

#### Other Sections Recommended to be Added in the Executive Budget (As Detailed in the Attached Appendix)

**Environment and rangeland protection fund transfer** - Section 3 would require the Agriculture Commissioner to transfer \$325,000 from the environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use pesticide fund during the 2021-23 biennium.

**Environment and rangeland protection fund** - Section 4 would identify \$7,046,124 in the estimated income line item in Section 1 is from the environment and rangeland protection fund.

**Game and Fish Department operating fund** - Section 5 would identify that \$624,136 in the estimated income line item in Section 1 is from the Game and Fish Department operating fund for various Department of Agriculture programs.

**State Water Commission transfer** - Section 6 would transfer \$125,000 from the State Water Commission to the Agriculture Commissioner for the Wildlife Services program during the 2021-23 biennium.

**Waterbank program** - Section 7 would amend Section 7 of Chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws to allow the Agriculture Commissioner to use "up to" \$50,000 of the 2019-21 biennium salaries and wages line item as matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant for the waterbank program.

**Pipeline restoration and reclamation** - Section 8 would identify that \$200,000 in the estimated income line item in Section 1 is from the abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund for the pipeline restoration and reclamation program.

Agriculture Commissioner salary - Section 9 would provide the statutory changes necessary to increase the Agriculture Commissioner's salary. The Agriculture Commissioner's annual salary would increase from the current level of \$119,757 to \$122,152 effective July 1, 2021, and to \$124,595 effective July 1, 2022, to reflect the 2 percent and 2 percent recommended salary increase.

**North Dakota Trade Office** - Section 10 would identify that \$850,000 in the operating expenses line item relates to the North Dakota Trade Office, which a portion of the program is recommended to be transferred from the Department of Commerce to the Agriculture Commissioner. The Agriculture Commissioner would be allowed to spend 60 percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the North Dakota Trade Office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent the North Dakota Trade Office provides \$1 of matching funds from private or other sources for each \$1 provided by the Agriculture Commissioner during the 2021-23 biennium. Matching funds may include money spent by businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants, to provide training, and to buy computer equipment as part of the North Dakota Trade Office's export assistant program.

#### **Continuing Appropriations**

**Bioscience innovation grant fund -** North Dakota Century Code Section 4.1-01-20.1 - Includes funding appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis to award grants to North Dakota bioscience businesses to support biotechnology innovation and commercialization, promote the creation of bioscience jobs in the state, encourage the development of new bioscience technologies and bioscience startup companies in the state, leverage the agriculture industry in the state to support the development of bioscience technologies impacting livestock operations and crop production, promote bioscience research and development at institutions under the control of the State Board of Higher Education; and encourage coordination and collaboration among other entities and programs in the state to promote bioscience innovation goals.

**Federal environmental law impact review fund** - Section 4.1-01-21 - Includes funding appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis for certain administrative costs related to the Federal Environmental Law Impact Review

Committee, which reviews federal environmental legislation and regulations detrimentally impacting or potentially detrimentally impacting the state's agricultural, energy, or oil production sectors.

**Environmental impact mitigation fund** - Section 4.1-01-21.1 - Includes funding appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis for distribution to landowners for the mitigation of agricultural land impacted by assessed adverse direct environmental impacts of a proposed site, corridor, route, or facility.

Honey promotion fund - Chapter 4.1-08 - Commodity checkoff for market development of honey.

Turkey fund - Chapter 4.1-12 - Commodity checkoff for market development of turkeys and turkey products.

**Industrial hemp** - Section 4.1-18-02 - Provides for the Agriculture Commissioner to assess a fee of \$150 plus \$25 per acre to each applicant requesting to grow or process industrial hemp. Fees collected for this purpose are deposited in the Agriculture Commissioner operating fund and appropriated to the Department of Agriculture on a continuing basis.

**Minor use pesticide fund** - Section 4.1-39-08 - For studies, investigations, and evaluations regarding registration and use of pesticides.

**Equine processing fund** - Section 36-21-19 - Provides for the Agriculture Commissioner to assess a fee of \$5 for equine processing facility assessments. The first \$50,000 of fees collected is deposited in the general fund and any additional amounts are deposited in the equine processing fund. All funds in the equine processing fund are appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis.

**State waterbank fund** - Section 61-31-10 - Authorizes the Agriculture Commissioner to receive funds from any private or public source, including from state agencies for the state waterbank program. The state waterbank fund and interest earned are appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis.

#### **Significant Audit Findings**

The operational audit for the Department of Agriculture conducted by the State Auditor's office for the period ending June 30, 2019, concluded the Agriculture Commissioner exceeded general fund appropriation limits by \$25,529 related to the waterbank program during the 2017-19 biennium.

Section 8 of House Bill No. 1009 (2017) provided the salaries and wages line item in Section 1 of the bill included \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program. During the 2017-19 biennium, the Agriculture Commissioner spent \$40,942 of the \$50,000 for salaries and wages, of which \$15,413 was spent on the waterbank program and \$25,529 was spent on other department salaries. The remaining \$9,058 was canceled and retained in the general fund at the end of the 2017-19 biennium.

The State Auditor's report states the \$50,000 appropriated from the general fund to the Agriculture Commissioner was available only for matching funds for salaries related to the waterbank program. The report states \$34,587 should have been canceled and returned to the general fund at the end of the 2017-19 biennium instead of \$9,058 and that the Agriculture Commissioner overspent the authority provided by \$25,529.

#### Major Related Legislation

House Bill No. 1026 - This bill combines state warehouse and facility-based grain buyer licenses and creates a new grain processor and broker license.

**House Bill No. 1115** - This bill transfers responsibilities related to zoning of animal feeding operations and regulation of odors from agricultural operations and animal feeding operations from the Department of Environmental Quality to the Agriculture Commissioner.

**House Bill No. 1158** - This bill requires the Agriculture Commissioner to deposit 50 percent of funding paid to mitigate the adverse environmental impacts of a proposed site, corridor, route, or facility into the environmental impact mitigation fund and the remaining 50 percent in the federal environmental law impact review fund, rather than depositing 100 percent of available funding into the environmental impact mitigation fund.

**Senate Bill No. 2171** - This bill transfers the International Business and Trade Office, also known as the North Dakota Trade Office, from the Department of Commerce to the Agriculture Commissioner and appropriates \$1,600,000 to the Agriculture Commissioner.



The agriculture commissioner shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-eighth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 3. TRANSFER - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION FUND – MINOR USE PESTICIDE FUND.** The agriculture commissioner shall transfer \$325,000 from the environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use pesticide fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 4. ESTIMATED INCOME - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$7,046,124, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the environment and rangeland protection fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various department of agriculture programs, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30,2023.

**SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - GAME AND FISH FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$624,136, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the game and fish department operating fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various department of agriculture programs, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - STATE WATER COMMISSION - TRANSFER.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$125,000 which the state water commission shall transfer to the agriculture commissioner for the wildlife services program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.** Section 7 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

**SECTION 7. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS.** The salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes <u>up to</u> \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program.

**SECTION 8. ESTIMATED INCOME – PIPELINE RESTORATION AND RECLAMATION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$200,000 from the abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the pipeline restoration and reclamation program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-21 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

**4-01-21. Salary of agriculture commissioner.** The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred sixteen thousand eight hundred thirty-six--dollars through June 30, 2020 one hundred twentytwo thousand one hundred fifty-two dollars through June 30, 2022, and one hundred nineteen thousand seven hundred fifty-seven one hundred twenty-four thousand five hundred ninety-five dollars thereafter.

**SECTION 10. TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT.** The operating line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include \$850,000 of funding relating to the North Dakota trade office. The agriculture commissioner may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent that the North Dakota trade office provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the department for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. Matching funds may include money spent by businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants provide training to export assistants or buy computer equipment as part of the North Dakota trade office's export assistance program.



## **Major Statutory Responsibilities**

The agriculture commissioner is statutorily responsible for enforcing laws and regulations pertaining to pesticides, fertilizers, anhydrous ammonia, livestock sales, dairy production, noxious weed control, plant export certification, and beekeeping. The commissioner is also responsible for the registration of pesticides, fertilizers, animal feeds, and veterinary medicines; the administration of fair and timely mediation services to agriculture producers, creditors, and energy related issues; the collection and elimination of unusable pesticides; the promotion and marketing of North Dakota products; and the administration of a state meat inspection program. The responsibilities have expanded to include a leadership role in the formation of policies effecting the state's agricultural industries; the advocacy of the needs and concerns of farmers and ranchers on state and national levels; and the distribution of information concerning agricultural issues to the governor, legislature, and the general public. The agriculture commissioner works collaboratively with the Board of Animal Health to protect the health of domestic animals and nontraditional livestock of the state.

- Hemp grower licenses increased by 25 percent and processor licenses increased from 9 in 2019 to 20 in 2020.

#### Grain & Livestock Licensing

    - Inspected all roving grain buyers.
- LP3 two full containment systems with another two to be complete summer of 2021.
- Livestock licensing will be fully transferred to electronic licensing.
- Reviewed 4,029 commercial feed labels and 12,096 pet food labels.

#### Animal Health

- The AHD and the BOAH have managed to control, suppress and avoid all major foreign animal or transboundary diseases. Done by enforcing the regulations as part of our daily duties, sending many warning letters and making many phone calls to educate those involved in interstate movement of animals.
- Request to move various types of animals into ND included a Gila Monster this year (look it up somehow very appropriate for 2020). Those diseases include, but are not limited to, SARS-CoV-2. A few respiratory cases in cats were followed up on, but all were found to be ill with other more common causes of respiratory illnesses in cats.

- Numerous Health Certificates (around 7,890 out of state incoming HCs and around 12,300 ND outgoing HCs) were reviewed and those health certificates represent approximately 162,170 animals coming into ND and 1,271,530 animals leaving) based on a past year's hard copy accumulated information. Next year the numbers will be more accurate and current.
- The real highlight of 2020 was learning that due to a human pandemic we would have to learn how to work remotely. We were asked what we needed to work functionally if remote working had to become the norm during any crisis.
- Purchased USAHERDS which was supported and approved of as part of the Commissioner's request of emergency needs which were covered under the CARES Act funds.
- Went live with USAHERDS on December 7 and held the last quarterly Board meeting on December 9, 2020.

#### Pesticide & Fertilizer

- Despite the circumstances of the pandemic, and having to work remotely for several months, this division still achieved all goals and had no lapse in services to the public. Many companies the Department works with (especially out state companies) were also shut down or working under restrictions so it was challenging to reach them, but staff members were reachable and responsive in processing requests.
- During the pandemic, the Department was still able to honor all federal commitments and still performed almost double the amount of inspections required in the federal cooperative agreement. While working remotely the Department was still able to successfully renew all fertilizer licenses and registrations that expired June 30<sup>th</sup>. The Department completed all required anhydrous ammonia inspections as well as assisted in getting several new facilities up and running. One major hurdle was addressing the pesticide certifications that were expiring on April 1, as well as certifying new commercial applicators during the shutdown. The Department was able to obtain a venue that we could socially distance people properly and were able to have staff present to proctor certification exams. We were also able to renew all the commercial certifications by the expiration date as well as certify all the new commercial applicators before springs work began. The Department also spent a lot of time visiting vulnerable population centers that like daycares, hospitals, nursing homes and schools where disinfectants and other general use pesticides are being used to provide outreach on safe use and storage, and potential health dangers to exposure. The Department also was able to renew our grant and have federal funding through FY 23. Despite spending all our budgeted funds for project safe send last year, the Department was still able to find enough funding to operate the program this year.

- Received Attorney General opinions for township zoning boards that align with Department review of their zoning ordinances.

- Assisted with ND Agriculture magazine planning.
- Developed the Agricultural Products Utilization Commission Annual Report.
- Member of Blue Book Committee and currently working on Blue Book chapter highlighting the apiary industry.
- Applied for a two-year grant/project with Agriculture in the Classroom for more specialty crop projects for students.
- Worked to organize the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture annual meeting in Medora and then worked to ensure a virtual event went off seamlessly.

#### **Priority 1 – Restore FTE and Funding: Administrative Assistance**

This requests one FTE and funding for a front desk and Pride of Dakota program administrative assistant. The front desk position is NDDA's first public contact, answering all phone calls and directing general public questions and requests to the proper department resources. The position also provides valuable assistance to Pride of Dakota. The program membership is more than 525 companies and continues to grow. The position provides support with managing the program member database, nine major showcase events each year and general assistance to the membership.

#### Total request: \$163,079 (General Funds): Executive Recommendation: <u>FTE restored, no funding</u>.

#### Priority 2 – Restore Funding: Apiary Research Grants

This requests funding for the apiary research grant program. North Dakota is the number one honey producing state in the nation and each summer is the home to over 670,000 honey bee colonies. Honey bee populations have been under a lot of pressure over the past 10 years. Research is crucial to mitigating loses and is vital to trying to develop solutions to the problems the industry faces such as Varroa mites, poor nutrition, viruses, and diseases.

Total request: \$75,000 (General Funds): Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.

#### **Priority 3 – Restore Funding: Grape and Wine Grants**

This requests funding for the grape and wine grant program. The greatest difficulty facing new and existing wineries in North Dakota is a reliable supply of domestically-produced grapes suitable for quality wines. The grape and wine grants allow for continued research and evaluation of new cold-hardy selections for wine potential and commercial release in ND. The grants address research, production, management, and promotion issues that threaten the sustainability and growth of the grape and wine industry.

Total request: \$80,000 (General Funds): Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.

#### **Priority 4 – Restore Funding: Johne's Disease Control**

This requests funding for the Johne's disease control program. This program has been instrumental in identifying and reducing the incidence of Johne's disease in the state. The funds encourage and enable cattle producers to test when a problem is suspected and where the cost might otherwise be prohibitive. This program is helping producers understand the disease and learn how to manage and test animals so that disease prevalence can be dramatically reduced.

#### Total request: \$68,000 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.

#### **Priority 5 – Employee Compensation**

NDDA's salary compa ratio continues to fall below other agencies and creates a significant challenge to recruit and retain qualified and experienced employees. The Legislature continues to express confidence in NDDA by adding programs because we are efficient and effective operators. This request provides an employee equity raise on July 1, 2021.

## Total request: \$702,500 (\$369,866 General Funds, \$174,150 Special Funds, & \$158,484 Federal Funds)

Executive Recommendation: Not included.

#### Priority 6 – Staff Attorney

This requests funding to reclassify a current policy FTE to a staff attorney FTE. This reclassified position will assist the commissioner on national, state, and local laws, rules, policy, and regulation impacting the agriculture industry and all other programs under the commissioner's portfolio. This position will aid the commissioner in providing legal review and recommendations for all regulatory divisions including Animal Health, Pesticide and Fertilizer, Grain, Feed, and Livestock, Meat and Dairy Inspection, and Plant Industries. The attorney will also assist with reviewing livestock zoning ordinances and providing support for the Federal Environmental Law Impact Review Committee, as well as reviewing all contracts, agreements, and grants.

#### Total request: \$68,279 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.

#### **Priority 7 - Grain Insolvency Legal Services**

This requests funding for grain inspection insolvency legal services. This program must use outside legal resources to litigate insolvencies and bankruptcies. Funding is essential to protect bonded assets, accounts receivable, and asset recovery from failed grain dealers.

Total request: \$230,000 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.

#### **Priority 8 – Meat Inspector**

This requests general funds (state match) for a meat inspector. The State Meat and Poultry Inspection Program is required to adhere to USDA standards including daily inspections at official establishments. Presently, SMPIP staff are fully scheduled and we are unable to provide state inspection service to additional official establishments and/or additional days/hours to existing establishments. The demand for state inspection service is currently high due to individuals wanting to start new meat processing businesses or existing processors wanting to expand into the wholesale market. The demand is particularly high now due to meat shortages experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic. Locations of processors currently requesting initial or addition state inspection service include Devils Lake, Carrington, Moffit, Berthold, and Bowman.

#### Total request: \$106,458 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.

#### **Priority 9 – Grain Inspector FTE**

This requests one FTE and funding for a grain inspector. The presence of the NDDA grain inspection program has been cited by our industry as the number one thing we can do to prevent problems with fraudulent activity and bad actors. This position would create a more robust inspection program, allowing for semi-annual inspections, both forensic and onsite. It would help to identify watchlists, new licensee detection, financial capacities of licensees; it would provide valuable support to assist and educate on compliance of regulatory matters in the field. The position would create logistical solutions to long travel times and overnight road expenses. Net effect of the position creates efficiencies to lower insolvencies, costs associated thereof and less potential loss to our farmers who rely on the NDDA to provide a fair business environment.

#### Total request: \$183,399 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.

#### Priority 10 - ND Mediation Service State Match

This requests funding for state match and nonallowable expenses. NDMS' primary purpose is to help financially distressed farmers and ranchers by aiding in credit and financial matters and resolving disputes. The goal of the NDMS credit counseling program is to provide clients with a clear picture of the state of their operation, provide them with possible options to address their situation, and prepare them for mediation when necessary.

#### Total request: \$120,000 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.

#### **Priority 11 – Combined Information Technology Request (Total: \$285,000 General Funds)**

#### Funding for Centralized Invoice Processing Information Technology

This requests funding of \$80,000 for technology to improve the paper accounts payable and receivable processing system currently in place. This technology will provide a single tracking system for all invoices sent and received to aid in overcoming inefficiencies to more quickly and accurately receive, pay, and track invoices within the entire department. It also allows for invoice receivables to be paid using our current e-commerce

Executive Recommendation: Not included.

#### Funding for ND Mediation Service Information Technology

This requests funding of \$90,000 to replace an outdated Access database that was developed and maintained by Vision Technology, which has since closed. A modern, integrated database will help improve efficiency and time productivity for the client base. The new database will allow for new function features allowing for rapid analytic reporting and tracking of mediation service information. The new system will allow for integration within the agency.

Executive Recommendation: Included.

#### Funding for Meat Inspection and Dairy Information Technology

This requests funding of \$90,000 for new software that will replace the outdated Access databases. These databases were developed and maintained by Vision Technology, which has since closed. The new database will allow for new function features allowing for rapid analytic reporting and tracking for these programs.

Executive Recommendation: Included.

#### Funding for Pesticide Program Information Technology Exploration

This requests funding of \$25,000 for contractual services with North Dakota Information Technology to asses our current database systems. The database systems we currently utilize through an outside vendor are getting outdated and do not allow for ecommerce transactions through the Department ecommerce portal. This enhancement would help us determine whether it would be more cost effective to upgrade our current systems or if there are other options available that would better meet our needs and offer a better customer experience to the public.

Executive Recommendation: Not included.

#### **Priority 12 – Reserve Corps Veterinarians Information Technology**

This requests funding for three laptops under desktop support to be included in go-pack kits for Reserve Corps Veterinarians to rapidly deploy personnel and assets to investigate and respond to weatherrelated events such as flooding, foreign animal disease threats, and animal health investigations.

