Minutes:

Chairman Nathe: Opened the hearing on HB 1201.

Representative Thomas Beadle: District 27. In support and introduced the HB 1201. ((See Attachment #1) (2:14-4:38)

Chairman Nathe: You mentioned about the matching grants, who might step up and do this.

Representative Beadle: I could see where maybe in technology fields like Microsoft, or perhaps we just have a number of pro education individuals that feel it would be worthwhile.

Chairman Nathe: Are there any other incentive programs already out there?

Representative Beadle: Last legislative session we appropriated \$5 million dollars towards performance funding within the University system. They had no idea how to spend that so they were looking at us for guidance. The HB 1261 that you will hear from in in a week or so has some frameworks for spending this money.

Rep Hunskor: Where did the fuel come from to bring this bill forward?

Representative Beadle: It came through discussions with Senator Flakoll, on how can we start encouraging some of the faculty members to increase technology usage. We thought a little recognition might help.

Rep Mock: Would the Challenge Grant that Universities receive be eligible to match this program?

Representative Beadle: I am not sure.

Chairman Nathe: We will discuss that later on this morning that is for educational infrastructure, we are looking at something that gives people incentives, they are two different things.

Rep Mock: So the language would preclude this program from being eligible to benefit from the Challenge Grant?

Chairman Nathe: Yes. I think so.

Rep Meier: Did you think the \$4800 dollars is enough or did you think of going a little higher for the incentives?

Representative Beadle: \$4800 dollars was kind of the beauty of this bill since It would not have to go to Appropriations, so that is why the \$4800 limit came about. Even a little bit helps to show we value the faculty.

Rep Meier: Currently would they be nominated by their peers, or could they nominate themselves?

Representative Beadle: That would be left up to the school board of the school.

Chairman Nathe: Any more support of HB 1201?

Lisa Feldner: from the North Dakota University System. We are in support of this bill and urge the committee a Do Pass.

Chairman Nathe: Anyone else here in support of HB 1201. Seeing none. Any opposition? None. Closed the hearing on HB 1201.

Rep Mock: Moved Do Pass on HB 1201.

Rep Kelsh: Seconded the motion.

Chairman Nathe: Any discussion?

Rep Olson: I am curious about the language on page 2 line 6&7 where it talks about the matching grants, if they become available they may increase the number of grants in each category. Is that the intention that there could just be any amount given out by these matching grants?

Chairman Nathe: The matching grants would be for the amount specified in the bill. So if your are eligible the match would be a \$1000.

Rep Olson: So the most that could be matched would be another \$4800 dollars.

Chairman Nathe: That is correct.

Rep Zubke: On line 14 after the state board of higher education shall select, does that force them to select someone, what if no one impresses them?

Chairman Nathe: No they do not have to pick someone but if there are nominations in front of them they would have to pick someone.

Vice Chairman Schatz: I do have a little trouble with this bill, some people getting money and some not, I think if everybody got some I would feel better.

Chairman Nathe: I like the bill, if you can give incentive to encourage new ideas, it is a good thing. It helps to raise their bar and take more pride.

Rep Ben Koppelman: Is there anything that suggests that by them having an innovative use of technology for instruction that this efficiency would save the University or even students money? Would there be any savings?

Chairman Nathe: If they come up with a better innovative way to deliver instruction there may be some cost savings.

Rep Hunskor: I am going to support the bill, but considering declining enrollment, we scrutinize funding even it is a large amount going out for increasing enrollment, yet a bill like this rewards professors for doing a good job, which is good but maybe there is other places the money would do more good.

Rep Olson: I have a little concern the unintended consequences, once we open this door we might need to incentivize other areas.

Chairman Nathe: That door has been open a while ago. Any other discussion? Seeing none. We will take the Roll.

Chairman Flakoll called the committee to order at 2:30pm with all committee members present.

Thomas Beadle, District 27 Representative (see attachment #1)

(4:15) **Senator Schaible**: Isn't this something that a teacher should be doing anyway? **Representative Beadle**: I would say yes; however we also understand that when you get 10 year faculty members, they don't always necessarily want to innovate. This is trying to reward those who will break the mold and set a higher bar.

Senator Schaible: If this is this an ongoing program, is this going to be a grant looking for an applicant then?

Representative Beadle: I would hope not. The board "shall" call for applications, but if no applications are received, I don't believe they have to force an award onto an individual. the \$4,800 is only going to last for a biennium. It is to jumpstart the overall technology innovation that is happening in our colleges. HCR 3009 and HCR 3013 last session were the two that I put forward that pushed open education resources. Since then we have had the opportunity to the partner with the University of Minnesota's library in order to help expand open source access across campuses. We urge the faculty Senate to start looking at adoption. It didn't catch hold until Dr. Tanya Spilovoy at the University System office took the reins and sought out some funding from the Governor's office to try to make some partnerships work. The goal is to build off the momentum of seeking new technology and reward those teachers that are willing to take a risk to try something new and adopt a new standard of excellence in our institutions.

Senator Marcellais: Would you have a problem if we added tribal colleges to this grant? **Representative Beadle**: The Tribal colleges do not fall under the purview of the Board of Higher Education. If we wanted to open it up to Tribal colleges you may also run the risk of opening up Tribal colleges being under the purview of the Board of Higher Education and all of their regulations and controls.

Senator Marcellais: That may be a good idea to put them under the Board.

Representative Beadle: I wouldn't be opposed to that, but it would probably kill the bill.

Chairman Flakoll: At \$4,800 it didn't go to house appropriations then?

Representative Beadle: No it did not. That number was strategically chosen.

Chairman Flakoll: Do you know how many faculty members who have the title of professor

or lecturer or instructor there would be within the University system?

Representative Beadle: I can't answer that but it could be provided for you.

(10:15) Lisa Feldner, Vice Chancellor for the University System

Feldner: We support this bill. We are sending out a survey to all faculties at the end of the month to find out how many are using open educational resources, so that we can have a baseline and be able to measure after we release our promoting it this year. Then we will survey again the following year.

Chairman Flakoli: Would this apply to anyone who teaches in a classroom setting or any kind of class regardless of their status or rank?

Feldner: I was wondering that too. We are sending it out to all faculty and adjunct. In my opinion it should apply to all, but I am not the final decision maker on that.

Chairman Flakoll: closes the hearing on HB 1201.
