

Other Sections Recommended to be Added in the Executive Budget (As Detailed in the Attached Appendix)

Discretionary funds exemption - Section 3 would provide an exemption for discretionary funds to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds in the discretionary funds line item into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$2.15 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Beyond visual line of sight UAS program exemption - Section 4 would provide an exemption for unexpended 2017-19 biennium funds continued into the 2019-21 biennium for the beyond visual line of sight UAS program to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The 2019 Legislative Assembly provided a \$28 million supplemental appropriation from the general fund for this purpose for the 2017-19 biennium.

Early childhood education grant program exemption - Section 5 would provide an exemption to continue unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the early childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.5 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Nonresident nurse employment recruitment program exemption - Section 6 would provide an exemption to continue unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$500,000 was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Unmanned aircraft systems program exemption - Section 7 would provide an exemption for the UAS program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the operating expenses of this program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$2.25 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Enhanced use lease grant program exemption - Section 8 would provide an exemption for the enhanced use lease grant program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$3 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Internship fund transfer - Section 9 would transfer \$755,000 from the general fund to the internship fund in the operating expenses line item for the Operation Intern program.

Operation Intern program exemption - Section 10 would provide an exemption for the Operation Intern program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$855,000 was appropriated from the general fund and transferred to the internship fund for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Intermodal container transportation shipping fees exemption - Section 11 would provide an exemption to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for intermodal container transportation shipping fees into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.3 million was appropriated from the beginning farmer revolving loan fund for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Other funds appropriation - Section 12 would appropriate all federal and special funds received by the Department of Commerce in excess of those funds appropriated in Section 1.

North Dakota Trade Office - Matching fund requirement - Section 13 would identify \$750,000 from the general fund for the North Dakota Trade Office and would allow the Department of Commerce to spend 60 percent of the North Dakota Trade Office line item listed in Section 1 without requiring any matching funds from the North Dakota Trade Office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent the North Dakota Trade Office provides \$1 of matching funds from private or other public sources for each \$1 provided by the Department of Commerce during the 2021-23 biennium.

Entrepreneurship grants and vouchers program - Section 14 would identify \$948,467 included in Section 1, of which \$740,956 is from the general fund and \$207,511 is from the economic development fund for the entrepreneurship grants and vouchers program, also known as Innovate ND, for the 2021-23 biennium. Any unexpended funds for the program would be made available to the department during the 2023-25 biennium.

North Dakota Trade Office - Statutory changes - Section 15 would amend North Dakota Century Code Section 54-60-16 to restrict the North Dakota Trade Office, also known as the International Business and Trade Office, from assisting businesses with investment opportunities in farming, forestry, ranching, food quality, and nutrition. The section would also be amended to provide the Commissioner of Commerce, or the commissioner's designee, must serve as the chairman of the International Business and Trade Office Advisory Board.

UAS-related programs continuing appropriation - Section 16 would amend Section 54-60-29 to expand the continuing appropriation provided to the Department of Commerce from the UAS fund for expenses of the UAS program to also include expenses of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program and the enhanced use lease grant program.

Continuing Appropriations

Innovation loan fund to support technology advancement - Section 6-09.18-05 - Provided for the purpose of providing innovation technology loans and for administrative expenses. The Department of Commerce is required to deposit to the fund all principal and interest paid on loans made from the fund. Loan recipients may only use funding to conduct applied research, experimentation, or operational testing within the state.

Ethanol production incentive fund - Section 17-02-05 - Allows for payments of ethanol production incentives to North Dakota ethanol plants.

Workforce enhancement fund - Section 54-60-23 - All funds in the workforce enhancement fund are appropriated to the Department of Commerce on a continuing basis for implementing and administering the Workforce Enhancement Council and workforce enhancement grants to higher education institutions assigned primary responsibility for workforce training.

Community development loan fund - Section 54-44.5-05 - Allows for the expenditures of community development block grant revolving loan funds.

Research North Dakota - Section 54-65-08 - This continuing appropriation allows for implementing and administering the Research North Dakota program.

Internship fund - Section 54-60-17.1 - This continuing appropriation allows for the expansion of the number of new internships, work experience, and apprenticeship opportunities with North Dakota employers.

UAS program fund - Section 54-60-29 - This continuing appropriation allows the UAS test site to collect fees and use the collected fees for expenses relating to the administration of the test site.

Energy conservation grant fund - Section 54-44.5-05.1 - This continuing appropriation allows for the agency to provide grants to political subdivisions for energy conservation projects in nonfederal public buildings.

Significant Audit Findings

The operational audit for the Department of Commerce conducted by the State Auditor's office for the period ending June 30, 2019, identified the following significant audit findings:

- Circumventing procurement guidelines The Department of Commerce circumvented procurement requirements related to the "Be Legendary" logo. In July 2018, the department entered a contract with a Minnesota-based business for \$9,500 to update the official North Dakota logo and develop digital and other mediums, including a new nd.gov website. The department later entered two temporary employment contracts to allow the work from the original contract to continue to avoid certain procurement requirements. The total of these contracts was \$87,163.
- Violation of appropriation law The Department of Commerce improperly charged \$853,908 related to the enhanced use lease grant program for the 2017-19 biennium in the 2019-21 biennium. The 2017 Legislative Assembly provided a one-time appropriation of \$3 million to the department for the enhanced use lease grant program, of which \$1 million was from the general fund and \$2 million was from the strategic investment and improvements fund. In December 2017, the department entered a grant agreement with Grand Forks County.

Grand Forks County submitted reimbursement requests for the work completed but the final payment to the county exceeded the reimbursement request by \$458,801, resulting in an advance payment prohibited by the grant agreement.

An additional \$395,107 for the program related to July 2019 expenditures was improperly charged to appropriations for the 2017-19 biennium.

The department did not request an exemption from the 2019 Legislative Assembly to continue funding for the program from the 2017-19 biennium to the 2019-21 biennium. Therefore, the total of \$853,908 should have been canceled at the end of the 2017-19 biennium and retained in the originating funding sources--the general fund and the strategic investment and improvements fund.

- Noncompliance with contract requirements The Department of Commerce did not monitor contract deliverables of an entrepreneurial contract, resulting in \$123,750 being paid to unapproved subcontractors. An additional \$23,448 was not supported by progress reports.
- Lack of internal control surrounding appropriations The Department of Commerce's internal control procedures
 are not effective to ensure expenditures are charged to the proper biennial appropriations authorized by the Legislative
 Assembly, as seen in the violation of appropriation law audit finding.

Major Related Legislation

Senate Bill No. 2169 - Requires the Department of Commerce to establish a COVID-19 essential worker relief grant program to provide financial assistance to essential workers. Each eligible worker is eligible for an award of \$1,000. An appropriation of \$200 million is provided from federal fiscal stimulus funds for the program. If federal fiscal stimulus funds do not become available for this program, a contingent appropriation of \$200 million from the general fund is provided for the program.

Senate Bill No. 2198 - Appropriates \$400,000 from the general fund to the Department of Commerce for the purpose of administering a nursing workforce recruitment and retention grant program. The department is required to provide grants to an organization dedicated to empowering, encouraging, and equipping North Dakota's nursing profession. Grant funds may be used for operating costs of the organization, including to establish a recruitment and retention program for traveling nurses to assist the state's nursing workforce.

Senate Bill No. 2219 - Appropriates \$200,000 from the general fund to the Department of Commerce for the purpose of providing matching funds to an organization providing research-based literacy intervention services to students below grade four who score below proficient in reading.

Senate Bill No. 2245 - Appropriates \$15 million from the general fund to the Department of Commerce for the purpose of developing an intermodal transportation assistance program, of which \$10 million is for providing grants to an organization dedicated to the development of an intermodal transportation facility and expansion of intermodal infrastructure in the state and \$5 million must be made available to the Bank of North Dakota for loan guarantees related to the development of an intermodal transportation facility and expansion of intermodal infrastructure in the state. Grant funds awarded must be used for the purchase of infrastructure assets, real property, and equipment necessary for successful intermodal rail service in the state.

House Bill No. 1141 - Appropriates \$25 million from the general fund, derived from legacy fund earnings, to the innovation loan fund to support technology advancement for the purpose of providing innovation technology loans during the 2021-23 biennium.

House Bill No. 1142 - Appropriates \$400,000 from the general fund to the Department of Commerce for the purpose of providing matching funds to an organization assisting in the recruitment, distribution, and supply, and enhancing the quality and efficiency of personnel providing health services in rural areas of the state. The department may spend the appropriated funds only to the extent the organization has secured matching funds from nonstate sources on a \$1-for-\$1 basis.

House Bill No. 1494 - Appropriates \$250,000 from the general fund to the Department of Commerce for the purpose of implementing a law enforcement retention program for the retention of law enforcement officers through grants to employers. The program allows the department to provide \$1 of matching funds for every \$2 dedicated by an employer for the retention of law enforcement officers.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4001 - Authorizes the Budget Section to hold the required legislative hearings on state plans for the receipt and expenditures of new or revised block grants passed by Congress. The Department of Commerce appropriation bill contains directions regarding the use of community services block grant program money for the period ending September 30, 2023.



Section 16 would amend Section 54-60-29 to expand the continuing appropriation provided to the Department of Commerce from the UAS fund for expenses of the UAS program to also include expenses of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program and the enhanced use lease grant program.

EXEMPTION.** The amount appropriated for the discretionary funds line item in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this line item are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 4. EXEMPTION.** The amount appropriated for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft systems program in section 12 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this line item are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 5. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$1,500,000 appropriated from the general fund for the early childhood education grant program in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 6. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$500,000 appropriated from the general fund for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this line item are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 7. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$2,225,000 appropriated from the general fund for the unmanned aircraft systems operating expense in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 8. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$3,000,000 appropriated from the general fund for the enhanced use lease grants in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 9. TRANSFER INTERNSHIP FUND.** The office of management and budget shall transfer \$755,000 of the amount appropriated in the operating expenses line item in section 1 of this Act to the internship fund for the purpose of administering the operation intern program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 10. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$855,000 appropriated from the general fund in the operating expenses line item for the operation intern program in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws and transferred to the internship fund in section 7 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 11. EXEMPTION**. The amount of \$1,300,000 appropriated to the department of commerce from the beginning farmer revolving loan fund for intermodal container transportation shipping fees in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30,2023.
- **SECTION 12. APPROPRIATION -** In addition to the amounts appropriated to the department of commerce in section 1 of this Act, there is appropriated any additional income from federal or other funds which may become available to the agency for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 13. TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT. The North Dakota trade office line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include \$750,000 of funding relating to the North Dakota trade office. The department of commerce may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent that the North Dakota trade office provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the department for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. Matching funds may include money spent by businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants, provide training to export assistants, or buy computer equipment as part of the North Dakota trade office's export assistance program.

SECTION 14. ENTREPRENEURSHIP GRANTS AND VOUCHER PROGRAM. Section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$948,467, of which \$740,956 is from the general fund and \$207,511 from special funds, for an entrepreneurship grants and voucher program to be developed and administered by the department of commerce, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. The department shall establish guidelines to provide grants to entrepreneurial centers certified by the department. The department shall also establish guidelines to award vouchers to entrepreneurs to procure business development assistance from certified entrepreneurial centers or to provide grants to entrepreneurs working with an entrepreneurial center. The amount appropriated for entrepreneurship grants in section 1 of this Act is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this line item are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 15. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-60-16. International business and trade office - Advisory board.

- 1. The commissioner shall administer the international business and trade office. The purpose of the office is to assist North Dakota businesses expand exports to international markets and to attract investment opportunities to the state by:
 - a. Advocating for exporters and foreign direct investment opportunities;
 - b. Offering export educational opportunities to North Dakota businesses;
 - c. Researching and raising awareness of export <u>and international business</u> opportunities, issues, and challenges impacting North Dakota businesses;
 - d. Assisting North Dakota businesses in identifying, developing, and cultivating international markets for products; and
 - e. Organizing and carrying out trade <u>and reverse trade</u> missions that seek to facilitate contact and communication between North Dakota businesses and international markets.; and
 - f. Assisting and fostering the diplomatic mission of North Dakota.
- 2. The international business and trade office shall not assist businesses with expansion efforts or investment opportunities in any of the following markets: farming, forestry, ranching, food quality, or nutrition.
- 3. The commissioner may designate a nonprofit corporation incorporated in this state that has the primary purpose of assisting North Dakota exporters or contract with a third party for the provision of services for the international business and trade office. If the commissioner designates a nonprofit corporation or contracts with a third party under this subsection, all data and databases collected and created by the third party in performing services for the office are the property of the department and the third party.
- 4. The department may seek and accept any gift, grant, or donation of funds, property, services, or other assistance from public or private sources for the purpose of furthering the objectives of the international business and trade office.
- 5. The commissioner may establish an international business and trade office advisory board with which the director may consult in administering the international business and trade office.
 - commissioner or the commissioner's designee shall serve as the chair of the international business and trade office advisory board. Each member of the advisory board created under this subsection is entitled to receive per diem compensation at a rate established by the director not exceeding sixty-two dollars and fifty cents and reimbursement of expenses as provided by law for state officers, while attending meetings or performing duties directly related to board

membership, except that per diem compensation under this section may not be paid to any member who receives compensation or salary as a regular state employee or official.

SECTION 16. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-60-29. Unmanned aircraft systems program fund - Continuing appropriation.

- 1. There is created in the state treasury a special fund known as the unmanned aircraft systems fund, which must may be used for the following purposes:
 - <u>a.</u> To defray the expenses of the operations of an unmanned aircraft systems test site officially designated by the federal aviation administration.
 - b. To defray the expenses of the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program.
 - c. To defray the expense of the enhanced used lease grant program.
- 2. The fund consists of fees collected for the administration of the test site and other funds as appropriated. All moneys in the fund are appropriated to the department of commerce on a continuing basis for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the unmanned aircraft systems program. Interest earned on moneys in the fund must be credited to the fund.

Chairmen Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations
Committee, I'm Shawn Kessel and I have the privilege of serving as Interim
Commissioner of the North Dakota Department of Commerce. Our
leadership team joins me today to assist in providing you report on
Commerce. We also have several others who will provide supporting
testimony and we have weaved them into our allotted time.

Commerce has had an extraordinary two years and we are ready to accelerate that success. We will share with you today some of those successes and discuss Commerce's priorities by breaking them down into five themes:

Theme 1: Commerce crushed it in the face of a flock of black swans

Theme 2: Community Development

Theme 3: The New Workforce

Theme 4: Elevating ND Image

Theme 5: Continued Economic Resiliency and Diversification

THEME 1: COMMERCE CRUSHED IT IN THE FACE OF A FLOCK OF BLACK SWANS

I would like to start with the issue that has affected us all lives and has dramatically changed the way we do business, the way we recreate and the way we live our lives. With very limited resources and staff that has been spread thin, Commerce has deployed over \$73 million of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act also known as CARES Act funding by creating, administering and deploying four brand new grants targeted at segments of the economy hit hardest by COVID-19;

We started with the Economic Resiliency Grant (ERG) which was an all industry grant meant to provide safety and build confidence in the marketplace. We received 2,656 applications and awarded \$38,720,521 to 2,064 businesses;

The Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant (HERG) was next and designed to provide much needed capital by reimbursing applicants for payroll, rent/lease, utilities expenses, or similar expenses targeting restaurants and bars in an effort to help them survive the 50%-70% declines in revenue that were not uncommon in this sector. Commerce received 1,132 applications and we awarded \$23,681,952 to 966 businesses;

The Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant PLUS was designed in a similar fashion as the HERG but focused on hotels/motels/resorts. I talked to one resort owner in the Devils Lake area and she had three bookings in November and the calendar through March looked similarly bleak. We received 220 applications and awarded \$8,351,332 to 197 businesses; and the

Medical Expense Assistance Program (MEAP) that we administered jointly with Workforce Safety and Insurance (WSI) to assist emergency responders and front-line healthcare workers who contracted COVID-19 from a secondary source. We received 2,968 applications and we awarded \$2.5 million to 2,469 North Dakota citizens.

In total for all four grants, we received almost 7,000 (6,976) applications, requesting over \$163 million (\$163,473,652). We made almost 6,000 (5,696) awards totaling over \$73 million (\$73,253,805).

But we aren't done.

The recent federal extension has allowed us more time to conduct a second round of grant awards where we intend to distribute almost \$30 million more of CARES Act funding to North Dakota businesses in need. Once distributed, Commerce will have shared almost \$100 million to help support businesses in North Dakota survive and continue to employ thousands of residents.

On January 28the at noon, in partnership with GNDC, we will announce the details regarding the application window for round two of the HERG. It will begin in early February followed closely by the Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant PLUS. We are working with our state partners to address some of the early hurdles caused by the initial federal deadlines. We would like to go back to existing ERG applicants and allow them a second chance to implement their original plans. Many applicants were not able to meet the tight deadlines we were forced to implement in order to comply with the initial federal deadline or applicants were not able to find contractors to implement the desired changes by the initial federal deadline – those applicants that had approved expenses but couldn't meet the deadlines will get another opportunity to obtain grant funds.

Commerce was able to tailor these grants to the most affected industries because we conducted no less than four surveys before designing the CARES grants. Two of these surveys were aimed at North Dakota businesses so we could better understand their needs and how COVID-19 was impacting their businesses and how deeply. Not only did our informed, data-driven response include the CARES Act grants mentioned above, but it also resulted in several webinars Commerce developed and produced to provide local leaders and communities with tools to assist them or to help

them connect to vital resources. We partnered with the North Dakota Department of Health to create and issue a survey that targeted all North Dakotan citizens and had over 11,000 people reply!

In addition, while most states were reactive to the federal government COVID-19 response, Commerce was not. We were weeks ahead. We became the experts on the federal response, partnered with our local subject matter experts and then shared this information with North Dakota businesses through a series of business briefings thereby preparing our companies to take advantage of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) and Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program. These proactive efforts resulted in over 11,000 Small Business Administration (SBA) loans being provided to North Dakota businesses. According to USA Facts website, "North Dakota received the most (in terms of federal loan proceeds) at \$2,037 per capita. California and New York received \$845 and \$1,041 per capita, respectively."

The Commerce COVID response improved lives and was nothing short of robust.

Last time we presented in front of you, we promised the development and deployment of a new Commerce strategy. We are pleased to share that we not only delivered what we promised but took it even further.

Thank you for your trust – I'm going to highlight some of your investment successes, and you'll hear additional details from the Commerce leadership team:

- Placed a heavy emphasis on diversification and innovation attracting hundreds of millions in private capital;
- Completely transformed how economic development is conducted in the state by doubling primary sector projects compared to last biennium;
- Introduced in excess of \$50 million in start-up innovation activity using the newly created Innovation Technology Loan Fund (LIFT) legislation;

- Doubled activity within the UAS environment while growing Grand Sky commercial activity by 30% and almost completing the Vantis beyond visual line of sight (BVLOS) network in the Bakken;
- Successfully recruited an intermodal operation to North Dakota after
 20 years of previous unsuccessful attempts;
- Working with our partners Regional Planning Councils and Community Action Agencies, we deployed Community Development Block Grant (CBDG) and Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds resulting in 85,699 people served/impacted;
- Actively managed 59 Renaissance Zones resulting in 1,850 approved investments (since inception in 1999) across communities in North Dakota;
- Developed and deployed the ND Development Calculator (ND2C) enabling communities to better understand the true long-term costs of infrastructure to ensure optimization of community planning and the reduction of local tax burdens;
- Empowered communities to proactively plan their futures by providing matching grant funds though our Partners in Planning grant program;
- Reenergized the Rural Development Council. Surveyed local leaders and used the data to set priorities for long term rural economic and community growth;
- Simultaneous to rural community and economic engagement, we achieved solid outreach across the nation by actively participating in national webinars and conference as panelists to share progress in North Dakota;
- Retooled Tourism Division marketing materials due to the pandemic and mobilized an in-state campaign and free cooperative platform featuring tourism businesses and destinations;
- Supported pandemic communications by providing leadership with Joint Information Center (JIC), CARE 19 apps, ND Smart Restart, a variety of Commerce grants and Business Briefings;

- Led occupational licensure reform research effort resulting in precision recommendations to improve talent recruitment and geographic mobility;
- Recruited "The Last Mile" training program to the North Dakota
 Department Corrections thereby improving prisoner rehab and job
 placement reducing recidivism and saving state resources and
 improving company growth prospects;
- Invested \$924,516 of matching funds in accelerated skilled workforce training programs designed to get displaced workers prepared for new jobs and back to work; and
- Operation Intern went big on tech, trade, logistics, critical skills gaps and in-demand jobs.

THEME 2: COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

I am going to provide a little deeper dive on Theme 2: Community Development and I will ask Bonnie Malo to share some additional details.

In order for North Dakota to be successful our communities must be successful. Commerce has been on the leading edge of redefining what "community development" means through its leadership ensuring that North Dakota communities not only understand the need for smart, efficient infrastructure; healthy, vibrant spaces; and 21st century workforce but, also have the resources to deploy strategies in pursuit of community aspirations.

After we designed and administered the Rural Economic Development study, results indicated economic development in rural North Dakota looks a little different than it does in our urban centers. In rural North Dakota the attraction and/or creation of retail and restaurants is the number one economic development goal. Commerce wants to make sure these rural communities have access to resources to pursue their economic development goals. Currently, the Rural Growth Fund contained within the Commerce Development Fund legislatively requires all investments to have a primary sector designation, because of this hurdle these funds have been rarely accessed. I ask you, is it time to eliminate this hurdle and allow rural

communities access to these funds? Our data says it is. And some communities have made a similar change already. In a conversation with Keith Lund, President and CEO of Grand Forks Regional Economic Development, he informed me that they eliminated the primary sector language from the economic support activities conducted outside the city limits of Grand Forks.

Another Commerce achievement was the creation of the ND2C. This tool enables communities to understand the true long-term costs of infrastructure, especially expansions with the goal of providing information to ensure decision makers are well informed when making decisions regarding optimization of existing infrastructure, planning and reducing tax burdens. We're actively working with the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) to deploy the ND2C on all NDDOT projects that involve streets in and around cities and communities showing the value in growth decisions.

The Partners in Planning (PiP) grant empowered communities to proactively plan their futures by supporting comprehensive plans, economic development/diversification strategic plans, or economic recovery plans due to impacts of COVID-19. In 2020, \$125,000 was awarded to six communities. These matching grants to Bowman County, City of Cavalier, Hettinger/Adams County and Linton Industrial Development Corporation helped them develop strategic plans and the City of Milnor develop a comprehensive plan.

We were able to reenergize the Rural Development Council and set priorities for long term rural economic and community growth which include; stabilizing rural development funding, investment in infrastructure, quality of life, high paying jobs and building leadership capacity.

Based on data gleaned from the Rural Economic Development survey and the trend of collaboration and regionalization we developed the Economic/Community Development Ecosystem Map which provides a spatial representation of state and local resources and organizations, with contact information, so leaders across our state can more easily connect with neighbors resulting in improved local economic and community development opportunities and collaboration.

Vibrancy grants were created to incent small successes in communities that serve to build confidence in local leaders and empower communities to engage the populace in community conversations that create vibrancy. These grants can also support the implementation of a community need project identified and supported by a comprehensive or economic development plan whose creation was incentivized by the Partners in Planning grant effectively operationalizing the plan and ensuring it doesn't get placed on a shelf.

Chairmen and members of the Committee. We ask for your continued support of the resources required to ensure community vibrancy and smart infrastructure development across North Dakota, especially in small towns. The Partners in Planning and Vibrancy grants were funded using the Commerce Momentum Fund.

I will return now to the remaining themes...

THEME 3: CONTINUED ECONOMIC RESILIENCY AND DIVERSIFICATION

In the past year, North Dakota has been affected by a "double black swan" event, that is, the collapse of oil demand and prices, followed by a global pandemic that grounded the world economy to a halt in the spring of 2020. While discussed as important for years, never has a solid economic diversification strategy been more crucial to our state. Combined with the need to stabilize existing industries and businesses in North Dakota, both for the purpose of creating a more "resilient" economy – one not as vulnerable to the shifts in the oil and agriculture industries and one capable of adjusting to new consumer behaviors and expectations more quickly than our national and global competitors.

THEME 4: THE NEW WORKFORCE

North Dakota began the year 2020 with an unemployment rate of 2.3% - the lowest in the nation – and a labor market participation rate of 69.2% - one of the highest in the nation. There is a need to prepare workforce for today's jobs and those to come. We are working closely with state educational systems and the private sector in preparing the workforce of tomorrow including reducing barriers that prevent residents from obtaining the skills or employment they seek.

THEME 5: ELEVATION OF NORTH DAKOTA'S IMAGE

Magnifying what North Dakota has to offer to visitors, new residents, and new companies, this opportunity has taken on a new and higher profile during the time of COVID-19. There is appetite for wide-open spaces, safe destinations, and the many amenities that North Dakota is naturally gifted to offer has never been so significant.

Each division director will talk more specifically about each of our themes.

I promised earlier that you would hear from Bonnie Malo, director of Community Services. I would like to invite Bonnie to the podium and talk more about our efforts to braid federal community development resources with state support to target and maximize impact. Bonnie can you please talk more about Community Development

BONNIE MALO, DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITY SERVICES

Thank you, Shawn.

Good morning Chairman Holmberg and members of the committee. I am Bonnie Malo, Director of the Division of Community Services (DCS) at the Commerce Department.

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) program requires a public hearing so we will incorporate that requirement into this meeting. The CSBG program's primary purpose is to assist communities to implement locally designed anti-poverty programs. The program is delivered through the seven statewide Community Action Agencies, providing various services including Head Start, weatherization, commodity food distribution, emergency services and case management to low income households and persons. For the 2018 and 2019 program years CSBG impacted 41,546 low income individuals statewide.

Commerce, in cooperation with the Community Action Agencies, has prepared a funding plan for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. We expect CSBG to be funded in the range of \$3.6 million in each of the next two years. Therefore, Mr. Chairman, would you please open the hearing for any public comments on the Community Services Block Grant funding plan?

Mr. Chairman, with there being no further comments, can we close the public hearing?

At this time, I will address the remaining programs within the Division of Community Services. The total appropriation for this biennium is \$50,823,035, which includes funding for the Energy Conservation Grants, Weatherization Assistance, Low Income Heating Assistance, CDBG, Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), North Dakota Homeless Grant (NDHG) and CSBG programs.,

The Energy Conservation Grant funded 65 projects to political subdivision for this biennium, which will save an estimated \$422,535 on energy savings per year.

The State Energy Program funded by the Department of Energy, provided funding to the Bismarck Public Schools System, where they recently installed 46 solar panels at the Bismarck Career Academy. In addition to reduced energy costs, students will now have an educational experience on solar energy production, providing exposure to alternative energy workforce opportunities. The energy cost savings is estimated to be around \$3,500 per year.

The Weatherization Program helps to improve housing conditions and save money for our state's most vulnerable citizens. One manufactured homeowner received weatherization assistance from the Jamestown Community Action Agency that can be directly attributed to remaining in their home because of the assistance they received. Prior to receiving the weatherization assistance, their utility bill was between \$400 to \$500 per month. After the work was completed, their bill dropped to about \$100 per month. This individual was very thankful for the assistance, with tears in her eyes she stated that they would not have been able to stay in their home without the weatherization work.

The CDBG and HOME funds are used to increase the affordable housing options in communities around North Dakota. Affordable housing was cited as the top need in all eight regions of the state during a statewide Needs Assessment Survey conducted in 2020.

The CDBG and HOME funds were an integral part of the capital stack for Monterey & Brighton Place Apartments in West Fargo. These funds were layered with Home Innovations Fund (HIF) funds and Low-Income Housing Tax Credits, allowing to demolish 60 units of Public Housing and then redevelop the site to construct 85 affordable units, significantly increasing the capacity for serving income-qualified families. Without the CDBG and

HOME funds, Cass County Housing Authority would not have been able to increase the number of eligible households served in this community.

Homelessness and housing insecurity impact thousands of families across the state every day. Jennifer had recently lost her husband to COVID-19 and while grieving, she also became homeless. After staying in her car, Jennifer went to Ministry on the Margins in Bismarck. They were able to provide financial assistance and secure temporary housing, until she was able to find employment and secure permanent housing. These emergency measures prevent individuals from becoming permanently homeless and the stability that temporary housing allows them to develop a plan to move forward to achieve greater self-sufficiency. Without financial support from ESG and NDHG, organizations like Ministry on the Margins would not be able to assist the overwhelming number of people who are in situations like Jennifer's.

The CSBG program helps to directly address poverty in our communities. A client in the Dickinson region turned to the Community Action Agency when she and her three children were threatened with homelessness due to divorce. Her husband lost his job, and she had lost most of her wages due to a recent COVID-19 quarantine. With no sick leave and no financial resources, she worked with staff at the agency to secure permanent housing for her children. This client stated that Community Action's guidance and financial assistance helped her make decisions during a stressful time.

The Renaissance Zone Program is an economic development tool that can help cities revitalize their communities by offering both state and local tax incentives. These tax incentives encourage residents and business owners to reinvest in their communities. I am pleased to introduce Brad Barth, executive director of Forward Devils Lake to discuss how Devils Lake has benefited from the program.

Recent Renaissance Zone projects in the community of Devils Lake include a microbrewery and a fitness center. The community notes that these

projects help to fill vacant buildings and lots in the core of their city and even brought one formerly tax-exempt property back onto the city's tax rolls. Later, Brad Barth from the city of Devils Lake will provide a broader view of what the Renaissance Zone program has done for his community.

The Division of Community Services has two asks, our first ask is to transfer the HOME program and two FTE's to the Housing Finance Agency. This transfer will create efficiencies with a one-stop shop for multi-family housing development programs.

The second ask is, Commerce currently has budgeted \$8 million in COVID-19 relief funds, we are asking for an additional \$3.5 million in federal spending authority. These additional funds are from the CSBG program. The total spending authority will now be \$11.5 million.

This concludes my testimony of the Division of Community Services programs.

I would like to now turn the podium over to Katie Ralston, director of Workforce to talk more about The New Workforce.

KATIE RALSTON, DIRECTOR OF WORKFORCE

Thank you, Bonnie.

Chairmen Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee, I'm Katie Ralston and I have had the honor to serve as the director of Workforce with the North Dakota Department of Commerce since January 2020.

The Workforce Division continues to augment state level workforce solutions to ensure that North Dakota is not only prepared for future workforce needs but is well positioned to outcompete neighboring states for qualified workers. In November 2019, the private sector led Workforce Development Council was moved to the Department of Commerce. We have leveraged the industry expertise and diverse geographic representation on this board to understand workforce needs in North

Dakota and generate strategies to address them. All the initiatives that I am going to highlight are aligned with the council's priorities and opportunities they have identified.

In conjunction with a subcommittee of the Workforce Development Council, the state continues to lead the occupational licensure reform effort by researching North Dakota's schema for occupational licensing to develop a thorough understanding of licensing in our state; discover best practices; engage licensing boards and commissions; and identify the best path for reform, with the goal of removing unnecessary barriers to employment while preserving the health and safety of North Dakotans and promoting competition. Throughout the last several months, this effort uncovered unique and effective practices already being utilized by our boards and resulted in precision recommendations to improve talent recruitment and geographic mobility.

We also led a cross-agency collaboration in leveraging federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act dollars to recruit The Last Mile IT training program to the North Dakota Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation. The Last Mile is specifically designed for correctional facilities and will provide residents of our state prison with full-stack software development training, which means they'll be highly qualified website and app developers with the ability to also program more complex systems such as servers and databases. This program will improve prisoner rehab and job placement upon release, and graduates could make a starting salary around \$50,000. We know that stable employment promotes overall recovery and reform for individuals who have criminal backgrounds. In fact, the recidivism rate in North Dakota is 35%, but that drops to 7% when individuals participate in workforce training programs while incarcerated. Nationally, the Last Mile boasts a 0% recidivism rate for the 240 returned citizens who have graduated from their program. The first cohort of Last Mile students in North Dakota are getting underway this month and will be ready for the job market by the end of this year.

Through an Apprenticeship State Expansion grant from the United States Department of Labor, we are developing new apprenticeship programs with \$694,000 primarily focused on healthcare and biomedical research to a support the rapidly growing biotech cluster which is highly important given the desire to diversify the economy. We also saw great success with our longstanding Operation Intern program, which provides up to \$4,000 in wage match for interns. Despite economic hardships due to the pandemic, many employers still prioritized internship programs as meaningful workbased learning experiences for students and continued to recognize their value in creating an effective workforce pipeline for their companies. As a result, we saw an increase in Operation Intern participation with a heavy concentration in technology, advanced manufacturing, and energy throughout the biennium. Today, you'll hear from a business owner who has successfully leveraged this program in his workforce training and recruitment efforts, effectively keeping talented young workers in our state.

Finally, when the state received CARES Act funds, we created the Technical Skills Training grant with \$1 million in matching funds that were used to support public and private sector led training providers in expanding and developing new accelerated skilled workforce training programs aimed at helping displaced workers prepare for high-demand jobs in North Dakota. These training programs range from CDL and CNA training, to IT and cybersecurity, to wind turbine technician and even structural and pipeline welding. We invested a total of \$924,516 in 12 programs across the state, each of which are sustainable and will continue to prepare citizens for entrance and movement within the workforce for years to come, thus creating more pathways to employment in our state. In a few moments you'll hear from one of our grant recipients who is using these funds to make a big difference in Watford City and the surrounding area.

We're fortunate to work with partners throughout the state who are dedicated to addressing North Dakota's workforce needs. I'm pleased to introduce Dave Farnsworth, manager of Power Generation and Engineering for Great River Energy and chairman of the Workforce Development Council. Also presenting will be Kara Glenn with Silver Fox Pipeline Facility Services and Ray Berry, owner of OmniByte Technology.

Thank you, Ray

In order to continue leading statewide workforce strategy and supporting key partners in addressing North Dakota's workforce needs, we need:

- Continued collaboration with the Workforce Development Council in order to remain ahead of workforce trends, so together, we can develop scalable solutions to address North Dakota's workforce needs and prepare a 21st century workforce
- We also need continued support of grant programs, such as Operation Intern and the Early Childhood Education Grant, that support learners at different stages of their education and training. Operation Intern has proven to be a valuable resource for businesses, and we need to continue supporting internship programs as they're an important tool for recruitment and training initiatives. We know that many of the businesses that participate in Operation Intern couldn't afford to provide internship experiences for students without this matching support.
- Finally, we need to sustain the Technical Skills Training grant program. With \$1 million in matching funds, we can continue to support training opportunities that prepare individuals for entrance and movement within the workforce. Accelerated job training programs are key to North Dakota's economic recovery and will help us fill high demand jobs in healthcare, renewable energy, IT, logistics and transportation, and more, well into the future.

I am pleased to now introduce Sara Otte Coleman, director of Tourism, to share some details regarding our final theme, elevation of North Dakota's image.

SARA OTTE COLEMAN, DIRECTOR OF TOURISM

Thank you, Katie.

Chairman Holmberg and members of the Committee, I'm Sara Otte Coleman and I have had the honor to serve as the director of Tourism with the North Dakota Department of Commerce for the past 18 years.

As Shawn mentioned, elevating North Dakota's image during a period of challenges and opportunity is crucial and we must take advantage of the shifting demographics, the desire to travel and the growing interest to enjoy wide-open spaces.

We were able to push \$70 million plus into the economy with an emphasis on hospitality sectors. Commerce awarded over \$23 million dollars to more than 960 restaurants, bars, coffee shops and venues with the HERG. Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant PLUS funds will help 197 hotels and lodges with more than \$8 million in awards. These Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant dollars will help this sector which was disproportionately impacted by the pandemic. To date, \$1.13 billion in visitor revenue has been lost to North Dakota and our businesses, due to COVID-19 related restrictions including the closure of the Canadian border which has cost us 465,000 personal vehicle trips.

New research confirms tourism advertising goes beyond motivating trips and plays a lead role in elevating our state's image across various economic development benchmarks. For example, people who have seen our advertising rated North Dakota 16% higher as "a good place to start a business" compared to those who had not seen our advertising. This lift is even higher once they have visited, where we saw respondents ranking the state 20% higher as "a good place to live" once they have visited.

The team's research driven media outreach showed strong results using a new creative campaign (2019) which included multi-channel placements targeting outdoor programming, sports and recreation and targeted urban areas like Minneapolis St. Paul and Chicago. The campaign exceeded our benchmarks and industry average results.

We retooled tourism marketing materials due to pandemic and mobilized an in-state campaign and created a free cooperative platform featuring tourism businesses and destinations. We are currently running our first winter campaign in-state and near border to inspire winter travel to support small businesses.

Paid media results 2020:

- 83 million people on TV
- 12 million people in print
- 233 million people on digital advertising
- 85 million people through out of home advertising
- 23 million people on social media through advertising campaigns
- 52% increase in visits to NDtourism.com over 2019
- Increases from 48 states
 - o First time visitors made up 92% of visits (up 78% from 2019)

We know this work impacted sales. In 2020, there were 3,523,146 room nights sold in North Dakota, this is down 30.4% from last year's nearly 5 million sold - however could have been much worse without our proactive work.

This year we garnered 40 national editorial media placements which was up 25% from 2019 and reaching 776 million. We also hosted eight influencers reaching more than 10.6 million. We hosted HoneyTrek- with paid support of \$3,900 and assistance from partners across the state. The couple spent 10 days in North Dakota generating 53 social posts and stories which were seen by over 1 million to date.

The Tourism/Marketing Division has led the state's brand unification efforts which became increasingly important as the state managed COVID-19 mitigation efforts. Thirty-four agencies are now using the Be Legendary brand. The team also supported pandemic communications by providing leadership with JIC, CARE 19 apps, ND Smart Restart, Economic Resiliency Grants and impacted business engagements.

I would like to introduce Jim Poolman - a longtime business leader in our state to give you a private business perspective. Following Jim will be Charley Johnson from the Fargo-Moorhead West Fargo Convention and Visitors Bureau to provide a community perspective and then Dave Achtenberg who is with the Regency Hotel Management group to further on the impact and needs for events and group business. There will also be testimony from the Travel Alliance Partnership, the Destination Marketing Association of North Dakota and the North Dakota Hospitality Association and other businesses following our agency testimony.

As illustrated, tourism revenue supports small businesses - 3,000 of them in the tourism sector. The experiences we showcase are for people that live here, visit here (for business or leisure) or are considering living here. It is important to increase the awareness of North Dakota and elevate our image to recruit and retain people from the region. We also must invest in those who have already visited the state. Once travel restrictions are lifted, the border traffic will help drive retail sales in northern communities and we will need to compete with all our neighbors, including Manitoba, to attract new wealth to the state.

To achieve those goals, we need \$2 million of one-time funding from the General Fund for destination marketing. This will allow us to extend our campaign beyond June. Research in 2020 showed that on-line searches on North Dakota travel options and online bookings were high and at par with neighboring states during the peak advertising campaign. Once the campaign ended in early June, the intent to travel, as shown by online searches and bookings, declined well below our competitors. The additional

dollars are imperative in driving demand to our businesses and assisting their recovery.

We also are asking for \$200,000 to improve our visitor services by leveraging existing state infrastructure, like rest areas and visitor sites, to elevate the North Dakota brand. The new hubs will enhance visitor services with fresh contemporary designed space aimed at showcasing experiences statewide to extend visitors stays.

These budget enhancements would allow continued investments in destination marketing to recruit visitors and new North Dakotans which will improve small business activity and increase visitor spending at a critical time. The added benefit is creating awareness for workforce recruitment purposes, retaining resident revenue and keeping North Dakotans traveling to sites within the state. All of which would improve success of all economic development and workforce recruitment efforts.

Next, I would like to introduce our Economic Development and Finance director Josh Teigen to provide a deeper dive into our third theme of continued economic resilience and diversification. Josh...

JOSH TEIGEN, DIRECTOR OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND FINANCE

Thank you, Sara.

Chairmen Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations
Committee, I'm Josh Teigen and am honored to have been promoted to
serve as the director of Economic Development and Finance. I still have
the privilege of working with the former Economic Development and
Finance Director James Leiman as he transitions into his new role within the
North Dakota Department of Commerce.

The last biennium laid the foundation for a highly diverse and resilient North Dakotan economy and we went big and bold with a heavy emphasis on economic diversification, especially in the areas of innovation, high tech jobs, and value-added activity.

In parallel to our strong economic development approach, we also reinvented the way we deploy capital in the state to better meet the market need. We achieved major successes in attracting outside investments such as venture capitals, equity firms, and private capital allowing for an innovation platform.

We successfully recruited the world's most successful innovation platform with Plug and Play, which equates to 40 top-tier startups each year in the intelligent ag space. This feeds economic development initiatives for us, brings a needed ecosystem to the marketplace, and is a great source of investment opportunities for us.

The department completely transformed how economic development is conducted in the state with precision recruitment and growth based on data, research and new investment opportunities. Using data, we can now be predictive rather than reactive, and focus our efforts on the highest return on investment (ROI) activities.

In addition, we developed nearly 100 primary sector projects in 2019 and in 2020 simultaneous to the pandemic, worked in excess of \$2 billion in projects in 2020, and introduced in excess of \$50 million in start-up innovation activity using LIFT and InnovateND which was a wise investment that paid huge returns for the state. We were able to develop new side-by-side investment relationships across the nation creating higher probability to create new wealth and improve capital access.

Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) deployed systems-wide unmanned system plan to include initial beyond visual line of sight (BVLOS) capability in the Red River Valley and Bakken, and doubled activity within the

Northern Plains UAS. Grand Sky commercial activity grew by 30% with hundreds of jobs averaging almost \$100 thousand per year and generated over \$55 million in private investment capital.

In collaboration with several partners, we successfully recruited an intermodal operation to North Dakota after 20 years of attempts; with no use of state money. This success allows huge savings for shippers and will likely see higher ROIs per acre. The biggest shipper in the state saves 34% on drayage, and average shippers save between 20-25%. This is a tremendous recruitment tool for the state and is a cornerstone for growth in the Minot Industrial Complex.

Our team developed and deployed a foreign direct investment (FDI) strategy attracting new companies and investments from Asia, the Middle East, Europe and Latin America including a major greenhouse project from Canada and petrochemical foundation which is a multigenerational solution to massive and long-term energy growth.

We redefined the approach to energy growth laying foundation for next generation economy including value-added, innovation, and environmental, social, and corporate guidance (ESG). What is needed is capital. If we could transfer \$30million from Legacy Fund earnings for the Innovation Technology Loan Program (LIFT), continued investment in innovation programs and get behind Grand Strategy which includes Grand Sky, Grand Farm, Grand Ranch and Grand Energy. This would allow Commerce to seed programs to focus on preparing companies for ESG compliance to attract equity, capital and entities to purchase North Dakotan products.

In addition, transfer \$20 million from Legacy Fund earnings to the Unmanned Aircraft System Program Fund on June 30, 2021 for Vantis, the first statewide BVLOS network, transfer \$7 million from Legacy Fund earnings to the Unmanned Aircraft System Program Fund on June 30, 2021 for Grand Sky, and transfer \$2 million from Legacy Fund earnings to continue funding the Northern Plains UAS Test Site.

And \$750,000 to The North Dakota Trade Office Bifurcation to fund trade and foreign direct investment opportunity with emphasis on energy and tech, e.g. UAS would allow focus on trade data to support need.




Department of Commerce Organizational Chart





RE: Control Enhancements

As you know, our most recent audit identified opportunities for improvement in our control environment. We have thoroughly reviewed the audit report to identify appropriate control enhancements. Please see the Department of Commerce's action plan, below.

FINDING 19-01 "CIRCUMVENTING PROCUREMENT GUIDELINES"

Audit Issue (pg. 2 of Audit Report)

"These contracts should have been treated as one contract for services and allowed for contractor competition following the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) procurement requirements."

Commerce Position

"We disagree with the finding that the Department "violated state law by circumventing procurement requirements related to the 'Be Legendary' logo and overall brand refresh. As correctly stated in the audit report, the value of this contract was \$9,500, and as such, did not require a competitive bid process under procurement rules. Contract deliverables were met prior to the contract being completed. Subsequently, temporary workers were hired to perform work that was connected to the brand refresh but was separate from the contract deliverables. We acknowledge there was overlap in the time frame of the contract and the temporary employment as the final contract payment was made in November 2018, and the temporary employees began employment with the Department in October 2018. After the hiring of the temporary employees, the OMB Procurement Office was consulted, and steps were taken to ensure the contract was appropriately terminated after final payment. The Department will ensure there is a clear separation between contract deliverables and temporary employment arrangements in the future and that all procurement requirements are followed."

As stated above, there were two separate workstreams: one to create the website design, or "frame," and the other to develop content for the website, which required additional resources. While we acknowledge these efforts were related, there was no overlap with the original contract, and we believe Commerce properly complied with OMB Purchasing Guidelines. Commerce also followed state hiring practices and generally accepted employment law principles in treating those hired for the second workstream as temporary employees.

FINDING 19-02 "VIOLATION OF APPROPRIATION AUTHORITY"

Audit Issue (pg. 5 of Audit Report)

The Department of Commerce agrees with the recommendation and acknowledges that these expenditures should have been charged to the 2019-21 biennium rather than the 2017-19 Biennium. The Department will strengthen internal controls and implement procedures to ensure in the future expenditures are properly allocated to the correct biennium.

As acknowledged, this was a timing error related to payment for agreed-upon work on an infrastructure project at Grand Sky UAS park – a project that was funded by the Legislature and had been delayed by weather. The Department made the correct payment to the correct party at the incorrect time, and Commerce has since implemented changes to prevent it from happening again. FINDING 19-03 "NONCOMPLIANCE WITH CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS"

<u>Audit Issue (pg. 6 of Audit Report)</u>

"...did not monitor contract deliverables of an entrepreneurial contract with a total cost of \$253,921. As a result, contract payments totaling \$123,750 were made to unapproved subcontractors. Further, \$23,448 of these payments were not supported by progress reports."

Commerce Position

"We disagree with the finding that the Department did not monitor contract deliverables and that contract payments were made to unapproved subcontractors.

The auditor's report indicates that the following contract deliverables were not met:

- CONTRACTOR must submit sub-contractors to state for approval with proof of sustainability of developed programming/positions.
- Sub-contractor progress reports must be reported in CONTRACTOR quarterly required reports.

The auditor's report indicates that the "The Department did not approve subcontractors...as required by the contract." The Department did provide approval for sub-contracts; however, this approval occurred verbally, as verified by the previous contract manager and vendor. The auditor's report indicates that unsupported payments were made to unapproved subcontractors. As noted, the Department verbally approved subcontractors, hence disagrees payments were made to "unapproved" contractors. The Department has implemented contract monitoring procedures to ensure appropriate documentation is secured in advance of payment for all future contracts."

As stated above, subcontractors were verbally approved as allowed for in the contract, and no payments were made to unapproved subcontractors. Commerce specifically reconciled the subcontractor billing with the aggregated billing to ensure that no one was overpaid or underpaid.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL (RDC)

The RDC is charged with facilitating collaboration among governments and the private and nonprofit sectors in the planning and implementation of programs and policies that have an impact on rural areas of the state. Members also monitor, report and comment on policies and programs aimed at addressing the needs of rural areas of North Dakota. The RDC unites the state's private and nonprofit sectors with state, federal, local and tribal governments to strengthen rural America.

THE RDC AND NORTH DAKOTA COMMERCE DEPARTMENT

In 2020, Commerce and the RDC prioritized and advanced several rural incentive and economic efforts. Much of this work was completed by the Commerce Main Street Initiative (MSI) team in collaboration with other state and private entities, maximizing resources and time.

Main Street Community network:

- Provides support and technical assistance to more than 230 people from 80 Main Street communities across North Dakota.
- Continues one-on-one visits with existing and new Main Street communities along with education, joint convenings and online resources.

Partners in Planning (PiP) Grant Program:

- Empowers communities to proactively plan their futures through comprehensive planning, economic development/diversification strategic plans or economic recovery plans.
- The PiP is a result of dialogue with the RDC and recommendations to support community planning efforts and the creation of actionable plans.

MSI Community Vibrancy Grant Program:

- Supports local efforts to increase community vibrancy with seed funding for a small project.
- Builds momentum and inspires additional projects with improved quality of life, attracting and retaining workforce and enhancing community pride.

Supporting statewide COVID-19 efforts:

- Implemented and conducted research and outreach education tools were undertaken supporting communities, small businesses and state leaders.
- COVID-19 webinars providing information for businesses and stakeholders across North Dakota, including resources available for small businesses, social distancing aspects and resources for businesses in rural areas related to online marketing.
- A business impact survey, conducted in partnership with the Greater Fargo Moorhead EDC, helped measure the impact of the pandemic on local businesses and gauge their needs and understand how to best direct resources.


North Dakota New Development Budgeting Calculator (ND2C):

DIVISION OF COMMUNITY SERVICES

The North Dakota Department of Commerce Division of Community Services was established to provide technical assistance to local governments and state agencies in the areas of community and rural planning and development, policy research and development and grant program implementation.

PROGRAMS INCLUDE:

STATE ENERGY PROGRAM — Promoting Energy Conservation and Efficiency The State Energy Program provides a range of energy conservation-related opportunities, including energy education, installation of energy efficient measures, transportation initiatives (alternative fuel vehicles and fueling systems) and renewable energy technologies (small scale wind turbines and solar technologies). The program's state energy plan is supported by financial and technical assistance through the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE).

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT — Developing Vibrant and Sustainable Communities

The Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), provided through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), provides financial assistance to local governments in the form of grants and loans for public facilities, housing rehabilitation and economic development projects. The primary beneficiaries of these projects must be very low and low-income individuals.

EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS AND CONTINUUM OF CARE GRANTS —

Working to End Homelessness

The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) and the Continuum of Care Grant are programs of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The Emergency Solutions Grant and ND Homeless Grant (NDHG) provides financial assistance to facilities and programs to identify sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons, as well as those at risk of homelessness, and provide services to help them quickly regain stability in permanent housing after experiencing homelessness. The North Dakota Department of Commerce currently awards grant funds directly to emergency/homeless shelters and agencies throughout the state for activities like operational expenses (utilities, insurance, furnishings, appliances, etc.) and essential services (case management, medical, laundry, transportation, etc.), homeless prevention, rapid rehousing and the Homeless Management Information System.

DID YOU KNOW

Community Services Block Grant impacted 41,546 low-income individuals, including 14,913 children, 6,283 persons with disabilities and 7,498 people who lacked health insurance.

Community Development Block Grant created 132 jobs and had \$1.39 million economic impact

WEATHERIZATION/LIHEAP — Increasing Energy Efficiency for Low-Income Persons

The Weatherization Assistance Program and the LIHEAP Weatherization Program impact low-income individuals across the state to:

- Increase energy efficiency in homes
- · Strengthen the health and safety of the home
- Reduce total residential energy expenditures
- Provide conservation measures

Since 2001, more than 10,000 homes have been equipped with energy-conserving measures. They are programs of the U.S. Department of Energy and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

HOME PROGRAM — Creating Affordable Housing

The HOME Program is a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development program, designed to create partnerships among government entities and the private sector to make affordable housing available to low-income persons. The program has two primary activities: homeowner assistance and rental production/assistance. This is accomplished through five basic areas:

- · Homeownership assistance
- · Homeowner rehabilitation activities
- Rental rehabilitation or production
- Security deposits
- · Rental assistance

COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT — Fighting Poverty in North Dakota

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) Program assists communities in implementing anti-poverty programs. The program administers funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services through the state's seven Community Action Agencies (CAAs), providing various services to low-income persons, including:

- · Emergency assistance
- Money management
- · Housing counseling
- Self-sufficiency services
- Case management and outreach
- · Referral services

DEVELOPING DOWNTOWNS

The Renaissance Zone Program is a locally driven program that includes 59 cities across North Dakota. Since 1999, more than 1,850 projects have been approved and more than 1,450 have been completed. The Renaissance Zone Program helps create and retain jobs, businesses and residents.

The Renaissance Zone Program is a tool for community redevelopment and economic investment that incorporates tax incentives to business and residential properties. The Renaissance Act, created by the 56th Legislative Assembly, made it possible for North Dakota cities to create Renaissance Zones within their jurisdictions.

RENAISSANCE ZONE SIZES


The size of the zone depends on city population.

- 34 city blocks in cities with a population of up to 5,000
- One additional block granted for each additional 5,000 in population
- Maximum size 49 blocks

PROJECT REQUIREMENTS

Development of a Renaissance Zone includes:

- A comprehensive or strategic plan
- · Creation of a development plan
- Public input from at least one public hearing
- Letters of support from the county and school district
- A resolution adopted by the city to provide the tax exemptions and credits permitted in the program



TAX INCENTIVES

Up to \$500,000 of income exempted annually on income derived at an approved zone business project (5-year max)

Property tax exemptions for commercial and residential properties (5-year max)

Up to a \$10,000 tax credit per year for five years on qualified single-family homes (max \$50,000)

25% tax credit available for historic property on the amount invested (max \$250,000)



SUCCESS STORIES

The city of West Fargo renewed the program for an additional five years in 2020. West fargo started utilizing the Renaissance Zone Program in

2000 and has had 90 approved projects. Recent major projects include Restad Industrial Park in 2020 and Midcontinent Communications in 2017.




The city of Wahpeton renewed the program for an additional five

years in 2018. Wahpeton started utilizing the Renaissance Zone Program in 2003 and has had 55 approved projects. Recent projects include Tractor Supply Company in 2017, Brew 2 Inc. in 2017, Grippers Sports in 2017 and Dakota Coffee Company in 2016.

The city of Valley City renewed the program for an additional five years in 2020. Valley City started utilizing the Renaissance Zone Program in 2000 and has had 125 approved projects. Recent major projects include Brockopp Brewing LLC in 2020 and Valley Lumber Company in 2018.

The city of Hazen renewed the program for an additional five years in 2018. Hazen started utilizing the Renaissance Zone Program in 2003 and has had 26 approved projects. Recent projects include Mandate Machinery in 2017 and Tractor Supply Company in 2017.

NORTH DAKOTA UMANNED AIR SYSTEMS (UAS): THE NEXT GENERATION

North Dakota's unmanned systems sector continues to lead the nation in supporting the agricultural and energy industries, commercializing intellectual property and operationalizing federal requirements. To continue this growth and momentum, North Dakota must continue to invest in growing its Beyond Visual Line of Sight (BVLOS) network, support robust operations at the Northern Plains UAS Test Site (NPUASTS) and expand infrastructure at the Grand Sky UAS Park to support highly diverse and well-paying jobs as well as the national security mission.

GRAND SKY: THE NATION'S FIRST PRIVATE UAS PARK

Grand Sky, the nation's first UAS business and aviation park, is home for flight testing, UAS operations and research and development. Grand Sky offers build-to-suit locations and temporary facilities for commercial UAS development and testing, as well as defenserelated operations support and has attracted more than \$100 million in private investment. Grand Sky offers access to secure defense networks, dark fiber, a 12,351-foot runway, uncongested airspace with less than 10 operations daily and more than 330 days of flying weather annually. Testing operations are supported with electronics component distributors, metal fabrication, 3D printing and equipment support for the most demanding test requirements. Grand Sky partners like the Northern Plains UAS Test Site can support airspace needs. Grand Sky is home to one of the nation's first commercial BVLOS system.

VANTIS

North Dakota leads in attracting companies and federal agencies to operationalize, commercialize and grow this sector by leveraging historic investments, utilizing existing resources, subject matter expertise and infrastructure to continue the growth trajectory, commercialization of new technologies, and well-paying jobs. North Dakota is using VANTIS and its subject matter experts at the test site on behalf of NASA, DoD, CBP and private industry. The Bakken capability will be deployed by Spring 2021. Commerce is recruiting new industries to assist in energy production and supporting small communities across the state. Autonomous development and the attraction of private equity throughout the agricultural sector continues at a rapid clip as well, including new start up activity from Plug and Play.

The Innovation Technology Loan Fund (LIFT) is an innovation loan fund to support technology advancement by providing financing for commercialization of intellectual property within the state of North Dakota. The following industries qualify for these funds:

- · Advanced computing and data management
- · Agriculture technology
- Autonomous and unmanned vehicles and related technologies
- Energy
- Health care
- Value-added agriculture
- Value-added energy
- Any industry or area specifically identified by the committee as an industry that will contribute to the diversification of the state's economy

The use of the loan funds are available to enhance capacity and to the extent possible, leverage state, federal and private sources of funding. Loan funds may be used to conduct applied research, experimentation or operational testing within the state. Loan funds may not be used for capital or building investments or for research, academic or instructive programming, workforce training, administrative costs, or to supplant funding for regular operations of institutions of higher education.

Approval for the LIFT applications shall be made by the LIFT Committee with consideration given to the following:

- 1. Deliver applied research, experimentation or operational testing in one or more of the diversification sectors to create information or data to enhance North Dakota companies or industries or companies making investments in North Dakota.
- 2. Lead to the commercialization or patent of an innovation technology solution.
- 3. Result in the development of a new company or expansion of an existing company that will diversify the state's economy through new products, investment or skilled jobs.

LIFT LOAN TERMS INCLUDE:

- Zero percent interest for the first three years of the loan
- Two percent interest for the next two years of the loan
- An interest rate equal to a standard Bank of North Dakota loan for all subsequent years

Access Point Technologies EP Inc. — A global supplier of innovative medical devices focused on meeting the needs of the large and fast-growing electrophysiology (EP) market, estimated at \$5 billion today with an 11% CAGR. APT EP designs and develops new catheters and systems for treating cardiac arrhythmias. It is building a new R&D center in Horace ND which will be ready in Q1 2021 and plans to develop both catheters and systems in this new facility. In addition, the company plans to hire and



Checkable Medical Corp. — Developing an at-home strep test to be manufactured in North Dakota and launching an at-home rapid COVID-19 antibody test. LIFT support allowed it to move the founding team to the state and partner with a North Dakota clinical research partner to execute its trial. The company plans to create high-paying jobs in the bioscience industry in the next couple years.

To date it has created one job in Grand Forks with plans for

Three Farm Daughters — A value-added ag start-up creating high-fiber, low gluten food products utilizing GoodWheat varieties grown in the USA and milled at the North Dakota State Mill.

Three Farm Daughters has launched three pasta products and a 100% wheat flour for sale online and in stores in North Dakota and Minnesota. In doing so, Three Farm Daughters utilizes three North Dakota logistics companies, a North Dakota food-grade warehouse facility and collaborates with a Grand Forks local chef for recipe development.



TracFrac Inc. — A Bismarck-based company developing a patent pending scheduling platform that coordinates activities between operators and service companies in the oil and gas industry. Currently working with two major energy companies in North Dakota, TracFrac adds reliability and automation to the oil and gas monitoring and notification system.

ROLE OF WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

The role of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council is to advise the governor and the public concerning the nature and extent of workforce development in the context of North Dakota's economic development needs, and how to meet these needs effectively while maximizing the efficient use of available resources and avoiding unnecessary duplication of effort.

The Workforce Development Council consists of more than 30 members, with representation from industry; K-12, post-secondary and career and technical education; organized labor; WIOA state workforce partners and local and state elected officials.

LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

As Chair of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council, I am pleased to forward 13 recommendations and two endorsements that the Council believes can help address the greatest workforce challenges faced by the state of North Dakota today and in the coming years. These recommendations fall under four themes that were previously identified in the Council's 2018 Report of Recommendations: earlier and more diverse career exploration and addressing the technical skills gap; removing barriers to employment; occupational licensing reform; and recruitment and retention of North Dakota workers.

Earlier & More Diverse Career Exploration and Addressing the Technical Skills Gap

- **The Council recommends** expanding Area Career & Technology Centers (ACTC) with a total investment of \$45 million to be awarded incrementally to multiple school districts through a competitive grant process to regions that demonstrate commitment to ensuring success through industry alignment and private sector match.
- The Council recommends that the North Dakota Department of Career and Technical Education (NDCTE) and North Dakota Department of Public Instruction (NDDPI) work collaboratively to promote and encourage increased opportunities for career explorations in our schools.
- **The Council recommends** expanding North Dakota Studies curriculum to highlight multiple industries and career opportunities.
- **The Council recommends** the development of a grant program to support the private sector in creating virtual examples of high demand careers in North Dakota for educators and students to access.
- **The Council endorses** utilizing a portion of ND Career Builders funding to promote the program to stakeholders, including businesses, employees, students, parents and educators.

