Based on recent sales reported by boat dealers, we estimate this transfer could be approximately \$250,000 per year, if interpreted more broadly than defined in the bill. Chair Unruh: Opened the hearing.

Senator Dave Oehlke, District 15 (0:20-10:00) Introduced the bill, please see attachment #1 for visual aid. These are pictures from North Dakota Game and Fish website, detailing aquatic nuisance species (ANS), and the infested waters in North Dakota. If you look at various maps, the first page talks about Curlyleaf Pondweed infestation and how extensive they are in various parts of North Dakota, the map is on the next page. I've been in ponds, rivers, and streams in Minnesota that are so thick with this type of weed, that you can barely pass. I've seen how bad it can get. Carp is an ANS, we work hard keeping it out of Devils Lake, with the help of Game and Fish Department, but it sneaks in through the Red River. It's very close to some major tributaries that drain into Devils Lake. Zebra Mussel is one you hear about a lot about, because of the infestations in Minnesota and the Great Lakes. I have seen a shopping cart retrieved and brought it to Wahpeton to show what it was like, totally encrusted with zebra mussels, that type of thing can be very hazardous to our waters ways. It should be clear that North Dakota Game and Fish does have a ANS program, but it has one employee. That employee is not able to do everything that is necessary. It is incredible how these problems can occur and propagate. In agriculture, palmer amaranth wasn't a word around here 5 years ago, now it's a big deal. Rather than wait until we have to address some of these issues with more aggressive means that will take a lot more expense because it will involve chemicals. These kinds of weeds can affect communities, we're not just talking about fishing, we're talking about issues that happened with water brought into Grand Forks and Fargo out of the river, what happens if the intakes or outtakes are clogged with these nuisance species. We feel the necessity for Game and Fish to do a bigger job, not a better job, what they have right now, a half-million dollar budget on this issue, we need to put together a program to address it more aggressively.

A couple things I'd point out: section 1 establishes a fund. Section 2 does talk about fuels tax. Admittedly we threw several different options in here, hoping that some or all of them

would be used. We came up with this one by taking the number of boats prevalent and registered and multiplying by 64, the average gallons used in a given year, and taking a portion of fuels tax on that number of gallons by x number of boats would give x number of dollars per year. The fiscal note, hard to know for sure how accurate they can be, that's the idea on that part of it. I know that takes money away from other areas, I don't feel it's an enough of an amount to deter the idea from getting some feet here. Section 3 talks about sales tax. Myles Vosberg will talk about that, there are some issues about just how that can be collected. The average boat seller also sells other stuff like life jackets. Do we want that as part of the income for this fund, or would you rather just have boats only? That would be difficult to figure. I don't think that's something that should make that much of a difference to people recreating. The fund itself, in appropriations we learned that Game and Fish invests their money right now, they're required to maintain at least \$15 million in a fund. Right now there's \$29 million in that fund, but only \$15 million is what we're talking about, the other amount has to be used for day to day operations. The \$15 million has been invested at the Bank of North Dakota at a very low interest rate. There's an interest there to have that moved over to the State Investment Board so that the interest on it could be more like what we get from our Legacy Fund dollars. There is one word in that section on line 24, that says 'must' that would have to be changed to 'may'. The Game and Fish will talk about that. It has to do with how we can't tell the feds how to spend their interest money. There is a need out there. The pictures tell, there could be more.

Senator Roers: Have you seen any of these species show up in Devils Lake yet?

Sen Oehlke: No. One of the reasons we haven't is that most wouldn't like it there, carp would thrive there. It has a higher salinity content than a lot of our river ways and waterways do; you get to the fresher water areas; the James, Red, and Missouri Rivers, those waterways are more likely to be affected than lakes like Devils Lake.

Rich Brueckner, Devils Lake, President, North Dakota Sport Fishing Congress (11:42-19:50) Testified in favor, please see attachment #2.

Chair Unruh: Could you explain what a watercraft wash station would look like? Would it be mandatory to go through?

Rich Brueckner: I don't have the exact parameters, it would be a station manned by three individuals who would then conduct an inspection, do a wash down, which would wash out any live wells, trailer components and interior of a boat. Basically try to decontaminate that unit to make it safe to put in our waters. I don't know the exact details in other wash stations that exist, Colorado and Montana for example, they collect all that wash off so it doesn't end up back in a storm sewer system or back in our rivers or waterways.

Chair Unruh: The points listed for areas we could use these have a lot of different entry points, would you want us to consider requiring watercrafts to go through these wash stations before entering a handful of these points or how do you see this working logistically?

Rich Brueckner: That would be wonderful if we could mandate it, but as you mentioned, there are too many entry points on many lakes. At this time, with three locations, we would identify a central, high traffic location where most units are coming through, that will depend

on obtaining land and property to set it up on, right now with the current advertising or educational process begin to notify those that receive a license that a wash station is available at that particular location.

Senator Roers: In looking through your sources of revenue, I see that you've got fishing licenses both in and out-of-state, but waterfowl license, you don't delineate in-state or out-of-state.

Rich Brueckner: When you obtain a fishing license or a general combination license, you are issued a certificate, so you'll have to have that certificate whether it's fishing or fishing and hunting. That \$3 applies to the certificate.

Michael Gunsch, Chairman, North Dakota Missouri River Advisory Council (23:40-) Testified in favor, please see attachment #3 and #4. Montana is looking at a potential risk of \$234 million dollars annually. The time is now, waiting only increases the costs that the state will incur at a later date. This is a modest approach to the issue. What we are going to find over time as things are monitored is what level of risk we actually have. We don't have a lot of information from inspections, because we aren't doing that many.

Senator Piepkorn: Why would we say, we're doing some, but not as much as our neighboring states. What's the obstacle to not ramping it up?

Michael Gunsch: The main obstacle is the funding source. It comes down to this is the initial step. It would be nice to go to a much higher level. Obviously I think there would be some resistance to that higher level. This step is a modest one, it was pointed out that we would gather data working with Game and Fish, if it becomes more serious, we and other organizations will get back and say we need more.

Senator Piepkorn: In my opinion, in 2-4 years we're going to be wishing we'd aimed higher.

Michael Gunsch: If you want to fund this higher, we would be happy to see that happen. Providing Game and Fish with additional resources would be greatly appreciated.

Mary Massad, North Dakota Water Users Association (28:20-31:20) Testified in support, please see attachment #5. Costs are astronomical, prevention is worth a pound of cure and more so. In Idaho, the Operations and Management costs are \$90 million to deal with ANS.

Chair Unruh: They seem to be focusing on leveraging user fees to pay for the ANS Program. This is the first testimony on industries really being affected by it. Would there be a way, or would the Water Users Association support a different funding source that would result in a fee for the people that would be affected is this way?

Mary Massad: Yes, it would be additional fees, whether prevention or in defense of ANS.

Jeff Frith, Manger Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource Board (33:30-41:00) Testified in favor, please see attachment # 6.

Senator Cook: What do you mean by filter water?

Jeff Frith: What they're doing by filtering the water is they're sucking through the water to extract the nutrients from it, the phytoplankton, the bottom of food chain. It greatly inhibits the food chain. It does potentially make the water clearer, allowing light to penetrate further, so you would have growth of aquatic plants further down. It's just one of those scary things, we haven't had a great deal of impacts; there's some in the Red River. These zebra mussels are transported by stream flow and man; we have to inspect, enforce and educate.

Blair Ihmels, Friends of Lake Sakakawea, ND Aquatic Invasive Species Committee (43:20-46:10) Testified in favor, please see attachment # 7.

Senator Piepkorn: You're suggesting we could spread the pain of the cost of a system, since it will affect more than fisheries and sportsmen. Looking at other funding sources, municipalities, industry. Are you suggesting that's a possibility?

Blair Ihmels: I agree, I sit on this committee with one of the industry components, MinnKota Power. They are very aware what's going on in Minnesota, they are affected. I think there needs to be an effort from industry, agriculture and citizens to really effectively fight it.

Mike McEnroe, ND Wildlife Society (47:40-50:00) Testified in opposition, please see attachment #8.

Steve Salwei, Transportation Programs Director, ND DOT (50:30-52:10) Testified in opposition, please see attachment # 9.

Chair Unruh: Help us with the logistics of these sections, motor vehicles fuel tax, collection for sales tax and dividing that all out, how does that work?

Myles Vosberg, North Dakota Tax Commissioners Office, Provided Neutral agency information. The fuel tax is based on a formula, we have no concern with, administratively. But section 3, the sales tax portion, a couple of concerns, first it calls for a half a percent on the value of the previous year's boat sales for sales tax purposes. When the boat dealers report their sales, they have one lump sum amount of sales. We can't segregate out the boats. The other concern is the language in that section is confusing because it talks about a half a percent on the previous year's reported sales, but then it also talks about collected under section 39.2-02, which is the sales tax imposition section. The collected under that section means you are talking about tax and not the sales, that language could be adjusted a little. That is the only concerns we had. Under the fiscal note, the \$250,000 calculated under section 3 of the bill, we looked at the total sales of boat dealers, we used the half percent of their total taxable sales. We overshot what's intended there.

Kim Kary, Chief of Administrative Services Division, North Dakota Game and Fish Department (55:50-1:00:50) Provided Neutral agency testimony, please see attachment # 10.

Chair Unruh: Was Game and Fish consulted with or did they participate in the writing of this legislation?

Kim Kary: No, not the crafting of the law, no. The \$15 million piece was already in a previous bill by OMB, and the other language, no.

Senator Cook: Tell me what Game ND Fish spends today on ANS prevention.

Kim Kary: Senator Oehlke stated \$533,000 per biennium. We have one FTE and we provide a grant to Valley City State for students to do ANS research. We gave them a \$205,000 grant to help us out since we are a one-person shop. We do education and advertising, and that takes \$533,000.

Senator Cook: Apparently Game and Fish thinks that's enough, and there's a room full of people that would like to see a whole lot more spent.

Kim Kary: We're not saying that's enough. We realize more needs to be done, but when we had to cut our appropriation we couldn't request more spending authority. We're saying we're willing to work with the committee, we couldn't request new FTEs we had to cut FTEs when we put our budget together we were included in the 10% cuts, we did not ask for any more money for ANS as part of our 2019 budget.

Senator Cook: What does it cost to fish in North Dakota and Minnesota?

Kim Kary: In North Dakota if you buy a resident license it is \$16; and Minnesota is \$24 for a resident.

Senator Cook: Is it safe to say a fishing license for a non-resident is cheaper in North Dakota than it is in the state they come from?

Kim Kary: I'm getting a nod that that is correct. I have some license numbers from in-state and out-of-state residents and where the out-of-state residents are coming from. Minnesota fisherman accounts for 60% of our non-resident anglers.

Senator Cook: Why don't we just charge out-of-state residents that they would charge a North Dakota resident to fish in their state. That would raise considerable revenue that could be used to fund more ANS programs.

Kim Kary: It could, the license fees are set by the legislature.

Chair Unruh: A question about using the fees only for specific items, if we did that would that same section apply? Could we direct those funds? I thought I understood you say that we couldn't take those fee funds and direct them towards a specific program.

