Representative Anderson: Are most of these crimes committed on or off the reservation?

Representative Buffalo: If we look at the Native American population, there is a sense of transient population that moved from a reservation to a town or city. It's hard to say because there is a lot of work that has to be done on the data gap.

Representative Schneider: Are you thinking this will add to and support the congressional delegation as it garners support nationally for Savannas Act?

Representative Buffalo: Yes. We hope that this will show our congressional delegation that there is support back here in North Dakota.

Representative Rohr: Line 19, it says that there is hope to improve tribal access to federal crime information data bases, isn't that already occurring?

Representative Buffalo: My understanding is that there is work that needs to be addressed in gaining access and having that communication shared widely between the different levels of government.

Danielle Finn, Standing Rock: I am the delegated person to come and speak to you today on behalf of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe. The Tribal Council men are actually stuck in Tribal Council. I am a judge down in Cheyenne River and also External Affairs Director, so I have a letter he would like me to read. See (Testimony # 2) 7:30

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There is currently 506 missing native women, that is on and off the reservation. Regarding shared data base. We don't always get federal information. We have to go through a TAP Program (Tribal Access Program) You have to qualify to get into that program, there is only certain tribes that have access to that program. Standing Rock recently got access to that program, so that way we do have shared data bases but not all tribes have that access.

Representative Rohr: What Criteria do you have to have to access the TAP program?

Danielle Finn: You have to have a skilled set of law enforcement, Proper training, where SORNA-Sex Offender Registration Information comes from, that has to be implemented as well into your tribe and you share that data base federally and tribally. You have to meet qualifications not all tribes can meet the qualifications, the tribes have different kinds of law enforcement whether it is BIA or they 638 it and they have their own tribal police.

Representative Rohr: Is there a cost for the tribes?

Danielle Finn: No

Chairman Weisz: Support?

10:00 **Dustin Peyer:** Former employer of the Three Affiliated Tribes. To create this standardization at a federal level is needed. The reservation has a lot of violence.

Representative Tveit: Are the limitations inside or outside the reservation?

Dustin Peyer: As a whole, creating a standardization so different jurisdictions can work together.

Chairman Weisz: Support?

Tracey Elk-Wilkey: Enrolled, grew up with Savannah's family. Support

Richard Jensen: I am a citizen of North Dakota I grew up in the Grand Forks area. I want to look at the big picture. Two 18-year-old girls, 1 white, one brown. Native American girl goes missing, nothing is done. 18-year-old Caucasian goes missing from college, National news is dispatched everyone is looking for her. There is a difference there, we have to change how we view and value, not just indigenous women but women as a whole.

Melody Angel Monez: Three Affiliated Tribes, Ft. Berthold: Tragedies happen on and off the reservation. When issues occur, jurisdiction becomes an issue. I got robbed and called the BIA for help, McLean county for help and it took 4-5 hours for jurisdiction to be determined.

Joseph McNeil, Former Standing rock council member: Tasked with bringing our tribe up to speed technology. We have three jurisdictions: Tribal Jurisdiction, County Jurisdiction and Federal Jurisdiction. Savannas Act will have the Federal government set forth rules and regulations that will allow for that cross sharing of data. Emergencies response takes a long

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period of time. Once response occurs, BIA reports to Aberdeen which may take 4-7 days to response. This Act will allow the information to travel faster.

Sheridan McNeil Citizen: I am here to support Savannas Act; I am from Cannonball but I live in Bismarck. Native women are murdered at ten times the national average and 84% of native women have experienced violence in their life time according to the national crime information center in 2016 there were 125 cases of missing native women in North Dakota alone, numbers are likely higher since there is no prodigal that currently exists to collect data and cases of missing native women, ultimately native women will continue to go missing and murdered as a result of a system that is broken, with inaccurate or unaccounted data and lack of training. We cannot expect any organization to adequately respond to any violence that it does not tract. In this day and age everything is data based and number based and if we can't actually see accurate data or if no data is actually collected there is no way that we can expect a response from law enforcement, or anyone else for that matter to keep our women and children safe. Creating a system of accountability accuracy and adequate training will help bring these cases to justice and will decrease the number of victims, In order to create a stronger healthier nation we must come together.

She was eight months pregnant when she went missing. Savanna was a member of the Spirit Lake Nation and descendant of the Turtle Mountain band of Chippewa tribe.

Savanna's premature death and murder unfortunately highlighted what many communities across the nation have experienced. Native women are murdered at ten times the national average, and 84 percent of Native women have experienced violence in their lifetime. In 2016, North Dakota had 125 reported cases of missing Native women according to the National Crime Information Center (NCIC), but numbers are likely much higher as no protocol exists to collect the data and cases are underreported. NCIC also reported that in 2016, there were 5,712 national reports of missing American Indian and Alaska Native women and girls, but only 116 of those cases were logged though the US Department of Justice's federal missing persons database.

Savanna's Act will improve cooperation between all levels of government including tribal, state and federal by enhancing tribal access to federal crime databases, create protocol for responding to missing Native Americans and establish an annual report to Congress. This legislation is necessary to address the epidemic of missing and murdered indigenous women and girls in the United States.

We urge you to vote for a do pass recommendation for this very important resolution urging members of the United State Congress to pass Savanna's Act which is co-sponsored by our US Senators Cramer and Hoeven.