MOMAS - L

Removing Barriers to Employment

- The Council recommends developing a job placement pilot pilot program through a coordinated effort between Job Service North Dakota, Department of Corrections & Rehabilitation, local organizations that serve and support individuals with criminal backgrounds, and employers with a goal of placing recently or soon-to-be released individuals into in-demand positions in North Dakota.
- The Council recommends promoting the existing framework and service provided by the North Dakota Parole and Pardon Advisory Boards to allow individuals with criminal backgrounds participating in the job placement pilot program, as well as people preparing for parole, to have the opportunity to apply for a certificate to demonstrate their readiness for the workplace.
- **The Council recommends** developing a statewide marketing campaign to provide education around hiring individuals with criminal backgrounds with a goal of changing employer perceptions and hiring practices.

Occupational Licensing Reform

- **The Council recommends** removing vague or generic terms, including without limitation the phrases "moral turpitude" and "good character" from licensing board policies.
- **The Council recommends** establishing and making public criminal convictions that will disqualify an applicant from obtaining a license to practice, and implementing a pre-qualification process for applicants who have criminal convictions on their record in order to prevent the unnecessary expense of training and testing if a specific past conviction will disqualify an applicant from receiving a license to practice in North Dakota.
- **The Council recommends** establishing an ongoing system for data collection from licensing boards, commissions, and agencies so future reform efforts can be specific to evolving needs, barriers and opportunities.
- **The Council recommends** clearly defining who qualifies as a military spouse or dependent and including military personnel under the provisions of the military spouse licensure reciprocity bill (SB 2306) passed by the 66th Legislative Assembly.

Recruitment and Retention of Workers

- **The Council recommends** sustaining the Technical Skills Training grant created by the Department of Commerce with \$1 million of Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding. This grant program provides matching dollars to help training providers develop or expand accelerated, skilled workforce training programs in targeted industries and in-demand occupations.
 - The Council endorses the current \$2 million funding allocation for TrainND as determined in the North Dakota Department of Career and Technical Education budget for the 2021-2023 biennium and is supportive of TrainND serving as a key partner in providing training programs under the Technical Skills Training Grant, in addition to the private sector and other training providers.
- **The Council recommends** investing in a workforce recruitment campaign to support targeted industries in attracting workers to the state.








HALO EFFECT OF NORTH DAKOTA TOURISM MARKETING





Chairman Holmberg and members of the Appropriations Committee I am pleased to be able to offer my testimony today on behalf of the Department of Commerce.

The City of Devils Lake respectfully requests that you continue to support the Department of Commerce in their efforts to administer and manage the Renaissance Zone program. Devils Lake has successfully used the Renaissance Zone program to help with the revitalization of our downtown/RZ area over 20 times during the years we have had the RZ. The increased taxable property value for these projects is over \$8 million dollars - a significant increase for a City of our size.

We continue to use this program as one of the tools in our Economic Development incentives toolbox. In the two years I have been Economic Development Director for Devils Lake and Ramsey County, ND it has been a "go-to" incentive to help get buildings bought, refurbished, and used in our downtown revitalization area.

The need for a responsive timely administration team at the Department of Commerce is critical in getting businesses to use the Renaissance Zone program and we thank you in advance for meeting their needs.

Economic Development in rural areas like Devils Lake is difficult - but programs like the Renaissance Zone give rural cities and towns the capability to put incentive packages together that entice and encourage our existing entrepreneurs and would-be entrepreneurs to "take a chance" on a project that normally would not happen. Without these incentives, projects would not get done.

Senator Ray Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Mr. Chairman, my name is Dave Achtenberg and I am employed by Regency Hotel Management. We manage two properties in Bismarck, the Ramkota & Radisson Hotels as well as a property in Fargo. With 35 years in the hospitality business we have never experienced the challenges we have faced in the past ten months. In March when the Pandemic began we furloughed roughly 95% of our workforce company wide and have been slowly ramping back up as demand increases. Hotel occupancy in the Bismarck market has declined from 60.9% in 2019 to 42%in 2020. Total lodging revenue has declined from \$67,182,623.00 in 2019 to \$41,297,867.00 in 2020 in the Bismarck market. Almost all meeting and convention business in 2020 was cancelled and the first half of 2021will be more of the same. The leisure market has begun a small rebound. Industry experts are predicting the rebound in groups and conventions may take 2 to 3 years.

We feel that there has never been a bigger need for increased tourism dollars and fully support the increases in the Governor's proposed budget for the Tourism Division. As lodging revenue has declined we have also seen a sharp decline in lodging tax revenues that fund many of our local Convention and Visitor Bureaus. The competition to attract and retain groups will be intense as many of our neighboring states already out spend us by large margins in Tourism Marketing. Our neighbors to the south doubled down early in the pandemic and enjoyed a fairly good tourist season. I believe the additional funding will benefit our state and local economies and help put people back to work.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Kara Glenn. Silver Fox Pipeline and Facility Services Inc. is dedicated to our community and to growing the local workforce by preserving local jobs with local people who are committed to the community. Long before the pandemic hit, we were trying to figure out how to change the culture of work and keep construction crews here and working through the winter. Every year we go through our ups and downs, where guys and gals who are amazing workers face layoffs and unemployment. Currently, welders go back to their out of state homes when work is slow, and operators are hard to find in the winter.

We posed several questions. What if we could cross train employees that are traditionally seasonal? What if we could have veteran welders teaching and training new welders in the winter? What if experienced dozer operators could give hands on training to new operators? What if we could use this model to grow our local workforce and in doing so, support community resiliency? This is exactly what we did and how Trade Ready was formed. Based on the need to diversify and adapt workforce to the ups and downs, we established a training center and curriculum for safety, structural welding, pipe welding, and heavy equipment operator training.

Our first group of students hit the ground running on October 1st, 2020 in our structural and pipe welding course. Our students are all so unique with their stories and why they are taking the course. It was very important to us for our students to know we wanted them to succeed. From making sure we brought in a bilingual instructor, to finding the instruction time for single moms and dads who wanted to take the course, we have provided every opportunity for success that we could. Current oilfield workers who work nontraditional hours can schedule nontraditional times and take classes.

Students work on real projects such as pig pens, gates, supports and stairs. They also receive their required safety certifications. They receive hands on experience by working hand in hand with seasoned Silver Fox welders and operators, teaching practical skills that apply directly to real oilfield jobs.

We have an 11-student capacity for our both our Structural and Pipe Welding courses and both courses have a max capacity enrollment. All 11 students graduated the Structural portion of the course and moved to the pipe welding portion, 10 of the 11 students have already received jobs in some sort of welding/fabricating capacity. Our students have completed more than 250 hours of hands-on instruction and have completed real projects for companies like John Deere in Williston and Steve Sharp Crane in Watford City.

The Technical Skills Training Grant allowed us to purchase equipment, welding supplies, safety supplies and pipe for our students. We were also able to hold safety courses that are required for workers in the Oil and Gas industry, i.e., PEC Basic, First Aid/CPR and PEC H2S. The Technical Skills Training Grant allowed us to grow and keep our program going giving our students hope when times are rough. The Technical Skills Training Grant and the support of our local officials and community have allowed us to continue with our commitment to providing displaced workers with a new trade to reenter the workforce and keeping workers in North Dakota.

Chairman Ray Holmberg and Senate Appropriations Committee Members

My name is Ray Berry and on behalf of OmniByte Technology, I want to express our support and share a bit of our successes for the ND Workforce Operation Intern Program.

I am a Co-Founder and the CEO of OmniByte founded in 2015. We are a boot strapped company started in Fargo, ND to build a better mobile for field service personnel in the industries we serve like Electrical, HVAC, and Energy.

I have a lot of experience in building a successful internship program in companies starting back in 1998 and in fact I started out as an intern as well. I knew when we started OmniByte in 2015, we would need interns to be able to grow since we were small and had no outside funding. Our first employee at OmniByte in the Winter of 2015 was a Student from NDSU as an intern. Jordan Pansch. In 2015, we were not able to receive support from Operation Intern and that did not stop us from hiring interns.

In our five and a half years in business, OmniByte has had twenty-eight (28) internships. (see attached Addendum) This is made up of twenty-three (23) college students and five (5) unpaid high school STEM students. The majority of our internships have been with NDSU students.

We provide internships in technology, specifically Computer Science and Engineering as well as in Business, Marketing and Sales. We provide real world experiences to students as they learn to become professionals along with what it is like to work for a technology startup. The Operation Interns work on technology projects including software development, research, testing, installations, training and demonstration of solutions.

Without the support of Operation Intern we certainly would have struggled to grow our company in an industry very competitive for technologists. We could not afford top dollar however needed top talent.

Each intern has been important because they add value to our company at a lower cost to the organization not just in wages but benefits. It allows our team to evaluate talent and offer full time positions at OmniByte.

Since the beginning, OmniByte has offered seven (7) student interns full time positions and six (6) accepted. In the 20+ years I have supported internships not all work out but this low-cost access to talent reduces risk as well because at end of intern and transition to Full Time, the chances of it working

out is high and we understand fully that full time turnover is very expensive and impacts companies and teams. Of the 6 interns hired, one was known short-term (Military service) and we still have four of them working for us full-time as well as one paid Operation Intern on staff this semester.

Our goal from beginning, besides our mission to Improve the Safety and Work Lives of Field Service Personnel Through Technology, has been to create a great and successful company here in North Dakota using local talent to build and grow. I have said from the very beginning, the success and growth of OmniByte will be tied at least partially to young talent in the form on student interns as we build our own team.

Of the current fourteen (14) Full-Time employees at OmniByte, four (4) of them started as Interns, three (3) through Operation Intern. Several others have found jobs in North Dakota keeping our talent here in our state. Of those four interns, one of them was our very first paid intern who started with us in 2015.

Please support this bill and program as it not only helps small companies like OmniByte Technology start and grow here in our state, it provides opportunities to our students which otherwise would not exist. Without this program I am certain we would have had less than half the number of internships in the last 5.5 years. This is one of the great ways to keep the talent in North Dakota.

TESTIMONY SENATE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE SENATOR RAY HOLMBERG, CHAIRMAN

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, my name is Jim Poolman, it truly is a pleasure to before the committee again, and it has been a long time since I was here to present the budget for the Insurance Commissioner. It's great to be back, even if it is only virtually.

Since my time as Insurance Commissioner, I have been involved in opening three restaurants, a hotel and other commercial real estate ventures. I wanted use my short time by expressing strong private sector support for the Department of Tourism budget, especially the one time funding for targeted destination marketing. These funds are going to be even more instrumental to get ND businesses a shot in the arm (pardon the pun) as the pandemic, hopefully, fades away to a bad memory. We know, as business owners that marketing dollars are important, and absolutely make a difference in keeping our business, or in this case North Dakota at top of mind for the buying public and will pay dividends for this modest investment.

I am probably not breaking any news to you but want to give you some anecdotal and specific figures about how the pandemic has affected our businesses. I want to be clear, I am not complaining, our businesses are going to be lucky and survive the pandemic, but some won't. I just want to give you an idea of the reality of the hand that's been dealt to us.

During the early stages of the pandemic the Blarney Stone Pubs in Bismarck and West Fargo voluntarily closed before the Governors order, albeit not long because the Governor reacted so quickly, but our goal was to keep our customers as safe as possible. As you can imagine, the revenue decline because of the closure, subsequent capacity limits, social distancing protocols, and the general lack of traffic had a huge negative impact on our business. We injected extra personal capital to make sure employees got paid, payments were paid and we could bridge any gaps on financing.

At our hotel in Bismarck, pre-pandemic we were selling approximately 80 percent of our rooms per night, and even now the average occupancy rates are less than half that at 30 to 40 percent. People have not been traveling, not been eating out at the rate they were pre-pandemic, and certainly not staying in hotels. Both leisure travelers and business travelers are staying home. When the pandemic finally eases, we will certainly need a boost to make sure that North Dakota stays at the forefront of people's minds for a vacation TO North Dakota, or even a North Dakota "staycation" for those that want to support local business.

In my short time with you, I cannot stress enough how important our tourism industry is, and how imperative it is going to be to get kicked back into gear at the right time. Sara and her team have their work cut out for them, and with the additional resources in the Executive Recommendation, it will hopefully provide them the leverage they need to jump start tourism

and our economy post pandemic. The state needs it, your private sector needs it, and the citizens, I believe want it.

Testimony before Senator Holmberg and Appropriations Committee Members, January 25, 2021

Good morning Senator Holmberg and Members of the Committee and thank you for this opportunity. My name is Charley Johnson, and I am the President and CEO of the Fargo-Moorhead-West Fargo Convention and Visitors Bureau. I'm here to wholeheartedly support—as a minimum—the Governor's proposed \$461-thousand increase in the Tourism Division Budget for the Biennium that begins next summer, and his proposal for an additional two-million dollars (\$2,000,000) for destination marketing. I say minimum because even the increase and the one-time marketing fund would still leave North Dakota well short of the tourism spending done by most of our competitors around the country, including those closest to us. The increased state expenditure is even more vital this year, as most of our local destination marketing budgets—largely dependent on the local lodging tax—have been devasted as Covid-19 curtailed all kinds of travel.

Many of you have heard me say this before, but it bears repeating—on their own, tourism & travel are probably the purest form of economic development, since visitors leave their money behind when they go home. But it's well-established that Tourism Marketing also lifts the national and international profile of the entire state, including for purposes of economic and workforce development. Very few people ever decide to move to a state to take a job unless they've had a chance to visit, first, and the visits that influence those decisions to move somewhere don't always come during a specific job search. Sometimes they come during a family vacation, or a trip to a conference, or to a Squirt Hockey Tournament. A visit is the "first date" of an economic relationship. People who visit ND for any reason whatsoever are far more likely to consider working, living, or starting a business here, and make no mistake about it—marketing drives the vast majority of the first visits. You have a great team in the Tourism Division of the Commerce Department, and I believe I can speak for all my travel, tourism and economic development colleagues around the state when I implore you to give them the tools—indeed, the funding—they need to raise North Dakota and all it has to offer to the place it deserves in the national consciousness. I would be delighted to answer any questions, either in person before your committee or via email or a phone call.

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Testimony from Dave Farnsworth, Chair of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council to the North Dakota Senate Appropriations Committee, January 25, 2021

Thank you, Katie, for the introduction.

Chairman Holmberg and Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

As Chair of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council, I would like to provide some insight in the role that the Workforce Development Council serves and focus on its recommendations which the Council feels can most effectively meet the workforce needs of its citizens and advance its economy into the future.

The Workforce Development Council consists of over 30 members, with over half of its members coming from the key private sectors such as Energy, Manufacturing, Value-Added Agriculture, Suppliers, Health Care, and Information Technology. In addition, key stakeholder groups such as Higher Ed, K-12, Organized Labor, Career and Technical Education, Job Services, Vocational Rehabilitation, Commerce, and North Dakota Legislators help to make the Council a dynamic and knowledgeable team for identifying effective ways of meeting North Dakota's workforce needs.

The role of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council is 1) to advise the Governor and the State concerning the nature and extent of workforce development in the context of North Dakota's economic development needs, and 2) how to effectively meet these needs, while optimizing the use of available resources and avoiding unnecessary duplication of effort.

At the end of 2020 the Workforce Development Council issued a report in which the Council provided 13 recommendations and 2 endorsements that the Council strongly feels can help address the greatest workforce challenges that face the State of North Dakota today and in the coming years. These recommendations are built upon those issued in the Council's October 2018 report and further home in on specific actions that will have the biggest impact on addressing the State's workforce needs.

In summary, the recommendations revolved around 4 main areas of emphasis, which are included in your packet of information:

- Earlier & More Diverse Career Exploration and Addressing the Technical Skills Gap.
- Remove Barriers to Employment
- Occupational Licensing Reform
- Recruitment and Retention of Workers

In its deliberations this session, I know this Committee will be faced with a great array of requests and needs from many groups and citizens. I also know that growing and diversifying the State's economy and tax base is foremost in the Committee's mind. I would encourage the Committee members to look at those portions of the Commerce budget that will address the workforce needs the Council has identified and move them forward.

Access Point Technologies EP is a medical technology company focused on the treatment of cardiac arrhythmias. HQ in Rogers MN since 2003, the company manufactures and sells highly specialized catheters in more than 20 countries including, Japan, Korea and the USA. We partner with world leading physicians to identify unmet device needs in their field and then develop solutions they can use to improve the care for their patients.

Our company leadership team are named inventors on more than 100 issued US patents and have brought many medical devices to market. We understand how to take a project from concept & napkin sketch through the design, prototype, testing and commercialization process. As you all know, there are significant costs associated with taking an early-stage concept into a device that is ready for the market. The most significant barrier to efficient medical device development is access to the capital required to bring devices quickly through this design, development, and regulatory clearance.

We were attracted to ND by the LIFT funding program. This program helped us close a significant gap and fund testing and new technology development to move a new cryo technology forward. We are excited to expand our business in ND with the support of the commerce department programs, both because of programs like LIFT and because of the strong level of engineering talent coming out of the ND colleges. We initially planned to lease space in existing facilities but decided to make the commitment to purchase and build a custom facility for our Med Device R&D center in Horace ND. Let me be clear, we would not have made that commitment without the LIFT program funding.

We expect our new facility in Horace to be the cornerstone of a medical device development campus where we plan to design and develop several new systems and devices which we will plan to initiate in 2021 and 2022. These additional projects will also require funding and we hope and anticipate that the environment in ND will continue to support the development of these programs as we expand our base of operations in the coming months and years.

Testimony Senate Appropriations Committee Senator Ray Holmberg, Chairman

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Tyler Demars and I am the Program Director for the IDEA Center at CTB – one of four ND Certified Entrepreneurial Centers. The IDEA Center is located right here in Bismarck-Mandan and supports entrepreneurs across our state, focusing on Central and Western ND.

I am here speaking in support of funding Entrepreneurship Program Grant initiatives, specifically related to the Innovate ND program.

Entrepreneur Grants through Innovate ND is a high impact program with goals of diversifying ND's economy through entrepreneurship and innovation. The program has a strong track record of being successful, creating jobs and new revenue for ND, while supporting new ideas, innovation, and scale-able business startups.

Each of the four Certified Entrepreneurial Centers (located in Bismarck, Grand Forks, Fargo, and Jamestown) provide technical assistance to Innovate ND Clients and Program Grant Recipients all while carving out specific niches to remove chances of duplicative services which in turn promotes collaboration amongst the centers. Additionally, Innovate ND provides grant funding to entrepreneurs supporting prototyping, technology development, marketing strategy development, and intellectual property protection.

In our center at CTB we have 30 clients currently enrolled and have supported 60 Innovate ND clients in the current biennium. The entrepreneurs that we've assisted and surveyed over the past 2 years report that they have generated 52 FTE jobs and generated gross revenues totaling more than \$9 Million dollars. Again, these results are from our center alone and do not include results from the good work being done by our counterpart entrepreneurial centers and their clients in Grand Forks, Fargo, and Jamestown.

The funding support we receive through Innovate ND allows us to drive value beyond the work of our Innovate ND clients. Our team at CTB operates a full-service entrepreneurship center supported by a large referral resource partner network to minimize any duplicative services.

Our services include:

 Business advising available to all entrepreneurs and small business owners as they develop from idea stage to commercialization including coaching related to prototyping, market research, protecting intellectual property, operations planning, financial management, operational assistance, and access to capital.

- A full incubation space that allows new entrepreneurs affordable office space and professional amenities
- Conference room rental space for trainings, meetings, co-working spaces, and other business development activities
- Collaboration within our resource partner network to grow a thriving and supportive startup ecosystem primarily as lead organizers of 1 Million Cups Bismarck & Mandan and TEDx Bismarck. This ecosystem development work allows us to maintain a large, diverse network of mentors and experienced professional service providers that we leverage in support of our clients. We pride ourselves on helping our clients develop the supportive relationships and network needed to give them the best chance of success.

"The centers support success stories and entrepreneurial ambassadors which are critical to a strong startup ecosystem."

In closing, Entrepreneur Grants for InnovateND and Entrepreneurship Centers is one of the most successful Commerce programs and most importantly it impacts more entrepreneurs (emerging employers) than any other program. Thank you for your time and consideration to continue stable funding for Entrepreneur Grants and the Entrepreneurship Centers that provide the assistance.

Senate Bill 2018 Testimony of Ron Ness Senate Appropriations January 25, 2021

Chairman Holmberg and members of the Committee, my name is Ron Ness, president of the North Dakota Petroleum Council. The North Dakota Petroleum Council represents more than 650 companies in all aspects of the oil and gas industry, including oil and gas production, refining, pipeline, transportation, mineral leasing, consulting, legal work, and oilfield service activities in North Dakota. I appear before you today in support of Senate Bill 2018.

I am glad to stand in support of the Department of Commerce budget. The North Dakota economy and the business community has certainly taken a significant hit the past ten months and indications from the recent actions by the Biden Administration should be a warning sign of great challenges ahead. Nearly a year ago, the energy industry through the Empower Commission began discussing the tremendous shift that was occurring in investment firms, banks and various funds across the nation and globe in relation to investing in energy. Actions taken by the Trump Administration as recently as this January were efforts to stop the discriminatory lending practices that are becoming common practice of large banks refusing to provide financial backing to fossil fuel developers. The Department of Commerce was quick to engage and embrace the challenges facing our state's top industry and was extremely supportive in educating policy makers and the public on this challenge. North Dakota's economy has a long history of riding the up and downs of a market-based commodity economy, our state is going to face challenges and need innovation and diversification, Commerce plays a critical component in business attraction, retention, and growth. I urge you to find and adequately fund the divisions of Commerce that support our state's business community and our state's great future.

We therefore urge a **Do Pass** on Senate Bill 2018. I would be happy to answer any questions.

Testimony from Thomas Swoyer, Jr Grand Sky Development Company LLC

Good Morning Chairman Holmberg and members of the committee. Thank you for the opportunity to be with you virtually. My name is Thomas Swoyer, Jr and I am the President of Grand Sky Development Company. I am with you today to advocate for continued investment in infrastructure at Grand Sky. My colleagues that have spoken before me and those that will speak after me will offer examples of success and opportunity in the Unmanned Systems industry in North Dakota and I appreciate this opportunity to share Grand Sky's story today.

Grand Sky is a public/private partnership between the US Air Force, Grand Forks County and my group, the Grand Sky Development Company. Together we have executed a 50-year agreement to develop 217 acres on Grand Forks AFB and turn it in to a state-of-the-art, commercial Unmanned Aircraft Airport and Business Park. Grand Sky is one of the only places that supports the commercial development and operations of the largest unmanned aircraft in the world. We're focused on developing the capabilities needed to support flight operations that span not only the upper plains but the entire United States. More recently, Grand Sky has supported international operations and has contributed to the growing national and international reputation of North Dakota's UAS industry. In fact, just this morning, in support of the North Dakota Trade Office, many of us joined in an hour-long pitch to representatives of over 50 European based companies looking for a place in the United States to bring their business. This October will mark the 10th anniversary of the Grand Sky's beginning. Over the past 10 years of our shared journey we have seen some incredible successes, but those successes would not have been possible if not for the investment in infrastructure from the State of North Dakota.

Last year, Grand Sky celebrated many successes, but I want to share two with you. Over the summer, Northrop Grumman conducted 10-weeks of flight test for their Firebird aircraft. This effort brought over 40 people representing multiple companies from around the United States. This team came to Grand Sky for more than 10 weeks of non-stop flight activity. While the pandemic ravaged many local businesses this flight test effort supported over 2,000 room nights and tens of thousands of dollars of catering that supported struggling restaurants. While hotel rooms and catering are all great, the real upside was the multiple federal agencies that came to Grand Forks to see the flight tests but left knowing that Grand Sky is a world-class test and evaluation center and will be looked to in the future for other flight tests.

Another important success revolves around the training of pilots and sensor operators for our NATO allies. Members of the Royal British Air Force came to Grand Sky to conduct multiple training classes. Word of the efficacy of these training sessions have resulted in agreements to bring members of the Air Forces of Belgium, Italy, Spain, India, Taiwan and Japan for weeks of training in 2021. The point I want you to leave with is that tests like this will renew in 2021 with the first flights scheduled in February. More training results in more investment in simulators, hangars, classrooms and other buildings to support it all. The investments made to date in Grand Sky are yielding consistent economic benefits for North Dakota.

The Firebird flight tests, and NATO training efforts are examples contributing to the larger economic development story. There are three key economic development metrics that I'd like to share with you. So far, Grand Sky produces roughly \$19.3M per year in wages from direct, indirect

and induced business activity. Roughly 175 people report to Grand Sky every day for work with another 167 that indirectly support Grand Sky. Another 400-600 people per year come to Grand Sky for training, official visits, flight operations and other reasons. These visits are as short as 2 or 3 days or, as we saw with the Firebird example, as long as 10 weeks or more. Perhaps the most important economic metric is the ratio of public to private investment at Grand Sky. We are grateful for the Legislature's vision and desire to invest in Grand Sky over the past decade. Over those 10 years, the Legislature has seen fit to appropriate \$21 million for infrastructure at Grand Sky. That investment has been used to repair and replace aircraft aprons, and to install new roads, electric lines, natural gas, water and sewer and security infrastructure necessary to attract the private sector investment that brings the jobs and economic activity. It is very important to note that none of the State's investment has gone to support private buildings. The appropriations have been used for investing in infrastructure like roads, utilities, aprons and similar necessities. The \$21M that has been appropriated has resulted in roughly \$70M in private sector investment in offices, hangars, labs, flight infrastructure and security. Grand Sky has leveraged more than \$3 of private sector investment for every \$1 of state investment. The benefit of the State's investment in Grand Sky is economic activity, jobs and private sector leverage. None of this is possible without the investment in the underlying infrastructure.

The final element that I would like to leave you with is an understanding of where we are headed. Grand Sky is growing. The funding we are requesting will go to extending infrastructure into the park to create more developable area. Grand Sky is moving into a new development phase. We have leased 35 of the 40 developable acres that have access to the runway, we need to create more. We are about to complete construction of our newest asset, our Multi-Tenant building called MT1. Grand Sky Development Company is the equity investor in MT1 which began in autumn of 2019 and is almost complete. While its not yet ready to move in, we have already executed tenant leases for three of its eight suites and are in negotiation with a single tenant for the remaining five. The \$7 million building will be totally leased up before it is complete. We're already planning for MT2 and MT3 and both of our anchor tenants have expansion plans to add more hangars, training space and other assets that will bring more flight test work, more employment and more business to North Dakota.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

I am Nicholas Flom, Executive Director of the Northern Plains Unmanned Aircraft Systems Test Site (NPUASTS). I have been the Executive Director since November of 2016 and have been a part of the Test Site since early 2014. I am testifying today in support of the Governor's funding request for the Unmanned Aircraft Systems Program under the Department of Commerce.

Background

On February 14, 2012 the Federal Aviation Administration Modernization and Reform Act (FMRA) was signed into law. This legislation required the FAA to choose six UAS National Test Sites (NTS). The NPUASTS was selected as one of six Test Sites on December 30, 2013 by the FAA following a nation-wide competition. The FAA Reauthorization Act of 2018 was passed by Congress on October 3, 2018 and signed by President Trump on October 5, 2018. This Act extends Congress's mandate to the FAA to continue the Test Site program through September 30, 2023.

Through an Executive Memorandum, on October 25th, 2017, President Trump directed U.S. Secretary of Transportation Elaine Chao to launch an initiative to safely test and validate advanced operations for drones in partnership with state and local governments in select jurisdictions. This UAS Integration Pilot Program (IPP) implements a directive with results that will be used to accelerate the safe integration of UAS into the national airspace and to realize the benefits of unmanned technology in our economy. The NPUASTS supported the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT), who was the lead applicant, on behalf of the state of North Dakota by providing our industry knowledge and industry to partners to participant on the team. Our strategy was to leverage the entire state of North Dakota and apply as a single state entity including state government, local communities and North Dakota's tribal nations. On October 25, 2020, the UAS IPP sunset, but on October 26, 2020 a new program called BEYOND was launched by the FAA. The BEYOND program continues the partnerships with eight of the nine IPP participants. BEYOND will focus on operating under established rules rather than waivers, collecting data to develop performance-based standards, collecting and addressing community feedback and understanding the societal and community benefits, and to streamline the approval processes for UAS integration.

The NPUASTS continues to be a leader in UAS both at industry and federal levels thanks in part to resources previously committed by North Dakota. We strive to continue to develop the commercial UAS industry and promote economic development in North Dakota. To meet the industry demands, the NPUASTS has been able to provide a research outlet while showing a direct path to commercialization.

Since there is no operational funding from the FAA for the NTS program, North Dakota's ability to maintain being a leader in the UAS industry would be dramatically diminished without state support. Therefore, the NPUASTS, in conjunction with the Governor, encourage you to continue to support the Unmanned Aircraft Systems Program proposed in Senate Bill No. 2018.

Northern Plains UAS Test Site

North Dakota, under the umbrella of the Department of Commerce, is one of seven states designated as a Test Site. The NPUASTS is comprised of formal team members including the University of North Dakota (UND); North Dakota State University (NDSU); the North Dakota Department of Commerce; the North Dakota Aeronautics Commission; and the Office of the Adjutant General. Additionally, we have participation from the North Dakota Department of Transportation and North Dakota Information Technology Department. The Northern Plains Unmanned Systems Authority, created by an executive order of the Governor on May 28, 2013, oversees the NPUASTS. The Authority is chaired by the Lieutenant Governor and is comprised of representation by the principle leadership of each team member as well as a representative from the North Dakota Aviation Council.

Status of the NPUASTS

The NPUASTS has continued to maintain a steady flow of work and contracts over this biennium. The private UAS industry is continuing to thrive. We are continuing to support Xcel Energy as they fly UAS this summer to inspect their transmission lines beyond visual line of sight. This summer they will fly about 3,000 miles of transmission line with a UAS and last summer about 2,500 miles. Having strong partners and working closely with the FAA to continue to move the ball forward has made for a steady 2020 even with the challenges of COVID-19.

As you are probably aware, in May of 2017 Governor Burgum designated myself as co-chair of the state's UAS Detection/Counter-UAS Task Force. The purpose of this Task Force was to explore government, business and research opportunities in this rapidly evolving field while also working to accommodate UAS operators who want to test UAS detection and countermeasures in North Dakota. Because of this pursuit, we have supported Customs and Border Protection with a project to detect low flying UAS and airplanes flying over the Canadian border in Northgate, ND in 2020 and in 2019 supported a similar operation at West Hope, ND. We are also entered into long term support contract with the Department of Homeland Security to test the detection of low flying UAS at Camp Grafton in early 2021 with more locations to follow later this spring.

The NPUASTS is also being recognized on a national level for our accomplishments and industry leadership. We represent the UAS Test Site program on the FAA's Unmanned Aircraft Safety Team which is an industry-government partnership committed to ensuring the safe operation of UAS. We have also been able promote UAS in North Dakota by speaking at many national events including AUVSI's Xponential event which has attendance that exceeds 8,000 people. Even with the many conferences going virtual in 2020, the NPUASTS participated in many virtual panels and presented on the great work that is being accomplished in North Dakota.

Economic Impact

On December 28, 2020, the U.S. DOT issued two new drone rules to advance safety and innovation. The UAS industry is still rapidly growing and we have seen incredible advancements in the last 2

years. The FAA issued their first drone delivery certification in 2019 and in 2020 they released a list of 10 companies that are close to completing the certification process which will allow for more advanced operations following regulation and not being issued through waiver or exemption. North Dakota continues to play a key role in these advancements. One example is the leading effort that NPUASTS took to make operations over people with a parachute a standard approval. These approvals were pursued by the NPUASTS with the FAA and it benefits the entire UAS industry. By all accounts, UAS hold tremendous potential to serve the benefit of mankind in countless ways by creating lasting jobs, diversifying our economy, and further advancing North Dakota as a leader in technology and innovation. This is an area of economic development worthy of continued pursuit with everything that North Dakota has to offer this industry.

The NPUASTS continues to be the epicenter of UAS activities in North Dakota. Our role continues to promote and market the state's UAS activities and support private industry's research needs while pursuing opportunities to advance UAS efforts. In the cases where the Test Site does not have a direct role in a particular UAS endeavor, we believe many UAS operations are indirectly benefited from the North Dakota having a Test Site.

The types of economic impact that the NPUASTS provides to North Dakota includes support to multiple agencies, companies, events and personnel including:

Privately Funded Projects

Over the past two years, two major things have happened in regards to privately funded projects. The first is that we are seeing a great influx of the number of companies that are coming to us directly to work on their initiatives. Secondly, these projects are larger and have longer timelines associated with them. We are attracting companies from out of state to work in North Dakota because of the capabilities we possess like the ability to fly beyond visual line of sight and our reputation with the FAA.

- Federally Funded Projects

Our Federally funded projects have really expanded of the past 2 years. We have worked directly for Customs and Border Protection, Department of Defense, FAA, and Department of Homeland Security. These projects not only benefit NPUASTS, but the benefit the North Dakota UAS ecosystem. Each Federal contract requires many subcontracts to be issued to North Dakota UAS operators, technology providers who are exposed to North Dakota's capabilities and our research universities. The relationships that the NPUASTS has gained with our Federal partners is truly paying dividends and is creating long term agreements with them.

- FAA University Research

The NPUASTS is an industry partner that is affiliated with a core research university member, University of North Dakota, with the Alliance for System Safety of UAS through Research Excellence (ASSURE) Coalition under the FAA's UAS Center of Excellence program. We are currently under contract to participate on 4 projects under this program.

- UAS Integration Pilot Program/BEYOND

O The UAS IPP has provided collaboration opportunities to not only the state of North Dakota but also to our partners that are a part of the program. The UAS IPP has been able to support the flooding in the Red River Valley in both 2019 and 2020. The collaboration between NPUASTS and NDDOT has only gotten stronger and become incredible partners. NDDOT has grown their UAS division with the support from the NPUASTS. The UAS IPP has also supported our first responders in the state and multiple state agencies to achieve advanced UAS approvals like the ability to fly over

people. This program has since sunset, but a new initiative called BEYOND is now in its place. With the Department of Transportation, we will continue to work to commercialize UAS in North Dakota through this program.

Current Budget Status (2019-21)

The 66th Legislative Assembly appropriated a total of \$2,000,000, which included \$760,628 of carry-over from the 2017-2019 biennium funds, to support North Dakota's UAS program during the 2019-20121 biennium. The \$2,760,628 estimated operating budget for the NPUASTS for the 2019-2021 biennium relied heavily on external revenue from both private industry and Federal partners.

Even with the tough budget cuts made during this past legislative session, we believe that continued support to the Test Site program shows the dedication to UAS in North Dakota. This is important, as many other states across the country are trying hard to replicate our successes. The funds appropriated were used to support our personnel expenses, operating costs, equipment and our subcontractors. The Test Site is also starting to see a steady flow of private and Federal funding opportunities, which allows us to not fully rely 100% on our appropriated dollars.

The NPUASTS was able to take the \$2,760,628 from the state legislators and leverage that into an additional \$5,662,988 through external contracts to have a two budget of \$8,339,615. These external contracts allows us to bring on personnel to support operations that are not reliant on the appropriations. The state also has been able to acquire almost \$250,000 worth of equipment through these contracts. Most importantly is how the NPUASTS supports the ecosystem in North Dakota. We have \$2,444,324 under contract to 20 subcontractors to support operations. Of the 20 subcontractors, 16 of them are North Dakota companies.

2021-23 Biennial Budget Overview

The projected operating budget for the NPUASTS during the 2021-2023 biennium is estimated at \$3,000,000. The Governor's budget recommendation of \$2,000,000 plus the carry-over of unexpended 2019-2021 biennium funds would make it challenging to operate the NPUASTS during the coming biennium. Currently, the anticipated carry-over from the 2019-2021 biennium is between \$0 and \$150,000 which would potentially put a 28% reduction in the biennium budget compared to 2019-2021. The 2019-2021 included approximately \$500,000 of carry-over, which is not available this time. The request for \$3,000,000 would assure that the NPUASTS can continue to support other state agencies and their UAS initiatives and will allow the NPUASTS budget to maintain personnel between projects. Even with the challenges from April through July of 2020 associated with COVID-19, the NPUASTS was able to maintain our 2019-2021 budget that relied heavily on the challenges of external funding.

With the Test Site program extended through Congress until September of 2023, we are anticipating that these next few years will be key in our national efforts in UAS. As a result of receiving additional state funding to continue supporting baseline operations of the NPUASTS, we will be able to expand our already strong position in the national UAS integration efforts and stay ahead of the other states that have recognized the benefits of investing into UAS. The Test Site has had great success and we continue to find new and innovative ways to support industry by providing capabilities that cannot be found elsewhere. Even with our current successes, there are many opportunities in this space that we are just now trying to capture that will ensure our success in the years to come.

In 2020, the United States Air Force launched an initiative called Agility Prime. The purpose of Agility Prime was to bring together academia, private industry and the federal government to help bring their concept of advanced mobility and cargo delivery a reality. Since the inception of this program, the NPUASTS has been awarded three contracts and believe that leveraging Vantis for future efforts will solidify North Dakota's position as a leader for the DOD.

Without a doubt, the state of North Dakota is known as a leader in UAS. Our research universities, technical colleges, and even high schools help promote UAS for the state. UAS has been recognized by private industry as a way to save cost by increasing productivity and obtaining actionable data. The NPUASTS wants to make sure that all state agencies understand the benefits that UAS can bring to their organization. If that means NDDOT using UAS for infrastructure inspections or road condition analysis or ND Game and Fish using this technology to increase the effectiveness of their inspections, we want to enable this. We believe that with state agencies having full access to the Test Site for training, subject matter expertise, or even operations, we can help provide efficiencies to help save costs and increase productivity.

This past summer we demonstrated the ultimate value of North Dakota's UAS ecosystem. In August of 2020, Northrop Grumman flew their Firebird UAS out of the Grand Sky UAS Business Park with the NPUASTS getting the appropriate airspace approval to fly beyond visual line of sight without the use of a chase aircraft. This flight was originally going to be done at the DOD's Yuma Proving Ground in Arizona but was not going to get the priority it needed. Northrop Grumman reached out to the NPUASTS to conduct these endurance flights in North Dakota. The Firebird performed more than 70 hours of flights in 7 days, including nighttime operations. Firebird flew more than 36 hours in a single 38-hour period, with the first leg alone stretching more than 25 hours.

As I have alluded earlier, we are recognized leaders in UAS. Other states are taking notice and want to replicate what North Dakota has created. Without state resources to support the NPUASTS, North Dakota's economic development opportunities in the UAS arena would be adversely impacted. In order to continue our momentum and remain in a nationally recognized leadership position in UAS, we urge your full support of the Governor's request for the NPUASTS in Senate Bill No. 2018.

Mr. Chairman that completes my testimony. I ask for your favorable support of Senate Bill No. 2018 and I will be glad to answer any questions.

Testimony from Dave Farnsworth, Chair of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council to the North Dakota Senate Appropriations Committee, January 25, 2021

Thank you, Katie, for the introduction.

Chairman Holmberg and Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

As Chair of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council, I would like to provide some insight in the role that the Workforce Development Council serves and focus on its recommendations which the Council feels can most effectively meet the workforce needs of its citizens and advance its economy into the future.

The Workforce Development Council consists of over 30 members, with over half of its members coming from the key private sectors such as Energy, Manufacturing, Value-Added Agriculture, Suppliers, Health Care, and Information Technology. In addition, key stakeholder groups such as Higher Ed, K-12, Organized Labor, Career and Technical Education, Job Services, Vocational Rehabilitation, Commerce, and North Dakota Legislators help to make the Council a dynamic and knowledgeable team for identifying effective ways of meeting North Dakota's workforce needs.

The role of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council is 1) to advise the Governor and the State concerning the nature and extent of workforce development in the context of North Dakota's economic development needs, and 2) how to effectively meet these needs, while optimizing the use of available resources and avoiding unnecessary duplication of effort.

At the end of 2020 the Workforce Development Council issued a report in which the Council provided 13 recommendations and 2 endorsements that the Council strongly feels can help address the greatest workforce challenges that face the State of North Dakota today and in the coming years. These recommendations are built upon those issued in the Council's October 2018 report and further home in on specific actions that will have the biggest impact on addressing the State's workforce needs.

In summary, the recommendations revolved around 4 main areas of emphasis, which are included in your packet of information:

- Earlier & More Diverse Career Exploration and Addressing the Technical Skills Gap.
- Remove Barriers to Employment
- Occupational Licensing Reform
- Recruitment and Retention of Workers

In its deliberations this session, I know this Committee will be faced with a great array of requests and needs from many groups and citizens. I also know that growing and diversifying the State's economy and tax base is foremost in the Committee's mind. I would encourage the Committee members to look at those portions of the Commerce budget that will address the workforce needs the Council has identified and move them forward.

Chairman Ray Holmberg and Senate Appropriations Committee Members

My name is Ray Berry and on behalf of OmniByte Technology, I want to express our support and share a bit of our successes for the ND Workforce Operation Intern Program.

I am a Co-Founder and the CEO of OmniByte founded in 2015. We are a boot strapped company started in Fargo, ND to build a better mobile for field service personnel in the industries we serve like Electrical, HVAC, and Energy.

I have a lot of experience in building a successful internship program in companies starting back in 1998 and in fact I started out as an intern as well. I knew when we started OmniByte in 2015, we would need interns to be able to grow since we were small and had no outside funding. Our first employee at OmniByte in the Winter of 2015 was a Student from NDSU as an intern. Jordan Pansch. In 2015, we were not able to receive support from Operation Intern and that did not stop us from hiring interns.

In our five and a half years in business, OmniByte has had twenty-eight (28) internships. (see attached Addendum) This is made up of twenty-three (23) college students and five (5) unpaid high school STEM students. The majority of our internships have been with NDSU students.

We provide internships in technology, specifically Computer Science and Engineering as well as in Business, Marketing and Sales. We provide real world experiences to students as they learn to become professionals along with what it is like to work for a technology startup. The Operation Interns work on technology projects including software development, research, testing, installations, training and demonstration of solutions.

Without the support of Operation Intern we certainly would have struggled to grow our company in an industry very competitive for technologists. We could not afford top dollar however needed top talent.

Each intern has been important because they add value to our company at a lower cost to the organization not just in wages but benefits. It allows our team to evaluate talent and offer full time positions at OmniByte.

Since the beginning, OmniByte has offered seven (7) student interns full time positions and six (6) accepted. In the 20+ years I have supported internships not all work out but this low-cost access to talent reduces risk as well because at end of intern and transition to Full Time, the chances of it working

out is high and we understand fully that full time turnover is very expensive and impacts companies and teams. Of the 6 interns hired, one was known short-term (Military service) and we still have four of them working for us full-time as well as one paid Operation Intern on staff this semester.

Our goal from beginning, besides our mission to Improve the Safety and Work Lives of Field Service Personnel Through Technology, has been to create a great and successful company here in North Dakota using local talent to build and grow. I have said from the very beginning, the success and growth of OmniByte will be tied at least partially to young talent in the form on student interns as we build our own team.

Of the current fourteen (14) Full-Time employees at OmniByte, four (4) of them started as Interns, three (3) through Operation Intern. Several others have found jobs in North Dakota keeping our talent here in our state. Of those four interns, one of them was our very first paid intern who started with us in 2015.

Please support this bill and program as it not only helps small companies like OmniByte Technology start and grow here in our state, it provides opportunities to our students which otherwise would not exist. Without this program I am certain we would have had less than half the number of internships in the last 5.5 years. This is one of the great ways to keep the talent in North Dakota.



TESTIMONY SENATE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE SENATOR RAY HOLMBERG, CHAIRMAN

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, my name is Jim Poolman, it truly is a pleasure to before the committee again, and it has been a long time since I was here to present the budget for the Insurance Commissioner. It's great to be back, even if it is only virtually.

Since my time as Insurance Commissioner, I have been involved in opening three restaurants, a hotel and other commercial real estate ventures. I wanted use my short time by expressing strong private sector support for the Department of Tourism budget, especially the one time funding for targeted destination marketing. These funds are going to be even more instrumental to get ND businesses a shot in the arm (pardon the pun) as the pandemic, hopefully, fades away to a bad memory. We know, as business owners that marketing dollars are important, and absolutely make a difference in keeping our business, or in this case North Dakota at top of mind for the buying public and will pay dividends for this modest investment.

I am probably not breaking any news to you but want to give you some anecdotal and specific figures about how the pandemic has affected our businesses. I want to be clear, I am not complaining, our businesses are going to be lucky and survive the pandemic, but some won't. I just want to give you an idea of the reality of the hand that's been dealt to us.

During the early stages of the pandemic the Blarney Stone Pubs in Bismarck and West Fargo voluntarily closed before the Governors order, albeit not long because the Governor reacted so quickly, but our goal was to keep our customers as safe as possible. As you can imagine, the revenue decline because of the closure, subsequent capacity limits, social distancing protocols, and the general lack of traffic had a huge negative impact on our business. We injected extra personal capital to make sure employees got paid, payments were paid and we could bridge any gaps on financing.

At our hotel in Bismarck, pre-pandemic we were selling approximately 80 percent of our rooms per night, and even now the average occupancy rates are less than half that at 30 to 40 percent. People have not been traveling, not been eating out at the rate they were pre-pandemic, and certainly not staying in hotels. Both leisure travelers and business travelers are staying home. When the pandemic finally eases, we will certainly need a boost to make sure that North Dakota stays at the forefront of people's minds for a vacation TO North Dakota, or even a North Dakota "staycation" for those that want to support local business.

In my short time with you, I cannot stress enough how important our tourism industry is, and how imperative it is going to be to get kicked back into gear at the right time. Sara and her team have their work cut out for them, and with the additional resources in the Executive Recommendation, it will hopefully provide them the leverage they need to jump start tourism

and our economy post pandemic. The state needs it, your private sector needs it, and the citizens, I believe want it.

Testimony before Senator Holmberg and Appropriations Committee Members, January 25, 2021

Good morning Senator Holmberg and Members of the Committee and thank you for this opportunity. My name is Charley Johnson, and I am the President and CEO of the Fargo-Moorhead-West Fargo Convention and Visitors Bureau. I'm here to wholeheartedly support—as a minimum—the Governor's proposed \$461-thousand increase in the Tourism Division Budget for the Biennium that begins next summer, and his proposal for an additional two-million dollars (\$2,000,000) for destination marketing. I say minimum because even the increase and the one-time marketing fund would still leave North Dakota well short of the tourism spending done by most of our competitors around the country, including those closest to us. The increased state expenditure is even more vital this year, as most of our local destination marketing budgets—largely dependent on the local lodging tax—have been devasted as Covid-19 curtailed all kinds of travel.

Many of you have heard me say this before, but it bears repeating—on their own, tourism & travel are probably the purest form of economic development, since visitors leave their money behind when they go home. But it's well-established that Tourism Marketing also lifts the national and international profile of the entire state, including for purposes of economic and workforce development. Very few people ever decide to move to a state to take a job unless they've had a chance to visit, first, and the visits that influence those decisions to move somewhere don't always come during a specific job search. Sometimes they come during a family vacation, or a trip to a conference, or to a Squirt Hockey Tournament. A visit is the "first date" of an economic relationship. People who visit ND for any reason whatsoever are far more likely to consider working, living, or starting a business here, and make no mistake about it—marketing drives the vast majority of the first visits. You have a great team in the Tourism Division of the Commerce Department, and I believe I can speak for all my travel, tourism and economic development colleagues around the state when I implore you to give them the tools—indeed, the funding—they need to raise North Dakota and all it has to offer to the place it deserves in the national consciousness. I am submitting testimony on behalf of Eric Bartsch of AGT Foods for SB 2018 below. Please let me know if you need additional information. Thanks so much!

"Members of the committee. On behalf of AGT I am writing this to express the impact that the intermodal ramp established in Minot has had on AGT as a company and will have on the regions economy. AGT is a value added process of pulse crops producing products such as pulse proteins, starch's and fibers in addition to pulse based pasta, texturized protein and specialty flours. The market for our products is growing quickly not only in North America but globally. Prior to October of 2020 in order to ship value added goods by ocean container that we are producing in Minot we had the extra costs to dray the material from Minot to either Winnipeg or Regina to ship the goods by containers to destinations around the world. This extra costs at times limited our ability to be competitive and in general lowered the value of our goods that we are producing in Minot. With the introduction of containers in Minot we are now more competitive to ship our goods from ND to Asia which provide a base for our company to continue developing our value added presence in North Dakota. Without the port it makes it challenging to continue investing in further added production at our Minot plant. They key to value added products is the ability to move the goods from origin to destination and maintain the IP of the product. Overall the port will have a positive impact on ND's ability to expand its value added presence as it provides a tool for producers to move their goods from ND to the rest of the world. Without this key competent it makes it very difficult for the state to attract further value added investment in ND."

Access Point Technologies EP is a medical technology company focused on the treatment of cardiac arrhythmias. HQ in Rogers MN since 2003, the company manufactures and sells highly specialized catheters in more than 20 countries including, Japan, Korea and the USA. We partner with world leading physicians to identify unmet device needs in their field and then develop solutions they can use to improve the care for their patients.

Our company leadership team are named inventors on more than 100 issued US patents and have brought many medical devices to market. We understand how to take a project from concept & napkin sketch through the design, prototype, testing and commercialization process. As you all know, there are significant costs associated with taking an early-stage concept into a device that is ready for the market. The most significant barrier to efficient medical device development is access to the capital required to bring devices quickly through this design, development, and regulatory clearance.

We were attracted to ND by the LIFT funding program. This program helped us close a significant gap and fund testing and new technology development to move a new cryo technology forward. We are excited to expand our business in ND with the support of the commerce department programs, both because of programs like LIFT and because of the strong level of engineering talent coming out of the ND colleges. We initially planned to lease space in existing facilities but decided to make the commitment to purchase and build a custom facility for our Med Device R&D center in Horace ND. Let me be clear, we would not have made that commitment without the LIFT program funding.

We expect our new facility in Horace to be the cornerstone of a medical device development campus where we plan to design and develop several new systems and devices which we will plan to initiate in 2021 and 2022. These additional projects will also require funding and we hope and anticipate that the environment in ND will continue to support the development of these programs as we expand our base of operations in the coming months and years.

Given enough revenue and a successful business strategy, as well as the perseverance and dedication of investors, Checkable Medical will eventually grow into a "tree" from the LIFT seed funding offered to our company provided by the great state of North Dakota.

Testimony Senate Appropriations Committee Senator Ray Holmberg, Chairman

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Tyler Demars and I am the Program Director for the IDEA Center at CTB – one of four ND Certified Entrepreneurial Centers. The IDEA Center is located right here in Bismarck-Mandan and supports entrepreneurs across our state, focusing on Central and Western ND.

I am here speaking in support of funding Entrepreneurship Program Grant initiatives, specifically related to the Innovate ND program.

Entrepreneur Grants through Innovate ND is a high impact program with goals of diversifying ND's economy through entrepreneurship and innovation. The program has a strong track record of being successful, creating jobs and new revenue for ND, while supporting new ideas, innovation, and scale-able business startups.

Each of the four Certified Entrepreneurial Centers (located in Bismarck, Grand Forks, Fargo, and Jamestown) provide technical assistance to Innovate ND Clients and Program Grant Recipients all while carving out specific niches to remove chances of duplicative services which in turn promotes collaboration amongst the centers. Additionally, Innovate ND provides grant funding to entrepreneurs supporting prototyping, technology development, marketing strategy development, and intellectual property protection.

In our center at CTB we have 30 clients currently enrolled and have supported 60 Innovate ND clients in the current biennium. The entrepreneurs that we've assisted and surveyed over the past 2 years report that they have generated 52 FTE jobs and generated gross revenues totaling more than \$9 Million dollars. - A full incubation space that allows new entrepreneurs affordable office space and professional amenities
- Conference room rental space for trainings, meetings, co-working spaces, and other business development activities
- Collaboration within our resource partner network to grow a thriving and supportive startup ecosystem primarily as lead organizers of 1 Million Cups Bismarck & Mandan and TEDx Bismarck. This ecosystem development work allows us to maintain a large, diverse network of mentors and experienced professional service providers that we leverage in support of our clients. We pride ourselves on helping our clients develop the supportive relationships and network needed to give them the best chance of success.

Testimony from Thomas Swoyer, Jr Grand Sky Development Company LLC

Good Morning Chairman Holmberg and members of the committee. Thank you for the opportunity to be with you virtually. My name is Thomas Swoyer, Jr and I am the President of Grand Sky Development Company. I am with you today to advocate for continued investment in infrastructure at Grand Sky. My colleagues that have spoken before me and those that will speak after me will offer examples of success and opportunity in the Unmanned Systems industry in North Dakota and I appreciate this opportunity to share Grand Sky's story today.

Grand Sky is a public/private partnership between the US Air Force, Grand Forks County and my group, the Grand Sky Development Company. Together we have executed a 50-year agreement to develop 217 acres on Grand Forks AFB and turn it in to a state-of-the-art, commercial Unmanned Aircraft Airport and Business Park. Grand Sky is one of the only places that supports the commercial development and operations of the largest unmanned aircraft in the world. We're focused on developing the capabilities needed to support flight operations that span not only the upper plains but the entire United States. More recently, Grand Sky has supported international operations and has contributed to the growing national and international reputation of North Dakota's UAS industry. In fact, just this morning, in support of the North Dakota Trade Office, many of us joined in an hour-long pitch to representatives of over 50 European based companies looking for a place in the United States to bring their business. This October will mark the 10th anniversary of the Grand Sky's beginning. Over the past 10 years of our shared journey we have seen some incredible successes, but those successes would not have been possible if not for the investment in infrastructure from the State of North Dakota.

Last year, Grand Sky celebrated many successes, but I want to share two with you. Over the summer, Northrop Grumman conducted 10-weeks of flight test for their Firebird aircraft. This effort brought over 40 people representing multiple companies from around the United States. This team came to Grand Sky for more than 10 weeks of non-stop flight activity. While the pandemic ravaged many local businesses this flight test effort supported over 2,000 room nights and tens of thousands of dollars of catering that supported struggling restaurants. While hotel rooms and catering are all great, the real upside was the multiple federal agencies that came to Grand Forks to see the flight tests but left knowing that Grand Sky is a world-class test and evaluation center and will be looked to in the future for other flight tests.

Another important success revolves around the training of pilots and sensor operators for our NATO allies. Members of the Royal British Air Force came to Grand Sky to conduct multiple training classes. Word of the efficacy of these training sessions have resulted in agreements to bring members of the Air Forces of Belgium, Italy, Spain, India, Taiwan and Japan for weeks of training in 2021. The point I want you to leave with is that tests like this will renew in 2021 with the first flights scheduled in February. More training results in more investment in simulators, hangars, classrooms and other buildings to support it all. The investments made to date in Grand Sky are yielding consistent economic benefits for North Dakota.

The Firebird flight tests, and NATO training efforts are examples contributing to the larger economic development story. There are three key economic development metrics that I'd like to share with you. So far, Grand Sky produces roughly \$19.3M per year in wages from direct, indirect and induced business activity. Roughly 175 people report to Grand Sky every day for work with another 167 that indirectly support Grand Sky. Another 400-600 people per year come to Grand Sky for training, official visits, flight operations and other reasons. These visits are as short as 2 or 3 days or, as we saw with the Firebird example, as long as 10 weeks or more. Perhaps the most important economic metric is the ratio of public to private investment at Grand Sky. We are grateful for the Legislature's vision and desire to invest in Grand Sky over the past decade. Over those 10 years, the Legislature has seen fit to appropriate \$21 million for infrastructure at Grand Sky. That investment has been used to repair and replace aircraft aprons, and to install new roads, electric lines, natural gas, water and sewer and security infrastructure necessary to attract the private sector investment that brings the jobs and economic activity. It is very important to note that none of the State's investment has gone to support private buildings. The appropriations have been used for investing in infrastructure like roads, utilities, aprons and similar necessities. The \$21M that has been appropriated has resulted in roughly \$70M in private sector investment in offices, hangars, labs, flight infrastructure and security. Grand Sky has leveraged more than \$3 of private sector investment for every \$1 of state investment. The benefit of the State's investment in Grand Sky is economic activity, jobs and private sector leverage. None of this is possible without the investment in the underlying infrastructure.

The final element that I would like to leave you with is an understanding of where we are headed. Grand Sky is growing. The funding we are requesting will go to extending infrastructure into the park to create more developable area. Grand Sky is moving into a new development phase. We have leased 35 of the 40 developable acres that have access to the runway, we need to create more. We are about to complete construction of our newest asset, our Multi-Tenant building called MT1. Grand Sky Development Company is the equity investor in MT1 which began in autumn of 2019 and is almost complete. While its not yet ready to move in, we have already executed tenant leases for three of its eight suites and are in negotiation with a single tenant for the remaining five. The \$7 million building will be totally leased up before it is complete. We're already planning for MT2 and MT3 and both of our anchor tenants have expansion plans to add more hangars, training space and other assets that will bring more flight test work, more employment and more business to North Dakota.

































Which States Are Prepared for the Drone Industry?



How the State Rankings Are Obtained

These five factors (which are followed by their relative weightings) indicate a state's readiness for commercial drone services and should be the top state priorities.

- 1. Airspace lease law (30 points): Drone highways must be demarcated by regulators and safely separated from airports, homes, schools, and other sensitive locations. Leasing airspace above public property would accelerate drone services because creating flight paths over backyards and private lands raises issues about the taking of private property.
- 2. Law vesting air rights with landowners (10 points): This clarifies that the state is exercising its police powers and defining property rights—and puts drone operators and residents on notice about the extent of those rights. Where state or local authorities own public rights-of-way, air rights laws recognize their property interest in the aerial corridors above public roads.
- 3. Avigation easement law (25 points): This allows drones to operate as long as they are high enough not to bother landowners and passersby. If the state or municipality does not own aerial corridors above public roads, drones can still generally access the aerial easements if state officials demarcate drone highways above public roads.
- 4. Drone task force or program office (20 points): These bodies help anticipate (and address) issues such as zoning rules, noise limits, time-of-day restrictions, insurance, and privacy for private dwellings.
- 5. Drone jobs estimate (15 points): The number of drone jobs per 100,000 residents is a proxy for soft factors (e.g., a college offering drone programs or workers in the aerospace industry) that can position states for future jobs and services growth.

To the Honorable Chairman Holmberg and Committee,

As the Director of TrainND Northwest it is my privilege to share our vision for our developing unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) program and express my support for appropriated funding through an amendment to the Commerce Budget. While TrainND Northwest's UAS program is new and developing, we see great potential in the training that we could potentially provide to the state.

To take full advantage of the impressive investment the state is making in the Vantis BVLOS (Beyond Visual Line of Site) network workforce training will be key. The applications of UAS for the industries of ND are near endless. The addition of the Vantis BVLOS network creates an opportunity for industry to gain efficiencies in multiple ways. To take advantage of this opportunity industry, communities, and the youth of North Dakota will need to be educated as to what those possibilities are and trained on how to safely and efficiently operate UAS. TrainND Northwest's vision is to provide this training and education to the people of North Dakota. A seamless workforce training program in UAS will allow the state to reap the full benefit of its investment in Vantis.

This appropriation would allow TrainND Northwest to develop and provide a rounded UAS training curriculum outlined below:

- UAS Careers exploration/community education
- Part 107 certification preparation (federal commercial license to operate an UAS)
- UAS Safety
- Hands on Flight training Crawl-Walk-Run approach
 - Simulation
 - Group 1 UAS (small)
 - Group 2 UAS (medium)
 - Medium Altitude Long Endurance (MALE) UAS
- BVLOS
 - Visual observer (visually observes flight of drone at checkpoints during mission)
 - Sensor operator (ensures BVLOS network is operating for UAS during mission)
 - Pilot & command (operators of UAS controls and legally responsible for operation of UAS)
 - Mission commander (oversees UAS mission and planning)
- Industry specific use training
 - Oil and Gas
 - Agriculture
 - Utilities and Wind Energy
 - Public/emergency services
 - Cinematography
 - Construction



To make this vision a reality we are asking for a <u>one-time</u> appropriation of \$2 million requiring, and contingent on receiving, a 1:1 match (available from any-and-all sources including O & G, Ag, Utilities, city, county, and WSC). Appropriations will be leveraged to continue building a UAS training program that meets the stated vision utilizing the draft budget seen below:

- 1.75 million UAS and sensors
- .75 million UAS curriculum development/administration
- .25 million UAS simulators
- .75 million UAS operations equipment
- .25 million UAS ground stations
- .25 million in- and out-of-state marketing

TrainND Northwest is confident that this appropriated funding will allow us to develop a UAS training program that will provide the state with a well trained UAS workforce that is ready to make use of the Vantis network allowing us to increase efficiencies and wealth for industry and the great citizens of North Dakota.

I propose this amendment to be located within the commerce budget due to the connection with UAS. I defer to the appropriation committee as to the location of the amendment as there are also connections to higher education and CTE with this request.