**Total request: \$14,910 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation: <u>Not included</u>.**

#### Meat Processor Cost Share Program: \$6,200,000

This cost share program was implemented to address increased demand for retail meat products and slaughter of livestock. Meat processing plants have been significantly impacted by the pandemic due to increased consumer demand for retail meat products. This cost share program provides meat processing plants increased capability to meet the growing demand for meat. Funded 76 plants.

#### Charitable Food Organizations Grant Program: \$2,000,000

This program offers grants to help charitable food organizations and small grocers make necessary investments in tools to extend the shelf life of perishable foods. Charitable food organizations include any organization that provides food and/or services, including food pantries, soup kitchens, senior citizen centers, food distribution centers and hubs, churches, and donation centers. Small grocers include any grocer located in a community of 750 or less. Funded 83 organizations.

#### **Bioscience Grant Program: \$5,000,000**

This programs provides grants to support biotechnology innovation and commercialization, promote the creation of bioscience jobs in the state, and promote bioscience research and development in the area of coronavirus research. Grant recipients are companies expressing the ability to partner, assist, and develop techniques to benefit coronavirus research, virus screening technologies, antibody therapies, immunotherapies, and sanitation technologies. Funded 8 companies.

#### Information Technology Projects to Improve Efficiencies and Overcome Challenges from Covid-19 Impacts: \$356,000

**Grain Inspection Program Database Enhancement**: This enhancement allowed for the electronic collection of credit sale indemnity fund, monthly grain reporting, and allowed producers access to li cense information.

**Livestock Auction Markets and Dealers Program Development**: This funding replaced a paper based process with an electronic process for licensing and provided producers access to license Information.

**Local Foods Map**: This funding created a producer updatable map that provides the public access to information regarding categories of locally produced food.

**USAHERDS Computer Database**: USAHERDS is a computerized database to gather and organize animal health data needed to prevent, detect, contain, and eradicate outbreaks of dangerous diseases in animals. The purchase of USAHERDS will allow monitoring and containment of animal diseases quickly and effectively, protecting our food supply, and local economies.

## Audit Report of Biennium Ended June 30, 2019

#### CONCLUSION

The Department of Agriculture appeared to have overspent their appropriation from the general fund by \$25,529.

### **Department Response**

<u>NDDA does not agree with the audit finding</u>. NDDA received funding from the Outdoor Heritage Fund in 2015 and worked with the Legislature to add language in our appropriation bill to be in compliance with NDCC 54-17.8-05(2) regarding the use of general funds as match. The intention in the grant application and our budget bill was to have the authority to match "up to" and not encumber \$50,000 of funds. We only requested authority to apply time for match that was directly spent working on this grant. Also, NDDA did not receive any additional general funds to cover this match.

## **Requested Action**

The Department is requesting the following language to amend HB 1009:

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT. Section 7 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

SECTION 7. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS. The salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes up to \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program.

## **Request for Century Code Amendment**

The Title 4.0 rewrites were completed during the Sixty-fifth Legislative Assembly of North Dakota (2017) and SB 2026 was part of the rewrites. SB 2026 passed after SB 2236 passed nullifying the amendments made by SB 2326 to Chapter 4-01. SB 2026 repealed Chapter 4-01 and enacted Chapter 4.1-01. Legislative Council informed the Department that due to the timing of the passage of SB 2026, the amendments passed by SB 2326 were not placed into law.

The Department is requesting the following amendment to add back the intent of SB 2236:

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

4.1-01-17. Pipeline restoration and reclamation oversight pilot program - Generally.

- 1. The commissioner shall establish a <del>pilot</del> program providing technical assistance and support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline restoration and followup support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline reclamation.
- The commissioner may contract for ombudsmen to be a resource for technical assistance and followup on pipeline issues. The ombudsmen may not investigate or assist with any pipeline installed before January 1, 2006, or regulated by the public service commission under title 49, and may not assist in easement negotiations.
- 3. The pilot-program may provide technical education, support, and outreach on pipeline-related matters in coordination with other entities.
- 4. The commissioner may contract with local individuals, deemed trustworthy by the surface owners and surface tenants, to be ombudsmen. The commissioner is not subject to the provisions of chapter 54-44.4 when contracting for the services of ombudsmen.
- 5. <u>The names of surface owners and surface tenants who receive assistance under the program are exempt</u> records as defined under section 44-04-17.1.

### **Other Related Bills with Fiscal Impacts to HB 1009**

- HB 1026: State warehouse grain and other licenses.
- HB 1045: Industrial hemp fees.
- SB 2171: Commerce Department— transfer of North Dakota Trade Office duties.



#### MAXIMIZING HONEYBEE POLLINATION TO INCREASE SUNFLOWER OIL YIELD AND OIL QUALITY

UND - Odegard School of Aerospace Sciences Paul Snyder, Grand Forks

Grant Amount:	\$59,113
Total Budget:	\$77,907

Australian technology startup Bee Innovative and the University of North Dakota (UND) are partnering to unlock an entirely new market for agricultural drones in the United States by combining Bee Innovative's extensive experience in tracking honeybees in real time for precision pollination in Australia with UND's global leadership in unmanned aircraft systems (UAS). Agriculture and honey production are important parts of North Dakota's economy, of which UND, as the state's flagship university, is a big driver through research and technology innovation. "As we grapple with global challenges around food security and doing more with less, any innovation that delivers increased certainty, predictability and outputs for farmers is a welcome innovation." "We're excited to work with UND to leverage their experience in unmanned autonomous vehicles to enhance our current BeeDar capability and make this solution a reality for the local and global agriculture market."

### SEMI-MECHANIZATION OF EARLY-SEASON VINEYARD MANAGEMENT

NDSU Department of Plant Sciences Harlene Hatterman-Valenti, Fargo

Grant Amount:	\$23,550
Total Budget:	\$29,438

Grant funding will be utilized to obtain, evaluate, and disseminate findings regarding the application of mechanized and semi-mechanized tools for new and expanding regional grape growing operations. Evaluation of traditional and powered grapevine pruners and training tools will enable comparison and isolation of tools that can empower farmer decision making for best use of resources. Demonstrations to farmers will be conducted to disperse knowledge of safe and precise handling of tools, strengthening regional vineyard owners' capacity to manage and train a new, more efficient workforce, capable of maintaining greater acreage with fewer labor hours leading to more fruit production with less expenditures.

### TESTING OF TWO NOVEL ANTI-MICROBIALS ON MEAT

NDSU Deparment of Microbiological Sciences Birgit Pruess, Fargo

Grant Amount:	\$45,765
Total Budget:	\$57,756

The proposal's main goal is to bring a submitted patent closer to commercialization by testing two novel antimicrobials (AM) on chicken. Previous research has established that both AM reduce live counts of spoilage and pathogenic bacteria when the AM are mixed with ground beef. The proposed research uses the AM as processing aid instead of treatment. The project will inoculate chicken breasts with specific levels of Salmonella or Campylobacter in PBS suspension. Contaminated meat will consecutively be treated with one of the AM by dipping into a water bath containing a 1% solution of the AM. The meat will be stored at 7 degrees C for a maximum of 3 days. Live counts of Salmonella and Campylobacter will be determined on selective agar plates. In addition, the project will determine live counts of several spoilage bacteria that are commonly associated with chicken. The research will broaden the range of applications that our AM are effective in.

#### SCALING UP SOY-BASED MONOMERS SYNTHESIS FOR COMMERCIAL ACCEPTANCE

NDSU Department of Coatings and Polymeric Materials Andriv Voronov, Fargo

This project is based on the already obtained and published experimental results that demonstrated strong commercial promise of technology entitled Biobased Acrylic Monomers developed and patented at the Coatings and Polymeric Materials Department of North Dakota State University (NDSU). The goal of this project is to scale up synthesis of soybean oil-based acrylic monomer (SBM) to enable larger products volume and extensive further testing of latexes from SBM at industrial partner facilities. The projects main objective is to demonstrate feasibility of SBM synthetic process to produce monomers in larger volume (10 - 100 gallons). Before scaling up, synthetic reaction parameters and process characteristics need to be optimized in terms of monomer quality and reaction control with a main target of introducing these new materials to the market. The long term goal of this study is to replace petroleum-based monomers in polymer latexes with monomers based on soybean oil, at a price point that is comparable, and with the same equipment and processes, and with identical or better performance of the end product.

#### EXAMINATION OF 10 PHOTOPERIOD AND 2 AUTOFLOWER HEMP CBD CULTIVARS

Dakota College at Bottineau Keith Knudson, Bottineau

Grant Amount:	\$37,553
Total Budget:	\$46,941

The grant funds will be used to set up an applied research project to identify and develop varieties

of industrial CBD hemp cultivars that will perform well under North Dakota climate including controlled environmental conditions. The grant fund will be utilized to purchase industrial hemp cultivars, set up experimental plots, providing internships to students for conducting applied research, materials and supplies for conducting experimental trials and extraction of CBD, and hosting field days and workshop for producers to demonstrate good agricultural practices and hemp production in outdoor field as well as an environmentally controlled agricultural environment.

#### A NEW HIGH VALUE MARKET FOR PLANT-BASED PRODUCTS FOR HEALTH AND ANTICANCER THERAPY NDSU

Kalpana Katti, Fargo

Grant Amount:	\$55,540
Total Budget:	\$80,553

The goal of the proposed research is to develop health target high value crops for North Dakota by evaluating the nutritional and anticancer properties of compounds from the extracts of oregano and related high phenolic crop, targeting effectiveness in treating prostate and breast cancer at the bone sites, which are considered terminal stage for these cancers. The research will combine the expertise of the Katti and Shetty groups to study the efficacy of the extracts from oregano and related high phenolic crops using the bone mimetic cancer testbeds with four cancer cell lines, highly metastatic and low metastatic prostate and breast cancer. Parallel studies will also be conducted to evaluate the effect of the natural extracts on healthy bone cells and bone regeneration. The ultimate goal of this research is to identify new uses and add value for oregano and related high phenolic crop grown in North Dakota, create health targeted high value markets for the products through discovery

and dissemination of the research to business, scientific communities and the public, build partnerships with local farmers, initiate patents and advance spin-off companies for job creation. The proposed research has a strong potential to increase employment in North Dakota, improve the health targeted markets through added value, develop new manufacturing capability in the agriculture sector in the state at the nexus of food, nutrition and medicine.

#### **BIO-BASED INNOVATIONS FOR** COMMERCIALIZATION FROM CHICKPEAS

NDSU Department of Plant Sciences Kalidas Shetty, Fargo

Grant Amount:	\$44,902
Total Budget:	\$56,128

To advance bio-based innovation for commercialization of high value ingredients from ND chickpeas to support pulse growers, local food and nutrition industry and to provide NCD-linked health benefits to consumers of ND. To achieve this broad objective, initially we will screen North Dakota grown desi and Kabuli chickpea cultivars with high protein and high human health relevant bioactive content and will further target them as high value nutraceuticals and health ingredients by better defining their NCD-linked health benefits. Additionally. we will advance bio-based innovations such as pre-harvest foliar elicitation strategy with natural bioprocessed elicitors and post-harvest processing strategy to enhance such NCD-linked health benefits in targeted novel health targeted ingredients which will be derived from high value North Dakota chickpea. Furthermore, we will also advance commercialization efforts for high value chickpea-based ingredients by using NDSU driven new spin-off, research kitchen initiative and a potential collaboration with local food, nutrition, and health industries such as Sanford Profile. This proposed APUC grant initiative will

help to develop new heath targeted functional ingredients from North Dakota chickpea and other legumes and will provide clear path for potential commercialization efforts for such high value agricultural products. Overall, development of such high value ingredients and advancement of its commercialization will contribute to the growth and long term stability of North Dakota economy.

#### OPTIMIZING INTERCROPPING PRACTICES FOR THE PRODUCTION, PRESERVATION, AND UTILIZATION OF SILAGE FEED

NDSU Carrington Research Extension Center Bryan Neville, Carrington

Grant Amount:	\$48,332
Total Budget:	\$60,415

The Carrington Research Extension Center researched three project objectives. 1) Maximize forage productivity of intercropped corn/legumes for the production of silage as livestock feed. 2) Determine the impacts of silage inoculant use on pH, nutrient content, and fermentation characteristics of intercropped corn/legume silages. 3) Compare feeding value of intercropped corn/legume silages to corn silage for backgrounding rations for beef heifers. In 2019, the corn production was much better previous research. It was believed that this would lead to better intercropping performance. However, field pea inclusion had a large negative impact on corn biomass production. The corn plants were shorter for much of the year which had cascade effects. First, the stunted corn did not yield well, but it also created more lanes for sunlight which created a more robust field pea crop. This was further compounded by heavy lodging and most field peas were not harvestable with silage chopping equipment. It is estimated that only 25% of the field pea biomass was harvested. It is possible that the unharvested field pea residue may have offset the loss in

forage production corn. Soybean production had minimal impacts on corn yield, however the corn was too robust in the mix. This resulted in a poor environment for soybeans to contribute much seed production. The best advantage with soybeans was a 5% increase in tons/acre fresh weight at the 145,200 soybean seeding rate compared to corn alone.

#### THE EFFECTS OF FEEDING HEMPSEED CAKE ON RUMINAL FERMENTATION AND SITE DIGESTION IN CATTLE NDSU

This project is designed to determine the feeding value of hemseed cake in finishing cattle diets. Specifically, in situ and in vitro ruminal digestibility experiments will be used to examine the ruminal protein degradability of hempseed meal as compared to other common protein sources used for cattle finishing diets using in situ and in vitro digestion approaches, 2) influence of hempseed meal supplementation on ruminal fermentation, nitrogen balance, and site of digestion in cattle, and 3) preliminary economic analysis and value discovery of hempseed cake as a protein supplement for cattle fed finishing diet.

#### VALORIZATION OF BREWERS' SPENT GRAIN USING SIMULTANEOUS CO-FERMENTATION TO ENHANCE NUTRITIONAL VALUE

NDSU Department of Plant Sciences Paul Schwarz, Fargo

Total Budget:	\$43,862.50

The microbial fermentation of brewers ' spent grains is an environmentally friendly and

economical operating process. which benefits the sustainability of barley growing in ND. The utilization of brewers' spent grains as livestock feed is limited (with an addition of less than 5% in the total feed) because of the non-digestivefibers and proteins. The current project is designed to use the microbial fermentation to break down the crude fiber and protein of BSG into sugars, peptides, amino acids, fatty acids, and prebiotics conducive to the digestion of livestocks . The operating process is to be conducted under the air condition, which prepares for a largescale implementation in practice. The solid state fermentation does not produce waste water. The process is relatively costless because of the convenient operation, inexpensive microbial strains. and no waste production. In addition, the process saves energy costs because the moisture content of BSG is expected to dramatically decrease with the heat produced during the microbial fermentation. The nutritional value of fermented BSG would be significantly increased, compared to the untreated BSG. The shelf life of fermented BSG would be longer due to the inhibition of spoilage microbes by beneficial fungus and bacteria applied in the fermentation process. The improvement of nutrients of fermented BSG would potentially enlarge the utilization of BSG as feed, which would reimburse the malting barley growers and promote the sustainability of barley growing.

#### EVALUATION OF SMALL-SCALE VEGETABLE PLANTING TECHNOLOGIES AND TECHNIQUES

NDSU Department of Plant Sciences Chiwon Lee, Fargo

Grant Amount:	\$17,517
Total Budget:	\$21,896.25

With the increase of small-scale vegetable production in North Dakota, new and veteran producers continually face the daunting task of optimizing resources, labor and time. Planting and seed starting are the most crucial and timeconsuming aspects of vegetable production. The utilization of commercial seeders provides the opportunity for decreased time and money expenditure, while improving accuracy and adaptability in direct sowing of small seeded high value crops. Utilization of a stale seedbed technique provides the benefit of non-chemical weed suppression, while also reducing need for tillage. Multiple commercial seeders developed for small scale farm operations will be evaluated for time-saving capacity and precision while planting high value small-seeded vegetable crops. A stale seed bed technique and conventional tillage will be used to evaluate weed suppression. Hand and vacuum seeders for indoor seed starting and greenhouse operations will be evaluated for cost and time effectiveness. Vegetable seed used in this project will be diverse and of economic importance to North Dakota producers. This project will address problems faced by short season North Dakota vegetable producers, while showcasing new tillage strategies to improve upon cultural practices. Through evaluation of new technologies, this project will identify where labor costs can be streamlined, enabling producers to invest more time and money into other aspects of their operation. Furthermore, findings will be communicated to stakeholders through grower meetings, field days and extension demonstrations.

#### EARLY IDENTIFICATION OF SOYBEAN CYST NEMATODE DISEASE

University of North Dakota Prakash Ranganathan, Grand Forks

Grant Amount:	\$62,800
Total Budget:	\$78,500

Soybean Cyst Nematode (SCN) dlsease is a leading use of yield loss in North America

soybean farms. It is often difficult to identify the exact symptoms of-SCN. Common below ground symptoms (BGS) Incluge root stunting, discoloration, and fewer nodules in the root. The above ground symptoms (AGS), include less biomass, stunting and early yellowing or browning of leaves. While we understand that SCN Infected soybeans can lose up to 25-30% of their yield before beginning to turn yellow and a number of other diseases also cause yellowing of leaves, the purpose of this study has two fold goals:

Goal 1: To find out whether there are early, subtle signs that SCN infection has occurred before visibly detectable early yellowing by relating large suites of multiple types of remote sensor data to soybean growth conditions. Goal 2: To find out whether there exists a relationship for early yellowing to SCN disease and mapping exact environmental conditions such as soil moisture and canopy assessment across all seasons. Currently, there is very limited research that integrates both aerial and ground data measurements to map the geo location of this SCN disease that captures variation in plant health, early yellowing and soil health across all seasons, as there is a lack of high fidelity big data in this area. The anticipated outcome of the project will result in a software and remote sensing hardware package that can be used to accurately detect the GPS locations of SCN infested areas in two ND soybean farms.

#### **GWAS AND TRANSCRIPTOME ANALYSIS**

Minn-Dak Growers Ltd. Mala Ganiger, Grand Forks

Grant Amount:	\$100,000
Total Budget:	\$125,000

The possible outcome of accelerated aging treatments will be to identify the environmental conditions stimulating the darkening of seed coat colbr in a reasonable time frame. This information is essential for the phenotypic evaluation of seed coat color browning in buckwheat breeding program and for commercial seed coat color evaluations at MDGL. Indirectly, the optimum storage conditions necessary for retaining the green seed coat color will be revealed. The GWAS study of common buckwheat accessions which will be the first report in relation to the seed coat color of common buckwheat should allow us to identify the gene/s controllir)g the seed coat color trait in buckwheat. Finally, the mechanism of gene expression at the molecular level with RNA-seg information will provide the comprehensive information of the genes involved in seed coat color development through differential gene expression study. This will help to develop the buckwheat varieties with darker green seed coat color resulting in the increase in acreage for production to meet the customer demand and having higher sales price for. This will create more job opportunities for both buckwheat farmers and buckwheat mill workers improving the overall economy of North Dakota. Moreover, this project will enforce the building and expanding the R&D department of MDGL further creating more job opportunities in buckwheat research field proving it to be more potential for economic growth in different areas such as buckwheat research.

