The1<sup>st</sup> time we increased employee contribution in that plan was last session, and it was 1%. This session will bring them up another 1.5 %. Considering what we have had to do with the main PERS plan, this plan has been doing very well.

This phases out the National Guard security and firefighter retirement plan and transfers all of the employees that were in that plan into the Law Enforcement with prior main service plan. (Fiscal Note - Attachment 2)

**Senator G. Lee**: What happened to those people that were the firefighters that were in Fargo?

**General Dohrmann**: We worked with them for over 18 months and through some help from our federal congressional delegation, we got them extended for awhile. In reality, we had to reduce that force from 28 to zero. When we stopped doing that mission at Hector Field, it became the responsibility of the Fargo Airport Authority to take up the mission. Without our jets that we used to have there, their requirement was only 10 firefighters, so of that 28 that were let go, ten of them were employed by the Fargo Airport Authority. The other eighteen were released with a small severance to find them other opportunities within their career field.



These changes have become necessary due to significant reductions in our authorized manning.

With the loss of our manned flying mission at Hector Field in Fargo, we also loss our authority to have a federally reimbursed fire department, resulting in an elimination of 28 federally reimbursed state employees. Additionally, the federally reimbursed Army National Guard security guards' authorized numbers have been reduced from 24 to 12. This leaves us with just 15 state employees in this defined benefits program. Because of this small number, we feared that the employee contribution numbers would not be large enough to sustain the National Guard Security and Firefighter plan. NDPERS concurred with this concern and has worked with us to present the bill before you today. Looking at similar plans that anticipated an earlier retirement age, and working with NDPERS, it was determined that the Law Enforcement with prior main service plan would be the most appropriate for our remaining 15 employees.

This bill does three things. First, it phases out the "National Guard Security Officers and Firefighters" retirement program [NDCC 54-52-06.2] on July 31, 2015 and transfers all plan participants to the Law Enforcement plan under NDCC 54-52-06.4. Second, based on current NDPERS actuarial assessments, Section 2 of this Bill increases the employee's contribution from its current 4.5% to 6 % at the start of the biennium, with a follow on reduction to 5.5% on January 1, 2016. Third, Section 4 of the Bill adds an option for our members to utilize the "Rule of 85", which makes our members retirement options consistent with all other members in the plan.

There should be no fiscal impact to the State since all state obligations under this plan are reimbursed from the federal government under a cooperative agreement.

## TESTIMONY OF NDPERS ON SENATE BILL 2102

Mr. Chairman, members of the committee, good morning my name is Kathy Allen and I am the Benefit Programs Manager at the North Dakota Public Employees Retirement System (PERS). Today I appear before you in support of SB2102. This bill relates to the National Guard security officers and firefighters retirement plan and retirement contributions and benefits for those members. Specifically, National Guard security officers and firefighters would become members in the Law Enforcement with prior main service plan and contributions and benefits would be aligned accordingly.

During the interim, NDPERS worked in conjunction with the National Guard administration to develop this bill. It was recognized that there was declining membership in the National Guard plan and it was proposed that the members and associated plan assets transfer to the Law Enforcement plan. It was determined this approach would be the best strategy to provide for the long term stability of a plan for National Guard members. The technical analysis by Segal Company indicated this proposal would not have any adverse effect on the Law Enforcement plan.





Because of this small number, we feared that the employee contribution numbers would not be large enough to sustain the National Guard Security and Firefighting plan. NDPERS concurred with this concern and has worked with us to present the bill before you today. Looking at similar plans that anticipated an earlier retirement age, and working with NDPERS, it was determined that the Law Enforcement with prior main service plan would be the most appropriate for the remaining employees.

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There should be no general fund fiscal impact to the State since all state obligations under this plan are reimbursed from the federal government under a cooperative agreement.

I ask for your support for this bill and will stand for any questions you may have.