To the Honorable Chairman Holmberg and Committee,

Having worked for years in the UAS industry, it is clear to me that the need for UAS training in North Dakota is essential to the continued development of, and leadership position with, UAS in North Dakota. The UAS program at Williston State College and TrainND Northwest is new, but shows as much tremendous promise as any new UAS initiative organized in the state of North Dakota. Through direct collaboration with the organizations, I detect a vision at their program that would certainly drive value for North Dakota in some of the most important sectors of the state's economy, namely UAS, agriculture, and energy. Pilots produced by TrainND would be in a perfect position to take advantage of the new statewide beyond-visual-line-of-sight (BVLOS) UAS network being constructed in the western side of North Dakota by the Northern Plains UAS Test Site's (NPUASTS) Vantis. This is also an opportune time to engage in such work due to the coincidentally simultaneous success North Dakota now enjoys as a member of the FAA's new Beyond program.

Such an appropriation, to my knowledge would be used to purchase equipment and administer the UAS program. I would suggest this appropriation during this legislative session in order to lay the groundwork to create workforce as soon as possible to take full advantage of Vantis.

Similarly to Vantis, I believe this would keep North Dakota the center of UAS development and operations, while also attracting companies to do UAS business in North Dakota and making the lives of North Dakotans better through advances in UAS in operations.

My understanding is that this would be a one-time appropriation, with lasting, and significant, value for North Dakota. To jump start this program will be to get a leg-up on other states without gold standard training to be adopted in such industries as oil and gas.

SB 2018

Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. I'm Jeff Horan, Pilot and UAS Project Coordinator for the North Dakota Department of Transportation (DOT). I'm here to provide information regarding SB 2018.

The USDOT states that there are over 1.7 million Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) currently registered in the United States.

The North Dakota Department of Transportation and the Northern Plains UAS Test Site is deploying UAS technologies through USDOT's Integration Pilot Program (IPP). Recently, the North Dakota Department of Transportation was awarded an extension to the IPP program. The new IPP program is called "BEYOND" and the North Dakota Department of Transportation along with the Northern Plains UAS Test Site are working toward the safe implementation of UAS operations and technologies throughout the State of North Dakota.

Our partnership with Northern Plains UAS Test site is critical in the advancement of UAS operations in North Dakota and to the further development of a state-wide UAS network tower system referred to as Vantis. The Department of Transportation has utilized and hopes to expand utilization of UAS technology for flood fighting efforts, bridge inspection, tower inspection, land surveys, stockpile inventories, and other operating needs of the agency.

Thank you for allowing me to provide information regarding this bill. This concludes my testimony. I stand for any questions you might have at this time.

Good afternoon Chairman Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations

Committee, my name is Donna Brown and I am President of Turtle Mountain

Community College (TMCC). Thank you for affording me the opportunity to provide testimony on Senate Bill 2018, relating to workforce development for Turtle Mountain

Community College.

I am here to respectfully request that the Workforce Development Grant to Turtle Mountain Community College in the amount of \$500,000 remain in the 2021-2023 Commerce Department budget.

This past biennium, we provided workforce training in Commercial Vehicle Operations (CVO), Heavy Equipment Operator (HEO), and Welding Technician programs. We also expanded our Medical Administrative Assistant (MAA) program to meet the future needs of the Tribe's recovery center, which is expected to be open in the near future. Our MAA program includes certification in coding, billing, and transcription. This is a two-year program and fifteen students are enrolled in their first year of the program, having begun in the fall of 2020.

The grant gave TMCC an opportunity to increase capacity, including building infrastructure and enhancing program offerings. Students can attain industry-recognized

certificates and degrees with a focus on stackable credentials, where students earn a sequence of credentials that can be accumulated over time and used to move along a career ladder. Intensive, customized student support is provided from intake to job placement. Additionally, funding played an important role in strengthening partnerships with business and industry resulting in programmatic alignment to jobs and increased opportunities for students to find and secure employment.

As part of building infrastructure, we purchased a 2020 Freightliner Semi for the Commercial Vehicle Operations program and a GPS control system for the Heavy Equipment Operator program. The remaining expenses included salaries & fringe benefits, supplies such as fuels & oils, student testing fees for certifications, and general maintenance of the equipment.

We have a strong emphasis on achieving results and we have a history of success in the number of students served, number of graduates, and number of placements. This past year we enrolled 24 students in the CVO program, with 9 completing and 10 employed. In the HEO program we enrolled 32 students, with 23 completing and 18 employed. Our Welding program served 26 students, with 9 completing and 8 placed in employment. In the fall of 2020 we began training students in the Medical Administrative Assistant program, with 15 students currently enrolled.

Like many other institutions of higher education, TMCC was impacted by the pandemic.

Our spring courses were interrupted in March for the safety of our students. Due to this
we were not able to provide the face-to-face instruction needed to complete the lab
portions of courses. Once safety protocols were implemented, faculty scheduled one-

on-one and small group sessions with students into the summer to complete course requirements from spring term. Because spring courses had to be completed in the summer, we did not enroll new students for summer, which we typically do.

We utilize our Career and Technical Education Advisory Committee – our partners – to assist with feedback and continuous improvement. The Advisory Committee members are from industry, business, and labor located at the tribal, regional, and state levels.

Our graduates fulfill workforce needs in our community and beyond. For example, graduates of the Commercial Vehicle and Heavy Equipment programs were employed by the Turtle Mountain Tribal Transportation department this past summer on various road projects. Welding program graduates are employed by the Turtle Mountain Manufacturing plant. They are also employed at the Rugby Manufacturing plant and the plant is requesting more of our graduates, which is a testimony to the quality of their skills.

TMCC is well positioned to qualify for another round of state funding that focuses on continued development of some of our programs and enhancement of others. We have demonstrated our ability and capacity as a viable source for the training of individuals and helping to meet the workforce demands in North Dakota.

I recommend a "do pass" by this Committee. Thank you very much and I will entertain any questions you might have at this time.

Some of my retailers enjoyed their most profitable quarters DURING the COVID-19 closures and restrictions---this was possible because of the planning and implementation we had done together.

The City of Lisbon was awarded the Governor's Choice Community Development Award for its efforts on the Hammelton Building. This award recognizes a development project that has increased the quality of life in a community. The Hammelton has been transformed into a high-rise apartment complex with a bridal store, flower shop, event hall, martial arts school and clothing boutiques. The project has been an inspiration for others in our community, and despite the economic challenges of 2021, Lisbon has seen a boom in new store openings and retail sales.

Testimony of Shawn Wenko, President Economic Development Association of North Dakota In Support of SB 2018 January 25, 2021

Chairman Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

I'm Shawn Wenko, executive director of Williston Economic Development and president of the Economic Development Association of North Dakota (EDND). It is in that capacity I am testifying before you today in support of SB 2018.

EDND represents more than 80 state economic development organizations on the front line of economic development efforts throughout North Dakota. The primary purpose of the organization is to promote the creation of new wealth throughout North Dakota to develop more vibrant communities and improve quality of life.

One of EDND's top priorities is to support North Dakota Department of Commerce programs as valuable tools, programs and resources for the economic developers in our state. EDND members can attest that a strong partnership with the state helps us locally recruit and retain new and expanding businesses, train North Dakota's workforce, and compete in national and international markets. We also rely on the Commerce Department to help local entrepreneurs explore potential opportunities and diversify the state's economy.

The pandemic and other unpredictability in oil and agriculture activity over the last decade have highlighted the need for North Dakota to diversify its economy and stabilize budget sources. Commercialization, entrepreneurship, and small business growth are crucial to North Dakota's economic future. Entrepreneurs and small businesses are leaders in the nation in employment growth. EDND is supportive of the continuation of all Department of Commerce programs which support local economic developers and businesses, such as Innovate ND, funding partners like the North Dakota Small Business Development Centers, providing training programs to redeploy displaced workers through the Technical Skills Training Grant, attracting workers and new industries through business development programs and tourism, investing in

For a few specific examples in the Williston area, the local SBDC was able to help the Hair Society Institute run cash flow scenarios and figure out the number of students to accept and training services to provide in order to get the school off the ground. They were also recently able to help Busted Knuckle Brewery and the Pit 105 Barbecue put together a finance plan with funders to enable the project, which took an old county building and rehabbed it, increasing the city's property tax base, to move forward. Across the state, every community or region can provide a multitude of examples like this, showing the value of these partner programs. EDND advocates for funding for all partner programs to remain stable from the 2019-21 biennium.

EDND believes an investment in the Department of Commerce is needed to grow and diversify the economy so North Dakota can ensure a more revenue-stable future. EDND members could spend the rest of the day giving examples of ways the Department of Commerce has aided their communities. No matter the location or size of the community, our membership relies on the Department of Commerce to provide guidance, resources, and staff to support and diversify our state's growth. WESTERN VETERINARY CLINIC

WILLISTON - The owners of Western Veterinary Clinic (WVC) in Williston are celebrating the third anniversary of their expansion and remodel. The construction project was started in 2017 to accommodate WVC's growing mixed animal practice. The buildout nearly doubled the clinic's size and made it more functional and attractive.

The \$1.2 million project included a 1,400 square-foot addition and 1,500 square-foot remodel. The renovation also gave the clinic more retail space for pet products and room for another veterinarian.

While the original clinic served WVC well for several decades, co-owners Dr. Lee Garbel, Dr. Jody Smith and Dr. Heidi Folden-Willard, began running out of room for their clients and patients in the mid 2010's.



"WVC was started in the 1970's by Dr. Bob Walton and Dr. Lloyd Sorenson," said Garbel. "Gradually, the previous owners retired, and we slowly bought in. Currently we have three owners, five full-time veterinarians, one part-time veterinarian and 15 staff members."

To help them finance the expansion, the owners turned to advisors at the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) and American State Bank and Trust (ASB&T) in Williston. Keith Olson, SBDC Regional Director, provided no-cost advising and support while Zach Nelson, ASB&T Assistant Vice President and Assistant Commercial Loan Manager, assisted with the loan. Garbel said Olson and Nelson were helpful with the loan process.

WVC utilized the Flex PACE program, funded by the Williston STAR Fund and Bank of North Dakota (BND). In 2017, WVC received \$82,000 from the STAR Fund and \$152,000 from BND to buydown the interest on its loan.

The expansion has helped WVC provide more daily appointments with shorter wait times. Clients and their pets can also enjoy a more comfortable lobby and larger exam rooms.

"The buildout was a way to expand the customer base and provide an opportunity to recruit new vets to ensure continued longevity," said Olson. "The Williston area is growing, and vet services are crucial as many people move with their pets."

Testimony of Tiffany Ford, State Director, North Dakota Small Business Development Centers Regarding Bill SB 2018: ND Commerce Department January 25, 2021 – Senate Appropriations Committee

Chairman Holmberg, Vice-Chairs Krebsbach and Wanzek, and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

My name is Tiffany Ford, State Director for your ND Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDC). The ND SBDC is hosted by the University of North Dakota (UND) Nistler College of Business and Public Administration. The national Small Business Development Centers (SBDC) program is administered by the U.S. Small Business Administration. Our state network is partially funded by federal dollars, with mandated state and local matching funds provided by the Department of Commerce, UND, cities, counties and private contributors. Our program here in North Dakota is nationally accredited by America's SBDC (ASBDC). We successfully completed a rigorous re-accreditation review in 2019, exceeding each of the quality standards in service, operations, and compliance, with zero findings and a national commendation.

ND SBDC credentialed advisors empower North Dakota small and medium-sized businesses and entrepreneurs to thrive, through customized guidance and resources that help them achieve their goals at any stage of their business. We are the source for knowledge, specialized expertise, connections, business acumen, insights, tools and resources, all at no cost to the client. We accelerate business growth and success across North Dakota, strengthening and diversifying the economy, resulting in long-term positive impacts. When small businesses thrive, communities thrive. North Dakota thrives.

This year we are celebrating the 35th anniversary of the ND SBDC program. For over three decades, our program and staff have been invested in the success of small and medium-

sized businesses across our state. Now, probably more than ever in our long history, the ND SBDC is recognized as the essential service provider and support system for the businesses that are the cornerstones of our state's economy. Please refer to the ND SBDC impact information, the 2020 ND SBDC Annual Report, and the letters of support provided with the written testimony. To highlight just a few relevant data points from the past 18 months of the current biennium:

- the state's return on investment for the ND SBDC program is estimated to exceed
 \$70 million in state tax revenues, with the current funding level at just over
 \$750,000 per biennium, that calculates an approximate benefit to cost ratio of 124:1,
- our survival success rate of 90% far exceeds the national average (nationally, only 50% of new small businesses survive their first five years),
- our client satisfaction rate also ranks extremely high: 96% of our clients rate the services they received a 4 out of 5, or higher,
- ND SBDC clients started more than 177 new small businesses, received more than \$116 million in capital, and created, retained, or supported more than 8,019 jobs in our state.

The COVID-19 pandemic has called attention to the vital and significant value of the ND SBDC program. Our COVID-related services and impacts are on page two of the included impact document. The demand for ND SBDC assistance has increased substantially in the past ten months. In 2020, we served nearly 3,500 individuals through one-on-one advising and training workshops. In an average year that count is usually around 1,500.


The ND SBDC program is North Dakota's widest reaching and most substantial business support program, assisting individual clients in each of our state's 53 counties. Our program far exceeds its goals in each category, each year. We report only verifiable, fact based successes. The comprehensive expertise and certifications of our staff is incomparable, and the tools available to our clients are not available through any other service or organization in our state, not even those that do charge a fee.

The ND SBDC is a fundamental component of the North Dakota entrepreneurial ecosystem. Small business is BIG business in this state, with 98.8% of firms defined as small businesses. The statewide services provided by the ND SBDC have direct economic impacts including jobs, tax base, and quality of life. Small businesses ARE the foundation of our communities and provide essential services and products to support the operations and success of all of our state's industries, including our top producers: oil, energy, agriculture, and tourism. Regardless of industry or interest, from manufacturing to childcare, innovation to rural vitality, and workforce development to business transition planning – the path for each client and business is unique, and the ND SBDC guides these businesses towards success.

Each of the past five years has seen an increase in federal funding for the national SBDC program, however, the ND SBDC will be challenged to receive additional federal dollars, when our state contribution remains at the current level. Page five of our Annual Report, shows the breakdown of federal, state, and local funding sources. The State provided only

23% of funding for operations of this statewide program in 2020. Adequate funding from the state supports our program in numerous ways:



State 23%

Federal 48%

- Adequate state funding ensures that we can continue to *leverage* the maximum amount of federal funding available to our state, and continue to meet the mandated
 1:1 match under the SBDC program; if state and local funding decreases, our federal funding will decrease (a triple-threat to our operations and service delivery capacity),
- We anticipate local sources of funding to become even more strained in the near future, and seeking these local sources for operational funding takes significant time away from direct assistance provided to clients,
- If funding for the ND SBDC program decreases below the current level, it will have negative repercussions on service delivery, economic impact, and may lead to the closure of service centers.

An additional consideration would be a more direct appropriations approach to the funds meant for the ND SBDC program. Funding allocations within an aggregated budget line often lack legislative intent. Given the considerable impact of the ND SBDC as a statewide program, it may be in the best interest of the state to have ND SBDC be a named budget line.

The ND SBDC is a long-standing, strong program with undeniable positive impacts for our state's economy, businesses, and communities – large and small. While many may not realize the strength of small businesses in our state, we like to remind them that the essential services and products they consume, whether from the grocery store, gas station,

car dealership, childcare center, plumber, electrician, or dentist, are small businesses that employ people, pay taxes, and support the local little league team. We as a network of passionate and invested individuals look forward to serving these businesses and this state for years to come. Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. My name is Dave Kleppe,
Program Manager of the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center. The
Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) program is hosted by the University
of North Dakota's Center for Business Engagement and Development (led by Tiffany
Ford) within the Nistler College of Business and Public Administration. Federal program
funding is provided by the Department of Defense's Defense Logistics Agency (DLA)
with match funding provided by the North Dakota Department of Commerce (DOC).

The program was established in 1985 to expand the number of businesses capable of participating in government contracts. It is administered by DLA's Small Business Programs in cooperation with the states, local governments and nonprofit organizations. Under the program, PTACs help businesses pursue and perform in contract awards with the Department of Defense, other federal agencies, state and local governments and also subcontracting with government prime contractors. Most of the assistance the PTACs provide is free. PTAC support to businesses includes registration in procurement systems such as the federal System for Award Management (SAM), identification of contract opportunities, help in understanding contracting requirements and in preparing and submitting bids. PTACs have a local presence in all

50 states. The North Dakota PTAC currently operates with two full-time positions: a

PTAC Advisor located in Fargo and a Program Manager located in the Entrepreneur

Center at the Bank of North Dakota.

The federal PTAC program provides 60% federal funding with a 40% state

match. For the past several years the required state match has been provided by the

Department of Commerce from within their discretionary funds line. Without the

required state match funds, the ND PTAC program will cease to exist. While the

amount of the state's investment is small, the economic impact of this program is not.

During state fiscal years 2019 and 2020, the ND PTAC assisted 373 small and large

North Dakota businesses. Many of them have been successful in the government

marketplace and have been awarded more than \$169 million in government contracts,

meaning diversification of revenue streams, creating jobs in our state, and positively

impacting our communities.

We have a very good working relationship with DOC. Without the matching

funds DOC provides, there would be no North Dakota PTAC program to assist our

businesses in navigating the complex path involved with government contracting.

Chair, Travel Alliance Partnership

In support of SB 2018

January 25, 2021

Chairman Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee, my name is Terri Thiel, and I am the chair of the ND Travel Alliance Partnership (ND TAP). ND TAP is a coalition of travel industry stakeholders, including CVB's, state attractions, businesses, and other interested stakeholders, in this number three industry of North Dakota's economy.

The impact of COVID has not only decimated our travel industry, but also caused economic strain throughout North Dakota. Local attractions, venues, hotels, restaurants, and visitor bureaus have all suffered huge losses in revenue resulting in layoffs, and in some communities, business closures. Included in my testimony is a survey, developed to gauge the impact of the pandemic on TAP's membership. Of those surveyed, nearly a quarter (22.2%) indicated the pandemic has resulted in a loss of revenue of \$1 million or more. 61.1% indicated they have had to reduce the size of their staff. Of those, 83.4% were either unable rehire staff or were able to hire some but not all of their pre-existing staff.

Financial assistance made possible through the North Dakota Department of Commerce in the form of grants have helped but are no substitute for sales driven by travelers. Revenue generated from travelers will be critical to the tourism industry's recovery, necessitating the need for the ND Tourism Division to appeal to travelers through expanded marketing and awareness.

The pandemic and the effects of quarantine and isolation have resulted in pent up interest in travel. North Dakota has already experienced some of the benefits of this demand, resulting in a substantial increase in state park use (up 16%), an increase in Game & Fish licenses, increases in boat and camper sales and more. ND Tourism Division's website analytics were up 52% over last year, showing that populations in and outside of the state is ready to get out and travel to the wide-open spaces of North Dakota. The ND Tourism Division needs to be ready to capture those additional in and out of state audiences.

Tourism supports many of the small businesses in the western part of the state, and now more than ever, it is important to help those businesses that have also been impacted due to the decreased energy activity. Tourism is a part of many small business in the eastern part of the state also. The experiences that many of them provide to travelers have been halted or modified this past year. The need for traveling customers is urgent, on both ends of the state.

ND TAP asks for your continued support of the ND Tourism Division and its efforts to attract those travelers by funding ND Tourism's budget at \$18 million. While this would be a notable increase in ND Tourism's budget, it would still pale in comparison to neighboring states. This increase would be a critical step to boost tourism awareness for North Dakota and allow for additional marketing campaigns to encourage travel to our state

Below are the figures for the 2019 – 2021 biennium:

- ND \$9 million
- SD \$30.2 million
- MT \$19.5 million

• MN - \$32.2 million

COVID has shed a light on the importance of travel and underscored the economic impact felt in the absence of tourism. Tourism will be a cornerstone to North Dakota's economic recovery. North Dakota's wide-open spaces, diverse experiences and unique communities have the capability to regenerate lost revenue and the ND Tourism Division plays a pivotal role in marketing those experiences. America is ready to travel again and North Dakota is ready for business.

We ask for your support of \$18 million in funding for the ND Tourism Division within SB 2018.








What is your organization's annual budget?


Did the Covid-19 pandemic force the cancellation of events or operations that substantially impacted your donations, revenue or funding?




How much do you estimate your organization lost in earned revenue or funding due to the pandemic?




Has the Covid-19 pandemic forced you to reduce the size of your staff? 18 responses




If you were forced to reduce the size of your staff, have you been able to rehire them since?




Did your organization apply for the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP)? 17 responses




If you answered yes to the previous question, was your application approved? 7 responses

What has been the biggest challenge to your organization throughout the Covid-19 pandemic?

- Funding. We have had to eliminate our paid marketing efforts and rely on our internal, organic efforts along with the ND Tourism Division's marketing to attract visitors to ND.
- The cancellation of all our events.
- Closing of the Canadian Border, major event cancellations which caused reduction in lodging. Cutbacks on corporate travel, impacts from the oil industry. We have been fortunate in that we were able to secure government/military groups participating with the MAFB and FEMA. We have also had to reduce some of our amenities which impacts the guest's stay.
- Maintaining a safe environment for customers and employees.
- Event cancellations, economic impact, and budget impacts.
- Simply the lack of financial support for hotels. We were denied for all of the first round
 of grants and while the second round was helpful with a loss of millions it was not
 enough as much support as needed especially as we go into the difficult winter
 season.
- Everchanging COVID restrictions/mandates.
- Finding ways to help our stakeholder industries: hotels, attractions, bars & restaurants.
- Visitors. When the border closed, we lost 40 percent of our annual visitors that come from Canada. In total, our revenue was 28 percent of 2019's revenue in gate fees and camping fees. We did not open a cafe because of COVID-19. Our gift shop also suffered.
- Our only income is the occupancy tax. Lack of travelers to our city has dropped our income. Trying to maintain our marketing presence has been a challenge.
- The reduction in funding has negatively impacted what we've been able to do to support the hospitality businesses in our community.
- In-person meetings
- The uncertainty of it all. Which is the trouble for all business and government.
- Like all agencies, the constant shifting from one scenario to another in an effort to reinvent during a time of uncertainty.
- Cancellations of events please let people get back to what they want.

Do you have any additional feedback you would like to provide regarding the impacts of the pandemic on your organization?

- More than ever we need additional funding for ND Tourism Division. The interest to travel is documented with the ND Tourism web analytics up 52% in 2020. The surrounding states fund their State Tourism entities almost double of our ND Tourism Division, we need to be able to compete for the attention of those travelers who will put money into our local businesses, attractions and tax revenue.
- Tourism is such an important part of our city and state and I believe we should continue to do whatever we can to keep tourism strong and to promote this wonderful state.
- We estimate that our community has already lost \$14.9 million in direct visitors expenditures just from the loss of multi-day meetings, conventions, sports and events. This number isn't done growing. 1st quarter is still showing very bleak indicators and we anticipate 2nd quarter being down significantly, too.
- The airline industry is suffering significant financial impacts which is impacting airports around the country.
- Now, more than ever, ND needs to invest in promoting the state. Things will begin to
 open around the country and world by mid-summer into fall, and there will be pent up
 demand for travel. ND Tourism needs to have the funds necessary to take advantage
 and let people know that this is a great place to visit.
- We are grateful for all of the relief funding we've received. Unfortunately, we need
 more support to continue recovering from all the lost revenue at the gate,
 campground, cafe, gift shop, canceled weddings and other rental events. The Peace
 Garden is a staple of the Peace Garden State. We are in an exciting phase of capital
 growth and hope to maintain our operating funds to help us recover from the tough
 year.

My name is Darren Bleth, and I am the General Manager of the La Quinta Inn & Suites in Dickinson. I am writing this letter, to implore you to increase the ND Tourism Division's budget.

I have served in the hotel industry in Dickinson, for the past 20+ years. During that time, our state and Southwestern North Dakota especially have seen its share of economic ups and downs. In the past decade, we have endured the oil and energy best of times as well as its worst of times. This past year has presented our industry, our state, our nation, and our world with unprecedented adversity. The likes of which, we could have never imagined.

As we navigated through the period of such uncertainty, beginning in March 2020, we were left only to question when or if tourism would again return. And, if so, to what degree? Given the pandemic's implications, travel from abroad was out of the equation. What then could be expected from domestic travel?

As 2020Q2 neared its close, our region began to see the domestic traveler. Unable to utilize airline travel as originally planned, given the pandemic, these individuals instead took to the interstates and highways to engage in outdoor vacation plans. And, as a result, the national parks provided one of the few "open" venues for responsible, safe socializing and gathering. This represents just an example of the impact of the ND Tourism Division's impact on our state. I am Terri Thiel, Executive Director of the Dickinson Convention & Visitors Bureau.

The ND Tourism Division has been, and always will be, the marketing agent for our state's image. That ability to draw travelers to North Dakota has never been more important than now. COVID has changed our industry. The visitor industry has been turned upside down.

Our Roughrider Days Fair & Expo was cancelled, along with most of other festival events. Convention and meetings were cancelled. Sporting events may have continued, but without the people in the stands.

As a result of the lower lodging tax revenue, our CVB re-budgeted, stripped our marketing plans, and basically kept the lights on while staff worked to re-invent themselves to help our community with information related to COVID hospitality updates, grant information, what businesses were open, hours of operation, delivery options and such. We may finally be able to receive a few dollars in the second round of PPP, (we did not qualify earlier), but the amount will be minimal.

We need ND Tourism to be able to show the brand image of the state to increase awareness of ND and influence a trip to the badlands, to the safe open places in ND. Our office has always been a regional partner for the surrounding attractions, events, and small businesses, and with our paid marketing reduced, it is even more important to support the ND Tourism Division budget.

In 2020 there was a **52% increase** in ND Tourism website traffic. There is pent up demand for travel, and not to the turmoiled cities - but to our wide, open, safe places in ND.

The ND Tourism Division needs to be competitive with our neighboring State Tourism offices to reach these travel audiences, they are so far below them.

Please support SB 2018 ND Tourism Division budget at \$18 million/biennium.

The hospitality industry has been devastated in 2020. Businesses from local boutiques to hotels to restaurants to visitor attractions had to shift, plan and rethink everything they knew about their work. In a year that we never could have imagined, there are stories of hardship and pain, but as a place, North Dakotans are never really down and out. It's part of our DNA as settlers that we look for optimism and point to a future with hope and gratitude. These are the stories of three Jamestown businesses:

On March 17, the Gladstone Inn in Jamestown closed its doors. The property has remained closed over these past 10 months. The Gladstone Inn has served the community of Jamestown for over 100 years. Plans are being made to resume operations mid-May. Confident to weather this uncertain time and come out stronger, they've invested dollars using the HERG grants and can now provide contactless check ins.

Sabirs Buffalo Grill, a local watering hole in the downtown district and the place everyone takes their out-of-town guests to, saw a 24% decrease in revenues including eight weeks when COVID or government restrictions closed their doors. The Payroll Protection Plan and the HERG helped with their operational overhead, and the ERG grant allowed Sabirs Buffalo Grill to implement a new touchless payment system and outdoor seating.

The National Buffalo Museum paid admissions were down 51% in 2020. The American Alliance of Museums surveyed institutions across the nation. As of a November 2020 report, 30% of museums remained closed, and for those who had reopened, their admissions have seen on average a reduction of 65%.

What do the hospitality businesses throughout North Dakota need? They need people. Much like the common themes of the public, these businesses strive to get back to normal. Businesses that support and benefit the hospitality industry need people. This can be accomplished by supporting the marketing budget for ND Tourism. These dollars will do two things:

- 1. Tell visitors North Dakota and its wide open spaces are open for business.
- 2. Broadcast North Dakota's investment in infrastructure that will make their visit safe and comforting.

Data shows a pent-up demand for travel. We know that there is a growing, and yet uncertain confidence for travel. North Dakota Tourism is well position to create an invitation to the state that addresses these concerns. If ever there was a time for North Dakota to act, it is now.

Please support the ND Tourism marketing budget – SB 2018. The dollars that can be invested in the coming biennium will bring the much-needed visitors that businesses throughout the state need now.

For the record, my name is Dr. Amy Whitney, and I am the Director of the University of North Dakota (UND) Center for Innovation. Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony regarding SB 2018: An act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the Department of Commerce.

As the Director of the UND Center for Innovation, I have the privilege of leading an entrepreneur center dedicated to helping North Dakotans as well as students and faculty at the University of North Dakota to commercialize their ideas, whether based on research or invention. Entrepreneurial business coaching and training is the heart and soul of what we do every day. After almost three years as Director of the UND Center for Innovation, I can say with confidence that our work as a business incubator is stronger when we partner with organizations such as the Department of Commerce. Programs under their purview such as InnovateND, the LIFT fund, BioND, and more, are essential components of a holistic suite of resources to help entrepreneurs access funding and technical support during the critical early stages of the creation, development and growth of a business.

The current version of SB 2018 provides \$948,467 of funding for entrepreneur grants and vouchers, otherwise known as InnovateND. My submitted testimony today focuses primarily on this program in an effort to provide you with a glimpse into the value of this program for North Dakota. Maintaining InnovateND program means sustaining a grant and voucher funding program for entrepreneurs as well as essential grants to the entrepreneurial center who provide coaching and technical assistance to those entrepreneurs. The UND Center for Innovation is one of four providing this support. Each Center has dedicated staff with the knowledge and experience necessary to coach, mentor and guide the entrepreneurs. We are uniquely positioned to support entrepreneurs and we have a strong, collaborative partnership with Commerce in support of InnovateND.

InnovateND uses a phased grant and voucher funding process that includes measurable benchmarks, provides coaching critical to determining the feasibility and viability of an entrepreneur's business idea, and a match requirement. Each recognized entrepreneur center receives a grant from Commerce to provide the coaching and support. The Commerce grants to for each Center is critical to our ability to off-set employment costs for these hands-on services and to leverage federal funding to expand our work. For example, at the UND Center for Innovation, we presently use the funding to support staff time and as a local match for our federal EDA University Center for Autonomous Systems grant.

As the State of North Dakota continues to respond to the COVID pandemic, supporting entrepreneurial activity is more critical than ever. Entrepreneurial activity helps North Dakota grow out of this challenging time in new and innovative ways. InnovateND provides non-dilutive funding at the earliest-stage of a business. The coaching we provide helps de-risk the idea, ensure market fit and requires customer discovery. Here are a few testimonials from InnovateND clients in our office from the last biennium.

My name is Tom Falck, and I am a member of the Grand Forks County Board of Commissioners; I also oversee the Grand Sky Portfolio. I am writing you today in support of SB2018, specifically the Enhanced Use Lease grant line item.

On February 6, 2015, Grand Forks County executed a historic, 50-year Enhanced Use Lease with the United States Air Force, creating the nation's first commercial testing and training center devoted to the support and development of the Unmanned Aircraft Systems industry. Grand Sky has since put North Dakota on the map in the UAS sector. Grand Sky has become the model EUL for other industry to follow. The USAF cites Grand Sky as its most successful, and innovative EUL.

Without the State's investments, Grand Sky would not exist. Thanks to the State's investments, necessary infrastructure has been made available to host the two leading UAS companies in Northrop Grumman Corporation and General Atomics.

Continued investments into Grand Sky provides hundreds of jobs in North Dakota – 175 jobs at Grand Sky alone. It also means investments into North Dakota from the private sector, such as private facilities, jobs, internships, and capital assets.

Investments into Grand Sky have strengthened the Grand Forks regions, and the State's partnership with Grand Forks Air Force Base. Grand Forks County is leading the way in Public-Public-Private Partnerships that positively impact both the County and the Air Force.

Finally, investments into Grand Sky offer economic benefits to North Dakota but also create valuable protection if the base were to experience another round of base realignments and closures.

Mr. Chairman, my name is Dave Achtenberg and I am employed by Regency Hotel Management. We manage two properties in Bismarck, the Ramkota & Radisson Hotels as well as a property in Fargo. With 35 years in the hospitality business we have never experienced the challenges we have faced in the past ten months. In March when the Pandemic began we furloughed roughly 95% of our workforce company wide and have been slowly ramping back up as demand increases. Hotel occupancy in the Bismarck market has declined from 60.9% in 2019 to 42%in 2020. Total lodging revenue has declined from \$67,182,623.00 in 2019 to \$41,297,867.00 in 2020 in the Bismarck market. Almost all meeting and convention business in 2020 was cancelled and the first half of 2021will be more of the same. The leisure market has begun a small rebound. Industry experts are predicting the rebound in groups and conventions may take 2 to 3 years.

We feel that there has never been a bigger need for increased tourism dollars and fully support the increases in the Governor's proposed budget for the Tourism Division. As lodging revenue has declined we have also seen a sharp decline in lodging tax revenues that fund many of our local Convention and Visitor Bureaus. The competition to attract and retain groups will be intense as many of our neighboring states already out spend us by large margins in Tourism Marketing. Our neighbors to the south doubled down early in the pandemic and enjoyed a fairly good tourist season. I believe the additional funding will benefit our state and local economies and help put people back to work.

Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Christy Dodd. I am the Executive Director of CTB, formerly Center for Technology & Business. CTB is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that houses the North Dakota Women's Business Center (NDWBC) with locations in Bismarck and Fargo providing service statewide.

The NDWBC was formed in 1999 and is a shared partnership between Small Business Administration's Office of Women's Business Ownership and the State of North Dakota through the ND Department of Commerce and CTB. The federal dollars mandate a 1:1 cash match and state dollars are leveraged 3.73 times to help meet that requirement and fulfill duties under the ND Women's Business Development Office (century code section: 54-60-15) along with the guidelines in the federal notice of award from SBA.

We ask for the State's continued support so that we can continue to secure the federal dollars awarded and fulfill the duties outlined to support and serve entrepreneurs in North Dakota.

The NDWBC provides one-on-one business advising and technical training to entrepreneurs to start, grow, and expand their businesses, provide in-depth business training opportunities and events with a focus of reaching underserved women, programming that develops skillsets and confidence for women to step into private, public and/or elected leadership roles, and acts as the certifying entity for Woman-Owned Business Certification programs.

Over the past 20 years, the NDWBC has trained almost 45,000 North Dakotans to date which includes outreach to many rural and tribal communities. We have built a large partner and client network across the state which fosters open communication and collaboration with local community leaders, resource partners, and other stakeholders when developing programming to minimize duplication of services.

We manage and facilitate several key programs and services that are outlined in the handouts provided. I would like to highlight a few:

1-on-1 Business Advising Services:

The NDWBC offers services and resources designed to help individuals in every phase of the business development and growth process. The one-on-one business advising, and technical training services are free and confidential, with an emphasis on resources specific to women entrepreneurs.

For the current biennium, our team provided one-on-one business advising to 423 individuals with new and existing businesses. That number is expected to grow past 500 by the end of this biennium. Of those clients, 39 officially registered a new business creating 48 new jobs so far.



Here are two examples of entrepreneurs who have received out services:

Kelani Welstad, owner of Turbo Septic of Upham, received business advising services through our Bismarck location this past Spring. Just after our meeting, Kelani was able to gain access to capital to grow her operation. She also applied for and was granted Certified Woman-Owned business status at the state and federal levels.

Dan Coleman (Yes, we help men, too!), a Fargo-area business advisee and one-time felon was able to launch his lawn care business after completing entrepreneurship training provided by the Fargo team. Dan was able to access the capital he needed, even with no credit, thanks to the preparedness and coaching of our staff.

Balancing Goat Coffee Co. opened in Mandan in January 2020. They offer specialty coffee and food items along with a wellness studio. They employ 17 part-time employees. The NDWBC assisted them over a 3-year period in overall operations, financial planning, and marketing. The client worked with the NDWBC through one-on-one business advising for technical advice and attended several events the NDWBC hosted.

Michaela, business advising client and a 2019 graduate of the NDWBC's Women's Leadership Program (WLP), was set to host her first-ever Limitless conference in Davenport. The event's purpose was to offer guidance and training for North Dakota's solopreneurs. Unfortunately, COVID-19 forced her to postpone but we consider this a success story because Michaela credits WLP and NDWBC staff for equipping her with the skills and courage necessary to take the leap.

The demand for individual business advising services for entrepreneurs, especially women, remains steady statewide.

Our Business and Technical Trainings

One of our focus areas is to develop and implement training across urban and rural ND based on community need and demand. The NDWBC provides current, relevant training opportunities to entrepreneurs, small business owners, and business professionals across the state.

Rural and tribal communities can often be underserved in their access to advanced technical and business education trainings. We work with local community partners such as economic developers and other stakeholders to bring relevant, in-demand, and non-duplicative training opportunities to these communities. In addition to rural communities, the NDWBC partners with the North Dakota Veterans Business Outreach Center (ND VBOC) and SBA to deliver services to military personnel and their family members at the Minot and Grand Forks Air Force Bases and other locations, as necessary.



NDWBC provides entrepreneurial training designed specifically for the residents at the Dakota Women's Correctional and Rehabilitation Center (DWCRC) located in New England. The training aims to equip women for a successful transition back into their communities and help them establish core business basics that include business planning, marketing their ideas, operations and gaining confidence to succeed.

The final training program I would like to highlight is a partnership the NDWBC has developed with Growing Small Towns in Oakes. Beginning in the summer of 2021 we will be implementing office hours onsite to assist the seven-county region with business advising, leadership development, and other training opportunities.

Certification of Women-Owned Businesses

The NDWBC is the only entity authorized but the ND Department of Commerce to examine applications and qualify businesses for status as a Certified Woman-Owned Business (WOB) in the state. NDWBC is also the only entity in the state approved as site visitors for any of the third-party certifiers of the Woman-Owned Small Business federal certification program.

NDWBC provides ongoing assistance to 39 active certified ND WOBs. They represent industries including retail, construction, service, HVAC design, oilfield safety and manufacturing. They average 19 years in business, 18 employees, and their average net profit totals more than \$3.3 Million per year.

Certification and ongoing assistance prepare these businesses for better securing state, federal and/or private contracts from businesses looking to increase diversity in their supply chain.

National certification provides the opportunity for ND businesses to seek federal contracts with set-asides for women-owned businesses. The U.S. government does not meet its goal of awarding 5% of federal contracts to women-owned businesses. If this annual goal was met, women-owned businesses would have access to marketplace opportunities worth at least \$4 billion each year.

As a recap, NDWBC proudly serves North Dakota entrepreneurs through various programs that positively impact the state's economy. I want to thank you and the State of ND for the continued support and urge you to approve the financial commitment that allows us to secure these federal dollars to continue to serve and support entrepreneurs throughout North Dakota.



About Host:

CTB formed in 1999, is a 501(c)(3) that hosts the North Dakota Women's Business Center (NDWBC) grant program. NDWBC is a shared partnership between Small Business Administration and the State of North Dakota (ND); through the ND Department of Commerce and fulfills the duties of the North Dakota Women's Business Development Office (Century Code section: 54-60-15).

In addition to the NDWBC, CTB houses the IDEA Center, a program that focuses on inspiring innovation, creating a vibrant entrepreneurial ecosystem, and supporting entrepreneurs through the Innovate ND program. Having both programs under one 501(c)(3) allow CTB to redirect operating dollars from both programs and put those dollars toward delivering client services and streamline offerings for entrepreneurs across the state of North Dakota.

CTB collaborates with other resource partners to serve urban and rural communities across the state by providing non-duplicative and impactful trainings for small business owners and their teams to increase revenue, develop skillsets, and adapt their processes to meet the workforce challenges by embracing remote workers and technology.

In 2016, NDWBC was selected as the Women's Business Center of Excellence winner from the Small Business Administration for providing innovative and in-demand training opportunities. NDWBC was chosen 1/105 centers in the United States. This national recognition for exceeding its goals for more than three years in a row was essential to NDWBC receiving a second federal grant from the Small Business Administration in 2018, which expanded NDWBC programming to two offices in ND. The additional federal award is a 4.5-year grant, totaling \$675,000.00 federal dollars, that mandates a 1:1 non-federal match.





How NDWBC is Funded:


Timeline of events leading to the initial development of the NDWBC:

- October 25, 1988, the U.S. Congress passed, and President Ronald Reagan signed into law, HR 5050-The Women's Business Ownership Act;
- The U.S. Small Business Administration created the Office of Women's Business Ownership office which administers the Women's Business Center grant;
- North Dakota established a Women's Business Center/Development Office in 1999 and state dollars were committed and leveraged to fulfill the requirement of the 1:1 cash match and to utilize the federal funding for North Dakota entrepreneurs.

CTB has a staff of 11 FTEs. Eight FTEs are focused on NDWBC programming, serving the entire state of North Dakota. CTB's annual operating budget for NDWBC is approximately \$680,000.00 per year, which totals to \$1,360,000.00 for the biennium. Roughly, 84% of the annual budget goes directly into delivering services to clients. The remaining 18% of the annual budget covers operations and grant management expenses.

CTB has multiple sources of funding to support its mission and programming duties. CTB leverages federal and state dollars to receive grants from the Bush Foundation, Otto Bremer Foundation, and private partnership commitments. These grants are specific to support the programming needs for NDWBC across the state. Program income is generated through training opportunities and programming throughout the year for program sustainability.

In addition, thousands of dollars via in-kind contributions from resource partners across the state help NDWBC to carry out its programs. In-kind contributions range from donated training space in rural communities to training facilitation by expert volunteers.



NDWBC's Mission:

To enhance ND's economic future by providing one-on-one business technical assistance to women entrepreneurs to start and grow businesses, provide in-depth business training opportunities with a focus on reaching underserved women, and programming that develops skillsets for women to step into private and/or public leadership roles across North Dakota.


NDWBC collaborates with resource partners and listens to the needs of rural and urban communities to develop programming to address those specific needs.

Key Programs of the NDWBC Grant:



A. Entrepreneurial Services

NDWBC's services and resources are designed to help individuals in every phase of business development and stage of growth.

- One-on-one business advisings and technical services are free and confidential.
 NDWBC emphasizes and promotes resources specific to women entrepreneurs and inventors seeking prototyping and manufacturing assistance.
- Business incubation office space and community room rentals make NDWBC a hub
 of entrepreneurial support and an ideal location for local organizations to gather for
 meetups and trainings.
- North Dakota ranks in the 5 lowest states for the combined economic clout of the number, employment, and revenues of women-owned firms. (source American Express Open: The State of Women-Owned Businesses, 2019)
- In North Dakota from 2007 to 2018, woman-owned firms increased by 32.5%, employment by woman-owned firms grew by 47%, revenues increased by 115.9% (source American Express Open: The State of Women-Owned Businesses, 2018).
- The high demand for one-on-one advisings resulted in an average 3-week wait period in 2019.
- In the current biennium, NDWBC provided one-on-one business advisings to 423 individuals. That number is projected to reach 500+ by the end of this biennium. Of those advisings, 38 started their businesses, supporting 289 jobs.

- In comparison to previous years, 233 individuals received business counseling services during the 2017-2019 biennium, and 191 in the 2015-2017 biennium.
- Of NDWBC clients, 94% saw growth in their business since attending a business advising or training service.

B. Business Development and Technology Trainings

NDWBC provides relevant trainings in technology and business development made for entrepreneurs and small business employees across the state. NDWBC emphasizes trainings in rural communities and communities with urgent and high-ranking needs.

- As the size of woman-owned businesses continues to grow in North Dakota, the
 need and demand for advanced trainings for business owners and their employees
 has increased greatly. In the current biennium, NDWBC trained 2,467 individuals,
 including 615 who participated in COVID specific training around EIDLE and PPP
 loans. In total, NDWBC completed outreach to 21,968 individuals. The need rose for
 entrepreneurs, and NDWBC met that need with the ability to market its services with
 increased staff.
- Rural communities are often under-served with limited access to technology and business training opportunities. During the last biennium, NDWBC worked with local partners and stakeholders to bring relevant, in-demand and non-duplicative training opportunities to communities including Glen Ullin, Dickinson, Williston, Hazen, Minot, Jamestown, Oakes, Valley City, Devil's Lake, Hankinson, Cayuga, Wahpeton, and others. After attending training events, entrepreneurs created business plans with financial projections to obtain start-up capital through lenders. Attendees gained practical knowledge in social media marketing and strategy, learning the value of a clean, simple website, NDWBC coached many through the uncertainties of coronavirus and helped business owners to pivot, keeping their business healthy and moving forward. With many more people working remotely, NDWBC is expanding its outreach through virtual trainings. NDWBC takes great pride in the fact that after advisings and trainings, entrepreneurs and professionals know they have an ally, a partner, and someone to connect with when they need encouragement or get stuck. Entrepreneurship can be a lonely road. Sometimes the most impactful data is qualitative, not quantitative.
- NDWBC collaborates with organizations promoting STEM and learning technology classes to girls and women. Providing exposure in a safe learning environment creates curiosity, builds confidence, and develops essential STEM skills.
- NDWBC provides educational training designed specifically for the residents at the Dakota Women's Correctional and Rehabilitation Center (DWCRC) located in New England. The training equips women for a successful transition into the community and equips the women with business basics, which include writing a business plan, best marketing practices, business operations, resetting the entrepreneurial mindset, and building the confidence to succeed.
- NDWBC facilitates the annual Finance Resource Tour educating loan officers, economic developers, and business development centers on financing programs in North Dakota. The tour is a collaboration with the USDA, ND Department of Commerce, Bank of North Dakota, and SBA. In 2019, the tour served approximately 90 attendees across Minot, Bismarck, Fargo, and Grand Forks. NDWBC partners with the SBA District Office to host Boots to Business at the Minot and Grand Forks Air Force Bases and ReBoot (entrepreneurial trainings for the ND National Guard in Bismarck, Fargo, and Dickinson each quarter. Military personnel and their spouses attend these trainings that cover the opportunities and challenges of transferring military skills into entrepreneurism, sustainable business concepts, competitive analysis, small business marketing, the economics of small business, legal considerations, business financing, business plan development, and the statewide resources available to entrepreneurs and veterans launching their business ideas. In the current biennium, NDWBC trained over 125 military personnel who were preparing to retire from service.

 NDWBC is a critical force that helps build a strong entrepreneurial ecosystem in local communities. It fosters healthier relationships among resource partners, provides staffing resources, and contributes to volunteer-driven, community-based events that encourage growth such as 1 Million Cups Bismarck-Mandan, the Mandan Pitch Challenge, and TEDxBismarck.



C. Women's Business Summit

NDWBC hosts the annual Women's Business Summit every October/November, coinciding with National Women's Small Business Month. The Summit attracts around 200 participants each year and includes top-notch speakers and breakout sessions training individuals from across the state. Attendees network and develop essential business skills. NDWBC honors 2 women in business with the coveted Woman of Impact and Female Entrepreneur of the Year awards during the awards luncheon.

- By bringing women together, the summit offers a unique and unmatched opportunity for women to make valuable business connections, learn advanced skills for business success through a full day of trainings, and to access a variety of resources in one location.

D. Women's Leadership Program

NDWBC's Women's Leadership Program (WLP) is a unique, six-month training dedicated to advancing the personal, professional, community, and health leadership skills for women of all ages. WLP's goal is increasing participants' interest in advanced leadership positions, building business leaders, and encouraging entrepreneurship. WLP is held in two hub communities and offers a one-day mini WLP session in rural and tribal communities. WLP has graduated 448 women from the six-month program and the one-day mini sessions. It has proven to be an environment in which women gain the skills and confidence to step into new leadership and gain traction toward closing the gender gap of women in leadership roles.

Of the graduates, many move into managerial roles, run successful campaigns for local and state elections, and step up to serve on boards.

 Within six months of graduation, NDWBC sees an increase in interest in the following categories:

 Data from the 2017 report from the American Association of University Women ranks ND #26 in pay equality, with women making just 79% of the wages of men. WLP

- Nationally women hold 52% of jobs in management, professional and related occupations yet only 14.6% of executive positions and 16.9% of board seats. (https://www.americanprogress.org/issues/women/reports/2014/03/07/85457/fact-sheet-the-womens-leadership-gap/). The gender gap increases dramatically from mid-management to top management. WLP participants undergo the crucial training that prepares them for succeeding in these advanced roles, including management and board leadership.
- Participants of the six-month program take on a philanthropic project and receive \$100 in seed money. Since the beginning of the program, WLP has raised \$408,724.41 of cash and in-kind donations for local community organizations. This project activates their leadership skills, shows participants that they have the power to make a difference in their communities, and builds their confidence for greater leaps in the future.

E. Career Discovery- Entrepreneurship Essentials

NDWBC partners with the University of Mary, NDSU Female Business Leaders Club, Williston Chamber, Mandan HS FBLA Club, and programs at Century HS in Bismarck for entrepreneurship classes and training.



F. Woman-Owned Business Certification: State and Federal

NDWBC is the only entity authorized by the North Dakota Department of Commerce to examines\ applications and qualify businesses for the elite status as a Certified Woman-Owned Business in North Dakota. NDWBC also certifies Federal Woman-Owned Small Businesses for the Women's Business Enterprise National Council and the National Women Business Owners Corporation.

- This biennium, NDWBC approved or renewed 77 ND Woman-Owned Business certifications, preparing these businesses for better securing federal and private contracts
- The status of a Woman-Owned Business Certification provides unique opportunities for attaining and securing contracts from businesses looking to increase diversity in their supply chain.
- The national certification provides ND woman-owned businesses the opportunity to go after large, federal contracts set aside for women-owned businesses, as the U.S. government has the goal of allocating 5% of its contracts to woman-owned small businesses. In 2017, this benchmark was reached for the first time in US history. There are 36 industry categories set aside solely for federally certified woman-owned businesses to compete for contracts and sole-source awards, dramatically expanding the opportunities for women-owned businesses and paving the way for new jobs.

Summary:

Since 1999, NDWBC has served approximately 44,824 individuals across North Dakota. Its programming reach has drastically increased in the last year to increased demand, marketing abilities, and recognition as a go-to trainer and community collaborator. NDWBC works closely with its resource partners across the state and refers clients to its resource partners for their areas of expert service.

State dollars are used to serve existing and aspiring entrepreneurs across North Dakota with a special focus to train and equip its rural communities. To serve effectively, NDWBC continued to adapt its strategies and roll with the changes in the business environment and its federal regulations. This biennium, NDWBC has offered a dramatically increased number of one-on-one business advising sessions. These advisings, even with the help of virtual conferences and video chat capabilities, saw a wait time of 2-3 weeks due to increased demand for assistance through COVID and limited resources.

In addition to a dramatic increase of business and technical advisings, NDWBC experienced changes in tracking clients. First, the definition of "clients served" was amended. The "trained" numbers reflect only "unique clients" (who may have attended 5 training sessions) instead of counting attendees at each training. This change is evident when one compares the number of individuals trained compared to the previous years of training.

This biennium marks the first time that NDWBC tracked "outreach" to individuals attending training sessions where SBA 641 forms were not filled out. These numbers reflect attendees of in-person and virtual trainings sessions and include individuals who attend multiple training sessions.

Continued state funding will allow NDWBC to maximize the reach of its key programs. State funding will allow NDWBC to continue providing the needed assistance to meet the increased demand across rural and urban ND and allow NDWBC to continue accessing \$600,000.00 federal from the Small Business Administration that supports the ND Women's Business

Development Office. Thank you for the continued support and the State's commitment provide resources that improve the lives and inspires success for women and entrepreneurs across North Dakota.

I had worked for a "Woman-Owned Business," Jost Construction, several years prior, and I knew I wanted to own a majority of the company. My previous boss, Darla Jost, majority owner of Jost Construction, told me to reach out to NDWBC."

Pride Pups is Fargo-Moorhead's first dog grooming salon with Fear Free Certified professionals dedicated to supporting local non-profit organizations. The salon is owned and oper-

ated by Allie Seely and Carley Schutt. Their mission was developed when the owners realized their passion for grooming and animal welfare and turned it into a next-generation dog salon.

Using Fear-Free practices, Pride Pups offers a calm, comfortable grooming experience and rehabilitates dogs that have had negative experiences in the past. Pride Pups donates half of its tips to non-profits that benefit animals, women, and the LGBTO+

community.

"Opening a dog grooming salon in the middle of a pandemic has had its fair number of challenges, but it has been very rewarding. The main obstacles have been obtaining grooming equipment for the salon and funding for

a loan to pay for the necessary equipment and start-up costs. Due to the pandemic, there was a shortage in steel and other supplies that distributors needed to make the equipment that Pride Pups was trying to purchase. Luckily, we were able to borrow equipment from the previous owner of the space

until ours was delivered."

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Dan Coleman Dakota Property Services, LLC in West Fargo, ND Est. January 2020

Dakota Property Services, LLC offers residential and commercial rooftop and driveway/parking lot snow and ice removal, general home maintenance, yard care, lawn mowing, spring and fall cleanup, and more. Owner Dan Coleman was introduced to NDWBC through the F5 entrepreneurship program. The odds were against Dan, a three-time felon recently released from jail with no credit and a baby on the way.

Dan reached out after graduating from the entrepreneurship class because he wanted to start his own business, often one of the only employment ontions for felons.

NDWBC connected him with a local lender and helped him write his business and financial plans. He received a small business loan to jumpstart his lawn care service company. rough past.

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Testimony of Shawn Wenko, President Economic Development Association of North Dakota In Support of SB 2018 January 25, 2021

Chairman Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

I'm Shawn Wenko, executive director of Williston Economic Development and president of the Economic Development Association of North Dakota (EDND). It is in that capacity I am testifying before you today in support of SB 2018.

EDND represents more than 80 state economic development organizations on the front line of economic development efforts throughout North Dakota. The primary purpose of the organization is to promote the creation of new wealth throughout North Dakota to develop more vibrant communities and improve quality of life.

One of EDND's top priorities is to support North Dakota Department of Commerce programs as valuable tools, programs and resources for the economic developers in our state. EDND members can attest that a strong partnership with the state helps us locally recruit and retain new and expanding businesses, train North Dakota's workforce, and compete in national and international markets. We also rely on the Commerce Department to help local entrepreneurs explore potential opportunities and diversify the state's economy.

The pandemic and other unpredictability in oil and agriculture activity over the last decade have highlighted the need for North Dakota to diversify its economy and stabilize budget sources. Commercialization, entrepreneurship, and small business growth are crucial to North Dakota's economic future. Entrepreneurs and small businesses are leaders in the nation in employment growth. EDND is supportive of the continuation of all Department of Commerce programs which support local economic developers and businesses, such as Innovate ND, funding partners like the North Dakota Small Business Development Centers, providing training

programs to redeploy displaced workers through the Technical Skills Training Grant, attracting workers and new industries through business development programs and tourism, investing in emerging industries such as Unmanned Aerial Systems, and much more. Further investment in programs such as the Innovation Technology Loan Program (LIFT) as part of a comprehensive statewide strategy to continue to bring new industries to the state are other tools to help diversification.

Partner programs such as the ND Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDCs), ND Women's Business Center (NDWBC), Impact ND, and the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center are vitally important to small business owners launching a new business and the economies of small communities. As an example of the impact of one of these partners, the 10 ND SBDCs provide training and direct business advising and have served 1,879 clients since the biennium began in 2019. During this time, SBDCs have helped 138 new businesses start in the state, supported more than 6,900 jobs and secured more than \$76 million in funds for these businesses. For a few specific examples in the Williston area, the local SBDC was able to help the Hair Society Institute run cash flow scenarios and figure out the number of students to accept and training services to provide in order to get the school off the ground. They were also recently able to help Busted Knuckle Brewery and the Pit 105 Barbecue put together a finance plan with funders to enable the project, which took an old county building and rehabbed it, increasing the city's property tax base, to move forward. Across the state, every community or region can provide a multitude of examples like this, showing the value of these partner programs. EDND advocates for funding for all partner programs to remain stable from the 2019-21 biennium.

EDND believes an investment in the Department of Commerce is needed to grow and diversify the economy so North Dakota can ensure a more revenue-stable future. EDND members could spend the rest of the day giving examples of ways the Department of Commerce has aided their communities. No matter the location or size of the community, our membership relies on the Department of Commerce to provide guidance, resources, and staff to support and diversify our state's growth. Thank you for the opportunity to address the committee and express support for SB 2018 on behalf of economic developers statewide.

I am writing today to ask you to consider Governor Burgum's recommendation to increase the Tourism Division's budget, as well as the additional \$2 million in one-time funding for destination marketing from the general fund and the \$200,000 for brand extension and visitor services enhancements.

Tourism has always played a vital role to the State of ND bringing in "new money" to the state and helping to retain the revenue to distribute to other entities around the state through state budgets, but it is needed now more than ever. The pandemic has diminished travel and made some weary of planning meetings or traveling for work. North Dakota has the prime stance to gain visitors to our state for leisure travel because of our wide-open spaces. Social distancing will be key in gaining the momentum back, and we have just what they need. But in order to gain the economic impact, we need to make sure North Dakota Tourism has the tools in their toolbox to get our face in front of those traveling... and that takes money.

The Tourism Division of the Department of Commerce is a strong Economic Development partner because they present the "image of North Dakota" to also help us grow our state as a place to do business. The Tourism Division's staff have done a great job marketing our state on a small budget but as our competing state's marketing dollars increase, it is getting harder and harder for North Dakota to stay on track.

Local cities and attractions could not be as successful without the help from the state's Tourism Division. The advertising efforts, reach and other programs they provide to the local entities are important for us to acquire the needed travelers to our areas. We partner with the state on many programs such as the Travel Show program and other advertising campaigns/promotions. As a small CVB with a very small budget, we would not be able to advertise in some of these markets without the help of the state Tourism Division. The data that is provided to us is vital in learning more about our visitors and potential visitors and in evaluating our own efforts. All of our communities rely on the ND Department of Tourism as our resource for such information. As an example, if you take the time to look through their 2021 media plan you will see that they are heavily investing in the Chicago and Minneapolis markets. I can tell you for a fact that their media push helps my small community of Devils Lake because Chicago and the Minneapolis market are by far the largest visitors to my area of the state. Our cities need the help from the state Tourism Division to make us succeed and stay viable communities.

Advertising costs are on the rise and technology is advancing. It is vital to the state of North Dakota that the Tourism Division keep up with trends and stay competitive. The ND Tourism budget is already underfunded. Any cuts to the department would put us further behind our competitors. I encourage you and your committee to support the tourism portion of SB2018 for at least the ask, but would urge you to consider more. It has been proven that tourism marketing dollars come back to the state in significant multiples.

Testimony of Sheri Grossman Bismarck-Mandan Convention & Visitors Bureau Senate Bill 2018 January 25, 2021

Chairman Holmberg and Members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

My name is Sheri Grossman, and I am the CEO for the Bismarck-Mandan Convention & Visitors Bureau (CVB).

Sufficient funding for the ND Tourism Division is more important than ever. The pandemic has brought so much devastation to the tourism and hospitality industry.

As the third largest contributor to North Dakota's economy, tourism is a proven revenue generator in all 53 counties. Visitors come to North Dakota for a variety of reasons: to shop, fish, hunt, golf, play or watch a sport, attend an event or convention; the list goes on and on. Whatever the reason, the impact is significant.

All indicators are showing that people want to start traveling again. They will go somewhere; we need to have the funding to inspire them to choose North Dakota. If not, we are letting other states derive the benefits of the economic impact that could benefit our state.

If we have learned anything from this pandemic, it is how much the tourism industry contributes to the economic welfare of our communities in North Dakota. In 2020, Bismarck-Mandan lost over 235 multi-day meetings and events. That is over 168,000 attendees and over \$14.9 million in lost direct expenditures. The lodging tax revenue, which is our major funding source, is down 38%.

The Bismarck-Mandan CVB, like most communities, relies on the Tourism Division to market to leisure travelers. We partner with Tourism on cooperative efforts, making it more affordable for all of us. In addition, by having the Tourism Division do most of the marketing for leisure travelers, we can use more of our CVB marketing dollars to bring in larger conventions and events—allowing all of us to bring in the greatest number of out-of-state visitors and dollars to help stimulate our North Dakota economy. This partnership is more vital than ever.

If you have watched TV these past several months, it is hard to miss the wealth of advertising that we are seeing from South Dakota Tourism. South Dakota Tourism has always had a much larger budget than North Dakota. However, this additional funding influx is of great concern.

It is critical that our Tourism Division has adequate funding to compete with neighboring states. North Dakota cannot continue to let our neighbors capture these visitors and risk losing the economic impact that they could bring to North Dakota. It is imperative to attract this business to fill our hotels, restaurants, gas stations and stores. These businesses suffered so much in 2020.

I hope you will make the commitment to invest our state's resources in the ND Tourism Division a priority. All of North Dakota will reap the benefits.