#### **INVIGOILS, LLC**

Invigoils will source regional identity preserved oilseed commodities for cold press processing for a commercial market of both human and animal consumption. Oilseeds under consideration are mainly safflower, sunflower, canola, flax and hemp. Additional oilseeds may be crushed for additional markets as the demand may warrant. Toll processing may be used when we have extra capacity.

Progress on Cows & Co. Creamery

The project must have the potential to create additional income for the farm unit.

#### **COWS AND CO CREAMERY**

Cows and Co. Creamery Maartje Murphy, Carrington

Grant Amount:	\$148,000
Total Budget:	\$670,000

Cows and Co. Creamery is a micro-creamery located near Carrington, ND. They produce artisan dairy products using milk from their family farm. Currently they are producing Gelato and are looking to develop lines of artisan cheeses with authentic "old-world" production. The vision for the creamery is to have an on-farm location that would serve as a creamery and an agridestination.

#### 701 MEATS, LLC

701 Meats, LLC Roy Krivoruchka, Belfield

Grant Amount:	\$97,650
Total Budget:	\$128,650

The project established a meat processing facility in southwest North Dakota. The facility will start out as a custom exempt facility with plans to expand into a state inspected facility. APUC provided funding for the refrigeration system for the meat processing facility. The facility processes North Dakota meat products such as steaks, roasts, burger, sausages, bacon, hams and more. This facility provides local producers with a place to process their animals as well as providing consumers with a place to obtain locally raised meat products.

#### LAKESIDE MEATS BUSINESS OPENING PLAN

4 Family Farms Alliance, LLC John Jacobson, Hatton

Grant Amount:	\$75,000
Total Budget:	\$93,750

An existing meat processing facility has been acquired by 4 Family Farms Alliance, LLC, and the business name will be "Lakeside Meats." Lakeside Meats intends to provide: a) fee-based meat processing services to livestock producers (custom-exempt); b) retail and wholesale sales of unprocessed product(s) (state inspected); and c) manufacturing/processing of meat products for retail and wholesale sales.

One factor that differentiates Lakeside Meats from its competitors involves the fact that all four owner families are personally in the livestock business, employ best management practices on their respective farms and ranches, provide care for their animals at a level that is unmatched, and remain committed to raising an exceptional product that is safe, affordable, fresh and delicious. Lakeside Meats is located at 307 College Dr S in Devils Lake, ND, in the heart of the business community of Devils Lake.

#### **QUANDT BARN**

Quandt Farm Justin & Stephanie Quandt, Oakes

Grant Amount:	\$20,500
Total Budget:	\$25,625

This project includes provisions for a 4,800 head finisher swine farm. The facility willconsist of one (1) 338.0'x 122.2' finisher barn. The finisher barn will house a total of 4,800 finisher pigs. The barn will be on slatted concrete floors over an 8'deep pit, which will fully contain the manure and waste water to ensure the protection of ground water and other vital natural resources. All buildings are totally roofed and all extraneous drainage will be drained away from the building and diverted around the site into engineer-designed containment. The hogs will arrive weighing approximately 30 lbs and will be fed using grain from our family farms as well as from other entities. The manure that is collected from the facility will be used to enrich the soil of our fields and those of our neighbors while cutting back on our dependency on chemical fertilizer. This finisher barn will help sustain our family farming operations for future generations. We have been working closely with our engineer to assure adherence to the environmental laws of our state, the health of our animals, and to being good and ethical neighbors.

#### FOOD FIRST MARKETING OF PROBIOTEIN BARS

Food First LLC Rob Thornberg, Walhalla

Now that our prebiotic fiber product -- ProBiotein -- and MicroBiome Bars, for good gut health, are available to large regional retailers from a national distributor, we want to be sure the customers of these retailers are aware our products are in their stores. Food First LLC of Walhalla, ND, has initial sales and commitments from 740 stores (340 Sprouts Farmers Markets and 400 Associated Food Stores). These two retail chains have established customer contact via social media and they also conduct in-store sampling for new products. The focus will be on reaching those customers with social-mediabased advertising, in-store demonstrations and signage. Building brand awareness is the effort and securing the all-important reorders is the goal.

Houweling's Dakota is conducting a feasability study and performing market research on the potential to develop a greenhouse industry in North Dakota. The goal is to understand the local, state, and national demands of the tomato market and create a strategic plan to implement the findings. This project could allow options for more locally grown produce while continuing to develop North Dakota's agriculture industry in a socially responsible and environmentally sustainable way.

#### TUTTLE FRESH ARTISAN PASTA WITH LOCAL GROWN VEGETABLES AND SAUCES

Tuttle Community Development Corporation Eli Hartje, Tuttle

This project aims to develop fresh pasta and/ or wet products using North Dakota semolina, vegetables, eggs, and dairy products from area farmers.

CoJACK is a start up packaging and snack food company offering puffed edible beans, roasted soy nuts, and pumpkin seeds. The project aims to place CoJack snack in front of the biggest buyers for retail stores across the nation. The grant will make it possible to promote identity preserved natural products to a large buying group. The project will not only be promoting the CoJACK brand but also be a large test market for several new products just being researched. The project will assist CoJack's marketing team build relationships with industry people that will help them grow and contribute to its success for many years to come.

### DEEP WINTER GREENHOUSE EDUCATION AND FERTILIZER DEMO SITE

Black Bison Organics, LLC Derek Lowstuter, Bismarck

Grant Amount:	\$49,000
Total Budget:	\$93,000

This project will construct an education and demonstration facility to: (1) showcase the use and effectiveness of Black Bison Organics fertilizers year-round; (2) demonstrate the use of a deep winter greenhouse to allow winter crop production without expensive supplemental heating; and (3) create a regional agroforestry and permaculture training hub. The project will be composed of a "net-zero" greenhouse that allows year-round crop production. The greenhouse will be attached to an annex building to host educational events, for fertilizer storage, and to house the greenhouse utilities. Both buildings will be constructed using the innovative Nordic Steel building system, based out of Mandan, ND; thereby demonstrating the use and effectiveness of two local products. Black Bison Organics fertilizer's main ingredients are NDsourced flax seed meal and leonardite - instead of relying on inferior, out-of-state ingredients. By greatly extending, or even eliminating, the growing season in North Dakota, the proposed project will allow the business to showcase crop quality and yields impossible or uneconomical to achieve without an energy-intensive traditional greenhouse.

Blue Flint Ethanol is a low carbon renewable fuel producer that is reliant on Great River Energy's Coal Creek Station for steam to run the biorefinery. Carbon intensity of the ethanol produced is a critical consideration for long term viability of an ethanol plant. Therefore, we are evaluating a boiler and handling system that would use biomass in the form of wheat straw and/or corn stover as an alternative to natural gas based system. This project will gather feasibility level engineering surrounding the biomass option and allow Blue Flint to select a technology. A second phase of the project will complete detailed engineering and design on the selected technology.

In 2019, 30,000 catalogs were printed and mailed out 5,500 of them to current/ potential customers throughout the midwest, Florida, Texas, Arizona, and California (former residents). This year by increasing this as well as more advertising in the area will lead to additional sales for these Pride of Dakota companies from Flasher to Burlington to Devils Lake to Esmond to Valley City etc.

In addition to additional catalogs and mailing, an aggressive marketing campaign online with radio presence will help increase sales.

Since opening the store full time on May 15, 2019, Minn Dak Market has seen steady growth. Holiday sales continue to grow. In 2019, a pop up store was used in the Dakota Square Mall for the holidays from October through January. We are researching opportunities currently in Kirkwood Mall in Bismarck as well as the Dakota Square Mall in Minot to continue to grow the brand of providing local residents access to locally made products.



Prototype Grants are restricted to inventions improving the operations of food processing equipment and agricultural equipment. Technology Grants are to encourage innovation and APUC maintains a broad view of technology, such as hardware, software, devices or processes. Biotechnology will be considered as long as those advances improve agricultural product utilization such as food, feeds, fuels and fiber.

#### LEAF AND BUD STRIPPER (STRIP IT GOOD)

Total Ag Industries Inc. Pat Muller, Hillsboro

This project seeks to develop a prototype of a new harvesting equipment for high-CBD hemp, the leaves of which are pressed for CBD oil. Grant funds will be used for the engineering, research and development and manufacturing of the prototype for the leaf and bud stripper. Although the CBD oil industry continues to grow, the current harvesting technique is a multi-step, labor intensive process that requires a great deal of both time and warehouse space. This prototype merges those seperate steps into one as farmers prepare hemp leaves for CBD oil production. Merging these steps provides numerous benefits to these hemp farmers including: 1) the need for a single, lower-priced harvesting machine 2) increased harvesting efficiency of at least 25% 3) elimination of the need for warehouse space 4) faster drying because you are only drying the leaves, not the entire plant 5) a purer superior product because the stems and other impurities are left in the field. Although the prototype will be built to harvest one row, the machine will be built so that additional row units can easily be added.

#### IMPROVEMENT PROJECT FOR EFFICIENCY AND PRODUCTION INCREASE

Hankinson Renewable Energy LLC Dodi Matti, Hankinson

Hankinson Renewable Energy (HRE) is planning an improvement project to its current plant located in Hankinson, ND. This improvement will involve the installation of stack heat recovery equipment that will improve plant efficiencies and increase ethanol production by an estimated 10 MMGY. The \$3.2 million project would allow HRE to improve operations; reduce natural gas and make-up water usage per gallon of ethanol; and resolve current production limitations, allowing the plant to operate at greater capacity and increase ethanol production by 10 MMGY.

#### NUTRITIONAL ASSESSMENT OF HEMP BYPRODUCTS FOR INCLUSION IN ANIMAL FEED

Healthy Oilseeds, LLC Roger Gussiass, Carrington Grant Amount: \$62,890.50 Total Budget: \$88,727.20

The grant funds will be used to complete the necessary research and analytical science needed to define the nutritional content, phytoremediatory properties, and anti-nutritive composition of hemp seed byproducts. This analysis is the first step in satisfying American Feed Control Officials (AAFCO) and FDA-CVM (Center for Veterinary Medicine) Nutritional reporting and safety evaluations for any new ingredient including hemp and its byproducts. The FDA-CVM requires that each ingredient (byproduct) be rigorously tested to determine its nutritional composition and to identify pesticides, heavy metals, vitamins, mineral, or anti-nutritives that may prevent its use as animal feed and which must be considered by the feed formulator for the target animal, its production category and the intended use. To prove the consistency of the ingredients composition; we must use American grown and processed hemp byproducts and provide 5-7 Certificates of Analysis, from a certified lab, using approved methods and equipment, for each ingredient. Maintaining the consistency of labs conducting the analysis

for each of the samples creates legitimacy of the results and allows for more confidence in the statistical analysis and interpretation of the nutritional composition. All six ingredients (oil, meal/cake, hulls, screenings, filtrate, and pulp) will have five samples submitted to Eurofins food.

#### WATER SERVICE TO BLUE FLINT ETHANOL

McLean-Sheridan County Rural Water District Ann Oberg, Turtle Lake

Grant Amount:	\$54,240
Total Budget:	\$71,190

The Blue Flint Ethanol Plant (BFEP) northwest of Washburn receives water supply and wastewater disposal services through from the Coal Creek Power Plant (CCPP) through a cooperative agreement with Great River Energy (GRE). As GRE looks to potentially close the CCPP, BFEP is exploring economical options to replace its current process water supply and wastewater disposal methods. The proposed project would replace the water supply and wastewater disposal services from CCPP with services from the City of Washburn through the McLean Sheridan Rural Water District (MSRWD). The BFEP would need up to 750,000 gallons a day (gpd) in water for the production of ethanol. The process would also produce up to 75,000 gpd of wastewater proposed to be disposed of through the Washburn wastewater lagoons.

ND inspectors also inspect milk tankers, dairy distributions sites, and evaluate milk sampling procedures.

#### NDIT Successes

- Helpdesk staff provide excellent service, and are usually very good at patiently walking staff though the process, even when it isn't their first time, or passing it on to a subject matter expert in another area.
- Desktop support staff are responsive to issues, normally tickets are picked up within 24 hours and resolved as soon as possible, there are equally as many times that a NDIT tech waited for our staff, as we have waited for theirs.
- Server and project staff provide valuable insight and are experts in their fields, between projects previous biennium's and those undertaken by the department in the last year, NDIT has been an Essential partner in completing those.
- Generally NDIT selected hardware has been both reliable and effective for office staff, including the focus on the larger keyboards and monitors, and the availability of smaller lighter devices for staff that travel a lot.
- Cyber Security and Email teams do a great job of communicating when projects require work with them, new
  projects have required extensive work with these areas, and NDIT staff have provided valuable insight and good
  customer service.

#### NDIT Challenges

- NDIT often has issues logistically implementing their plans, sufficient thought is often not provided to how to wrap up previous software or services, or how to deal with no longer used hardware.
- NDIT has failed to effectively communicate even at the Agency Coordinator level what is in the pipe as potential, NDDA's IT Liaison, has learned about a number of implementations or their timelines in the last 12 months when service desk messages went out to all staff.
- ITCC is supposed to be an opportunity for other agencies to steer NDIT's action, I have inquired on this group
  regularly, the current website on NDIT's pages was last updated in October of 2019, with no information on a
  contact to attend the meetings, and no information on that groups meeting date or time.
- NDIT's billing and process can be confusing, fiscal staff at NDIT has been helpful in clarifying, but billing code
  names and other things are modified as new services are added, and this isn't always explained or
  communicated to agency staff tasked with ensuring the billing is accurate.
- NDIT's funding structure forces them to in essence subsidize some services with the profit from other services, this drives up the prices to agencies for some services, and limits NDIT's ability to work along with other agencies as a good partner and help the State of North Dakota move forward.
- NDIT makes high level decisions operating on the assumption that all agency staff are as familiar and comfortable with technology and new items as the staff of computer science grads that make up nearly all of NDIT's staff. NDDA hires scientists, marketing staff, and others who have a specific needed skill set, not all of those come with computer skills.

#### SECTION 14. TRANSFER – BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - AGRICULTURE PRODUCTS UTILIZATION

**COMMISSION.** The Bank of North Dakota shall transfer the sum of \$3,000,000 or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the Bank's current earnings and undivided profits to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agricultural products utilization commission fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. #### ND Information Technology Concerns

- NDIT would better serve state agencies by reaching out and opening dialogue to discuss agency IT concerns, and before they make major changes to IT systems.
  - NDIT used to send over an upper management staff member to meet with us and address concerns.
    - NOTE: Previous NDIT employee Dan Sipes did this often with our agency.
    - Sipes' approach was to come to our agency physically, listen to our concerns, and explain NDIT's approach.
    - Sipes would also follow-up and identify a path forward to meet our agency needs.
  - Example: NDIT rolled out replacement of desk phones with TEAMS voice.
    - This was a major change to the way our staff communicated with customers.
    - Nobody from NDIT approached the Agriculture Commissioner to discuss why the change was occurring and gather feedback before the decision was final.
  - <u>Service Level Agreements</u>: State agencies no longer have the true ability to be a partner with NDIT in developing and implementing our agreement with NDIT for services.
    - We used to draft an agreement that clearly outlined the services we needed from NDIT.
    - Now, we are managed by a service level agreement that we had little to no input in the creation or changes to the agreement.
      - Example: The Department of Agriculture is a NDIT desktop support agency. We no longer can discuss our expectations as an agency for how NDIT will provide these services.

#### ND Information Technology Concerns

- NDIT would better serve state agencies by reaching out and opening dialogue to discuss agency IT concerns, and before they make major changes to IT systems.
  - NDIT used to send over an upper management staff member to meet with us and address concerns.
    - NOTE: Previous NDIT employee Dan Sipes did this often with our agency.
    - Sipes' approach was to come to our agency physically, listen to our concerns, and explain NDIT's approach.
    - Sipes would also follow-up and identify a path forward to meet our agency needs.
  - Example: NDIT rolled out replacement of desk phones with TEAMS voice.
    - This was a major change to the way our staff communicated with customers.
    - Nobody from NDIT approached the Agriculture Commissioner to discuss why the change was occurring and gather feedback before the decision was final.
  - <u>Service Level Agreements</u>: State agencies no longer have the true ability to be a partner with NDIT in developing and implementing our agreement with NDIT for services.
    - We used to draft an agreement that clearly outlined the services we needed from NDIT.
    - Now, we are managed by a service level agreement that we had little to no input in the creation or changes to the agreement.
      - Example: The Department of Agriculture is a NDIT desktop support agency. We no longer can discuss our expectations as an agency for how NDIT will provide these services.

APPROPRIATION - TRANSFER - GENERAL FUND TO FEDERAL ENVIRONMENTAL LAW IMPACT REVIEW FUND - ONE-TIME FUNDING.** There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$5,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, which the office of management and budget shall transfer to the federal environmental law impact review fund for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The agriculture commissioner shall use these funds for defraying costs associated with federal environmental legislation or regulations which detrimentally impact or potentially impact the state's agricultural, energy, or oil production sectors. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS UTILIZATION COMMISSION -ONE-TIME FUNDING. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$2,700,000 which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer from the Bank's current earnings and undivided profits to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agricultural products utilization commission fund for defraying the expenses of the agricultural products utilization commission for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - OUTDOOR HERITAGE FUND - SOIL HEALTH COVER CROP GRANT PROGRAM - ONE-TIME FUNDING. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$500,000, of which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer \$300,000 from the Bank's current earnings and undivided profits and the industrial commission shall transfer \$200,000 from the outdoor heritage fund to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agriculture commissioner's operating fund for defraying the expenses of the soil health cover crop grant program for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The agriculture commissioner shall establish guidelines for the use of grant funding provided for this program. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

**SECTION 7. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - STATE WATER COMMISSION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$125,000 which the state water commission shall transfer to the agriculture commissioner for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the wildlife services program.

#### SECTION 8. TRANSFER - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION FUND - MINOR USE PESTICIDE FUND. The agriculture commissioner shall transfer \$325,000 from the environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use pesticide fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 9. ESTIMATED INCOME - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION** FUND. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,900,301 from the environment and rangeland protection fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various agriculture commissioner programs.

**SECTION 10. ESTIMATED INCOME - GAME AND FISH FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$619,329 from the game and fish department operating fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various agriculture commissioner programs.