Kim Kary: If you charge an additional fee for a specific program, that's fine. We do that for PLOTS right now, there's an additional fee on the general gaming habitat and then that x-amount of money from that \$3 goes to the PLOTS Program. We can't take all of the Game and Fish's money, earn interest on it, take all that money and earmark it towards one program. If you charge an additional fee for something, and make it go to a program, that would not be a loss of control.

Senator Cook: Could you look at all the fees, the out-of-state hunters, and do a fiscal note for how that might increase revenue?

Kim Kary: We'd be happy to do that, did you say fish and waterfowl?

Senator Cook: Please do.

Chair Unruh: The half million dollars you currently use for ANS, where does that come from?

Kim Kary: Our regular revenue we get from license sales and boats, regular pot of money. We do receive \$40,000 from the US Fish and Wildlife Service, and then two bienniums ago we started using some of our fishery apportionment from the excise sales on fishing licenses, that's \$40,000. Part of it is federal funding, but most of it is state.

Senator Roers: Why are we attaching this to waterfowl? I thought this was a fishing issue, not waterfowl.

Kim Kary: Boats come in to do waterfowl hunting.

Chair Unruh: Closed the hearing.

Senator Cook: Passed out amendments (**Please see attachment #1**), These are simple, they take out section 2 and section 3, the funding mechanism for SB 2293, and it replaces that funding mechanism with a surcharge on the out-of-state and in-state license fees. The out-of-state license fee has a surcharge of \$6 per license, and in-state is \$3 per license. And the senior citizen and handicap stays the same at \$5. The fiscal note would be about \$1.6 million. I believe Mr. Gaebe worked with all the different fishing groups and they support this concept.

Senator Roers: What was the budget for this inspection process?

Senator Piepkorn: \$2.5 million was an ask for the minimum, I remember \$20 million would get infrastructure at check points up to would get us up to the standards of our neighboring states. If we had the budget they could spend \$20 million, \$2.5 million is a start.

Chair Unruh: The \$2.5 million allowed for checkpoints and a couple of other things; this will probably be one checkpoint and a few other inspections.

Senator Cook: The fiscal note shows an increase of \$1.4 million, expenditures of \$10 million, and it talks about if SB 2293 is enacted, it is likely to result in transfers to the Aquatic Nuisance Species Program Fund estimated \$2.4 million.

Senator Cook: I move to adopt the amendment ending in .01001.

Senator Schaible: I second.

A voice vote was taken. Motion carries

Senator Cook: Moved a Do Pass As Amended.

Senator Schaible: I second.

Senator Piepkorn: It seems like this is a band aid approach. It's too bad we don't have the full funding for it. Chairman Porter: Opened the hearing on SB 2293.

Sen. Kreun, **District 42**: Introduced SB 2293. Basically it was the funding mechanism that was in question in the bill. Presented **(Attachment 1)**. There's a problem with aquatic species in North Dakota and Senator Oehlke wanted to make sure we will have there's a fund to help combat this issue. The other issue is license surcharge. We want to keep as many Nuisance Aquatic Species out of our water in North Dakota as we possibly can.

Chairman Porter: Any questions? Seeing none. Further testimony in support of SB 2293.

Jeff Frith, Manager of the Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource Board and the ND Aquatic Invasive Species Committee: Presented (Attachment 2). In support. Zebra mussels once introduced cannot be eradicated. They will silently kill the ecology of a lake. Please support SB 2293. 4:00-11:27

Rep. Anderson: Are the fisherman bring their boats and come to boat landings are they doing everything they need to make sure they are ready for the water?

Jeff Frith: For the most part, but they are doing what needs to be done but they are the ones that are going to spread the nuisance by their live wells, anchors and motors. It is very important that hunters and boater that use blinds and boats that they take precautions to not spread nuisance aguatic species.

Rep. Ruby: Where does this new money go? What's the focus? We already spend about \$250,000 a year for education already. What's the main need that we have to increase our funding so much?

Jeff Frith: I think what's been designed for the State Game and Fish for their Aquatic Nuisance Committee but their invasive management plan doesn't go far enough in some of the proposed plans. Education is key but the rest of it is through enforcement, and other activities.

Rep. Ruby So it's going to expand what has already been done, there's nothing new?

Jeff Frith: Once these Nuisance Aquatic species are introduced there is no getting rid of them. That's one of the reasons we emphasize education and prevention. It would go a long way in prevention. That's the main reason why this money would be required.

Chairman Porter: Further support? Any opposition to SB 2293? Who from the Department of Game and Fish is answering questions today?

Kim Kary, Chief of Administrative Services, North Dakota Game and Fish: Providing information on SB 2293. The ANS program fund does have a continuing appropriation and if this passes the revenue will go into that fund but does that fund need an appropriation. Our appropriation bill is now in the House so we would have to work with that. Presented (Attachment 8).

Chairman Porter: The way it stands this fund over the next two years would collect money, but unless there is something that's appropriated out of your fund in your budget, or if we appropriate out of the fund in this bill, you would not be able to spend any of the money for over the next two years towards any of these programs.

Kim Kary: That sounds correct.

Chairman Porter: There is nothing in your budget that talks about or deals with this fund so we will have to deal with that here. The fiscal note does include the combination license and we need to change that to any license. How many boat licenses do we have in the state? I ask because I have a problem targeting all of this toward the fisherman, when this is a boating problem and issue in preventing the further spread of all of these ANS.

Kim Kary: It is between 52,000 and 60,000, this includes jet skis, boats, etc. if you include all it would be about 60,000.

Rep. Anderson: On the proclamation for waterfowl is there warnings for aquatic nuisance species (ANS) on those?

Kim Kary: It is in the guide but not in the proclamation.

Rep. Anderson: I think you should put it in the proclamation also so those people are aware.

Rep. Keiser: What's the penalty whether intentional or unintentional for someone who has Zebra Mussels on the back of the trailer and they are backing in the water?

Greg Powers, North Dakota Fisheries Divisions Chief: If it's an ANS on the prohibited list. I believe it is a class B misdemeanor and there is a number of other noncompliance issues such as water in the boat, etc.

Rep. Keiser: So for whatever mechanism they're introducing?

Greg Powers: Correct.

Chairman Porter: There are several different statutes that are out there. If you are driving around with a plug in your boat you can get fined for that. But if you come into the state without having your boat and trailer clean there is a fine for that also.

Rep. Keiser: It's unique situation to have someone there to catch it and if no one had been there to catch that the Zebra mussels are in.

Greg Powers: In Montana they really ramped up their inspections. In 2017 or 2018 in 72,000 inspections they found 13 had zebra mussels on the boat, most of them were dry.

Rep. Keiser: It only takes one.

Chairman Porter: We already have them in the Red River they are coming out of the lakes in Minnesota and flowing north. Miss Kary, I would ask the department for 2 things. One is the component of Section 3, to make sure that language is correct so if we have to change that on line 11, from "each" to "any", so we're fully encompassed for those licenses.

Kim Kary: If we change "each" to "any" then you are going to include the 65 years and older and the permanently and totally disabled, if that is your wish.

Chairman Porter: Then I would ask for a section to this bill for actual implementation of this plan because it is not in your budget. It is going to have to appear in this bill as we carry this to appropriations as to how the plan is going to be implemented and the number of FTEs that are going to be asked for and how the money's going to be spent for cleaning stations, for inspections, for what's been laid out here today. We have to have a money plan, we have a trust fund created, but we don't have any money being spent. It is not in your budget so it needs to be in here.

Kim Kary: The department would not be asking for FTEs for 2021 because the fund would not have enough funds generated yet for that. But come the next biennium we would ask for FTE request but we would ask for temporary staff or for grant money to continue our work through Valley City State University and for other things.

Chairman Porter: We will need a Section 4 plan by next week.

Kim Kary: Yes we could do that.

Chairman Porter: Any further questions for the department? Any further testimony for SB 2293? Seeing none. As we are going forward with this, I have a definite problem with Section 2 in allocating any of the interest funds off of that fund into a special fund because you're taking the dollars that are made in interest and not allowing the Department to do it. I do not have a single problem with the fishing license. I do have a problem that we are not going after just boats in general also. In Nebraska they have a stamp program in addition to their license for both resident and nonresident boats that they are paying for the program to do inspections. So it would cover the duck boats, recreational boating, as they are moving in and out of the state constantly and it would cover individuals coming into the

state to fish in the state. Probably our biggest risk of spreading this disease is the boats coming out of Minnesota. Inside of Nebraska they do a \$5.00 resident stamp on top of their license that would be good for 2 years and then \$15.00 each year for a non-resident boat. All the money would go into that aquatic nuisance fund. It would be my suggestion to amend out Section 2 of the bill and add a new Section for the boating stamp, give the department a week to work on the implementation component, and then see where the fiscal note lands.

Rep. Mitskog: Made a motion to amend SB 2293 to remove Subsection 2 of the bill, and then to add the boat stamp requirement of \$5.00 per resident boat license and \$15.00 for an annual nonresident license for ANS. Amendment 19.1073.02001.

Rep. Anderson: Seconded.

Chairman Porter: The component side they were talking about on the investment board side is already covered in the budget, so if we remove section 2 completely then it just stays existing law and whatever amendment is done in appropriations.

Kim Kary: The only problem with amending that is on page 1 line 20 that "must" in there was also replaced with "may" because we are planning ahead for an audit that may catch that, so we were going to change that to a "may".

Chairman Porter: That was not in your budget that language?

Kim Kary: No, only number 2 on page 2 that piece was in the budget.

Chairman Porter: Is everyone clear we would remove subsection 2 and add the boat stamp requirement of \$5.00 per resident boat license and \$15.00 for an annual nonresident license for ANS.

A voice vote was taken. Motion carries to amend SB 2293.

Chairman Porter: Opened the hearing on SB 2293.

Kim Kary, Chief of Administrative Services, North Dakota Game and Fish: reviewed Attachment 1 which is amendment 19.1073.02002.

Chairman Porter: Section 7 was my language, because of the upcoming fishing season and the risk of our closed basins that the ND G&F are authorized to use money in their reserve account to get the program up and running this summer, then pay it back out of the aquatic nuisance species account when the money comes back in so that money doesn't just build up in that account.

Rep. Anderson: Do you know exactly what they're going to do with their inspections or monitoring program.

Kim Kary: We provided the implementation plan to Rep. Porter based on the last time we were up here. Starting in May of 2019 we will have one additional inspection team staffed by temps and in June 2019, we would start the IT programing for getting the boat stickers ready and bidding out the stickers. The stickers on the motorboats would take place January 2020. Our plans are to get geared up and get work ready and hire January 2020 those 2 FTEs would start.

Rep. Anderson: so when you go around are you going to concentrate on Lake Sakakawea and Devils Lake or monitor different lakes at different times? Any idea how that's going to work.

House Energy and Natural Resources Committee SB 2293 3.21.19 Page 2

Kim Kary: I believe the fisheries chief said those 2 lakes are the main lakes fished by nonresidents and residents. Those are two of the main areas we would be targeting. We would bring on 2 additional inspection crews in May of 2020.