We've continued to take advantage of the business advice of Mary Beth Votava, the current Center Director of the Minot Region SBDC. She has helped us improve our pricing structure, create budgets, analyze our performance, and survive the cycles of business in an area dependent on agriculture and oil. I believe it is safe to say The Flower House Garden Center would not be in business, employing 15-20 people in our small town, today if not for the support of SBDC. The Prairie Bistro, LLC began the same year the ND SBDC did, in 1989. And as with the Flower House, the local SBDC has been a steady source of support, education, and advice since I opened the business. I knew how to bake but not how to create a budget, price my product, or read a financial statement. Thanks to the ongoing support of the SBDC, we now employ 4 full staff and up to 8 part time. Neither business would be here today if not for the support of the SBDC.

Please support small business owners, local communities, and economic growth around our great state by supporting and increasing funding for the ND SBDC program. I cannot overstate the importance of their assistance, now more than ever, as small businesses like mine attempt to navigate and survive the impacts of the pandemic. The support of the ND SBDC has not only kept The Flower House Garden Center and The Prairie Bistro, LLC, but has also helped us grow. Financial support for this program will result in a healthier and more resilient small-business sector, create meaningful jobs and thriving communities, and support the overall North Dakota economy. The worst thing you want to do is overpay for a business. Sometimes, in the blind excitement of purchasing a business, a grounded, neutral party needs to look at it and provide advice. My wife did not buy this business.

Third: Mary Beth generated the projections for my wife to go out on her own and open her own flower shop. My wife opened her shop in April of 2012. She has now been open close to nine years and has been named the #1 flower shop in Minot for the last seven years.

Fourth: We leased the building for five years that houses my wife's flower shop. We were given the opportunity to purchase the building. Mary Beth assisted my wife and me in the paperwork needed to take to the banks for the purchase of the building.

Fifth: Mary Beth assisted my wife with applying for the Commerce Emergency Relief Grant. These funds were used to purchase a UV disinfection lamp, masks and sanitizing stations to make her business safer for customers to come in.

The Small Business Development Center has been vital to both my wife and me and our businesses. Small businesses are the backbone of our communities, contributing to the local economy and providing jobs.

Chairman Holmberg and Committee members, thank you for the opportunity to touch on the importance of SB2018. In Region 4 (northeastern North Dakota), we have been working diligently the past seven years in the areas of tourism/destination, workforce, manufacturing, and community development. These areas came to our forefront as key focal areas during strategic planning conducted in 2014.

First, I'd like to provide a brief report on activities in the Pembina Gorge, as this committee was instrumental to our ability to continue to develop outdoor recreational amenities. Though COVID prohibits Canadian visitors which have historically comprised most of the winter customers at Frost Fire, the Pembina Gorge Foundation opted to press forward to having a winter season this year. And, boy, are we glad we did. The mild winter and people aching to be outside, Frost Fire has been a bustling destination with more skiers than we'd imagined from down the valley and the entire state. This winter traffic has allowed us to showcase the Gorge and create a renewed awareness of these terrific amenities. COVID assistance has also been a lifeline for many of our small businesses.

In the past few years, we have enlisted support from the Department of Commerce and its partner programs in each of these areas. Both funding programs and expertise have been valuable to our efforts.

We have tapped funding from the Division of Community Services to address handicap accessibility at the Walla Theater, rehabilitate single family homes in Park River and Minto and launching a new project in Nelson County; greatly improve accessibility at Nelson County Health Systems in McVille; build a new fire hall in Crystal; and address water supply emergencies in Lakota and Aneta. Without this funding, each of these projects would've struggled greatly to be completed.

We have also received funding from the Partners in Marketing and Planning programs. To increase awareness of the retention and expansion of our 20+ manufacturing firms, the marketing program provided matching funds to complete 10 social media videos, conduct strategic planning, and plan a couple substantial student awareness events. Our manufacturers need nearly 750 new employees to support growth and replace retiring personnel in the next 3-5 years. The planning program is currently being utilized to develop a six-county destination and brand development strategic plan that will guide our efforts for the next 5-10 years.

We regularly call upon the Small Business Development Center and Impact Dakota as key partners. Both organizations provide quality one-on-one consulting services to new and existing entrepreneurs in our region. We are also extremely appreciative of the ND Workforce Development Council and strongly support their recommendations. In partnership with North Valley Career and Technology Center, we have been developing career exposure and linkage opportunities for our existing businesses has already

had success and needs to be increased. ND Career Builders can continue to assist in leveling up these efforts.

Tourism has been vital to our growing momentum in the Rendezvous Region. With 1.2 million people within a two-hour drive, we believe tourism has vast development potential to enliven our rural main streets and further outdoor recreation and cultural assets. The expertise, data, marketing, and funding opportunities give us the confidence and boost that are resulting in increased visits to our region. The monthly industry chats that have been developed due to COVID have been outstanding. It is our hope that we can turn some of these visitors to residents. We don't want to be a "best kept secret" – to overcome this, we are ever-increasing our marketing and need Tourism's assistance.

I call for support in further programs that enhance our ability to develop our rural communities. Over the past couple of sessions, community enhancement programs through Tourism Infrastructure Grant Program and ND Parks and Recreation Department Community Grant Program were not funded. The Outdoor Heritage Fund has not funded numerous rural community recreation requests. Without matching grants, many of these projects simply do not proceed.

I write to provide specific examples of the value the Department of Commerce is regularly bringing to our region. We are extremely grateful for the leadership, staff, and resources.

Testimony of Rudie Martinson

Chairman Holmberg and Members of the Committee,

Good morning and thank you for the opportunity to address the committee. My name is Rudie Martinson and I am Executive Director of the ND Hospitality Association, which is North Dakota's trade association for the restaurant, lodging, and retail beverage industries. Today we urge you to support the additional tourism marketing funding included in SB 2018.

Since the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic, the hospitality sector has been the most directly and severely impacted industry in North Dakota. Bars and restaurants have been subjected to executive orders severely curtailing their business activities, often forcing individual establishments to redesign their business models functionally overnight. And though the lodging segment of the industry has not been directly subject to such orders, the pandemic has caused the cancellation of nearly every business driver for a hotel property: things like business travel, conventions, community events, sporting events, and concerts.

The ND state government and the Burgum administration took pains to minimize the impact of the pandemic and its response measures on this critical portion of North Dakota's economy. Bars and restaurants were limited to carry-out service only for the shortest possible time, and the industry was involved in drafting the guidelines for reopening. Several economic aid programs were implemented in addition to the federal Paycheck Protection Plan in order to help businesses continue to function in light of harsh circumstances and additional regulatory requirements.

In fact, two rounds of grants were directed specifically at hospitality sector businesses. These programs were also designed to incentivize following ND Smart Restart guidelines, rather than implementing regulatory penalties for failure to comply.

Unfortunately, these regulations and economic aid programs were originally designed to be temporary measures, not permanent operating conditions. "Two weeks to slow the spread" is now entering month eleven, though vaccine distribution does appear to be providing a light at the end of the tunnel. However, bars and restaurants are simply not designed to operate at limited capacity indefinitely. Hotels cannot continue to operate with no upcoming events on their calendar for months ahead.

Tourism is North Dakota's third largest industry, and hospitality businesses are the front line of that industry. If North Dakota is going to maintain a recognizable hospitality industry in a post-COVID world, the state government needs to commit to making the financial investment to carry the industry through this challenging period in time.

This is why we believe support for the ND Tourism Division and their promotional programs is critical. These programs play a critical role in consumer demand recovery, and in reminding people regionally and nationwide what a great place North Dakota is to visit. These investments will result directly in an increase in visits and dollars being spent at our restaurants, bars, and hotels.

For these reasons, we urge your support of these tourism funds included in SB 2018. Thank you.

Executive Budget Recommendation

Section 3 would provide an exemption for discretionary funds to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds in the discretionary funds line item into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$2.15 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 4 would provide an exemption for unexpended 2017-19 biennium funds continued into the 2019-21 biennium for the beyond visual line of sight UAS program to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The 2019 Legislative Assembly provided a \$28 million supplemental appropriation from the general fund for this purpose for the 2017-19 biennium.

Section 8 would provide an exemption for the enhanced use lease grant program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$3 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 9 would transfer \$755,000 from the general fund to the internship fund in the operating expenses line item for the Operation Intern program.

Section 10 would provide an exemption for the Operation Intern program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$855,000 was appropriated from the general fund and transferred to the internship fund for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 11 would provide an exemption to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for intermodal container transportation shipping fees into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.3 million was appropriated from the beginning farmer revolving loan fund for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Executive Budget Recommendation

Section 16 would amend Section 54-60-29 to expand the continuing appropriation provided to the Department of Commerce from the UAS fund for expenses of the UAS program to also include expenses of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program and the enhanced use lease grant program.

As you know, our most recent audit identified opportunities for improvement in our control environment. We have thoroughly reviewed the audit report to identify appropriate control enhancements. Please see the Department of Commerce's action plan, below.

FINDING 19-01 "CIRCUMVENTING PROCUREMENT GUIDELINES"

Audit Issue (pg. 2 of Audit Report)

"These contracts should have been treated as one contract for services and allowed for contractor competition following the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) procurement requirements."

Commerce Position

"We disagree with the finding that the Department "violated state law by circumventing procurement requirements related to the 'Be Legendary' logo and overall brand refresh. As correctly stated in the audit report, the value of this contract was \$9,500, and as such, did not require a competitive bid process under procurement rules. Contract deliverables were met prior to the contract being completed. Subsequently, temporary workers were hired to perform work that was connected to the brand refresh but was separate from the contract deliverables. We acknowledge there was overlap in the time frame of the contract and the temporary employment as the final contract payment was made in November 2018, and the temporary employees began employment with the Department in October 2018. After the hiring of the temporary employees, the OMB Procurement Office was consulted, and steps were taken to ensure the contract was appropriately terminated after final payment. The Department will ensure there is a clear separation between contract deliverables and temporary employment arrangements in the future and that all procurement requirements are followed."

As stated above, there were two separate workstreams: one to create the website design, or "frame," and the other to develop content for the website, which required additional resources. While we acknowledge these efforts were related, there was no overlap with the original contract, and we believe Commerce properly complied with OMB Purchasing Guidelines. Commerce also followed state hiring practices and generally accepted employment law principles in treating those hired for the second workstream as temporary employees.

FINDING 19-02 "VIOLATION OF APPROPRIATION AUTHORITY"

Audit Issue (pg. 5 of Audit Report)

"...violated their appropriation authorized in the 2017 Session Laws by improperly charging \$853,908 to the wrong biennium."

Commerce Position

The Department of Commerce agrees with the recommendation and acknowledges that these expenditures should have been charged to the 2019-21 biennium rather than the 2017-19 Biennium. The Department will strengthen internal controls and implement procedures to ensure in the future expenditures are properly allocated to the correct biennium.

As acknowledged, this was a timing error related to payment for agreed-upon work on an infrastructure project at Grand Sky UAS park – a project that was funded by the Legislature and had been delayed by weather. The Department made the correct payment to the correct party at the incorrect time, and Commerce has since implemented changes to prevent it from happening again. Ultimately, the funds went to the Legislature's intended purpose, and no party received undue benefit. Funding for infrastructure projects often comes with continuing appropriation authority, or "carryover" authority, which allows the funding to be carried into the next biennium in case of construction delays. That carryover authority was not in place for this project. Commerce will request such authority in the future to prevent this from happening again.

FINDING 19-03 "NONCOMPLIANCE WITH CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS"

Audit Issue (pg. 6 of Audit Report)

"...did not monitor contract deliverables of an entrepreneurial contract with a total cost of \$253,921. As a result, contract payments totaling \$123,750 were made to unapproved subcontractors. Further, \$23,448 of these payments were not supported by progress reports."

Commerce Position

"We disagree with the finding that the Department did not monitor contract deliverables and that contract payments were made to unapproved subcontractors.

The auditor's report indicates that the following contract deliverables were not met:

- CONTRACTOR must submit sub-contractors to state for approval with proof of sustainability of developed programming/positions.
- Sub-contractor progress reports must be reported in CONTRACTOR quarterly required reports.

The auditor's report indicates that the "The Department did not approve subcontractors...as required by the contract." The Department did provide approval for sub-contracts; however, this approval occurred verbally, as verified by the previous contract manager and vendor. The auditor's report indicates that unsupported payments were made to unapproved subcontractors. As noted, the Department verbally approved subcontractors, hence disagrees payments were made to "unapproved" contractors. The Department has implemented contract monitoring procedures to ensure appropriate documentation is secured in advance of payment for all future contracts."

As stated above, subcontractors were verbally approved as allowed for in the contract, and no payments were made to unapproved subcontractors. Commerce specifically reconciled the subcontractor billing with the aggregated billing to ensure that no one was overpaid or underpaid.

Executive Budget Recommendation

Section 3 would provide an exemption for discretionary funds to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds in the discretionary funds line item into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$2.15 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 4 would provide an exemption for unexpended 2017-19 biennium funds continued into the 2019-21 biennium for the beyond visual line of sight UAS program to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The 2019 Legislative Assembly provided a \$28 million supplemental appropriation from the general fund for this purpose for the 2017-19 biennium.

Section 5 would provide an exemption to continue unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the early childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.5 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 6 would provide an exemption to continue unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$500,000 was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 7 would provide an exemption for the UAS program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the operating expenses of this program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$2.25 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 8 would provide an exemption for the enhanced use lease grant program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$3 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 9 would transfer \$755,000 from the general fund to the internship fund in the operating expenses line item for the Operation Intern program.

Section 10 would provide an exemption for the Operation Intern program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$855,000 was appropriated from the general fund and transferred to the internship fund for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 6 provides an exemption to continue \$320,000 of the \$500,000 appropriated for the 2019-21 biennium for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program into the 2021-23 biennium. Executive Budget Recommendation

Section 11 would provide an exemption to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for intermodal container transportation shipping fees into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.3 million was appropriated from the beginning farmer revolving loan fund for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 12 would appropriate all federal and special funds received by the Department of Commerce in excess of those funds appropriated in Section 1.

Section 13 would identify \$750,000 from the general fund for the North Dakota Trade Office and would allow the Department of Commerce to spend 60 percent of the North Dakota Trade Office line item listed in Section 1 without requiring any matching funds from the North Dakota Trade Office. Any unexpended funds for the program would be made available to the department during the 2023-25 biennium.

Section 15 would amend North Dakota Century Code Section 54-60-16 to restrict the North Dakota Trade Office, also known as the International Business and Trade Office, from assisting businesses with investment opportunities in farming, forestry, ranching, food quality, and nutrition. The section would also be amended to provide the Commissioner of Commerce, or the commissioner's designee, must serve as the chairman of the International Business and Trade Office Advisory Board.

Section 16 would amend Section 54-60-29 to expand the continuing appropriation provided to the Department of Commerce from the UAS fund for expenses of the UAS program to also include expenses of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program and the enhanced use lease grant program.

Section 14 provides an exemption to continue unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the early childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.5 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 15 provides an exemption to continue \$320,000 of the \$500,000 appropriated for the 2019-21 biennium for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program into the 2021-23 biennium. In addition to the program eligibility guidelines established for the 2019-21 biennium, the Department of Commerce is required to provide funding for the program to eligible nursing students in the state who have not been employed by a health care provider on a full-time basis in the year preceding the grant award.

Section 10 would provide an exemption for the Operation Intern program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$855,000 was appropriated from the general fund and transferred to the internship fund for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 11 would provide an exemption to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for intermodal container transportation shipping fees into the 2021-23 biennium. SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION - BEYOND VISUAL LINE OF SIGHT UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PROGRAM - ONE-TIME FUNDING. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 8. A new section to chapter 4.1-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

<u>International business and trade office - Advisory board - Continuing appropriation.</u>

- 1. The commissioner shall administer the international business and trade office. The purpose of the office is to assist North Dakota businesses to expand exports to international markets by:
 - a. Advocating for exporters;

- b. Offering export educational opportunities to North Dakota businesses;
- <u>Researching and raising awareness of export opportunities, issues, and challenges impacting North Dakota businesses;</u>
- d. Assisting North Dakota businesses in identifying, developing, and cultivating international markets for products; and
- e. Organizing and carrying out trade missions that seek to facilitate contact and communication between North Dakota businesses and international markets.
- 2. The commissioner may designate a nonprofit corporation incorporated in this state which has the primary purpose of assisting North Dakota exporters or contract with a third party for the provision of services for the international business and trade office. If the commissioner designates a nonprofit corporation or contracts with a third party under this subsection, all data and databases collected and created by the third party in performing services for the office are the property of the department and the third party.
- 3. The commissioner may seek and accept any gift, grant, or donation of funds, property, services, or other assistance from public or private sources for the purpose of furthering the objectives of the international business and trade office. Any funds accepted under this subsection are appropriated to the commissioner on a continuing basis.
- 4. The commissioner may establish an international business and trade office advisory board with whom the commissioner may consult in administering the international business and trade office. Each member of the advisory board is entitled to receive per diem compensation at a rate established by the director not exceeding sixty-two dollars and fifty cents and reimbursement of expenses as provided by law for state officers, while attending meetings or performing duties directly related to board membership, except that per diem compensation under this section may not be paid to any member who receives compensation or salary as a regular state employee or official.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-60-29. Unmanned aircraft systems program fund - Continuing appropriation.

- There is created in the state treasury a special fund known as the unmanned aircraft systems fund, which mustmay be used to defray the expenses of the operations:
 - <u>a.</u> <u>Operations</u> of an unmanned aircraft systems test site officially designated by the federal aviation administration;
 - <u>b.</u> Beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program; and
 - c. Enhanced use lease grant program.



2. The fund consists of fees collected for the administration of the test site and other funds appropriated by the legislative assembly. All moneys in the fund are appropriated to the department of commerce on a continuing basis for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the unmanned aircraft systems programprograms identified in subsection 1. Interest earned on moneys in the fund must be credited to the fund.

SECTION 10. REPEAL. Section 54-60-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.

SECTION 11. EXEMPTION - BEYOND VISUAL LINE OF SIGHT UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PROGRAM. The amount of \$28,000,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The department of commerce may provide grants of up to \$28,000,000, to the department of transportation, for the purpose of defraying tower infrastructure construction expenses of the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program during the 2021-23 biennium.

SECTION 12. EXEMPTION - UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PROGRAM. The amount of \$2,250,000 appropriated from the general fund in the operating expenses line item for the unmanned aircraft system program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - ENHANCED USE LEASE GRANT PROGRAM. The amount of \$3,000,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the enhanced use lease grant program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 14. EXEMPTION - EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION PROGRAM. The amount of \$1,500,000 appropriated from the general fund in the operating expenses line item and grants line item for the early childhood education program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 15. EXEMPTION - NONRESIDENT NURSE EMPLOYMENT RECRUITMENT PROGRAM - ELIGIBILITY. Of the \$500,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws, \$320,000 is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. In addition to the program eligibility guidelines established for the 2019-21 biennium, the department of commerce shall provide funding authorized in this section to eligible nursing students in the state who have not been employed by a health care provider on a full-time basis in the year preceding the grant award.

SECTION 16. EXEMPTION - DISCRETIONARY FUNDS. The amount of \$2,150,000 appropriated from the general fund in the discretionary funds line item in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11

SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION - BEYOND VISUAL LINE OF SIGHT UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PROGRAM - ONE-TIME FUNDING. There is appropriated from special funds, derived from grant funds received from the department of commerce pursuant to section 11 of this Act, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$28,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of transportation for the purpose of defraying tower infrastructure construction expenses of the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The department of transportation may bid, award, and administer any contracts necessary to complete the construction of the tower infrastructure. This funding is considered a one-time funding item."

The grants line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$1,000,000 from the general fund for grants to an organization dedicated to expanding workforce opportunities, training, and education related to the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system industry, which the department of commerce may provide only to the extent the organization provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the department. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 8. A new section to chapter 4.1-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

<u>International business and trade office - Advisory board - Continuing appropriation.</u>

- 1. The commissioner shall administer the international business and trade office. The purpose of the office is to assist North Dakota businesses to expand exports to international markets by:
 - a. Advocating for exporters;
 - Offering export educational opportunities to North Dakota businesses;
 - Researching and raising awareness of export opportunities, issues, and challenges impacting North Dakota businesses;
 - d. Assisting North Dakota businesses in identifying, developing, and cultivating international markets for products; and

- e. Organizing and carrying out trade missions that seek to facilitate contact and communication between North Dakota businesses and international markets.
- 2. The commissioner may designate a nonprofit corporation incorporated in this state which has the primary purpose of assisting North Dakota exporters or contract with a third party for the provision of services for the international business and trade office. If the commissioner designates a nonprofit corporation or contracts with a third party under this subsection, all data and databases collected and created by the third party in performing services for the office are the property of the department and the third party.
- 3. The commissioner may seek and accept any gift, grant, or donation of funds, property, services, or other assistance from public or private sources for the purpose of furthering the objectives of the international business and trade office. Any funds accepted under this subsection are appropriated to the commissioner on a continuing basis.
- 4. The commissioner may establish an international business and trade office advisory board with whom the commissioner may consult in administering the international business and trade office. Each member of the advisory board is entitled to receive per diem compensation at a rate established by the director not exceeding sixty-two dollars and fifty cents and reimbursement of expenses as provided by law for state officers, while attending meetings or performing duties directly related to board membership, except that per diem compensation under this section may not be paid to any member who receives compensation or salary as a regular state employee or official.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-60-29. Unmanned aircraft systems program fund - Continuing appropriation.

- There is created in the state treasury a special fund known as the unmanned aircraft systems fund, which <u>mustmay</u> be used to defray the expenses of the <u>operations</u>:
 - <u>a.</u> <u>Operations</u> of an unmanned aircraft systems test site officially designated by the federal aviation administration;
 - b. Beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program; and
 - c. Enhanced use lease grant program.
- The fund consists of fees collected for the administration of the test site and other funds appropriated by the legislative assembly. All moneys in the fund are appropriated to the department of commerce on a continuing basis for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the unmanned aircraft systems programprograms identified in subsection 1. Interest earned on moneys in the fund must be credited to the fund.

SECTION 10. REPEAL. Section 54-60-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.

SECTION 11. EXEMPTION - BEYOND VISUAL LINE OF SIGHT UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PROGRAM. The amount of \$28,000,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019

Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The department of commerce may provide grants of up to \$28,000,000, to the department of transportation, for the purpose of defraying tower infrastructure construction expenses of the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program during the 2021-23 biennium.

SECTION 12. EXEMPTION - UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM

PROGRAM. The amount of \$2,250,000 appropriated from the general fund in the operating expenses line item for the unmanned aircraft system program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - ENHANCED USE LEASE GRANT

PROGRAM. The amount of \$3,000,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the enhanced use lease grant program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 14. EXEMPTION - EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

PROGRAM. The amount of \$1,500,000 appropriated from the general fund in the operating expenses line item and grants line item for the early childhood education program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 15. EXEMPTION - NONRESIDENT NURSE EMPLOYMENT RECRUITMENT PROGRAM - ELIGIBILITY. Of the \$500,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws, \$320,000 is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. In addition to the program eligibility guidelines established for the 2019-21 biennium, the department of commerce shall provide funding authorized in this section to eligible nursing students in the state who have not been employed by a health care provider on a full-time basis in the year preceding the grant award.

SECTION 16. EXEMPTION - DISCRETIONARY FUNDS. The amount of \$2,150,000 appropriated from the general fund in the discretionary funds line item in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023."

The department of commerce shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-eighth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION - BEYOND VISUAL LINE OF SIGHT UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PROGRAM - ONE-TIME FUNDING. There is appropriated from special funds, derived from grant funds received from the department of commerce pursuant to section 11 of this Act, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$28,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of transportation for the purpose of defraying tower infrastructure construction expenses of the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The department of transportation may bid, award, and administer any contracts necessary to complete the construction of the tower infrastructure. This funding is considered a one-time funding item."

SECTION 7. BEYOND VISUAL LINE OF SIGHT UNMANNED AIRCRAFT PROGRAM - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT - ONE-TIME FUNDING. The grants line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$1,000,000 from the general fund for grants to an organization dedicated to expanding workforce opportunities, training, and education related to the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system industry, which the department of commerce may provide only to the extent the organization provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the department. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

SECTION 8. A new section to chapter 4.1-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

<u>International business and trade office - Advisory board - Continuing appropriation.</u>

- 1. The commissioner shall administer the international business and trade office. The purpose of the office is to assist North Dakota businesses to expand exports to international markets by:
 - a. Advocating for exporters;

- b. Offering export educational opportunities to North Dakota businesses:
- c. Researching and raising awareness of export opportunities, issues, and challenges impacting North Dakota businesses;
- d. Assisting North Dakota businesses in identifying, developing, and cultivating international markets for products; and
- e. Organizing and carrying out trade missions that seek to facilitate contact and communication between North Dakota businesses and international markets.
- 2. The commissioner may designate a nonprofit corporation incorporated in this state which has the primary purpose of assisting North Dakota exporters or contract with a third party for the provision of services for the international business and trade office. If the commissioner designates a nonprofit corporation or contracts with a third party under this subsection, all data and databases collected and created by the third party in performing services for the office are the property of the department and the third party.
- 3. The commissioner may seek and accept any gift, grant, or donation of funds, property, services, or other assistance from public or private sources for the purpose of furthering the objectives of the international business and trade office. Any funds accepted under this subsection are appropriated to the commissioner on a continuing basis.
- 4. The commissioner may establish an international business and trade office advisory board with which the commissioner may consult in administering the international business and trade office. Each member of the advisory board is entitled to receive per diem compensation at a rate established by the director not exceeding sixty-two dollars and fifty cents and reimbursement of expenses as provided by law for state officers, while attending meetings or performing duties directly related to board membership, except that per diem compensation under this section may not be paid to any member who receives compensation or salary as a regular state employee or official.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-60-29. Unmanned aircraft systems program fund - Continuing appropriation.

- 1. There is created in the state treasury a special fund known as the unmanned aircraft systems fund, which mustmay be used to defray the expenses of the operations:
 - <u>a.</u> Operations of an unmanned aircraft systems test site officially designated by the federal aviation administration;
 - b. Beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program; and
 - c. Enhanced use lease grant program.

The fund consists of fees collected for the administration of the test site and other funds appropriated by the legislative assembly. All moneys in the fund are appropriated to the department of commerce on a continuing basis for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the unmanned aircraft systems programprograms identified in subsection 1 of this section. Interest earned on moneys in the fund must be credited to the fund.

SECTION 10. REPEAL. Section 54-60-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.

SECTION 11. EXEMPTION - BEYOND VISUAL LINE OF SIGHT UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PROGRAM. The amount of \$28,000,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. The department of commerce may provide grants of up to \$28,000,000, to the department of transportation, for the purpose of defraying tower infrastructure construction expenses of the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program during the 2021-23 biennium.

SECTION 12. EXEMPTION - UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PROGRAM. The amount of \$2,250,000 appropriated from the general fund in the operating expenses line item for the unmanned aircraft system program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - ENHANCED USE LEASE GRANT PROGRAM. The amount of \$3,000,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the enhanced use lease grant program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 14. EXEMPTION - EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION PROGRAM. The amount of \$1,500,000 appropriated from the general fund in the operating expenses line item and grants line item for the early childhood education program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 15. EXEMPTION - NONRESIDENT NURSE EMPLOYMENT RECRUITMENT PROGRAM - ELIGIBILITY. Of the \$500,000 appropriated from the general fund in the grants line item for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws, \$320,000 is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. In addition to the program eligibility guidelines established for the 2019-21 biennium, the department of commerce shall provide funding authorized in this section to eligible nursing students in the state who have not been employed by a health care provider on a full-time basis in the year preceding the grant award.

SECTION 16. EXEMPTION - DISCRETIONARY FUNDS. The amount of \$2,150,000 appropriated from the general fund in the discretionary funds line item in section 27 of chapter 40 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11



Other Sections in Senate Bill No. 2018

Appropriation - Department of Transportation - Beyond visual line of sight UAS program - Section 3 appropriates \$28 million to the Department of Transportation from grant funds received from the Department of Commerce pursuant to Section 11 for the purpose of defraying tower infrastructure construction expenses of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program during the 2021-23 biennium. The Department of Transportation may bid, award, and administer any contracts necessary to complete the construction of the tower infrastructure. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

Internship fund transfer - Section 4 transfers \$755,000 from the general fund to the internship fund in the operating expenses line item for the Operation Intern program.

Entrepreneurship grants and vouchers program - Section 5 identifies \$948,467 included in Section 1, of which \$740,956 is from the general fund and \$207,511 is from the economic development fund for the entrepreneurship grants and vouchers program, also known as Innovate ND, for the 2021-23 biennium.

Strategic investment and improvements fund - Beyond visual line of sight UAS program - Enhanced use lease grant program - Section 6 identifies \$26 million from the strategic investment and improvements fund in Section 1, of which \$19 million is for providing beyond visual line of sight UAS grants and \$7 million is for providing enhanced use lease grants during the 2021-23 biennium. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

Beyond visual line of sight UAS program - Matching fund requirement - Section 7 identifies \$1 million from the general fund in Section 1 is for providing grants to an organization dedicated to expanding workforce opportunities, training, and education related to the beyond visual line of sight UAS industry, which the Department of Commerce may provide only to the extent the organization provides \$1 of matching funds from private or other public sources for each \$1 provided by the department during the 2021-23 biennium. This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

North Dakota Trade Office - Advisory board - Continuing appropriation - Section 8 creates a new section to North Dakota Century Code Chapter 4.1-01 to transfer the international business and trade office, also known as the North Dakota Trade Office, from the Department of Commerce to the Agriculture Commissioner.

UAS-related programs continuing appropriation - Section 9 amends Section 54-60-29 to expand the continuing appropriation provided to the Department of Commerce from the UAS fund for expenses of the UAS program to also include expenses of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program and the enhanced use lease grant program.

North Dakota Trade Office - Repeal - Section 10 repeals Section 54-60-16 related to the international business and trade office, also known as the North Dakota Trade Office, as part of the transfer of the program from the Department of Commerce to the Agriculture Commissioner.

Beyond visual line of sight UAS program exemption - Section 11 provides an exemption for unexpended 2017-19 biennium funds continued into the 2019-21 biennium for the beyond visual line of sight UAS program to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The 2019 Legislative Assembly provided a \$28 million supplemental appropriation from the general fund for this purpose for the 2017-19 biennium. The Department of Commerce may provide grants of up to \$28 million to the Department of Transportation, pursuant to the appropriation in Section 3, defraying tower infrastructure construction expenses of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program during the 2021-23 biennium.

Unmanned aircraft systems program exemption - Section 12 provides an exemption for the UAS program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the operating expenses of this program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$2.25 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Enhanced use lease grant program exemption - Section 13 provides an exemption for the enhanced use lease grant program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$3 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Early childhood education grant program exemption - Section 14 provides an exemption to continue unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the early childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.5 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Nonresident nurse employment recruitment program exemption - Section 15 provides an exemption to continue \$320,000 of the \$500,000 appropriated from the general fund for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program for the 2019-21 biennium into the 2021-23 biennium. In addition to the program eligibility guidelines established for the 2019-21 biennium, the Department of Commerce is required to provide funding for the program to eligible nursing students in the state who have not been employed by a health care provider on a full-time basis in the year preceding the grant award.

Discretionary funds exemption - Section 16 provides an exemption for discretionary funds to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds in the discretionary funds line item into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$2.15 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Continuing Appropriations

Innovation loan fund to support technology advancement - Section 6-09.18-05 - Provided for the purpose of providing innovation technology loans and for administrative expenses. The Department of Commerce is required to deposit to the fund all principal and interest paid on loans made from the fund. Loan recipients may only use funding to conduct applied research, experimentation, or operational testing within the state.

Ethanol production incentive fund - Section 17-02-05 - Allows for payments of ethanol production incentives to North Dakota ethanol plants.

Workforce enhancement fund - Section 54-60-23 - All funds in the workforce enhancement fund are appropriated to the Department of Commerce on a continuing basis for implementing and administering the Workforce Enhancement Council and workforce enhancement grants to higher education institutions assigned primary responsibility for workforce training.

Community development loan fund - Section 54-44.5-05 - Allows for the expenditures of community development block grant revolving loan funds.

Research North Dakota - Section 54-65-08 - This continuing appropriation allows for implementing and administering the Research North Dakota program.

Internship fund - Section 54-60-17.1 - This continuing appropriation allows for the expansion of the number of new internships, work experience, and apprenticeship opportunities with North Dakota employers.

UAS program fund - Section 54-60-29 - This continuing appropriation allows the UAS test site to collect fees and use the collected fees for expenses relating to the administration of the test site.

Energy conservation grant fund - Section 54-44.5-05.1 - This continuing appropriation allows for the agency to provide grants to political subdivisions for energy conservation projects in nonfederal public buildings.

Significant Audit Findings

The operational audit for the Department of Commerce conducted by the State Auditor's office for the period ending June 30, 2019, identified the following significant audit findings:

- Circumventing procurement guidelines The Department of Commerce circumvented procurement requirements
 related to the "Be Legendary" logo. In July 2018, the department entered a contract with a Minnesota-based business for
 \$9,500 to update the official North Dakota logo and develop digital and other mediums, including a new nd.gov website.
 The department later entered two temporary employment contracts to allow the work from the original contract to continue
 to avoid certain procurement requirements. The total of these contracts was \$87,163.
- Violation of appropriation law The Department of Commerce improperly charged \$853,908 related to the enhanced
 use lease grant program for the 2017-19 biennium in the 2019-21 biennium. The 2017 Legislative Assembly provided a
 one-time appropriation of \$3 million to the department for the enhanced use lease grant program, of which \$1 million was

from the general fund and \$2 million was from the strategic investment and improvements fund. In December 2017, the department entered a grant agreement with Grand Forks County.

Grand Forks County submitted reimbursement requests for the work completed but the final payment to the county exceeded the reimbursement request by \$458,801, resulting in an advance payment prohibited by the grant agreement.

An additional \$395,107 for the program related to July 2019 expenditures was improperly charged to appropriations for the 2017-19 biennium.

The department did not request an exemption from the 2019 Legislative Assembly to continue funding for the program from the 2017-19 biennium to the 2019-21 biennium. Therefore, the total of \$853,908 should have been canceled at the end of the 2017-19 biennium and retained in the originating funding sources--the general fund and the strategic investment and improvements fund.

- Noncompliance with contract requirements The Department of Commerce did not monitor contract deliverables of
 an entrepreneurial contract, resulting in \$123,750 being paid to unapproved subcontractors. An additional \$23,448 was
 not supported by progress reports.
- Lack of internal control surrounding appropriations The Department of Commerce's internal control procedures
 are not effective to ensure expenditures are charged to the proper biennial appropriations authorized by the Legislative
 Assembly, as seen in the violation of appropriation law audit finding.

Major Related Legislation

House Bill No. 1141 - Transfers \$15 million from the strategic investment and improvements fund to the innovation loan fund to support technology advancement for providing innovation technology loans during the 2021-23 biennium.

House Bill No. 1142 - Appropriates \$250,000 from the general fund to the Department of Commerce for providing matching funds to an organization assisting in the recruitment, distribution, and supply, and enhancing the quality and efficiency of personnel providing health services in rural areas of the state. The department may spend the appropriated funds only to the extent the organization has secured matching funds from nonstate sources on a \$1-for-\$1 basis.

House Bill No. 1394 - This bill provides a 2019-21 biennium appropriation of \$11,393,078 to the Department of Commerce from federal funds received as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, of which \$7,393,078 is for the community services block grant program, \$3,000,000 is for the community development block grant program, and \$1,000,000 is for the emergency solutions block grant program. Section 2 of the bill provides an exemption for the Department of Commerce to continue the funding into the 2021-23 biennium.

House Bill No. 1395 - This bill provides a 2019-21 biennium appropriation of \$109,179,000 of federal funding to the Department of Commerce, as approved by the Emergency Commission and Budget Section during the 2019-20 interim, from the state's allocation from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund for various programs in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Senate Bill No. 2245 - Appropriates \$10 million from the strategic investment and improvements fund to the Department of Commerce for developing an intermodal transportation assistance program, which must be used for providing grants to an organization dedicated to the purchase and development of an intermodal transportation facility and expansion of intermodal infrastructure in the state. Grant funds awarded must be used for the purchase of infrastructure assets, real property, and equipment necessary for successful intermodal rail service in the state.

Senate Bill No. 2291 - Requires the Department of Commerce to study environmental social governance related to government and private industry in the state. The study must include an evaluation of investment policies and the potential implications for the state related to the boycott of energy or production of agriculture commodities by companies that intend to penalize, inflict economic harm on, or limit commercial relations. The department is required to report its findings and recommendations to the Legislative Management by June 1, 2022.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4001 - Authorizes the Budget Section to hold the required legislative hearings on state plans for the receipt and expenditures of new or revised block grants passed by Congress. The Department of Commerce appropriation bill contains directions regarding the use of community services block grant program money for the period ending September 30, 2023.

Executive Budget Recommendation

Section 11 would provide an exemption to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for intermodal container transportation shipping fees into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.3 million was appropriated from the beginning farmer revolving loan fund for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 12 would appropriate all federal and special funds received by the Department of Commerce in excess of those funds appropriated in Section 1.

Section 13 would identify \$750,000 from the general fund for the North Dakota Trade Office and would allow the Department of Commerce to spend 60 percent of the North Dakota Trade Office line item listed in Section 1 without requiring any matching funds from the North Dakota Trade Office. The section would also be amended to provide the Commissioner of Commerce, or the commissioner's designee, must serve as the chairman of the International Business and Trade Office Advisory Board.



EXEMPTION.** The amount appropriated for the discretionary funds line item in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this line item are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 4. EXEMPTION.** The amount appropriated for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft systems program in section 12 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this line item are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 5. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$1,500,000 appropriated from the general fund for the early childhood education grant program in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 6. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$500,000 appropriated from the general fund for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this line item are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 7. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$2,225,000 appropriated from the general fund for the unmanned aircraft systems operating expense in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 8. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$3,000,000 appropriated from the general fund for the enhanced use lease grants in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 9. TRANSFER INTERNSHIP FUND.** The office of management and budget shall transfer \$755,000 of the amount appropriated in the operating expenses line item in section 1 of this Act to the internship fund for the purpose of administering the operation intern program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 10. EXEMPTION.** The amount of \$855,000 appropriated from the general fund in the operating expenses line item for the operation intern program in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws and transferred to the internship fund in section 7 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 11. EXEMPTION**. The amount of \$1,300,000 appropriated to the department of commerce from the beginning farmer revolving loan fund for intermodal container transportation shipping fees in section 1 of chapter 18 of the 2019 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this program are available for the program during the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.
- **SECTION 12. APPROPRIATION -** In addition to the amounts appropriated to the department of commerce in section 1 of this Act, there is appropriated any additional income from federal or other funds which may become available to the agency for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023.

SECTION 13. TRADE OFFICE - MATCHING FUND REQUIREMENT. The North Dakota trade office line item and the general fund appropriation in section 1 of this Act include \$750,000 of funding relating to the North Dakota trade office. The department of commerce may spend sixty percent of this amount without requiring any matching funds from the trade office. Any additional amounts may be spent only to the extent that the North Dakota trade office provides one dollar of matching funds from private or other public sources for each one dollar provided by the department for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. Matching funds may include money spent by businesses or organizations to pay salaries to export assistants, provide training to export assistants, or buy computer equipment as part of the North Dakota trade office's export assistance program.

SECTION 14. ENTREPRENEURSHIP GRANTS AND VOUCHER PROGRAM. Section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$948,467, of which \$740,956 is from the general fund and \$207,511 from special funds, for an entrepreneurship grants and voucher program to be developed and administered by the department of commerce, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. The department shall establish guidelines to provide grants to entrepreneurial centers certified by the department. The department shall also establish guidelines to award vouchers to entrepreneurs to procure business development assistance from certified entrepreneurial centers or to provide grants to entrepreneurs working with an entrepreneurial center. The amount appropriated for entrepreneurship grants in section 1 of this Act is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this line item are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 15. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-60-16. International business and trade office - Advisory board.

- 1. The commissioner shall administer the international business and trade office. The purpose of the office is to assist North Dakota businesses expand exports to international markets and to attract investment opportunities to the state by:
 - a. Advocating for exporters and foreign direct investment opportunities;
 - b. Offering export educational opportunities to North Dakota businesses;
 - c. Researching and raising awareness of export <u>and international business</u> opportunities, issues, and challenges impacting North Dakota businesses;
 - d. Assisting North Dakota businesses in identifying, developing, and cultivating international markets for products; and
 - e. Organizing and carrying out trade <u>and reverse trade</u> missions that seek to facilitate contact and communication between North Dakota businesses and international markets.; and
 - f. Assisting and fostering the diplomatic mission of North Dakota.
- 2. The international business and trade office shall not assist businesses with expansion efforts or investment opportunities in any of the following markets: farming, forestry, ranching, food quality, or nutrition.
- 3. The commissioner may designate a nonprofit corporation incorporated in this state that has the primary purpose of assisting North Dakota exporters or contract with a third party for the provision of services for the international business and trade office. If the commissioner designates a nonprofit corporation or contracts with a third party under this subsection, all data and databases collected and created by the third party in performing services for the office are the property of the department and the third party.
- 4. The department may seek and accept any gift, grant, or donation of funds, property, services, or other assistance from public or private sources for the purpose of furthering the objectives of the international business and trade office.
- 5. The commissioner may establish an international business and trade office advisory board with which the director may consult in administering the international business and trade office.
 - commissioner or the commissioner's designee shall serve as the chair of the international business and trade office advisory board. Each member of the advisory board created under this subsection is entitled to receive per diem compensation at a rate established by the director not exceeding sixty-two dollars and fifty cents and reimbursement of expenses as provided by law for state officers, while attending meetings or performing duties directly related to board

membership, except that per diem compensation under this section may not be paid to any member who receives compensation or salary as a regular state employee or official.

SECTION 16. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-60-29. Unmanned aircraft systems program fund - Continuing appropriation.

- 1. There is created in the state treasury a special fund known as the unmanned aircraft systems fund, which must may be used for the following purposes:
 - <u>a.</u> To defray the expenses of the operations of an unmanned aircraft systems test site officially designated by the federal aviation administration.
 - b. To defray the expenses of the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system program.
 - c. To defray the expense of the enhanced used lease grant program.
- 2. The fund consists of fees collected for the administration of the test site and other funds as appropriated. All moneys in the fund are appropriated to the department of commerce on a continuing basis for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the unmanned aircraft systems program. Interest earned on moneys in the fund must be credited to the fund.

Chairman Monson and members of the House Appropriations Committee, I am James Leiman and I have the privilege of serving as Commissioner of the North Dakota Department of Commerce. The amazing Commerce leadership team joins me today to assist in providing you a report on Commerce. We also have a short video to augment our presentation that includes supporting testimony from some of our amazing partners. We have weaved the video and supporting testimony into our allotted time.

Commerce has had an extraordinary two years and we are ready to accelerate that success and take North Dakota to the next level. We will share with you today some of those successes and discuss Commerce's priorities by breaking them down into five themes:

Theme 1: Commerce crushed it in the face of a flock of black swans

Theme 2: Community Development

Theme 3: The New Workforce

Theme 4: Elevating ND Image

Theme 5: Continued Economic Resiliency and Diversification

THEME 1: COMMERCE CRUSHED IT IN THE FACE OF A FLOCK OF BLACK SWANS

I would like to start with the issue that has affected us all lives and has dramatically changed the way we do business, the way we recreate and the way we live our lives. With very limited resources and staff that has been spread thin, Commerce has deployed over \$80 million of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act also known as CARES Act funding by creating, administering and deploying four brand new grants targeted at segments of the economy hit hardest by COVID-19;

We started with the Economic Resiliency Grant (ERG) which was an all industry grant meant to provide safety and build confidence in the marketplace. We received 2,656 applications and awarded \$38,720,521 to 2,064 businesses.

The Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant (HERG) was next and designed to provide much needed capital by reimbursing applicants for payroll, rent/lease, utilities expenses, or similar expenses targeting restaurants and bars in an effort to help them survive the 50%-70% declines in revenue that were not uncommon in this sector. Commerce received 1,132 applications and we awarded \$23,681,952 to 966 businesses.

The Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant PLUS was designed in a similar fashion as the HERG but focused on hotels/motels/resorts. I talked to one resort owner in the Devils Lake area and she had three bookings in November and the calendar through March looked similarly bleak. We received 220 applications and awarded \$8,351,332 to 197 businesses.

The Medical Expense Assistance Program (MEAP) that we administered jointly with Workforce Safety and Insurance (WSI) to assist emergency responders and front-line healthcare workers who contracted COVID-19 from a secondary source. We received 2,968 applications and we awarded \$2.5 million to 2,469 North Dakota citizens.

In total for all four grants, we received almost 7,000 (6,976) applications, requesting over \$163 million (\$163,473,652). We made almost 6,000 (5,696) awards totaling over \$73 million (\$73,253,805).

But we aren't done. The recent federal extension has allowed us more time to conduct a second round of grant awards where we intend to distribute all remaining funds to North Dakota businesses in need. Once distributed, Commerce will have shared almost \$100 million to help support businesses in North Dakota survive and continue to employ thousands of residents.

Round two of the Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant PLUS will begin in March. We are working with our state partners to address some of the early hurdles caused by the initial federal deadlines. We would like to go back to existing ERG applicants and allow them a second chance to implement their original plans. Many applicants were not able to meet the tight deadlines we were forced to implement in order to comply with the initial federal deadline or applicants were not able to find contractors to implement the desired changes by the initial federal deadline – those applicants that had approved expenses but couldn't meet the deadlines will get another opportunity to obtain grant funds.

Commerce was able to tailor these grants to the most affected industries because we conducted no less than four surveys before designing the CARES grants. Two of these surveys were aimed at North Dakota businesses so we could better understand their needs and how COVID-19 was impacting their businesses and how deeply. Not only did our informed, data-driven response include the CARES Act grants mentioned above, but it also resulted in several webinars Commerce developed and produced to provide local leaders and communities with tools to assist them or to help them connect to vital resources. We partnered with the North Dakota Department of Health to create and issue a survey that targeted all North Dakotan residents and had over 11,000 people reply!

In addition, while most states were reactive to the federal government COVID-19 response, Commerce was not. We were weeks ahead. We became the experts on the federal response, partnered with our local subject matter experts and then shared this information with North Dakota businesses through a series of business briefings thereby preparing our companies to take advantage of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) and Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program. These proactive efforts resulted in over 11,000 Small Business Administration (SBA) loans being provided to North Dakota businesses. According to USA Facts website, "North Dakota received the most (in terms of federal loan proceeds) at \$2,037 per capita. California and New York received \$845 and \$1,041 per capita, respectively."

The Commerce COVID response improved lives and was nothing short of robust.

Last time we presented in front of you, we promised the development and deployment of a new Commerce strategy. We are pleased to share that we not only delivered what we promised but took it even further.

Thank you for your trust – I'm going to highlight some of your investment successes, and you'll hear additional details from the Commerce leadership team:

- Placed a heavy emphasis on diversification and innovation attracting hundreds of millions in private capital.
- Completely transformed how economic development is conducted in the state by doubling primary sector projects compared to last biennium.
- Introduced in excess of \$50 million in start-up innovation activity using the newly created Innovation Technology Loan Fund (LIFT) legislation.
- Doubled activity within the UAS environment while growing Grand Sky commercial activity by 30% and almost completing the Vantis beyond visual line of sight (BVLOS) network in the Bakken.
- Successfully recruited an intermodal operation to North Dakota after 20 years of previous unsuccessful attempts.
- Working with our partners Regional Planning Councils and Community Action Agencies, we deployed Community Development Block Grant (CBDG) and Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds resulting in 85,699 people served/impacted.
- Actively managed 59 Renaissance Zones resulting in 1,850 approved investments (since inception in 1999) across communities in North Dakota.
- Developed and deployed the ND Development Calculator (ND2C) enabling communities to better understand the true long-term costs of infrastructure to ensure optimization of community planning and the reduction of local tax burdens.
- Empowered communities to proactively plan their futures by providing matching grant funds though our Partners in Planning grant program.
- Reenergized the Rural Development Council. Surveyed local leaders and used the data to set priorities for long term rural economic and community growth.
- Simultaneous to rural community and economic engagement, we achieved solid outreach across the nation by actively participating in national webinars and conference as panelists to share progress in North Dakota.
- Retooled Tourism Division marketing materials due to the pandemic and mobilized an in-state campaign and free cooperative platform featuring tourism businesses and destinations.
- Supported pandemic communications by providing leadership with Joint Information Center (JIC), CARE 19 apps, ND Smart Restart, a variety of Commerce grants and Business Briefings.
- Led occupational licensure reform research effort resulting in precision recommendations to improve talent recruitment and geographic mobility.

- Recruited "The Last Mile" training program to the North Dakota Department Corrections thereby improving prisoner rehab and job placement reducing recidivism and saving state resources and improving company growth prospects.
- Invested \$924,516 of matching funds in accelerated skilled workforce training programs designed to get displaced workers prepared for new jobs and back to work; and
- Operation Intern went big on tech, trade, logistics, critical skills gaps and indemand jobs.

THEME 2: COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

I am going to provide a little deeper dive on Theme 2: Community Development and I will ask Bonnie Malo to share some additional details.

In order for North Dakota to be successful our communities must be successful. Commerce has been on the leading edge of redefining what "community development" means through its leadership ensuring that North Dakota communities not only understand the need for smart, efficient infrastructure; healthy, vibrant spaces; and 21st century workforce but, also have the resources to deploy strategies in pursuit of community aspirations.

After we designed and administered the Rural Economic Development study, results indicated economic development in rural North Dakota looks a little different than it does in our urban centers. In rural North Dakota the attraction and/or creation of retail and restaurants is the number one economic development goal. Commerce wants to make sure these rural communities have access to resources to pursue their economic development goals. Currently, the Rural Growth Fund contained within the Commerce Development Fund legislatively requires all investments to have a primary sector designation, because of this hurdle these funds have been rarely accessed. I ask you, is it time to eliminate this hurdle and allow rural communities access to these funds? Our data says it is. And some communities have made a similar change already. In a conversation with Keith Lund, President and CEO of Grand Forks Regional Economic Development, he informed me that they eliminated the primary sector language from the economic support activities conducted outside the city limits of Grand Forks.

Another Commerce achievement was the creation of the ND2C. This tool enables communities to understand the true long-term costs of infrastructure, especially expansions with the goal of providing information to ensure decision makers are well informed when making decisions regarding optimization of existing infrastructure, planning and reducing tax burdens. We're actively working with the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) to deploy the ND2C on all NDDOT projects that

involve streets in and around cities and communities showing the value in growth decisions.

The Partners in Planning (PiP) grant empowered communities to proactively plan their futures by supporting comprehensive plans, economic development/diversification strategic plans, or economic recovery plans due to impacts of COVID-19. In 2020, \$125,000 was awarded to six communities. These matching grants to Bowman County, City of Cavalier, Hettinger/Adams County and Linton Industrial Development Corporation helped them develop strategic plans and the City of Milnor develop a comprehensive plan.

We were able to reenergize the Rural Development Council and set priorities for long term rural economic and community growth which include stabilizing rural development funding, investment in infrastructure, quality of life, high paying jobs and building leadership capacity.

Based on data gleaned from the Rural Economic Development survey and the trend of collaboration and regionalization we developed the Economic/Community Development Ecosystem Map which provides a spatial representation of state and local resources and organizations, with contact information, so leaders across our state can more easily connect with neighbors resulting in improved local economic and community development opportunities and collaboration.

Vibrancy grants were created to incent small successes in communities that serve to build confidence in local leaders and empower communities to engage the populace in community conversations that create vibrancy. These grants can also support the implementation of a community need project identified and supported by a comprehensive or economic development plan whose creation was incentivized by the Partners in Planning grant effectively operationalizing the plan and ensuring it doesn't get placed on a shelf.

Chairman and members of the Committee. We ask for your continued support of the resources required to ensure community vibrancy and smart infrastructure development across North Dakota, especially in small towns. The Partners in Planning and Vibrancy grants were funded using the Commerce Momentum Fund.

I will return now to the remaining themes...

THEME 3: CONTINUED ECONOMIC RESILIENCY AND DIVERSIFICATION

In the past year, North Dakota has been affected by a "double black swan" event, that is, the collapse of oil demand and prices, followed by a global pandemic that grounded the world economy to a halt in the spring of 2020. While discussed as important for years, never has a solid economic diversification strategy been more crucial to our state. Combined with the need to stabilize existing industries and businesses in North Dakota, both for the purpose of creating a more "resilient" economy – one not as vulnerable to the shifts in the oil and agriculture industries and one capable of adjusting to new consumer behaviors and expectations more quickly than our national and global competitors.

THEME 4: THE NEW WORKFORCE

North Dakota began the year 2020 with an unemployment rate of 2.3% - the lowest in the nation – and a labor market participation rate of 69.2% - one of the highest in the nation. There is a need to prepare workforce for today's jobs and those to come. We are working closely with state educational systems and the private sector in preparing the workforce of tomorrow including reducing barriers that prevent residents from obtaining the skills or employment they seek.

THEME 5: ELEVATION OF NORTH DAKOTA'S IMAGE

Magnifying what North Dakota has to offer to visitors, new residents, and new companies, this opportunity has taken on a new and higher profile during the time of COVID-19. There is appetite for wide-open spaces, safe destinations, and the many amenities that North Dakota is naturally gifted to offer has never been so significant.

Each division director will talk more specifically about each of our themes.

I promised earlier that you would hear from Bonnie Malo, director of Community Services. I would like to invite Bonnie to the podium and talk more about our efforts to braid federal community development resources with state support to target and maximize impact. Bonnie can you please talk more about Community Development.

BONNIE MALO, DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITY SERVICES

Thank you, James.

Good afternoon Chairman Monson and members of the committee. I am Bonnie Malo, Director of the Division of Community Services (DCS) at the Commerce Department.

I will address the programs within the Division of Community Services. The total appropriation for this biennium is \$50,823,035, which includes funding for the Energy

Conservation Grants, Weatherization Assistance, Low Income Heating Assistance, State Energy Program, CDBG, Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), HOME, North Dakota Homeless Grant (NDHG), CSBG and Renaissance Zone programs.

To augment growth potential, we were able to serve almost 86,000 individuals with the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) programs. These programs touch individuals either through services provided by the Regional Planning Councils or the Community Actions Agencies.

The CSBG program helps to directly address poverty in our communities. A client in the Dickinson region turned to the Community Action Agency when she and her three children were threatened with homelessness due to divorce. Her husband lost his job, and she had lost most of her wages due to a recent COVID-19 quarantine. With no sick leave and no financial resources, she worked with staff at the agency to secure permanent housing for her children. This client stated that Community Action's guidance and financial assistance helped her make decisions during a stressful time.

The Energy Conservation Grant funded 65 projects to political subdivision for this biennium, which will save an estimated \$422,535 on energy savings per year.

The State Energy Program funded by the Department of Energy, provided funding to the Bismarck Public Schools System, where they recently installed 46 solar panels at the Bismarck Career Academy. In addition to reduced energy costs, students will now have an educational experience on solar energy production, providing exposure to alternative energy workforce opportunities. The energy cost savings is estimated to be around \$3,500 per year.

The Weatherization Program helps to improve housing conditions and save money for our state's most vulnerable citizens. One manufactured homeowner received weatherization assistance from the Jamestown Community Action Agency that can be directly attributed to remaining in their home because of the assistance they received. Prior to receiving the weatherization assistance, their utility bill was between \$400 to \$500 per month. After the work was completed, their bill dropped to about \$100 per month. This individual was very thankful for the assistance, with tears in her eyes she stated that they would not have been able to stay in their home without the weatherization work.

The CDBG and HOME funds are used to increase the affordable housing options in communities around North Dakota. Affordable housing was cited as the top need in all eight regions of the state during a statewide Needs Assessment Survey conducted in 2020.

The CDBG and HOME funds were an integral part of the capital stack for Monterey & Brighton Place Apartments in West Fargo. These funds were layered with Home Incentive Fund (HIF) funds and Low-Income Housing Tax Credits, allowing to demolish 60 units of Public Housing and then redevelop the site to construct 85 affordable units, significantly increasing the capacity for serving income-qualified families. Without the CDBG and HOME funds, Cass County Housing Authority would not have been able to increase the number of eligible households served in this community.

Homelessness and housing insecurity impact thousands of families across the state every day. Jennifer had recently lost her husband to COVID-19 and while grieving, she also became homeless. After staying in her car, Jennifer went to Ministry on the Margins in Bismarck. They were able to provide financial assistance and secure temporary housing, until she was able to find employment and secure permanent housing. These emergency measures prevent individuals from becoming permanently homeless and the stability that temporary housing allows them to develop a plan to move forward to achieve greater self-sufficiency. Without financial support from ESG and NDHG, organizations like Ministry on the Margins would not be able to assist the overwhelming number of people who are in situations like Jennifer's.

The Renaissance Zone Program is an economic development tool that can help cities revitalize their communities by offering both state and local tax incentives. These tax incentives encourage residents and business owners to reinvest in their communities. Earlier, Lauren Orchard, the Economic Development Directors for the City of West Fargo discussed how their community has benefited from the program.

Recent Renaissance Zone projects in the community of West Fargo include an industrial park, an investment firm, and multiple transportation/freight companies. The community notes that these projects help to fill and rehab vacant buildings and lots in the core of their city.

The Division of Community Services has received additional funding through the CARES Act Funds in the amounts of \$4.8M in Community Services Block Grant Funds that was distributed to the 7 Community Action Agencies. The Emergency Shelter Grants Programs received \$5.1M for homeless assistance.

The Community Development Block Grant Program received \$6.3M that will be used in conjunction with the Department of Human Services Rent Bridge Program to prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless.

The Division of Community Services ask is to transfer the HOME program and two FTE's to the Housing Finance Agency. This transfer will create efficiencies with a one-stop shop for multi-family housing development programs.

This concludes my testimony of the Division of Community Services programs.

I am pleased to now introduce Sara Otte Coleman, director of Tourism, to share some details regarding elevation of North Dakota's image.

SARA OTTE COLEMAN, DIRECTOR OF TOURISM

Thank you, Bonnie.

Chairman Monson and members of the Committee, I'm Sara Otte Coleman and I have had the honor to serve as the state's director of Tourism for the past 18 years.

As James mentioned, elevating North Dakota's image during a period of challenges and opportunity is crucial and we must take advantage of the shifting demographics, the desire to travel and the growing interest to enjoy wide-open spaces.

We were able to push \$80 million plus into the economy with an emphasis on hospitality sectors. Commerce awarded over \$30 million dollars to more than 1000 restaurants, bars, coffee shops and venues with the HERG. An additional 401 applications for more than \$11 million are currently being reviewed for round two. Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant PLUS funds will help 197 hotels and lodges with more than \$8 million in awards. Round two will open March 9th. These Hospitality Economic Resiliency Grant dollars will help this sector which was disproportionately impacted by the pandemic. To date, \$1 billion in visitor revenue has been lost to North Dakota and our businesses, due to COVID-19 related restrictions including the closure of the Canadian border which has cost us 465,000 personal vehicle trips.

New research confirms tourism advertising goes beyond motivating trips and plays a lead role in elevating our state's image across various economic development benchmarks. For example, people who have seen our advertising rated North Dakota 16% higher as "a good place to start a business" compared to those who had not seen our advertising. This lift is even higher once they have visited, where we saw respondents ranking the state 20% higher as "a good place to live" once they have visited.

The team's research driven media outreach showed strong results using a new creative campaign (2019) which included multi-channel placements targeting outdoor programming, sports and recreation and targeted urban areas like Minneapolis St. Paul and Chicago. The campaign exceeded our benchmarks and industry average results.

We retooled tourism marketing materials due to pandemic by mobilizing an in-state campaign and created a free cooperative platform featuring tourism businesses and destinations. We are currently running our first winter campaign in-state and near border to inspire winter travel to support small businesses.

Paid media results 2020:

- 83 million people on TV
- 12 million people in print
- 233 million people on digital advertising
- 85 million people through out of home advertising
- 23 million people on social media through advertising campaigns
- 52% increase in visits to NDtourism.com over 2019
- Increases from 50 states
 - o First time visitors made up 92% of visits (up 78% from 2019)

We know this work impacted sales. In 2020, there were 3,523,146 room nights sold in North Dakota, this is down 30.4% from last year's nearly 5 million sold - however could have been much worse without our proactive work.

This year we garnered 40 national editorial media placements which was up 25% from 2019 and reaching 776 million. We also leveraged eight influencers reaching more than 10.6 million. We hosted HoneyTrek- with paid support of \$3,900 and assistance from partners across the state. The couple spent 10 days in North Dakota generating 53 social posts and stories which were seen by over 1 million to date.