**SECTION 11. TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT.** The North Dakota trade office line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include \$1,600,000 of funding related to the North Dakota trade office. The agriculture commissioner may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent the North Dakota trade office provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the agriculture commissioner. Matching funds may include money spent by businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants, providing training to export assistants, or to purchase computer equipment as part of the North Dakota trade office's export assistant program.

**SECTION 12. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-01-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 4.1-01-02. Salary of agriculture commissioner.

The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred sixteentwenty-one thousand eightfive hundred thirty-sixfifty-three dollars through June 30, 20202022, and one hundred nineteentwenty-three thousand seventhree hundred fifty-sevenseventy-six dollars after that date.

**SECTION 13. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-01-17 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

# 4.1-01-17. Pipeline restoration and reclamation oversight <del>pilot</del> program - Generally.

- 1. The commissioner shall establish a <del>pilot</del> program providing technical assistance and support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline restoration and followup support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline reclamation.
- 2. The commissioner may contract for ombudsmen to be a resource for technical assistance and followup on pipeline issues. The ombudsmen may not investigate or assist with any pipeline installed before January 1, 2006, or regulated by the public service commission under title 49, and may not assist in easement negotiations.

- 3. The <del>pilot</del> program may provide technical education, support, and outreach on pipeline-related matters in coordination with other entities.
- 4. The commissioner may contract with local individuals, deemed trustworthy by the surface owners and surface tenants, to be ombudsmen. The commissioner is not subject to the provisions of chapter 54-44.4 when contracting for the services of ombudsmen.
- 5. The names of surface owners and surface tenants who receive assistance under the program are closed records as defined in section 44-04-17.1.

#### **SECTION 14. ESTIMATED INCOME - PIPELINE RESTORATION AND**

**RECLAMATION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$200,000 from the abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the pipeline restoration and reclamation program.

**SECTION 15. AMENDMENT.** Section 7 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

SECTION 7. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS. The

salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes <u>up to</u> \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program.

**SECTION 16. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS.** The salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes up to \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program."

APPROPRIATION - TRANSFER - GENERAL FUND TO FEDERAL ENVIRONMENTAL LAW IMPACT REVIEW FUND - ONE-TIME FUNDING.** There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$5,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, which the office of management and budget shall transfer to the federal environmental law impact review fund for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The agriculture commissioner shall use these funds for defraying costs associated with federal environmental legislation or regulations which detrimentally impact or potentially impact the state's agricultural, energy, or oil production sectors. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS UTILIZATION COMMISSION -ONE-TIME FUNDING. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$2,700,000 which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer from the Bank's current earnings and undivided profits to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agricultural products utilization commission fund for defraying the expenses of the agricultural products utilization commission for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - OUTDOOR HERITAGE FUND - SOIL HEALTH COVER CROP GRANT PROGRAM - ONE-TIME FUNDING. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$500,000, of which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer \$300,000 from the Bank's current earnings and undivided profits and the industrial commission shall transfer \$200,000 from the outdoor heritage fund to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agriculture commissioner's operating fund for defraying the expenses of the soil health cover crop grant program for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The agriculture commissioner shall establish guidelines for the use of grant funding provided for this program. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

**SECTION 7. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - STATE WATER COMMISSION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$125,000 which the state water commission shall transfer to the agriculture commissioner for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the wildlife services program.

#### SECTION 8. TRANSFER - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION FUND - MINOR USE PESTICIDE FUND. The agriculture commissioner shall transfer \$325,000 from the environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use pesticide fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 9. ESTIMATED INCOME - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION** FUND. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,900,301 from the environment and rangeland protection fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various agriculture commissioner programs.

**SECTION 10. ESTIMATED INCOME - GAME AND FISH FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$619,329 from the game and fish department operating fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various agriculture commissioner programs.

**SECTION 11. TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT.** The North Dakota trade office line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include \$1,600,000 of funding related to the North Dakota trade office. The agriculture commissioner may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent the North Dakota trade office provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the agriculture commissioner. Matching funds may include money spent by businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants, providing training to export assistants, or to purchase computer equipment as part of the North Dakota trade office's export assistant program.

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The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred sixteentwenty-one thousand eightfive hundred thirty-sixfifty-three dollars through June 30, 20202022, and one hundred nineteentwenty-three thousand seventhree hundred fifty-sevenseventy-six dollars after that date.

**SECTION 13. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-01-17 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

# 4.1-01-17. Pipeline restoration and reclamation oversight <del>pilot</del> program - Generally.

- 1. The commissioner shall establish a <del>pilot</del> program providing technical assistance and support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline restoration and followup support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline reclamation.
- 2. The commissioner may contract for ombudsmen to be a resource for technical assistance and followup on pipeline issues. The ombudsmen may not investigate or assist with any pipeline installed before January 1, 2006, or regulated by the public service commission under title 49, and may not assist in easement negotiations.

- 3. The <del>pilot</del> program may provide technical education, support, and outreach on pipeline-related matters in coordination with other entities.
- 4. The commissioner may contract with local individuals, deemed trustworthy by the surface owners and surface tenants, to be ombudsmen. The commissioner is not subject to the provisions of chapter 54-44.4 when contracting for the services of ombudsmen.
- 5. The names of surface owners and surface tenants who receive assistance under the program are closed records as defined in section 44-04-17.1.

#### **SECTION 14. ESTIMATED INCOME - PIPELINE RESTORATION AND**

**RECLAMATION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$200,000 from the abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the pipeline restoration and reclamation program.

**SECTION 15. AMENDMENT.** Section 7 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

SECTION 7. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS. The

salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes <u>up to</u> \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program.

**SECTION 16. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS.** The salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes up to \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program."

There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$5,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, which the office of management and budget shall transfer to the federal environmental law impact review fund for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The agriculture commissioner shall use these funds for defraying costs associated with federal environmental legislation or regulations which detrimentally impact or potentially impact the state's agricultural, energy, or oil production sectors. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS UTILIZATION COMMISSION -ONE-TIME FUNDING. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$2,700,000 which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer from the Bank's current earnings and undivided profits to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agricultural products utilization commission fund for defraying the expenses of the agricultural products utilization commission for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - OUTDOOR HERITAGE FUND - SOIL HEALTH COVER CROP GRANT PROGRAM - ONE-TIME FUNDING. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$500,000, of which the Bank of North Dakota shall transfer \$300,000 from the Bank's current earnings and undivided profits and the industrial commission shall transfer \$200,000 from the outdoor heritage fund to the agriculture commissioner for deposit in the agriculture commissioner's operating fund for defraying the expenses of the soil health cover crop grant program for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The agriculture commissioner shall establish guidelines for the use of grant funding provided for this program. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

**SECTION 7. ESTIMATED INCOME - TRANSFER - STATE WATER COMMISSION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$125,000 which the state water commission shall transfer to the agriculture commissioner for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the wildlife services program. SECTION 8. TRANSFER - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION FUND - MINOR USE PESTICIDE FUND. The agriculture commissioner shall transfer \$325,000 from the environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use pesticide fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 9. ESTIMATED INCOME - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION** FUND. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,900,301 from the environment and rangeland protection fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various agriculture commissioner programs.

**SECTION 10. ESTIMATED INCOME - GAME AND FISH FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$619,329 from the game and fish department operating fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various agriculture commissioner programs.

**SECTION 11. TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT.** The North Dakota trade office line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include \$1,600,000 of funding related to the North Dakota trade office. The agriculture commissioner may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent the North Dakota trade office provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the agriculture commissioner. Matching funds may include money spent by businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants, providing training to export assistants, or to purchase computer equipment as part of the North Dakota trade office's export assistant program.

**SECTION 12. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-01-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 4.1-01-02. Salary of agriculture commissioner.

The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred sixteentwenty-one thousand eightfive hundred thirty-sixfifty-three dollars through June 30, 2020202, and one hundred nineteentwenty-three thousand seventhree hundred fifty-sevenseventy-six dollars after that date.

- 3. The pilot program may provide technical education, support, and outreach on pipeline-related matters in coordination with other entities.
- 4. The commissioner may contract with local individuals, deemed trustworthy by the surface owners and surface tenants, to be ombudsmen. The commissioner is not subject to the provisions of chapter 54-44.4 when contracting for the services of ombudsmen.
- 5. The names of surface owners and surface tenants who receive assistance under the program are closed records as defined in section 44-04-17.1.

**SECTION 14. ESTIMATED INCOME - PIPELINE RESTORATION AND RECLAMATION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$200,000 from the abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the pipeline restoration and reclamation program.

**SECTION 15. AMENDMENT.** Section 7 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

**SECTION 7. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS.** The salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes <u>up to</u> \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program.

**SECTION 16. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS.** The salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes up to \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program."

TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT.** The North Dakota trade office line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include \$1,600,000 of funding related to the North Dakota trade office. The agriculture commissioner may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent the North Dakota trade office provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the agriculture commissioner. Matching funds may include money spent by businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants, providing training to export assistants, or to purchase computer equipment as part of the North Dakota trade office's export assistant program.

**SECTION 12. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-01-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 4.1-01-02. Salary of agriculture commissioner.

The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred sixteentwenty-one thousand eightfive hundred thirty-sixfifty-three dollars through June 30, 20202022, and one hundred nineteentwenty-three thousand seventhree hundred fifty-sevenseventy-six dollars after that date.

**SECTION 13. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-01-17 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

# 4.1-01-17. Pipeline restoration and reclamation oversight <del>pilot</del> program - Generally.

- 1. The commissioner shall establish a <del>pilot</del> program providing technical assistance and support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline restoration and followup support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline reclamation.
- The commissioner may contract for ombudsmen to be a resource for technical assistance and followup on pipeline issues. - 5. The names of surface owners and surface tenants who receive assistance under the program are closed records as defined in section 44-04-17.1.

# SECTION 14. ESTIMATED INCOME - PIPELINE RESTORATION AND

**RECLAMATION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$200,000 from the abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the pipeline restoration and reclamation program.



**Bioscience innovation grant fund** - Section 4.1-01-20.1 - Includes funding appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis to award grants to North Dakota bioscience businesses to support biotechnology innovation and commercialization, promote the creation of bioscience jobs in the state, encourage the development of new bioscience technologies and bioscience startup companies in the state, leverage the agriculture industry in the state to support the development of bioscience technologies impacting livestock operations and crop production, promote bioscience research and development at institutions under the control of the State Board of Higher Education; and encourage coordination and collaboration among other entities and programs in the state to promote bioscience innovation goals.

**Federal environmental law impact review fund** - Section 4.1-01-21 - Includes funding appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis for certain administrative costs related to the Federal Environmental Law Impact Review Committee, which reviews federal environmental legislation and regulations detrimentally impacting or potentially detrimentally impacting the state's agricultural, energy, or oil production sectors.

**Environmental impact mitigation fund** - Section 4.1-01-21.1 - Includes funding appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis for distribution to landowners for the mitigation of agricultural land impacted by assessed adverse direct environmental impacts of a proposed site, corridor, route, or facility.

Honey promotion fund - Chapter 4.1-08 - Commodity checkoff for market development of honey.

Turkey fund - Chapter 4.1-12 - Commodity checkoff for market development of turkeys and turkey products.

**Industrial hemp** - Section 4.1-18-02 - Provides for the Agriculture Commissioner to assess a fee of \$150 plus \$25 per acre to each applicant requesting to grow or process industrial hemp. Fees collected for this purpose are deposited in the Agriculture Commissioner operating fund and appropriated to the Department of Agriculture on a continuing basis.

**Minor use pesticide fund** - Section 4.1-39-08 - For studies, investigations, and evaluations regarding registration and use of pesticides.

**Equine processing fund** - Section 36-21-19 - Provides for the Agriculture Commissioner to assess a fee of \$5 for equine processing facility assessments. The first \$50,000 of fees collected is deposited in the general fund and any additional amounts

are deposited in the equine processing fund. All funds in the equine processing fund are appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis.

**State waterbank fund** - Section 61-31-10 - Authorizes the Agriculture Commissioner to receive funds from any private or public source, including from state agencies for the state waterbank program. The state waterbank fund and interest earned are appropriated to the Agriculture Commissioner on a continuing basis.

#### Significant Audit Findings

The operational audit for the Department of Agriculture conducted by the State Auditor's office for the period ending June 30, 2019, concluded the Agriculture Commissioner exceeded general fund appropriation limits by \$25,529 related to the waterbank program during the 2017-19 biennium.

Section 8 of House Bill No. 1009 (2017) provided the salaries and wages line item in Section 1 of the bill included \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program. During the 2017-19 biennium, the Agriculture Commissioner spent \$40,942 of the \$50,000 for salaries and wages, of which \$15,413 was spent on the waterbank program and \$25,529 was spent on other department salaries. The remaining \$9,058 was canceled and retained in the general fund at the end of the 2017-19 biennium.

The State Auditor's report states the \$50,000 appropriated from the general fund to the Agriculture Commissioner was available only for matching funds for salaries related to the waterbank program. The report states \$34,587 should have been canceled and returned to the general fund at the end of the 2017-19 biennium instead of \$9,058 and that the Agriculture Commissioner overspent the authority provided by \$25,529.

#### **Major Related Legislation**

House Bill No. 1026 - This bill combines state warehouse and facility-based grain buyer licenses and creates a new grain processor and broker license.

House Bill No. 1045 - This bill allows the Agriculture Commissioner to charge a fee of up to \$125 to inspect, sample, and test hemp, which must be deposited in the Agriculture Commissioner's operating fund.

**House Bill No. 1094** - This bill removes the Agriculture Commissioner from the list of agencies required to obtain centralized desktop support services from the Information Technology Department.

**House Bill No. 1158** - This bill requires the Agriculture Commissioner to deposit 50 percent of funding paid to mitigate the adverse environmental impacts of a proposed site, corridor, route, or facility into the environmental impact mitigation fund and the remaining 50 percent in the federal environmental law impact review fund, rather than depositing 100 percent of available funding into the environmental impact mitigation fund.

**House Bill No. 1394 -** This bill provides a 2019-21 biennium appropriation of \$5.5 million to the Agriculture Commissioner from federal funds received as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, of which \$500,000 is for COVID-19 stress assistance program operating expenses and \$5 million is for COVID-19 specialty crop block grants. Section 2 of the bill provides an exemption for the Agriculture Commissioner to continue the funding into the 2021-23 biennium.

**House Bill No. 1395** - This bill provides a 2019-21 biennium appropriation of \$13,556,000 of federal funding to the Agriculture Commissioner, as approved by the Emergency Commission and Budget Section during the 2019-20 interim, from the state's allocation from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund for various programs in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

**House Bill No. 1475** - This bill creates an agriculture innovation fund, provides the Bank of North Dakota a continuing appropriation from the fund, and provides for a transfer from the general fund to the agriculture innovation fund. The Bank is required to develop policies for loans provided from this fund in consultation with the Agricultural Products Utilization Commission.

**Senate Bill No. 2282** - This bill adds the Agriculture Commissioner as a member of the Board of University and School Lands, contingent on voters approving Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4007.

**Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4007** - This resolution adds the Agriculture Commissioner as a member of the Board of University and School Lands.



ESTIMATED INCOME - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$7,046,124, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the environment and rangeland protection fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various department of agriculture programs, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30,2023.

**SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - GAME AND FISH FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$624,136, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the game and fish department operating fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various department of agriculture programs, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - STATE WATER COMMISSION - TRANSFER.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$125,000 which the state water commission shall transfer to the agriculture commissioner for the wildlife services program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.** Section 7 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

**SECTION 7. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS.** The salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes <u>up to</u> \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program.

**SECTION 8. ESTIMATED INCOME – PIPELINE RESTORATION AND RECLAMATION.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$200,000 from the abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the pipeline restoration and reclamation program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

**SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-21 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

**4-01-21. Salary of agriculture commissioner.** The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred sixteen thousand eight hundred thirty-six--dollars through June 30, 2020 one hundred twentytwo thousand one hundred fifty-two dollars through June 30, 2022, and one hundred nineteen thousand seven hundred fifty-seven one hundred twenty-four thousand five hundred ninety-five dollars thereafter.

**SECTION 10. TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT.** The operating line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include \$850,000 of funding relating to the North Dakota trade office. The agriculture commissioner may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent that the North Dakota trade office provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the department for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. 

# **Major Statutory Responsibilities**

The agriculture commissioner is statutorily responsible for enforcing laws and regulations pertaining to pesticides, fertilizers, anhydrous ammonia, livestock sales, dairy production, noxious weed control, plant export certification, and beekeeping. The commissioner is also responsible for the registration of pesticides, fertilizers, animal feeds, and veterinary medicines; the administration of fair and timely mediation services to agriculture producers, creditors, and energy related issues; the collection and elimination of unusable pesticides; the promotion and marketing of North Dakota products; and the administration of a state meat inspection program. The responsibilities have expanded to include a leadership role in the formation of policies effecting the state's agricultural industries; the advocacy of the needs and concerns of farmers and ranchers on state and national levels; and the distribution of information concerning agricultural issues to the governor, legislature, and the general public. The agriculture commissioner works collaboratively with the Board of Animal Health to protect the health of domestic animals and nontraditional livestock of the state.

# Kenneth Junkert, Director Administrative Services Division

- Assisted with transition of the server from legacy hardware for OLE (Plant Industries/Marketing) including a new build of the local foods map. This build will provide a number of consumer based features and allow producers to maintain their product info.
- Worked closely with DES, DEQ and DMR on Hazconnect to coordinate accurate and timely notification for items that impact areas in the agriculture industry and Department.
- Worked with NDIT to test AutoPilot deployment of laptops to office staff including both laptops and phones via Intune.

## **Plant Industries**

- Maintained inspections in nursery and export certification including a record 400 acres of seed field inspections for export and 1,000 acres of nursery stock.
- Issued a record 4,646 federal phytosanitary certificates for export.
- State of Origin certificates for cereal grains to Canada has increased 329 percent over the last two years.
- Collected and removed from commerce over 200 packages of seeds sent unsolicited to citizens from China.
- Investigated and removed from commerce potentially Ralstonia solanacearum race 3 biovar 2 infested geraniums from greenhouses.
- Conducted 11 plant pest surveys with very little interruptions from COVID-19.
- Conducted a record number of California pre-inspections and certified 77,804 apiary colonies.
- Submitted a State Hemp Plan and continued communication with USDA on the concerns with their hemp rules.

- Released a new leafy spurge beetle that is more suitable for areas that the other biocontrol agents don't establish in (Spurgia capitigena).
- Continue to work with and release Canada thistle rust fungus to determine its viability in the state.
- Continue monitoring for Palmer Amaranth and offering assistance for landowners who received noxious weed seeds in animal feed.
- Apiary colony registrations are up to 691,665 colonies with 300 beekeepers.
- Inspected 325 apiaries for health certification and an additional 271 for compliance with state law.
- Hemp grower licenses increased by 25 percent and processor licenses increased from 9 in 2019 to 20 in 2020.

