Explanation or reason for introduction of bill/resolution:

To provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the Office of Administrative Hearings

Minutes:

Chairman Pollert called meeting to order on HB 1017.

Allen C. Hoberg, Director of the Office of Administrative Hearings, provided testimony which is labeled as attachment ONE. He went over this document with committee members interjecting with questions as follows.

Representative Kreidt: Regarding the Dept of Human Services (DHS) hearings, are the majority of those with disputes in regards to rates with nursing home residents?

Hoberg: We get very few of those actually. Within DHS, there are 25-30 different types of hearings. Probably the most common are child abuse/neglect hearing, followed mostly by Medicaid appeals.

Chairman Pollert: What would be the public service commission hearings?

Hoberg: Those would be hearings such as rate setting, informal and formal hearings, and compliant hearings. We do all the prehearing work with the commission actually at the hearing.

Vice Chairman Bellew: OAH is a special funded organization. Are those special funds general fund from other organizations?

Hoberg: The majority are special funds, including all our big users such as WSI, Human Services. A lot of it comes pass-through for the different applicants that are applying for PSC approval. A lot is also federal funds, especially Human Services.

Representative Nelson: Could you walk me through your salary package again? I understand the permanent positions and the compensation package. Do your five temps participate in the increase, and if they do, what levels of fringe do they participate in?

Hoberg: They're under a contract rate which is set by the agency, such as WSI, and us, and it is on a case by case basis.

Representative Nelson: Is that contract rate changing in the next biennium for those folks?

Hoberg: That's under discussion with WSI, it may be. That's a separate matter entirely. That would all come under the professional services, which is why I am asking for the increase. When we started in the last biennium, we were under a different structure. We underestimated the number of contract services we'd have under WSI.

Representative Kreidt: Periodically the administrative law judge will rule in favor of the facility, and then the department can go back and overrule the administrative law judge. I don't believe that's correct, but they have that power. Do the administrative law judges feel, why did I go through all this if the department can throw everything out that we've worked on and spent a lot of time and money doing. Do they ever make comments in regard to that?

Hoberg: Probably half the hearings that we conduct, including WSI hearings, the ALJs issue final decisions. For almost all of the Human Services hearings we do issue recommended decisions. They accept the vast majority of them. But even if they don't, they see somebody else's perspective, and sometimes they change things. And sometimes when they overrule us, it goes up to the courts and they get overruled. But yes, it can be frustrating sometimes.

Representative Kreidt: Going into district court there are additional expenses, which a lot of times individuals won't pursue because they can't afford to do that. I did look at the statutes and played at putting in a bill where the ALJ's decision would be final, but I didn't pursue it.

Hoberg: You might want to speak with Representative Koppelman. He approached me about the same thing you were asking about. I believe he's considering a study. Keep in mind some of the Human Services case load is under federal guidelines, that at least some people have interpreted to mean there has to be recommended decisions. But there are a lot of Human Services decisions that aren't under federal guidelines that could be final decisions. It's something that could be looked at.

Chairman Pollert: If you take on a case from DHS, roughly a third or half is general funds. If there's a case, is it because of an outside third party, and they would have paid into that fund, whether it be a rate or something or other?

Hoberg: It would depend on the case. If it's an application for a wind farm, yes, part of their application is paying for the hearing process. If it's a complaint by the PSC against somebody, then it wouldn't be part of the application fee. If it's a reclamation case where there was a notice of violation, it would be more like a complaint and would not come out of the company either. There's a difference between the application process, where it for sure comes out of the company, and the other types of cases.

Vice Chairman Bellew: Committee, do you think we need to do a detail? I don't believe it is really necessary for him to come back (next week) as long as we get the report from Office of Management and Budget.

Chairman Pollert: Is it correct to say that a lot of the increase in your budget is due to the initiated measure that passed?

Hoberg: It is an indirect result of that. The initiated measure requires WSI to use us. We run the operation, but it's by agreement by WSI and us. Probably 85% of it is handled by the contract ALJs and 15% by our permanent staff. However, three of those contract ALJs have been with us since 1995 doing WSI hearings.

Chairman Pollert: There has been no change in scope, we're on a steady course for this session?

Hoberg: Correct. Unless something else comes up, caseload will stay essentially the same as the last session.

Chairman Pollert: This is one of the quickest budgets ever, there being no further questions from the committee. We'll be at ease until the next section starts.