The Tourism/Marketing Division has led the state's brand unification efforts which became increasingly important as the state managed COVID-19 mitigation efforts. Thirty-four agencies are now using the Be Legendary brand. The team also supported pandemic communications by providing leadership with JIC, CARE 19 apps, ND Smart Restart, Economic Resiliency Grants and impacted business engagements.

In addition to the video clips you saw earlier the Travel Alliance Partnership, the Destination Marketing Association of North Dakota and other businesses will also request to testify.

As illustrated, tourism revenue supports small businesses - 3,000 of them in the tourism sector. The experiences we showcase are for people that live here, visit here (for business or leisure) or are considering living here. It is important to increase the awareness of North Dakota and elevate our image to recruit and retain people from the region. We also must invest in those who have already visited the state. Once travel restrictions are lifted, the border traffic will help drive retail sales in northern

communities and we will need to compete with all our neighbors, including Manitoba, to attract new wealth to the state.

To achieve those goals, we need additional dollars for marketing. The Governor's budget included a \$2 million of one-time funding from the General Fund for destination marketing. This will would be used to extend our campaign beyond June. Research in 2020 showed that on-line searches on North Dakota travel options and online bookings were high and at par with neighboring states during the peak advertising campaign. Once the campaign ended in early June, the intent to travel, as shown by online searches and bookings, declined well below our competitors. The additional dollars are imperative in driving demand to our businesses and assisting their recovery.

We also are asking for \$200,000 to improve our visitor services by leveraging existing state infrastructure, like rest areas and visitor sites, to elevate the North Dakota brand. The new hubs will enhance visitor services with fresh contemporary designed space aimed at showcasing experiences statewide to extend visitors stays.

The senate supported these requests. While they did not include the \$461,000 in ongoing funding as proposed in the executive budget, they kept the on-going budget even with last biennium and provided \$7 million in on-time funding for destination marketing including visitor services enhancements.

These budget enhancements would allow continued investments in destination marketing to recruit visitors and new North Dakotans which will improve small business activity and increase visitor spending at a critical time. The added benefit is creating awareness for workforce recruitment purposes, retaining resident revenue, and keeping North Dakotans traveling to sites within the state. All of which would improve success of all economic development and workforce recruitment efforts.

I would like to now turn the podium over to Katie Ralston, director of Workforce to talk more about The New Workforce.

KATIE RALSTON, DIRECTOR OF WORKFORCE

Thank you, Sara.

Chairman Monson and members of the committee, I'm Katie Ralston and I have had the honor to serve as the director of Workforce with the North Dakota Department of Commerce since January 2020.

The Workforce Division continues to augment state level workforce solutions to ensure that North Dakota is not only prepared for future workforce needs but is well positioned to outcompete neighboring states for qualified workers. In November 2019, the private

sector led Workforce Development Council was moved to the Department of Commerce. We have leveraged the industry expertise and diverse geographic representation on this board to better understand workforce needs in North Dakota and generate strategies to address them. Recently, the Council identified a number of opportunities to address some of the states most pressing needs in the following areas: earlier and more diverse career exploration and addressing the technical skills gap; removing barriers to employment; occupational licensure reform; and recruitment and retention of workers. We're honored to take the lead in coordinating partners and aligning resources to create statewide workforce solutions.

Last summer, when the state received CARES Act funds, we created the Technical Skills Training grant with \$1 million in matching funds that were used to support public and private sector led training providers in expanding and developing new accelerated skilled workforce training programs aimed at helping displaced workers prepare for high-demand jobs in North Dakota. These training programs range from CDL and CNA training, to IT and cybersecurity, to wind turbine technician and even structural and pipeline welding. We invested a total of \$924,516 in 12 programs across the state from August to December. The success of this program has motivated us to pursue state funding to continue providing support for accelerated training programs in the next biennium, not just for displaced workers, but for those who want to make a career change and for students who want to expedite their path to the workforce after completing their education. This model previously existed in North Dakota through workforce enhancement grants; however, the biggest difference between that program and the technical skills training grant is who can access the funds and provide the training. In the spring of 2020, we saw private businesses across the country step up and create industry-led training programs, and North Dakota was no different. Ten of the programs we supported through our grant were developed by the private sector, and based on the interest we've had from businesses since closing the program in December, we know that more are interested in making this investment in our workforce.

Each of the programs we supported with federal dollars are sustainable and will continue to prepare citizens for entrance and movement within the workforce for years to come, thus creating more pathways to employment in our state. To date, nearly 200 individuals have graduated from training programs created by, or expanded, under this grant, and have entered the workforce with an average entry salary of \$43,500. The technical skills training grant is a state program that we stood up with federal dollars. With \$1 million in matching funds, we can continue to support training opportunities

that prepare individuals for entrance and movement within the workforce. Accelerated job training programs will help us fill high demand jobs in healthcare, renewable energy, IT, logistics and transportation, and more, well into the future.

In the 2019 legislative session, Commerce received \$500,000 for a non-resident nurse recruitment program. Throughout the biennium, we identified opportunities to improve this program, which is why you see an extension of the original allocation in the amount of \$320,000 from the Senate Appropriations committee. By opening this program up to include the recruitment of recent nursing graduates who are already residents of the state to licensed healthcare facilities, we will see increased use of this program and more nursing job vacancies filled. Funds awarded under this program go directly to the nurse in the form of a sign-on bonus, moving or housing stipend, covering the cost of continuing education credits or training, in return for a four-year contract with their employer. Last year, 864 LPN, RN, and APRN students graduated from North Dakota nursing programs. In collaboration with licensed healthcare facilities, this is the audience we will target, in addition to nurses who are interested in moving to the state.

The workforce division is also active in connecting students with employers through apprenticeship and internship opportunities. We are requesting authority to spend the \$694,000 Apprenticeship State Expansion grant we received from the United States Department of Labor to develop new apprenticeship programs primarily focused on healthcare, biomedical research, and advanced manufacturing, along with other indemand jobs. Half of our overall grant award was approved by the Emergency Commission in August 2020, so we are asking for approval to spend the remaining \$347,157 in the 2021-2023 biennium. Finally, I'd like to add some context to the \$100,000 decrease you see in our ask for Operation Intern. This program continues to see great success. Despite economic hardships due to the pandemic, many employers still prioritized internship programs as meaningful work-based learning experiences for students and continued to recognize their value in creating an effective workforce pipeline for their companies. As a result, we saw an increase in Operation Intern participation with a heavy concentration in technology, advanced manufacturing, and energy throughout the biennium. We have had the ability to carry over unused funds in past biennia, which we will be able to utilize if we receive an appropriation of \$755,000 which is less than what we received in the 2019-2020 biennium.

I appreciate the opportunity to discuss how what we've done throughout the last two years will help us continue to lead statewide workforce strategy and support key partners in addressing North Dakota's workforce needs in the next biennium.

Next, I would like to introduce our Economic Development and Finance director Josh Teigen to provide a deeper dive into our next theme of continued economic resilience and diversification.

JOSH TEIGEN, DIRECTOR OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND FINANCE

Thank you, Katie.

Chairman Monson and members of the Appropriations Committee, I'm Josh Teigen and am honored to have been promoted to serve as the director of Economic Development and Finance.

The last biennium laid the foundation for a highly diverse and resilient North Dakotan economy and we went big and bold with a heavy emphasis economic diversification, especially in the areas of innovation, high tech jobs and value added activity.

In parallel to our strong economic development approach, we also reinvented the way we deploy capital in the state to better meet the market need. We achieved major successes in attracting outside investments such as venture capitals, equity firms, and private capital allowing for an innovation platform.

The department completely transformed how economic development is conducted in the state with precision recruitment and growth based on data, research, and new investment opportunities. Using data, we can now be predictive rather than reactive, and focus our efforts on the highest return on investment (ROI) activities.

We successfully recruited the world's most successful innovation platform with Plug and Play, which equates to 40 top-tier startups each year in the intelligent ag space. This feeds economic development initiatives for us, brings a needed ecosystem to the marketplace, and is a great source of investment opportunities for us.

In addition, we developed nearly 100 primary sector projects in 2019 and in 2020 simultaneous to the pandemic, worked in excess of \$2 billion in projects in 2020, and introduced in excess of \$50 million in start-up innovation activity using LIFT and InnovateND which was a wise investment that paid huge returns for the state. We were able to develop new side-by-side investment relationships across the nation creating higher probability to create new wealth and improve capital access.

Our team developed and deployed a foreign direct investment (FDI) strategy attracting new companies and investments from Asia, the Middle East, Europe and Latin America including a major greenhouse project from Canada and petrochemical foundation which is a multigenerational solution to massive and long-term energy growth.

Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) deployed systems-wide unmanned system plan to include initial beyond visual line of sight (BVLOS) capability in the Red River Valley and Bakken and doubled activity within the Northern Plains UAS. Grand Sky commercial activity grew by 30% with hundreds of jobs averaging almost \$100 thousand per year and generated over \$55 million in private investment capital.

In collaboration with several partners, we successfully recruited an intermodal operation to North Dakota after 20 years of attempts; with no use of state money. This success allows huge savings for shippers and will likely see higher ROIs per acre. The biggest shipper in the state saves 34% on drayage, and average shippers save between 20-25%. This is a tremendous recruitment tool for the state and is a cornerstone for growth in the Minot Industrial Complex.

We redefined the approach to energy growth laying foundation for next generation economy including value-added, innovation, and environmental, social, and corporate guidance (ESG).

Next, I would like to ask James to return to the podium and provide a couple of closing thoughts.

Thank you, Josh.

Chairman Monson and members of the committee, we only had 70 minutes today and I hope you were able to get a high-level overview of the agency's budget. Most importantly, I wish to talk about where we are heading with your continued confidence and investment.

I want to take a minute or two and reiterate some of the items covered earlier today. UAS is a tide that lifts other boats including ag, energy and tech sectors. We are working with other state agencies, including the North Dakota Department of Transportation and intend to request an amendment so they can help Commerce and the industry build common infrastructure. We want to work with the ND Agriculture department to utilize each our strengths to increase trade with foreign countries. Commerce would like to retain the diplomatic role, foreign direct investment and continue to have a seat at the table so we can work in unison for the good of all ND businesses. We would like to carryover unexpended funds in our discretionary fund so we can continue to help ND communities and businesses, and we would like to eliminate the primary sector language from the Rural Growth Fund so rural leaders can pursue the economic development activities that they feel impact their communities the most. I certainly won't take the time to cover all the ways we stand ready to help but I hope you can see that the evidence speaks for itself, in the face of extraordinary adversity, we delivered. I am proud of the work our team did and the investments made are paying off.

The state of North Dakota is at a crossroads. It has been a difficult year for many and may remain difficult for some of our most important economic sectors – such as agriculture and energy, for the years to come. As you heard, Commerce is doubling down on community development, economic resiliency and diversification and is investing heavily into the future of our communities and the nation's best workforce. We are elevating our image so everyone knows about the opportunity that awaits them in our beautiful state.

We have an amazing opportunity for the residents of our great state...Come with us and let's grow this State together!




Department of Commerce Organizational Chart













RE: Control Enhancements

As you know, our most recent audit identified opportunities for improvement in our control environment. We have thoroughly reviewed the audit report to identify appropriate control enhancements. Please see the Department of Commerce's action plan, below.

FINDING 19-01 "CIRCUMVENTING PROCUREMENT GUIDELINES"

Audit Issue (pg. 2 of Audit Report)

"These contracts should have been treated as one contract for services and allowed for contractor competition following the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) procurement requirements."

Commerce Position

"We disagree with the finding that the Department "violated state law by circumventing procurement requirements related to the 'Be Legendary' logo and overall brand refresh. As correctly stated in the audit report, the value of this contract was \$9,500, and as such, did not require a competitive bid process under procurement rules. Contract deliverables were met prior to the contract being completed. Subsequently, temporary workers were hired to perform work that was connected to the brand refresh but was separate from the contract deliverables. We acknowledge there was overlap in the time frame of the contract and the temporary employment as the final contract payment was made in November 2018, and the temporary employees began employment with the Department in October 2018. After the hiring of the temporary employees, the OMB Procurement Office was consulted, and steps were taken to ensure the contract was appropriately terminated after final payment. The Department will ensure there is a clear separation between contract deliverables and temporary employment arrangements in the future and that all procurement requirements are followed."

As stated above, there were two separate workstreams: one to create the website design, or "frame," and the other to develop content for the website, which required additional resources. While we acknowledge these efforts were related, there was no overlap with the original contract, and we believe Commerce properly complied with OMB Purchasing Guidelines. Commerce also followed state hiring practices and generally accepted employment law principles in treating those hired for the second workstream as temporary employees.

FINDING 19-02 "VIOLATION OF APPROPRIATION AUTHORITY"

<u>Audit Issue (pg. 5 of Audit Report)</u>

"...violated their appropriation authorized in the 2017 Session Laws by improperly charging \$853,908 to the wrong biennium."

Commerce Position

The Department of Commerce agrees with the recommendation and acknowledges that these expenditures should have been charged to the 2019-21 biennium rather than the 2017-19 Biennium. The Department will strengthen internal controls and implement procedures to ensure in the future expenditures are properly allocated to the correct biennium.

As acknowledged, this was a timing error related to payment for agreed-upon work on an infrastructure project at Grand Sky UAS park – a project that was funded by the Legislature and had been delayed by weather. The Department made the correct payment to the correct party at the incorrect time, and Commerce has since implemented changes to prevent it from happening again. Ultimately, the funds went to the Legislature's intended purpose, and no party received undue benefit. Funding for infrastructure projects often comes with continuing appropriation authority, or "carryover" authority, which allows the funding to be carried into the next biennium in case of construction delays. That carryover authority was not in place for this project. Commerce will request such authority in the future to prevent this from happening again.

FINDING 19-03 "NONCOMPLIANCE WITH CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS"

<u>Audit Issue (pg. 6 of Audit Report)</u>

"...did not monitor contract deliverables of an entrepreneurial contract with a total cost of \$253,921. As a result, contract payments totaling \$123,750 were made to unapproved subcontractors. Further, \$23,448 of these payments were not supported by progress reports."

Commerce Position

"We disagree with the finding that the Department did not monitor contract deliverables and that contract payments were made to unapproved subcontractors.

The auditor's report indicates that the following contract deliverables were not met:

- CONTRACTOR must submit sub-contractors to state for approval with proof of sustainability of developed programming/positions.
- Sub-contractor progress reports must be reported in CONTRACTOR quarterly required reports.

The auditor's report indicates that the "The Department did not approve subcontractors...as required by the contract." The Department did provide approval for sub-contracts; however, this approval occurred verbally, as verified by the previous contract manager and vendor. The auditor's report indicates that unsupported payments were made to unapproved subcontractors. As noted, the Department verbally approved subcontractors, hence disagrees payments were made to "unapproved" contractors. The Department has implemented contract monitoring procedures to ensure appropriate documentation is secured in advance of payment for all future contracts."

As stated above, subcontractors were verbally approved as allowed for in the contract, and no payments were made to unapproved subcontractors. Commerce specifically reconciled the subcontractor billing with the aggregated billing to ensure that no one was overpaid or underpaid.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL (RDC)

The RDC is charged with facilitating collaboration among governments and the private and nonprofit sectors in the planning and implementation of programs and policies that have an impact on rural areas of the state. Members also monitor, report and comment on policies and programs aimed at addressing the needs of rural areas of North Dakota. The RDC unites the state's private and nonprofit sectors with state, federal, local and tribal governments to strengthen rural America.

THE RDC AND NORTH DAKOTA COMMERCE DEPARTMENT

In 2020, Commerce and the RDC prioritized and advanced several rural incentive and economic efforts. Much of this work was completed by the Commerce Main Street Initiative (MSI) team in collaboration with other state and private entities, maximizing resources and time.

Main Street Community network:

- Provides support and technical assistance to more than 230 people from 80 Main Street communities across North Dakota.
- Continues one-on-one visits with existing and new Main Street communities along with education, joint convenings and online resources.

Partners in Planning (PiP) Grant Program:

- Empowers communities to proactively plan their futures through comprehensive planning, economic development/diversification strategic plans or economic recovery plans.
- The PiP is a result of dialogue with the RDC and recommendations to support community planning efforts and the creation of actionable plans.

MSI Community Vibrancy Grant Program:

- Supports local efforts to increase community vibrancy with seed funding for a small project.
- Builds momentum and inspires additional projects with improved quality of life, attracting and retaining workforce and enhancing community pride.

Supporting statewide COVID-19 efforts:

- Implemented and conducted research and outreach education tools were undertaken supporting communities, small businesses and state leaders.
- COVID-19 webinars providing information for businesses and stakeholders across North Dakota, including resources available for small businesses, social distancing aspects and resources for businesses in rural areas related to online marketing.
- A business impact survey, conducted in partnership with the Greater Fargo Moorhead EDC, helped measure the impact of the pandemic on local businesses and gauge their needs and understand how to best direct resources.



DIVISION OF COMMUNITY SERVICES

The North Dakota Department of Commerce Division of Community Services was established to provide technical assistance to local governments and state agencies in the areas of community and rural planning and development, policy research and development and grant program implementation.

PROGRAMS INCLUDE:

STATE ENERGY PROGRAM — Promoting Energy Conservation and Efficiency The State Energy Program provides a range of energy conservation-related opportunities, including energy education, installation of energy efficient measures, transportation initiatives (alternative fuel vehicles and fueling systems) and renewable energy technologies (small scale wind turbines and solar technologies). The program's state energy plan is supported by financial and technical assistance through the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE).

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT — Developing Vibrant and Sustainable Communities

The Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), provided through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), provides financial assistance to local governments in the form of grants and loans for public facilities, housing rehabilitation and economic development projects. The primary beneficiaries of these projects must be very low and low-income individuals.

EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS AND CONTINUUM OF CARE GRANTS —

Working to End Homelessness

The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) and the Continuum of Care Grant are programs of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The Emergency Solutions Grant and ND Homeless Grant (NDHG) provides financial assistance to facilities and programs to identify sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons, as well as those at risk of homelessness, and provide services to help them quickly regain stability in permanent housing after experiencing homelessness. The North Dakota Department of Commerce currently awards grant funds directly to emergency/homeless shelters and agencies throughout the state for activities like operational expenses (utilities, insurance, furnishings, appliances, etc.) and essential services (case management, medical, laundry, transportation, etc.), homeless prevention, rapid rehousing and the Homeless Management Information System.

DID YOU KNOW

Community Services Block Grant impacted 41,546 low-income individuals, including 14,913 children, 6,283 persons with disabilities and 7,498 people who lacked health insurance.

Community Development Block Grant created 132 jobs and had \$1.39 million economic impact

WEATHERIZATION/LIHEAP — Increasing Energy Efficiency for Low-Income Persons

The Weatherization Assistance Program and the LIHEAP Weatherization Program impact low-income individuals across the state to:

- Increase energy efficiency in homes
- · Strengthen the health and safety of the home
- Reduce total residential energy expenditures
- Provide conservation measures

Since 2001, more than 10,000 homes have been equipped with energy-conserving measures. They are programs of the U.S. Department of Energy and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

HOME PROGRAM — Creating Affordable Housing

The HOME Program is a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development program, designed to create partnerships among government entities and the private sector to make affordable housing available to low-income persons. The program has two primary activities: homeowner assistance and rental production/assistance. This is accomplished through five basic areas:

- · Homeownership assistance
- · Homeowner rehabilitation activities
- Rental rehabilitation or production
- Security deposits
- · Rental assistance

COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT — Fighting Poverty in North Dakota

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) Program assists communities in implementing anti-poverty programs. The program administers funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services through the state's seven Community Action Agencies (CAAs), providing various services to low-income persons, including:

- · Emergency assistance
- Money management
- · Housing counseling
- Self-sufficiency services
- Case management and outreach
- · Referral services

The Renaissance Zone Program is a locally driven program that includes 59 cities across North Dakota. Since 1999, more than 1,850 projects have been approved and more than 1,450 have been completed. The Renaissance Zone Program helps create and retain jobs, businesses and residents.

The Renaissance Zone Program is a tool for community redevelopment and economic investment that incorporates tax incentives to business and residential properties. The Renaissance Act, created by the 56th Legislative Assembly, made it possible for North Dakota cities to create Renaissance Zones within their jurisdictions.

RENAISSANCE ZONE SIZES


The size of the zone depends on city population.

- 34 city blocks in cities with a population of up to 5,000
- One additional block granted for each additional 5,000 in population

PROJECT REQUIREMENTS

Development of a Renaissance Zone includes:



2000 and has had 90 approved projects. Recent major projects include Restad Industrial Park in 2020 and Midcontinent Communications in 2017.




The city of Wahpeton renewed the program for an additional five

years in 2018. Wahpeton started utilizing the Renaissance Zone Program in 2003 and has had 55 approved projects. Recent projects include Tractor Supply Company in 2017, Brew 2 Inc. in 2017, Grippers Sports in 2017 and Dakota Coffee Company in 2016.

The city of Valley City renewed the program for an additional five years in 2020. Valley City started utilizing the Renaissance Zone Program in 2000 and has had 125 approved projects. Recent major projects include Brockopp Brewing LLC in 2020 and Valley Lumber Company in 2018.

The city of Hazen renewed the program for an additional five years in 2018. Hazen started utilizing the Renaissance Zone Program in 2003 and has had 26 approved projects. Recent projects include Mandate Machinery in 2017 and Tractor Supply Company in 2017.

NORTH DAKOTA UMANNED AIR SYSTEMS (UAS): THE NEXT GENERATION

North Dakota's unmanned systems sector continues to lead the nation in supporting the agricultural and energy industries, commercializing intellectual property and operationalizing federal requirements. To continue this growth and momentum, North Dakota must continue to invest in growing its Beyond Visual Line of Sight (BVLOS) network, support robust operations at the Northern Plains UAS Test Site (NPUASTS) and expand infrastructure at the Grand Sky UAS Park to support highly diverse and well-paying jobs as well as the national security mission.

GRAND SKY: THE NATION'S FIRST PRIVATE UAS PARK

Grand Sky, the nation's first UAS business and aviation park, is home for flight testing, UAS operations and research and development. Grand Sky offers build-to-suit locations and temporary facilities for commercial UAS development and testing, as well as defenserelated operations support and has attracted more than \$100 million in private investment. Grand Sky offers access to secure defense networks, dark fiber, a 12,351-foot runway, uncongested airspace with less than 10 operations daily and more than 330 days of flying weather annually. Testing operations are supported with electronics component distributors, metal fabrication, 3D printing and equipment support for the most demanding test requirements. Grand Sky partners like the Northern Plains UAS Test Site can support airspace needs. Grand Sky is home to one of the nation's first commercial BVLOS system.

VANTIS

North Dakota leads in attracting companies and federal agencies to operationalize, commercialize and grow this sector by leveraging historic investments, utilizing existing resources, subject matter expertise and infrastructure to continue the growth trajectory, commercialization of new technologies, and well-paying jobs. North Dakota is using VANTIS and its subject matter experts at the test site on behalf of NASA, DoD, CBP and private industry. The Bakken capability will be deployed by Spring 2021. Commerce is recruiting new industries to assist in energy production and supporting small communities across the state. Autonomous development and the attraction of private equity throughout the agricultural sector continues at a rapid clip as well, including new start up activity from Plug and Play.

The Innovation Technology Loan Fund (LIFT) is an innovation loan fund to support technology advancement by providing financing for commercialization of intellectual property within the state of North Dakota. The following industries qualify for these funds:

- Advanced computing and data management
- Agriculture technology
- Autonomous and unmanned vehicles and related technologies
- Energy
- Health care
- Value-added agriculture
- Value-added energy
- Any industry or area specifically identified by the committee as an industry that will contribute to the diversification of the state's economy

The use of the loan funds are available to enhance capacity and to the extent possible, leverage state, federal and private sources of funding. Loan funds may be used to conduct applied research, experimentation or operational testing within the state. Loan funds may not be used for capital or building investments or for research, academic or instructive programming, workforce training, administrative costs, or to supplant funding for regular operations of institutions of higher education.

Approval for the LIFT applications shall be made by the LIFT Committee with consideration given to the following:

- 1. Deliver applied research, experimentation or operational testing in one or more of the diversification sectors to create information or data to enhance North Dakota companies or industries or companies making investments in North Dakota.
- 2. Lead to the commercialization or patent of an innovation technology solution.
- 3. Result in the development of a new company or expansion of an existing company that will diversify the state's economy through new products, investment or skilled jobs.

LIFT LOAN **TERMS INCLUDE:**

- Zero percent interest for the first three years of the loan
- Two percent interest for the next two years of the loan
- An interest rate equal to a standard Bank of North Dakota loan for all subsequent years

Access Point Technologies EP Inc. — A global supplier of innovative medical devices focused on meeting the needs of the large and fast-growing electrophysiology (EP) market, estimated at \$5 billion today with an 11% CAGR. APT EP designs and develops new catheters and systems for treating cardiac arrhythmias. It is building a new R&D center in Horace ND which will be ready in Q1 2021 and plans to develop both catheters and systems in this new facility. In addition, the company plans to hire and



Checkable Medical Corp. — Developing an at-home strep test to be manufactured in North Dakota and launching an at-home rapid COVID-19 antibody test. LIFT support allowed it to move the founding team to the state and partner with a North Dakota clinical research partner to execute its trial. The company plans to create high-paying jobs in the bioscience industry in the next couple years.

First-I LLC (KSI Video) — Currently contracting its software services FIRST from a North Dakota company and recently established an office in Grand Forks as base for the development and manufacture of a new UAS product designed to assist first responders and emergency management personnel. The company is applying for matching funding from other sources and plans to have a commercially viable prototype available later in 2021. To date it has created one job in Grand Forks with plans for

Three Farm Daughters — A value-added ag start-up creating high-fiber, low gluten food products utilizing GoodWheat varieties grown in the USA and milled at the North Dakota State Mill.

Three Farm Daughters has launched three pasta products and a 100% wheat flour for sale online and in stores in North Dakota and Minnesota. In doing so, Three Farm Daughters utilizes three North Dakota logistics companies, a North Dakota food-grade warehouse facility and collaborates with a Grand Forks local chef for recipe development.



TracFrac Inc. — A Bismarck-based company developing a patent pending scheduling platform that coordinates activities between operators and service companies in the oil and gas industry. Currently working with two major energy companies in North Dakota, TracFrac adds reliability and automation to the oil and gas monitoring and notification system.

ROLE OF WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

The role of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council is to advise the governor and the public concerning the nature and extent of workforce development in the context of North Dakota's economic development needs, and how to meet these needs effectively while maximizing the efficient use of available resources and avoiding unnecessary duplication of effort.

The Workforce Development Council consists of more than 30 members, with representation from industry; K-12, post-secondary and career and technical education; organized labor; WIOA state workforce partners and local and state elected officials.

LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

As Chair of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council, I am pleased to forward 13 recommendations and two endorsements that the Council believes can help address the greatest workforce challenges faced by the state of North Dakota today and in the coming years. These recommendations fall under four themes that were previously identified in the Council's 2018 Report of Recommendations: earlier and more diverse career exploration and addressing the technical skills gap; removing barriers to employment; occupational licensing reform; and recruitment and retention of North Dakota workers.

Earlier & More Diverse Career Exploration and Addressing the Technical Skills Gap

- **The Council recommends** expanding Area Career & Technology Centers (ACTC) with a total investment of \$45 million to be awarded incrementally to multiple school districts through a competitive grant process to regions that demonstrate commitment to ensuring success through industry alignment and private sector match.
- The Council recommends that the North Dakota Department of Career and Technical Education (NDCTE) and North Dakota Department of Public Instruction (NDDPI) work collaboratively to promote and encourage increased opportunities for career explorations in our schools.
- **The Council recommends** expanding North Dakota Studies curriculum to highlight multiple industries and career opportunities.
- **The Council recommends** the development of a grant program to support the private sector in creating virtual examples of high demand careers in North Dakota for educators and students to access.
- **The Council endorses** utilizing a portion of ND Career Builders funding to promote the program to stakeholders, including businesses, employees, students, parents and educators.

MOMAS - L

Removing Barriers to Employment

- The Council recommends developing a job placement pilot pilot program through a coordinated effort between Job Service North Dakota, Department of Corrections & Rehabilitation, local organizations that serve and support individuals with criminal backgrounds, and employers with a goal of placing recently or soon-to-be released individuals into in-demand positions in North Dakota.
- The Council recommends promoting the existing framework and service provided by the North Dakota Parole and Pardon Advisory Boards to allow individuals with criminal backgrounds participating in the job placement pilot program, as well as people preparing for parole, to have the opportunity to apply for a certificate to demonstrate their readiness for the workplace.
- **The Council recommends** developing a statewide marketing campaign to provide education around hiring individuals with criminal backgrounds with a goal of changing employer perceptions and hiring practices.

Occupational Licensing Reform

- **The Council recommends** removing vague or generic terms, including without limitation the phrases "moral turpitude" and "good character" from licensing board policies.
- **The Council recommends** establishing and making public criminal convictions that will disqualify an applicant from obtaining a license to practice, and implementing a pre-qualification process for applicants who have criminal convictions on their record in order to prevent the unnecessary expense of training and testing if a specific past conviction will disqualify an applicant from receiving a license to practice in North Dakota.
- **The Council recommends** establishing an ongoing system for data collection from licensing boards, commissions, and agencies so future reform efforts can be specific to evolving needs, barriers and opportunities.
- **The Council recommends** clearly defining who qualifies as a military spouse or dependent and including military personnel under the provisions of the military spouse licensure reciprocity bill (SB 2306) passed by the 66th Legislative Assembly.

Recruitment and Retention of Workers

- **The Council recommends** sustaining the Technical Skills Training grant created by the Department of Commerce with \$1 million of Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding. This grant program provides matching dollars to help training providers develop or expand accelerated, skilled workforce training programs in targeted industries and in-demand occupations.
 - The Council endorses the current \$2 million funding allocation for TrainND as determined in the North Dakota Department of Career and Technical Education budget for the 2021-2023 biennium and is supportive of TrainND serving as a key partner in providing training programs under the Technical Skills Training Grant, in addition to the private sector and other training providers.
- **The Council recommends** investing in a workforce recruitment campaign to support targeted industries in attracting workers to the state.








HALO EFFECT OF NORTH DAKOTA TOURISM MARKETING





I am Terri Thiel, Executive Director of the Dickinson Convention & Visitors Bureau.

The ND Tourism Division has been, and always will be, the marketing agent for our state's image. That ability to draw travelers to North Dakota has never been more important than now. COVID has changed our industry. The visitor industry has been turned upside down.

Our Roughrider Days Fair & Expo was cancelled, along with most of other festival events. Convention and meetings were cancelled. Sporting events may have continued, but without the people in the stands.

As a result of the lower lodging tax revenue, our CVB re-budgeted, stripped our marketing plans, and basically kept the lights on while staff worked to re-invent themselves to help our community with information related to COVID hospitality updates, grant information, what businesses were open, hours of operation, delivery options and such. We may finally be able to receive a few dollars in the second round of PPP, (we did not qualify earlier), but the amount will be minimal.

We need ND Tourism to be able to show the brand image of the state to increase awareness of ND and influence a trip to the badlands, to the safe open places in ND. Our office has always been a regional partner for the surrounding attractions, events, and small businesses, and with our paid marketing reduced, it is even more important to support the ND Tourism Division budget.

In 2020 there was a **52% increase** in ND Tourism website traffic. There is pent up demand for travel, and not to the turmoiled cities - but to our wide, open, safe places in ND.

The ND Tourism Division needs to be competitive with our neighboring State Tourism offices to reach these travel audiences, they are so far below them.

Please support SB 2018 ND Tourism Division budget at \$18 million/biennium.

Dear Chairman Delzer and members of the House Appropriations Committee:

My name is Darren Bleth, and I am the General Manager of the La Quinta Inn & Suites in Dickinson. I am writing this letter, to implore you to increase the ND Tourism Division's budget.

I have served in the hotel industry in Dickinson, for the past 20+ years. During that time, our state and Southwestern North Dakota especially have seen its share of economic ups and downs. In the past decade, we have endured the oil and energy best of times as well as its worst of times. This past year has presented our industry, our state, our nation, and our world with unprecedented adversity. The likes of which, we could have never imagined.

As we navigated through the period of such uncertainty, beginning in March 2020, we were left only to question when or if tourism would again return. And, if so, to what degree? Given the pandemic's implications, travel from abroad was out of the equation. What then could be expected from domestic travel?

As 2020Q2 neared its close, our region began to see the domestic traveler. Unable to utilize airline travel as originally planned, given the pandemic, these individuals instead took to the interstates and highways to engage in outdoor vacation plans. And, as a result, the national parks provided one of the few "open" venues for responsible, safe socializing and gathering. This represents just an example of the impact of the ND Tourism Division's impact on our state. Without their efforts in bringing awareness and exposure for our state, and all its attractions and destinations, our industry...our region will become stagnant. The impact and inroads realized by their efforts necessitate a long-term, increased budgetary commitment.

I challenge you to think of the ND Tourism Division as, in essence, our state's dedicated Sales force. Historically, our state legislature has funded our state's Sales force approximately \$1 for every \$4-\$5 afforded the neighboring states in our region. This is not competitive. Not close. This is a travesty and a disservice. To our industry, to our region, and to our state.

Chair, Travel Alliance Partnership

In support of SB 2018

March 3, 2021

Chairman Monson and members of the House Appropriations Education and Environment Committee, my name is Terri Thiel, and I am the chair of the ND Travel Alliance Partnership (ND TAP). ND TAP is a coalition of travel industry stakeholders, including CVB's, state attractions, businesses, and other interested stakeholders, in this number three industry of North Dakota's economy.

The impact of COVID has not only decimated our travel industry, but also caused economic strain throughout North Dakota. Local attractions, venues, hotels, restaurants, and visitor bureaus have all suffered huge losses in revenue resulting in layoffs, and in some communities, business closures. Included in my testimony is a survey, developed to gauge the impact of the pandemic on TAP's membership. Of those surveyed, nearly a quarter (22.2%) indicated the pandemic has resulted in a loss of revenue of \$1 million or more. 61.1% indicated they have had to reduce the size of their staff. Of those, 83.4% were either unable rehire staff or were able to hire some but not all of their pre-existing staff.

Financial assistance made possible through the North Dakota Department of Commerce in the form of grants have helped but are no substitute for sales driven by travelers. Revenue generated from travelers will be critical to the tourism industry's recovery, necessitating the need for the ND Tourism Division to appeal to travelers through expanded marketing and awareness.

The pandemic and the effects of quarantine and isolation have resulted in pent up interest in travel. North Dakota has already experienced some of the benefits of this demand, resulting in a substantial increase in state park use, up 35% overall in 2020 with a 339% increase in October alone. Increases in Game & Fish licenses and boat and camper sales were also observed as travelers made adjustments to their vacation plans due to the pandemic. ND Tourism Division's website analytics were up 52% over last year, showing that populations in and outside of the state is ready to get out and travel to the wide-open spaces of North Dakota. The ND Tourism Division needs to be ready to capture those additional in and out of state audiences.

Through its state, regional and international marketing campaigns and efforts, North Dakota Tourism plays an important role in supporting the small businesses, restaurants, hotels, and attractions in communities across the state. With many small businesses still hurting from the impacts of the pandemic, the Tourism Division's marketing efforts this year will be critical to supporting communities by helping attract travelers eager to travel once again.

ND TAP asks for your continued support of the ND Tourism Division and its efforts to attract travelers. The one-time use of \$7 million in funding for ND Tourism's destination and marketing efforts will play an important role in attracting travelers by boosting North Dakota's marketing efforts. TAP asks the House Appropriations Education and Environment Committee to also support this critical funding. Additionally, TAP would like to see Tourism's budget funded at \$18 million. While this would be a notable increase in ND Tourism's budget, it would still pale in comparison to neighboring states. This increase would be a critical step to boost tourism awareness for North Dakota and allow for additional marketing campaigns to encourage travel to our state.

Below are the figures for the 2019 – 2021 biennium:

- ND \$9 million
- SD \$30.2 million
- MT \$19.5 million
- MN \$32.2 million

COVID has shed a light on the importance of travel and underscored the economic impact felt in the absence of tourism. Tourism will be a cornerstone to North Dakota's economic recovery. North Dakota's wide-open spaces, diverse experiences and unique communities have the capability to regenerate lost revenue and the ND Tourism Division plays a pivotal role in marketing those experiences. America is ready to travel again and North Dakota is ready for business.

We ask for your support of the \$7 million in one-time funding and \$18 million in ongoing funding for the ND Tourism Division.


Travel Alliance Partnership Pandemic Survey

The Covid-19 pandemic has had a profound impact on North Dakota's travel and tourism industry, forcing the cancellation or delay of dozens of events statewide.






What is your organization's annual budget?


Did the Covid-19 pandemic force the cancellation of events or operations that substantially impacted your donations, revenue or funding?




How much do you estimate your organization lost in earned revenue or funding due to the pandemic?




Has the Covid-19 pandemic forced you to reduce the size of your staff? 18 responses




If you were forced to reduce the size of your staff, have you been able to rehire them since?


Did your organization apply for the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP)? 17 responses




If you answered yes to the previous question, was your application approved? 7 responses

What has been the biggest challenge to your organization throughout the Covid-19 pandemic?

- Funding. We have had to eliminate our paid marketing efforts and rely on our internal, organic efforts along with the ND Tourism Division's marketing to attract visitors to ND.
- The cancellation of all our events.
- Closing of the Canadian Border, major event cancellations which caused reduction in lodging. Cutbacks on corporate travel, impacts from the oil industry. We have been fortunate in that we were able to secure government/military groups participating with the MAFB and FEMA. We have also had to reduce some of our amenities which impacts the guest's stay.
- Maintaining a safe environment for customers and employees.
- Event cancellations, economic impact, and budget impacts.
- Simply the lack of financial support for hotels. We were denied for all of the first round
 of grants and while the second round was helpful with a loss of millions it was not
 enough as much support as needed especially as we go into the difficult winter
 season.
- Everchanging COVID restrictions/mandates.
- Finding ways to help our stakeholder industries: hotels, attractions, bars & restaurants.
- Visitors. When the border closed, we lost 40 percent of our annual visitors that come from Canada. In total, our revenue was 28 percent of 2019's revenue in gate fees and camping fees. We did not open a cafe because of COVID-19. Our gift shop also suffered.
- Our only income is the occupancy tax. Lack of travelers to our city has dropped our income. Trying to maintain our marketing presence has been a challenge.
- The reduction in funding has negatively impacted what we've been able to do to support the hospitality businesses in our community.
- In-person meetings
- The uncertainty of it all. Which is the trouble for all business and government.
- Like all agencies, the constant shifting from one scenario to another in an effort to reinvent during a time of uncertainty.
- Cancellations of events please let people get back to what they want.

Do you have any additional feedback you would like to provide regarding the impacts of the pandemic on your organization?

- More than ever we need additional funding for ND Tourism Division. The interest to travel is documented with the ND Tourism web analytics up 52% in 2020. The surrounding states fund their State Tourism entities almost double of our ND Tourism Division, we need to be able to compete for the attention of those travelers who will put money into our local businesses, attractions and tax revenue.
- Tourism is such an important part of our city and state and I believe we should continue to do whatever we can to keep tourism strong and to promote this wonderful state.
- We estimate that our community has already lost \$14.9 million in direct visitors expenditures just from the loss of multi-day meetings, conventions, sports and events. This number isn't done growing. 1st quarter is still showing very bleak indicators and we anticipate 2nd quarter being down significantly, too.
- The airline industry is suffering significant financial impacts which is impacting airports around the country.
- Now, more than ever, ND needs to invest in promoting the state. Things will begin to
 open around the country and world by mid-summer into fall, and there will be pent up
 demand for travel. ND Tourism needs to have the funds necessary to take advantage
 and let people know that this is a great place to visit.
- We are grateful for all of the relief funding we've received. Unfortunately, we need
 more support to continue recovering from all the lost revenue at the gate,
 campground, cafe, gift shop, canceled weddings and other rental events. The Peace
 Garden is a staple of the Peace Garden State. We are in an exciting phase of capital
 growth and hope to maintain our operating funds to help us recover from the tough
 year.

Testimony before Chair Monson and Division Members, March 3, 2021

Good afternoon Representative Monson and Members of the Committee and thank you for this opportunity. My name is Charley Johnson, and I am the President and CEO of the Fargo-Moorhead-West Fargo Convention and Visitors Bureau. I'm here to wholeheartedly support the Senate-approved version of 2018, including the addition of seven-million dollars (\$7,000,000) for destination marketing. The increased expenditure would be welcome, and is even more vital this year, as most of our local destination marketing budgets—largely dependent on the local lodging tax—have been devastated as Covid-19 curtailed all kinds of travel. I believe the now-year-long disruption has clearly revealed exactly how big a piece of the state economy our industry is, and how important it is to help it rebound.

Many of you have heard me say this before, but it bears repeating—on their own, tourism & travel are probably the purest form of economic development, since visitors leave their money behind when they go home. But it's well-established that Tourism Marketing also lifts the national and international profile of the entire state, including for purposes of economic and workforce development. Very few people ever decide to move to a state to take a job unless they've had a chance to visit, first, and the visits that influence those decisions to move somewhere don't always come during a specific job search. Sometimes they come during a family vacation, or a trip to a conference, or to a Squirt Hockey Tournament. A visit is the "first date" of an economic relationship. People who visit ND for any reason whatsoever are far more likely to consider working, living, or starting a business here, and make no mistake about it—marketing drives the vast majority of the first visits. You have a great team in the Tourism Division of the Commerce Department, and I believe I can speak for all my travel, tourism, and economic development colleagues around the state when I implore you to give them the tools—indeed, the funding—they need to raise North Dakota and all it has to offer to the place it deserves in the national consciousness. Testimony of Shawn Wenko, President Economic Development Association of North Dakota In Support of SB 2018 March 3, 2021

Chair Monson and members of the House Appropriations Committee- Education and Environment Division:

I'm Shawn Wenko, executive director of Williston Economic Development and president of the Economic Development Association of North Dakota (EDND). It is in that capacity I am testifying before you today in support of SB 2018.

EDND represents more than 80 state economic development organizations on the front line of economic development efforts throughout North Dakota. The primary purpose of the organization is to promote the creation of new wealth throughout North Dakota to develop more vibrant communities and improve quality of life.

One of EDND's top priorities is to support North Dakota Department of Commerce programs as valuable tools, programs and resources for the economic developers in our state. EDND members can attest that a strong partnership with the state helps us locally recruit and retain new and expanding businesses, train North Dakota's workforce, and compete in national and international markets. We also rely on the Commerce Department to help local entrepreneurs explore potential opportunities and diversify the state's economy.

The pandemic and other unpredictability in oil and agriculture activity over the last decade have highlighted the need for North Dakota to diversify its economy and stabilize budget sources. Commercialization, entrepreneurship, and small business growth are crucial to North Dakota's economic future. Entrepreneurs and small businesses are leaders in the nation in employment growth. EDND is supportive of the continuation of all Department of Commerce programs which support local economic developers and businesses, such as Innovate ND, funding partners like the North Dakota Small Business Development Centers, providing training programs to redeploy displaced workers through the Technical Skills Training Grant, attracting

workers and new industries through business development programs and tourism, investing in emerging industries such as Unmanned Aerial Systems, and much more. Further investment in programs such as the Innovation Technology Loan Program (LIFT) as part of a comprehensive statewide strategy to continue to bring new industries to the state are other tools to help diversification.

Partner programs such as the ND Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDCs), ND Women's Business Center (NDWBC), Impact ND, and the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center are vitally important to small business owners launching a new business and the economies of small communities. As an example of the impact of one of these partners, the 10 ND SBDCs provide training and direct business advising and have served 1,879 clients since the biennium began in 2019. During this time, SBDCs have helped 138 new businesses start in the state, supported more than 6,900 jobs and secured more than \$76 million in funds for these businesses. For a few specific examples in the Williston area, the local SBDC was able to help the Hair Society Institute run cash flow scenarios and figure out the number of students to accept and training services to provide in order to get the school off the ground. They were also recently able to help Busted Knuckle Brewery and the Pit 105 Barbecue put together a finance plan with funders to enable the project, which took an old county building and rehabbed it, increasing the city's property tax base, to move forward. Across the state, every community or region can provide a multitude of examples like this, showing the value of these partner programs. EDND advocates for funding for all partner programs to remain stable from the 2019-21 biennium.

EDND believes an investment in the Department of Commerce is needed to grow and diversify the economy so North Dakota can ensure a more revenue-stable future. EDND members could spend the rest of the day giving examples of ways the Department of Commerce has aided their communities. No matter the location or size of the community, our membership relies on the Department of Commerce to provide guidance, resources, and staff to support and diversify our state's growth. Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. My name is Dave Kleppe,
Program Manager of the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center. The
Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) program is hosted by the University
of North Dakota's Center for Business Engagement and Development (led by Tiffany
Ford) within the Nistler College of Business and Public Administration. Federal program
funding is provided by the Department of Defense's Defense Logistics Agency (DLA)
with match funding provided by the North Dakota Department of Commerce (DOC).

The program was established in 1985 to expand the number of businesses capable of participating in government contracts. It is administered by DLA's Small Business Programs in cooperation with the states, local governments and nonprofit organizations. Under the program, PTACs help businesses pursue and perform in contract awards with the Department of Defense, other federal agencies, state and local governments and also subcontracting with government prime contractors. Most of the assistance the PTACs provide is free. PTAC support to businesses includes registration in procurement systems such as the federal System for Award Management (SAM), identification of contract opportunities, help in understanding contracting requirements and in preparing and submitting bids. PTACs have a local presence in all

50 states. The North Dakota PTAC currently operates with two full-time positions: a

PTAC Advisor located in Fargo and a Program Manager located in the Entrepreneur

Center at the Bank of North Dakota.

The federal PTAC program provides 60% federal funding with a 40% state

match. For the past several years the required state match has been provided by the

Department of Commerce from within their discretionary funds line. Without the

required state match funds, the ND PTAC program will cease to exist. While the

amount of the state's investment is small, the economic impact of this program is not.

During state fiscal years 2019 and 2020, the ND PTAC assisted 373 small and large

North Dakota businesses. Many of them have been successful in the government

marketplace and have been awarded more than \$169 million in government contracts,

meaning diversification of revenue streams, creating jobs in our state, and positively

impacting our communities.

We have a very good working relationship with DOC. Without the matching

funds DOC provides, there would be no North Dakota PTAC program to assist our

businesses in navigating the complex path involved with government contracting.

Testimony of Kyle Martin Executive Director TechND

In Support of SB 2018 March 3, 2020

Chairman Monson and members of the House Appropriations Education and Environment Committee:

My name is Kyle Martin, executive director of the Technology Council of North Dakota (TechND). I am writing to voice support of SB 2018.

TechND, formerly known as the Information Technology Council of North Dakota (ITCND), was created in 2000 by North Dakota business, government and education leaders who recognized the need to strengthen the state's information technology infrastructure and reposition the state as a national leader in IT. The organization has since expanded its focus to include members from the technology industry as a whole. TechND has over 60 member organizations, with representatives from both the public and private sector.

The Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) program within the Department of Commerce is important to advancing TechND's mission of encouraging the use, growth and development of technology in North Dakota.

North Dakota stands at the threshold of opportunity through the advancement of its beyond visual line of site network (BVLOS) and is leading the nation in supporting the agricultural, retail, defense, and energy industries through the utilization of UAS. The BVLOS network serves as a critical sandbox for the aerospace industry by allowing companies to test the feasibility of long-distance unmanned flight operations. And, with BVLOS site deployment in

McKenzie County, the opportunities afforded by the network far extend beyond the Grand Forks region.

The BVOLS and long-range drone activities currently being tested in North Dakota could open the door to future drone delivery of medical supplies to rural communities, provide easy access to nutrition by delivering food, allow ranchers to monitor their herds from miles away, allow power companies to quickly inspect power infrastructure after a winter storm, or keep our nation's skies safe from threats imposed by hostile nations.

The Technical Skills Training Grant Program, also supported in SB 2018, provides \$1 million in grant support funding for workforce training programs. These programs seek to assist displaced workers wishing to acquire the technical skills necessary to make a career change and remain employed in North Dakota. As workers pursue new careers, the technology sector is an attractive option, providing employees with flexibility, job growth and good wages. The Technical Skills Training Grant Program has the potential to bridge the gap between high demand computer science and technology positions and North Dakota's workforce.

TechND thanks you for your support of SB 2018. Both the UAS Program and Technical Skills Training Grant Program are important to supporting North Dakota's workforce and have the potential to create new jobs and create economic opportunities for our region. TechND hopes you will support these initiatives within SB 2018 to the fullest extent possible.

Chairman Delzer and members of the House Appropriates Committee, I'm Connie Ova, CEO of the Jamestown/Stutsman Development Corporation (JSDC). I have served in this capacity since 2003. The Jamestown/Stutsman Development Corporation is dedicated to area economic development growth and diversification. JSDC was formally organized in 1991 to develop employment to improve business conditions and advance the interests of the City of Jamestown and Stutsman County, North Dakota by implementing and sustaining an organized effort to attract new businesses and industry, support existing businesses and industry, and encourage new business starts. Jamestown/Stutsman Development Corporation's focus is primary sector job creation.

My testimony is in support of SB 2018. The ND Department of Commerce is a premier partner that provides valuable tools, programs, and resources for the economic developers across our state. While JSDC is supportive of the continuation of all Department of Commerce programs, I want to take opportunity to specifically express our support for a few key programs in this bill.

The North Dakota Small Business Development Centers (NDSBDC) help North Dakotans to start, manage, and grow their businesses. The NDSBDC is a statewide network supporting entrepreneurs and business owners through no-cost, confidential consulting, and business education. Their regional expertise is easily accessible across more than a dozen locations. The ND Small Business Development Center (SBDC) is funded primarily from the Partner Programs line, however, some of their funding comes from the discretionary line, which has been reduced by the Senate. Cuts to either line, will influence their operations, if that cut gets passed on to them. Our goal (and ask) is to provide increased funding.

An integral program aligned with the SBDC is the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center (ND PTAC). The ND PTAC program is 100% funded from the discretionary line. Their team assists business to navigate the government contracting learning curve and make the whole process easier. The team advisors work with businesses to identify government contracting opportunities.

JSDC understands the difficult position you have to determine the state's future, and we appreciate all the thoughtfulness you have put into managing this responsibility. Please consider how programs and resources support the communities in the entire state as you make these decisions.

I urge the committee's support of SB2018.

As a business that has received direct advising from the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center (ND PTAC), we urge you to increase the state's funding support of the ND PTAC. This program provides invaluable, no-cost business procurement assistance to North Dakota businesses and has been influential in helping expand our market sectors.

Razor Consulting Solution, Inc. (Razor) is a perfect example of why the ND PTAC is so important to the sustained success of North Dakota businesses. We realized the opportunities but needed someone to guide us through the complexities of doing business with the federal government. Testifying in Support of SB 2018

Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. I'm Jolene Rieck, the Executive Staff Officer for the North Dakota Department of Transportation. I'm here to testify on behalf of the agency to support SB 2018.

The North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT), Department of Commerce and the Northern Plains UAS Test Site are deploying Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) technologies through USDOT's Integration Pilot Program (IPP). Recently, the North Dakota Department of Transportation was awarded an extension to the IPP program. The new IPP program is called "BEYOND" and the North Dakota Department of Transportation along with the Northern Plains UAS Test Site are working toward the safe implementation of UAS operations and technologies throughout the State of North Dakota.

The USDOT states that there are over 1.7 million Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) currently registered in the United States. North Dakota DOT's partnership with Department of Commerce and the Northern Plains UAS Test Site is critical in the advancement of UAS operations in North Dakota. VANTIS is the program working in this partnership to expand development of a state-wide UAS network remote ground control infrastructure.

The Department of Transportation will continue to utilize UAS technology for flood fighting efforts, bridge and tower inspections, land surveys, stockpile inventories, and other operating needs of the agency. This allows our agency to work more effectively and efficiently to safety move people and goods throughout North Dakota.

As a partner to the Department of Commerce and the UAS Test Site, the North Dakota Department of Transportation supports the language in SB2018. I stand for any questions. Thank you.



House Appropriations Committee – SB 2018 Representative Delzer, Chair March 3, 2021

Dear Chairman Delzer and Members of the House Appropriations Committee

My name is Nathan Schneider and I am Vice President of the Bismarck Mandan Chamber EDC and a board member of the Economic Development Association of North Dakota (EDND). It is in this capacity that I testify in support of SB 2018.

The Bismarck Mandan Chamber EDC serves as the organization that leads the advocacy and economic development efforts of the Bismarck Mandan community as well as Burleigh and Morton counties. EDND represents more than 80 state economic development organizations on the front line of economic development efforts throughout North Dakota. The primary purpose of the organization is to promote the creation of new wealth throughout North Dakota to develop more vibrant communities and improve quality of life.

As you all well know, the Department of Commerce offers support to local economic development organizations across the state and both the Chamber EDC and EDND is supportive of those efforts. One vital component of support provided by the Department of Commerce is through its funding of partner programs such as the ND Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDCs), CTB, Impact Dakota, and the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center. These partner programs are instrumental in assisting local economic developers to grow businesses in their communities. The partner programs had a significant impact on the Bismarck Mandan business community specifically and it is the support of these partner programs that I would like to focus my attention on today.

- The SBDC, which provides one-on-one consulting to people looking to start or expand their business, has assisted 751 individuals out of the Bismarck office with 15 small businesses opening due to the assistance of SBDC. These businesses mostly in manufacturing, wholesale trade, healthcare and social assistance, professional/scientific/technical services, and retail trade reported over \$8,300,000 in capital investments with the assistance of the Bismarck SBDC.

- Impact Dakota is a part of the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP) program. Impact Dakota provides services to manufacturers and processors across the state of North Dakota. These services focus on instructing companies to implement process improvements that eliminate waste in their production processes and business operations resulting in increased productivity while reducing costs. The service offerings range from continuous improvement tools, to quality management systems, to CMMC cybersecurity, and numerous other areas focused on the needs of manufacturers. After the services are provided an independent third party surveys the manufacturer to find out the impact realized. The results for the Bismarck Mandan area show since 2015 through Q3 of 2020 Impact Dakota has assisted 20 manufacturers. The assistance provided nearly \$57,000,000 in total impact to the Bismarck Mandan economy. This includes \$32.4 MM in increased and retained sales, \$8.2 MM in total savings to the manufacturers, and \$16.2 MM in new product, equipment, and facility investments. Ultimately the assistance created 59 new jobs and the retention of another 112 as reported by the independent third party.
- CTB, which is headquartered in Bismarck, provides programs and resources to leaders, students, and entrepreneurs throughout North Dakota. CTB is a certified entrepreneurial center through the Department of Commerce and is also one of the centers that clients of Innovate ND must work with as they go through that program. CTB is supervising 23 Innovate clients from Burleigh and Morton counties and currently working with 8 clients outside of the Innovate program. This biennium the CTB has provided 118 individual business advising sessions and provided training to 352 Burleigh and Morton county clients. This training includes business, personal development, and professional/leadership trainings. CTB is the only authorized entity through the Department of Commerce to certify Woman-Owned Businesses at the state level. There are 12 certified Woman-Owned Business in Burleigh/Morton counties that currently employ 124 people and generate \$23,503,392 in gross sales.

As you can see the partner programs funded through the ND Department of Commerce have a significant impact on Bismarck Mandan and Burleigh and Morton counties. It is important to note that the partner programs each offer a unique set of services and do not duplicate each other's efforts. Nor do the duplicate the services of the local economic development professional or the ND Department of Commerce Staff — they are a supplement to all of our efforts. It is my understanding that even though the partner program line item remains unchanged from the 19-21 biennium a portion of the funding for the partners came from the discretionary line item of the DOC budget which has been significantly cut for the 21-23 biennium. Local economic developers depend upon these partner programs to assist us in our efforts. Please consider addressing the partner program line item to account for the lost discretionary funds and fund all of the partner programs at their 2019-2021 levels. Thank you.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

I am writing to you regarding SB 2018 and State funding for the ND Small Business Development Centers (SBDC) through the ND Department of Commerce budget.

I recently received assistance from the SBDC Fargo service center and business advisor Paul Smith after first learning of the program through the SBA District Office in Fargo. The SBDC has been vital to starting my new business. Paul assisted with financial projections and investor presentations, and his knowledge, professionalism and level of caring were evident and greatly appreciated. This process required numerous on-site meetings at the SBDC office, Zoom meetings, and also face to face meetings with potential investors at their place of work. The amount of work provided to me at no cost would have been cost prohibitive through a CPA firm.

After much consideration and assistance from Paul, I started Forest Products Direct, which will offer a one-step approach to providing lumber and sheet goods to contractor customers. We will also offer doors, windows, millwork, drywall, siding and roofing products through our specialty (one-step) distributor partnerships.

I have many years of experience running existing businesses including Simonson Lumber and Miller Holdings. Starting a new business is a very difficult and stressful process – even for an experienced business person. I can't imagine what it would be like for a person who doesn't have experience. Having the services of the SBDC and Paul to bounce ideas and provide financial documents to obtain capital was invaluable.

I was amazed to learn the SBDC provided assistance to more the 1400 unique clients in 2020, helped small business owners obtain nearly 85M in capital for starting and expanding their companies, and supported 6,031 jobs in ND – all in the face of this challenging COVID-19 pandemic. And most impressive of all: 90% of small business owners who use SBDC services to start their companies are still in business after 5 years. These statistics point to the impact of the SBDC on small businesses and the economy across our state.

I would respectfully ask for your consideration of increased funding for this vital program. By continuing to fund and expand this great service, you are supporting small businesses, job creation and economic growth across North Dakota.

For the record, my name is Dr. Amy Whitney, and I am the Director of the University of North Dakota (UND) Center for Innovation. Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony regarding SB 2018: An act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the Department of Commerce.

As the Director of the UND Center for Innovation, I have the privilege of leading an entrepreneur center dedicated to helping North Dakotans as well as students and faculty at the University of North Dakota to commercialize their ideas, whether based on research or invention. Entrepreneurial business coaching and training is the heart and soul of what we do every day. After almost three years as Director of the UND Center for Innovation, I can say with confidence that our work as a business incubator is stronger when we partner with organizations such as the Department of Commerce. Sharing a common mission to promote economic development in North Dakota is a shared vision for both organizations and collaboration on programming, support and funding for business opportunities and growth makes us more effective than trying to do the work alone. Commerce programs such as InnovateND, the LIFT fund, BioND, and more, are essential components of a holistic suite of resources vital to economic develop, help us to engage and facilitate strong economic development opportunities for entrepreneurial activity, and they provide access to essential early funding and technical support during the critical early stages of the creation, development and growth of a business. We appreciate the opportunity to assist is helping these program succeed as a certified entrepreneurial center and to collaborate with the Department of Commerce in implementing them.

The current version of SB 2018 provides \$948,467 of funding for entrepreneur grants and vouchers, otherwise known as InnovateND. My submitted testimony today focuses primarily on this program in an effort to provide you with a glimpse into the value of this program for North Dakota. Maintaining InnovateND program means sustaining a grant and voucher funding program for entrepreneurs as well as essential grants to the entrepreneurial center who provide

coaching and technical assistance to those entrepreneurs. The UND Center for Innovation is one of four providing this support. Each Center has dedicated staff with the knowledge and experience necessary to coach, mentor and guide the entrepreneurs. We are uniquely positioned to support entrepreneurs and we have a strong, collaborative partnership with Commerce in support of InnovateND.

InnovateND uses a phased grant and voucher funding process that includes measurable benchmarks, provides coaching critical to determining the feasibility and viability of an entrepreneur's business idea, and a match requirement. Each recognized entrepreneur center receives a grant from Commerce to provide the coaching and support. The Commerce grants to for each Center is critical to our ability to off-set employment costs for these hands-on services and to leverage federal funding to expand our work. For example, at the UND Center for Innovation, we presently use the funding to support staff time and as a local match for our federal EDA University Center for Autonomous Systems grant.

As the State of North Dakota continues to respond to the COVID pandemic, supporting entrepreneurial activity is more critical than ever. Entrepreneurial activity helps North Dakota grow out of this challenging time in new and innovative ways. InnovateND provides non-dilutive funding at the earliest-stage of a business. The coaching we provide helps de-risk the idea, ensure market fit and requires customer discovery. Here are a few testimonials from InnovateND clients in our office from the last biennium.