### **Livestock Industries**

- Fielded many phone calls/emails from individuals wanting information on starting new slaughter/ processing establishments.
- Assisted many individuals starting new slaughter/processing establishments. Expect to have three new official state slaughter establishment within the next two months (Berthold, Carrington and Devils Lake), another new official slaughter establishment by the end of 2021 (Bowman); and, one new official processing plant within the next two months (Fargo). Also have been assisting K 2 new establishments planning to be official federal slaughter establishments (Mott and New Salem).
- Transitioning to electronic reporting to Federal State Audit Branch.
- Purchase of Bismarck Dairy plant Prairie Farms has been operating very successfully.
- Added several new egg dealers for a total of 27.

### Grain & Livestock Licensing

- Transfer of Grain inspection program from PSC.
  - Inspected all licensed state warehouses in first year of transfer.
    - Inspected all roving grain buyers.
- Completed two LP3 full containment systems with another two to be complete during the summer of 2021.
- Transferring livestock licensing to electronic licensing.
- Reviewed 4,029 commercial feed labels and 12,096 pet food labels.

### Animal Health

- The USAHERDS animal health and licensing database program was implemented in December 2020. The Program allowed the combination of around 12 different programs, databases, and spreadsheets, as well as providing the ability to automatically receive most electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) information in the case of an animal health emergency or a disease investigation.
- Each year around 8,000 incoming and 12,000 outgoing CVIs are reviewed by staff, representing the movement of over 160,000 animals into the state and over 1.2 million animals leaving the state.
- In 2019 and 2020, 454,500 official USDA ear tags were issued to accredited veterinarians, 394,000 metal NUES, and 60,500 electronic RFID tags.

- There are currently 62 nontraditional livestock facilities and 46 farmed elk facilities under the oversight of the AHD. Additionally, the AHD oversees 234 permits to possess, propagate, and domesticate protected wildlife on behalf of the ND Game and Fish Department.
- Annual training was provided to 175 modified live vaccine agents representing 75 licensed and inspected facilities.
- Over 1,400 products and 43 companies are currently registered under the livestock medicine program.
- Three continuing education seminars were held, providing up to 10.5 hours of continuing education for 81 veterinarians regarding animal disease traceability and Johne's disease, and for 22 veterinarians regarding regulatory cervid health programs.
- In 2020, 10 incidents of feral swine were investigated and responded to, in cooperation with USDA Wildlife Services.
- In the 2017-19 biennium, over 30 cattle herds were investigated and around 5,500 cattle were tested in the state as part of three separate TB investigations. One of those investigations led to the identification of a positive herd in the state which was successfully depopulated with the cooperation of the owner.
- There are 195 herds participating in the Johne's disease control program; of these, 19 herds tested for the first time in 2019-21.

### Pesticide & Fertilizer

- Achieved all goals, remained reachable, and responsive during the pandemic.
- Honored all federal commitments and still performed almost double the amount of inspections required in the federal cooperative agreement during the pandemic.
- Renewed all fertilizer licenses and registrations that expired June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2020.
- Completed all required anhydrous ammonia inspections as well as assisted in getting several new facilities up and running.
- Addressed pesticide certifications expiring on April 1, 2020, as well as certifying new commercial applicators during the initial pandemic shutdown. The Department was able to obtain a venue that we could socially distance people properly and were able to have staff present to proctor certification exams. We were also able to renew all the commercial certifications by the expiration date as well as certify all the new commercial applicators before spring work began.
- The Department also visited vulnerable population centers that like daycares, hospitals, nursing homes, and schools where disinfectants and other general use pesticides are being used to provide outreach on safe use and storage, and potential health dangers to exposure.
- The Department also was able to renew our grant and have federal funding through FY 23. Despite spending all our budgeted funds for project safe send last year, the Department was still able to find enough funding to operate the program this year.

### **Business, Marketing & Information**

- Updated Specialty Crop Block Grant marketing materials including brochures and our website.
  - USDA selected ND SCBGP project as a feature project Automatic sensor-controlled drip irrigation under mulches for tomato and watermelon productions.
- Issued \$3,500,000 of grants to 14 federal meat plants CARES Act.
- Hosted two in-person farmers market events at a new State Capitol location.
- Issued guidance for ND Farmers Markets to continue commerce for consumers and producers during the pandemic.
- Awarded \$65,000 to four orchard grant projects and \$65,000 to five high tunnel grant projects.
- Held all APUC board meetings in-person..
- Received Attorney General opinions for township zoning boards that align with Department review of their zoning ordinances.
- Awarded \$500,000 to seven projects in Bioscience Innovation Grant funds.
- Awarded \$80,000 to three projects in Grape & Wine Grants.
- North Dakota Mediation Service assisted with successful outcomes in two high-profile cases referred by Senator Cramer's Office.
- The Department is being recognized with an award for most increased participation in the Wellness Program.
- Implemented new POD Rules, effective July 1, 2020.
- Successfully held four in-person showcases, making many adjustments to follow COVID-19 guidance.
- Ag in the classroom was awarded a SCBG to provide educational resources on specialty crops to classrooms and made the transition to all digital Ag Mags to ensure that all students continue to have access to the resource regardless of classroom location.
- Drafted policy letters or comments on over 20 federal issues.
- Developed a chickpea video.
- Assisted with state Joint Information Center during beginning of COVID crisis.
- Assisted with ND Agriculture magazine planning.
- Developed the Agricultural Products Utilization Commission Annual Report.
- Member of Blue Book Committee and currently working on Blue Book chapter highlighting the apiary industry.
- Applied for a two-year grant/project with Agriculture in the Classroom for more specialty crop projects for students.
- Worked to organize the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture annual meeting in Medora and then worked to ensure a virtual event went off seamlessly.

#### **Priority 1 – Restore FTE and Funding: Administrative Assistance**

This requests one FTE and funding for a front desk and Pride of Dakota program administrative assistant. The front desk position is NDDA's first public contact, answering all phone calls and directing general public questions and requests to the proper department resources. The position also provides valuable assistance to Pride of Dakota. The program membership is more than 525 companies and continues to grow. The position provides support with managing the program member database, nine major showcase events each year and general assistance to the membership.

#### **Total request: \$163,079 (General Funds): Executive Recommendation:** FTE restored, no funding. <u>House included.</u>

#### Priority 2 – Restore Funding: Apiary Research Grants

This requests funding for the apiary research grant program. North Dakota is the number one honey producing state in the nation and each summer is the home to over 670,000 honey bee colonies. Honey bee populations have been under a lot of pressure over the past 10 years. Research is crucial to mitigating loses and is vital to trying to develop solutions to the problems the industry faces such as Varroa mites, poor nutrition, viruses, and diseases.

**Total request: \$75,000 (General Funds): Executive Recommendation:** Not included. <u>House included.</u>

#### Priority 3 – Restore Funding: Grape and Wine Grants

This requests funding for the grape and wine grant program. The greatest difficulty facing new and existing wineries in North Dakota is a reliable supply of domestically-produced grapes suitable for quality wines. The grape and wine grants allow for continued research and evaluation of new cold-hardy selections for wine potential and commercial release in ND. The grants address research, production, management, and promotion issues that threaten the sustainability and growth of the grape and wine industry.

Total request: \$80,000 (General Funds): Executive Recommendation: Not included. House included.

### **Optional Requests Comparison to Executive Budget (2)**

#### **Priority 4 – Restore Funding: Johne's Disease Control**

This requests funding for the Johne's disease control program. This program has been instrumental in identifying and reducing the incidence of Johne's disease in the state. The funds encourage and enable cattle producers to test when a problem is suspected and where the cost might otherwise be prohibitive. This program is helping producers understand the disease and learn how to manage and test animals so that disease prevalence can be dramatically reduced.

**Total request: \$68,000 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation:** Not included. <u>House included.</u>

#### **Priority 5 – Salary Compression Compensation**

NDDA's salary compa ratio continues to fall below other agencies and creates a significant challenge to recruit and retain qualified and experienced employees. The Legislature continues to express confidence in NDDA by adding programs because we are efficient and effective operators. This request provides an employee equity raise on July 1, 2021.

# Total request: \$702,500 (\$369,866 General Funds, \$174,150 Special Funds, & \$158,484 Federal Funds)

**Executive Recommendation:** Not included. **House included.** 

#### **Priority 6 – Staff Attorney**

This requests funding to reclassify a current policy FTE to a staff attorney FTE. This reclassified position will assist the commissioner on national, state, and local laws, rules, policy, and regulation impacting the agriculture industry and all other programs under the commissioner's portfolio. This position will aid the commissioner in providing legal review and recommendations for all regulatory divisions including Animal Health, Pesticide and Fertilizer, Grain, Feed, and Livestock, Meat and Dairy Inspection, and Plant Industries. The attorney will also assist with reviewing livestock zoning ordinances and providing support for the Federal Environmental Law Impact Review Committee, as well as reviewing all contracts, agreements, and grants.

**Total request: \$68,279 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation:** Not included. <u>House included.</u>

#### **Priority 7 – Grain Insolvency Legal Services**

This requests funding for grain inspection insolvency legal services. This program must use outside legal resources to litigate insolvencies and bankruptcies. Funding is essential to protect bonded assets, accounts receivable, and asset recovery from failed grain dealers.

**Total request: \$230,000 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation:** Not included.

#### **Priority 8 – Meat Inspector**

This requests general funds (state match) for a meat inspector. The State Meat and Poultry Inspection Program is required to adhere to USDA standards including daily inspections at official establishments. Presently, SMPIP staff are fully scheduled and we are unable to provide state inspection service to additional official establishments and/or additional days/hours to existing establishments. The demand for state inspection service is currently high due to individuals wanting to start new meat processing businesses or existing processors wanting to expand into the wholesale market. The demand is particularly high now due to meat shortages experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic. Locations of processors currently requesting initial or addition state inspection service include Devils Lake, Carrington, Moffit, Berthold, and Bowman.

**Total request: \$106,458 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation:** Not included. <u>House included.</u>

#### **Priority 9 – Grain Inspector FTE**

This requests one FTE and funding for a grain inspector. The presence of the NDDA grain inspection program has been cited by our industry as the number one thing we can do to prevent problems with fraudulent activity and bad actors. This position would create a more robust inspection program, allowing for semi-annual inspections, both forensic and onsite. It would help to identify watchlists, new licensee detection, financial capacities of licensees; it would provide valuable support to assist and educate on compliance of regulatory matters in the field. The position would create logistical solutions to long travel times and overnight road expenses. Net effect of the position creates efficiencies to lower insolvencies, costs associated thereof and less potential loss to our farmers who rely on the NDDA to provide a fair business environment.

**Total request: \$183,399 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation:** Not included. <u>House included.</u>

#### Priority 10 - ND Mediation Service State Match

This requests funding for state match and nonallowable expenses. NDMS' primary purpose is to help financially distressed farmers and ranchers by aiding in credit and financial matters and resolving disputes. The goal of the NDMS credit counseling program is to provide clients with a clear picture of the state of their operation, provide them with possible options to address their situation, and prepare them for mediation when necessary.

Total request: \$120,000 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation: Not included. <u>House included.</u>

#### **Priority 11 – Combined Information Technology Request (Total: \$285,000 General Funds)**

#### Funding for Centralized Invoice Processing Information Technology

This requests funding of \$80,000 for technology to improve the paper accounts payable and receivable processing system currently in place. This technology will provide a single tracking system for all invoices sent and received to aid in overcoming inefficiencies to more quickly and accurately receive, pay, and track invoices within the entire department. It also allows for invoice receivables to be paid using our current e-commerce

Executive Recommendation: Not included.

#### Funding for ND Mediation Service Information Technology

This requests funding of \$90,000 to replace an outdated Access database that was developed and maintained by Vision Technology, which has since closed. A modern, integrated database will help improve efficiency and time productivity for the client base. The new database will allow for new function features allowing for rapid analytic reporting and tracking of mediation service information. The new system will allow for integration within the agency.

**Executive Recommendation:** Included.

#### Funding for Meat Inspection and Dairy Information Technology

This requests funding of \$90,000 for new software that will replace the outdated Access databases. These databases were developed and maintained by Vision Technology, which has since closed. The new database will allow for new function features allowing for rapid analytic reporting and tracking for these programs.

**Executive Recommendation:** Included.

#### Funding for Pesticide Program Information Technology Exploration

This requests funding of \$25,000 for contractual services with North Dakota Information Technology to asses our current database systems. The database systems we currently utilize through an outside vendor are getting outdated and do not allow for ecommerce transactions through the Department ecommerce portal. This enhancement would help us determine whether it would be more cost effective to upgrade our current systems or if there are other options available that would better meet our needs and offer a better customer experience to the public.

**Executive Recommendation:** Not included.

#### **Priority 12 – Reserve Corps Veterinarians Information Technology**

This requests funding for three laptops under desktop support to be included in go-pack kits for Reserve Corps Veterinarians to rapidly deploy personnel and assets to investigate and respond to weatherrelated events such as flooding, foreign animal disease threats, and animal health investigations.

**Total request: \$14,910 (General Funds) Executive Recommendation:** Not included.

#### Meat Processor Cost Share Program: \$6,200,000

This cost share program was implemented to address increased demand for retail meat products and slaughter of livestock. Meat processing plants have been significantly impacted by the pandemic due to increased consumer demand for retail meat products. This cost share program provides meat processing plants increased capability to meet the growing demand for meat. Funded 76 federal plants.

#### Charitable Food Organizations Grant Program: \$2,000,000

This program offers grants to help charitable food organizations and small grocers make necessary investments in tools to extend the shelf life of perishable foods. Charitable food organizations include any organization that provides food and/or services, including food pantries, soup kitchens, senior citizen centers, food distribution centers and hubs, churches, and donation centers. Small grocers include any grocer located in a community of 750 or less. Funded 83 organizations.

#### **Bioscience Grant Program: \$5,000,000**

This programs provides grants to support biotechnology innovation and commercialization, promote the creation of bioscience jobs in the state, and promote bioscience research and development in the area of coronavirus research. Grant recipients are companies expressing the ability to partner, assist, and develop techniques to benefit coronavirus research, virus screening technologies, antibody therapies, immunotherapies and sanitation technologies. Funded 8 companies.

# Information Technology Projects to Improve Data Management Effectiveness Due to Covid-19 Impacts: \$356,000

**Grain Inspection Program Database Enhancement**: This enhancement allowed for the electronic collection of credit sale indemnity fund, monthly grain reporting, and allowed producers access to li cense information.

**Livestock Auction Markets and Dealers Program Development**: This funding replaced a paper based process with an electronic process for licensing and provided producers access to license Information.

**Local Foods Map**: This funding created a producer updatable map that provides the public access to information regarding categories of locally produced food.

**USAHERDS Computer Database**: USAHERDS is a computerized database to gather and organize animal health data needed to prevent, detect, contain, and eradicate outbreaks of dangerous diseases in animals. The purchase of USAHERDS will allow monitoring and containment of animal diseases quickly and effectively, protecting our food supply and local economies.

# Audit Report of Biennium Ended June 30, 2019

#### CONCLUSION

The Department of Agriculture appeared to have overspent their appropriation from the general fund by \$25,529.

### **Department Response**

<u>NDDA does not agree with the audit finding</u>. NDDA received funding from the Outdoor Heritage Fund in 2015 and worked with the Legislature to add language in our appropriation bill to be in compliance with NDCC 54- 17.8-05(2) regarding the use of general funds as match. The intention in the grant application and our budget bill was to have the authority to match "up to" and not encumber \$50,000 of funds. We only requested authority to apply time for match that was directly spent working on this grant. Also, NDDA did not receive any additional general funds to cover this match.



Section 15 of Engrossed HB 1009 addresses the audit finding.

**SECTION 15. AMENDMENT.** Section 7 of chapter 34 of the 2019 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

SECTION 7. WATERBANK PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS. The salaries and wages line item in section 1 of this Act includes up to \$50,000 from the general fund for matching funds for the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grant provided for the waterbank program.

The Title 4.0 rewrites were completed during the Sixty-fifth Legislative Assembly of North Dakota (2017) and SB 2026 was part of the rewrites. SB 2026 passed after SB 2236 passed nullifying the amendments made by SB 2326 to Chapter 4-01. SB 2026 repealed Chapter 4-01 and enacted Chapter 4.1-01. Legislative Council informed the Department that due to the timing of the passage of SB 2026, the amendments passed by SB 2236 were not placed into law. Section 13 of Engrossed HB 1009 adds back the intent of SB 2236.

**SECTION 13. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-01-17 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 4.1-01-17. Pipeline restoration and reclamation oversight pilot program - Generally.

- The commissioner shall establish a pilot program providing technical assistance and support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline restoration and followup support to surface owners and surface tenants on pipeline reclamation.
- 2. The commissioner may contract for ombudsmen to be a resource for technical assistance and followup on pipeline issues. The ombudsmen may not investigate or assist with any pipeline installed before January 1, 2006, or regulated by the public service commission under title 49, and may not assist in easement negotiations.
- 3. The pilot-program may provide technical education, support, and outreach on pipeline-related matters in coordination with other entities.
- 4. The commissioner may contract with local individuals, deemed trustworthy by the surface owners and surface tenants, to be ombudsmen. The commissioner is not subject to the provisions of chapter 54-44.4 when contracting for the services of ombudsmen.
- 5. <u>The names of surface owners and surface tenants who receive assistance under the program are exempt</u> records as defined under section 44-04-17.1.



#### MAXIMIZING HONEYBEE POLLINATION TO INCREASE SUNFLOWER OIL YIELD AND OIL QUALITY

UND - Odegard School of Aerospace Sciences Paul Snyder, Grand Forks

Grant Amount:	\$59,113
Total Budget:	\$77,907

Australian technology startup Bee Innovative and the University of North Dakota (UND) are partnering to unlock an entirely new market for agricultural drones in the United States by combining Bee Innovative's extensive experience in tracking honeybees in real time for precision pollination in Australia with UND's global leadership in unmanned aircraft systems (UAS). Agriculture and honey production are important parts of North Dakota's economy, of which UND, as the state's flagship university, is a big driver through research and technology innovation. "As we grapple with global challenges around food security and doing more with less, any innovation that delivers increased certainty, predictability and outputs for farmers is a welcome innovation." "We're excited to work with UND to leverage their experience in unmanned autonomous vehicles to enhance our current BeeDar capability and make this solution a reality for the local and global agriculture market."