Chairman Holmberg: Meeting called back to order on Thursday, March 3, 2011 at 3:45 pm in reference to HB 1017 for the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) Tad H. Torgerson, OMB; and Sheila M Sandness. Legislative Council present.

Allen C. Hoberg: Director of the Office of Administrative Hearing testified in favor of HB 1017. (Attachment #1) His testimony contains information regarding the number of hearings the department heard and also the budget analysis. (An organizational chart is Attachment G.) This bill came out of the House without any amendments.

Chairman Holmberg: You might be interested to note that 20-15 which is the OMB budget had in its language, telling agencies how to pay out the money. That has a 4 in1so the budget itself would not be changed because the dollar amounts are the same.

Allen Hoberg: Continuing testimony.

Senator Kilzer: With the increasing costs, are you able to pass some of these costs on to your clients....particularly the DHS and WSI?

Allen Hoberg: Yes and no. We bill all agencies that we provide services forwe don't have any general funds. Our billing rate is based on the previous biennium, so the next biennium billing rate will be based on cost this biennium. We have to be very careful on how we spend our monies and how we spend our time to make sure we are able to cover all our costs. The increases will be passed on, but somewhat difficult for us. Sometimes it will be involving considerable working hours, but as long as the cases flow in, and we are able to provide those services, we have been able to cover the cost of increase, salaries, etc.

Senator Warner: What is the nature of hearing you do for DHS?

Allen Hoberg: We do about 30 different types of hearings, Medicaid, Day Care, Child abuse and neglect, development disabilities, etc. We do not do child support. Child Support is done by administrative offices. Our case load is increasing in DHSa large part is due to a big increase in child abuse and neglect type hearings. Our counter parts in other states along with us are seeing a large increase of those types of hearings.

Senator Wanzek: What are minimum requirements of an ALJ?

Allen Hoberg: The law currently states that the ALJ must be a member of the State Bar and a graduate of law school and has the bar exam in the state of ND. We have one administrative law judge who is grandfathered- in who is not a lawyer, but I am required by law, the next judge I would hire would have to be an lawyer. That person who is grandfathered- in has 30 years in of hearing experience and operates much like an attorney. She does a very good job.

Senator Grindberg: Why does this country and region have such an increase of child abuse?

Allen Hoberg: Some of it is a focus on what is going on within the families; probably what is being discovered now that wasn't discovered before. The social problems these days, drugs and other things have multiple factors. That question could be answered better by the social people who deal with that on a daily bases. In the hearings, we try to decide if someone did abuse, the causes, multiple causes in many cases.



The 2009-2011 biennium has been a relatively good biennium for the Office of Administrative Hearings ("OAH"), a return to normal operations plus some improvements. For the entire biennium OAH has again been conducting Workforce Safety and Insurance ("WSI") administrative hearings, unlike last biennium when WSI left OAH and then came back to OAH with the passage of 2008 Initiated Measure No. 4. The number of requests for hearings received from all of OAH's user agencies, boards, commissions, and local entities has increased. OAH now has hearing performance guidelines implemented for all of its user state agencies, boards, and commissions. OAH issued its first biennial report for the 2007-2009 biennium in December 2009.

OAH continues to receive requests to conduct administrative hearings from many different state agencies, boards and commission, and from local entities. Over the

years, OAH has conducted hearings for over 70 different state and local government agencies or entities. Some agencies make many requests for hearings each year, while others have made only a few requests for hearings since OAH was established in 1991. For example, in calendar year 2009, 22 different agencies or entities made 415 requests for hearings (Attachment "A"), and in calendar year 2010, 23 different agencies or entities made 436 requests for hearings (Attachment "B"). For comparison, in calendar year 2008, 24 different entities made 344 requests for hearings (Attachment "C"). In 2009 and 2010 combined, 30 different agencies or entities made 851 requests for hearings. OAH numbers its cases by calendar year; e.g., 20110001 would be the first request for a hearing received in 2011. Attachment "D" shows the number of hearings actually held for calendar years 2009 and 2010, 423. Thus, about half of the hearing requests actually went to hearing in those two years. Attachment "E" shows the number of prehearing conferences actually held for calendar years 2009 and 2010. Prehearing conferences are usually held for the more complex hearings. 195 prehearing conferences were held during those two years.

For the first 18 months of this biennium, through December 31, 2010, 25 different agencies or entities have made 651 requests for hearings. See attachment "E." As you can see, the bulk of requests for hearings each biennium come from two agencies, the

Department of Human Services and WSI. Another frequent OAH user, much more so recently, is the Public Service Commission.