I acquired the Hammelton Building in Lisbon, ND, in 2018. Built in 1907, the Hammelton building had been empty for more than 15 years prior to its renovation. My name is Sonja Duerre Stromswold, and I own two small businesses in Mohall, ND. As the owner of two long-operating small businesses in North Dakota, I am writing to testify in support of the North Dakota Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDC) and their services. I have worked with and seen first-hand the impacts of the ND SBDC, so I urge you to increase the state's funding support of this incredibly impactful program. This nationally accredited program provides invaluable, no-cost business advising to small businesses all around the state and is influential in the growth of business and economic success in our state and local communities.

Both of my businesses have utilized the services of the ND SBDC since the program started in North Dakota in 1989 – 35 years ago. From starting a business to growing it, the ND SBDC and its business advisors have been invaluable to my businesses. Both businesses, The Flower House Garden Center and The Prairie Bistro, LLC, are located in rural Mohall, North Dakota. The Flower House began as a way to supplement my family's farming income in 1968. While our farm has not survived, the Flower House did, partly due to the business support and financial help from SBDC. Our advisor at the time helped us develop a business plan and helped us apply for and receive Disaster Assistance due to the poor economy in rural North Dakota at the time. We've continued to take advantage of the business advice of Mary Beth Votava, the current Center Director of the Minot Region SBDC. She has helped us improve our pricing structure, create budgets, analyze our performance, and survive the cycles of business in an area dependent on agriculture and oil. I believe it is safe to say The Flower House Garden Center would not be in business, employing 15-20 people in our small town, today if not for the support of SBDC. The Prairie Bistro, LLC began the same year the ND SBDC did, in 1989. And as with the Flower House, the local SBDC has been a steady source of support, education, and advice since I opened the business. I knew how to bake but not how to create a budget, price my product, or read a financial statement. Thanks to the ongoing support of the SBDC, we now employ 4 full staff and up to 8 part time. Neither business would be here today if not for the support of the SBDC.

I cannot overstate the importance of their assistance, now more than ever, as small businesses like mine attempt to navigate and survive the impacts of the pandemic. Testimony of Shawn Wenko, President Economic Development Association of North Dakota In Support of SB 2018 January 25, 2021

Chairman Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

I'm Shawn Wenko, executive director of Williston Economic Development and president of the Economic Development Association of North Dakota (EDND). It is in that capacity I am testifying before you today in support of SB 2018.

EDND represents more than 80 state economic development organizations on the front line of economic development efforts throughout North Dakota. The primary purpose of the organization is to promote the creation of new wealth throughout North Dakota to develop more vibrant communities and improve quality of life.

One of EDND's top priorities is to support North Dakota Department of Commerce programs as valuable tools, programs and resources for the economic developers in our state. EDND members can attest that a strong partnership with the state helps us locally recruit and retain new and expanding businesses, train North Dakota's workforce, and compete in national and international markets. We also rely on the Commerce Department to help local entrepreneurs explore potential opportunities and diversify the state's economy.

The pandemic and other unpredictability in oil and agriculture activity over the last decade have highlighted the need for North Dakota to diversify its economy and stabilize budget sources. Commercialization, entrepreneurship, and small business growth are crucial to North Dakota's economic future. Entrepreneurs and small businesses are leaders in the nation in employment growth. EDND is supportive of the continuation of all Department of Commerce programs which support local economic developers and businesses, such as Innovate ND, funding partners like the North Dakota Small Business Development Centers, providing training programs to redeploy displaced workers through the Technical Skills Training Grant, attracting workers and new industries through business development programs and tourism, investing in

emerging industries such as Unmanned Aerial Systems, and much more. Further investment in programs such as the Innovation Technology Loan Program (LIFT) as part of a comprehensive statewide strategy to continue to bring new industries to the state are other tools to help diversification.

Partner programs such as the ND Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDCs), ND Women's Business Center (NDWBC), Impact ND, and the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center are vitally important to small business owners launching a new business and the economies of small communities. As an example of the impact of one of these partners, the 10 ND SBDCs provide training and direct business advising and have served 1,879 clients since the biennium began in 2019. During this time, SBDCs have helped 138 new businesses start in the state, supported more than 6,900 jobs and secured more than \$76 million in funds for these businesses. For a few specific examples in the Williston area, the local SBDC was able to help the Hair Society Institute run cash flow scenarios and figure out the number of students to accept and training services to provide in order to get the school off the ground. They were also recently able to help Busted Knuckle Brewery and the Pit 105 Barbecue put together a finance plan with funders to enable the project, which took an old county building and rehabbed it, increasing the city's property tax base, to move forward. Across the state, every community or region can provide a multitude of examples like this, showing the value of these partner programs. EDND advocates for funding for all partner programs to remain stable from the 2019-21 biennium.

EDND believes an investment in the Department of Commerce is needed to grow and diversify the economy so North Dakota can ensure a more revenue-stable future. EDND members could spend the rest of the day giving examples of ways the Department of Commerce has aided their communities. No matter the location or size of the community, our membership relies on the Department of Commerce to provide guidance, resources, and staff to support and diversify our state's growth. Thank you for the opportunity to address the committee and express support for SB 2018 on behalf of economic developers statewide.

WAHPETON - In the spring of 1997, Julson Lawn Mowing started as a way for Jay to get his kids out of the house and make some money. For over seventeen years it was just Jay and his two sons mowing lawns for the people in the Wahpeton community. In August of 2014, Jay's youngest son asked him to look into buying the All Seasons Car Wash so they could convert the already existing car wash building into a shop for their lawn mowing business. Jay believed this would be an ideal business opportunity to renovate the existing car wash and be able to expand his lawn mowing business.

In the fall of 2014, Jay reached out to the ND SBDC to get help with the purchase of All Seasons Car Wash and better understand all of his financing options. Because of this, Jay was able to successfully get financing for the purchase of the car wash.

So, with the purchase complete, Julson's Lawn Mowing converted to a full-time business by adding nearly ten employees to their staff during the mowing season. Additionally, All Seasons Car Wash expanded by adding a soft touch car wash feature thanks to the help of Nicole Evans, the Grand Forks ND SBDC center director. Jay worked with Nicole to prepare for the expansion. Jay

was able to turn the five-bay self-service wash into a four-bay self-service wash with the fifth bay being an automatic wash.

"I have recommended the ND SBDC to others as they have the knowledge

MINOT - Travis Gerjets, founder of Prairie Sky Breads, never set out to open a business of his own but the people of Minot and surrounding communities are sure glad he did.

It all started at the local farmers market back in 2014. Gerjets wanted to make people happy with fresh homemade bread, and that he did. The community supported him so much that they started offering "Bread Subscriptions," where customers could sign up to have fresh bread delivered weekly. As subscriptions grew, so did his business. Gerjets knew he had to pivot to adjust to the heightened demand.

"I first realized that I was going to start my own business when we started baking year-round. That is when I started to look at the numbers and think about what it might take to make this a business instead of a passion project," Gerjets stated.



As every entrepreneur knows, opening up a new business comes with its set of challenges. Gerjets knew almost everything about what it took to bake a perfect loaf of bread but not nearly as much about what it would take to open up his own business.

"The SBDC was recommended early on. Mary Beth worked patiently with me as I put together a business plan, budget, menu... all the things I needed to get going. She was right there to run the numbers with me. We talked about rent cost, taxes, inventory, utilities --so many things that could have been overlooked without a pro looking over my shoulder," he expressed.

lan was also able to help Jeff finalize his financial proformas as he worked to obtain the \$1 million in capital acquisition needed to start his business. Ian assisted Jeff with fulfilling loan requests from various banks as well as understanding the range of loan programs available to him. His final funding included an SBA 504 loan. Prairie Stone was successfully opened in November of 2019.

WESTERN VETERINARY CLINIC

WILLISTON - The owners of Western Veterinary Clinic (WVC) in Williston are celebrating the third anniversary of their expansion and remodel. The construction project was started in 2017 to accommodate WVC's growing mixed animal practice. The buildout nearly doubled the clinic's size and made it more functional and attractive.

The \$1.2 million project included a 1,400 square-foot addition and 1,500 square-foot remodel. The renovation also gave the clinic more retail space for pet products and room for another veterinarian.

While the original clinic served WVC well for several decades, co-owners Dr. Lee Garbel, Dr. Jody Smith and Dr. Heidi Folden-Willard, began running out of room for their clients and patients in the mid 2010's.



"WVC was started in the 1970's by Dr. Bob Walton and Dr. Lloyd Sorenson," said Garbel. "Gradually, the previous owners retired, and we slowly bought in. Currently we have three owners, five full-time veterinarians, one part-time veterinarian and 15 staff members."

To help them finance the expansion, the owners turned to advisors at the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) and American State Bank and Trust (ASB&T) in Williston. Keith Olson, SBDC Regional Director, provided no-cost advising and support while Zach Nelson, ASB&T Assistant Vice President and Assistant Commercial Loan Manager, assisted with the loan. Garbel said Olson and Nelson were helpful with the loan process.

WVC utilized the Flex PACE program, funded by the Williston STAR Fund and Bank of North Dakota (BND). In 2017, WVC received \$82,000 from the STAR Fund and \$152,000 from BND to buydown the interest on its loan.

The expansion has helped WVC provide more daily appointments with shorter wait times. Clients and their pets can also enjoy a more comfortable lobby and larger exam rooms.

"The buildout was a way to expand the customer base and provide an opportunity to recruit new vets to ensure continued longevity," said Olson. "The Williston area is growing, and vet services are crucial as many people move with their pets."

B2B and Reboot are entrepreneurial education and training programs. They are open to Service members. National Guard and Reserves, Veterans of all eras, and their spouses.



Government Contracting Assistance

North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center (ND PTAC) is a resource for assisting North Dakota businesses in obtaining federal, state, and local government contracts. ND PTAC advisors work with businesses to identify government contracting opportunities. They do this by providing confidential, no cost, one-on-one counseling on how to obtain, manage and comply with contracting requirements for the Department of Defense (DoD) and other federal agencies, state & local governments and businesses with government prime contracts. They emphasize the importance of understanding contracting requirements, and educate businesses on all levels of government contracting.

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Testimony of Tiffany Ford, State Director, North Dakota Small Business Development Centers Regarding Bill SB 2018: ND Commerce Department March 3, 2021 – House Appropriations Committee (Education & Environment Division)

Chairman Monson, Vice-Chairman Schmidt, and members of the House Appropriations Committee, Education & Environment Division:

My name is Tiffany Ford, State Director for your ND Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDC). The ND SBDC is hosted by the University of North Dakota (UND) Nistler College of Business and Public Administration. The national Small Business Development Centers (SBDC) program is administered by the U.S. Small Business Administration. Our state network is partially funded by federal dollars, with mandated state matching funds provided by the Department of Commerce from the **Partner Program line and the Discretionary line**. Local contributors include UND, cities, counties, and private contributors. Our program here in North Dakota is nationally accredited by America's SBDC (ASBDC). We successfully completed a rigorous re-accreditation review in 2019, exceeding each of the quality standards in service, operations, and compliance, with zero findings and a national commendation.

ND SBDC credentialed advisors empower North Dakota small and medium-sized businesses and entrepreneurs to thrive, through customized guidance and resources that help them achieve their goals at every stage of business development. We are the source for knowledge, specialized expertise, connections, business acumen, insights, tools and resources, all at no cost to the client. We accelerate business growth and success across North Dakota, strengthening and diversifying the economy, resulting in long-term positive impacts. When small businesses thrive, communities thrive. **North Dakota thrives**.

This year we are celebrating the 35th anniversary of the ND SBDC program. For over three decades, our program and staff have been invested in the success of small and medium-sized businesses across our state. Now, probably more than ever in our long history, the ND SBDC is recognized as the essential service provider and support system for the businesses that are the cornerstones of our state's economy. Please refer to the ND SBDC impact information, the 2020 ND SBDC Annual Report, and the letters of support provided with this written testimony. To highlight just a few relevant data points from the past 20 months of the current biennium:

- the state's return on investment for the ND SBDC program is estimated to exceed
 \$70 million in state tax revenues, with the current funding level at just over
 \$750,000 per biennium, that calculates an approximate benefit to cost ratio of
 124:1,
- our survival success rate of 90% far exceeds the national average (nationally, only 50% of new small businesses survive their first five years),
- our client satisfaction rate also ranks extremely high: 96% of our clients rate the services they received a 4 out of 5, or higher,
- ND SBDC clients started more than 180 new small businesses, received more than \$121 million in capital, and created, retained, or supported more than 8,200 jobs in our state.

The COVID-19 pandemic has called attention to the vital and significant value of the ND SBDC program. Our COVID-related services and impacts are on page two of the included impact document. The demand for ND SBDC assistance has increased substantially in the past year. In 2020, we served nearly 3,500 individuals through one-on-one advising and training workshops. In an average year that count is usually around 1,500.


The ND SBDC program is North Dakota's widest reaching and most substantial business support program, assisting individual clients in each of our state's 53 counties. Our program far exceeds its goals in each category, each year. We report only verifiable, fact based successes. The comprehensive expertise and certifications of our staff is incomparable, and the tools available to our clients are not available through any other service or organization in our state, not even those that do charge a fee.

The ND SBDC is a fundamental component of the North Dakota entrepreneurial ecosystem. Small business is BIG business in this state, with 98.8% of firms defined as small businesses. The statewide services provided by the ND SBDC have direct economic impacts including jobs, tax base, and quality of life. Small businesses ARE the foundation of our communities and provide essential services and products to support the operations and success of all of our state's industries, including our top producers: oil, energy, agriculture, and tourism. Regardless of industry or interest, from manufacturing to childcare, innovation to rural vitality, and workforce development to business transition planning – the path for each client and business is unique, and the ND SBDC guides these businesses towards success.

Each of the past five years has seen an increase in federal funding for the national SBDC program, however, the **ND SBDC will be challenged to receive our full allocation of federal dollars**, when our state contribution remains at the current level. Page five of our Annual Report shows the breakdown of federal, state, and local funding sources. The State

provided only 23% of funding for operations of this statewide program in 2020. Adequate funding from the state supports our program in numerous ways:

Federal 48%

- Adequate state funding ensures that we can continue to leverage the maximum
 amount of federal funding available to our state, and continue to meet the mandated
 1:1 match under the SBDC program; if state and local funding decreases, our federal
 funding will decrease (a triple-threat to our operations and service delivery capacity),
- We anticipate local sources of funding to become even more strained in the near future, and seeking these local sources for operational funding takes significant time away from direct assistance provided to clients,
- If funding for the ND SBDC program decreases below the current level, it will have negative repercussions on service delivery, economic impact, and may lead to the closure of service centers.

An additional consideration would be a more direct appropriations approach to the funds meant for the ND SBDC program. Funding allocations within an aggregated budget line lack legislative intent. Given the considerable **statewide impact** of the ND SBDC, it may be in the best interest of the state to have ND SBDC be a named budget line, outside of the Partner Programs line.

The ND SBDC is a long-standing, strong program with undeniable positive impacts for our state's economy, businesses, and communities – large and small. While many may not realize the strength of small businesses in our state, we like to remind them that the essential services and products they consume, whether from the grocery store, gas station, car dealership, childcare center, plumber, electrician, or dentist, are small businesses that

employ people, pay taxes, and support the local little league team. We as a network of passionate and invested individuals look forward to serving these businesses and this state for years to come. We are proud to assist the resilient, determined, and hard-working small businesses and entrepreneurs in our communities. Helping our clients achieve their dreams of owning a successful small business, right here in North Dakota, is what matters most.

I am writing you on behalf of Thales, a global organization with more than 80,000 employees worldwide, revenues of \$24 Billion and one of the systems integrators for the State's beyond visual line of sight (BVLOS) initiative—Vantis—to express our support for Governor Burgum's initiative to use Legacy Funds to stimulate the growth of the unmanned aviation sector in the State.

As a partner with the State, Thales believes that there is enormous potential in the expansion of the UAS industry within the State and across the country. Thales, along with a globally recognized policy and financial consulting firm, recently conducted a technology and economic study to assess the impact of UAS operations in the State of North Dakota over the next 15 years. 2021 ENHANCED USE LEASE REQUEST

The current request, passed by the North Dakota Senate, is for **\$7M** in new funding to support growth of utilities and infrastructure at the park and **\$3M** of carryover from the **2019-2021** biennium. Grand Sky requested the \$7M to support accelerated growth in response to the growth of the UAS market nationally and the expected rapid growth of the North Dakota UAS market that will see quicker growth than the national average with the roll-out of the Vantis statewide BVLOS network.

Grand Sky is self-sufficient with respect to its operations. All past and future State investments are used for the development of new utilities and infrastructure at the park that benefit all tenants. The Enhanced Use Lease grant is funding that will support new investment in utilities and infrastructure that includes; security, roads, electric, sanitary sewer, natural gas, water, fire suppression (hydrant system), storm water and wetlands, airfield apron concrete repair, taxiway lights, taxiway paving, airfield striping and painting, flight support facilities, firefighting equipment, communications (fiber optics), software and licenses for flight operations support, fencing/gates, and common area parking. No funds will be used to subsidize Grand Sky operations with the exception of investment in new roads, utilities, and infrastructure as referenced above.

As mentioned above, Grand Sky is self-sufficient with respect to its ongoing day-to-day operations. However, funding for utilities and infrastructure is needed to continue to grow the park. At the outset, Total utility investment required for the entire park is estimated at \$41M. If approved, the current \$7M request would bring total infrastructure investment to \$28.5M.

THE NEED:

- The tenant base at Grand Sky is growing as is the need for more space.
- Grand Sky will be developing "Phase 2" of the park which includes additional security and
 communications requirements, along with the pre-development of expansion of the flight
 operations aprons to promote the possibility of a crosswind runway along with expanded apron
 space to encourage more tenants to establish operations at the park. Simply put, the park needs to
 grow its utility and infrastructure footprint to support growth from existing tenants and new
 tenants.
- We request permission to use some portion, up to \$2M, for engineering, planning, and similar services in support of the development of new utilities and infrastructure. No funds will be used in support of tenant facilities.

THE HISTORY

- To date the state has invested \$21.5M in utilities and infrastructure at the park.
- The Enhanced Use Lease Grant (Grand Sky) which has been leveraged with \$68.75M in private sector investment in the form of new office buildings, hangars, and other support facilities completed in 2020.
- The private sector has invested \$3.19 for every \$1 the state has invested.

• Since 2015, over \$90M in privately funded construction has been completed at Grand Sky yielding a ratio of \$4.18 (privately funded) to \$1 (State funds).

JOBS CREATED

Annual employment and wage impacts from Grand Sky's ongoing operations (Grand Sky and tenant operations) include the following:

- Grand Sky and its tenants employ 187 people annually. Those 187 jobs generate almost \$17M in annual wages with an average salary of \$90,586.05 per year. (Note: Average Salary derived by dividing Total Reported Salary of \$16,966,768.00 by 187.3 reported jobs.)
- Grand Sky and its tenants create an Indirect economic impact of \$7,282,724 in wages from 143.4 jobs. (Note: Based on IMPLAN estimates)
- Grand Sky and its tenants create an Induced economic impact of \$4,935,297 in wages from 120.0 jobs. (Note: Based on IMPLAN estimates)
- Total ANNUAL Grand Sky economic impact, including Direct, Indirect and Induced economic impacts from employment is \$29.18M over 450.7 jobs. (SOURCE: Project Technical Memorandum from Jeffrey Donohoe Associates, LLC regarding "Grand Sky Economic Impact Evaluation" dated 2/26/21)

Testimony of Shawn Wenko, President Economic Development Association of North Dakota In Support of SB 2018 March 3, 2021

Chair Monson and members of the House Appropriations Committee- Education and Environment Division:

I'm Shawn Wenko, executive director of Williston Economic Development and president of the Economic Development Association of North Dakota (EDND). It is in that capacity I am testifying before you today in support of SB 2018.

EDND represents more than 80 state economic development organizations on the front line of economic development efforts throughout North Dakota. The primary purpose of the organization is to promote the creation of new wealth throughout North Dakota to develop more vibrant communities and improve quality of life.

One of EDND's top priorities is to support North Dakota Department of Commerce programs as valuable tools, programs and resources for the economic developers in our state. EDND members can attest that a strong partnership with the state helps us locally recruit and retain new and expanding businesses, train North Dakota's workforce, and compete in national and international markets. We also rely on the Commerce Department to help local entrepreneurs explore potential opportunities and diversify the state's economy.

The pandemic and other unpredictability in oil and agriculture activity over the last decade have highlighted the need for North Dakota to diversify its economy and stabilize budget sources. Commercialization, entrepreneurship, and small business growth are crucial to North Dakota's economic future. Entrepreneurs and small businesses are leaders in the nation in employment growth. EDND is supportive of the continuation of all Department of Commerce programs which support local economic developers and businesses, such as Innovate ND, funding partners like the North Dakota Small Business Development Centers, providing training programs to redeploy displaced workers through the Technical Skills Training Grant, attracting

workers and new industries through business development programs and tourism, investing in emerging industries such as Unmanned Aerial Systems, and much more. Further investment in programs such as the Innovation Technology Loan Program (LIFT) as part of a comprehensive statewide strategy to continue to bring new industries to the state are other tools to help diversification.

I know he assists other business, yet he is not the one cutting the ribbons and winning awards for business growth.

Keith understood that helping Leonardite Products was a benefit to the region and North Dakota for two reasons: 1. We are a is a primary sector business. In other words, 100% of the income we generate comes into North Dakota from outside the state. In 2021 we expect 50% of our income will be from outside of the US. 2. Leonardite Products also diversifies the industry mix of the Williston economy.

In Support of SB 2018 Funding for the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) to the House Appropriations - Education and Environment Division Public Hearing March 11, 2021

Good morning Mr. Chairman and Committee members.

My name is Holly Anderson, and I am the owner and CEO of Elinor Coatings, a research and development company in Fargo that provides corrosion and surface protection solutions to the Department of Defense. Thank you for the opportunity to provide my input on SB 2018. As a business owner who has received direct advising from the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center (ND PTAC), I urge your continued support for funding of the program.

ND PTAC provides no-cost procurement and contracting assistance to North Dakotans who want to do business with local, state and federal agencies. Navigating the complex government contracting environment without proper guidance can lead to costly mistakes in time and money for a business owner.

In 2020, North Dakota entities held contracts from The Department of Defense valued at \$260,989,826. In 2020, the Department of Health and Human Services increased contracts in North Dakota nearly \$85 million from the year before to \$251,652,705. (www.usaspending.gov) PTAC is helping our state grow new business sectors, create high-paying skilled jobs and increase North Dakota's share of the \$1.485 trillion in discretionary funding spent by the federal government annually.

Having knowledgeable and no-cost support from PTAC has been extremely valuable to Elinor Coatings. We recently secured two multi-year Department of Defense research contracts to develop anti-corrosion coatings for air and ground vehicles for the Air Force and Army. These contracts have resulted in seven additional highly-skilled employees at Elinor laboratories and two open positions we are seeking to fill.

The state and local PTAC have been very helpful to Elinor Coatings in several ways. Cathy Lindquist at PTAC Fargo has assisted us with our registration on the Federal System for Awards Management (Sam.gov), searching for opportunities, qualifying for HUBZone, navigating the Federal invoicing website, and finding information to stay compliant in cybersecurity and federal acquisition regulations (FARs). We take advantage of webinars and online materials the PTAC offers regularly. We consistently get same-day answers to our questions from our PTAC office.

Funding of PTAC is currently provided by the Department of Defense's Defense Logistics Agency on a 60/40 basis with the 40% state match being funded by the ND Department of Commerce through the momentum/discretionary budget line. Please support business owners like me all around our great state by proposing increased funding for the ND PTAC.

As a small business owner who has received direct assistance from Paul Smith, I urge you to increase the state's funding support of the ND SBDC. This nationally accredited program provides invaluable, no-cost business advising to small businesses all around the state and has been influential in helping build and grow my business.

I acquired the Hammelton Building in Lisbon, ND, in 2018. Built in 1907, the Hammelton building had been empty for more than 15 years prior to its renovation. With limited knowledge and experience within the world of construction, real estate law, marketing, etc., I began the planning process to bring this property back to life. During the renovation process, I worked with several professionals and sought advice from anyone willing to help. It was then that Gwen Crawford, Lisbon City Auditor, advised me to look to the ND Small Business Development Centers for assistance. I had no experience with this sort of project; I only knew I wanted to be successful in making an impact and establishing a legacy with our community.

Elijah Holdings LLC has been a client of the ND SBDC since 2017 and our project was recently featured as a 2020 success story. ND SBDC assisted me AND my future tenants (separately) in planning for future financial needs and growth. Together, we had a comprehensive plan that has allowed each of us to succeed. Testimony of Shawn Wenko, President Economic Development Association of North Dakota In Support of SB 2018 January 25, 2021

Chairman Holmberg and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee:

I'm Shawn Wenko, executive director of Williston Economic Development and president of the Economic Development Association of North Dakota (EDND). It is in that capacity I am testifying before you today in support of SB 2018.

EDND represents more than 80 state economic development organizations on the front line of economic development efforts throughout North Dakota. The primary purpose of the organization is to promote the creation of new wealth throughout North Dakota to develop more vibrant communities and improve quality of life.

One of EDND's top priorities is to support North Dakota Department of Commerce programs as valuable tools, programs and resources for the economic developers in our state. EDND members can attest that a strong partnership with the state helps us locally recruit and retain new and expanding businesses, train North Dakota's workforce, and compete in national and international markets. We also rely on the Commerce Department to help local entrepreneurs explore potential opportunities and diversify the state's economy.

The pandemic and other unpredictability in oil and agriculture activity over the last decade have highlighted the need for North Dakota to diversify its economy and stabilize budget sources. Commercialization, entrepreneurship, and small business growth are crucial to North Dakota's economic future. Entrepreneurs and small businesses are leaders in the nation in employment growth. EDND is supportive of the continuation of all Department of Commerce programs which support local economic developers and businesses, such as Innovate ND, funding partners like the North Dakota Small Business Development Centers, providing training programs to redeploy displaced workers through the Technical Skills Training Grant, attracting workers and new industries through business development programs and tourism, investing in

emerging industries such as Unmanned Aerial Systems, and much more. Further investment in programs such as the Innovation Technology Loan Program (LIFT) as part of a comprehensive statewide strategy to continue to bring new industries to the state are other tools to help diversification.

Partner programs such as the ND Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDCs), ND Women's Business Center (NDWBC), Impact ND, and the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center are vitally important to small business owners launching a new business and the economies of small communities. As an example of the impact of one of these partners, the 10 ND SBDCs provide training and direct business advising and have served 1,879 clients since the biennium began in 2019. During this time, SBDCs have helped 138 new businesses start in the state, supported more than 6,900 jobs and secured more than \$76 million in funds for these businesses. For a few specific examples in the Williston area, the local SBDC was able to help the Hair Society Institute run cash flow scenarios and figure out the number of students to accept and training services to provide in order to get the school off the ground. They were also recently able to help Busted Knuckle Brewery and the Pit 105 Barbecue put together a finance plan with funders to enable the project, which took an old county building and rehabbed it, increasing the city's property tax base, to move forward. Across the state, every community or region can provide a multitude of examples like this, showing the value of these partner programs. EDND advocates for funding for all partner programs to remain stable from the 2019-21 biennium.

EDND believes an investment in the Department of Commerce is needed to grow and diversify the economy so North Dakota can ensure a more revenue-stable future. EDND members could spend the rest of the day giving examples of ways the Department of Commerce has aided their communities. No matter the location or size of the community, our membership relies on the Department of Commerce to provide guidance, resources, and staff to support and diversify our state's growth. Thank you for the opportunity to address the committee and express support for SB 2018 on behalf of economic developers statewide.

WESTERN VETERINARY CLINIC

WILLISTON - The owners of Western Veterinary Clinic (WVC) in Williston are celebrating the third anniversary of their expansion and remodel. The construction project was started in 2017 to accommodate WVC's growing mixed animal practice. The buildout nearly doubled the clinic's size and made it more functional and attractive.

The \$1.2 million project included a 1,400 square-foot addition and 1,500 square-foot remodel. The renovation also gave the clinic more retail space for pet products and room for another veterinarian.

While the original clinic served WVC well for several decades, co-owners Dr. Lee Garbel, Dr. Jody Smith and Dr. Heidi Folden-Willard, began running out of room for their clients and patients in the mid 2010's.



"WVC was started in the 1970's by Dr. Bob Walton and Dr. Lloyd Sorenson," said Garbel. "Gradually, the previous owners retired, and we slowly bought in. Currently we have three owners, five full-time veterinarians, one part-time veterinarian and 15 staff members."

To help them finance the expansion, the owners turned to advisors at the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) and American State Bank and Trust (ASB&T) in Williston. Keith Olson, SBDC Regional Director, provided no-cost advising and support while Zach Nelson, ASB&T Assistant Vice President and Assistant Commercial Loan Manager, assisted with the loan. Garbel said Olson and Nelson were helpful with the loan process.

WVC utilized the Flex PACE program, funded by the Williston STAR Fund and Bank of North Dakota (BND). In 2017, WVC received \$82,000 from the STAR Fund and \$152,000 from BND to buydown the interest on its loan.

The expansion has helped WVC provide more daily appointments with shorter wait times. Clients and their pets can also enjoy a more comfortable lobby and larger exam rooms.

"The buildout was a way to expand the customer base and provide an opportunity to recruit new vets to ensure continued longevity," said Olson. "The Williston area is growing, and vet services are crucial as many people move with their pets."

NETWORK PROGRAMS



The Veterans Business Outreach Center (VBOC) program is a one-stop-shop for service members, veterans and military spouses looking to start, purchase, or grow a business. Located nationwide, VBOCs provide training workshops, including Boots to Business (B2B) and Boots to Business Reboot, as well as business development assistance such as training, advising and mentoring, and resource referrals. B2B and Reboot are entrepreneurial education and training programs. They are open to Service members. National Guard and Reserves, Veterans of all eras, and their spouses.



Government Contracting Assistance

North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center (ND PTAC) is a resource for assisting North Dakota businesses in obtaining federal, state, and local government contracts. ND PTAC advisors work with businesses to identify government contracting opportunities. They do this by providing confidential, no cost, one-on-one counseling on how to obtain, manage and comply with contracting requirements for the Department of Defense (DoD) and other federal agencies, state & local governments and businesses with government prime contracts. They emphasize the importance of understanding contracting requirements, and educate businesses on all levels of government contracting.

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Testimony of Tiffany Ford, State Director, North Dakota Small Business Development Centers Regarding Bill SB 2018: ND Commerce Department March 11, 2021 – House Appropriations Committee (Education & Environment Division)

Chairman Monson, Vice-Chairman Schmidt, and members of the House Appropriations Committee, Education & Environment Division:

For the record, my name is Tiffany Ford, State Director for your ND Small Business Development Centers (ND SBDC).

The ND SBDC is not a department within Commerce, but is hosted by the University of North Dakota (UND) Nistler College of Business and Public Administration. The ND SBDC receives funding from ND Commerce under both the Partner Programs line and the Discretionary line. **State and local funding is necessary in order to receive the full amount of federal funds allocated to North Dakota for this program**. Other local funds that support this match are provided by UND, cities, counties, and private contributors. Each of the past five years has seen an increase in federal funding for the national SBDC program, however, the ND SBDC will be challenged to receive our full allocation of federal dollars, when our state contribution remains at the current level.

In the current biennium, the ND SBDC has been awarded \$756,930 from the department of Commerce. During the 2019-2021 legislative session, the ND SBDC was approved for an increase of \$233,334 on top of the base budget of \$654,611. For the upcoming biennium, adequate state funding for the ND SBDC is more important than ever before because we anticipate that the lasting effects due to the pandemic will be devastating for years to come for our state's businesses. \$900,000 for the 2021-2023 biennium would support program operations, so that we can, at a minimum, sustain our current service capacity and program offerings, in order to meet the increasing demand for assistance from ND small businesses to start, grow, and not just survive but thrive in the long-term.

Adequate state funding ensures that we can continue to leverage the maximum amount of federal funding available to our state. If state and local funding decreases, our federal funding will decrease. We anticipate local sources of support to become even more strained in the next year and beyond, and seeking these local sources for operational funding takes significant time away from direct assistance provided to clients. Any decreases below our current level of funding will have negative repercussions on service delivery, economic impact, and may lead to the closure of service centers.

Given the considerable statewide impact of the ND SBDC, an additional consideration would be a more direct appropriations approach to the funds meant for the ND SBDC program. Funding allocations within an aggregated budget line lack legislative intent. It may be in the best interest of the state to have ND SBDC be a named budget line, outside of the Partner Programs line.

The written testimony I submitted last week gave a more detailed overview of the ND SBDC program. To briefly revisit the impacts and the return on the state's current investment in our program:

- the state's return on investment for the ND SBDC program is estimated to exceed
 \$70 million in state tax revenues with the current funding level at just over
 \$750,000 this biennium, that calculates an approximate benefit to cost ratio of
 \$124:\$1
- Businesses that work with the ND SBDC have a *survival success rate of 90%* which far exceeds the national average (nationally, only 50% of new small businesses survive their first five years)
- In the last biennium, ND SBDC clients started more than 185 new small businesses in ND; received more than \$130 million in capital invested in their success and growth; and supported, created or saved more than 8,300 jobs for ND citizens

The ND SBDC has been on the front lines, helping businesses access all available COVID disaster relief programs. The demand for ND SBDC assistance has increased substantially in the past year. In 2020, we served nearly 3,500 individuals, whereas in an average year that count is usually around 1,500. Our network of staff have been the boots-on-the-ground, getting documentation compiled for businesses to take to the bank, connecting business owners to approved lenders and portals for the applications, and answering questions as the regulations and programs get revised, all of which will continue to be a priority for the foreseeable future. ND SBDC staff have the direct connection to SBA for clients that have been denied and are looking to file for reconsideration of their application. At the state and local level, the ND SBDC is the source for assistance related to the ERG, HERG, and HERG+ application processes, and all other regional disaster assistance programs.

This past year we have observed a shift in our client base. We have seen an uptick in our services to existing businesses. These businesses are looking to expand their operations, shift or re-invent their business model, find operational efficiencies, enter into new markets, develop digital marketing and e-commerce, or are looking at exporting beyond the boundaries of ND and bringing in new revenues to our state. **The businesses that we assist provide essential services and products to support the operations and success**

of all of our state's industries, including our top producers: oil, energy, agriculture, and tourism. To mention a couple:

- Creedence Energy Services in Williston delivers chemical solutions to oil and gas
 operators that improve production, reduce failures, and optimize overall
 operational efficiency. They began working with the ND SBDC in 2014 on starting a
 business. They secured start-up financing, grew almost overnight, employ more
 than 50 people, are still hiring, and continue to work with the ND SBDC as they look
 to expand their operations and services for a second time.
- Harvest Profit out of Fargo began working with the ND SBDC in 2017 as an existing business looking for additional capital financing for expansion. This long-term relationship has now seen two separate phases of growth and financing for this agri-business technology company, using venture capital, ND Development Fund, BND, and PACE programs. In 2020 they were acquired by John Deere – a great next phase of innovation for this ND business!
- Chris Ahl began working with the ND SBDC in 2015 when he decided to purchase
 what is now Pekin Lodge. We helped him to find multiple sources for the capital
 necessary to finalize the purchase in 2017. Things were going well, until COVID
 devastated the tourism industry. Now he is working with us again to get the disaster
 assistance funds the business needs to survive this downturn and come out
 successful on the other side.

ND SBDC services to entrepreneurs looking to start new businesses did not see any decline due to the pandemic. In 2020 we were able to capture more new business starts than in the previous two years. Entrepreneurs saw solutions to problems, and gaps in the market to fill with their product or service. Many of our entrepreneurial clients have been let go from a job and see this as an opportunity to capitalize on the skillset they already have, to "be their own boss," and to continue to contribute to the vitality of their community. As these entrepreneurs work with us to refine their business idea and determine a model that will lead to their long-term success, we are helping to diversify our state's economy.

The ND SBDC is a fundamental component of the North Dakota entrepreneurial ecosystem. This is a long-standing, reputable, and strong program with undeniable positive impacts for our state's economy, businesses, and communities – large and small, including job creation, tax base, and quality of life. We, as a network of passionate and invested individuals, look forward to serving these businesses and this state for years to come. We are proud to assist the resilient, determined, and hard-working businesses and

Chairman Monson and members of the Committee. My name is Dave Kleppe, Program Manager of the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center.

The Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) program is hosted by the University of North Dakota's Center for Business Engagement and Development (led by Tiffany Ford) within the Nistler College of Business and Public Administration.

Federal program funding is provided by the Department of Defense's Defense Logistics Agency (DLA) with match funding provided by the North Dakota Department of Commerce (DOC).

The program was established in 1985 to expand the number of businesses capable of participating in government contracts. It is administered by DLA's Small Business Programs in cooperation with the states, local governments, and nonprofit organizations. Under the program, PTACs help businesses pursue and perform in contract awards with the Department of Defense, other federal agencies, state and local governments, and also subcontracting with government prime contractors.

Most of the assistance the PTACs provide is free. PTAC support to businesses includes:

- Assisting with state and federal registrations in procurement systems such as the federal System for Award Management (SAM)
- Creation of a bidmatch search profile unique to each business to help identify contracting and subcontracting opportunities
- Providing training on federal and state contracting and cybersecurity

requirements and providing assistance with government certifications

Conducting solicitation reviews and advice on preparing bid proposals

PTACs have a local presence in all 50 states. The North Dakota PTAC currently operates with two full-time positions: a PTAC Advisor located in Fargo and a Program Manager located in the Entrepreneur Center at the Bank of North Dakota.

The federal PTAC program provides 60% federal funding with a 40% match requirement. For the past several years the required state match has been provided by the Department of Commerce from within their discretionary funds line. Without the required state match funds, the ND PTAC program will cease to exist. While the amount of the state's investment is small, the economic impact of this program is not. During state fiscal years 2019 and 2020, the ND PTAC assisted 373 small and large North Dakota businesses. Many of them have been successful in the government marketplace and have been awarded more than \$169 million in government contracts, meaning expansion and diversification of revenue streams, creating jobs in our state, and positively impacting our communities. Program return-on-investment is \$860 in contracts for every state dollar invested.

We have a very good working relationship with DOC. Without the matching funds DOC provides, there would be no North Dakota PTAC program to assist our businesses in navigating the complex path involved with government contracting. Thank you Chairman Monson and committee members for your time and for your support of the ND PTAC.

Legislative Support for North Dakota Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse at the ND Center for Nursing (Amendment to SB 2018)

"Due to a major shortage of health care staffing, the state's hospitals have a sever lack of available beds. Rising COVID-19 hospitalizations and high non-coronavirus admissions, some resulting from residents who deferred health care earlier int eh pandemic, have caused a crunch on medical centers." Grand Forks Herald November 10, 2020.

If we learned anything from the COVID-19 pandemic, it is that North Dakota does **not** have a centralized, coordinated effort to provide for adequate nurse staff across the state. Nursing forms the foundation for the economic engine for North Dakota's communities. Currently, health care facilities spend MILLIONS of dollars contracting with out of state agencies to secure travel and contract nurses, huge opportunity for these dollars to stay in ND.

"Something needs to be done about retention of staff. Currently, I know of 7 ICU nurses that left their positions in Bismarck to take traveling positions to Fargo and 7 Fargo nurses that have left Fargo to go to Bismarck for different jobs. ND has a constant churning of nurses." ND Practicing Nurse, 2020

"Nurses are burning out due to chronic nursing shortages exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic." ND Nurse Administrator, 2020

"Nurses are heavily recruited by out-of-state recruiters. ND should provide more detailed resources promoting in-state jobs if they would like us to stay here." ND Nursing Student, 2020.



The North Dakota Center for Nursing requests an amendment to the ND Department of Commerce budget (SB 2018) to reallocate \$140,000 of the previously appropriated Nonresident Nurse Employment Recruitment Program funding for the establishment of the ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse and support the Culture of Excellence program at the ND Center for Nursing during the 2021-2023 biennium.

The ND Center for Nursing is uniquely positioned to develop and implement an innovative comprehensive strategy to address the state's nursing shortage in rural areas.

Two goals for ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse:

- Recruit nurse graduates and nurses for health care employment in ND.
- **Retain** nurses in **ND**, and in the workplace decrease staff turnover.





Key Components of ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse

- Will be based on extensive ND Center for Nursing data showing the need for increased recruitment and retention.
- Target all levels of nurses: Certified Nursing Assistants (CNA), Licensed Practical Nurses (LPN), Registered Nurses (RN), Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) and Nursing Faculty
- Is a unique opportunity for nursing education programs and employers to work together to keep ND students in North Dakota.

• Recruit nurse graduates and nurses for health care employment in ND.

Provide career services to nursing students by connecting them with local communities and employment opportunities. Connect employers and graduating nurses directly together to get them to the bedside in rural and urban ND. We will work to connect students to NNERP and other incentive programs to increase the uptake. In a recent survey of graduating nurses, 38% plan to work outside of North Dakota and they are heavily recruited from out of state agencies.

Develop a flexible staffing model through collaborative work with health care employers, graduating students, practicing nurses and education programs to provide increased opportunities for unique staffing patterns to better meet the needs of nurses (i.e., hours, shifts, travel vs. permanent).

- Retain nurses in their workplace and in ND and decrease turnover.
 - Increase retention of nurses through the ND Nursing Culture of Excellence Designation program which is designed to improve the workplace culture and support the formation of professional identity in nursing. In a recent survey of practicing nurses, 48% indicated that they plan to leave North Dakota.
- Will add a critical component to existing ND Department of Commerce workforce programs to fill the gap of direct recruitment and retention of nurses to ND.

Fiscal Note: Funding is needed to support the ND Center for Nursing infrastructure and to fully develop the ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse and the Culture of Excellence program. It is anticipated that these will be fully developed during the 2021-2023 biennium which will help provide sustained funding for all the ND Center for Nursing activities. A version of this plan was included in SB 2198 which failed in the Senate.

Total State Appropriations for 2021-2023= \$140,000 from carry-forward funding

The North Dakota Center for Nursing, a non-profit 501c3 organization, was developed in 2011 to represent over 20,000 nurses and over 40 nursing organizations across North Dakota. The mission of the North Dakota Center for Nursing is through collaboration guide ongoing development of a well-prepared and diverse nursing workforce to meet health care needs in North Dakota through research, education, recruitment and retention, advocacy and public policy. This policy agenda has been approved by our Board of Directors and is an official policy of the North Dakota Center for Nursing.

This amendment would allocate \$140,000 of the carry-forward funding of the Nonresident Nurse Employment Recruitment Program for the establishment of the ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse and to support the Culture of Excellence program.

Nurse staffing is in crisis in North Dakota, especially with the pandemic, and North Dakota emergency nurses have felt the impact of this firsthand. Beyond the added strain of COVID-19, emergency nurses face increased 'inpatient boarding' (patients admitted to the hospital, but remaining in the ED due to the lack of an inpatient nurse to care for them), increased nurse-to-patient ratios – especially for critically ill patients in the ED, and a constant churn of travel nurses in and out of the facilities, leading to unpredictable numbers of nurses to care for our patients.

There is a critical need for a centralized, coordinated effort to provide nurse staffing across the state. This is paired with the need for increased awareness and recruitment of future nurses to replace burned out nurses, an increased focus on recruiting ND nursing students to work in ND, the development of a centralized contract nursing staffing pool with flexible staffing options, and the need to ensure that the work environment provides a positive workplace culture to ensure retention.

I support the ND Center for Nursing proposed amendment because the Center has a strong reputation of bringing North Dakota's nurses together to solve challenging problems, has an existing framework upon which to develop an effective solution, and is committed to changing the way staffing is addressed within our state. The Center for Rural Health (CRH), UND School of Medicine and Health Sciences, as the State Office of Rural Health (SORH) and the Program Office for the Area Health Education Center (AHEC) can support your effort to use Department of Commerce Carry Forward funds to address nursing supply and demand issues. The Center for Rural Health does employ a Workforce Specialist, supported with state appropriation, who works to assist rural communities with a range of health workforce needs (e.g., medical providers, nursing, allied health, administrative, and others). It is my understanding that this legislation is not duplicative of what is already occurring and that it can augment current efforts. The nursing situation is indeed complicated and multiple partners collaboratively working to address it may produce more benefits for North Dakota. The travel nurse pool idea is distinct.

Nurses are the largest health professional category in ND and are vital to the continuation of access to necessary health services in rural and tribal communities. Especially during a pandemic we have seen the critical importance of nursing. Nurses keep our rural hospitals and clinics open, providing high quality care. We are writing in strong support of SB 2198, which would provide support for the organizational structure of the North Dakota Center for Nursing, and build a new nursing workforce recruitment and retention program for the state.

Ave Maria Village is a 100-bed faith-based skilled nursing and rehabilitation facility. This past year, we have faced the most severe challenges we have ever had in recruiting qualified professional nurses. For the first time in many years, we are contracting with a travel nurse service in order to adequately staff our facility. During a major COVID-19 outbreak in our facility and community this past fall, not only were we utilizing costly travel nurses, but we were also heavily dependent upon the state emergency nurse pool to meet the needs of our residents. No recruitment incentives, even a substantial sign-on bonus. were bringing results. To be frank, the future looks grim in terms of attracting nurses to rural areas of North Dakota outside of the four major cities. It is truly a crisis which will only get worse unless we take strong and proactive steps to improve the situation.

Provisions in SB 2198 will enable the North Dakota Center for Nursing to provide a centralized, coordinated effort to enhance nurse staffing across the state. The Center will also increase awareness of the crisis that health care providers find themselves in. They will provide an increased focus on recruiting nursing students in the state to stay and work in North Dakota, and attracting nurses from out of state, both nationally and internationally. In addition, they will develop a centralized contract nursing pool, and promote positive workplace cultures to enhance nurse retention.

I am writing today in support of SB 2198, which would lay our framework to help some of our staffing shortages and staffing crises in North Dakota. This is the North Dakota State Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse

My name is Tessa Johnson, and I am a registered nurse in North Dakota. I am the Executive Director of CountryHouse residence in Dickinson North Dakota. CountryHouse Residence is licensed as a basic care and memory care home. I also serve as the ND Center for Nursing as well as the NDNA President.

In many areas in nursing and healthcare around the state, we have faced staffing shortages at one point in time. During the last year during the COVID-19 crisis many of us had faced staffing crisis and staffing shortages like no other. I am an administrator of a long-term care facility and with staff members out with COVID-19 it was very difficult to staff our building at times.

Prior to COVID-19 we were often able to use local staffing agencies to fill needs. During this time, the demand is so high that even our local staffing agencies had a hard time helping us fill some of our shifts. There are many times or administrators, or leadership teams had to work in caregiver situations putting our work behind to the back burner for our residents to get the care we need. All these situations lead to burn out, exhaustion and leaving the practice.

There have also been times in which we have used agency that enjoy working for our company and with our residents. To keep them we must pay a large amount of money to buy their contract out which is very difficult for small facilities. This clearinghouse would give us the opportunity to help match these health care workers with a job they love.

As a nursing home administrator, I am speaking in favor of this staffing clearinghouse to help us mitigate this staffing crisis is in staffing shortages. We would be able to have help filling certified nursing assistant roles, nursing roles and other jobs in our buildings. We also would have to pay less recruitment fees and out-of-state contracts.

In addition, I feel like integrating the North Dakota nursing graduates into this program would help keep new graduate nurses in our state which is always a goal of ours.

If facilities are going to pay a higher amount for staffing through agency staff it would make more sense to keep the money in our state and keep it locally to benefit the nurses and other healthcare entities throughout our state.

To Chairman Monson and Committee Members,

I am Suzie Kenner, the Director for the Devils Lake Tourism Division. I am writing to you today to ask your full support of the Senate approved version of 2018, including the addition of the seven-million dollars (\$7,000,000) for destination marketing.

I realize that seems like a large amount of money to give to a division, but we cannot sit by and just "wish" people to come to our state and spend money. We need to actually put work and effort into it, and that takes dollars. South Dakota's current tourism marketing budget is \$30.2 million per year, Minnesota's is \$32.2 million and Montana's budget sits at \$19.5 million. North Dakota needs to boost the budget for North Dakota Tourism and give them the opportunity to prove that marketing works, not just for the travel industry but for job creation and relocation and economic development as a whole and have the opportunity to at least be competitive with these other states.

Another note that I would like to touch on is fall and winter activities. If we were taught anything in the year 2020, it's that people have flocked to the outdoors. North Dakota also has this niche. We aren't just a Memorial Day through Labor Day destination as some may think. Abu Garcia, a national fishing company, just ranked Devils Lake 18th out of 100 for the best fishing destination. We have great ski areas in the state, as well as outdoor winter activities in our downtowns and fall hunting that far exceeds other states. Our small CVBs or Destination Marketing Associations need the help of the state tourism division to push us out on the national level. We are all funded on local hospitality and lodging tax dollars and with the cancellation of events, meetings, concerts and the like, our budgets and staff have also dwindled. The marketing dollars will provide cooperative opportunities that can help not only push the state, but our individual cities as well, and get our businesses and attractions back on track.

Tourism goes beyond inspiring travel. Coming out of the other side of this pandemic, North Dakota is geared to come out on top, but we need your help to properly fund tourism to not only keep the momentum going but stay in the race with the other states that are also competing for the same market share. To put it bluntly, we need the tools for our toolbox.

I urge you to give them the tools we need, please support SB2018 including the \$7 million in one-time funding.

Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Christy Dodd, and I am the Executive Director of CTB, formerly Center for Technology and Business. CTB is a standalone 501(c)(3) located in Bismarck providing services across all of North Dakota and houses the North Dakota Women's Business Center (NDWBC) with offices in Bismarck and Fargo.

NDWBC was formed in 1999 and is a shared partnership between the Small Business Administration's Office of Women's Business Ownership and the State of North Dakota; through the ND Department of Commerce and CTB. The federal dollars mandate a 1:1 cash match and State dollars are leveraged to help meet that requirement and fulfill duties under the ND Women's Business Development Office (century code section: 54-60-15) along with the guidelines in the federal notice of award from SBA.

In 2016, the NDWBC was selected as the Women's Business Center of Excellence award winner from the SBA among all 105 WBC across the US for providing innovative women focused training opportunities.

This national recognition and exceeding goals for more than three years in a row were essential to the NDWBC being awarded a second federal grant from SBA in April of 2018 to expand the NDWBC program.

The additional federal award is a five-year commitment that brings in an additional \$300,000.00 of new federal dollars to ND per biennium. Together both federal awards total \$600,000.00 (\$300,000 from the new grant) federal dollars per biennium which requires a 1:1 cash match. This year we also were able to leverage an additional \$840,000 in CARES Act Funding towards specific COVID related training for small businesses in the state. This funding created an OnDemand Library for small business owners on remote supervision, supply chain disruption, remote customer support, to name a few. Classes in the library are taught by small business owners with expertise in the topic and is free to all businesses across the state.

We ask for the state's continued support so that we can continue to secure the federal dollars awarded and fulfill the duties outlined to support and serve women entrepreneurs across North Dakota. We can leverage the funding provided through the partnership programs budget 3.74 times to benefit women owned business and leadership development across the state in general.

NDWBC provides 1:1 business technical assistance to women entrepreneurs to start, grow and expand businesses. We provide in-depth business training opportunities and events with a focus of reaching underserved women, programming that develops skillsets and confidence for women to step into private, public and/or elected leadership roles across North Dakota. We also act as the certifying entity for Women Owned Business Certification programs.



In respect of time today, I was not planning on reading the remainder of my written testimony. I look forward to a future opportunity where I can go into details if needed and of course will answer any questions that you might have about the documents we have provided in advance to you.

We do ask you for your continued support to bring the \$600,000 federal dollars into the state so we may continue our support of North Dakota women. Our programming is unique, and I would like to quickly tell you about two women who have entered our doors and now have businesses.

Because of our efforts through Hustle 2.0, mothers have re-connected with family and set goals for healthy re-entry. One woman, with a business degree, has made plans post incarceration to open a car lot and repair shop. Many of the offenses are drug related and when doing the math, one member of the class shared that she made \$4.10/hour selling drugs and making countless bad choices. Her plans post-incarceration includes goals of honest employment and earning a salary that uses her sales skills. For her five-year sentence, at \$14.25/hour she can expect to have lost \$148,000 based on the hours she claimed on the street. She looks forward to the day where she can maintain an honest living and not end up "property of the state."

Erin Sorensen, owner of Home Instead Senior Care of Hazen received business advising services through our Bismarck location. This is a franchised business that offers home health care for senior patients who do not need to be hospitalized but require more care than a volunteer or family caregiver can provide. After our meeting, Erin acquired access to capital through a \$10,000 grant from the state to grow her business.

I want to thank you again for your consideration and will take any questions at this time.



1-1 Business Advising Services:

NDWBC offers services and resources designed to help individuals in every phase of the business development and growth process. The one-on-one business advising, and technical training services are free and confidential, with an emphasis on resources specific to women entrepreneurs.

For the current biennium, our team provided one-on-one business advising to 423 individuals with new and existing businesses. That number is expected to grow past 500 by the end of this biennium. Of those clients, 39 officially registered a new business creating 48 new jobs so far.

Here are some examples of entrepreneurs who have received our services:

- Kelani Welstad, owner of Turbo Septic of Upham, received business advising services through our Bismarck location this past Spring. Just after our meeting, Kelani was able to gain access to capital to grow her operation. She also applied for and was granted Certified Woman-Owned business status at the state and federal levels.
- Dan Coleman (Yes, we help men, too!), a Fargo-area business advisee and one-time felon was able to launch his lawn care business after completing entrepreneurship training provided by the Fargo team. Dan was able to access the capital he needed, even with no credit, thanks to the preparedness and coaching of our staff.
- Balancing Goat Coffee Co. opened in Mandan in January 2020. They offer specialty coffee and food items along with a wellness studio. They employ 17 part-time employees. The NDWBC assisted them over a 3-year period in overall operations, financial planning, and marketing. The client worked with the NDWBC through one-on- one business advising for technical advice and attended several events the NDWBC hosted.
- Michaela, business advising client and a 2019 graduate of the NDWBC's Women's Leadership Program (WLP), was set to host her first-ever Limitless conference in Davenport. The event's purpose was to offer guidance and training for North Dakota's solopreneurs. Unfortunately, COVID-19 forced her to postpone but we consider this a success story because Michaela credits WLP and NDWBC staff for equipping her with the skills and courage necessary to take the leap.

The demand for individual business advising services for entrepreneurs, especially women, remains steady statewide.

Our Business and Technical Trainings

One of our focus areas is to develop and implement training across urban and rural ND based on community need and demand. NDWBC provides current, relevant training opportunities to entrepreneurs, small business owners, and business professionals across the state.

Rural and tribal communities can often be underserved in their access to advanced technical and business education trainings. We work with local community partners such as economic developers



and other stakeholders to bring relevant, in-demand, and non-duplicative training opportunities to these communities. In addition to rural communities, the NDWBC partners with the North Dakota Veterans Business Outreach Center (ND VBOC) and SBA to deliver services to military personnel and their family members at the Minot and Grand Forks Air Force Bases and other locations, as necessary.

NDWBC provides entrepreneurial training designed specifically for the residents at the Dakota Women's Correctional and Rehabilitation Center (DWCRC) located in New England. The training aims to equip women for a successful transition back into their communities and help them establish core business basics that include business planning, marketing their ideas, operations and gaining confidence to succeed.

The final training program I would like to highlight is a partnership the NDWBC has developed with Growing Small Towns in Oakes. Beginning in the summer of 2021 we will be implementing office hours onsite to assist the seven-county region with business advising, leadership development, and other training opportunities.

Certification of Women-Owned Businesses

NDWBC is the only entity authorized by the ND Department of Commerce to examine applications and qualify businesses for status as a Certified Woman-Owned Business (WOB) in the state. NDWBC is also the only entity in the state approved as site visitors for any of the third-party certifiers of the Woman-Owned Small Business federal certification program.

NDWBC provides ongoing assistance to 39 active certified ND WOBs. They represent industries including retail, construction, service, HVAC design, oilfield safety and manufacturing. They average 19 years in business, 18 employees, and their average net profit totals more than \$3.3 Million per year.

Certification and ongoing assistance prepare these businesses for better securing state, federal and/or private contracts from businesses looking to increase diversity in their supply chain.

National certification provides the opportunity for ND businesses to seek federal contracts with setasides for women-owned businesses. The U.S. government does not meet its goal of awarding 5% of federal contracts to women-owned businesses. If this annual goal were met, women-owned businesses would have access to marketplace opportunities worth at least \$4 billion each year.

As a recap, NDWBC proudly serves North Dakota entrepreneurs through various programs that positively impact the state's economy. I want to thank you and the State of ND for the continued support and urge you to approve the financial commitment that allows us to secure these federal dollars to continue to serve and support entrepreneurs throughout North Dakota.





About Host:

CTB formed in 1999, is a 501(c)(3) that hosts the North Dakota Women's Business Center (NDWBC) grant program. NDWBC is a shared partnership between Small Business Administration and the State of North Dakota (ND); through the ND Department of Commerce and fulfills the duties of the North Dakota Women's Business Development Office (Century Code section: 54-60-15).

In addition to the NDWBC, CTB houses the IDEA Center, a program that focuses on inspiring innovation, creating a vibrant entrepreneurial ecosystem, and supporting entrepreneurs through the Innovate ND program. Having both programs under one 501(c)(3) allow CTB to redirect operating dollars from both programs and put those dollars toward delivering client services and streamline offerings for entrepreneurs across the state of North Dakota.

CTB collaborates with other resource partners to serve urban and rural communities across the state by providing non-duplicative and impactful trainings for small business owners and their teams to increase revenue, develop skillsets, and adapt their processes to meet the workforce challenges by embracing remote workers and technology.

In 2016, NDWBC was selected as the Women's Business Center of Excellence winner from the Small Business Administration for providing innovative and in-demand training opportunities. NDWBC was chosen 1/105 centers in the United States. This national recognition for exceeding its goals for more than three years in a row was essential to NDWBC receiving a second federal grant from the Small Business Administration in 2018, which expanded NDWBC programming to two offices in ND. The additional federal award is a 4.5-year grant, totaling \$675,000.00 federal dollars, that mandates a 1:1 non-federal match.





How NDWBC is Funded:


Timeline of events leading to the initial development of the NDWBC:

- October 25, 1988, the U.S. Congress passed, and President Ronald Reagan signed into law, HR 5050-The Women's Business Ownership Act;
- The U.S. Small Business Administration created the Office of Women's Business Ownership office which administers the Women's Business Center grant;
- North Dakota established a Women's Business Center/Development Office in 1999 and state dollars were committed and leveraged to fulfill the requirement of the 1:1 cash match and to utilize the federal funding for North Dakota entrepreneurs.

CTB has a staff of 11 FTEs. Eight FTEs are focused on NDWBC programming, serving the entire state of North Dakota. CTB's annual operating budget for NDWBC is approximately \$680,000.00 per year, which totals to \$1,360,000.00 for the biennium. Roughly, 84% of the annual budget goes directly into delivering services to clients. The remaining 18% of the annual budget covers operations and grant management expenses.

CTB has multiple sources of funding to support its mission and programming duties. CTB leverages federal and state dollars to receive grants from the Bush Foundation, Otto Bremer Foundation, and private partnership commitments. These grants are specific to support the programming needs for NDWBC across the state. Program income is generated through training opportunities and programming throughout the year for program sustainability.

In addition, thousands of dollars via in-kind contributions from resource partners across the state help NDWBC to carry out its programs. In-kind contributions range from donated training space in rural communities to training facilitation by expert volunteers.



NDWBC's Mission:

To enhance ND's economic future by providing one-on-one business technical assistance to women entrepreneurs to start and grow businesses, provide in-depth business training opportunities with a focus on reaching underserved women, and programming that develops skillsets for women to step into private and/or public leadership roles across North Dakota.


NDWBC collaborates with resource partners and listens to the needs of rural and urban communities to develop programming to address those specific needs.

Key Programs of the NDWBC Grant:



A. Entrepreneurial Services

NDWBC's services and resources are designed to help individuals in every phase of business development and stage of growth.

- One-on-one business advisings and technical services are free and confidential.
 NDWBC emphasizes and promotes resources specific to women entrepreneurs and inventors seeking prototyping and manufacturing assistance.
- Business incubation office space and community room rentals make NDWBC a hub
 of entrepreneurial support and an ideal location for local organizations to gather for
 meetups and trainings.
- North Dakota ranks in the 5 lowest states for the combined economic clout of the number, employment, and revenues of women-owned firms. (source American Express Open: The State of Women-Owned Businesses, 2019)
- In North Dakota from 2007 to 2018, woman-owned firms increased by 32.5%, employment by woman-owned firms grew by 47%, revenues increased by 115.9% (source American Express Open: The State of Women-Owned Businesses, 2018).
- The high demand for one-on-one advisings resulted in an average 3-week wait period in 2019.
- In the current biennium, NDWBC provided one-on-one business advisings to 423 individuals. That number is projected to reach 500+ by the end of this biennium. Of those advisings, 38 started their businesses, supporting 289 jobs.

