Explanation or reason for introduction of bill/resolution:

Relating to public improvement bid and bond thresholds

Chairman Klein: Called the committee to order.

Senator Kannianen: (:45-1:53) Introduced the bill. This is a fairly straight forward bill. The purpose is to bring uniformity across the threshold for bidding and bonding requirements. In the previous legislative session, the threshold was increased for architects and engineers, requirements up to 150,000 dollars and this bill would do the same.

Chairman Klein: Have we had issues, have there been problems since we passed that other portion?

Senator Kannianen: I don't think there has been any real issues. This is to bring clarity and uniformity so there aren't some projects that require bidding and bonding but don't require the engineers and architects. Things like that, it seems to just make it cleaner for everybody.

Chairman Klein: Asked how they missed it last session.

Russ Hanson ~ Associated General Contractors of ND: I believe these thresholds have been place since 1991, beginning with 25,000. We are adjusted to 50,000 sometime thereafter, I think 1997, was when it was last changed.

Chairman Keiser: Have you ever requested to go down?

Hanson: No we haven't. Our board met & we had a discussion about this bill because we have been in strong defenders of \$100,000 threshold. We like the competitiveness, transparence & the ability to compete for the jobs. The board indicated that having the uniformity is important & we would like to get back to that uniformity.

If the legislature wants to go to the \$150,000 for each, we would be ok with that. However, I would predict that in the future someone would be opposing further increases for some time. We do like the transparent process.

We were opposed to the bill that you dealt with earlier this session that took it to a quarter of a million. We thought that was too high.

Chairman Keiser: This affect bidding & bonding.

Bonnie Staiger ~ Executive Director of AIA ND: We support this bill. We are not in favor of the thresholds being raised. We opposed the \$250,000 that was an earlier bill in this session. We know that it's important for these numbers to be the same, so it does not create confusion. We suffered for the last 2 years that the numbers were different, so we are recognizing the need for the same numbers.

Chairman Keiser: Anyone else here to testify in support, opposition of SB 2146?

John Boyle ~ Director of Facility & Management: I'm not so opposed to raising the threshold to \$150,000, I would prefer that the architect threshold came back to \$100,000.

What I'm really opposed to, is how many times are you allowed to give a contractor a job during a 12-month period. If we really want to make it similar to the architect, the architect today can do 2 jobs or a job up to \$25,000, \$50,000. There is a bill that says \$35,000, \$70,000 but on this it's a \$150,000 but it's not limited. I could give somebody 8 jobs that are a \$125,000 & it's a million dollars' worth of work. There's no competition.

I would the committee could consider you could give \$150,000 of work in one shot or up to a \$450,000 during a 12-month period. If one is capped they both should be capped.

Chairman Keiser: Capped at what?

Boyle: Something like \$450,000.

Chairman Keiser: Is that the architect?

Boyle: No the architect is capped today at \$50,000. You can get multiple jobs, but you can't pay an architect more than \$50,000 in a 12-month period.

Rep Laning: If that same contractor would bid a job, it would be something separate?

Boyle: That's correct, there's no bidding in this process right here.

Chairman Keiser: Aren't we comparing apples & oranges? An architect makes 10% on a project. These are construction projects. The cost can be significantly higher for the construction site for the bid of the bond than for the architect. Isn't it?

Boyle: I not arguing that point at all. If you want to raise it to \$150,000, I don't have a problem with that. I would much rather the architect limit come down to a \$100,000. Without any cap, I had 15 jobs that were less than a \$150,000, I could give them to one contractor over a biennium. That doesn't seem right to me.

Chairman Keiser: Anyone here to testify in opposition, neutral position? Closes the hearing. We will hold the bill.

Good Morning Chairman Klein and members of the Senate Industry, Business, and Labor Committee, my name is William Sherwin, here today representing the members of the Dakotas Chapter of the National Electrical Contractors Association and the ND Association of Plumbing, Heating & Mechanical Contractors.

On behalf of our contractor members I'd like to voice our combined support of Senate Bill 2146, which brings consistency and parity across the bidding and bonding process located under NDCC 48-01.2. The proposed changes as suggested by the bill would raise the bidding and bonding thresholds to one hundred fifty thousand dollars bringing these sections into agreement with other requirements in NDCC 15.1-36-01, NDCC 43-19.1-28, and NDCC 48-01.2-02.1. In the 64th Assembly, HB 1426 made multiple changes to thresholds in the previously mentioned sections raising the base amounts from one hundred thousand dollars to one hundred fifty thousand dollars. By passing SB 2146, the legislature will bring the bidding and bonding thresholds up to one hundred fifty thousand dollars and into parity with the changes made by the 64th Assembly in HB 1426.

For these reasons I would ask the committee in its wisdom give SB 2146 a "Do Pass" recommendation and bring consistency and clarity to the bidding and bonding process.