### SEMI-MECHANIZATION OF EARLY-SEASON VINEYARD MANAGEMENT

NDSU Department of Plant Sciences Harlene Hatterman-Valenti, Fargo

Grant Amount:	\$23,550
Total Budget:	\$29,438

Grant funding will be utilized to obtain, evaluate, and disseminate findings regarding the application of mechanized and semi-mechanized tools for new and expanding regional grape growing operations. Evaluation of traditional and powered grapevine pruners and training tools will enable comparison and isolation of tools that can empower farmer decision making for best use of resources. Demonstrations to farmers will be conducted to disperse knowledge of safe and precise handling of tools, strengthening regional vineyard owners' capacity to manage and train a new, more efficient workforce, capable of maintaining greater acreage with fewer labor hours leading to more fruit production with less expenditures.

### TESTING OF TWO NOVEL ANTI-MICROBIALS ON MEAT

NDSU Deparment of Microbiological Sciences Birgit Pruess, Fargo

Grant Amount:	\$45,765
Total Budget:	\$57,756

The proposal's main goal is to bring a submitted patent closer to commercialization by testing two novel antimicrobials (AM) on chicken. Previous research has established that both AM reduce live counts of spoilage and pathogenic bacteria when the AM are mixed with ground beef. The proposed research uses the AM as processing aid instead of treatment. The project will inoculate chicken breasts with specific levels of Salmonella or Campylobacter in PBS suspension. Contaminated meat will consecutively be treated with one of the AM by dipping into a water bath containing a 1% solution of the AM. The meat will be stored at 7 degrees C for a maximum of 3 days. Live counts of Salmonella and Campylobacter will be determined on selective agar plates. In addition, the project will determine live counts of several spoilage bacteria that are commonly associated with chicken. The research will broaden the range of applications that our AM are effective in.

#### SCALING UP SOY-BASED MONOMERS SYNTHESIS FOR COMMERCIAL ACCEPTANCE

NDSU Department of Coatings and Polymeric Materials Andriv Voronov, Fargo

This project is based on the already obtained and published experimental results that demonstrated strong commercial promise of technology entitled Biobased Acrylic Monomers developed and patented at the Coatings and Polymeric Materials Department of North Dakota State University (NDSU). The goal of this project is to scale up synthesis of soybean oil-based acrylic monomer (SBM) to enable larger products volume and extensive further testing of latexes from SBM at industrial partner facilities. The projects main objective is to demonstrate feasibility of SBM synthetic process to produce monomers in larger volume (10 - 100 gallons). Before scaling up, synthetic reaction parameters and process characteristics need to be optimized in terms of monomer quality and reaction control with a main target of introducing these new materials to the market. The long term goal of this study is to replace petroleum-based monomers in polymer latexes with monomers based on soybean oil, at a price point that is comparable, and with the same equipment and processes, and with identical or better performance of the end product.

#### EXAMINATION OF 10 PHOTOPERIOD AND 2 AUTOFLOWER HEMP CBD CULTIVARS

Dakota College at Bottineau Keith Knudson, Bottineau

The grant funds will be used to set up an applied research project to identify and develop varieties

of industrial CBD hemp cultivars that will perform well under North Dakota climate including controlled environmental conditions. The grant fund will be utilized to purchase industrial hemp cultivars, set up experimental plots, providing internships to students for conducting applied research, materials and supplies for conducting experimental trials and extraction of CBD, and hosting field days and workshop for producers to demonstrate good agricultural practices and hemp production in outdoor field as well as an environmentally controlled agricultural environment.

#### A NEW HIGH VALUE MARKET FOR PLANT-BASED PRODUCTS FOR HEALTH AND ANTICANCER THERAPY NDSU

Kalpana Katti, Fargo

Grant Amount:	\$55,540
Total Budget:	\$80,553

The goal of the proposed research is to develop health target high value crops for North Dakota by evaluating the nutritional and anticancer properties of compounds from the extracts of oregano and related high phenolic crop, targeting effectiveness in treating prostate and breast cancer at the bone sites, which are considered terminal stage for these cancers. The research will combine the expertise of the Katti and Shetty groups to study the efficacy of the extracts from oregano and related high phenolic crops using the bone mimetic cancer testbeds with four cancer cell lines, highly metastatic and low metastatic prostate and breast cancer. Parallel studies will also be conducted to evaluate the effect of the natural extracts on healthy bone cells and bone regeneration. The ultimate goal of this research is to identify new uses and add value for oregano and related high phenolic crop grown in North Dakota, create health targeted high value markets for the products through discovery

and dissemination of the research to business, scientific communities and the public, build partnerships with local farmers, initiate patents and advance spin-off companies for job creation. The proposed research has a strong potential to increase employment in North Dakota, improve the health targeted markets through added value, develop new manufacturing capability in the agriculture sector in the state at the nexus of food, nutrition and medicine.

#### **BIO-BASED INNOVATIONS FOR** COMMERCIALIZATION FROM CHICKPEAS

NDSU Department of Plant Sciences Kalidas Shetty, Fargo

Total Budget:	\$56,128

To advance bio-based innovation for commercialization of high value ingredients from ND chickpeas to support pulse growers, local food and nutrition industry and to provide NCD-linked health benefits to consumers of ND. To achieve this broad objective, initially we will screen North Dakota grown desi and Kabuli chickpea cultivars with high protein and high human health relevant bioactive content and will further target them as high value nutraceuticals and health ingredients by better defining their NCD-linked health benefits. Additionally. we will advance bio-based innovations such as pre-harvest foliar elicitation strategy with natural bioprocessed elicitors and post-harvest processing strategy to enhance such NCD-linked health benefits in targeted novel health targeted ingredients which will be derived from high value North Dakota chickpea. Furthermore, we will also advance commercialization efforts for high value chickpea-based ingredients by using NDSU driven new spin-off, research kitchen initiative and a potential collaboration with local food, nutrition, and health industries such as Sanford Profile. This proposed APUC grant initiative will

help to develop new heath targeted functional ingredients from North Dakota chickpea and other legumes and will provide clear path for potential commercialization efforts for such high value agricultural products. Overall, development of such high value ingredients and advancement of its commercialization will contribute to the growth and long term stability of North Dakota economy.

#### OPTIMIZING INTERCROPPING PRACTICES FOR THE PRODUCTION, PRESERVATION, AND UTILIZATION OF SILAGE FEED

NDSU Carrington Research Extension Center Bryan Neville, Carrington

Grant Amount:	\$48,332
Total Budget:	\$60,415

The Carrington Research Extension Center researched three project objectives. 1) Maximize forage productivity of intercropped corn/legumes for the production of silage as livestock feed. 2) Determine the impacts of silage inoculant use on pH, nutrient content, and fermentation characteristics of intercropped corn/legume silages. 3) Compare feeding value of intercropped corn/legume silages to corn silage for backgrounding rations for beef heifers. In 2019, the corn production was much better previous research. It was believed that this would lead to better intercropping performance. However, field pea inclusion had a large negative impact on corn biomass production. The corn plants were shorter for much of the year which had cascade effects. First, the stunted corn did not yield well, but it also created more lanes for sunlight which created a more robust field pea crop. This was further compounded by heavy lodging and most field peas were not harvestable with silage chopping equipment. It is estimated that only 25% of the field pea biomass was harvested. It is possible that the unharvested field pea residue may have offset the loss in

forage production corn. Soybean production had minimal impacts on corn yield, however the corn was too robust in the mix. This resulted in a poor environment for soybeans to contribute much seed production. The best advantage with soybeans was a 5% increase in tons/acre fresh weight at the 145,200 soybean seeding rate compared to corn alone.

#### THE EFFECTS OF FEEDING HEMPSEED CAKE ON RUMINAL FERMENTATION AND SITE DIGESTION IN CATTLE NDSU

This project is designed to determine the feeding value of hemseed cake in finishing cattle diets. Specifically, in situ and in vitro ruminal digestibility experiments will be used to examine the ruminal protein degradability of hempseed meal as compared to other common protein sources used for cattle finishing diets using in situ and in vitro digestion approaches, 2) influence of hempseed meal supplementation on ruminal fermentation, nitrogen balance, and site of digestion in cattle, and 3) preliminary economic analysis and value discovery of hempseed cake as a protein supplement for cattle fed finishing diet.

#### VALORIZATION OF BREWERS' SPENT GRAIN USING SIMULTANEOUS CO-FERMENTATION TO ENHANCE NUTRITIONAL VALUE

NDSU Department of Plant Sciences Paul Schwarz, Fargo

The microbial fermentation of brewers ' spent grains is an environmentally friendly and

economical operating process. which benefits the sustainability of barley growing in ND. The utilization of brewers' spent grains as livestock feed is limited (with an addition of less than 5% in the total feed) because of the non-digestivefibers and proteins. The current project is designed to use the microbial fermentation to break down the crude fiber and protein of BSG into sugars, peptides, amino acids, fatty acids, and prebiotics conducive to the digestion of livestocks . The operating process is to be conducted under the air condition, which prepares for a largescale implementation in practice. The solid state fermentation does not produce waste water. The process is relatively costless because of the convenient operation, inexpensive microbial strains. and no waste production. In addition, the process saves energy costs because the moisture content of BSG is expected to dramatically decrease with the heat produced during the microbial fermentation. The nutritional value of fermented BSG would be significantly increased, compared to the untreated BSG. The shelf life of fermented BSG would be longer due to the inhibition of spoilage microbes by beneficial fungus and bacteria applied in the fermentation process. The improvement of nutrients of fermented BSG would potentially enlarge the utilization of BSG as feed, which would reimburse the malting barley growers and promote the sustainability of barley growing.

#### EVALUATION OF SMALL-SCALE VEGETABLE PLANTING TECHNOLOGIES AND TECHNIQUES

NDSU Department of Plant Sciences Chiwon Lee, Fargo

With the increase of small-scale vegetable production in North Dakota, new and veteran producers continually face the daunting task of optimizing resources, labor and time. Planting and seed starting are the most crucial and timeconsuming aspects of vegetable production. The utilization of commercial seeders provides the opportunity for decreased time and money expenditure, while improving accuracy and adaptability in direct sowing of small seeded high value crops. Utilization of a stale seedbed technique provides the benefit of non-chemical weed suppression, while also reducing need for tillage. Multiple commercial seeders developed for small scale farm operations will be evaluated for time-saving capacity and precision while planting high value small-seeded vegetable crops. A stale seed bed technique and conventional tillage will be used to evaluate weed suppression. Hand and vacuum seeders for indoor seed starting and greenhouse operations will be evaluated for cost and time effectiveness. Vegetable seed used in this project will be diverse and of economic importance to North Dakota producers. This project will address problems faced by short season North Dakota vegetable producers, while showcasing new tillage strategies to improve upon cultural practices. Through evaluation of new technologies, this project will identify where labor costs can be streamlined, enabling producers to invest more time and money into other aspects of their operation. Furthermore, findings will be communicated to stakeholders through grower meetings, field days and extension demonstrations.

#### EARLY IDENTIFICATION OF SOYBEAN CYST NEMATODE DISEASE

University of North Dakota Prakash Ranganathan, Grand Forks

Grant Amount:	\$62,800
Total Budget:	\$78,500

Soybean Cyst Nematode (SCN) dlsease is a leading use of yield loss in North America

soybean farms. It is often difficult to identify the exact symptoms of-SCN. Common below ground symptoms (BGS) Incluge root stunting, discoloration, and fewer nodules in the root. The above ground symptoms (AGS), include less biomass, stunting and early yellowing or browning of leaves. While we understand that SCN Infected soybeans can lose up to 25-30% of their yield before beginning to turn yellow and a number of other diseases also cause yellowing of leaves, the purpose of this study has two fold goals:

Goal 1: To find out whether there are early, subtle signs that SCN infection has occurred before visibly detectable early yellowing by relating large suites of multiple types of remote sensor data to soybean growth conditions. Goal 2: To find out whether there exists a relationship for early yellowing to SCN disease and mapping exact environmental conditions such as soil moisture and canopy assessment across all seasons. Currently, there is very limited research that integrates both aerial and ground data measurements to map the geo location of this SCN disease that captures variation in plant health, early yellowing and soil health across all seasons, as there is a lack of high fidelity big data in this area. The anticipated outcome of the project will result in a software and remote sensing hardware package that can be used to accurately detect the GPS locations of SCN infested areas in two ND soybean farms.

#### **GWAS AND TRANSCRIPTOME ANALYSIS**

Minn-Dak Growers Ltd. Mala Ganiger, Grand Forks

Total Budget:	\$125,000

The possible outcome of accelerated aging treatments will be to identify the environmental conditions stimulating the darkening of seed coat colbr in a reasonable time frame. This information is essential for the phenotypic evaluation of seed coat color browning in buckwheat breeding program and for commercial seed coat color evaluations at MDGL. Indirectly, the optimum storage conditions necessary for retaining the green seed coat color will be revealed. The GWAS study of common buckwheat accessions which will be the first report in relation to the seed coat color of common buckwheat should allow us to identify the gene/s controllir)g the seed coat color trait in buckwheat. Finally, the mechanism of gene expression at the molecular level with RNA-seg information will provide the comprehensive information of the genes involved in seed coat color development through differential gene expression study. This will help to develop the buckwheat varieties with darker green seed coat color resulting in the increase in acreage for production to meet the customer demand and having higher sales price for. This will create more job opportunities for both buckwheat farmers and buckwheat mill workers improving the overall economy of North Dakota. Moreover, this project will enforce the building and expanding the R&D department of MDGL further creating more job opportunities in buckwheat research field proving it to be more potential for economic growth in different areas such as buckwheat research.

Invigoils will source regional identity preserved oilseed commodities for cold press processing for a commercial market of both human and animal consumption. Toll processing may be used when we have extra capacity.

#### **COWS AND CO CREAMERY**

Cows and Co. Creamery Maartje Murphy, Carrington

Grant Amount:	\$148,000
Total Budget:	\$670,000

Cows and Co. Creamery is a micro-creamery located near Carrington, ND. They produce artisan dairy products using milk from their family farm. Currently they are producing Gelato and are looking to develop lines of artisan cheeses with authentic "old-world" production. The vision for the creamery is to have an on-farm location that would serve as a creamery and an agridestination.

#### 701 MEATS, LLC

701 Meats, LLC Roy Krivoruchka, Belfield

Grant Amount:	\$97,650
Total Budget:	\$128,650

The project established a meat processing facility in southwest North Dakota. The facility will start out as a custom exempt facility with plans to expand into a state inspected facility. APUC provided funding for the refrigeration system for the meat processing facility. The facility processes North Dakota meat products such as steaks, roasts, burger, sausages, bacon, hams and more. This facility provides local producers with a place to process their animals as well as providing consumers with a place to obtain locally raised meat products.

#### LAKESIDE MEATS BUSINESS OPENING PLAN

4 Family Farms Alliance, LLC John Jacobson, Hatton

An existing meat processing facility has been acquired by 4 Family Farms Alliance, LLC, and the business name will be "Lakeside Meats." Lakeside Meats intends to provide: a) fee-based meat processing services to livestock producers (custom-exempt); b) retail and wholesale sales of unprocessed product(s) (state inspected); and c) manufacturing/processing of meat products for retail and wholesale sales.

One factor that differentiates Lakeside Meats from its competitors involves the fact that all four owner families are personally in the livestock business, employ best management practices on their respective farms and ranches, provide care for their animals at a level that is unmatched, and remain committed to raising an exceptional product that is safe, affordable, fresh and delicious. Lakeside Meats is located at 307 College Dr S in Devils Lake, ND, in the heart of the business community of Devils Lake.

#### **QUANDT BARN**

Quandt Farm Justin & Stephanie Quandt, Oakes

Grant Amount:	\$20,500
Total Budget:	\$25,625

This project includes provisions for a 4,800 head finisher swine farm. The facility willconsist of one (1) 338.0'x 122.2' finisher barn. The finisher barn will house a total of 4,800 finisher pigs. The barn will be on slatted concrete floors over an 8'deep pit, which will fully contain the manure and waste water to ensure the protection of ground water and other vital natural resources. All buildings are totally roofed and all extraneous drainage will be drained away from the building and diverted around the site into engineer-designed containment. The hogs will arrive weighing approximately 30 lbs and will be fed using grain from our family farms as well as from other entities. The manure that is collected from the facility will be used to enrich the soil of our fields and those of our neighbors while cutting back on our dependency on chemical fertilizer. This finisher barn will help sustain our family farming operations for future generations. We have been working closely with our engineer to assure adherence to the environmental laws of our state, the health of our animals, and to being good and ethical neighbors.

#### FOOD FIRST MARKETING OF PROBIOTEIN BARS

Now that our prebiotic fiber product -- ProBiotein -- and MicroBiome Bars, for good gut health, are available to large regional retailers from a national distributor, we want to be sure the customers of these retailers are aware our products are in their stores. Food First LLC of Walhalla, ND, has initial sales and commitments from 740 stores (340 Sprouts Farmers Markets and 400 Associated Food Stores). These two retail chains have established customer contact via social media and they also conduct in-store sampling for new products. Building brand awareness is the effort and securing the all-important reorders is the goal.

### DEEP WINTER GREENHOUSE EDUCATION AND FERTILIZER DEMO SITE

This project will construct an education and demonstration facility to: (1) showcase the use and effectiveness of Black Bison Organics fertilizers year-round; (2) demonstrate the use of a deep winter greenhouse to allow winter crop production without expensive supplemental heating; and (3) create a regional agroforestry and permaculture training hub. The project will be composed of a "net-zero" greenhouse that allows year-round crop production. The greenhouse will be attached to an annex building to host educational events, for fertilizer storage, and to house the greenhouse utilities. Both buildings will be constructed using the innovative Nordic Steel building system, based out of Mandan, ND; thereby demonstrating the use and effectiveness of two local products. Black Bison Organics fertilizer's main ingredients are NDsourced flax seed meal and leonardite - instead of relying on inferior, out-of-state ingredients. By greatly extending, or even eliminating, the growing season in North Dakota, the proposed project will allow the business to showcase crop quality and yields impossible or uneconomical to achieve without an energy-intensive traditional greenhouse.

The platform will connect beef producers, transporters, and processors for real time information on pickups, drop offs, and driver availability. QueBitz is now available in the App Store and Google play where it can be downloaded for use.

#### **BLUE FLINT RE-POWER ENGINEERING**

Blue Flint Ethanol LLC Jeff Zueger, Underwood

Blue Flint Ethanol is a low carbon renewable fuel producer that is reliant on Great River Energy's Coal Creek Station for steam to run the biorefinery. Great River Energy has announced it does not plan to operate Coal Creek beyond 2022. To continue to operate, Blue Flint will likely need to install a boiler to replace the lost steam supply. Carbon intensity of the ethanol produced is a critical consideration for long term viability of an ethanol plant. Therefore, we are evaluating a boiler and handling system that would use biomass in the form of wheat straw and/or corn stover as an alternative to natural gas based system. This project will gather feasibility level engineering surrounding the biomass option and allow Blue Flint to select a technology. A second phase of the project will complete detailed engineering and design on the selected technology.