Rep. Keiser: I see there's a penalty for not having the sticker. What is the penalty if there's a situation where the nuisance species could be on a MN boat, brought across the board, put in the water and the nuisance is potentially alive? What's the penalty you're inspectors fine?

Kim Kary: I believe it's \$100. I didn't look specifically look at that one.

Rep. Keiser: Just \$100? That doesn't seem to be a sufficient fine. Given the potential problem that would be created through just one, that doesn't seem like a significant penalty and we're not holding them very personally responsible for the magnitude of the problem.

Chairman Porter: it is a Class B misdemeanor. There's also a seizure component where they can also take what brought it in. So they could lose a boat. I've been getting concerns about the \$15 stamp on the nonresident boats. My argument back is those are the boats we're most concerned with. Those are the boats the program is designed around. Those are the boats that have to be inspected, that we have to be most concerned about. I've heard concerns that we're targeting them and we are because they are the area causing us to increase our inspections and increase the program to protect our basins. I've heard them and I don't agree with their complaint.

Rep. Ruby: I would like to see half the hysteria we have behind this over CWD but to not muddy the water, I will move these amendments.

Rep. Anderson: second.

Chairman Porter: We have a motion and a second to adopt the amendment 02002 on SB 2293. Discussion? Voice vote, motion carried.

Rep. Ruby: I move a Do Pass as Amended and rereferred to Appropriations on SB 2293.



Moneys deposited in the aquatic nuisance species program fund must be transferred to the state game and fish fund to repay any moneys expended from the state game and fish fund under this section.

Relating to the creation of the aquatic nuisance species program fund and surcharges for fishing and waterfowl licenses; relating to the investment of the state game and fish fund; and to provide a continuing appropriation.

Chairman Delzer: Called the meeting to order for SB 2293, this is a bill for aquatic nuisance species program.

Representative Porter: House Energy and Natural Resources committee has been working on SB 2293. This creates a dedicated aquatic nuisance species program. We realize our current program has about a \$500,000 appropriation inside the budget that includes one FTE and a \$250,000 contract with Valley City State College that puts together an inspection team and plan. This is a significant expansion of that program. This is the biggest threat that we have inside of North Dakota fisheries. Zebra mussels are the ones you have heard about and they are well established in the Red River. They came in through the Great Lakes. Fargo is already having problems with their water intake structure with zebra mussels on it. Lake Winnipeg all the way to the Hudson Bay has zebra mussels. The problem is that they are extremely efficient filtering animals and they take all the nutrients out of the water and the fish can't survive. Each one does about a gallon a day. As we are looking at this bill we have fisheries in this state, Devils Lake being one of the primary closed basin fishery. A lot of the other shallow aquafer lakes that are stocked with fish are all closed basin type scenarios. If we get a zebra mussel in those type of lakes it will be because of a boat. The risk is us. We are going to be the transfer vehicles. Zebra mussels aren't our only threat but they are the biggest threat right now. The biggest threat is boats that come from areas that the zebra mussel exists. If I go to the Detroit Lakes boating and come back to North Dakota but don't do a proper inspection or clean or power wash the boat off and go to a local lake, then I would be an infectious boat and I could be the one causing the spread of this species. The first component of this program is that we need money to ramp up our enforcements and inspections. The money that is being proposed to be raised is about \$2.5 million in additional funding that would go into a set alone aquatic nuisance species fund that Game and Fish can use as appropriated by us to ramp up the aquatic nuisance species enforcement and education program to try to stop

this from coming into our state. Handed out proposed amendments and Christmas tree versions of 02002 and 02003 of SB 2293. (See Attachment 1).

Chairman Delzer: Which version are you working off of?

Rep. Porter: We are working off of .04000 version of the bill. It is the one we adopted out of committee. The Christmas tree version 02003 includes this set of amendments. We could certainly do just a fishing licenses increase to do this but it's not just a targeted crowd that fishes, it's also that crowd that skies, jet skis, hunting. This bill has a combination of license fee increases. It increases the nonresident water fowl fee and fishing fees for resident and nonresident and there is a licensing component in there on boats.

Chairman Delzer: Is that all being done in Section 3?

Representative Porter: Section 3 is the boat stamp component and Section 5 is the fishing and waterfowl license surcharge section. We add \$5 per year on a resident boat license so it is a \$15 total. We are also developing a new stamp for nonresident boats for \$15 per year. That funding would raise approximately \$2.7 million to go into the aquatic nuisance species fund. The fund itself we would give them authorization to get \$467,000 out of their reserves to get this started this summer with the emergency clause and they would have to repay that back as this generated money.

Chairman Delzer: You are also raising the combination or the resident fishing license for anybody under 65 by \$3.

Representative Porter: Yes the combination license includes a fishing license so we did raise that one also.

Representative Nathe: How do you see the Game and Fish being able to enforce this?

Representative Porter: We looked at this as an all entity involved kind of situation where the authorization to hire the two positions would be warden positions in the eastern part of the state. So you would get an entry program going and have signs where if you are pulling a boat you must be inspected. Education is another key component to this and the cross training inside of our state parks to watch for the boats getting put into the water.

Representative Nathe: Do you foresee spotters and checkers at the boat landings?

Representative Porter: I would see more trying to do a combination where we would have them at check points, and also at campgrounds. It is also the boater's responsibility to clean their boats and drain their live wells.

Chairman Delzer: That's already illegal to not drain your boat out.

Representative Porter: That is exactly right and this is to help to ramp that inspection even more.

Chairman Delzer: This is a very big deal but our Game and Fish fund currently is over \$30 million why can't you use some of that, surely that is something that would fit the guidelines for everything the Game and Fish does.

Representative Porter: When we looked at this from how are we going to create this new program and pay for it, we didn't think that fund was the right place. Part of the money inside of that fund is coming from hunters and excise taxes and we didn't want to risk that we would suddenly be noncompliant with the excise tax component to where we would have to pay that money back.

Chairman Delzer: I can't imagine the Feds have any problem with that.

Representative Porter: There are two sides in there and I would think that one side of that excise tax would have a problem with this. That is why we put the component that we would have to pay that fund back. We could ask Game and Fish if this would be a problem.

Representative Bellew: Can these little critters latch onto a goose or duck and be transported that way?

Representative Porter: I have not heard of that with a zebra mussel and there is another critter that floats and when people say they get the lake itch it is a little organism when it bores into us it dies and causes a little bump. I don't know if that could happen.

Chairman Delzer: Certainly the plant species could be.

Representative Nathe: In regards to the Game and Fish would this money be used if they should find a breakout to fight this or are they working on that?

Representative Porter: All of the money inside of this fund is to be appropriated by the Legislative Assembly. There isn't a continuing appropriation inside of here so they couldn't just go in and grab it. They could come to the budget section and say we have a crisis and we would like access to this fund but there isn't any contingency in there that they could do what you say.

Representative Nathe: Is there any discussion in there for that?

Representative Porter: That is why we put that budget section in there that is compliant with the new bill we passed not so long ago.

Chairman Delzer: I don't' think the language would allow that, it says education, inspection and monitoring programs. If you wanted that issue I think you would have to look at changing that language.

Representative Meier: Can you explain the penalty portion for this bill?

Representative Porter: We are taking the penalty and putting it into the fund. The person is guilty of a class 2 criminal offense. If they don't have the sticker it's a \$25 dollar fine and there is already a fine for failing to pull your plug or hauling water across.

Chairman Delzer: How will out of state people know they have to have this sticker?

Representative Porter: That will be a part of the education campaign.

Representative Mock: Do we have areas to wash boats off at all the docks?

Representative Porter: No and that is part of this also.

Representative J. Nelson: Is there a period of time that if the boat isn't in water the threat

would go away? How long would you have to be out of the water to be safe?

Representative Porter: I don't know the answer to that.

Representative J. Nelson: Did the committee consider the surcharge on nonresident

hunting fees, maybe giving the hunter a couple extra days for the surcharge?

Representative Porter: No. You will have the opportunity to discuss that today.

Representative Holman: How does this compare to other states?

Representative Porter: We are hugely behind on this. Minnesota has been fighting this at a much greater rate than where we are. They have inspectors and power wash stations and check stations as people are leaving the lakes.

Representative Holman: What success are they having?

Representative Porter: You don't' hear about newly affected areas in closed basins. We are way behind on our education, inspection and being proactive on this problem. We know where they are now and we don't want them to move west.

Representative Brandenburg: On Page2 10 line to of the bill, it talks about investing the \$15 million from the budget. The budget has \$37 million of Federal funds and Special funds is \$46 million for the total of \$84 million. If you could explain what you are looking at doing is taking the \$15 million and using the interest income off of that to deal with aquatic nuisance program. Is that what your process will be?

Representative Porter: I would stand here and tell you that that is in there still in error. When we created the stamp program we didn't want that in there or to tie up that investment income into this program. I would ask you to remove that because I thought that was gone.

Chairman Delzer: Are you talking about the whole paragraph 2?

Representative Porter: Yes that whole subsection 2. That was supposed to be out of there. We didn't want to tie up any of that investment income. We felt that was wrong. I would ask that be removed inside of the considerations of this.

Chairman Delzer: You handed out a .02003 Christmas tree version?

Representative Porter: That version was given to me from Legislative council. All that does is give you a look at the amendment I passed out.

Chairman Delzer: What you passed out of your committee is .02002 and you want us to adopt .02003?

Representative Porter: Yes, we need to create that aquatic nuisance species fee for motorboats and also straighten out the fees so if someone comes in to buy a boat license it would only be good for one year. What it says on page 5 of the Christmas tree is that they would only be charged a \$5 surcharge rather than the full \$15. So it is \$5 per year. It fixes that also.

Chairman Delzer: The Christmas tree .02002 is the one they passed out of committee and .02003 is the one they want us to adopt?

Brady Larson, Legislative Council: That is correct, on the amendment and the corrections you will see that it says in lieu of the amendments adopted by the policy committee.

Chairman Delzer: And we still need to take out subsection 2 if we adopt the .02003. So go ahead and draft the .02004. Did you want to walk through these amendments anymore?

Representative Porter: I think it was simple fixes that made sure that it was going into that specific fund and that the license fee was stepped.

Chairman Delzer: When was the last time we raised the fishing and the combination licenses?

Representative Porter: I am guessing it has been 5 or 6 years. We are still lower then all the states around us.

Chairman Delzer: A boat that sits at Dakota waters all the time and only fishes there, how often do they have to worry about washing this?

Representative Porter: They are a very little risk. If they come out of that water and go to the storage shed across the road. They are at zero risk.

Chairman Delzer: If we found out that we could use some of the Game and Fish money are you opposed to lowering some of the fees a little?

Representative Porter: I would not. We need to be very careful with that to make sure we aren't putting at risk the repayment of those excise taxes. The penalties for nonrepayment is extreme.

Chairman Delzer: Brady would you request that information from Game and Fish about their view and whether or not any of their funds could be used.

Representative J. Nelson: If someone comes into the state and they are at risk, is there an option for the boater to wash the boat if Game and Fish do the inspection and it needs to be cleaned. Will there be a power washer available to use or do they have to go to a car wash?