OAH conducts hearings for state and local agencies and entities that are required to use OAH (see N.D.C.C. §§ 54-57-03(1); 40-51.2-12; 40-47-01.1; and 15.1-15-08), for state agencies that voluntarily use OAH (*e.g.*, the Public Service Commission, the Insurance Department, the Industrial Commission, the Department of Transportation for dealer licensing hearings, and Student Loans of North Dakota for student loan hearings), and for local entities that voluntarily use OAH (cities and counties that use OAH to conduct such hearings as employee discipline, tobacco sales enforcement, or public nuisance abatement hearings).

OAH's structure for conducting hearings is five permanent FTEs - 3 ALJs and 2 support staff, and seven temporary, contract ALJs. See attached organizational chart, Attachment "G." Six of OAH's contract ALJs conduct almost entirely WSI hearings. One contract ALJ conducts entirely PSC hearings. OAH's three full-time permanent ALJs conduct a mixture of different agency hearings but, primarily, DHS and PSC hearings. OAH proposes to move forward into the 2011-2013 biennium with the same structure.

BUDGET ANALYSIS

OAH's 2009-2011 budget for administrative hearings shows funding at \$1,498,712. When OAH submitted its requested 2009-2011 budget to the governor there remained uncertainty as to how OAH would continue its operations, under what structure as to the use of contract ALJs. As a result, the amount requested in operating expenses for payments to contract ALJs was underestimated. We have exceeded that estimated amount for the 2000-20011 biennium already. Thus, for the coming biennium OAH is requesting an increase of \$239,300 for payments to contract ALJs. OAH is also asking for an increase in operating expenses for building rent. OAH has now moved to a new location, effective January 1, 2011, because of Land Department staff expansion in our previous location in the Land Department building where OAH had been located since 1997. OAH anticipated this move and asked for a \$17,600 increase in building rental for this next biennium. The total increase in operating expenses for OAH for the coming biennium is \$256,900. I noted in my budget analysis last biennium that it was quite possible that OAH would exceed its operating budget appropriation because of increased use of contract ALJs to conduct WSI hearings, and that is what happened. We were alerted to the possibility of having to move from the Land Department building after the start of this biennium and now we have had to move.

OAH requested a budget of \$1,775,367 to the governor for the 2011-2013 biennium. This included a \$19,755 (2.2 percent) increase in salaries to address the 5 percent increase that was only funded for half of the current biennium under the phased-in 5 percent/5 percent increase passed last session for all state agencies. Other than this increase, OAH salaries remain the same in the budget OAH requested to the governor. There were no special equity salary increases included in OAH's budget request. The governor's executive budget recommendation for OAH does include the compensation package the governor recommended for all state agencies. Thus, the governor's recommendation for salary increases for OAH staff totals \$71,587 (OAH's requested increase of \$19,755 plus the governor's compensation package of \$51,832). The governor's total executive recommendation for OAH is \$1,827,199.

OAH continues to perform a vital task for state and local agencies, boards, commissions, and other governmental entities, both for mandatory and voluntary users of OAH's services, holding a wide variety of types of administrative hearings for these users. We believe that with OAH's current structure and the governor's executive budget recommendation, OAH will continue to meet the administrative hearing requirements of all those users of OAH's services which depend on OAH to conduct their hearings. Having a separate entity such as OAH for conducting administrative



The 2009-2011 biennium has been a relatively good biennium for the Office of Administrative Hearings ("OAH"), a return to normal operations plus some improvements. For the entire biennium OAH has again been conducting Workforce Safety and Insurance ("WSI") administrative hearings, unlike last biennium when WSI left OAH and then came back to OAH with the passage of 2008 Initiated Measure No. 4. The number of requests for hearings received from all of OAH's user agencies, boards, commissions, and local entities has increased. OAH now has hearing performance guidelines implemented for all of its user state agencies, boards, and commissions. OAH issued its first biennial report for the 2007-2009 biennium in December 2009.