This year, with the pandemic creating cancellations of trade shows such as two of the Pride of Dakota shows and the concern that the other shows may be less in attendance, sales etc. several Pride of Dakota vendors have reached out to see if they could increase their marketing to try and increase holiday sales. In 2019, 30,000 catalogs were printed and mailed out 5,500 of them to current/ potential customers throughout the midwest, Florida, Texas, Arizona, and California (former residents). This year by increasing this as well as more advertising in the area will lead to additional sales for these Pride of Dakota companies from Flasher to Burlington to Devils Lake to Esmond to Valley City etc.

In addition to additional catalogs and mailing, an aggressive marketing campaign online with radio presence will help increase sales.

Since opening the store full time on May 15, 2019, Minn Dak Market has seen steady growth. Holiday sales continue to grow. In 2019, a pop up store was used in the Dakota Square Mall for the holidays from October through January. We are researching opportunities currently in Kirkwood Mall in Bismarck as well as the Dakota Square Mall in Minot to continue to grow the brand of providing local residents access to locally made products.


## AGRITOURISM EXPANSION THROUGH VALUE ADDED NICHE MARKET CROP PRODUCTION

A huge array of equipment can be useful in conducting business in rural living and agricultural economics. Prototype Grants are restricted to inventions improving the operations of food processing equipment and agricultural equipment. Technology Grants are to encourage innovation and APUC maintains a broad view of technology, such as hardware, software, devices or processes. Biotechnology will be considered as long as those advances improve agricultural product utilization such as food, feeds, fuels and fiber.

#### **VRT RENEGADE MARKET ACCELERATION**

Cloverdale will invest in developing a process that is the most effective for chilling during the cooking and cooling process that will quickly, evenly, and consistently cool to ensure food safety and quality subsequent processing.

WCCO is developing a new type of rubber product primarily used on equipment that harvests potatoes, sugar beets, onions, and other root vegetables. The growth will increase North Dakota exports and create high-paying local manufacturing jobs.

#### LEAF AND BUD STRIPPER (STRIP IT GOOD)

Total Ag Industries Inc. Pat Muller, Hillsboro

Grant Amount:	\$26,250
Total Budget:	\$49,150

This project seeks to develop a prototype of a new harvesting equipment for high-CBD hemp, the leaves of which are pressed for CBD oil. Grant funds will be used for the engineering, research and development and manufacturing of the prototype for the leaf and bud stripper. Although the CBD oil industry continues to grow, the current harvesting technique is a multi-step, labor intensive process that requires a great deal of both time and warehouse space. This prototype merges those seperate steps into one as farmers prepare hemp leaves for CBD oil production. Merging these steps provides numerous benefits to these hemp farmers including: 1) the need for a single, lower-priced harvesting machine 2) increased harvesting efficiency of at least 25% 3) elimination of the need for warehouse space 4) faster drying because you are only drying the leaves, not the entire plant 5) a purer superior product because the stems and other impurities are left in the field. Although the prototype will be built to harvest one row, the machine will be built so that additional row units can easily be added.

#### IMPROVEMENT PROJECT FOR EFFICIENCY AND PRODUCTION INCREASE

Hankinson Renewable Energy LLC Dodi Matti, Hankinson

Grant Amount:	\$52,500

Hankinson Renewable Energy (HRE) is planning an improvement project to its current plant located in Hankinson, ND. This improvement will involve the installation of stack heat recovery equipment that will improve plant efficiencies and increase ethanol production by an estimated 10 MMGY. The \$3.2 million project would allow HRE to improve operations; reduce natural gas and make-up water usage per gallon of ethanol; and resolve current production limitations, allowing the plant to operate at greater capacity and increase ethanol production by 10 MMGY.

#### NUTRITIONAL ASSESSMENT OF HEMP BYPRODUCTS FOR INCLUSION IN ANIMAL FEED

Healthy Oilseeds, LLC Roger Gussiass, Carrington Grant Amount: \$62,890.50 Total Budget: \$88,727.20

The grant funds will be used to complete the necessary research and analytical science needed to define the nutritional content, phytoremediatory properties, and anti-nutritive composition of hemp seed byproducts. This analysis is the first step in satisfying American Feed Control Officials (AAFCO) and FDA-CVM (Center for Veterinary Medicine) Nutritional reporting and safety evaluations for any new ingredient including hemp and its byproducts. The FDA-CVM requires that each ingredient (byproduct) be rigorously tested to determine its nutritional composition and to identify pesticides, heavy metals, vitamins, mineral, or anti-nutritives that may prevent its use as animal feed and which must be considered by the feed formulator for the target animal, its production category and the intended use. To prove the consistency of the ingredients composition; we must use American grown and processed hemp byproducts and provide 5-7 Certificates of Analysis, from a certified lab, using approved methods and equipment, for each ingredient. Maintaining the consistency of labs conducting the analysis

for each of the samples creates legitimacy of the results and allows for more confidence in the statistical analysis and interpretation of the nutritional composition. All six ingredients (oil, meal/cake, hulls, screenings, filtrate, and pulp) will have five samples submitted to Eurofins food.

#### WATER SERVICE TO BLUE FLINT ETHANOL

McLean-Sheridan County Rural Water District Ann Oberg, Turtle Lake

Grant Amount:	\$54,240
Total Budget:	\$71,190

The Blue Flint Ethanol Plant (BFEP) northwest of Washburn receives water supply and wastewater disposal services through from the Coal Creek Power Plant (CCPP) through a cooperative agreement with Great River Energy (GRE). As GRE looks to potentially close the CCPP, BFEP is exploring economical options to replace its current process water supply and wastewater disposal methods. The proposed project would replace the water supply and wastewater disposal services from CCPP with services from the City of Washburn through the McLean Sheridan Rural Water District (MSRWD). The BFEP would need up to 750,000 gallons a day (gpd) in water for the production of ethanol. The process would also produce up to 75,000 gpd of wastewater proposed to be disposed of through the Washburn wastewater lagoons.

## Testimony of Jennifer Greuel Economic Development Association of North Dakota In Support of HB 1009 March 8, 2021

Chair Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

The Economic Development Association of North Dakota represents more than 80 large and small and rural and urban economic development organizations on the front line of growing businesses and communities in North Dakota. The primary purpose of the organization is to promote the creation of new wealth throughout North Dakota to develop more vibrant communities and improve quality of life. It is for these reasons our organization and its members want to express support for HB 1009, especially regarding the Agricultural Products Utilization Commission (APUC), bioscience innovation grant fund and the North Dakota Trade Office.

Energy and agriculture have long been the two historical and leading pillars of North Dakota's economy. EDND supports investments that will enhance these important economic sectors and ensure their success in the future, while making strides to diversify the economy. If North Dakota wants to remain a leader in agriculture, we will have to encourage innovation.

EDND members are extremely supportive of APUC and encourage it to be funded at adequate levels. The more value that is added to crops and livestock raised within the state, the more agriculture and the state can benefit. EDND supports the inclusion of \$4.46 million for the program as it came out of the House.

The bioscience and biotechnology fields have the potential to broaden the tax base and pose North Dakota as a leader in this important, newly developing sector. EDND supports the House's inclusion of \$5.5 million for a bioscience innovation grant fund. As we have seen with UAS, making investments into new technologies and ideas can make a huge impact on the direction of our state.

Finally, one of EDND's top legislative priorities is the diversification of North Dakota's economy. The North Dakota Trade Office supports exports in agriculture, but also other industries that diversify the economy, such as technology, manufacturing and energy. Ultimately, whether the Trade Office is located in the Department of Commerce or the Department of Agriculture, we ask it to be funded at the appropriate level and be allowed to continue its important mission.

Thank you for the opportunity to express our support for HB 1009 and for your continued commitment to keeping North Dakota globally competitive and diversifying the state's economy.

I am writing in regard to HB 1009. I strongly oppose the appropriation of \$200,000 from the Outdoor Heritage Fund (OHF) as listed on page 3 line 23 of this bill. The OHF **was not** intended to be used as a pot of money to be raided by state agencies as a direct appropriation. Rather the OHF was developed and designed for state and local governments along with conservation organization, local park districts, etc. to apply for grants to be ranked and reviewed by the 16-member OHF advisory board making recommendations to the ND Industrial Commission. This process has worked well through 17 grant rounds providing \$58.9 million in grants, to date.

The ND Dept. of Ag. needs to use the process in place to compete against other worthy projects for the \$200,000 for the OHF. Many state and local agencies and NGO's create partnerships pooling dollars and personnel to deliver conservation programs to farmers and ranchers across ND. This well designed OHF funding process will be short circuited by this appropriation prioritizing state agencies over all other applicants to the OHF.

I urge your committee to remove the \$200,000 to the ND Ag. Committee from the OHF. If the ND Ag. Department's soil health cover crop program is well developed with partners, both financial and staffing, it will rank out well and get funded through the required OHF funding process. Using OHF funds to directly fund and staff state agencies is a terrible precedent to set.

Please remove the raiding of \$200,000 from the OHF for the ND Ag. Dept. from this bill

#### Position: The Bioscience Association of North Dakota supports North Dakota HB 1009 – Dept. of Ag Budget

The **Bioscience Association of North Dakota (BioND)** facilitated the use of \$6 million from the 2019 Legislature to facilitate the growth of 13 bio-companies in North Dakota. \$1 Million of the Funds came from both the **Department of Agriculture** and **Department of Commerce** budgets. \$500,000 was designated for grants and approximately \$500,000 was designated for BioND to cover the two-year costs of identifying and recruiting quality applicants, assisting with high quality applications, as well as conducting other outreach programs and operations. The other \$5 million came from the "**CARES ACT**" funding. This became available after Commissioner Goehring petitioned the Emergency Commission to award funds for the Bio Innovation Grant Program for COVID-related projects.. All of the **Cares Act** money went directly to companies in the form of grants through the Department of Agriculture.

Of the 13 companies in the **Bio Innovation portfolio**, 7 were recruited to North Dakota and 6 were North Dakota startups. Few had cash flow and all had less than \$2.5 million dollars in revenue. The Bio Innovation Grant statute precluded providing a grant to any company with \$2.5 million in revenue (no corporate welfare).

The 13 companies created - or projected to create - **161 jobs.** The industry average salary is \$65,000 a year, or \$28.85 per hour. Therefore, the companies generate **\$10.5 million** <u>a year</u> in salary, \$21 million per biennium. The portfolio companies are:

- 1. **Inovan Inc. \$75,000** leased space in the UND Tech Accelerator to research an effective therapeutic treatment for Covid. As of Jan. 2021, they had 3 employees with 2 Interns to be hired.
- National Agricultural Genotyping Center \$106,666 services provide quality control and food safety technologies through genotyping. They moved to the NDSU campus from Los Alamos National Laboratory. 5 employees.
- 3. Cotys, Inc. \$75,000 developed a "trucking app" that streamlined the process of pickup and delivery for small trucking companies. 4 employed.
- 4. **Krampade**, **LLC \$61,655** –moved from Lincoln,NE to Grand Forks,ND to manufacture Krampade, a high potassium electrolyte powder, which stops muscle cramping, enhances athletic performance, speeds recovery after activity, and reduces fatigue, all the while optimizing hydration. 3 employees in a new manufacturing facility.
- New Age Farming and Distributing, LLC \$50,000 distributes a product containing mycorrhizal fungi technology, to enhance root growth and soil health and maximize crop growth and increases yields. Engages 40 commission salesmen; 10+ dealers in the Upper Midwest; with 5 staff.
- 6. **ImmunoPrecise Antibodies, Ltd \$1,575,000** moved from Canada to develop a therapeutic drug with US headquarters in Fargo. IPA USA employs 16, growing to 25 after completion of their expansion.
- 7. Access Point Technologies \$56,678 is a medical device company locating in Horace, ND focused on the production of Catheters. Moved from Rogers, MN. 10 to 15 employees initially.



- 8. **SafetySpect, Inc. \$1,500,000** developed a handheld device that combines complex contamination identification of respiratory droplets and saliva with immediate remediation of any potential COVID-19 threat using UVC light. They moved from California to Grand Forks, Growing to 20 employees.
- BiomedProtection, LLC \$1,467,200 designs and manufactures vaccines utilizing Biomed's' unique and proprietary electronic Biology Platform. Moved from Galveston, TX to Fargo, ND. Employs 3. Utilizes Aldevron to manufacture their product.
- 10. Genovac Antibody Discovery, LLC \$412,800 delivers advanced genetic immunization and hybridoma technologies for the generation of antibodies against challenging diseases. Genovac moved from Freiberg, Germany to the NDSU campus. At least 20 employees.
- 11. **Checkable Medical, Inc. \$40,000** was recruited from Eden Prairie, MN to focus on delivering innovative <u>at-home diagnostic testing</u> to employers and individuals. They will both manufacture and distribute their product and are hiring 6 employees.
- 12. Core Health Strategies \$50,000 developing a Naturopathic Immunological Wellness and Therapy Program for the prevention and treatment of COVID19. 5 employees in Mandan, ND.
- 13. Core Health Strategies \$30,000 Developing Bovine Interleukin-10 as a primary suppressor of the Cytokine Storm Cascade in patients with COVID-19. 2 employees.

Aldevron, LLC of Fargo is a great magnet for biotech companies and works closely with BioND. Aldevron has not received a state grant, nor asked for one. BioND has worked closely with Aldevron during their rapid growth period, including in 2018 when they constructed their 70,000-sf addition, the world's largest plasmid DNA manufacturing facility. Now they are constructing an 189,000-sf building expected to open Q2 2021. It is projected that Aldevron, which has 500 employees now for an annual payroll \$32,500,000 a year, will grow to 1,000 employees by 2021 with a \$65 million payroll <u>a year</u>.

BioND will co-sponsor meetings in Boston, San Francisco, and San Diego, to recruit companies to North Dakota with **Aldevron** which is a "magnet" for companies engaged in the creation of mRNA and RNA vaccines as well Genome Therapy. They make the material that is necessary for all of these applications.

BioND promotes biotech in the **food industry**, such as **Food First** in Walhalla, ND, the maker of ProBiotein®, a multi-prebiotic fiber ingredient that promotes gut health; the **Ethanol Industry** both on the regional and national level by promoting the use of ethanol as ethanol accounts for consuming 60% of the annual corn crop in North Dakota; the **Corn and Soybean** producers by finding funding for innovation projects utilizing these products in a nontraditional manner, i.e. soybean oil used in making tires.

BioND staff have made a special effort to utilize **university technologies and talent** to facilitate bio-company growth in the engineering and health sciences areas. We are actively working with UND Department of Engineering on a product and to facilitate and foster a medical devices program within the Department.

To facilitate developing bio talent, BioND is working with **iBIO EDUCATE**, and Goshen Education Consulting (prominent STEM educational evaluation and research center) to design and implement novel educational experiences for up to 3,750 children in military families by creating summer camps for Kids of Active Military Personnel **(STEMKAMPs).** BioND is working with "**Science is U.S.**", a foundation-supported effort that brings together a diverse group of science, engineering, industry, higher education and labor organizations to galvanize a broad, bipartisan political base of support for research, science and technology.

North Dakota is being recognized as an upcoming leader in the Biotech Industry. We want to expand our industry in this State. There is great opportunity for growth in North Dakota and diversification of the state's economy. The funding as requested in **HB 1009, Section 3,** in the sum of \$5,500,000, to the bioscience innovation grant fund for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023, is critical to capturing that opportunity and diversification.

Testimony of North Dakota Chapter of The Wildlife Society HB 1009 8 March, 2021 Elizabeth Loos, #342

Dear Chairman Holmberg and Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee,

I represent the ND Chapter of The Wildlife Society (NDCTWS), which is comprised of professionals, students, and laypersons active in wildlife research, management, education and administration. HB 1009, the Agriculture Commissioners budget was amended to include a \$200,000 appropriation from the Outdoor Heritage Fund (OHF) for defraying the expenses of the soil health cover crop grant program. We strongly oppose this amendment, and urge its removal.

The OHF was designed to provide grants to state agencies, tribal governments, political subdivisions and nonprofit organizations. Grant applications are ranked and reviewed by the OHF Advisory Board, which then makes funding recommendations to the ND Industrial Commission. State, local and tribal agencies form partnerships and pool funds to deliver conservation programs to farmers and ranchers throughout the state. This has been a successful model for 17 grant cycles, with groups competing for the use of OHF dollars. The ND Depart of Agriculture could, and should, use the process to compete for the \$200,000 appropriated in HB 1009 for its soil health cover crop grant program. Using OHF funds to directly fund state agency budgets was never part of the development of the very successful OHF, and no such precedent should be set in this bill.

We urge you to remove this amendment (Section 6, page, 3, lines 22-25).

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1009

Page 6, after line 4, insert:

**SECTION 18. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 1 of section 54-12-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

1. After consultation with the head of the state department or institution or with the state board, commission, committee, or agency affected, the attorney general may appoint assistant or special assistant attorneys general to represent the state board, commission, committee, or agency. A state officer, head of any state department, whether elected or appointed, or state department, board, commission, committee, or agency may not employ legal counsel, and no person may act as legal counsel in any matter, action, or proceeding in which the state or any state department, board, commission, committee, or agency is interested or is a party, except upon written appointment by the attorney general. Workforce safety and insurance, the department of transportation, the state tax commissioner, the public service commission, the insurance commissioner, and the securities commissioner, and the agriculture commissioner may employ attorneys to represent them. These entities shall pay the salaries and expenses of the attorneys they employ within the limits of legislative appropriations. The attorneys that represent these entities must be special assistant attorneys general appointed by the attorney general pursuant to this section. Absent good cause, the attorney general shall appoint as special assistant attorneys general licensed attorneys selected by these entities. The attorney general may revoke the appointment only for good cause or upon the request of the entity. Good cause means an inadequate level of experience, competence, or ethical standards. 2. The powers conferred upon special assistant attorneys general are the same as a

Workforce safety and insurance, the department of transportation, the state tax commissioner, the public service commission, the insurance commissioner, the agriculture commissioner, and the securities commissioner may employ attorneys to represent them. These entities shall pay the salaries and expenses of the attorneys they employ within the limits of legislative appropriations. The attorneys that represent these entities must be special assistant attorneys general appointed by the attorney general pursuant to this section. Absent good cause, the attorney general shall appoint as special assistant attorneys general licensed attorneys selected by these entities. The attorney general may revoke the appointment only for good cause or upon the request of the entity. Good cause means an inadequate level of experience, competence, or ethical standards.
- 2. The powers conferred upon special assistant attorneys general are the same as are exercised by the regular assistant attorneys general, unless the powers are limited specifically by the terms of the appointment. Except as otherwise provided by this section, an appointment is revocable at the pleasure of the attorney general. The appointment may be made with or without compensation, and when compensation is allowed by the attorney general for services performed, the compensation must be paid out of the funds appropriated therefor.
- 3. The attorney general may require payment for legal services rendered by any assistant or special assistant attorney general to any state official, board, department, agency, or commission and those entities shall make the required payment to the attorney general. Moneys received by the attorney general in payment for legal services rendered must be deposited into the attorney general's operating fund. General fund moneys may not be utilized for the payment of legal services provided by the attorneys employed by the attorney general, except for those payments required of the department of human services, state department of health, department of environmental quality, and the state hospital.
- 4. An assistant or special assistant attorney general appointed to represent the state board of higher education or an institution under the control of the

state board of higher education may access and examine any record under the control of the state board of higher education. For purposes of reviewing records under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act [20 U.S.C. 1232g; 34 CFR 99] or any other federal privacy law, the assistant or special assistant attorney general is considered a state educational official authorized to access student records."