Representative Porter: I am not exactly sure how game and fish will handle that.

Representative J. Nelson: I would think in some of the major areas it could be a business venture to do that sort of thing. I don't know how they could ever do this without being on the major highways.

It does allow them to use a little bit of money out of the game and fish fund, and that would be repaid as soon as any of the money flowed into this new fund they are setting up called the aquatic nuisance species program fund in state treasury. Thoughts?

Representative J. Nelson: Are we talking about removing lines 6-9?

Chairman Delzer: Yes. The moneys must be invested by the investment authority according to the laws relating to state investments. The department shall notify the state investment board of the amount available for investment. I don't think they want it tied up that tight.

Representative J. Nelson: This is supporting a stronger fishery in North Dakota, and I would think most fisherman would go with it.

Representative Vigesaa: Is the language in that Subsection 2 of the \$15 million going to the supervision of the SIB in their budget bill?

Representative Monson: I Move to reconsider our actions

Chairman Delzer: We have a motion to reconsider our Do Pass on SN 2293. Discussion on the motion? Voice vote, All in Favor, Motion carries. We have the amended bill before us.

Representative Howe: We went back and look at 2293 and had lengthy conversations with the game and fish and director Steinwand. The way we had it originally was a 3 and 6 dollars' increase on fishing licenses for resident and nonresidents and also a 15 dollars' boat sticker. The total amount was way more than what game and fish needed and they didn't want to stock pile money with no intent of it going anywhere. We looked at a way to decrease the funds, we decided to remove the 3-dollar license increase and just keep the boat sticker. If you have a ND boat license you will have a 15-dollar nuisance sticker. If you are coming in from out of state with a boat you will also have to purchase that sticker.

Chairman Delzer: It would be 5 dollars a year for instate but 15 dollars a year for out of state?

Chris Kadrmas, Legislative Council: Section 5 as in the amendment doesn't change at all but section 6 was added because there was a section that appropriated all funds. Section 6 appropriated the amount that would be available for the biennium.

Chairman Delzer: page 1 of the bill takes out the continuing appropriation and then section 6 of the bill as well. Further discussion?

Representative Howe: I will stand corrected, page 4 of the amendment, line 56; out of state boaters would be every year that they would need this sticker.

Representative J. Nelson: Did you consider lower the amount as a combination rather than taking the licenses out of these at all?

Representative Howe: We did but you can get a fishing license and not own a boat and it's the water craft that is going to spread this.

Representative J. Nelson: But there is the punitive effect on somebody that has a number of water craft and none of them may ever leave the body of water that they have a lake home at.

Representative Howe: I will move amendment 19.1073.02005.

Just adding the 6 dollars to the fishing and water fowl license raised almost a million dollars. We just thought let's do the boats because they are they transporters of the disease.

Chairman Delzer: There are a number of boats that would be out of state and then come back.

Representative J. Nelson: A Minnesota duck hunter would have a duck boat tied to the top of his car and that wouldn't be subject to licensing if there is no motor on it and that is a true cause of transporting these species.

Representative Beadle: The other reason we wanted to do the registrations is because there is a lot of water crat like jet skis and that type of boats that would be carrying water from one body of water to another.

Representative Howe: Do Pass as Amended

Representative Vigesaa: Second

In lieu of the amendments adopted by the House as printed on pages 1262 and 1263 of the House Journal, Engrossed Senate Bill No. 2293 is amended as follows:

"SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-03-12 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

20.1-03-12. Schedule of fees for licenses and permits.

The fees collected under this section for licenses and permits must be deposited with the state treasurer and credited to the game and fish <u>fund</u>, <u>except</u> <u>aquatic nuisance species fees must be deposited with the state treasurer and credited to the aquatic nuisance species program fund</u>. Forty-five dollars of each nonresident big game hunting license fee must be used for the private land initiative. The various license and permit fees are as follows:

- For a resident, age sixteen and over, small game hunting license, ten dollars.
- 2. For a nonresident small game hunting license, one hundred dollars.

- 3. For a resident big game hunting license, thirty dollars, except the fee for a licensee under age sixteen is ten dollars, except as provided in a gubernatorial proclamation issued pursuant to section 20.1-08-04.1.
- 4. Except for a nonresident who participates on the same basis as a resident in a lottery for deer licenses remaining after the second lottery for residents under subsection 4 of section 20.1-03-11, for a nonresident big game hunting license, two hundred fifty dollars, and for a nonresident bow license, two hundred fifty dollars, and a nonrefundable five dollar application fee must accompany any lottery license fee under this subsection, except as provided in a gubernatorial proclamation issued pursuant to section 20.1-08-04.1. For a nonresident who participates on the same basis as a resident in a lottery for deer licenses remaining after the second lottery for residents, fifty dollars.
- 5. For a resident fur-bearer license, fifteen dollars.
- 6. For a resident fishing license, sixteen dollars, except that for a resident sixty-five years or over, a resident totally or permanently disabled, or a resident disabled veteran who has a fifty percent service-connected disability as determined by the department of veterans' affairs or has an extra-schedular rating to include individual unemployability that brings the veteran's total disability ratio to fifty percent, the license fee is five dollars.
- 7. For a nonresident fishing license, forty-five dollars.
- 8. For a resident husband and wife fishing license, twenty-two dollars.
- 9. For a nonresident nongame hunting license, fifteen dollars.
- 10. For a resident wild turkey permit, fifteen dollars.
- 11. For an annual general game license, three dollars.
- 12. For a license to a nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs, or that person's agent, the amount that the nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs would pay for a nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs license or comparable license in that person's state of residence, or fifty dollars, whichever is greater.
- For a license to a resident buyer or shipper of green furs, eight dollars for each place of business maintained by that person within this state.
- 14. For a license to a resident traveling agent, buyer, or shipper of green furs, twenty dollars.
- 15. For an annual license to practice taxidermy, twenty-five dollars.
- 16. For a permit to ship, by a person having a resident hunting license, during the respective open seasons, not to exceed in any one season twenty-five game birds, to points within this state other than that person's home or to points outside this state, three dollars.
- 17. For a permit to make collections of protected birds and animals for scientific purposes, ten dollars.
- 18. For a motorboat certificate of number and license: Each motorboat under sixteen feet [4.88 meters] in length, and all canoes, regardless of length, powered by a motor, eighteen dollars. Each motorboat sixteen feet [4.88 meters] in length and over but shorter than twenty feet [6.1 meters] in

- length, excluding canoes, thirty-six dollars. Each motorboat twenty feet [6.1 meters] in length or over excluding canoes, forty-five dollars.
- 19. For the taking of undesirable fish from the waters of this state pursuant to section 20.1-06-05, fifteen dollars for each hoop-net or trap, and fifteen dollars for each seine of fifty feet [15.24 meters] or any fraction thereof.
- 20. For a resident paddlefish tag annual license, ten dollars per tag.
- 21. For a nonresident paddlefish tag annual license, twenty-five dollars and fifty cents per tag.
- 22. For an annual resident license to sell minnows or other live bait at wholesale, fifty dollars.
- 23. For an annual license to sell minnows or other live bait at retail, fifteen dollars, except the fee is seventy-five dollars if white suckers are sold.
- 24. For an annual license to operate a private fish hatchery, seventy-five dollars.
- 25. For a resident commercial frog license, fifty dollars.
- 26. For a nonresident commercial frog license, two hundred dollars.
- 27. For a resident frog license, three dollars.
- 28. For a resident husband and wife frog license, five dollars.
- 29. For a shooting preserve operating permit, one hundred dollars, plus thirty cents per acre [.40 hectare] for each acre [.40 hectare].
- 30. For a nonresident waterfowl hunting license, one hundred dollars.
- 31. For a nonresident husband and wife fishing license, sixty dollars.
- 32. For a nonresident short-term three-day fishing license, twenty-five dollars.
- 33. For a nonresident fur-bearer and nongame hunting license, forty dollars.
- 34. For a combination license, fifty dollars.
- 35. For a white-tailed deer license sold to certified guides or outfitters and provided by them to nonresidents, two hundred fifty dollars.
- 36. For a resident swan license, ten dollars.
- 37. For a nonresident swan license, thirty dollars.
- 38. For a resident sandhill crane license, ten dollars.
- 39. For a nonresident sandhill crane license, thirty dollars.
- 40. For a resident commercial clam license, one hundred dollars.
- 41. For a nonresident commercial clam license, one thousand dollars.
- 42. For a commercial clam dealer's permit, two thousand dollars. In addition, the applicant shall submit to the director a surety bond in the sum of two thousand dollars.

- 43. For an annual class B nonresident license to sell minnows or other live bait at wholesale, two hundred fifty dollars.
- 44. For a bighorn sheep license issued to a nonresident, five hundred dollars.
- 45. For a nonresident reciprocal trapping license, three hundred fifty dollars.
- 46. For a nonresident spring white goose license, fifty dollars.
- 47. For a resident certificate fee, one dollar, and for a nonresident certificate fee, two dollars. An agent may not charge a service fee for issuing a resident or nonresident certificate fee.
- 48. For a nonresident short-term ten-day fishing license, thirty-five dollars.
- 49. For a nonresident wild turkey permit, eighty dollars.
- 50. For a statewide nonresident waterfowl hunting license, one hundred fifty dollars.
- 51. For an annual class A nonresident license to sell minnows or other live bait at wholesale, five hundred dollars.
- 52. For a resident early Canada goose season license, five dollars.
- 53. For a nonresident early Canada goose season license, fifty dollars.
- 54. For a resident disabled veteran combined general game, habitat stamp, small game, and fur-bearer license, three dollars.
- 55. For each motorboat licensed in this state, an aquatic nuisance species fee of fifteen dollars valid concurrent with motorboat licensure.
- 56. For each motorboat operated on waters of this state and not licensed in this state, an aquatic nuisance species fee of fifteen dollars for the calendar year in which it is paid.

Page 2, replace lines 8 through 17, with:

"SECTION 4. A new section to chapter 20.1-13 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Operation of motorboat without payment of aquatic nuisance species fee prohibited - Penalty.

- For each motorboat operated on waters of this state, an aquatic nuisance species fee must be paid.
 - <u>a.</u> For each motorboat licensed in this state, the fee is due at the time of motorboat licensure.
 - b. For each motorboat operated on waters of this state and exempt from licensure in this state, the owner shall pay the fee and, after payment of the fee, must be issued an aquatic nuisance species sticker from the department. The sticker must be attached to the motorboat in a manner prescribed by the department so the sticker is clearly visible.
- Fees collected under this section must be deposited with the state treasurer and credited to the aquatic nuisance species program fund.

 A person who violates this section is guilty of a class 2 noncriminal offense.

SECTION 5. APPROPRIATION - 2017-19 BIENNIUM - TRANSFER -

EXEMPTION. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the state game and fish fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$467,100, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the game and fish department for the purpose of administering aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs, for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2019. The funding provided in this section is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and may be continued into the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. The game and fish department is authorized two full-time equivalent positions for this purpose. The game and fish department shall transfer moneys deposited in the aquatic nuisance species program fund must be transferred to the state game and fish fund to repay any moneys expended from the state game and fish fund under this section.