- In comparison to previous years, 233 individuals received business counseling services during the 2017-2019 biennium, and 191 in the 2015-2017 biennium.
- Of NDWBC clients, 94% saw growth in their business since attending a business advising or training service.

B. Business Development and Technology Trainings

NDWBC provides relevant trainings in technology and business development made for entrepreneurs and small business employees across the state. NDWBC emphasizes trainings in rural communities and communities with urgent and high-ranking needs.

- As the size of woman-owned businesses continues to grow in North Dakota, the
 need and demand for advanced trainings for business owners and their employees
 has increased greatly. In the current biennium, NDWBC trained 2,467 individuals,
 including 615 who participated in COVID specific training around EIDLE and PPP
 loans. In total, NDWBC completed outreach to 21,968 individuals. The need rose for
 entrepreneurs, and NDWBC met that need with the ability to market its services with
 increased staff.
- Rural communities are often under-served with limited access to technology and business training opportunities. During the last biennium, NDWBC worked with local partners and stakeholders to bring relevant, in-demand and non-duplicative training opportunities to communities including Glen Ullin, Dickinson, Williston, Hazen, Minot, Jamestown, Oakes, Valley City, Devil's Lake, Hankinson, Cayuga, Wahpeton, and others. After attending training events, entrepreneurs created business plans with financial projections to obtain start-up capital through lenders. Attendees gained practical knowledge in social media marketing and strategy, learning the value of a clean, simple website, NDWBC coached many through the uncertainties of coronavirus and helped business owners to pivot, keeping their business healthy and moving forward. With many more people working remotely, NDWBC is expanding its outreach through virtual trainings. NDWBC takes great pride in the fact that after advisings and trainings, entrepreneurs and professionals know they have an ally, a partner, and someone to connect with when they need encouragement or get stuck. Entrepreneurship can be a lonely road. Sometimes the most impactful data is qualitative, not quantitative.
- NDWBC collaborates with organizations promoting STEM and learning technology classes to girls and women. Providing exposure in a safe learning environment creates curiosity, builds confidence, and develops essential STEM skills.
- NDWBC provides educational training designed specifically for the residents at the Dakota Women's Correctional and Rehabilitation Center (DWCRC) located in New England. The training equips women for a successful transition into the community and equips the women with business basics, which include writing a business plan, best marketing practices, business operations, resetting the entrepreneurial mindset, and building the confidence to succeed.
- NDWBC facilitates the annual Finance Resource Tour educating loan officers, economic developers, and business development centers on financing programs in North Dakota. The tour is a collaboration with the USDA, ND Department of Commerce, Bank of North Dakota, and SBA. In 2019, the tour served approximately 90 attendees across Minot, Bismarck, Fargo, and Grand Forks. NDWBC partners with the SBA District Office to host Boots to Business at the Minot and Grand Forks Air Force Bases and ReBoot (entrepreneurial trainings for the ND National Guard in Bismarck, Fargo, and Dickinson each quarter. Military personnel and their spouses attend these trainings that cover the opportunities and challenges of transferring military skills into entrepreneurism, sustainable business concepts, competitive analysis, small business marketing, the economics of small business, legal considerations, business financing, business plan development, and the statewide resources available to entrepreneurs and veterans launching their business ideas. In the current biennium, NDWBC trained over 125 military personnel who were preparing to retire from service.

 NDWBC is a critical force that helps build a strong entrepreneurial ecosystem in local communities. It fosters healthier relationships among resource partners, provides staffing resources, and contributes to volunteer-driven, community-based events that encourage growth such as 1 Million Cups Bismarck-Mandan, the Mandan Pitch Challenge, and TEDxBismarck.



C. Women's Business Summit

NDWBC hosts the annual Women's Business Summit every October/November, coinciding with National Women's Small Business Month. The Summit attracts around 200 participants each year and includes top-notch speakers and breakout sessions training individuals from across the state. Attendees network and develop essential business skills. NDWBC honors 2 women in business with the coveted Woman of Impact and Female Entrepreneur of the Year awards during the awards luncheon.

- By bringing women together, the summit offers a unique and unmatched opportunity for women to make valuable business connections, learn advanced skills for business success through a full day of trainings, and to access a variety of resources in one location.

D. Women's Leadership Program

NDWBC's Women's Leadership Program (WLP) is a unique, six-month training dedicated to advancing the personal, professional, community, and health leadership skills for women of all ages. WLP's goal is increasing participants' interest in advanced leadership positions, building business leaders, and encouraging entrepreneurship. WLP is held in two hub communities and offers a one-day mini WLP session in rural and tribal communities. WLP has graduated 448 women from the six-month program and the one-day mini sessions. It has proven to be an environment in which women gain the skills and confidence to step into new leadership and gain traction toward closing the gender gap of women in leadership roles.

Of the graduates, many move into managerial roles, run successful campaigns for local and state elections, and step up to serve on boards.

 Within six months of graduation, NDWBC sees an increase in interest in the following categories:

 Data from the 2017 report from the American Association of University Women ranks ND #26 in pay equality, with women making just 79% of the wages of men. WLP

- Nationally women hold 52% of jobs in management, professional and related occupations yet only 14.6% of executive positions and 16.9% of board seats. (https://www.americanprogress.org/issues/women/reports/2014/03/07/85457/fact-sheet-the-womens-leadership-gap/). The gender gap increases dramatically from mid-management to top management. WLP participants undergo the crucial training that prepares them for succeeding in these advanced roles, including management and board leadership.
- Participants of the six-month program take on a philanthropic project and receive \$100 in seed money. Since the beginning of the program, WLP has raised \$408,724.41 of cash and in-kind donations for local community organizations. This project activates their leadership skills, shows participants that they have the power to make a difference in their communities, and builds their confidence for greater leaps in the future.

E. Career Discovery- Entrepreneurship Essentials

NDWBC partners with the University of Mary, NDSU Female Business Leaders Club, Williston Chamber, Mandan HS FBLA Club, and programs at Century HS in Bismarck for entrepreneurship classes and training.



F. Woman-Owned Business Certification: State and Federal

NDWBC is the only entity authorized by the North Dakota Department of Commerce to examines\ applications and qualify businesses for the elite status as a Certified Woman-Owned Business in North Dakota. NDWBC also certifies Federal Woman-Owned Small Businesses for the Women's Business Enterprise National Council and the National Women Business Owners Corporation.

- This biennium, NDWBC approved or renewed 77 ND Woman-Owned Business certifications, preparing these businesses for better securing federal and private contracts
- The status of a Woman-Owned Business Certification provides unique opportunities for attaining and securing contracts from businesses looking to increase diversity in their supply chain.
- The national certification provides ND woman-owned businesses the opportunity to go after large, federal contracts set aside for women-owned businesses, as the U.S. government has the goal of allocating 5% of its contracts to woman-owned small businesses. In 2017, this benchmark was reached for the first time in US history. There are 36 industry categories set aside solely for federally certified woman-owned businesses to compete for contracts and sole-source awards, dramatically expanding the opportunities for women-owned businesses and paving the way for new jobs.

Summary:

Since 1999, NDWBC has served approximately 44,824 individuals across North Dakota. Its programming reach has drastically increased in the last year to increased demand, marketing abilities, and recognition as a go-to trainer and community collaborator. NDWBC works closely with its resource partners across the state and refers clients to its resource partners for their areas of expert service.

State dollars are used to serve existing and aspiring entrepreneurs across North Dakota with a special focus to train and equip its rural communities. To serve effectively, NDWBC continued to adapt its strategies and roll with the changes in the business environment and its federal regulations. This biennium, NDWBC has offered a dramatically increased number of one-on-one business advising sessions. These advisings, even with the help of virtual conferences and video chat capabilities, saw a wait time of 2-3 weeks due to increased demand for assistance through COVID and limited resources.

In addition to a dramatic increase of business and technical advisings, NDWBC experienced changes in tracking clients. First, the definition of "clients served" was amended. The "trained" numbers reflect only "unique clients" (who may have attended 5 training sessions) instead of counting attendees at each training. This change is evident when one compares the number of individuals trained compared to the previous years of training.

This biennium marks the first time that NDWBC tracked "outreach" to individuals attending training sessions where SBA 641 forms were not filled out. These numbers reflect attendees of in-person and virtual trainings sessions and include individuals who attend multiple training sessions.

Continued state funding will allow NDWBC to maximize the reach of its key programs. State funding will allow NDWBC to continue providing the needed assistance to meet the increased demand across rural and urban ND and allow NDWBC to continue accessing \$600,000.00 federal from the Small Business Administration that supports the ND Women's Business

Development Office. Thank you for the continued support and the State's commitment provide resources that improve the lives and inspires success for women and entrepreneurs across North Dakota.

My name is Tom Falck, and I am a member of the Grand Forks County Board of Commissioners; I also oversee the Grand Sky Portfolio. I am writing you today in support of SB2018, specifically the Enhanced Use Lease grant line item.

On February 6, 2015, Grand Forks County executed a historic, 50-year Enhanced Use Lease with the United States Air Force, creating the nation's first commercial testing and training center devoted to the support and development of the Unmanned Aircraft Systems industry. Grand Sky has since put North Dakota on the map in the UAS sector. Grand Sky has become the model EUL for other industry to follow. The USAF cites Grand Sky as its most successful, and innovative EUL.

Without the State's investments, Grand Sky would not exist. Thanks to the State's investments, necessary infrastructure has been made available to host the two leading UAS companies in Northrop Grumman Corporation and General Atomics.

Continued investments into Grand Sky provides hundreds of jobs in North Dakota – 175 jobs at Grand Sky alone. It also means investments into North Dakota from the private sector, such as private facilities, jobs, internships, and capital assets.

Investments into Grand Sky have strengthened the Grand Forks regions, and the State's partnership with Grand Forks Air Force Base. Grand Forks County is leading the way in Public-Public-Private Partnerships that positively impact both the County and the Air Force.

Finally, investments into Grand Sky offer economic benefits to North Dakota but also create valuable protection if the base were to experience another round of base realignments and closures.

My name is Sheri Grossman, and I am the CEO for the Bismarck-Mandan Convention & Visitors Bureau (CVB).

Sufficient funding for the ND Tourism Division is more important than ever. The pandemic has brought so much devastation to the tourism and hospitality industry.

As the third largest contributor to North Dakota's economy, tourism is a proven revenue generator in all 53 counties. Visitors come to North Dakota for a variety of reasons: to shop, fish, hunt, golf, play or watch a sport, attend an event or convention; the list goes on and on. Whatever the reason, the impact is significant.

All indicators are showing that people want to start traveling again. They will go somewhere; we need to have the funding to inspire them to choose North Dakota. If not, we are letting other states derive the benefits of the economic impact that could benefit our state.

If we have learned anything from this pandemic, it is how much the tourism industry contributes to the economic welfare of our communities in North Dakota. In 2020, Bismarck-Mandan lost over 235 multi-day meetings and events. That is over 168,000 attendees and over \$14.9 million in lost direct expenditures. The lodging tax revenue, which is our major funding source, is down 38%.

The Bismarck-Mandan CVB, like most communities, relies on the Tourism Division to market to leisure travelers. We partner with Tourism on cooperative efforts, making it more affordable for all of us. In addition, by having the Tourism Division do most of the marketing for leisure travelers, we can use more of our CVB marketing dollars to bring in larger conventions and events—allowing all of us to bring in the greatest number of out-of-state visitors and dollars to help stimulate our North Dakota economy. This partnership is more vital than ever.

If you have watched TV these past several months, it is hard to miss the wealth of advertising that we are seeing from South Dakota Tourism. South Dakota Tourism has always had a much larger budget than North Dakota. However, this additional funding influx is of great concern.

It is critical that our Tourism Division has adequate funding to compete with neighboring states. North Dakota cannot continue to let our neighbors capture these visitors and risk losing the economic impact that they could bring to North Dakota. It is imperative to attract this business to fill our hotels, restaurants, gas stations and stores. These businesses suffered so much in 2020.

I hope you will make the commitment to invest our state's resources in the ND Tourism Division a priority. All of North Dakota will reap the benefits.

Dear Rep. Monson and Members of the Committee:

I'm writing in support of SB 2018, and specifically in support of the addition of seven-million dollars (\$7,000,000) to the Tourism Division for destination marketing.

I understand from the Committee's first overview of this measure that you all have some concerns about what seems like a significant increase in that marketing budget. Adding this amount to the base Tourism budget would bring the spending to promote the state across all platforms to about \$8,500,000 per year. Yes, that's an increase of about 70%, but it still leaves North Dakota well below the typical tourism spending of other states, including its closest neighbors. I have no concerns, whatsoever, about the Tourism Division Marketing Team's ability to turn that money into thousands of more visits to the state.

Effective marketing works, so—for me—it comes down to a question of whether you want to raise the profile of your state and attract more visitors and their money, or not. If you're happy with the status quo and think our cities and attractions should be happy with the visitation they've been getting, then don't spend any more money on it. It's your call, you hold the purse strings, and we all understand that. On the other hand, if you'd like your Marketing Team to be able to afford to get the word out, and invite more people to your beautiful state, you should seriously consider spending enough money to make that happen. We can't sit on our couches in Bismarck, or Medora, or Fargo, or Minot and whisper "gee, I wish more people would visit our state" and expect them to come. You have to invite them and inform them of all the state has to offer.

And again, as we've been telling you for years, marketing the state for tourism also has a huge impact on economic development and overall image, so please consider that aspect of this proposed increase, as well.

Imagine UAVs carrying precious vaccines or necessary medical supplies to rural hospitals in hours not days; conducting pipeline inspections via drone at a fraction of the time and expense needed currently, thus increasing safety and freeing up funds for further enhancements; or helping a small manufacturer access necessary parts to keeps its machines running and employees on the job.

Investments in the UAS network today will have impact beyond our current generation and imagination. As an elected official you have the difficult job of balancing fiscal responsibility with an overwhelming number of near-term budget needs. However, a Legacy fund allocation to VANTIS does not compete with those near term needs – in fact it offers an opportunity to make a prudent investment that will leverage the already robust UAS military and civil infrastructure that will grow jobs in the state and assist the military in solving the complex problem of flying drones while also complying with National Airspace requirements.

This investment will ultimately help North Dakota become a nationwide leader in using drones. It will also assist in all aspects of oil production and delivery and will help insure America is not dependent on foreign oil. Please know that Collins is standing with you to develop and build the VANTIS network, and is looking forward to a future for America that grows well beyond our current vision for a BVLOS network.

Testimony 67th Legislative Assembly House Appropriations Education and Environment Division Senate Bill 2018 March 11, 2021

Chairman Monson and members of the Education and Environment Division, thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of SB2018. My name is Jolene Garty, and I am the Director of Student Services at the South East Education Cooperative (SEEC) and I oversee North Dakota Reading Corps.


I am testifying in support of 2018 to provide background information on the \$200,000 allocation in Section 1, line 20 under "grants". That funding would be administered as a grant for matching funds to provide literacy intervention services through ND Reading Corps, which is an AmeriCorps program.

This is a renewal of the legislation passed in 2019 which also provided \$200,000 to expand Reading Corps into new schools in the state. In this current legislative session SB2219 was introduced as a stand-alone bill. Since the grant is administered through Commerce's Work Force Division, Senate Appropriations decided to include the funding in this bill and 2219 was subsequently killed in the Senate.

ND Reading Corps is an intervention program that partners with North Dakota school districts to deliver reading services during the school day. It combines the power of national service through AmeriCorps with the Science of Reading to help struggling readers transform into confident and capable students.

Why We Need Reading Corps

Research tells us that students who are reading proficiently by 3rd grade are 4 times more likely to graduate from high school. The 2018-19 NDSA English Language Arts (ELA) Achievement data shows that 52% of 3rd graders are not proficient in reading.



Third grade also marks the transition from "learning to read" to "reading to learn". After 3rd grade, students who are behind in reading begin to fall behind in other subjects. Reading Corps is a cost-effective way to close the literacy gap in North Dakota to help achieve the State's Strategic Vision Framework goal of increasing the number of 3rd graders reading proficiently.

Reading Corps works with students who score below the 49th percentile in proficiency on district reading assessments. They are often referred to as the "bubble kids". They are at-risk for reading failure, but schools do not typically have capacity to work one on one with these students. Instead, schools need to focus their resources on students who are much further behind. This waiting period widens the gap, and it takes more intensive and expensive intervention to get these students to proficiency. The goal of Reading Corps is to catch those students before they are that far behind. By partnering with Reading Corps, the district can focus its staff and resources on students who have more intensive needs.

To implement the program, SEEC and the Central Regional Education Association (CREA) work in partnership with school districts to serve students who qualify during the school day. We recruit individuals from the community to commit to a year of service as a tutor through AmeriCorps, which is known as the domestic version of the Peace Corps. Reading Corps trains tutors to deliver evidence-based literacy interventions to students in Kindergarten through 3rd grade. Our tutors come from all walks of life and many are parents, retirees, or college students. Some have experience working in education and others do not. Tutors are placed in an elementary building part-time to work one-on-one with students 20 minutes a day, 5 days a week. In exchange for their service, they earn a stipend of \$8,200 or \$11,000 each year plus an education award of up to \$3,000 to use towards student loans or future tuition expenses. Tutors who are over 55 can transfer the award to a child or grandchild for those purposes.

The success of Reading Corps is based on using strategies that are aligned to how the brain learns to read, which is known as the Science of Reading. Tutors assess students to identify which reading skills each individual student needs help with. Tutors meet with students for 20 minutes a day, 5 days a week, one-on-one to deliver evidence-based literacy interventions. "Interventions" means scripted practice which targets specific reading skills. Reading Corps helps students with phoneme (sound) blending, decoding, building fluency, comprehension, and expression. Student progress is monitored weekly to track growth and provide data for decision-making. Students "graduate" from the program on a rolling basis when they demonstrate that they have acquired the literacy skills required to "catch up" with their grade-level peers. A new student is then placed in that spot to receive services.

Reading Corps is also implemented as a full model which includes 5 days of training and a multi-layer coaching system which includes an on-site Internal Coach, who is a district employee, and an REA Master Coach. Both coaches meet with the tutor monthly to observe tutoring sessions using a fidelity checklist and to review student progress data.

Reading Corps programs are now in 13 other states and Washington D.C. Minnesota currently invests \$7.95 million of state funding annually, serving 25,000 students.

Proven Results

One of the benefits of Reading Corps is that we know that it works. During the 2019-20 school year, 79% or 499 out of 632 students served in 11 school districts had a weekly growth rate above their grade level target; meaning they made more than a years' worth of growth within a year's time to close the gap. This growth occurred even though the in-person school year and tutoring were cut short.

Reading Corps has also undergone multiple studies nationally, including a large randomized-control trial and an impact evaluation completed with West Fargo Public Schools in 2018-19. That study used a matched-comparison analysis of 99 students receiving Reading Corps service and 99 students with similar demographics (race, gender, free or reduced lunch status). Reading Corps students received an average of 65 minutes of support for 20 weeks. The evaluation found that all grade levels exceed the reading scores of the comparison group. Most notably, second and third grade students assigned to Reading Corps outperformed their peers by 68 points on STAR Reading, a remarkable feat equivalent to roughly 18 additional weeks of typical reading instruction.

Cost Savings

Through our partnership with AmeriCorps, we can leverage almost \$500,000 in federal funding which comes to us through the North Dakota Department of Commerce. With the combination of grants and a low fee from school districts, we can deliver effective intervention services for around \$1,100 per student. This is a significantly lower price per student than other programs. For example, Reading Recovery, a well-known program which only serves first graders and does not align to the Science of Reading costs over \$5,000 per student.

AmeriCorps has restrictions on the use of federal dollars for the required matching funds which means that school districts are limited in using CARES or ESSER to pay their cost share to participate in the program.

Support SB2219

With continued state funding, Reading Corps can serve an additional 175 students who are not receiving service. We can help support students during this time of COVID learning loss and to help increase the number of 3rd graders reading proficiently in ND. Under the 2219 testimony, you will find additional testimony in support of the program from principals and parents.

Executive Budget Recommendation

Section 4 would provide an exemption for unexpended 2017-19 biennium funds continued into the 2019-21 biennium for the beyond visual line of sight UAS program to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The 2019 Legislative Assembly provided a \$28 million supplemental appropriation from the general fund for this purpose for the 2017-19 biennium.





2021 ENHANCED USE LEASE REQUEST

The current request, passed by the North Dakota Senate, is for **\$7M** in new funding to support growth of utilities and infrastructure at the park and **\$3M** of carryover from the **2019-2021** biennium. Grand Sky requested the \$7M to support accelerated growth in response to the growth of the UAS market nationally and the expected rapid growth of the North Dakota UAS market that will see quicker growth than the national average with the roll-out of the Vantis statewide BVLOS network.

Grand Sky is self-sufficient with respect to its operations. All past and future State investments are used for the development of new utilities and infrastructure at the park that benefit all tenants. The Enhanced Use Lease grant is funding that will support new investment in utilities and infrastructure that includes; security, roads, electric, sanitary sewer, natural gas, water, fire suppression (hydrant system), storm water and wetlands, airfield apron concrete repair, taxiway lights, taxiway paving, airfield striping and painting, flight support facilities, firefighting equipment, communications (fiber optics), software and licenses for flight operations support, fencing/gates, and common area parking. No funds will be used to subsidize Grand Sky operations with the exception of investment in new roads, utilities, and infrastructure as referenced above.

As mentioned above, Grand Sky is self-sufficient with respect to its ongoing day-to-day operations. However, funding for utilities and infrastructure is needed to continue to grow the park. At the outset, Total utility investment required for the entire park is estimated at \$41M. If approved, the current \$7M request would bring total infrastructure investment to \$28.5M.

THE NEED:

- The tenant base at Grand Sky is growing as is the need for more space.
- Grand Sky will be developing "Phase 2" of the park which includes additional security and
 communications requirements, along with the pre-development of expansion of the flight
 operations aprons to promote the possibility of a crosswind runway along with expanded apron
 space to encourage more tenants to establish operations at the park. Simply put, the park needs to
 grow its utility and infrastructure footprint to support growth from existing tenants and new
 tenants.
- We request permission to use some portion, up to \$2M, for engineering, planning, and similar services in support of the development of new utilities and infrastructure. No funds will be used in support of tenant facilities.

THE HISTORY

- To date the state has invested \$21.5M in utilities and infrastructure at the park.
- The Enhanced Use Lease Grant (Grand Sky) which has been leveraged with \$68.75M in private sector investment in the form of new office buildings, hangars, and other support facilities completed in 2020.
- The private sector has invested \$3.19 for every \$1 the state has invested.

• Since 2015, over \$90M in privately funded construction has been completed at Grand Sky yielding a ratio of \$4.18 (privately funded) to \$1 (State funds).

JOBS CREATED

Annual employment and wage impacts from Grand Sky's ongoing operations (Grand Sky and tenant operations) include the following:

- Grand Sky and its tenants employ 187 people annually. Those 187 jobs generate almost \$17M in annual wages with an average salary of \$90,586.05 per year. (Note: Average Salary derived by dividing Total Reported Salary of \$16,966,768.00 by 187.3 reported jobs.)
- Grand Sky and its tenants create an Indirect economic impact of \$7,282,724 in wages from 143.4 jobs. (Note: Based on IMPLAN estimates)
- Grand Sky and its tenants create an Induced economic impact of \$4,935,297 in wages from 120.0 jobs. (Note: Based on IMPLAN estimates)
- Total ANNUAL Grand Sky economic impact, including Direct, Indirect and Induced economic impacts from employment is \$29.18M over 450.7 jobs. (SOURCE: Project Technical Memorandum from Jeffrey Donohoe Associates, LLC regarding "Grand Sky Economic Impact Evaluation" dated 2/26/21)

BENEFITS TO THE STATE

- Currently, Grand Sky generates \$1,309,000 per year in state and local taxes from the following four sources: Employee Compensation, Tax on Production and Imports, Households, Corporations.

I am writing to you in support of Governor Burgum's recent budget request of \$27M for Fiscal Year 2021-2023 to fund Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) activities in the State of North Dakota. L3Harris Technologies has been a mission partner with the State and commercial UAS entities since 2015. Our joint research and development efforts with the University of North Dakota (UND) Research Institute for Autonomous Systems have led to advancements and innovation in providing aviation-grade, ground-based surveillance and Detect-and-Avoid capabilities. These safety-critical technologies will ensure the proper integration of UAS into the National Airspace System in accordance with the Federal Aviation Administration's UAS Concept of Operations.

We are especially encouraged by the Governor's specific request to direct \$20M of Legacy Fund earnings to support continued development of the North Dakota statewide beyond-visual-line-of-sight UAS network. Since the advent of modern UAS, North Dakota has been the clear leader in adapting and integrating these platforms into every facet of American life. From supporting early applications in defense with the Air Force's Predator and Global Hawk programs, to standing up the Northern Plains UAS Test Site and supporting the Grand Sky Business Park, North Dakota has created the world's first UAS ecosystem that serves as a model across the United States. The development of the Vantis network is the latest step in maintaining that leadership by demonstrating operational, political, and financial vision in the integration of UAS. To the Honorable Chairman Delzer, Chairman Monson, and Committee,

As the Director of TrainND Northwest it is my privilege to share our vision for our unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) program and express my support for appropriated funding through the Commerce Budget (SB 2018). While TrainND Northwest's UAS program is new and developing, we see great potential in the workforce training that we could potentially provide to the state.

To take full advantage of the impressive investment the state is making in the Vantis BVLOS (Beyond Visual Line of Site) network workforce training will be key. The applications of UAS for the industries of ND are near endless. The addition of the Vantis BVLOS network creates an opportunity for industry to gain efficiencies in multiple ways. To take advantage of this opportunity industry, communities, and the youth of North Dakota will need to be educated as to what those possibilities are and trained on how to safely and efficiently operate UAS. TrainND Northwest's vision is to provide this training and education to the people of North Dakota. A seamless workforce training program in UAS will allow the state to reap the full benefit of its investment in Vantis.

This grant would allow TrainND Northwest to develop and administer a rounded UAS training curriculum that meets the needs of LOS and BVLOS UAS operations as outlined below:

- UAS Careers exploration/community education
- Part 107 certification preparation (federal commercial license to operate an UAS)
- UAS Safety
- Hands on Flight training Crawl-Walk-Run approach
 - Simulation
 - Group 1 UAS (small)
 - Group 2 UAS (medium)
 - Medium Altitude Long Endurance (MALE) UAS
- Airframe and Powerplant (A&P) Mechanics
- BVLOS
 - Visual observer (visually observes flight of drone at checkpoints during mission)
 - Sensor operator (ensures BVLOS network is operating for UAS during mission)
 - Pilot & command (operators of UAS controls and legally responsible for operation of UAS)
 - Mission commander (oversees UAS mission and planning)
- Data Collection and Interpretation
- Industry specific use training
 - Oil and Gas
 - Agriculture
 - Utilities and Wind Energy
 - Public/emergency services



To make this vision a reality we are asking for a <u>one-time</u> appropriation of \$1 million requiring, and contingent on receiving, a 1:1 match (available from any-and-all sources including O & G, Ag, Utilities, city, county, and WSC). Appropriations will be leveraged to continue building a UAS training program that meets the stated vision utilizing the draft budget seen below:

- 40% UAS and sensors
- 20% UAS curriculum development/administration
- 10% UAS simulators
- 17% UAS operations equipment
- 7% UAS ground stations
- 6% in- and out-of-state marketing

TrainND Northwest is confident that this appropriated funding will allow us to develop a UAS training program that will provide the state with a well-trained UAS workforce that is ready to make use of the Vantis network allowing us to increase efficiencies and wealth for industry and the great citizens of North Dakota.



Projected Impact on the ND UAS Workforce

We are currently planning our budget for this program based on the idea that the core curriculum for BVLOS will take students 3 weeks to complete. Much of this curriculum will be available via distance learning models both asynchronous and opportunities for synchronous "check-ins" with certified instructors. Once the "theory" portion of the curriculum is completed students will work in cohorts of 5 students/instructor to complete hands-on flight instruction that builds from simulation to in flight training and industry specific uses.

Under this model using the current instructors available and the budgeted for UAS and related equipment, we would conservatively be able to train 10 students every 2 weeks. We feel confident in our ability to scale this number up or down as needed. This equates to the ability to train a conservative total of 250 students each year. Currently, industry estimates a required 3-4 people trained (not all pilot) per UAS on the Vantis Network. It is plain to see that there will be a need for workforce training as the Vantis network matures and gains momentum with industry.

Early projections are that we will be able to provide this training at an affordable rate of \$5-6 thousand dollars/student.





We are excited and prepared to be a key part of the FUTURE for UAS in ND!

North Dakota will need UAS centered workforce training in order to take full advantage of the investment it is making in Vantis. TrainND Northwest is ready and waiting to provide this key training to the state and beyond!

Chairman Monson and members of the Committee. My name is Dave Kleppe, Program Manager of the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center.

The Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) program is hosted by the University of North Dakota's Center for Business Engagement and Development (led by Tiffany Ford) within the Nistler College of Business and Public Administration.

Federal program funding is provided by the Department of Defense's Defense Logistics Agency (DLA) with match funding provided by the North Dakota Department of Commerce (DOC).

The program was established in 1985 to expand the number of businesses capable of participating in government contracts. It is administered by DLA's Small Business Programs in cooperation with the states, local governments, and nonprofit organizations. Under the program, PTACs help businesses pursue and perform in contract awards with the Department of Defense, other federal agencies, state and local governments, and also subcontracting with government prime contractors.

Most of the assistance the PTACs provide is free. PTAC support to businesses includes:

- Assisting with state and federal registrations in procurement systems such as the federal System for Award Management (SAM)
- Creation of a bidmatch search profile unique to each business to help identify contracting and subcontracting opportunities
- Providing training on federal and state contracting and cybersecurity

Conducting solicitation reviews and advice on preparing bid proposals

PTACs have a local presence in all 50 states. The North Dakota PTAC currently operates with two full-time positions: a PTAC Advisor located in Fargo and a Program Manager located in the Entrepreneur Center at the Bank of North Dakota.

The federal PTAC program provides 60% federal funding with a 40% match requirement. For the past several years the required state match has been provided by the Department of Commerce from within their discretionary funds line. Without the required state match funds, the ND PTAC program will cease to exist. While the amount of the state's investment is small, the economic impact of this program is not. During state fiscal years 2019 and 2020, the ND PTAC assisted 373 small and large North Dakota businesses. Many of them have been successful in the government marketplace and have been awarded more than \$169 million in government contracts, meaning expansion and diversification of revenue streams, creating jobs in our state, and positively impacting our communities. Program return-on-investment is \$860 in contracts for every state dollar invested.

We have a very good working relationship with DOC. Without the matching funds DOC provides, there would be no North Dakota PTAC program to assist our businesses in navigating the complex path involved with government contracting. Thank you Mr. Chairman and committee members for your time and for your support of the North Dakota PTAC.

Having worked for years in the UAS industry, it is clear to me that the need for UAS training in North Dakota is essential to the continued development of, and leadership position with, UAS in North Dakota. The UAS program at Williston State College and TrainND Northwest is new, but shows as much tremendous promise as any new UAS initiative organized in the state of North Dakota. Through direct collaboration with the organizations, I detect a vision at their program that would certainly drive value for North Dakota in some of the most important sectors of the state's economy, namely UAS, agriculture, and energy. Pilots produced by TrainND would be in a perfect position to take advantage of the new statewide beyond-visual-line-of-sight (BVLOS) UAS network being constructed in the western side of North Dakota by the Northern Plains UAS Test Site's (NPUASTS) Vantis. This is also an opportune time to engage in such work due to the coincidentally simultaneous success North Dakota now enjoys as a member of the FAA's new Beyond program.

Such an appropriation, to my knowledge would be used to purchase equipment and administer the UAS program. I would suggest this appropriation during this legislative session in order to lay the groundwork to create workforce as soon as possible to take full advantage of Vantis.

Similarly to Vantis, I believe this would keep North Dakota the center of UAS development and operations, while also attracting companies to do UAS business in North Dakota and making the lives of North Dakotans better through advances in UAS in operations.

My understanding is that this would be a one-time appropriation, with lasting, and significant, value for North Dakota. To jump start this program will be to get a leg-up on other states without gold standard training to be adopted in such industries as oil and gas.

SENATE BILL NO. 2018

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

I am Nicholas Flom, Executive Director of the Northern Plains Unmanned Aircraft Systems Test Site (NPUASTS). I have been the Executive Director since November of 2016 and have been a part of the Test Site since early 2014. I am testifying today in support of the Governor's funding request for Vantis, the state's unmanned aircraft system (UAS) beyond visual line of sight (BVLOS) network, under the Department of Commerce.

The Governor's budget request was for \$20,000,000 in new funding, and currently passed by the North Dakota Senate, is for \$19,000,000 in new funding to support the expansion of Vantis and carryover authority from the 2019-2021 biennium. The 2021-2023 additional funding would allow us to maintain the program office, support operations and maintenance costs of the key site infrastructure, deployment of multiple new sites and operational service areas, and on-boarding of UAS operators with appropriate FAA/government approvals.

Maintaining of the program management office and to continue to facilitate the infrastructure deployment including personnel, subcontractors supporting the network and the continued promotion is budgeted at \$4,200,000. To maintain the deployed network, the SE/SIs have given cost estimates of \$6,000,000. The O&M support plan is developed based on industry best practices for the scale and scope of the Key Site. The Key Site is being deployed with funding from the 2019-2021 biennium. With many foundational components in place, each additional deployed operational area would cost approximately \$5,000,000. Depending on funding available, multiple additional operational areas would be deployed during the 2021-2023 biennium.

CARRYOVER:

• There is an anticipation of approximately \$5,000,000 of unspent dollars that will be used to expand the Vantis network to new operational areas that were not able to be completed during the 2019-2021 biennium.

THE HISTORY

- During the 2019-2021 Biennium, \$28,000,000 was appropriated for the beyond visual line of sight UAS program (now named Vantis).
- The Vantis system architecture was designed and developed, the program was branded, and the Program Office was established.
- Selection of three system integrators was made to Collins Aerospace, L3Harris Technologies and Thales USA.

- Implementation of the Mission and Network Operations Center at Grand Sky, and installation of remote infrastructure in McKenzie and Williams Counties is ongoing.
- Vantis is being broadly supported by the FAA's BEYOND Program.

LEVERAGE STATE ASSETS

- Installations have been made on existing North Dakota Department of Transportation towers.
- The backhaul network of Vantis uses North Dakota Information Technology Department's STAGEnet infrastructure.
- Northern Plains UAS Test Site employees are leveraged to support the Vantis Program Office.

BENEFITS TO THE STATE

- The state's 3% revenue over the first 10 years is estimated at \$3,000,000 with sustained \$700,000 per year after that.
- Estimated revenue from Vantis will cover operating expenses after 2027.
- Estimated revenue from Vantis over the first 10 years is estimated at \$100,000,000.
- Developing public-private partnerships that will enable royalties, funding and cost-share.

JOBS AND TAX REVENUE

- We will be creating hundreds of jobs over the next 4 years and that will transition to thousands of jobs over the next 10 years.
- Vantis is projected to create approximately 6,000 UAS industry direct jobs by 2032 that support operations, data collection/analysis, logistics, manufacturing and engineering.
 - Estimated tax revenue from UAS industry direct jobs over the first 10 years is ~\$270M with sustained yearly tax revenue of \$59M per year after that.
- To directly support Vantis deployment and operations, we project that there will be ~85 jobs in 10 years to support the Mission and Network Operations Center, in-field maintenance and technical support, and additional jobs to support new development and capabilities.
 - Estimated tax revenue from direct jobs supporting Vantis over the first 10 years is ~\$5.6M with sustained yearly tax revenue of \$900K per year after that.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

I am Nicholas Flom, Executive Director of the Northern Plains Unmanned Aircraft Systems Test Site (NPUASTS). I have been the Executive Director since November of 2016 and have been a part of the Test Site since early 2014. I am testifying today in support of the Governor's funding request for the Unmanned Aircraft Systems Program under the Department of Commerce.

The current request, passed by the North Dakota Senate, is for \$3,000,000 in new funding to support the continuation of the UAS Test Site program and carryover authority from the 2019-2021 biennium. The funding would be able to support the FAA's UAS Test Site Program, FAA's BEYOND Program, support to state agencies and promotion and advocacy of UAS in North Dakota.

APPROPRIATIONS

- \$3,000,000 from General Fund
- \$7,020,150 (Other Funds) Authority to spend from Federal contracts
- \$1,000,000 (Other Funds) Authority to spend from Private contracts

THE HISTORY

- Since 2013, the State of North Dakota has invested \$11,943,620 into the NPUASTS.
- Since 2013, NPUASTS has been awarded external contracts worth \$7,200,000 with \$5,600,000 being awarded during this current biennium.

PROGRAM RECOGNITION

- The NPUASTS has been awarded Federal contracts during this biennium from CBP, DHS, DOD, FAA, and NASA.
- Selected with the North Dakota Department of Transportation as one of 10 participants in the FAA's UAS Integration Pilot Program.
- Selected with the North Dakota Department of Transportation as one of eight participants in the FAA's BEYOND Program.

BENEFITS TO THE STATE

• The Mercatus Center at George Mason University released on January 14, 2021 a 50 state report card outlining "Which States Are Prepared for the Drone Industry". North Dakota was ranked #1, and a major contributor to our ranking was the NPUASTS.

- The NPUASTS paid subcontractors \$2,444,324 to support our flight activity this current biennium, with 100% of those funds coming from external sources. Of the 20 subcontractors, 16 were from the state of North Dakota.
- The NPUASTS has supported flight activity at Grand Sky, University of North Dakota, Camp Grafton, and runs the program office for Vantis.

Subject: Support for TrainND Specific UAS Training Appropriation in SB 2018

To the Honorable Chairman Monson and Committee,

The State of North Dakota has placed significant investment into the Vantis network to allow civilian unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) to operate beyond visual line of sight (BVLOS) in the same airspace as manned aircraft.

I believe it is critical the State make continued investment into Vantis as well as training individuals within the industry to operate within its network. TrainND Northwest is uniquely situated in the heart of the energy industry, which I believe will be an early adopter of this technology to enhance efficiency and be a value add to their business in North Dakota.

In order to take full advantage of this infrastructure investment, training qualified UAS operators is paramount. The potential career opportunities BVLOS presents are exponential, including pilots, aircraft maintenance, and more. BVLOS operations will take place in the same airspace as manned aircraft which will require significant safety and regulatory training. It will be very important to the industries adopting UAS technology to have qualified and knowledgeable personnel available to perform the necessary operations safely and efficiently.

I ask that you support TrainND Northwest's one-time appropriation request of \$1 million to make this training program a reality and support ongoing job creation in the energy industry.

Good morning Chairman Monson and members of the House Appropriations Committee, Education & Environment Division.

My name is Deidre Hillman, State Director for your ND Women's Business Center (NDWBC). We are hosted by the organization CTB, formally known as Center for Technology and Business. CTB is a stand alone 501(c)(3) located here in Bismarck providing service across all of North Dakota.

NDWBC has two physical locations, one in Bismarck and one in Fargo. We employ staff in each city, who are responsible for covering their respective territories (Bismarck staff cover the Western half of ND, Fargo staff covers the Eastern half.

The NDWBC was formed in 1999 and is a shared partnership between the Small Business Administration's Office of Women's Business Ownership (OWBO) and the State of North Dakota; through the ND Department of Commerce and CTB. The federal dollars mandate a 1:1 cash match and State dollars are leveraged to help meet that requirement and fulfill duties under the ND Women's Business Development Office (century code section: 54-60-15) along with the guidelines in the federal notice of award from SBA.

In 2016, the NDWBC was selected as the Women's Business Center of Excellence award winner from the SBA among all 105 WBC across the US for providing innovative women focused training opportunities.

This national recognition and exceeding goals for more than three years in a row were essential to the NDWBC being awarded a second federal grant from SBA in April of 2018 to expand the NDWBC program.

That additional federal award brings in an additional \$300,000.00 of new federal dollars to ND per biennium. Together both federal awards total \$600,000.00 (\$300,000 from the new grant) federal dollars per biennium which requires a 1:1 cash match.

This year we also were able to leverage an additional \$840,000 in CARES Act Funding towards specific COVID related training for small businesses in North Dakota.

A large portion of the CARES Act dollars were used to create custom software we call The NDWBC Library which launched in January 2021. This on-demand training includes topics such how small business owners manage remote employees, supply chain disruption, remote customer support, to name a few. The trainers who developed the material are made up for subject matter experts from our region, many of them small business owners themselves with expertise in the topic and is free to access.

We ask for the States continued support so that we can continue to secure the federal dollars awarded and fulfill the duties outlined to support and serve female entrepreneurs across North Dakota. I have provided a hand-out highlighting our impact and growth trends.

We do ask you for your continued support to bring the \$600,000 federal dollars into the state so we may continue our support of the women of North Dakota. Our programming is unique and I would like to quickly tell you about two women who've entered our doors and now have businesses.

Erin Sorensen, is now the owner of Home Instead Senior Care of Hazen. She received business advising services through our Bismarck location. This is a franchised business and offers home health care for senior patients who do not need to be hospitalized but require more care than a volunteer or family caregiver can provide. After our meeting, Erin acquired access to capital through grants from the state to grow her business.

I want to thank you again for your consideration and will take any questions at this time.

Karen Schmidt and Dawn Hager Balancing Goat Coffee Co. in Mandan, ND Est. January 2020

Karen Schmidt and Dawn Hager, longtime friends and former co-workers, wanted to go into business together. Looking for balance, they realized they wanted to offer it to their clients as well, which is why they opened Balancing Goat Coffee Co. a coffee shop and yoga studio, combining caffeine with relaxation. Partnering with yoga instructors, offering an all-day menu, roasting their own coffee beans is part of the whole experience.

"Our goal was to create a place where you can break out of the mundane, make it your second home, and feel relaxed."

Before breaking ground on their new location, Schmidt and Hager booked a business advising with NDWBC for training in the areas of general business services, marketing and branding, financial management, and human resources.

"The staff was helpful and knowledgable. The training sessions we received were full of great nuggets of information that we took back and applied to our business. NDWBC provided us with the opportunity to network and meet other woman business owners who shared their experiences and advice as well as the pitfalls to avoid. These connections were very beneficial to us prior to and after opening our business. Not only did they provide us with training, connections, and general business knowledge, but they also continue to inspire us and provide us with support and motivation. We think of NDWBC as a valued friend in our business adventure."

Balancing Goat provides in-house roasted coffee, fresh fruit smoothies, smoothie bowls, pastries, baked goods, all-day breakfast, lunch, and much more. They partner with Transitions Yaga, another woman-owned business, to manage the yoga studio. Balancing Goat Coffee Co. offers customers a way to relax and start or end their days on a balanced note.

Kelani & Tyler Welstad Turbo Septic Service LLC in Upham, ND Est. April 2020 Turbo Septic Service LLC provides and services portable toilets and offers servicing of residential and commercial septics. Turbo Septic Service LLC started when Kalani and Tyler Welstad realized the need for a portable toilet rental company in rural, north-central North Dakota. After receiving brochures from a couple of portable toilet companies, Kelani started to feel overwhelmed despite her business background. I had worked for a "Woman-Owned Business," Jost Construction, several years prior, and I knew I wanted to own a majority of the company. My previous boss, Darla Jost, majority owner of Jost Construction, told me to reach out to NDWBC."

Kalani booked her business advising session for business plan development, counseling services, government procurement, and grant opportunities.

Their mission was developed when the owners realized their passion for grooming and animal welfare and turned it into a next-generation dog salon.

Using Fear-Free practices, Pride Pups offers a calm, comfortable grooming experience and rehabilitates dogs that have had negative experiences in the past. Pride Pups donates half of its tips to non-profits that benefit animals, women, and the LGBTQ+ community.

"Opening a dog grooming salon in the middle of a pandemic has had its fair number of challenges, but it has been very rewarding. The main obstacles have been obtaining grooming equipment for the salon and funding for a loan to pay for the necessary equipment and start-up costs. Legislative Support for North Dakota Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse at the ND Center for Nursing (Amendment to SB 2018)

"Due to a major shortage of health care staffing, the state's hospitals have a sever lack of available beds. Rising COVID-19 hospitalizations and high non-coronavirus admissions, some resulting from residents who deferred health care earlier int eh pandemic, have caused a crunch on medical centers." Grand Forks Herald November 10, 2020.

If we learned anything from the COVID-19 pandemic, it is that North Dakota does **not** have a centralized, coordinated effort to provide for adequate nurse staff across the state. Nursing forms the foundation for the economic engine for North Dakota's communities. Currently, health care facilities spend MILLIONS of dollars contracting with out of state agencies to secure travel and contract nurses, huge opportunity for these dollars to stay in ND.

"Something needs to be done about retention of staff. Currently, I know of 7 ICU nurses that left their positions in Bismarck to take traveling positions to Fargo and 7 Fargo nurses that have left Fargo to go to Bismarck for different jobs. The North Dakota Center for Nursing requests an amendment to the ND Department of Commerce budget (SB 2018) to reallocate \$140,000 of the previously appropriated Nonresident Nurse Employment Recruitment Program funding for the establishment of the ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse and support the Culture of Excellence program at the ND Center for Nursing during the 2021-2023 biennium.

The ND Center for Nursing is uniquely positioned to develop and implement an innovative comprehensive strategy to address the state's nursing shortage in rural areas.

Two goals for ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse:

- **Recruit** nurse graduates and nurses for health care employment in **ND**.
- **Retain** nurses in **ND**, and in the workplace decrease staff turnover.





Key Components of ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse

- Will be based on extensive ND Center for Nursing data showing the need for increased recruitment and retention.
- Target all levels of nurses: Certified Nursing Assistants (CNA), Licensed Practical Nurses (LPN), Registered Nurses (RN), Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) and Nursing Faculty
- Is a unique opportunity for nursing education programs and employers to work together to keep ND students in North Dakota.

• Recruit nurse graduates and nurses for health care employment in ND.

Provide career services to nursing students by connecting them with local communities and employment opportunities. Connect employers and graduating nurses directly together to get them to the bedside in rural and urban ND. We will work to connect students to NNERP and other incentive programs to increase the uptake. In a recent survey of graduating nurses, 38% plan to work outside of North Dakota and they are heavily recruited from out of state agencies.

Develop a flexible staffing model through collaborative work with health care employers, graduating students, practicing nurses and education programs to provide increased opportunities for unique staffing patterns to better meet the needs of nurses (i.e., hours, shifts, travel vs. permanent).

- Retain nurses in their workplace and in ND and decrease turnover.
 - Increase retention of nurses through the ND Nursing Culture of Excellence Designation program which is designed to improve the workplace culture and support the formation of professional identity in nursing. In a recent survey of practicing nurses, 48% indicated that they plan to leave North Dakota.
- Will add a critical component to existing ND Department of Commerce workforce programs to fill the gap of direct recruitment and retention of nurses to ND.

Fiscal Note: Funding is needed to support the ND Center for Nursing infrastructure and to fully develop the ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse and the Culture of Excellence program. It is anticipated that these will be fully developed during the 2021-2023 biennium which will help provide sustained funding for all the ND Center for Nursing activities. A version of this plan was included in SB 2198 which failed in the Senate.

Total State Appropriations for 2021-2023= \$140,000 from carry-forward funding

The North Dakota Center for Nursing, a non-profit 501c3 organization, was developed in 2011 to represent over 20,000 nurses and over 40 nursing organizations across North Dakota. The mission of the North Dakota Center for Nursing is through collaboration guide ongoing development of a well-prepared and diverse nursing workforce to meet health care needs in North Dakota through research, education, recruitment and retention, advocacy and public policy. This policy agenda has been approved by our Board of Directors and is an official policy of the North Dakota Center for Nursing.

I am writing this letter to support the ND Center for Nursing proposed amendment to SB 2018: ND Department of Commerce Budget. This amendment would allocate \$140,000 of the carry-forward funding of the Nonresident Nurse Employment Recruitment Program for the establishment of the ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse and to support the Culture of Excellence program.

Nurse staffing is in crisis in North Dakota, especially with the pandemic, and North Dakota emergency nurses have felt the impact of this firsthand. Beyond the added strain of COVID-19, emergency nurses face increased 'inpatient boarding' (patients admitted to the hospital, but remaining in the ED due to the lack of an inpatient nurse to care for them), increased nurse-to-patient ratios – especially for critically ill patients in the ED, and a constant churn of travel nurses in and out of the facilities, leading to unpredictable numbers of nurses to care for our patients.

There is a critical need for a centralized, coordinated effort to provide nurse staffing across the state. This is paired with the need for increased awareness and recruitment of future nurses to replace burned out nurses, an increased focus on recruiting ND nursing students to work in ND, the development of a centralized contract nursing staffing pool with flexible staffing options, and the need to ensure that the work environment provides a positive workplace culture to ensure retention.

I support the ND Center for Nursing proposed amendment because the Center has a strong reputation of bringing North Dakota's nurses together to solve challenging problems, has an existing framework upon which to develop an effective solution, and is committed to changing the way staffing is addressed within our state. The Center for Rural Health (CRH), UND School of Medicine and Health Sciences, as the State Office of Rural Health (SORH) and the Program Office for the Area Health Education Center (AHEC) can support your effort to use Department of Commerce Carry Forward funds to address nursing supply and demand issues. The Center for Rural Health does employ a Workforce Specialist, supported with state appropriation, who works to assist rural communities with a range of health workforce needs (e.g., medical providers, nursing, allied health, administrative, and others). It is my understanding that this legislation is not duplicative of what is already occurring and that it can augment current efforts. The nursing situation is indeed complicated and multiple partners collaboratively working to address it may produce more benefits for North Dakota. The travel nurse pool idea is distinct.

We are writing in strong support of SB 2198, which would provide support for the organizational structure of the North Dakota Center for Nursing, and build a new nursing workforce recruitment and retention program for the state.

Ave Maria Village is a 100-bed faith-based skilled nursing and rehabilitation facility. This past year, we have faced the most severe challenges we have ever had in recruiting qualified professional nurses. For the first time in many years, we are contracting with a travel nurse service in order to adequately staff our facility. During a major COVID-19 outbreak in our facility and community this past fall, not only were we utilizing costly travel nurses, but we were also heavily dependent upon the state emergency nurse pool to meet the needs of our residents. No recruitment incentives, even a substantial sign-on bonus. were bringing results. To be frank, the future looks grim in terms of attracting nurses to rural areas of North Dakota outside of the four major cities. It is truly a crisis which will only get worse unless we take strong and proactive steps to improve the situation.

Provisions in SB 2198 will enable the North Dakota Center for Nursing to provide a centralized, coordinated effort to enhance nurse staffing across the state. The Center will also increase awareness of the crisis that health care providers find themselves in. They will provide an increased focus on recruiting nursing students in the state to stay and work in North Dakota, and attracting nurses from out of state, both nationally and internationally. I am writing today in support of SB 2198, which would lay our framework to help some of our staffing shortages and staffing crises in North Dakota. This is the North Dakota State Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse

My name is Tessa Johnson, and I am a registered nurse in North Dakota. I am the Executive Director of CountryHouse residence in Dickinson North Dakota. CountryHouse Residence is licensed as a basic care and memory care home. I also serve as the ND Center for Nursing as well as the NDNA President.

In many areas in nursing and healthcare around the state, we have faced staffing shortages at one point in time. During the last year during the COVID-19 crisis many of us had faced staffing crisis and staffing shortages like no other. I am an administrator of a long-term care facility and with staff members out with COVID-19 it was very difficult to staff our building at times.

Prior to COVID-19 we were often able to use local staffing agencies to fill needs. During this time, the demand is so high that even our local staffing agencies had a hard time helping us fill some of our shifts. There are many times or administrators, or leadership teams had to work in caregiver situations putting our work behind to the back burner for our residents to get the care we need. All these situations lead to burn out, exhaustion and leaving the practice.

There have also been times in which we have used agency that enjoy working for our company and with our residents. To keep them we must pay a large amount of money to buy their contract out which is very difficult for small facilities. This clearinghouse would give us the opportunity to help match these health care workers with a job they love.

As a nursing home administrator, I am speaking in favor of this staffing clearinghouse to help us mitigate this staffing crisis is in staffing shortages. We would be able to have help filling certified nursing assistant roles, nursing roles and other jobs in our buildings. We also would have to pay less recruitment fees and out-of-state contracts.

In addition, I feel like integrating the North Dakota nursing graduates into this program would help keep new graduate nurses in our state which is always a goal of ours.

If facilities are going to pay a higher amount for staffing through agency staff it would make more sense to keep the money in our state and keep it locally to benefit the nurses and other healthcare entities throughout our state.

In Support of SB 2018 Funding for the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) to the House Appropriations - Education and Environment Division Public Hearing March 11, 2021

Good morning Mr. Chairman and Committee members.

My name is Holly Anderson, and I am the owner and CEO of Elinor Coatings, a research and development company in Fargo that provides corrosion and surface protection solutions to the Department of Defense. Thank you for the opportunity to provide my input on SB 2018. As a business owner who has received direct advising from the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center (ND PTAC), I urge your continued support for funding of the program.

ND PTAC provides no-cost procurement and contracting assistance to North Dakotans who want to do business with local, state and federal agencies. Navigating the complex government contracting environment without proper guidance can lead to costly mistakes in time and money for a business owner.

In 2020, North Dakota entities held contracts from The Department of Defense valued at \$260,989,826. In 2020, the Department of Health and Human Services increased contracts in North Dakota nearly \$85 million from the year before to \$251,652,705. (www.usaspending.gov) PTAC is helping our state grow new business sectors, create high-paying skilled jobs and increase North Dakota's share of the \$1.485 trillion in discretionary funding spent by the federal government annually.

Having knowledgeable and no-cost support from PTAC has been extremely valuable to Elinor Coatings. We recently secured two multi-year Department of Defense research contracts to develop anti-corrosion coatings for air and ground vehicles for the Air Force and Army. These contracts have resulted in seven additional highly-skilled employees at Elinor laboratories and two open positions we are seeking to fill.

The state and local PTAC have been very helpful to Elinor Coatings in several ways. Cathy Lindquist at PTAC Fargo has assisted us with our registration on the Federal System for Awards Management (Sam.gov), searching for opportunities, qualifying for HUBZone, navigating the Federal invoicing website, and finding information to stay compliant in cybersecurity and federal acquisition regulations (FARs). We take advantage of webinars and online materials the PTAC offers regularly. We consistently get same-day answers to our questions from our PTAC office.

Funding of PTAC is currently provided by the Department of Defense's Defense Logistics Agency on a 60/40 basis with the 40% state match being funded by the ND Department of Commerce through the momentum/discretionary budget line. Please support business owners like me all around our great state by proposing increased funding for the ND PTAC.

A TOOL FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The North Dakota Development Fund was created through legislation in 1991 as an economic development tool. It provides flexible gap financing through debt and equity investments for new or expanding North Dakota primary sector businesses.

The Development Fund makes investments of up to \$1 million. The board of directors may adjust the limit when deemed appropriate. In general, the following criteria apply to Development Fund investments:

- The entrepreneur must have a realistic financial commitment at stake. Usually, principals are required to have a minimum of 15% equity in the project.
- Refinancing of debt is not eligible.
- Principal shareholders with 20% or greater ownership are generally required to guarantee the debt. Other shareholders may also be required to guarantee.
- Financing is available to any primary sector business project with the exception of production agriculture.

The fund provides "flexible financing" through loans and equity investments not available from most conventional lenders and is available to any primary sector business with the exception of production agriculture.

- Primary sector includes individuals and businesses
 which, through the employment of knowledge or
 labor, add value to a product, process or service
 which results in the creation of new wealth. Primary
 sector includes tourism and specific types of investorowned agriculture, and is typically businesses such
 as manufacturers, food processors or export service
 companies. Investor-owned agriculture includes
 livestock feeding or milking operations, or other valueadded agriculture located apart from an individual
 farm operation that is professionally managed and has
 employees.
- Tourism, specific types of value-added agriculture and investor-owned agriculture can also qualify as primary sector.

Loan and equity programs managed by the North Dakota Development Fund include:

- · North Dakota Development Fund
- Regional Rural Revolving Loan Fund
- Rural Incentive Growth Loan Program
- Small Business Technology Program
- · Child Care Loan Program
- New Venture Capital Program
- Venture Capital Program

The North Dakota Development Fund coordinates efforts between all the sources of financing, the business and the community. Any project considered for this financing must be feasible and have a reasonable chance of succeeding.

LETTER FROM THE CEO



The Development Fund invested \$5,674,246 in 39 primary sector and child care businesses from July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020. The Development Fund has provided gap financing in which the fund's investments, since inception, have reached \$147 million.

With Development Fund's dollars invested, there has been \$266,758,203 leveraged from other financing institutions resulting in a \$7.87 to \$1 ratio – for every Development Fund dollar invested, \$7.87 was invested from other sources.

The investments made by the Development Fund in 2019 to 2020 contributed to the creation of 327 in the primary sector and child care industries.

The Development Fund reported an estimated operating income of \$434,684 before bad debt expense as of June 30, 2019 fiscal year-end, as compared to \$232,582 for the

fiscal year-end 2018. The 87 percent increase in income is attributable to an increase in interest income, dividend income and other income in 2019 as compared to 2018. The fund saw a decrease in general and administrative expenses of \$125,724 from 2018 to 2019. The Development Fund continues to pay all costs of operating the fund, including salaries and benefits. The cash flow generated from principal and interest collections continues to be strong at \$3.3 million. The Development Fund continues to be a revolving loan fund as the fund has collected \$6.8 million the past two years, which in turn can be used for future loan and equity investments.

Operating income (loss) before nonoperating revenues and expenses decreased by \$354,500 from (\$1,240,744) in 2018 to (\$886,239) in 2019. The decrease in the operating income (loss) in 2019 was attributable to an increase in reserve for bad debt expense and a decrease in operating expenses.

Since the fund's inception, it has invested \$147 million in 694 companies with over \$48.2 million invested in rural communities. Fund investments have contributed to the projected creation of 12,203 primary sector jobs. The Development Fund helped 18 start-up businesses begin operations in North Dakota in 2018 to 2019. Of the 18 start-up businesses, two of the were in rural communities.

In providing flexible financing, the Development Fund helped primary sector and child care businesses start up or expand, which in turn created new jobs and generated new revenues. What follows are highlights of 2020 along with the accompanying financial statements.











NORTH DAKOTA INVESTMENT LOCATIONS

July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020




Number of Development Fund Projects

3DomFuel

Just a few years ago, 3D printers were still a novelty item that most people had never heard of or seen. But a few brave companies were already working to be among the best in the marketplace and provide the supplies those 3D printers needed. Fargo 3D Printing's owners, John Schneider and Jake Clark, saw the opportunity due to the presence of a lot of poorly manufactured 3D filament and decided to get into the 3D filament manufacturing business. Around the same time, they met Danny McMenamin, a 40-year veteran of the plastics industry, who already was producing filament in Ireland under the business name 3Dom Filaments Ltd. They soon formed parallel businesses called 3Dom USA and 3Dom Europe.

Meanwhile, Matthew Stegall also saw the opportunity and came up with a terrific name for a 3D supplies company: 3D-Fuel. He started a separate company and brought on partners to help it grow. All three companies struggled to gain a foothold in the market until a series of events brought all three together and a rare synergy occurred.

3Dom USA, 3D-Fuel and 3Dom Europe joined forces in May of 2016 to form 3DomFuel, a new company based on the combined efforts of many people whose common goal was to produce the best 3D filament available. Their goal was to take it to the marketplace and provide quality filament at reasonable prices to the masses that would be adopting this new technology.

In the years since, 3DomFuel's 3D-Fuel filament has earned a reputation as fantastic filament for almost any job and 3D printer. Test after test has shown 3D-Fuel to be among not only the best quality, but also available at a reasonable price. Sales have begun to flourish and grow: 3D-Fuel filaments are being sold on three continents (soon to be four) and in more than 10 countries with demand increasing daily and showing no signs of slowing down

Fast forward to today, 3D printers are now well-known and becoming more and more commonplace. The market is waking up, growth is occurring and 3DomFuel and 3D-Fuel products are right in the middle of it.

Due to the rapid growth over the last year, 3DomFuel's business has expanded to the point that it had to bring on additional labor to open more shifts – it operates two current production lines 24 hours a day, six days a week. It plans to upgrade existing equipment and add additional production lines while utilizing more space in the facility it moved to in 2018.