OAH continues to receive requests to conduct administrative hearings from many different state agencies, boards and commission, and from local entities. Over the

years, OAH has conducted hearings for over 70 different state and local government agencies or entities. Some agencies make many requests for hearings each year, while others have made only a few requests for hearings since OAH was established in 1991. For example, in calendar year 2009, 22 different agencies or entities made 415 requests for hearings (Attachment "A"), and in calendar year 2010, 23 different agencies or entities made 436 requests for hearings (Attachment "B"). For comparison, in calendar year 2008, 24 different entities made 344 requests for hearings (Attachment "C"). In 2009 and 2010 combined, 30 different agencies or entities made 851 requests for hearings. OAH numbers its cases by calendar year; e.g., 20110001 would be the first request for a hearing received in 2011. Attachment "D" shows the number of hearings actually held for calendar years 2009 and 2010, 423. Thus, about half of the hearing requests actually went to hearing in those two years. Attachment "E" shows the number of prehearing conferences actually held for calendar years 2009 and 2010. Prehearing conferences are usually held for the more complex hearings. 195 prehearing conferences were held during those two years.

For the first 18 months of this biennium, through December 31, 2010, 25 different agencies or entities have made 651 requests for hearings. See attachment "F." As you can see, the bulk of requests for hearings each biennium come from two agencies, the

Department of Human Services and WSI. Another frequent OAH user, much more so recently, is the Public Service Commission.

OAH conducts hearings for state and local agencies and entities that are required to use OAH (see N.D.C.C. §§ 54-57-03(1); 40-51.2-12; 40-47-01.1; and 15.1-15-08), for state agencies that voluntarily use OAH (*e.g.*, the Public Service Commission, the Insurance Department, the Industrial Commission, the Department of Transportation for dealer licensing hearings, and Student Loans of North Dakota for student loan hearings), and for local entities that voluntarily use OAH (cities and counties that use OAH to conduct such hearings as employee discipline, tobacco sales enforcement, or public nuisance abatement hearings).

OAH's structure for conducting hearings is five permanent FTEs - three ALJs and two support staff, and seven part-time, contract ALJs. See attached organizational chart, Attachment "G." Six of OAH's contract ALJs conduct almost exclusively WSI hearings. One contract ALJ conducts exclusively PSC hearings. OAH's three full-time permanent ALJs conduct a mixture of different agency hearings but, primarily, DHS, PSC, and HRMS employee grievance hearings. OAH proposes to move forward into the 2011-2013 biennium with the same structure.

BUDGET ANALYSIS

OAH's 2009-2011 budget for administrative hearings shows funding at \$1,498,712. When OAH submitted its requested 2009-2011 budget to the governor, there remained uncertainty as to how OAH would continue its operations, under what structure as to the use of contract ALJs. As a result, the amount requested in operating expenses for payments to contract ALJs was underestimated. We have exceeded that estimated amount for the 2000-20011 biennium already. Thus, for the coming biennium OAH is requesting an increase of \$239,300 for payments to contract ALJs. OAH is also asking for an increase in operating expenses for building rent. OAH has now moved to a new location, effective January 1, 2011, because of Land Department staff expansion in our previous location in the Land Department building where OAH had been located since 1997. OAH anticipated this move and asked for a \$17,600 increase in building rental for this next biennium. The total increase in operating expenses for OAH for the coming biennium is \$256,900. I noted in my budget analysis last biennium that it was quite possible that OAH would exceed its operating budget appropriation because of increased use of contract ALJs to conduct WSI hearings, and that is what happened. We were alerted to the possibility of having to move from the Land Department building after the start of this biennium and now we have had to move.

OAH requested a budget of \$1,775,367 to the governor for the 2011-2013 biennium. This included a \$19,755 (2.2 percent) increase in salaries to address the 5 percent increase that was only funded for half of the current biennium under the phased-in 5 percent/5 percent increase passed last session for all state agencies. Other than this increase, OAH salaries remain the same in the budget OAH requested to the governor. There are no special equity salary increases included in OAH's budget request. The governor's executive budget recommendation for OAH does include the compensation package the governor recommended for all state agencies. Thus, the governor's recommendation for Salary increases for OAH staff totals \$71,587 (OAH's requested increase of \$19,755 plus the governor's compensation package of \$51,832). The governor's total executive recommendation for OAH is \$1,827,199. We understand that there may be changes to the governor's recommendation as to the salary package for OAH but HB 1017 did come out of the House without any amendments to it.

OAH continues to perform a vital task for state and local agencies, boards, commissions, and other governmental entities, both for mandatory and voluntary users of OAH's services, holding a wide variety of types of administrative hearings for these users. We believe that with OAH's current structure and the governor's executive budget recommendation, OAH will continue to meet the administrative hearing requirements of all those users of OAH's services which depend on OAH to conduct