SECTION 6. APPROPRIATION - AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES PROGRAM FUND. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the aquatic nuisance species program fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,300,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the game and fish department for use in aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs under chapter 20.1-17, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

SECTION 7. EMERGENCY. This Act is declared to be an emergency measure."

Chairman Cook: Opened the conference committee.

Representative Howe: I know this came through the House Energy and Natural Resources first and then it came to the House Appropriations, where we removed the \$6 non-resident and the \$3 resident fee increases, and just included that \$15 boat stamp. We heard from the director of the department, that the fee increase along with the boat stamp, there would be more money than the department would need, they didn't want that extra money laying around, not being put to use. The \$15 would cover everything, at that point, the \$15 would have a little left over, the day we passed the bill, we got an updated fiscal note, that wasn't quite enough, but the \$3 and \$6 would have been too much. We also removed some language that was duplicative in the Game and Fish Department budget dealing with investment into the State Investment Board, the \$15 million, we struck that as well.

Chairman Cook: As we sit now, to implement the ANS program that the Game and Fish would like, they are still short some dollars. I think we are in agreement that we should do what we can to find those dollars. I have an email here, (**Please see attachment #1**).

Senator Piepkorn: In our testimony, if Game and Fish did want to establish a program as robust as Montana or Minnesota, to have that thorough a program for protecting against invasive species, they could easily justify a \$20 million budget, the least we could do is get it up to where it will work for them.

Representative Anderson: In Montana, they hire high school kids during the summer to monitor these boats as they go to the ramps. I don't know if Game and Fish plans to do that, but I think it worked quite well.

Chairman Cook: (From attachment #1) To clarify, if we added a surcharge on non-resident fishing licenses of \$3, non-resident licenses of \$3 and resident fishing licenses of \$2, that'd raise \$714,000, and everybody would be happy.

Representative Zubke: We'd want to make sure on the resident fishing licenses that it also includes the combination license, the \$2, in regard to what you stated.

Representative Anderson: That combination license is what they need to put everything on?

Terry Steinwand, Director, Game and Fish: What you are talking about is a certificate fee, that's a \$1 fee. What Representative Zubke is talking about is a combination, it's a fishing license, a general game and habitat, small game and furbearer. A lot of people buy the combination license instead of just a fishing license.

Representative Howe: I move the House recede and amend as follows to include a \$3 surcharge on non-resident fishing, non-resident waterfowl, and then a \$2 surcharge on resident fishing as well as the combination.

Senator Piepkorn: I second.

Terry Steinwand: Our intent would be to start the stickers for the boats on January 1, 2020, that is a new three-year cycle for registration of resident boats, and also to start the surcharge for the resident and non-resident fishing and combination licenses on April 1, 2020, that coincides with the licensing season. I don't like the idea of going with a license fee increase as of July 1st or August 1st. It'd be the middle of the season.

Chairman Cook: You don't need the emergency clause, you need an effective date of January 1, 2020.

Chairman Cook: Opened the conference committee. All conferees were present.

You have the amendments I had drafted (**please see attachment #1**) and a handout from Kim Kary (**please see attachment #2**) To explain the amendments, if you go to the back page, sections 6 and 7, we removed the emergency clause with the FTE in section 6, it appeared that the money was gone June 30, and it wasn't, so we put the two new FTE positions into section 7 and put the emergency clause back on. Kim, come talk to us about your amendment.

Kim Kary, Division Chief, North Dakota Game and Fish: The reason for the changes in section 4, when the House passed their last version, these words in red were included in their version, .04000. When the Senate put the fishing combination and waterfall license back in, that version was an older version, and did not include these words in red. To make it clear in law that it is for the resident 65 years of age or older license versus just a person that is 65 years old, and for the permanently or totally disabled license, and a disabled veterans license. It's for those people that purchase that \$5-dollar license, not just if you are totally disabled. You could buy a full price license, so we need those words in red also.

Chairman Cook: The amendments we have before us, section 4 is not in these amendments.

Kim Kary: Correct. Because section 4 was okay up until now. We need to put section 4 in there with these changes.

Chairman Cook: This is everything that has to be done to this bill?

Kim Kary: I sure hope so.

Representative Zubke: I want to make sure that your indication was that even if the emergency clause doesn't carry, you're still okay with the way this bill is. Is that correct?

Kim Kary: If the emergency doesn't carry, we will not have the \$467,000 worth of funds to spend immediately. That will delay some spending until July 1. Also, we wouldn't be able to hire a warden until January 1, instead of July 1, without that \$467,000. It would delay the hiring, that is the reason for the emergency clause.

Representative Anderson: You don't have any money on balance to borrow from to get it established?

Kim Kary: In talking to OMB, they said that if we do, there isn't a pay back out of that aquatic nuisance species fund, we couldn't code anything to that line until there is revenue in it. We aren't collecting revenue until January 1 with what you had passed previously. We could get by with existing appropriation, but we really wouldn't want to hire an FTE, gimping by for six months.

Senator Oehlke: When I look at this on section 6, I realize there's some wording missing that you have to get in, that the Game and Fish Department shall transfer moneys and so on, but in the blue section on page 6, it does say that you are authorized two FTE, you are moving that from section 6 to section 7?

Kim Kary: That was a discussion with OMB and Chris Kadrmas from Legislative Council. The reason they pulled the FTE out of section 6 and moved it to section 7, is because section 6 was merely an emergency clause type thing. Their interpretation of the law was, if it ends June 30, 2019, it's a done deal. If that emergency clause doesn't pass, section 6 goes away and so would the FTEs. They wanted to move the FTEs to section 7 in case the emergency clause doesn't pass. It was a confusing morning between all the departments going back and forth on the workings of this. With the least amount of changes to make it as simple as possible, that's the version they decided to do: move that one sentence of the FTEs down to section 7 and add a section 10 to say both parts are an emergency. SECTION 7. APPROPRIATION - AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES PROGRAM FUND. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the aquatic nuisance species program fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,500,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the game and fish department for use in aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs under chapter 20.1-17, for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2021. The game and fish department is authorized two full-time equivalent positions for this purpose.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 3 of this Act becomes effective on January 1, 2020.









Testimony of Rich Brueckner, President of North Dakota Sportfishing Congress

Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee

In support of Senate Bill 2293 January 25, 2019

Chairman Unruh and members of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, my name is Rich Brueckner. I am from Devils Lake and I currently serve as the president of the North Dakota Sportfishing Congress. This organization is made up of several fishing groups and many anglers who are brought together by our common love of fishing and in promoting this awesome pastime. The members of the Sportfishing Congress members collaborate on the protection of our amazing fishing resources and in support of efforts to maintain and enhance our quality lakes and rivers. Our members advanced the policy proposal outlined in SB 2293, and thus we support the bill.

The members and member organizations of the Sportfishing Congress believe that one of the biggest threats presently facing North Dakota's fishing resource is the introduction and spread of aquatic nuisance species (ANS), such as zebra mussels, Asian carp, and Eurasian watermilfoil. Proliferation of any of these, or a host of other invasive or nuisance species could lead to a collapse of our remarkable fishery. ANS cost the United States billions of dollars annually, impact recreation, and harm our natural resources. It is for these reasons that we have initiated the effort to advance a sportsman funded program to partially address ANS in North Dakota.

To become more proactive in the defense against ANS, the Sportfishing Congress members believe that increased funding is needed, and the Game and Fish Department should be provided with additional resources dedicated to aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs.

The state has adopted regulations and an ANS Management plan, which was recently updated and was ratified by Governor Burgum. However, we feel that more needs to be done to reduce these risks. The Game and Fish Department has the rules, but not the tools to reduce the risk of ANS introduction in the state.

Others today will expound on the risks of ANS, however you should know that invasive plant, animal and disease species:

- Directly outcompete native species for food and habitat
- Affect the composition and structure of aquatic communities and food chains
- Degrade habitat and negatively affect wildlife and water quality
- Decrease sportfishing opportunities
- Negative economic effects on recreation and tourism industries
- Degrade shorelines and facilities for human use
- Decrease property values
- Negatively affect human and wildlife health (e.g. injury and disease vectors).
- Increase costs to utilities, industry, and municipalities (e.g. Zebra mussels at water intakes)

The Sportfishing Congress advocates implementing a modest ANS outreach, inspection and monitoring program at the Game and Fish Department. We are proposing in Senate Bill 2293, to fund, with sportsmen's dollars, additional resources to address ANS. To improve the ability to prevent the introduction and spread of ANS and assist in compliance with current regulations, the objective is to establish three permanent watercraft wash stations at high traffic locations (probably Devils Lake, Sakakawea, and Bismarck) staffed with seasonal technicians.

We estimate that an additional \$2.5 million per biennium is needed to provide adequate funding and staffing. In comparison to the need, this request is modest, and we consider it the minimum needed to improve ANS compliance, and to help protect and improve North Dakotas fishing resources. The effort would not be as extensive or expensive as many neighboring states, several of which conduct mandatory inspections at multiple locations and at all water access points. A comprehensive mandatory ANS inspection program in North Dakota could cost \$20-30 million per biennium.

The special fund the fishermen and women are seeking and willing to finance, will help to conduct more ANS work across North Dakota to address ongoing shortcomings the members of the Sportfishing Congress have identified for several years. We propose a multifaceted funding formula to support an ANS FTE position, enough seasonal staffing to operate the three wash stations, construction costs for additional wash stations, an increase in watercraft inspections and additional ANS laboratory capabilities. In addition, the Sportfishing Congress would like to see two additional game wardens to work on improving ANS compliance with existing rules and regulations. Finally, we seek to enhance the Department's Development program including funding another FTE. This would not only improve boating access to the state's fishing waters but would also be helpful in constructing more fish cleaning stations which help in fulfilling ANS compliance by anglers.

The fund would be created from four sources:

- 1) The gasoline tax generated from the equivalent of 64 gallons per registered watercraft, up to \$750,000 annually.
- 2) A \$3 ANS surcharge fee on all fishing and waterfowl hunting licenses to generate \$700,000 each year.
- 3) Half a percent of the existing sales tax collected annually on boat sales estimated at \$225,000.
- 4) Income and returns from investing \$15 million of the State Game and Fish Fund to raise \$200,000 to \$400,000.

The following pages provide detail of funding estimates and a table of comparison with other states' ANS effort. I will be happy to respond to your questions.

Invasive Mussels Could Cost Montana \$234 Million Per Year

HELENA, Mont — Montana's economy could see more than \$230 million in annual mitigation costs and lost revenue if invasive mussels become established in the state, according to a report released today by the Montana Invasive Species Council (MISC).

Commissioned by MISC and completed by the University of Montana Flathead Biological Station, the economic impact study provides "a snapshot of projected direct costs to affected stakeholders dependent on water resources," said Bryce Christiaens, MISC chair. "It does not reflect the total economic impact to the state, which would be considerably higher."

The report identifies three key economic sectors – recreation, infrastructure and irrigation – that face the greatest potential impacts from an established mussel infestation, accounting for 60 to 75 percent of the total potential damages statewide.