### "4.1-83-22. Appointment of trustee.

- Upon the insolvency of a livestock dealer, the agriculture commissioner may apply to the district court of the county in which the dealer maintains its principal place of business for appointment as the trustee.shall make notice to the livestock dealer and may immediately suspend, close, or take control of assets held in the trust fund as described in 4.1-83-21, or take any combination of these actions as the commissioner deems necessary to begin an orderly liquidation of those trust fund assets as provided in this chapter.
- Upon notice to the livestock dealer, as the court shall prescribe, but not exceeding ten days, or upon a written waiver of notice by the dealer, the court shall hear and make a determination regarding the application in a summary manner.
- If the court determines that the livestock dealer is insolvent within the meaning of this chapter and that it would be in the best interest of persons holding claims against the dealer for the purchase price of livestock sold to the dealer or to the dealer's agent that the agriculture commissioner execute the trust, the court shall issue an order appointing the commissioner as the trustee, without bond.
- 4. Upon being appointed as the trustee establishing the trust fund, the agriculture commissioner shall perform the duties of a trustee as set forth in this chapter."

**SECTION 15. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-83-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

### "4.1-83.23. Possession of records and property – Notice to file claims.

1. a. Upon being appointed trustee establishing the trust fund, the agriculture commissioner shall take possession of all accounts and records pertaining to the livestock dealer's business. After reviewing the records, the agriculture commissioner may return to the dealer any records that are not necessary to the settlement of claims under this chapter.

b. Upon being appointed trustee establishing the trust fund, the agriculture commissioner shall take possession of all livestock purchased by the dealer under the dealer's license and remaining in the dealer's possession.

2. The agriculture commissioner, as trustee, shall publish a notice once each week for three consecutive weeks in the official newspaper of each county in which the livestock dealer was conducting business, directing any person having a claim against the dealer to file the claim and all supporting documentation with the commissioner no later than forty-five days from the last date of publication. Any person failing to meet the filing requirements set forth in the notice is barred from participating in any funds marshalled by the agriculture commissioner under this chapter."

**SECTION 16. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-83-28 of the North Dakota Century **Code is amended** and reenacted as follows:

### "4.1-83-28. Report of amounts payable – Distribution of trust fund.

- Upon recovery of the trust fund, or so much of the fund as is recoverable or necessary to pay the outstanding claims, the agriculture commissioner shall file with the courtclaimants a report showing the amount payable on each claim, after recognition of all proper liens, pledges, assignments, and deductions.
- 2. If the trust fund is insufficient to pay all claims in full, the agriculture commissioner shall prorate the fund among the claimants.
- The court shall notify the claimants by mail regarding the proposed distribution and direct that the claimants show cause why the report and distribution should not be approved.
- 4. After holding a hearing on the matter, the courtagriculture commissioner shall:
  - a. Approve or modify the report;
  - b. Issue an order directing that the trust fund be distributed. and
  - c. Discharge the agriculture commissioner from all duties as trustee."

An organization that receives a grant under this program may distribute the funding to cooperative grazing associations for eligible infrastructure projects, which must be located on national grasslands within the state. Eligible infrastructure projects include water development; fencing; conservation initiatives; compliance with federal permitting requirements, including fees for professional services; and other projects to enhance wildlife habitat, capture carbon, or increase the health of grasslands. Program participants shall develop and implement a grazing land plan in compliance with local soil conservation district guidance and the plan must be approved by the local soil conservation district. The agriculture commissioner shall establish additional guidelines for the program."

1. Upon the insolvency of a livestock dealer, the agriculture commissioner may apply to the district court of the county in which the dealer maintains its principal place of business for appointment as the trustee.

- 2. Upon notice to the livestock dealer, as the court shall prescribe but not exceeding ten days, or upon a written waiver of notice by the dealer, the court shall hear and make a determination regarding the application in a summary manner.
- 3. If the court determines that the livestock dealer is insolvent within the meaning of this chapter and that it would be in the best interest of persons holding claims against the dealer for the purchase price of livestock sold to the dealer or to the dealer's agent that the agriculture commissioner execute the trust, the court shall issue an order appointing the commissioner as the trustee, without bond.
- 4. Upon being appointed as the trusteeshall provide notice to the livestock dealer and may immediately suspend, close, or take control of assets held in the trust fund pursuant to section 4.1-83-21, or take any combination of these actions as the agriculture commissioner deems necessary to begin orderly liquidation of trust fund assets as set forth in this chapter.
- 2. <u>Upon establishing the trust fund</u>, the agriculture commissioner shall perform the duties of a trustee as set forth in this chapter.

**SECTION 16. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-83-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

### 4.1-83-23. Possession of records and property - Notice to file claims.

- 1. a. Upon being appointed trustee establishing the trust fund, the agriculture commissioner shall take possession of all accounts and records pertaining to the livestock dealer's business. After reviewing the records, the agriculture commissioner may return to the dealer any records that are not necessary to the settlement of claims under this chapter.
  - b. Upon being appointed trustee<u>establishing the trust fund</u>, the agriculture commissioner shall take possession of all livestock purchased by the dealer under the dealer's license and remaining in the dealer's possession.
- 2. The agriculture commissioner, as trustee, shall publish a notice once each week for three consecutive weeks in the official newspaper of each county in which the livestock dealer was conducting business, directing any person having a claim against the dealer to file the claim and all supporting documentation with the commissioner no later than forty-five days from the last date of publication. Any person failing to meet the filing requirements set forth in the notice is barred from participating in any funds marshalled by the agriculture commissioner under this chapter.

**SECTION 17. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-83-28 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

### 4.1-83-28. Report of amounts payable - Distribution of trust fund.

1. Upon recovery of the trust fund, or so much of the fund as is recoverable or necessary to pay the outstanding claims, the agriculture commissioner shall file with the courtclaimants a report showing the amount payable on

each claim, after recognition of all proper liens, pledges, assignments, and deductions.

- 2. If the trust fund is insufficient to pay all claims in full, the agriculture commissioner shall prorate the fund among the claimants.
- 3. The court shall notify the claimants by mail regarding the proposed distribution and direct that the claimants show cause why the report and distribution should not be approved.
- 4. After holding a hearing on the matter, the courtagriculture commissioner shall:
  - a. Approve or modify the report; and
  - b. Issue an order directing that the trust fund be distributed; and
  - c. Discharge the agriculture commissioner from all duties as trustee.

**SECTION 18. AMENDMENT.** Section 54-12-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

# 54-12-08. Assistant and special assistant attorneys general - Appointment - Revocation - Compensation.

- 1. After consultation with the head of the state department or institution or with the state board, commission, committee, or agency affected, the attorney general may appoint assistant or special assistant attorneys general to represent the state board, commission, committee, or agency. A state officer, head of any state department, whether elected or appointed, or state department, board, commission, committee, or agency may not employ legal counsel, and no person may act as legal counsel in any matter, action, or proceeding in which the state or any state department, board, commission, committee, or agency is interested or is a party, except upon written appointment by the attorney general. Workforce safety and insurance, the department of transportation, the state tax commissioner, the public service commission, the insurance commissioner, the agriculture commissioner, and the securities commissioner may employ attorneys to represent them. These entities shall pay the salaries and expenses of the attorneys they employ within the limits of legislative appropriations. The attorneys that represent these entities must be special assistant attorneys general appointed by the attorney general pursuant to this section. Absent good cause, the attorney general shall appoint as special assistant attorneys general licensed attorneys selected by these entities. The attorney general may revoke the appointment only for good cause or upon the request of the entity. Good cause means an inadequate level of experience, competence, or ethical standards.
- 2. The powers conferred upon special assistant attorneys general are the same as are exercised by the regular assistant attorneys general, unless the powers are limited specifically by the terms of the appointment. Except as otherwise provided by this section, an appointment is revocable at the pleasure of the attorney general. The appointment may be made with or without compensation, and when compensation is allowed by the attorney

general for services performed, the compensation must be paid out of the funds appropriated therefor.

- 3. The attorney general may require payment for legal services rendered by any assistant or special assistant attorney general to any state official, board, department, agency, or commission and those entities shall make the required payment to the attorney general. Moneys received by the attorney general in payment for legal services rendered must be deposited into the attorney general's operating fund. General fund moneys may not be utilized for the payment of legal services provided by the attorneys employed by the attorney general, except for those payments required of the department of human services, state department of health, department of environmental quality, and the state hospital.
- 4. An assistant or special assistant attorney general appointed to represent the state board of higher education or an institution under the control of the state board of higher education may access and examine any record under the control of the state board of higher education. For purposes of reviewing records under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act [20 U.S.C. 1232g; 34 CFR 99] or any other federal privacy law, the assistant or special assistant attorney general is considered a state educational official authorized to access student records."

This requirement was not included in the Senate version.
- Amends a section related to the Agriculture Commissioner's salary provided for in statute to reflect salary increases of 1.5 percent and 2 percent approved for the 2021-23 biennium, the same as provided by the Senate.
- Adds three sections to amend Sections 4.1-83-22, 4.1-83-23, and 4.1-83-28, related to livestock dealer insolvency cases being overseen by the Agriculture Commissioner rather than the courts, similar to grain insolvency cases. These sections are declared emergency measures. These sections were not included in the Senate or House versions.
- Adds a section to amend Section 54-12-08 to add the Agriculture Commissioner to the list of agencies allowed to employ an attorney position. The Senate included this section.

ESTIMATED INCOME - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND** IMPROVEMENTS FUND - GRASSLANDS GRAZING GRANT PROGRAM -**ONE-TIME FUNDING - MATCHING FUNDS.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$5,000,000 from the strategic investment and improvements fund for the purpose of providing grassland grazing grants to an organization representing cooperative grazing associations in the state. To be eligible for a grant under this program, an organization must provide one dollar of matching funds from nonstate sources for every four dollars of grant funding. An organization that receives a grant under this program may distribute the funding to cooperative grazing associations for eligible infrastructure projects, which must be located on national grasslands within the state. Eligible infrastructure projects include water development; fencing; conservation initiatives; compliance with federal permitting requirements, including fees for professional services; and other projects to enhance wildlife habitat, capture carbon, or increase the health of grasslands. Program participants shall develop and implement a grazing land plan in compliance with local soil conservation district guidance and the plan must be approved by the local soil conservation district. The agriculture commissioner shall establish additional guidelines for the program.'

Page 5, after line 16, insert:

"SECTION 15. AMENDMENT. Section 4.1-83-22 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

### 4.1-83-22. Appointment of trustee.

- 1. Upon the insolvency of a livestock dealer, the agriculture commissioner may apply to the district court of the county in which the dealer maintainsits principal place of business for appointment as the trustee.
- 2. Upon notice to the livestock dealer, as the court shall prescribe but notexceeding ten days, or upon a written waiver of notice by the dealer, the court shall hear and make a determination regarding the application in a summary manner.

- 3. If the court determines that the livestock dealer is insolvent within the meaning of this chapter and that it would be in the best interest of persons holding claims against the dealer for the purchase price of livestock sold to the dealer or to the dealer's agent that the agriculture-commissioner execute the trust, the court shall issue an order appointing-the commissioner as the trustee, without bond.
- 4. Upon being appointed as the trusteeshall provide notice to the livestock dealer and may immediately suspend, close, or take control of assets held in the trust fund pursuant to section 4.1-83-21, or take any combination of these actions as the agriculture commissioner deems necessary to begin orderly liquidation of trust fund assets as set forth in this chapter.
- 2. <u>Upon establishing the trust fund</u>, the agriculture commissioner shall perform the duties of a trustee as set forth in this chapter.

**SECTION 16. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-83-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

### 4.1-83-23. Possession of records and property - Notice to file claims.

- a. Upon being appointed trusteeestablishing the trust fund, the agriculture commissioner shall take possession of all accounts and records pertaining to the livestock dealer's business. After reviewing the records, the agriculture commissioner may return to the dealer any records that are not necessary to the settlement of claims under this chapter.
  - b. Upon being appointed trusteeestablishing the trust fund, the agriculture commissioner shall take possession of all livestock purchased by the dealer under the dealer's license and remaining in the dealer's possession.
- 2. The agriculture commissioner, as trustee, shall publish a notice once each week for three consecutive weeks in the official newspaper of each county in which the livestock dealer was conducting business, directing any person having a claim against the dealer to file the claim and all supporting documentation with the commissioner no later than forty-five days from the last date of publication. Any person failing to meet the filing requirements set forth in the notice is barred from participating in any funds marshalled by the agriculture commissioner under this chapter.

**SECTION 17. AMENDMENT.** Section 4.1-83-28 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

### 4.1-83-28. Report of amounts payable - Distribution of trust fund.

- 1. Upon recovery of the trust fund, or so much of the fund as is recoverable or necessary to pay the outstanding claims, the agriculture commissioner shall file with the courtclaimants a report showing the amount payable on each claim, after recognition of all proper liens, pledges, assignments, and deductions.
- 2. If the trust fund is insufficient to pay all claims in full, the agriculture commissioner shall prorate the fund among the claimants.

- 3. The court shall notify the claimants by mail regarding the proposed distribution and direct that the claimants show cause why the report and distribution should not be approved.
- 4. After holding a hearing on the matter, the <u>courtagriculture commissioner</u> shall:
  - a. Approve or modify the report; and
  - b. Issue an order directing that the trust fund be distributed; and
  - c. Discharge the agriculture commissioner from all duties as trustee.

**SECTION 18. AMENDMENT.** Section 54-12-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

# 54-12-08. Assistant and special assistant attorneys general - Appointment - Revocation - Compensation.

- 1. After consultation with the head of the state department or institution or with the state board, commission, committee, or agency affected, the attorney general may appoint assistant or special assistant attorneys general to represent the state board, commission, committee, or agency. A state officer, head of any state department, whether elected or appointed, or state department, board, commission, committee, or agency may not employ legal counsel, and no person may act as legal counsel in any matter, action, or proceeding in which the state or any state department, board, commission, committee, or agency is interested or is a party, except upon written appointment by the attorney general. Workforce safety and insurance, the department of transportation, the state tax commissioner, the public service commission, the insurance commissioner, the agriculture commissioner, and the securities commissioner may employ attorneys to represent them. These entities shall pay the salaries and expenses of the attorneys they employ within the limits of legislative appropriations. The attorneys that represent these entities must be special assistant attorneys general appointed by the attorney general pursuant to this section. Absent good cause, the attorney general shall appoint as special assistant attorneys general licensed attorneys selected by these entities. The attorney general may revoke the appointment only for good cause or upon the request of the entity. Good cause means an inadequate level of experience, competence, or ethical standards.
- 2. The powers conferred upon special assistant attorneys general are the same as are exercised by the regular assistant attorneys general, unless the powers are limited specifically by the terms of the appointment. Except as otherwise provided by this section, an appointment is revocable at the pleasure of the attorney general. The appointment may be made with or without compensation, and when compensation is allowed by the attorney general for services performed, the compensation must be paid out of the funds appropriated therefor.
- 3. The attorney general may require payment for legal services rendered by any assistant or special assistant attorney general to any state official, board, department, agency, or commission and those entities shall make the required payment to the attorney general. Moneys received by the attorney general in payment for legal services rendered must be deposited into the attorney general's operating fund. General fund moneys may not be utilized for the payment of legal services provided by

the attorneys employed by the attorney general, except for those payments required of the department of human services, state department of health, department of environmental quality, and the state hospital.

4. An assistant or special assistant attorney general appointed to represent the state board of higher education or an institution under the control of the state board of higher education may access and examine any record under the control of the state board of higher education. For purposes of reviewing records under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act [20 U.S.C. 1232g; 34 CFR 99] or any other federal privacy law, the assistant or special assistant attorney general is considered a state educational official authorized to access student records."

Page 6, after line 4, insert:

"SECTION 23. EMERGENCY. Sections 15, 16, and 17 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure."

<sup>1</sup> Salaries and wages funding is adjusted for 2021-23 biennium salary increases of 1.5 percent on July 1, 2021, with a minimum monthly increase of \$100 and 2 percent on July 1, 2022, the same as provided by the Senate. The House provided salary adjustments of 1.5 percent on July 1, 2021, and July 1, 2022, with a minimum monthly increase of \$100 and a maximum monthly increase of \$250.

<sup>2</sup> One-time funding is increased by \$200,000 for a soil health cover crop grant program to provide a total of \$700,000 for the program, of which \$300,000 is from Bank of North Dakota profits and \$400,000 is from other funds derived from federal and special funds the Agriculture Commissioner may receive during the biennium for the program, the same as provided by the Senate. The House approved a total of \$500,000 for the program, of which \$300,000 was from Bank profits and \$200,000 was from the outdoor heritage fund.

<sup>3</sup> One-time funding of \$5 million is added from the strategic investment and improvements fund for the purpose of providing grassland grazing grants to an organization representing cooperative grazing associations in the state. A separate section is added to the bill to provide eligibility requirements for the funding, including requiring successful applicants to provide \$1 of matching funds from nonstate sources for every \$4 of grant funding.

This amendment also:

- Amends a section to require the Agriculture Commissioner to submit an application to the North Dakota Outdoor Heritage Advisory Board for funding from the outdoor heritage fund for the soil health cover crop grant program, which the North Dakota Outdoor Heritage Advisory Board shall consider pursuant to North Dakota Century Code Section 54-17.8-03. This requirement was not included in the Senate version.
- Amends a section related to the Agriculture Commissioner's salary provided for in statute to reflect salary increases of 1.5 percent and 2 percent approved for the 2021-23 biennium, the same as provided by the Senate.
- Adds three sections to amend Sections 4.1-83-22, 4.1-83-23, and 4.1-83-28, related to livestock dealer insolvency cases being overseen by the Agriculture Commissioner rather than the courts, similar to grain insolvency cases. These sections are declared emergency measures. These sections were not included in the Senate or House versions.
- Adds a section to amend Section 54-12-08 to add the Agriculture Commissioner to

the list of agencies allowed to employ an attorney position. The Senate included this section.

Engrossed HB 1009 was placed on the Seventh order of business on the calendar.