Sixty-fourth Legislative Assembly of North Dakota In Regular Session Commencing Tuesday, January 6, 2015

HOUSE BILL NO. 1426 (Representatives Steiner, Rick C. Becker, Devlin, Trottier)

AN ACT to amend and reenact subsection 1 of section 15.1-36-01 and sections 43-19.1-28 and 48-01.2-02.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to approval of school construction projects by the superintendent of public instruction and bids and plans and specifications for public improvements; and to provide for application.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Subsection 1 of section 15.1-36-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

Notwithstanding the powers and duties of school boards provided by law, the superintendent
of public instruction shall approve the construction, purchase, repair, improvement,
modernization, or renovation of any public school building or facility before commencement of
the project if the cost of the project, as estimated by the school board, is in excess of one
hundred <u>fifty</u> thousand dollars.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 43-19.1-28 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

43-19.1-28. Public works.

Except as otherwise provided by law, the state and its political subdivisions may not engage in the construction of public works involving the practice of professional engineering when the contemplated expenditure for the project exceeds the sum of one hundred <u>fifty</u> thousand dollars, unless the engineering drawings and specifications and estimates have been prepared by, and the construction administration and construction observation services are executed under the supervision of, a registered professional engineer. Any engineering contract executed in violation of this section is void.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 48-01.2-02.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

48-01.2-02.1. Public improvement construction threshold.

The threshold for bidding construction of a public improvement is one hundred thousand dollars. The threshold for procuring plans, drawings, and specifications from an architect or engineer for construction of a public improvement is one hundred <u>fifty</u> thousand dollars.

SECTION 4. APPLICATION. Sections 2 and 3 of this Act apply to any public improvement project for which a contract or agreement for plans, drawings, or specifications is executed after the effective date of this Act.

Testimony of Eric Volk, Executive Director

ND Rural Water Systems Association

Senate Bill 2146

Senate Industry, Business and Labor Committee – January 17, 2017

Chairman Klein and members of the Senate Industry, Business and Labor Committee, my name is Eric Volk. I am the executive director of the North Dakota Rural Water Systems Association (NDRWSA) which serves a membership of more than 250 cities, 28 rural/regional water systems, and four tribal systems. Those rural/regional water systems provide water to nearly 250,000 residents. Today I am submitting testimony in support of Senate Bill 2146.

The NDRWSA is committed to ensuring all North Dakota's residents receive affordable drinking water of excellent quality and sufficient quantity. NDRWSA is committed to completing and maintaining North Dakota's water infrastructure for economic growth and quality of life. Last session, the NDRWSA supported changes to the public improvement construction thresholds (supported increasing both thresholds to \$150,000). One thing to remember, bidding a project requires very detailed engineering specifications and preparation of official bid documents. These two thresholds go hand in hand and should be kept at the same levels.

For the record, I want to say that we fully understand the importance of the bid process and we support the roles engineers and architects play in most North Dakota water projects. The current engineering/architect threshold was increased to one hundred fifty thousand dollars in 2015. The current bid threshold was increased to one hundred thousand dollars in 1997. Today's value of one hundred thousand dollars is a little over one hundred fifty thousand dollars. In talking with several rural water systems, some routine maintenance items and numerous system

improvements are exceeding today's threshold. These items are tasks that can be done in house without the need to bid them or to involve an engineer, but since they are sometimes over the thresholds, they are required to follow current law.

Booster Station Example

A water system in North Dakota needed to improve pressure and flow in one area of their system. After much research, they decided that an inline booster station would solve their problems. With the help of the system's control, pump and pipe experts, they designed an inline booster station. Using a familiar local contractor, the project was completed. Total price tag of this project was just below the one hundred thousand dollar threshold. Even though this improvement project did not have an engineer's stamp or was subject to the bidding process, it was a successful project that did not endanger the public and did not waste money.

A vast array of water projects could be completed in a similar manner. Many more could be completed if the bidding threshold is increased. Small systems must be allowed to find ways to save money. A study completed by the United States Environmental Protection Agency revealed the rates needed to cover future infrastructure repair and replacement for small systems will be four times as high as their larger counterparts.

Water system projects are normally approved by the governing board. Decisions approved by the governing board on no bid contracts protect the public from collusion and kickbacks from contractors/suppliers. Systems that feel more comfortable with lower thresholds have the choice to put engineering and bidding ordinances/policies in place to meet their specific requirements.

With that said, I urge you to give SB 2146 a do pass recommendation. Thank you for your time and I will stand for any questions. EV

Senate Bill 2146

Good Morning Chairman Klein and Committee Members. My name is Steve Tabor. I am the owner of S.A. Tabor Architecture here in Bismarck. I appear here in favor of Senate Bill 2146.

The proposed amendments to Chapter 48 of the North Dakota Century Code contained in this bill seek to bring consistency to the dollar values in both of the referenced sections of Chapter 48. During the last legislative session the threshold for procuring plans, drawings and specifications from and architect or engineer for the construction of a public improvement was changed from one hundred thousand dollars to one hundred fifty thousand dollars. The dollar threshold for bidding the construction of a public improvement in section 48-01.2-02.1 and the dollar threshold requiring a bond for a public improvement in section 48-01.2-10 were left at one hundred thousand dollars. This difference in dollar thresholds can create confusion for state agencies and political subdivisions when undertaking public improvements.

These amendments would alleviate confusion by requiring the same dollar thresholds for bidding, procurement of architectural or engineering services and bonding for public improvements.

That completes my testimony. I would be glad to answer any questions the committee may have.