"Invasive mussels can devastate aquatic ecosystems, clog water intake pipes and delivery systems, cover boat launches and beaches, and impact any economic sector dependent on water," Christiaens said. "They pose a major threat to Montana's environment, economy, recreation, and human health."

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks has been working to prevent the introduction of invasive mussels since 2005 through watercraft inspection, early detection monitoring and


education. Those efforts ramped up when invasive mussel larvae were detected at Tiber and Canyon Ferry reservoirs in 2016. With additional funding from the legislature, FWP was able to double their prevention efforts, triple early detection monitoring and expand education to the public. To date, no adult mussels have been found and no additional invasive mussel larvae has been detected since the initial detection in 2016.

"Eradicating invasive mussels once they establish is difficult if not impossible," said Thomas Woolf, MT Fish Wildlife, and Parks Aquatic Invasive Species bureau chief. "Prevention is our best bet at keeping them out of our waters and avoiding the costs associated with their impacts. Research continues on methods to prevent and manage mussels, so the longer we can keep them out, the better the chances we'll see a solution to this problem."

The study was commissioned to provide managers and policy makers with an estimate of costs in order to inform decisions about the level of funding for state prevention and containment programs. The current level of Montana's AIS funding, approximately \$6.5 million, is roughly three percent of the estimated \$234 million annual costs for invasive mussel mitigation and lost revenue.

The Montana Invasive Species Council is a statewide partnership working to protect Montana's economy, natural resources, and public health through a coordinated approach to combat invasive species. For more information about MISC and to access the report, visit misc.mt.gov.

Chairman Unruh and members of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee:

My name is Mary Massad. I represent the North Dakota Water Users Association and I am here to testify in support of Senate Bill 2293. The North Dakota Water Users Association was organized in 1959 to protect, develop and manage North Dakota's water resources and it is currently comprised of over 300 local, statewide and regional organizations in North Dakota who have an active interest in water.

At our annual meeting in December, the North Dakota Water Users Association passed a resolution supporting the aggressive prevention of aquatic nuisance species from harming North Dakota waters as outlined in the North Dakota aquatic species management plan prepared by the Aquatic Invasive Species Committee, as well as adequate funding for ANS education and enforcement.

In bodies of water where ANS have become established, they are expensive to combat and difficult or nearly impossible remove.

This is not just a sportsmen issue. ANS can greatly impact industry in the state by lowering water quality and infiltrating water intakes. These intakes provide water to regional water suppliers as well as refineries, ethanol plants, irrigation operations, and power plants, to name a few. If these intakes were obstructed or clogged by an aquatic nuisance species, the cost of repair and eradication would greatly exceed the cost of prevention. These species reproduce so quickly they clog entire power plants, public water intakes and pipes, and constrict flow reducing the intake in heat exchangers, condensers, firefighting equipment, and air conditioning and cooling systems. If water supply systems must keep intakes and pipelines clear of ANS, that cost will pass to the consumer in the form of higher rates.

This state has already invested millions of dollars in water projects and many of these projects would be at risk if aquatic nuisance species were not prevented from entering our waters.

If North Dakota waters were to become infested, it would be less attractive for energy, energy by-product, and industrial development, due to the unavailability of an adequate supply of water for such purposes. Madam Chairman, Mr. Vice-Chairman and distinguished members of the committee I would like to thank you for allowing me the time to address the committee today. My name is Jeff Frith I am from Devils Lake and I am the Manager of the Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource Board and since 2010 I have served on the North Dakota Aquatic Invasive Species Committee. The testimony I am providing is in support to Senate Bill 2293, which would create the Aquatic Nuisance Species Program Fund.

The Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource Board is comprised of County Water Resource District Managers from 8 counties within the Devils Lake Basin. As members of the North Dakota Water Resource District Association they fully support the association's long-term goals and resolutions adopted on December 6th, 2018 including the position that states: "AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES. We urge aggressive prevention of aquatic nuisance species (ANS) prevention for North Dakota waters as outlined in the North Dakota aquatic species management plan prepared by the Aquatic Invasive Species Committee. We urge all federal and state agencies to address and implement aquatic nuisance species prevention programs in all North Dakota waters, and we support adequate funding for ANS education and enforcement." To further support the efforts to prevent the introduction or spread of invasive aquatic nuisances on Wednesday, January 23rd the Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource of Directors unanimously voted in support of Senate Bill 2293.

Aquatic nuisance species' impacts on the waters of North Dakota could vary greatly from barely noticeable to ecologically devastating and given the economic benefits of fishing throughout the state, 787.8 million dollars annually (NDSU Agribusiness and Applied Economics Report 785, January 2019) could prove to be very extremely costly.

Today I would like to speak to you about a particular invasive aquatic nuisance species that should make the make the hair on the back of your neck stand up, I know it does mine, and that is the zebra mussel.

Once introduced zebra mussels can NOT be eradicated. Zebra mussels are voracious filter feeders. A single mussel can suck a liter of water through its tiny body daily. The thumbnail-sized mollusks spread rapidly, a single female mussel can produce about a half a billion offspring in here 3 to 5-year life span. Eventually they silently, but relentlessly upend the delicate ecology of a lake. They overwhelm and kill native mussels. They strain out and devour tiny, edible material, robbing native fish of nutrients. They excrete a carpet of waste that fosters the growth of hairy, stinky, toxic mats of algae. Zebra mussels have a jagged, razor sharp shell that can slice a swimmer's foot or leave your hand bloody when grabbing onto anything submerged in the infested waters. Once they have gone through their lifecycle and have died, they wash onto the shore by the millions adding yet another set of problems.

When talking with people about zebra mussels I often refence Mille Lacs Lake in Minnesota and the devastating effect zebra mussels have had on their fishery. I do this for a few reasons, first, it is similar in size to Devils Lake in its current elevation, about 140,000 acres, something people can relate to, second it is known for its Walleye fishing, recreation and tourism is a big part of their economy, and three I have a sister that lives close to and a place where I've had the opportunity to visit several times.

Zebra mussels were discovered in Mille Lacs Lake in 2005 by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The DNR started doing surveys using dive teams along specific tracs to gauge the density and spread of the invasive creature. What the study found was that zebra mussels were expanding in density by about a factor of 30 every year until the maximum average density per square foot was 1,269. This was an increase of 8 million times within just 6 short years.

It is now estimated that there are approximately 2 trillion zebra mussels in Mille Lacs Lake! That is 2 trillion liters of water filtered by the mussels each and every day. That is enough filtration to filter the entire volume of Mille Lacs Lake every 42 hours or so.

Besides zebra mussels Mille Lacs Lake also has spiny waterflea, yet another invasive aquatic nuisance, which along with the zebra mussels has had a dramatic impact on their walleye production. In 2012 the Minnesota DNR reduced the number of walleyes anglers were able to keep to 4 that were 17 inches and under and in 2017 reduced that number even further by going to a catch-and-release only walleye regulation. Imagine fishing on Devils Lake, Lake Sakakawea or any of the fabulous fisheries we have here in North Dakota and NOT being able to keep any walleye or other game fish you caught. Now imagine what that would do to a community's, region's and the state's economy....Remember the 787.8 million dollars spend by anglers annually?

The University of Wisconsin Sea Grant Institute warns that zebra mussel pose a multibillion-dollar threat to North America's industrial, agriculture and municipal water supplies. The U.S. Department of the Interior estimates yearly damages of \$500,000 in the Great Lakes region alone.

Zebra mussels are just one of the many invasive aquatic nuisance species that could find their way to our waters. Some other of concern are the quagga mussel, Eurasian watermifoil, various carp species and starry stonewort. The very best way to get rid of invasive aquatic nuisance species is to NOT get them in the first place. Benjamin Franklin stated "an once of prevention is worth a pound of cure" that could never be more true when it come to the spread of invasive aquatic nuisance species. Education, inspection and enforcement are all very important components to stop the spread of aquatic nuisance species and I believe that SENATE BILL 2293 would go a long way in assisting in that endeavor and that is I am asking for your support of Senate Bill 2293.

That is a start but today we can work towards funding that can expand education, inspection and also decontamination stations in critical locations of the state.

If an infestation occurs and expands it will become a problem for every citizen of this great state. Water intake structures for cities may be effected, power plant intake structures will be compromised, agriculture may never be the same and recreation will be changed forever. This will cost everyone in the end but at this point we do not have the issues that our neighbors in Minnesota have been going through. It is preventable and today I encourage your support of SB 2293. Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony.

TESTIMONY OF MICHAEL McENROE ND CHAPTER OF THE WILDLIFE SOCIETY SENATE BILL 2293 ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE JANUARY 25, 2019

Chairwoman Unruh and Members of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee:

For the record, I am Mike McEnroe representing the North Dakota Chapter of The Wildlife Society, comprised of some 350 wildlife biologists, land managers, educators, students, law enforcement officers, and administrators in the State.

SB 2293 creates an Aquatic Nuisance Species (ANS fund) to provide more staff and funding for the ND Game and Fish Department to use to combat the spread of ANS into the State. We strongly support this concept.

However the Chapter has serious reservations about the funding mechanism of SB 2293. The Game and Fish Department is a special fund agency, using monies from hunting, fishing, and boating licenses and several federal excise taxes for its operation. This bill purports to use a variety of other ND tax revenue sources (gas tax and sales tax) to supplement the GFD budget. And while the GFD would realize a higher rate of interest on their reserve fund monies invested with State Investment Board, those monies would be placed in an ANS fund, which

could be viewed as a diversion of GFD funds and may cost the Department its \$ 30-35 million per biennium in federal funds.

The Chapter would recommend and has already supported increases in the Game and Fish budget, SB 2017, for ANS work and an increased law enforcement effort using existing monies in the Department's reserve fund.

For these reasons the North Dakota Chapter of The Wildlife Society respectfully asks for a Do Not Pass vote on SB 2293 as drafted.

That being said, the Chapter will work with the Sport Fishing Congress, Friends of Lake Sakakawea, and the Game and Fish Department to develop language that funds the Department's ANS Plan in ways that do not jeopardize federal funds.

SB 2293

Madam Chair, members of the committee. I'm Steve Salwei, and I serve as the Transportation Programs Director for the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT). I'm here today to oppose Senate Bill 2293 as written.

This bill would divert up to \$1,500,000 per biennium from the Highway Tax Distribution Fund to the ND Game and Fish Aquatic Nuisance Species Program fund. This diversion of funds would not only impact the DOT's ability to plan and reconstruct roadways, it would also have an impact on counties, cities, townships and transit as well.

The table below shows the impact this diversion of funds would have on the distribution of funds for various governmental entities:

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department already gets a share of the Highway Tax Distribution Fund, per **ND Century Code 20.1-02-16.6**. While we understand the importance of keeping our lakes, rivers and streams free of aquatic nuisance species we would prefer that no additional funding be taken from the Highway Tax Distribution Fund for the Aquatic Nuisance Species Program.

Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee Testimony on SB 2293

North Dakota Game and Fish Department Kim Kary, Chief Administrative Services Division January 25, 2019

Madam Chair Unruh and members of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources committee, my name is Kim Kary, Chief of Administrative Services Division of the North Dakota Game and Fish Department and I am testifying on SB 2293.

Conceptually, we recognize and appreciate the intentions of this bill as we need to protect waters of the state from the adverse effects of aquatic nuisance species (ANS) infestations. The North Dakota Aquatic Nuisance Species Management Plan was signed just last month by Governor Burgum. This plan outlines many activities that need to be addressed to prevent the introduction and spread of ANS into and within North Dakota and SB 2293 addresses some of those actions. We recognize that although we've collectively addressed many ANS actions and activities needed to slow down its spread, we also recognize more needs to be done.

However, I must share a few concerns we have regarding the proposed funding mechanisms in relation to the Department.

The Game and Fish Department (Department) is a special fund agency using only licensing revenue (hunting, fishing, and boat registrations) and federal funding.

Per NDCC 20.1-02-17, Hunting and fishing license fees and application fees may only be used for departmental programs and administration. Noncompliance will result in a diversion of funds. A diversion of funds can occur when there is a loss of control of those funds by the Department. A diversion would result in the Department not being able to receive *any* Federal funds from the USFWS (approx. \$32M).

I would like to point out some language in the proposed bill that is problematic as it relates to loss of control: Section 4, on page 2, line 24, which states "the investment income <u>must</u> be deposited into the aquatic nuisance species program fund for use in aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs". This language would result in a loss of control by the Department. The word "must" should be replaced with "may" in order to avoid a loss of federal funds.

This premise of investing the fifteen million dollar balance under the supervision of the state investment board was part of the appropriation bill draft by OMB submitted to Legislative Council and was discussed with the Senate Appropriation Committee during our budget hearing. However, the investment income was not mandated for ANS as required in SB 2293.

And finally, this bill would require in Section 5, a surcharge of three dollars on each fishing and waterfowl license. In some instances, we are unsure whether the across the board surcharge fairly reflects the potential, deleterious impacts of ANS transport inherent to the various license holders. For example:

- 1) a resident senior fishing license is \$5; the surcharge would increase the fee by 60%; resident senior anglers are less of a threat pertaining to ANS transport than those from out-of-state.
- 2) a specific waterfowl license is required only for nonresidents; there is not a waterfowl license for residents.

Finally, although the Department has some concerns with the funding portion of this bill, we are encouraged by the intentions of SB 2293 which aim to prevent or slow down the spread of ANS.

Madam Chair and committee members, this concludes my testimony. I would be happy to answer any questions.











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TESTIMONY TO NORTH DAKOTA LEGISLATURE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON ENGERY AND NATURAL RESOURCES

SB 2293

Mr. Chairman, Mr. Vice-Chairman and distinguished members of the committee I would like to thank you for allowing me the time to address the committee today. My name is Jeff Frith I am from Devils Lake and I am the Manager of the Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource Board and since 2010 I have served on the North Dakota Aquatic Invasive Species Committee. The testimony I am providing is in support to Senate Bill 2293, which would create the Aquatic Nuisance Species Program Fund.

The Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource Board is comprised of County Water Resource District Managers from 8 counties within the Devils Lake Basin. As members of the North Dakota Water Resource District Association and fully support the association's long-term goals and resolutions adopted on December 6th, 2018 including the position that states: "AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES. We urge aggressive prevention of aquatic nuisance species (ANS) prevention for North Dakota waters as outlined in the North Dakota aquatic species management plan prepared by the Aquatic Invasive Species Committee. We urge all federal and state agencies to address and implement aquatic nuisance species prevention programs in all North Dakota waters, and we support adequate funding for ANS education and enforcement." To further support the efforts to prevent the introduction or spread of invasive aquatic nuisances on Wednesday, January 23rd the Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource of Directors unanimously voted in support of Senate Bill 2293.

Aquatic nuisance species' impacts on the waters of North 3/8/9 Dakota could vary greatly from barely noticeable to ecologically tachment 2 devastating and given the economic benefits of fishing throughout the state, 787.8 million dollars annually (NDSU Agribusiness and Applied Economics Report 785, January 2019) could prove to be very extremely costly.

Today I would like to speak to you about a particular invasive aquatic nuisance species that should make the make the hair on the back of your neck stand up, I know it does mine, and that is the zebra mussel.

Once introduced zebra mussels can NOT be eradicated. Zebra mussels are voracious filter feeders. A single mussel can suck a liter of water through its tiny body daily. The thumbnail-sized mollusks spread rapidly, a single female mussel can produce about a half a billion offspring in her 3 to 5-year life span. Eventually they silently, but relentlessly upend the delicate ecology of a lake. They overwhelm and kill native mussels. They strain out and devour tiny, edible material, robbing native fish of nutrients. They excrete a carpet of waste that fosters the growth of hairy, stinky, toxic mats of algae. Zebra mussels have a jagged, razor sharp shell that can slice a swimmer's foot or leave your hand bloody when grabbing onto anything submerged in the infested waters. Once they have gone through their lifecycle and have died, they wash onto the shore by the millions adding yet another set of problems.

When talking with people about zebra mussels I often refence Mille Lacs Lake in Minnesota and the devastating effect zebra mussels have had on their fishery. I do this for a few reasons, first, it is similar in size to Devils Lake in its current elevation, about 140,000 acres, something people can relate to, second it is known for its Walleye fishing, recreation and tourism is a big part of their economy, and three I have a sister that lives close to and a place where I've had the opportunity to visit several times.

Zebra mussels were discovered in Mille Lacs Lake in 2005 by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The DNR started doing surveys using dive teams along specific tracs to gauge the density and spread of the invasive creature. What the study found was that zebra mussels were expanding in density by about a factor of 30 every year until the maximum average density per square foot was 1,269. This was an increase of 8 million times within just 6 short years.

It is now estimated that there are approximately 2 trillion \$\frac{5B 2293}{3/8/\text{Pl}}\$
zebra mussels in Mille Lacs Lake! That is 2 trillion liters of waterment 2 filtered by the mussels each and every day. That is enough filtration to filter the entire volume of Mille Lacs Lake every 42 hours or so.

Besides zebra mussels Mille Lacs Lake also has spiny waterflea, yet another invasive aquatic nuisance, which along with the zebra mussels has had a dramatic impact on their walleye production. In 2012 the Minnesota DNR reduced the number of walleyes anglers were able to keep to 4 but those were limited to 17 inches and under, in 2015 walleye fishing was suspended mid-season, allowed in 2017 to a a catch-and-release only to its current regulation of one walleye 21" – 23" in length with everything else being immediately released. Imagine fishing on Devils Lake, Lake Sakakawea or any of the fabulous fisheries we have here in North Dakota and NOT being able to keep any walleye or other game fish you caught. Now imagine what that would do to a community's, a region's or the state's economy....Remember the 787.8 million dollars spend by anglers annually?

The University of Wisconsin Sea Grant Institute warns that zebra mussel poses a multibillion-dollar threat to North America's industrial, agriculture and municipal water supplies. The U.S. Department of the Interior estimates yearly damages of \$500,000 in the Great Lakes region alone.

Zebra mussels are just one of the many invasive aquatic nuisance species that could find their way to our waters. Some other of concern are the larger cousin of the zebra mussels the quagga mussel which survives in deeper waters, Eurasian watermifoil, the various carp species, spiny waterflea and starry stonewort just to name a few. The very best way to get rid of invasive aquatic nuisance species is to NOT get them in the first place. Benjamin Franklin stated "an once of prevention is worth a pound of cure" that could never be more true when it come to the spread of invasive aquatic nuisance species. Education, inspection and enforcement are all very important components to stop the spread of aquatic nuisance species and I believe that SENATE BILL 2293 would go a long way in assisting in that endeavor and that is I am asking for your support of Senate Bill 2293.

In support of Engrossed Senate Bill 2293 March 8, 2019

Chairman Unruh and members of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, my name is Rich Brueckner. I am from Devils Lake and I currently serve as the president of the North Dakota Sportfishing Congress. This organization is made up of several fishing groups and many anglers who are brought together by our common love of fishing and in promoting this grand pastime. The members of the Sportfishing Congress collaborate on the protection of our amazing fishing resources and in support of efforts to maintain and enhance our quality lakes and rivers. Our members advanced the policy proposal outlined in SB 2293, and thus we support the bill.

The members and member organizations of the Sportfishing Congress believe that one of the biggest threats presently facing North Dakota's fishing resource is the introduction and spread of aquatic nuisance species (ANS), such as zebra mussels, Asian carp, and Eurasian watermilfoil. Proliferation of any of these, or a host of other invasive or nuisance species could lead to a collapse of our remarkable fishery. Proliferation of ANS cost the United States billions of dollars annually, impact recreation, and harm our natural resources. It is for these reasons that we have initiated the effort to advance a sportsman funded program to partially address ANS in North Dakota.

To become more proactive in the defense against ANS, the Sportfishing Congress members believe that increased funding is needed, and the Game and Fish Department should be provided with additional resources dedicated to aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs.

The state has adopted regulations and an ANS Management plan, which was recently updated and was ratified by Governor Burgum. However, we feel that more needs to be done to reduce these risks. The Game and Fish Department has the rules, but not the tools to reduce the risk of ANS introduction in the state.

Others today will expound on the risks of ANS, however you should know that invasive plant, animal and disease species:

- Directly outcompete native species for food and habitat
- Affect the composition and structure of aquatic communities and food chains
- Degrade habitat and negatively affect wildlife and water quality
- Decrease sportfishing opportunities
- Negative economic effects on recreation and tourism industries
- Degrade shorelines and facilities for human use
- Decrease property values
- Negatively affect human and wildlife health (e.g. injury and disease vectors).
- Increase costs to utilities, industry, and municipalities (e.g. Zebra mussels at water intakes)

The Sportfishing Congress advocates implementing a modest ANS outreach, inspection and monitoring program at the Game and Fish Department. We are proposing in Senate Bill 2293, to fund, with sportsmen's dollars, additional resources to address ANS. To improve the ability to prevent the introduction and spread of ANS and assist in compliance with current regulations, the objective is to eventually establish three permanent watercraft wash stations at high traffic locations (probably Devils Lake, Sakakawea, and Bismarck) staffed with seasonal technicians.

We estimated that an additional \$2.5 million per biennium is needed to provide adequate funding and staffing. In comparison to the need, this request is modest, and we consider it the minimum needed to improve ANS compliance, and to help protect and improve North Dakota's fishing resources. The effort would not be as extensive or expensive as many neighboring states, several of which conduct mandatory inspections at multiple locations and at all water access points. A comprehensive mandatory ANS inspection program in North Dakota could cost \$20-30 million per biennium.

This bill creates a special fund the fishermen and women are willing to finance, to help to conduct more ANS work across North Dakota to address prevention shortcomings the members of the Sportfishing Congress have identified for several years. We proposed a multifaceted funding formula to support an FTE position dedicated to ANS, enough seasonal staffing to operate the three wash stations, construction costs for additional wash stations, an increase in watercraft inspections and additional ANS laboratory capabilities. In addition, the Sportfishing Congress would like to see two additional game wardens to work on improving ANS compliance with existing rules and regulations. Finally, we seek to enhance the Department's Development program to not only improve boating access to the state's fishing waters, but would also help in constructing more fish cleaning stations which help in fulfilling ANS compliance by anglers.

The fund would be created from two sources that may generate around \$2 million per biennium:

- 1) A surcharge of \$3 on each resident fishing license except for seniors or disabled citizens and a surcharge of \$6 on each nonresident fishing and each waterfowl hunting license to generate an estimated \$1.7 million per biennium.
- 2) Authorizes the investment of \$15 million of the State Game and Fish Fund to generate income and returns of \$200,000 to \$400,000 that may be added to the ANS Fund.

As introduced, the bill included a transfer of the gasoline tax generated by boat use estimated at \$750,000 annually; and half of one percent of the sales tax collected on boat sales which was estimated at \$225,000 annually. However, the Senate removed these two funding sources.

The following provide detail of funding estimates of the \$2.1 million generated by the policies in Engrossed SB 2293, and the following page contains a table of comparison with other states' ANS efforts.

TESTIMONY OF JOHN BRADLEY NORTH DAKOTA WILDLIFE FEDERATION **SENATE BILL 2293 ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE** MARCH 8, 2019

Chairman Porter and members of the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee:

For the Record, I am John Bradley, Executive Director of the North Dakota Wildlife Federation. I'm here today representing our 1,500 members in 15 affiliated wildlife and sportsmen's club across North Dakota.

The North Dakota Wildlife Federation supports efforts to reduce the risks of Aquatic Nuisance Species entering our state. NDWF rises in support of SB 2293. The Federation had issues about the funding mechanism of SB 2293, primarily the gas and sales tax. The bill sponsors, in coordination with proponents of the bill made necessary changes to fix the issues and we are now proud to support this bill.

The funding mechanism in the bill is a surcharge of three dollars on each resident fishing license except for a resident who is sixty five years of age or older, permanently or totally disabled, or a disabled veteran. The director also shall establish a surcharge of six dollars on each nonresident fishing license and each nonresident waterfowl hunting license. Game and Fish is funded entirely using monies from hunting, fishing,




boating licenses, and several federal excise taxes for its operation. The current bill solves the issue and our worry about the Department of Game and Fish receiving other North Dakota tax revenue sources (gas and sales tax) to supplement their budget.

NDWF hopes to continue work with the Sport Fishing Congress, Game and Fish, and any other groups including industry and utility companies to fight ANS from spreading into North Dakota's water bodies.

Testimony, SB 2293

Chairman Porter and members of the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee:

My name is Mary Massad. I represent the North Dakota Water Users Association and I am here to testify in support of Senate Bill 2293. The North Dakota Water Users Association was organized in 1959 to protect, develop and manage North Dakota's water resources and it is currently comprised of over 300 local, statewide and regional organizations in North Dakota who have an active interest in water.

At our annual meeting in December, the North Dakota Water Users Association passed a resolution supporting the aggressive prevention of aquatic nuisance species (ANS) from harming North Dakota waters as outlined in the North Dakota Aquatic Species Management Plan prepared by the Aquatic Invasive Species Committee, as well as adequate funding for ANS education and enforcement.

In bodies of water where ANS have become established, they are expensive to combat and difficult or nearly impossible remove.

This is not just a sportsmen issue. ANS can and will greatly impact industry in the state by lowering water quality and infiltrating water intakes. These intakes provide water to regional water suppliers as well as refineries, ethanol plants, irrigation operations, and power plants, to name just a few. If these intakes were obstructed or clogged by an aquatic nuisance species, the cost of repair and eradication would greatly exceed the cost of prevention. These species reproduce so quickly they clog entire power plants, public water intakes and pipes, and constrict flow reducing the intake in heat exchangers, condensers, firefighting equipment, and air conditioning and cooling systems. If water supply systems must keep intakes and pipelines clear of ANS, that cost will pass to the consumer in the form of higher rates.

Our state has already invested millions of dollars in water projects and many of these projects would be at risk if aquatic nuisance species were not prevented from entering our waters.

If North Dakota waters were to become infested, it would be less attractive for energy, energy by-product, and industrial development, due to the unavailability of an adequate supply of water for such purposes. This would also make it more difficult to increase employment and economic opportunities for our state and local communities.

Please give SB 2293 a DO PASS recommendation. Thank you for allowing me to speak with you.



House Energy and Natural Resources Committee Information on SB 2293

North Dakota Game and Fish Department Kim Kary, Chief Administrative Services Division March 8, 2019

Chairman Porter and members of the House Energy and Natural Resources committee, my name is Kim Kary, Chief of Administrative Services Division of the North Dakota Game and Fish Department and I am providing information on SB 2293.

The Department recognizes and appreciates the intentions of this bill as we need to protect waters of the state from the adverse effects of aquatic nuisance species (ANS) infestations. The North Dakota Aquatic Nuisance Species Management Plan was signed in December 2018 by Governor Burgum. This plan outlines many activities that need to be addressed to substantially reduce the risk of introduction and spread of ANS into and within North Dakota and SB 2293 addresses some of those actions. We recognize that although we've collectively addressed many ANS actions and activities needed to slow down its spread, we also recognize more needs to be done.

The Game and Fish Department (Department) is a special fund agency using only licensing revenue (hunting, fishing, and boat registrations) and federal funding.

Per NDCC 20.1-02-17, Hunting and fishing license fees and application fees may only be used for departmental programs and administration. Noncompliance will result in a diversion of funds. A diversion of funds can also occur when there is a loss of control of those funds by the Department. A diversion would result in the Department not being able to receive *any* Federal funds from the USFWS (approx. \$32M).

The original bill had some problematic language which would've resulted in a loss of control putting the department in a diversion of funds. The language was corrected by replacing the word "must" with "may" in the amended version.

On page 2, lines 1-4, of this bill, the premise of investing the fifteen-million-dollar balance under the supervision of the state investment board was part of our appropriation bill draft by OMB, submitted to Legislative Council and it has been included by the Senate in our appropriation bill SB 2017. However, page 2, lines 5-7, were not included in our appropriation bill passed by the Senate. It is the Department's intent to put a portion of the interest income toward ANS.

Finally, in Section 3, this bill as amended would require:

- 1. a surcharge of three dollars on each resident fishing license (except for a resident sixty-five years or over, a resident totally or permanently disabled, or a resident disabled veteran as defined in section 20.1-03-12(6)).
 - We would like to express, it was the intent that the three-dollar surcharge would apply toward a combination license and our fiscal note was calculated including it. We wanted to get the committee's thoughts whether the language is clear regarding that the surcharge applies to a combination license.
- 2. a surcharge of six dollars on each nonresident fishing license and each nonresident waterfowl hunting license.

The funding provided in this section is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and may be continued into the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. The game and fish department is authorized two full-time equivalent positions for this purpose. Moneys deposited in the aquatic nuisance species program fund must be transferred to the state game and fish fund to repay any moneys expended from the state game and fish fund under this section.

For a nonresident who participates on the same basis as a resident in a lottery for deer licenses remaining after the second lottery for residents, fifty dollars.
- 5. For a resident fur-bearer license, fifteen dollars.
- 6. For a resident fishing license, sixteen dollars, except that for a resident sixty-five years or over, a resident totally or permanently disabled, or a resident disabled veteran who has a fifty percent service-connected disability as determined by the department of veterans' affairs or has an extra-schedular rating to include individual unemployability that brings the veteran's total disability ratio to fifty percent, the license fee is five dollars.
- 7. For a nonresident fishing license, forty-five dollars.
- 8. For a resident husband and wife fishing license, twenty-two dollars.
- 9. For a nonresident nongame hunting license, fifteen dollars.
- 10. For a resident wild turkey permit, fifteen dollars.
- 11. For an annual general game license, three dollars.
- 12. For a license to a nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs, or that person's agent, the amount that the nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs would pay for a nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs license or comparable license in that person's state of residence, or fifty dollars, whichever is greater.
- 13. For a license to a resident buyer or shipper of green furs, eight dollars for each place of business maintained by that person within this state.
- 14. For a license to a resident traveling agent, buyer, or shipper of green furs, twenty dollars.
- 15. For an annual license to practice taxidermy, twenty-five dollars.
- 16. For a permit to ship, by a person having a resident hunting license, during the respective open seasons, not to exceed in any one season twenty-five

game birds, to points within this state other than that person's home or to points outside this state, three dollars.

- 17. For a permit to make collections of protected birds and animals for scientific purposes, ten dollars.
- 18. For a motorboat certificate of number and license: Each motorboat under sixteen feet [4.88 meters] in length, and all canoes, regardless of length, powered by a motor, eighteen dollars. A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 20.1-02-and, a new section to chapter 20.1-03, and a new section to chapter 20.1-13 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the creation of the aquatic nuisance species program fund-and, surcharges for fishing and waterfowl licenses, and requiring aquatic nuisance species fees for motorboats; to amend and reenact sections 20.1-02-16.1 and 20.1-03-12 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the investment of the state game and fish fund and aquatic nuisance species fees for motorboats; and to provide a penalty; to provide a continuing an appropriation; to provide for a transfer; to provide an exemption; and to declare an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. A new section to chapter 20.1-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Aquatic nuisance species program fund - Continuing appropriation Appropriation.

There is created in the state treasury a special fund known as the aquatic nuisance species program fund. The fund consists of transfers and deposits made in accordance with sections 2 and 3 section 20.1-02-16.1 and sections 4 and 5 of this Act. All moneys Moneys in the fund are appropriated to the game and fish department upon budget section approval for use in aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs under chapter 20.1-17.

Budget section approval under this section must comply with the new section to chapter 54-35 as created by section 15 of Senate Bill No. 2055, as approved by the sixty-sixth legislative assembly.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-02-16.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

20.1-02-16.1. Game and fish fund - Use - Required balance - Budget section approval.

- All income of the state game and fish department deposited by the director with the state treasurer must be credited to the state game and fish fund and the fund may be used only by the department. 

The sticker must be attached to the motorboat in a manner prescribed by the department so the sticker is clearly visible.
- Fees collected under this section must be deposited with the state treasurer and credited to the aquatic nuisance species program fund.
- 3. A person that violates this section is guilty of a class 2 noncriminal offense.

SECTION 6. APPROPRIATION - 2017-19 BIENNIUM - TRANSFER -

EXEMPTION. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the state game and fish fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$467,100, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the game and fish department for the purpose of administering aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs, for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2019. The funding provided in this section is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and may be continued into the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. The game and fish department shall transfer moneys deposited in the aquatic nuisance species program fund to the state game and fish fund to repay any moneys expended from the state game and fish fund under this section.

SECTION 7. APPROPRIATION - AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES PROGRAM

FUND. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the aquatic nuisance species program fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,500,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the game and fish department for use in aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs under chapter 20.1-17, for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act and ending June 30, 2021. The game and fish department is authorized two full-time equivalent positions for this purpose.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 3 of this Act becomes effective on January 1, 2020.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 4 of this Act becomes effective on April 1, 2020.

SECTION 10. EMERGENCY. Sections 6 and 7 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure."