3Dom's current sales are completely outstripping the current production capacity. It is experiencing good cash flow from month to month but is limited by production capacity. It also is starting to attract large-volume customers, some of which would buy all 3Rom could make if it had a production line dedicated to specific customers. It currently has half a dozen new, unannounced materials (for making 3D filament) that it wants to launch that have a higher dollar margin than current materials. But it is unable to launch the line due to a lack of production capacity and the working capital required to hire the additional staff and purchase the raw materials necessary for a rapid startup. Pausing production of its current materials would cannibalize current cash flow.

3Dom has identified the necessary equipment and workforce required to double existing production capacity and to continue to grow its sales efforts.

It has signed a lease on a 15,000-square-foot facility that it currently shares with C2Renew, another local Fargo plastics production company. They made the transition to this location in June 2018. 3DomFuel surpassed \$1 million in sales in 2020, a growth of over 180% from 2019, and it is on track to more than double revenues in 2021.

"Without a doubt, our growth would not have been possible without the amazing North Dakota Development Fund. Starting and growing a business is hard, especially a manufacturing business with global customers. The development fund has been there to assist in navigating the financial growing pains of our business. We expect to more double the number of people that we employ in the next 12 months and are projecting to double that again 18-24 months from now. That level of growth has been enabled by the development fund."— 3DomFuel CEO John Schneider

Plans also include additional labor to be hired full-time as production grows. The company currently employs one facility manager and nine variable hourly employees. The table below shows the projections for the next two years.

3Dom also has multiple new product releases planned and needs to produce the inventory to have on hand for when the products launch. 3Dom also wants to commit to growth for North Dakota. It has demonstrated this in 2018 by signing a 10-year lease on a building to be used for expansion. It will continue to grow through hiring of local people.

We are also responsible for communicating significant matters related to the audit that are, in our professional judgment, relevant to your responsibilities in overseeing the financial reporting process. However, we are not required to design procedures for the purpose of identifying other matters to communicate to you.

We have provided our findings regarding a significant control deficiency over financial reporting and material noncompliance, and other matters noted during our audit in a separate letter to you dated December 4, 2020.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We conducted our audit consistent with the planned scope and timing we previously communicated to you.

Compliance with All Ethics Requirements Regarding Independence

The engagement team, others in our firm, as appropriate, our firm, and other firms utilized in the engagement, if applicable, have complied with all relevant ethical requirements regarding independence.

Qualitative Aspects of the Entity's Significant Accounting Practices

Significant Accounting Policies

Management has the responsibility to select and use appropriate accounting policies. A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. is included in Note 1 to the financial statements. There have been no initial selection of accounting policies and no changes in significant accounting policies or their application during 2020. No matters have come to our attention that would require us, under professional standards, to inform you about (1) the methods used to account for significant unusual transactions and (2) the effect of significant accounting policies in controversial or emerging areas for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Significant Accounting Estimates

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's current judgments. Those judgments are normally based on knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ markedly from management's current judgments.

The most sensitive accounting estimates affecting the financial statements are the allowance for loan losses and valuation of equity investments.

Management's estimate of the allowance for loan losses is based on management's periodic review of the collectability of the loans in light of historical experience, the nature and volume of the loan portfolio, adverse situations that may affect the borrower's ability to repay, estimated value of underlying collateral, and prevailing economic conditions.

Among the factors considered in determining whether an other than temporary impairment of an investment has occurred are the cost of the investment, development since the acquisition of the investment, the financial condition and operation results of the issuer, the long-term potential of the business of the issuer, and other factors generally pertinent to the valuation of investments. The North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. has relied on financial data investees and, in many instances, on estimates by the management company and of the investee company as to the potential effect of future developments.

We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the allowance for loan losses and valuation of equity investments and determined that it is reasonable in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Financial Statement Disclosures

Certain financial statement disclosures involve significant judgment and are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. There are no sensitive disclosures affecting the financial statements.

Significant Difficulties Encountered during the Audit

The North Dakota Development Fund experienced significant turnover in the current year. This turnover did impact our ability to receive timely information on House Bill #1014.

Uncorrected and Corrected Misstatements

For purposes of this communication, professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that we believe are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Further, professional standards require us to also communicate the effect of uncorrected misstatements related to prior periods on the relevant classes of transactions, account balances or disclosures, and the financial statements as a whole and each applicable opinion unit.

The following misstatements that we identified as a result of our audit procedures were brought to the attention of, and corrected by, management:

No such disagreements arose during the course of the audit.

We applied certain limited procedures to the Management's Discussion and Analysis, which is required supplementary information (RSI) that supplements the basic financial statements. Our procedures consisted of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We did not audit the RSI and do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the RSI.

We were engaged to report on the Combining Statements of Net Position, Combining Statements of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position, and Combining Statements of Cash Flows, which accompany the financial statements but are not RSI. With respect to this supplementary information, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

Our responsibility also includes communicating to you any information which we believe is a material misstatement of fact. Nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe that such information, or its manner of presentation, is materially inconsistent with the information, or manner of its presentation, appearing in the financial statements.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of North Dakota Development Fund, Inc., a component unit of the state of North Dakota, as of June 30, 2020 and 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Development Fund's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. They do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the State of North Dakota as of June 30, 2020 and 2019, and the changes in its financial position and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages 4 through 7 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements taken as a whole. The combining financial statements shown on pages 21 through 24 are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements.

The combining financial statements are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued a report dated December 4, 2020, on our consideration of North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements, and other matters. North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. Management's Discussion and Analysis June 30, 2020 and 2019

The discussion and analysis of the financial performance of the North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. that follows is meant to provide additional insight into the Development Fund's activities for the year ended June 30, 2020. Please read it in conjunction with the Development Fund's financial statements and footnotes, which are presented within this report.

Financial Highlights

Total revenue increased by \$102,479 (11.49%) to \$994,243. Operating revenues increased by \$66,121 (7.87%) to \$906,066. Cash flow increased by \$7,168,685 (57.48%) to \$19,640,826. The Fund collected \$2,816,729 in principal payments in 2020, which was a decrease of \$471,188 (14.33%) from 2019. The increase in total and in operating revenue is attributable to an increase in dividend/interest income received from investments/loans and an increase in other income. The increase in loan interest income is due to loan growth in the portfolio in 2020. The increase in dividend income is due to the purchase of the New Venture Capital Program equities in the amount of \$6,564,111 from the Bank of North Dakota as part of the \$15 million transfer provided for in HB 1014 of the 2019 legislative session. The decrease in total principal funds collected was attributable to the Fund receiving lower payout of loans on the books of the North Dakota Development Fund as compared to 2019 partly due to suspended loan payments for COVID relief as well as receiving lower payout of loans on the books of the North Dakota Development Fund in 2019.

The Fund received \$105,544 in dividend payments in 2020 from equity investments made, compared to \$1,746 in dividend payments received in 2019. This increase is due to purchase of the New Venture Capital Program equities from the Bank of North Dakota as part of the \$15 million transfer provided for in HB 1014 of the 2019 legislative session.

General and Administrative expense decreased by \$11,187 (2.77%) from \$402,885 in 2019 to \$391,698 in 2020. The decrease was attributable to overall general decreased costs of operations compared to 2019.

Operating Income (loss) before non-operating revenues and expenses decreased by \$5,713,915 from (\$938,058) in 2019 to (\$6,651,973) in 2020. The decrease in the operating income (loss) in 2020 was attributable to an increase in provision for losses (change in allowance). This increase in provision for losses is a result from the purchase of the New Venture Capital Program equities from the Bank of North Dakota as part of the \$15 million transfer provided for in HB 1014 of the 2019 legislative session that created the NDDF Venture Capital Program.

Interest income on deposits increased by \$36,358 (70.16%) from \$51,819 received in 2019 to \$88,177 received in 2020. The increase was the result of larger balances carried at the Bank of North Dakota along with creation of a new account at the Bank of North Dakota for the NDDF Venture Capital program.

The change in net position increased by \$9,322,443 from (\$886,239) in 2019 to \$8,436,204 in 2020. The increase was attributable to the \$15 million transfer provided for by HB 1014. The impact of this increase on the net position was offset by a corresponding increase in reserves for bad debt expense for the equities purchased from the Bank of North Dakota.

Net position increased by \$8,436,204 from \$22,640,814 at the end of year 2019 to \$31,077,018 at the end of year 2020. The increase was attributable to the \$15 million transfer provided for by HB 1014. The impact of this increase on the net position was offset by a corresponding increase in reserves for bad debt expense for the equities purchased from the Bank of North Dakota.

North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. Management's Discussion and Analysis June 30, 2020 and 2019

Noncurrent net assets (excluding equipment) increased by \$3,617,596 from \$3,259,629 in 2019 to \$6,877,225 in 2020. The noncurrent assets consist of the Fund's loan and equity investments. The equity investments decreased by \$2,013,629 from \$3,221,812 in 2019 to \$1,208,183 in 2020. There were no equity investments that were charged off during 2020 and 2019.

The loan investments made increased by \$10,063,260 from \$19,083,675 in 2019 to \$29,146,935 in 2020. There were no loan investments that were charged off during 2020 and 2019.

Interest receivable on loans increased by \$59,861 to \$140,860. The increase in the receivable in 2020 is due to the increase in loans booked during 2020.

Current portion of loans receivable decreased from \$6,838,143 in 2019 to \$4,422,932 in 2019. The decrease is attributable to loans maturing in fiscal year 2020.

Cash and cash equivalents increased by \$7,168,685 (57.48%) to \$19,640,826 (cash balance is before loan and investment commitments). The increase in Cash and Cash Equivalents was attributable to available funds in the NDDF Venture Capital fund resulting from the \$15 million transfer provided for in HB 1014 of the 2019 legislative session.

The Fund does invest their excess funds into longer term deposits for a higher rate of return to coincide with the funding commitments made by the Fund to companies for loans and equity investments, which are not required to be funded in the short-term. The Fund has invested more funds in longer term certificates of deposit, which are at a higher rate of return earning more deposit interest and putting the funds to work in loan and equity investments to "Primary Sector" businesses in the State of North Dakota.

39 projects were funded totaling \$5,674,246.

Required Financial Statements

The discussion and analysis are intended to serve as an introduction to the Development Fund's financial statements. The financial statements of the Development Fund provide accounting information similar to that of many other business entities. The Balance Sheet summarizes the assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net position. It also serves as a basis for analysis of the soundness and liquidity of the Development Fund. The statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net position summarize the Development Fund's operating performance for the year. The statements of Cash Flows summarize the flow of cash through the Development Fund as it conducts its business.

Economic Factors and Future Outlook

As a result of the spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus, economic uncertainties have arisen which are likely to negatively impact net interest income and dividend income. Other financial impact could occur though such potential impact is unknown at this time.

On March 19, 2020 the Board of Directors voted to suspend loan payments and interest accrual on all NDDF loans where NDDF was not in a participant decision. On April 9, 2020, the Board of Directors voted to extend the COVID relief for an additional two months.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization and Nature of Activities

The North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. (the Corporation) was established pursuant to Chapter 10-30.3 of the North Dakota Century Code as amended by the passage of Senate Bill 2058 during the 1991 legislative session. The Corporation is a statewide nonprofit development corporation with the authority to take equity positions in; to provide loans to; or to use other innovative financing mechanisms to provide capital for new or expanding primary sector businesses in North Dakota or relocating to North Dakota.

The Corporation uses funds to report on its financial position and the results of its operations. Fund accounting is designed to demonstrate legal compliance and to aid financial management by segregating transactions related to certain corporate functions or activities.

The following activities are used by the Corporation:

Development Fund

The Development Fund is used to account for fund investments, including equity positions, loans, loan guarantees, and other innovative financing mechanisms for new or expanding primary sector businesses in North Dakota or relocating to North Dakota.

Regional Rural Development Revolving Loan Fund

The Regional Rural Development Revolving Loan Fund is used to account for fund investments including equity positions, loans, loan guarantees, or debt financing on a matching basis to new or expanding primary sector businesses in rural areas.

Small Business Technology Investment Fund

The Small Business Technology Fund is used to provide matching investments to startup technology-based businesses.

Child Care Fund

The Child Care Fund is used to account for fund investments including loans and loan guarantees for new or expanding child-care facilities in North Dakota.

Venture Capital Loan Program

The Venture Capital Loan Program is used to provide flexible financing through debt and equity investments for new or expanding businesses in the state of North Dakota.

The Corporation may form additional corporations, partnerships or other forms of business associations in order to further its mission.

The Director of the Department of Commerce Division of the Economic Development and Finance shall appoint the Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation. All investments, contracts, partnerships, limited liability companies, and business transactions of the Corporation are the responsibility of the Chief Executive Officer and the eight-member Board of Directors, who are appointed by the Governor.

Reporting Entity

In accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statements, the Corporation should include all component units over which the Corporation exercises such aspects as (1) appointing a voting majority of an organization's governing body and (2) has the ability to impose its will on that organization or (3) the potential for the organization to provide specific financial benefits to, or impose specific burdens on the Corporation. GASB further defined reporting units as a legally separate, tax exempt affiliated organization that meet all of the following criteria:

- The economic resources of the organization entirely or almost entirely directly benefit the Corporation or its constituents, and
- The Corporation or its component units are entitled to or can otherwise access, a majority of the
 economic resources of the organization, and
- The economic resources that the Corporation is entitled to, or can otherwise access, are significant to the Corporation.

Based upon criteria set forth in GASB, no organizations were determined to be part of the reporting entity. The Corporation is included as part of the primary government of the State of North Dakota's reporting entity.

Basis of Accounting

The Corporation is presented in the accompanying financial statements as a proprietary fund type – an enterprise fund.

An enterprise fund is used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises, where the intent is that costs of providing goods or services to the general public or other funds on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges. The Corporation operates primarily with appropriations from the general fund.

As a proprietary fund type, the Corporation accounts for its transactions using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized for its transactions when they are earned, and expenses are recognized when they are incurred.

Revenue and Expense Recognition

The Corporation presents its revenues and expenses as operating or non-operating based on recognition definitions from GASB. Operating activities are those activities that are necessary and essential to the mission of the Corporation. Operating revenues include all charges to customers, research contracts and grants, dividends earned on equity investments and interest earned on loans. Revenues from non-exchange transactions and state appropriations that represent subsidies or gifts to the Corporation, as well as investment income, are considered non-operating since these are either investing, capital or noncapital financing activities. Operating expenses are all expense transactions incurred other than those related to investing, capital or noncapital financing activities. Revenues received for capital financing activities, as well as related expenses, are considered neither operating nor non-operating activities and are presented after non-operating activities on the accompanying Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position.

Concentration of Credit Risk

Loans receivable consist primarily of loans to new or expanding businesses in North Dakota or relocating businesses to North Dakota. The Corporation performs credit evaluations and maintains a security interest until related loans are collected.

Cash Equivalents

The Corporation considers all highly liquid investments purchased with maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Equity Investments

The Corporation records its equity investments at cost adjusted for other than temporary impairment as determined by the Board of Directors. The other than temporary impairment of equity investments is included in fund equity. Realization of the carrying value of these investments is subject to future developments inherent in such investments (see Note 3).

Among the factors considered in determining whether an other than temporary impairment of an investment has occurred are the cost of the investment, development since the acquisition of the investment, the financial condition and operating results of the issuer, the long-term potential of the business of the issuer, and other factors generally pertinent to the valuation of investments. The Development Fund has relied on financial data of investees and, in many instances, on estimates by the management company and of the investee company as to the potential effect of future developments.

Expense Allocation

The Development Fund pays all expenses of the Corporation.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Material estimates that are particularly susceptible to significant change in the near-term relate to the determination of the allowance for loan losses and valuation of equity investments.

Capital Assets and Depreciation

All capital assets are recorded in the accompanying financial statements at cost. Donated capital assets are stated at fair market value at the time of donation. Equipment with a cost greater than \$5,000 is capitalized and reported in the accompanying financial statements. The Corporation's capital assets are being depreciated on a straight-line basis over estimated useful life of 8 years.

Loans

Loans are reported at their outstanding unpaid principal adjusted for charge-offs and the allowance for loan losses.

Interest income is accrued on the unpaid principal balance. The accrual of interest on loans is discontinued at the time the loan is 90 to 120 days delinquent unless the credit is well secured and in process of collection. Loans are placed on non-accrual or charged-off at an earlier date if collection of principal or interest is doubtful. All current year interest accrued but not collected for loans that are placed on non-accrual or charged off is reversed against interest income. All prior year interest accrued but not collected is charged-off against the allowance for loan losses. The interest on these loans is accounted for on the cash-basis or cost-recovery method, until qualifying for return to accrual. Loans are returned to accrual status when all principal and interest amounts contractually due are brought current and future payments are reasonably assured.

The Corporation has determined that the accounting for nonrefundable fees and costs associated with originating or acquiring loans does not have a material effect on their financial statements. As such, these fees and costs have been recognized during the period they are collected and incurred, respectively.

Allowance for Loan Losses

The allowance for loan losses is established as losses are estimated to have occurred through a provision for loan losses charged to earnings. Loan losses are charged against the allowance when management believes the uncollectibility of a loan balance is confirmed. Subsequent recoveries, if any, are credited to a recovery account.

The allowance for loan losses is evaluated on a regular basis by management and is based upon management's periodic review of the collectability of the loans in light of historical experience, the nature and volume of the loan portfolio, adverse situations that may affect the borrower's ability to repay, estimated value of any underlying collateral and prevailing economic conditions. This evaluation is inherently subjective as it requires estimates that are susceptible to significant revision as more information becomes available.

A loan is considered impaired when, based on current information and events, it is probable that the Corporation will be unable to collect the scheduled payments of principal or interest when due according to the contractual terms of the loan agreement. Factors considered by management in determining impairment include payment status, collateral value, and the probability of collecting scheduled principal and interest payments when due. Loans that experience insignificant payment delays and payment shortfalls generally are not classified as impaired. Management determines the significance of payment delays and payment shortfalls on a case-by-case basis, taking into consideration all of the circumstances surrounding the loan and the borrower's prior payment record, and the amount of the shortfall in relation to the principal and interest owed. Impairment is measured on a loan-by-loan basis by either the present value of expected future cash flows discounted at the loan's effective interest rate, the loan's obtainable market price, or the fair value of the collateral if the loan is collateral dependent. The Corporation separately identifies individual loans for impairment disclosures by rating them on a scale of 1 to 6.

Restricted Resources

It is the North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s policy to first apply restricted resources when an expense is incurred for which both restricted and unrestricted resources are available.

Note 2 - Deposits

The Corporation is required to maintain its deposits at the Bank of North Dakota (a related party). As of June 30, 2020, the Corporation had the following:

Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in interest rates of investments will adversely affect the fair value of the investments.

Custodial and Concentration of Credit Risk

For deposits and investments, the custodial credit risk that, in the event of the failure of a depository financial institution, the Corporation will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in possession of an outside party. The Corporation's deposits are uncollateralized. All of the Corporation's deposits are with the Bank of North Dakota.

The Corporation acquired its investment by direct purchase from the issuer under investment representations, and the Board of Directors valued the securities on the premise that they may not be sold without registration under the Securities Act of 1933. The price of securities purchased was determined by direct negotiation between the Corporation and the seller.

Note 6 - Commitments and Contingencies

Development Fund

The Board of Directors has approved equity investments, loans, grants and guaranty of collections at June 30, 2020 for which funds have not been disbursed or written agreements entered into in the approximate amount of \$1,333,650.

Regional Rural Development Revolving Loan Fund

The Board of Directors has approved equity investments, loans, and guaranty of collections at June 30, 2020 for which funds have not been disbursed or written agreements entered into in the approximate amount of \$998,082.

Child Care Loan Fund

The Board of Directors has approved equity investments, loans, and guaranty of collections at June 30, 2020 for which funds have not been disbursed or written agreements entered into in the approximate amount of \$107,312.

Development Fund Venture Capital Fund

The Board of Directors has approved equity investments, loans, and guaranty of collections at June 30, 2020 for which funds have not been disbursed or written agreements entered into in the approximate amount of \$546,142.

Note 7 - Related Party Transactions

The financial statements of the North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. include equity investments in entities partially owned by members of the Board of Directors. The related party investment balance was \$1,301,918 and \$1,317,149 as of June 30, 2020 and 2019, respectively. Additionally, the North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. has loans receivables from the same entities with a balance of \$814,906 and \$1,159,101 as of June 30, 2020 and 2019.

Note 8 - Risk Management

North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The following are funds/pools established by the State for risk management issues:

The 1995 Legislative Session established the Risk Management Fund (RMF), an internal service fund, to provide a self-insurance vehicle for funding the liability exposures of state agencies resulting from the elimination of the state's sovereign immunity. The RMF manages the tort liability of the state, its agencies' employees, and the University System. All state agencies participate in the RMF and their fund contribution was determined using a projected cost allocation approach. The statutory liability of the State is limited to a total of \$250,000 per person and \$1,000,000 per occurrence.

The Corporation participates in the North Dakota Fire and Tornado Fund and the State Bonding Fund through the policies of the North Dakota Commerce Department. North Dakota Commerce Department pays an annual premium to the Fire and Tornado Fund to cover property damage to personal property. Replacement cost coverage is provided by estimating replacement cost in consultation with the Fire and Tornado Fund. The Fire and Tornado Fund is reinsured by a third-party insurance carrier for losses in excess of one million dollars per occurrence during a twelve-month period. The State Bonding Fund currently provides the Agency with blanket fidelity bond coverage in the amount of \$100,000 per employee. The State Bonding Fund does not currently charge any premium for this coverage.

The Corporation participates in the North Dakota Workforce Safety and Insurance, (WSI) an Enterprise Fund of the State of North Dakota. WSI is a state insurance fund and a "no fault" insurance system covering the State's employers and employees financed by premiums assessed to employers. The premiums are available for the payment of claims to employees injured during employment.

There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage from the prior year and settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

Note 9 - Transfers

During the year ended June 30, 2020, the North Dakota Development Fund received a transfer of \$15,000,000 from the Bank of North Dakota. Per House Bill 1014, the North Dakota Development Fund used a portion of these proceeds to purchase venture capital assets from the Bank of North Dakota.

The most sensitive estimates affecting the financial statements include the allowance for uncollectible loans receivable and valuation allowance for equity investments.

The allowance for loan losses is evaluated on a regular basis by management and is based upon management's periodic review of the collectability of the loans in light of historical experience, the nature and volume of the loan portfolio, adverse situations that may affect the borrower's ability to repay, estimated value of any underlying collateral and prevailing economic conditions. This evaluation is inherently subjective as it requires estimates that are susceptible to significant revision as more information becomes available.

Among the factors considered in determining whether an other than temporary impairment of an investment has occurred are the cost of the investment, development since the acquisition of the investment, the financial condition and operating results of the issuer, the long-term potential of the business of the issuer, and other factors generally pertinent to the valuation of investments. The Development Fund has relied on financial data of investees and, in many instances, on estimates by the management company and of the investee company as to the potential effect of future developments.

Our opinion on the reasonableness of these estimates is based on the testing performed during our audit procedures. Our procedures included assessing the risk assigned by the Development Fund to the loans and equity investments, evaluation of the past history of these amounts, discussion with management, and review of recent information regarding the loans and investments.

3. Identify any significant audit adjustments.

The following material audit adjustment was identified as a result of the audit procedures performed which was brought to the attention of, and corrected by, management:

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of North Dakota Development Fund, Inc., a component unit of the State of North Dakota, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated December 4, 2020.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s response to the findings identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses. North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

2020-001 - Preparation of Financial Statements

<u>Criteria:</u> Proper controls over financial reporting include the ability to prepare financial statements and accompanying notes to the financial statements that are materially correct.

<u>Condition:</u> The North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. does not have an internal control system designed to provide for the preparation of the financial statements being audited. As auditors, we were requested to draft the financial statements and accompanying notes to the financial statements. This circumstance is not unusual in an organization of your size. It is the responsibility of management and those charged with governance to make the decision whether to accept the degree of risk associated with this condition because of cost or other considerations.

<u>Cause</u>: The control deficiency could result in a misstatement to the presentation of the financial statements.

<u>Effect:</u> Inadequate controls over financial reporting of the North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. result in the more than remote likelihood that the North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. would not be able to draft the financial statements and accompanying notes to the financial statements that are materially correct without the assistance of the auditors.

<u>Recommendations:</u> While we recognize that this condition is not unusual for an organization your size, it is important that you be aware of this condition for financial reporting purposes. Management and the Board should continually be aware of the financial reporting of the North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. and changes in reporting requirements.

<u>Views of responsible officials:</u> Since it is not cost-effective for an organization our size to have staff to prepare audit-ready financial statements, we have chosen to hire Eide Bailly, a public accounting firm, to prepare the audit financial statements as part of their annual audit of North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.

North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. Schedule of Findings and Responses Year Ended June 30, 2020

2020-002 - Material Proposed Audit Adjustments

<u>Criteria:</u> A good system of internal accounting control should provide for the proper reconcilements of all general ledger accounts and adjustments of those accounts to the reconciled balances. This also includes accounting for transactions in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

<u>Condition:</u> We identified misstatements in North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s financial statements causing us to propose material audit adjustments.

<u>Cause:</u> North Dakota Development Fund, Inc. had an entirely new staff in the current year. The organization does not have a document that details transactions outside of the typical day to day activities.

<u>Effect:</u> Misstatements in the financial statements could result from inadequate controls over recording of transactions and it affects the North Dakota Development Fund, Inc.'s ability to detect misstatements to the financial statements.

<u>Recommendations:</u> The organization should develop a document that details various transactions made by the organization and includes supporting documentation to enable new staff the ability to easily understand what has occurred in the past and how to properly account for those transactions.

Views of responsible officials:

The organization accepts the recommendation of proposed audit adjustment and will prepare more thorough documentation of the North Dakota Development Fund's staff process to provide for a smoother transition of employees.

Legislative Support for North Dakota Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse at the ND Center for Nursing (Amendment to SB 2018)

"Due to a major shortage of health care staffing, the state's hospitals have a severe lack of available beds. Rising COVID-19 hospitalizations and high non-coronavirus admissions, some resulting from residents who deferred health care earlier in the pandemic, have caused a crunch on medical centers." Grand Forks Herald November 10, 2020.

If we learned anything from the COVID-19 pandemic, it is that North Dakota does **not** have a centralized, coordinated effort to provide for adequate nurse staff across the state. Nursing forms the foundation for the economic engine for North Dakota's communities. Currently, health care facilities spend MILLIONS of dollars contracting with out of state agencies to secure travel and contract nurses, huge opportunity for these dollars to stay in ND.

"Something needs to be done about retention of staff. Currently, I know of 7 ICU nurses that left their positions in Bismarck to take traveling positions to Fargo and 7 Fargo nurses that have left Fargo to go to Bismarck for different jobs. "Nurses are burning out due to chronic nursing shortages exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic." ND Nurse Administrator, 2020

"Nurses are heavily recruited by out-of-state recruiters. ND should provide more detailed resources promoting in-state jobs if they would like us to stay here." ND Nursing Student, 2020.



The North Dakota Center for Nursing requests an amendment to the ND Department of Commerce budget (SB 2018) to reallocate \$140,000 of the previously appropriated Nonresident Nurse Employment Recruitment Program funding for the establishment of the ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse and support the Culture of Excellence program at the ND Center for Nursing during the 2021-2023 biennium.

The ND Center for Nursing is uniquely positioned to develop and implement an innovative comprehensive strategy to address the state's nursing shortage in rural areas.

Two goals for ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse:

- **Recruit** nurse graduates and nurses for health care employment in **ND**.
- **Retain** nurses in **ND**, and in the workplace decrease staff turnover.





Key Components of ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse

- Will be based on extensive ND Center for Nursing data showing the need for increased recruitment and retention.
- Target all levels of nurses: Certified Nursing Assistants (CNA), Licensed Practical Nurses (LPN), Registered Nurses (RN), Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) and Nursing Faculty
- Is a unique opportunity for nursing education programs and employers to work together to keep ND students in North Dakota.

• Recruit nurse graduates and nurses for health care employment in ND.

Provide career services to nursing students by connecting them with local communities and employment opportunities. Connect employers and graduating nurses directly together to get them to the bedside in rural and urban ND. We will work to connect students to NNERP and other incentive programs to increase the uptake. In a recent survey of graduating nurses, 38% plan to work outside of North Dakota and they are heavily recruited from out of state agencies.

Develop a flexible staffing model through collaborative work with health care employers, graduating students, practicing nurses and education programs to provide increased opportunities for unique staffing patterns to better meet the needs of nurses (i.e., hours, shifts, travel vs. permanent).

- Retain nurses in their workplace and in ND and decrease turnover.
 - Increase retention of nurses through the ND Nursing Culture of Excellence Designation program which is designed to improve the workplace culture and support the formation of professional identity in nursing. In a recent survey of practicing nurses, 48% indicated that they plan to leave North Dakota.
- Will add a critical component to existing ND Department of Commerce workforce programs to fill the gap of direct recruitment and retention of nurses to ND.

Fiscal Note: Funding is needed to support the ND Center for Nursing infrastructure and to fully develop the ND Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse and the Culture of Excellence program. It is anticipated that these will be fully developed during the 2021-2023 biennium which will help provide sustained funding for all the ND Center for Nursing activities. A version of this plan was included in SB 2198 which failed in the Senate.

Total State Appropriations for 2021-2023= \$140,000 from carry-forward funding

The North Dakota Center for Nursing, a non-profit 501c3 organization, was developed in 2011 to represent over 20,000 nurses and over 40 nursing organizations across North Dakota. The mission of the North Dakota Center for Nursing is through collaboration guide ongoing development of a well-prepared and diverse nursing workforce to meet health care needs in North Dakota through research, education, recruitment and retention, advocacy and public policy. This policy agenda has been approved by our Board of Directors and is an official policy of the North Dakota Center for Nursing.

Ave Maria Village is a 100-bed faith-based skilled nursing and rehabilitation facility. This past year, we have faced the most severe challenges we have ever had in recruiting qualified professional nurses. For the first time in many years, we are contracting with a travel nurse service in order to adequately staff our facility. During a major COVID-19 outbreak in our facility and community this past fall, not only were we utilizing costly travel nurses, but we were also heavily dependent upon the state emergency nurse pool to meet the needs of our residents. No recruitment incentives, even a substantial sign-on bonus. were bringing results. To be frank, the future looks grim in terms of attracting nurses to rural areas of North Dakota outside of the four major cities. It is truly a crisis which will only get worse unless we take strong and proactive steps to improve the situation.

Provisions in SB 2198 will enable the North Dakota Center for Nursing to provide a centralized, coordinated effort to enhance nurse staffing across the state. The Center will also increase awareness of the crisis that health care providers find themselves in. They will provide an increased focus on recruiting nursing students in the state to stay and work in North Dakota, and attracting nurses from out of state, both nationally and internationally. In addition, they will develop a centralized contract nursing pool, and promote positive workplace cultures to enhance nurse retention.

We wish you the best as you advocate for this important piece of legislation. Please contact us if there is any way we can help in this effort.

I am writing today in support of SB 2198, which would lay our framework to help some of our staffing shortages and staffing crises in North Dakota. This is the North Dakota State Nurse Staffing Clearinghouse

My name is Tessa Johnson, and I am a registered nurse in North Dakota. I am the Executive Director of CountryHouse residence in Dickinson North Dakota. CountryHouse Residence is licensed as a basic care and memory care home. I also serve as the ND Center for Nursing as well as the NDNA President.

In many areas in nursing and healthcare around the state, we have faced staffing shortages at one point in time. During the last year during the COVID-19 crisis many of us had faced staffing crisis and staffing shortages like no other. I am an administrator of a long-term care facility and with staff members out with COVID-19 it was very difficult to staff our building at times.

Prior to COVID-19 we were often able to use local staffing agencies to fill needs. During this time, the demand is so high that even our local staffing agencies had a hard time helping us fill some of our shifts. There are many times or administrators, or leadership teams had to work in caregiver situations putting our work behind to the back burner for our residents to get the care we need. All these situations lead to burn out, exhaustion and leaving the practice.

There have also been times in which we have used agency that enjoy working for our company and with our residents. To keep them we must pay a large amount of money to buy their contract out which is very difficult for small facilities. This clearinghouse would give us the opportunity to help match these health care workers with a job they love.

As a nursing home administrator, I am speaking in favor of this staffing clearinghouse to help us mitigate this staffing crisis is in staffing shortages. We would be able to have help filling certified nursing assistant roles, nursing roles and other jobs in our buildings. We also would have to pay less recruitment fees and out-of-state contracts.

In addition, I feel like integrating the North Dakota nursing graduates into this program would help keep new graduate nurses in our state which is always a goal of ours.

If facilities are going to pay a higher amount for staffing through agency staff it would make more sense to keep the money in our state and keep it locally to benefit the nurses and other healthcare entities throughout our state.

Chairman Monson and members of the Committee. My name is Dave Kleppe, Program Manager of the North Dakota Procurement Technical Assistance Center.

The Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) program is hosted by the University of North Dakota's Center for Business Engagement and Development (led by Tiffany Ford) within the Nistler College of Business and Public Administration.

Federal program funding is provided by the Department of Defense's Defense Logistics Agency (DLA) with match funding provided by the North Dakota Department of Commerce (DOC).

The program was established in 1985 to expand the number of businesses capable of participating in government contracts. It is administered by DLA's Small Business Programs in cooperation with the states, local governments, and nonprofit organizations. Under the program, PTACs help businesses pursue and perform in contract awards with the Department of Defense, other federal agencies, state and local governments, and also subcontracting with government prime contractors.

Most of the assistance the PTACs provide is free. PTAC support to businesses includes:

- Assisting with state and federal registrations in procurement systems such as the federal System for Award Management (SAM)
- Creation of a bidmatch search profile unique to each business to help identify contracting and subcontracting opportunities
- Providing training on federal and state contracting and cybersecurity

PTACs have a local presence in all 50 states. The North Dakota PTAC currently operates with two full-time positions: a PTAC Advisor located in Fargo and a Program Manager located in the Entrepreneur Center at the Bank of North Dakota.

The federal PTAC program provides 60% federal funding with a 40% match requirement. For the past several years the required state match has been provided by the Department of Commerce from within their discretionary funds line. Without the required state match funds, the ND PTAC program will cease to exist. While the amount of the state's investment is small, the economic impact of this program is not. During state fiscal years 2019 and 2020, the ND PTAC assisted 373 small and large North Dakota businesses. Many of them have been successful in the government marketplace and have been awarded more than \$169 million in government contracts, meaning expansion and diversification of revenue streams, creating jobs in our state, and positively impacting our communities. Program return-on-investment is \$860 in contracts for every state dollar invested.

We have a very good working relationship with DOC. Without the matching funds DOC provides, there would be no North Dakota PTAC program to assist our businesses in navigating the complex path involved with government contracting. Thank you Mr. Chairman and committee members for your time and for your support of the North Dakota PTAC.

Section 12 provides an exemption for the UAS program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the operating expenses of this program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$2.25 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 13 provides an exemption for the enhanced use lease grant program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$3 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 14 provides an exemption to continue unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the early childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$1.5 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 15 provides an exemption to continue \$320,000 of the \$500,000 appropriated from the general fund for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program for the 2019-21 biennium into the 2021-23 biennium. Section 15 provides an exemption for the enhanced use lease grant program to continue any unexpended 2019-21 biennium funds for the program into the 2021-23 biennium. A total of \$3 million was appropriated from the general fund to the department for this purpose for the 2019-21 biennium.

Section 16 provides an exemption to continue \$320,000 of the \$500,000 appropriated from the general fund for the nonresident nurse employment recruitment program for the 2019-21 biennium into the 2021-23 biennium. In addition to the program eligibility guidelines established for the 2019-21 biennium, the Department of Commerce is required to provide funding for the program to eligible nursing students in the state who have not been employed by a health care provider on a full-time basis in the year preceding the grant award.

A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.
- 3. The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section. subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.
- 4. The city may not use city or state funds raised or provided under this section for costs associated with administering the rural growth incentive city. The department shall provide the rural growth incentive city with training to assist the city in expanding primary sector businesses, locating

new businesses, and working with state economic development programs."

The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that

- provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.
- The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.
- 4. The city may not use city or state funds raised or provided under this section for costs associated with administering the rural growth incentive city. The department shall provide the rural growth incentive city with training to assist the city in expanding primary sector businesses, locating new businesses, and working with state economic development programs."

The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.
- 3. The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.



The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.
- The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primarysector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.

This funding is considered a one-time funding item. The department of commerce shall request an appropriation from the sixty-eighth legislative assembly to repay any outstanding loan authorized in this section. To qualify for a grant under this program, an organization must have:

- Secured a loan or investment under the legacy infrastructure loan fund program established in House Bill No. 1425 as approved by the sixty-seventh legislative assembly for construction of an event and entertainment venue focused on highlighting North Dakota history and attractions:
- 2. Obtained \$5,000,000 of matching funds from nonstate sources; and
- 3. Entered a lease with the state of North Dakota for use of land for the event and entertainment venue.

Grant funds awarded may be used only for the operating costs of an event and entertainment venue used to promote the expansion of tourism and economic development and growth in the state."

The department of commerce shall establish additional eligibility requirements for the program. The following organizations are ineligible for a grant under this subsection:

- The department shall manage and administer the rural growth incentive program. A city with a population of less than two thousand five hundred may apply to the department to be designated as a rural growth incentive city. A rural growth incentive city may be eligible for a loan, grant, or both under this section.
- 2. The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the loan and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for loan matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan under this section, subject to the availability of funds, the state shall make a loan to the city in an amount not less than twenty-five

thousand dollars and not more than seventy-five thousand dollars. The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.

- The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.
- 4. The city may not use city or state funds raised or provided under this section for costs associated with administering the rural growth incentive city. The department shall provide the rural growth incentive city with training to assist the city in expanding primary sector businesses, locating new businesses, and working with state economic development programs."

SECTION 20. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - NORTHERN PLAINS UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM TEST SITE. It is the intent of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly that the northern plains unmanned aircraft system test site maximize earned revenue to the extent possible while operating and conducting business of the test site.

SECTION 21. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DATA STORAGE.

During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying data storage by state entities. The study must include input from the information technology department, North Dakota university system, and kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council. The study must consider data security, geographical locations of storage, geographical locations of corporate contractors, state and federal laws that may affect North Dakota data, ownership and control of data storage, and current and estimated data storage costs related to cloud-based, out-of-state data storage of North Dakota state and local government data. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

SECTION 22. EMERGENCY. Funding appropriated from the federal coronavirus relief fund in section 1 and identified in sections 2 and 9 of this Act is declared to be an emergency measure."

- Secured a loan or investment under the legacy infrastructure loan fund program established in House Bill
 No. 1425 as approved by the 67th Legislative Assembly for construction of an event and entertainment venue
 focused on highlighting North Dakota history and attractions;
- Obtained \$5 million of matching funds from nonstate sources; and
- Entered a lease with the State of North Dakota for use of land for the event and entertainment venue.

Grant funds awarded may be used only for the operating costs of an event and entertainment venue used to promote the expansion of tourism and economic development and growth in the state. The department is required to request a deficiency appropriation from the 68th Legislative Assembly to repay any outstanding loan related to this program.

The House provided a general fund appropriation for this item. The Senate did not provide funding for this item.

The House approved \$6.9 million for tourism marketing and branding operating expenses and \$1 million for technical skills training grants from the general fund. The Senate approved \$7 million for tourism marketing and branding operating expenses and \$1 million for technical skills training grants from the general fund.

The Conference Committee version includes the transfer of 1 FTE information technology position and related funding to the Information Technology Department (ITD) for the information technology unification initiative, the same as the Senate. The House amendments did not transfer the FTE position to ITD.

The department of commerce shall request an appropriation from the sixty-eighth legislative assembly to repay any outstanding loan authorized in this section. To qualify for a grant under this program, an organization must have:

- Secured a loan or qualified investment from the state investment board through the provisions established in House Bill No. 1425 as approved by the sixty-seventh legislative assembly for construction of an event and entertainment venue focused on highlighting North Dakota history and attractions;
- 2. Obtained \$5,000,000 of matching funds from nonstate sources; and
- 3. Entered a lease with the state of North Dakota for use of land for the event and entertainment venue.

Grant funds awarded may be used only for the operating costs of an event and entertainment venue used to promote the expansion of tourism and economic development and growth in the state."

 - d. Organizations that only offer guided services and tours of their attraction.

The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.

- 3. The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.
- 4. The city may not use city or state funds raised or provided under this section for costs associated with administering the rural growth incentive city. The department shall provide the rural growth incentive city with training to assist the city in expanding primary sector businesses, locating new businesses, and working with state economic development programs."

SECTION 20. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - NORTHERN PLAINS UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM TEST SITE. It is the intent of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly that the northern plains unmanned aircraft system test site maximize earned revenue to the extent possible while operating and conducting business of the test site.

SECTION 21. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DATA STORAGE.

During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying data storage by state entities. The study must include input from the information technology department, North Dakota university system, and kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council. The study must consider data security, geographical locations of storage, geographical locations of corporate contractors, state and federal laws that may affect North Dakota data, ownership and control of data storage, and current and estimated data storage costs related to cloud-based, out-of-state data storage of North Dakota state and local government data. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

SECTION 22. EMERGENCY. The \$12,000,000 appropriated from the federal coronavirus relief fund, of which \$6,565,432 is in the operating expenses line item and \$5,434,568 is in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in sections 2 and 9, and the \$100,000 appropriated from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in section 2 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure."

Department of Commerce budget. The House and Senate have added \$1.5 million for this program in the Department of Human Services budget relating to the changes in House Bill No. 1466.

- ³ Funding of \$50,000 is added from the general fund for rural health care grants to provide a total of \$250,000 from the general fund, the same as the House. The Senate provided \$200,000 from the general fund. A separate section is added to the bill requiring a dollar-for-dollar match.
- ⁴ Funding of \$600,000 from the general fund, removed by the Senate, is restored to provide a total of \$2.15 million from the general fund in the discretionary funds line item, the same as the base level and as provided by the House. The Senate provided a total of \$1.55 million.

The House provided a general fund appropriation for this item. The Senate did not provide funding for this item.

- ⁷ One-time funding of \$1.5 million is added from the strategic investment and improvements fund to provide a job development and economic growth grant directly to the Cavalier County Job Development Authority, which is an organization dedicated to promoting job development and economic growth in the state, the same as provided by the House.
- ⁸ One-time funding of \$1.5 million is added from the strategic investment and improvements fund to provide a workforce safety grant directly to the North Dakota Safety Council, which is an organization that provides workforce safety, the same as provided by the House.
- ⁹ One-time funding of \$8 million, of which \$7 million is for tourism marketing and branding initiatives and \$1 million is for technical skills training grants, is removed from the general fund and added from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund. The House approved \$6.9 million for tourism marketing and branding operating expenses and \$1 million for technical skills training grants from the general fund. The Senate approved \$7 million for tourism marketing and branding operating expenses and \$1 million for technical skills training grants from the general fund.

- ¹⁰ One-time funding of \$4 million is added from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund, of which \$2 million is for travel agent and tour operator emergency resiliency grants and \$2 million is for event center emergency resiliency grants. A separate section of the bill is added to identify all funding from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund. Funding from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund is declared an emergency measure.
- ¹¹ One-time funding of \$565,432 is added from the general fund for a tourism transportation improvement grant to be provided directly to the Theodore Roosevelt Medora Foundation, which is an organization dedicated to preserving and promoting a historic, tourism destination North Dakota city, to provide a total of \$1,000,000 for the tourism transportation improvement grant program, including \$434,568 from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund.

The Conference Committee version includes the transfer of 1 FTE information technology position and related funding to the Information Technology Department (ITD) for the information technology unification initiative, the same as the Senate. The House amendments did not transfer the FTE position to ITD.



This amendment also:

- Amends a section that provides an exemption for the \$28 million 2017-19 biennium supplemental appropriation for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system (UAS) program that was continued into the 2019-21 biennium to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The Department of Commerce may provide grants of up to \$5 million from this funding to the Department of Transportation for infrastructure construction of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program during the 2021-23 biennium. This section was included by the House. The Senate authorized the Department of Commerce to provide a grant of up to \$28 million to the Department of Transportation.
- Amends a section identifying \$29 million provided from the strategic investment and improvements fund in Section 1, the same as provided by the House. The Senate provided a total of \$26 million.
- Adds a section to amend North Dakota Century Code Section 54-34.3-13 to remove the requirement that
 businesses be "primary sector" businesses to qualify for the rural growth incentive program, which is
 administered by the North Dakota Development Fund in the rural growth incentive fund. The House included
 this section.
- Removes a section added by the Senate that provided an exemption to the Department of Commerce to
 continue 2019-21 biennium funding for the early childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. The
 House also removed this section. The Department of Commerce anticipates \$565,432 related to the early
 childhood education grant program will not be used and will be canceled at the end of the 2019-21 biennium.
 This amount is included in the 2021-23 biennium general fund beginning balance.
- Amends a section to require of the 2019-21 biennium funding in the discretionary funds line item the
 Department of Commerce is authorized to continue into the 2021-23 biennium, \$200,000 must be used retrain
 up to 10 displaced energy industry workers to enhance programmer development and engineering skills. The
 Senate and House authorized the exemption for the discretionary funds line time but did not previously provide
 a designation for the \$200,000.
- Adds a section of legislative intent that the Northern Plains UAS Test Site maximize earned revenue when
 possible. The House included this section.
- Adds a section providing for a Legislative Management study of data storage by state entities. The House included this section.
- Declares \$12 million appropriated from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund for various programs and \$100,000 from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant to be an emergency measure.

The department of commerce may borrow from the Bank of North Dakota, the sum of \$5,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, which is appropriated to the department of commerce in the grants line item in section 1 of this Act for the purpose of providing a grant to an organization dedicated to expanding economic development, growth, and diversification. This funding is considered a one-time funding item. The department of commerce shall request an appropriation from the sixty-eighth legislative assembly to repay any outstanding loan authorized in this section. To qualify for a grant under this program, an organization must have:

- Secured a loan or qualified investment from the state investment board through the provisions established in House Bill No. 1425 as approved by the sixty-seventh legislative assembly for construction of an event and entertainment venue focused on highlighting North Dakota history and attractions;
- 2. Obtained \$5,000,000 of matching funds from nonstate sources; and
- Entered a lease with the state of North Dakota for use of land for the event and entertainment venue.

Grant funds awarded may be used only for the operating costs of an event and entertainment venue used to promote the expansion of tourism and economic development and growth in the state."

The department of commerce shall establish guidelines for awarding funding under this section. This funding is considered a one-time funding item and is available for the following:

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- \$7,000,000 for tourism marketing and branding initiatives, of which \$6,565,432 is for tourism marketing and branding operating expenses and \$434,568 is for the tourism transportation improvement grant program for a grant to be provided to an organization dedicated to preserving and promoting a historic, tourism destination North Dakota city.
- 2. \$1,000,000 for technical skills training grants.
- 3. \$2,000,000 for travel agent and tour operator emergency resiliency grants. Grants may be awarded only to travel agents that book commission-based travel for private individuals or companies, tour companies that schedule tour details and itineraries in North Dakota, or transportation companies providing transportation services to tour planners for tours originating in North Dakota or operators bringing tours into North Dakota. The department of commerce shall establish additional eligibility requirements for the program. The following organizations are ineligible for a grant under this subsection:
 - National companies that provide travel services to individuals in North Dakota but do not employ at least one individual in the state;
 - b. Corporations with staff dedicated to purchasing and arranging travel for employees;
 - Military-based travel agents or other individuals employed by government entities; and
 - Organizations that only offer guided services and tours of their attraction.
- 4. \$2,000,000 for event center emergency resiliency grants."

"SECTION 12. AMENDMENT. Section 54-34.3-13 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-34.3-13. Rural growth incentive program.

- The department shall manage and administer the rural growth incentive program. A city with a population of less than two thousand five hundred may apply to the department to be designated as a rural growth incentive city. A rural growth incentive city may be eligible for a loan, grant, or both under this section.
- 2. The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the loan and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for loan matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan under this section, subject to the availability of funds, the state shall make a loan to the city in an amount not less than twenty-five thousand dollars and not more than seventy-five thousand dollars. The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or

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expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.

- The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.
- 4. The city may not use city or state funds raised or provided under this section for costs associated with administering the rural growth incentive city. The department shall provide the rural growth incentive city with training to assist the city in expanding primary sector businesses, locating new businesses, and working with state economic development programs."

SECTION 20. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - NORTHERN PLAINS UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM TEST SITE. It is the intent of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly that the northern plains unmanned aircraft system test site maximize earned revenue to the extent possible while operating and conducting business of the test site.

SECTION 21. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DATA STORAGE.During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying data

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storage by state entities. The study must include input from the information technology department, North Dakota university system, and kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council. The study must consider data security, geographical locations of storage, geographical locations of corporate contractors, state and federal laws that may affect North Dakota data, ownership and control of data storage, and current and estimated data storage costs related to cloud-based, out-of-state data storage of North Dakota state and local government data. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

SECTION 22. EMERGENCY. The \$12,000,000 appropriated from the federal coronavirus relief fund, of which \$6,565,432 is in the operating expenses line item and \$5,434,568 is in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in sections 2 and 9, and the \$100,000 appropriated from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in section 2 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure."

- ¹⁰ One-time funding of \$4 million is added from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund, of which \$2 million is for travel agent and tour operator emergency resiliency grants and \$2 million is for event center emergency resiliency grants. A separate section of the bill is added to identify all funding from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund. Funding from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund is declared an emergency measure.

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The Conference Committee version includes the transfer of 1 FTE information technology position and related funding to the Information Technology Department (ITD) for the information technology unification initiative, the same as the Senate. The House amendments did not transfer the FTE position to ITD.

This amendment also:

- Amends a section that provides an exemption for the \$28 million 2017-19 biennium supplemental appropriation for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system (UAS) program that was continued into the 2019-21 biennium to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The Department of Commerce may provide grants of up to \$5 million from this funding to the Department of Transportation for infrastructure construction of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program during the 2021-23 biennium. This section was included by the House. The Senate authorized the Department of Commerce to provide a grant of up to \$28 million to the Department of Transportation.
- Amends a section identifying \$29 million provided from the strategic investment and improvements fund in Section 1, the same as provided by the House. The Senate provided a total of \$26 million.
- Adds a section to amend North Dakota Century Code Section 54-34.3-13 to remove
 the requirement that businesses be "primary sector" businesses to qualify for the
 rural growth incentive program, which is administered by the North Dakota
 Development Fund in the rural growth incentive fund. The House included this
 section.
- Removes a section added by the Senate that provided an exemption to the
 Department of Commerce to continue 2019-21 biennium funding for the early
 childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. The House also removed
 this section. The Department of Commerce anticipates \$565,432 related to the early
 childhood education grant program will not be used and will be canceled at the end
 of the 2019-21 biennium. This amount is included in the 2021-23 biennium general
 fund beginning balance.
- Amends a section to require of the 2019-21 biennium funding in the discretionary funds line item the Department of Commerce is authorized to continue into the 2021-23 biennium, \$200,000 must be used retrain up to 10 displaced energy industry workers to enhance programmer development and engineering skills. - Declares \$12 million appropriated from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund for various programs and \$100,000 from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant to be an emergency measure.

The department of commerce shall request an appropriation from the sixty-eighth legislative assembly to repay any outstanding loan authorized in this section. To qualify for a grant under this program, an organization must have:

- Secured a loan or investment under the legacy infrastructure loan fund program established in House Bill No. 1425 as approved by the sixty-seventh legislative assembly for construction of an event and entertainment venue focused on highlighting North Dakota history and attractions;
- 2. Obtained \$5,000,000 of matching funds from nonstate sources; and
- 3. Entered a lease with the state of North Dakota for use of land for the event and entertainment venue.

Grant funds awarded may be used only for the operating costs of an event and entertainment venue used to promote the expansion of tourism and economic development and growth in the state."

Grants may be awarded only to travel agents that book commission-based travel for private individuals or companies, tour companies that schedule tour details and itineraries in North Dakota, or transportation companies providing transportation services to tour planners for tours originating in North Dakota or operators bringing tours into North Dakota. The department of commerce shall establish additional eligibility requirements for the program. The following organizations are ineligible for a grant under this subsection:
 - a. National companies that provide travel services to individuals in North Dakota but do not employ at least one individual in the state;
 - b. Corporations with staff dedicated to purchasing and arranging travel for employees;
 - Military-based travel agents or other individuals employed by government entities; and
 - d. Organizations that offer guided services and tours.
- 4. \$2,000,000 for event center emergency resiliency grants."

The source of city funds used for loan matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan under this section, subject to the availability of funds, the state shall make a loan to the city in an amount not less than twenty-five

thousand dollars and not more than seventy-five thousand dollars. The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.

- The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.
- 4. The city may not use city or state funds raised or provided under this section for costs associated with administering the rural growth incentive city. The department shall provide the rural growth incentive city with training to assist the city in expanding primary sector businesses, locating new businesses, and working with state economic development programs."

SECTION 20. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - NORTHERN PLAINS UNMANNED

AIRCRAFT SYSTEM TEST SITE. It is the intent of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly that the northern plains unmanned aircraft system test site maximize earned revenue to the extent possible while operating and conducting business of the test site.

SECTION 21. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DATA STORAGE.

During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying data storage by state entities. The study must include input from the information technology department, North Dakota university system, and kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council. The study must consider data security, geographical locations of storage, geographical locations of corporate contractors, state and federal laws that may affect North Dakota data, ownership and control of data storage, and current and estimated data storage costs related to cloud-based, out-of-state data storage of North Dakota state and local government data. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

SECTION 22. EMERGENCY. Funding appropriated from the federal coronavirus relief fund in section 1 and identified in sections 2 and 9 of this Act is declared to be an emergency measure."

The Conference Committee version includes the transfer of 1 FTE information technology position and related funding to the Information Technology Department (ITD) for the information technology unification initiative, the same as the Senate. Grants may be awarded only to travel agents that book commission-based travel for private individuals or companies, tour companies that schedule tour details and itineraries in North Dakota, or transportation companies providing transportation services to tour planners for tours originating in North Dakota or operators bringing tours into North Dakota. The department of commerce shall establish additional eligibility requirements for the program. The following organizations are ineligible for a grant under this subsection:
 - a. National companies that provide travel services to individuals in North Dakota but do not employ at least one individual in the state;
 - Corporations with staff dedicated to purchasing and arranging travel for employees;



- Military-based travel agents or other individuals employed by government entities; and
- d. Organizations that only offer guided services and tours of their attraction.
- 4. \$2,000,000 for event center emergency resiliency grants."

"SECTION 11. AMENDMENT. Section 54-34.3-13 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-34.3-13. Rural growth incentive program.

- The department shall manage and administer the rural growth incentive program. A rural growth incentive city may be eligible for a loan, grant, or both under this section.
- The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the loan and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for loan matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan under this section, subject to the availability of funds, the state shall make a loan to the city in an amount not less than twenty-five thousand dollars and not more than seventy-five thousand dollars. The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.
- 3. The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a

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business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.

- 4. The city may not use city or state funds raised or provided under this section for costs associated with administering the rural growth incentive city. The department shall provide the rural growth incentive city with training to assist the city in expanding primary sector businesses, locating new businesses, and working with state economic development programs."

The study must consider data security, geographical locations of storage, geographical locations of corporate contractors, state and federal laws that may affect North Dakota data, ownership and control of data storage, and current and estimated data storage costs related to cloud-based, out-of-state data storage of North Dakota state and local government data. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

SECTION 21. EMERGENCY. The \$12,000,000 appropriated from the federal coronavirus relief fund, of which \$6,565,432 is in the operating expenses line item and \$5,434,568 is in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in sections 2 and 8, and the \$100,000 appropriated from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in section 2 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure."

The Conference Committee version:

- Includes the transfer of 1 FTE information technology position and related funding to the Information Technology Department (ITD) for the information technology unification initiative, the same as the Senate. The House amendments did not transfer the FTE position to ITD.
- Does not include funding for an economic development, growth, and diversification grant program for providing
 grants for the operating costs of an event and entertainment venue used to promote the expansion of tourism
 and economic development and growth in the state. The House added a \$5 million general fund appropriation
 for this program.

This amendment also:

- Amends a section that provides an exemption for the \$28 million 2017-19 biennium supplemental appropriation for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system (UAS) program that was continued into the 2019-21 biennium to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The Department of Commerce may provide grants of up to \$5 million from this funding to the Department of Transportation for infrastructure construction of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program during the 2021-23 biennium. This section was included by the House. The Senate authorized the Department of Commerce to provide a grant of up to \$28 million to the Department of Transportation.
- Amends a section identifying \$29 million provided from the strategic investment and improvements fund in Section 1, the same as provided by the House. The Senate provided a total of \$26 million.
- Adds a section to amend North Dakota Century Code Section 54-34.3-13 to remove the requirement that businesses be "primary sector" businesses to qualify for the rural growth incentive program, which is administered by the North Dakota Development Fund in the rural growth incentive fund. The House included this section.
- Removes a section added by the Senate that provided an exemption to the Department of Commerce to continue 2019-21 biennium funding for the early childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. The House also removed this section. The Department of Commerce anticipates \$565,432 related to the early childhood education grant program will not be used and will be canceled at the end of the 2019-21 biennium. This amount is included in the 2021-23 biennium general fund beginning balance.
- Amends a section to require of the 2019-21 biennium funding in the discretionary funds line item the Department of Commerce is authorized to continue into the 2021-23 biennium, \$200,000 must be used retrain up to 10 displaced energy industry workers to enhance programmer development and engineering skills. The Senate and House authorized the exemption for the discretionary funds line time but did not previously provide a designation for the \$200,000.
- Adds a section of legislative intent that the Northern Plains UAS Test Site maximize earned revenue when
 possible. The House included this section.
- Adds a section providing for a Legislative Management study of data storage by state entities. The House included this section.
- Declares \$12 million appropriated from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund for various programs and \$100,000 from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant to be an emergency measure.

The department of commerce shall establish guidelines for awarding funding under this section. This funding is considered a one-time funding item and is available for the following:

- \$7,000,000 for tourism marketing and branding initiatives, of which \$6,565,432 is for tourism marketing and branding operating expenses and \$434,568 is for the tourism transportation improvement grant program for a grant to be provided to an organization dedicated to preserving and promoting a historic, tourism destination North Dakota city.
- 2. \$1,000,000 for technical skills training grants.
- 3. \$2,000,000 for travel agent and tour operator emergency resiliency grants. Grants may be awarded only to travel agents that book commission-based travel for private individuals or companies, tour companies that schedule tour details and itineraries in North Dakota, or transportation companies providing transportation services to tour planners for tours originating in North Dakota or operators bringing tours into North Dakota. The department of commerce shall establish additional eligibility requirements for the program. The following organizations are ineligible for a grant under this subsection:
 - National companies that provide travel services to individuals in North Dakota but do not employ at least one individual in the state;
 - b. Corporations with staff dedicated to purchasing and arranging travel for employees;
 - Military-based travel agents or other individuals employed by government entities; and

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 Organizations that only offer guided services and tours of their attraction.

4. \$2,000,000 for event center emergency resiliency grants."

"SECTION 11. AMENDMENT. Section 54-34.3-13 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-34.3-13. Rural growth incentive program.

- The department shall manage and administer the rural growth incentive program. A city with a population of less than two thousand five hundred may apply to the department to be designated as a rural growth incentive city. A rural growth incentive city may be eligible for a loan, grant, or both under this section.
- The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the loan and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for loan matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a loan under this section, subject to the availability of funds, the state shall make a loan to the city in an amount not less than twenty-five thousand dollars and not more than seventy-five thousand dollars. The department shall establish the amount of the interest rate for loans provided to a city under this subsection. The funding source of the state loan is the North Dakota development fund. The city shall distribute the city and state funds to qualifying new or expanded primary sector businesses in the city. A qualifying business in the city includes a business that provides essential services to the city. For purposes of this subsection, a business that provides essential services does not include a public utility. The governing body of the city determines whether a new or expanded primary sector business qualifies for funding, and the director of the department determines whether a business that provides essential services to the city qualifies for funding. The state shall distribute a loan to a rural growth incentive city once the city establishes the city has chosen a specified qualified business to receive funding.
- The department shall designate an applicant city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant if the city raises funds in the amount of a dollar-for-dollar match for the amount requested in the grant application and meets any additional program requirements provided by rule. The source of city funds used for grant matching funds may be any combination of public and private funds. If the department designates a city as a rural growth incentive city eligible for a grant under this section, subject to availability of funds, the state shall make a grant to the city in an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. The recipient rural growth incentive city shall use the grant money received to conduct a feasibility study for the location of a new business, including an expansion of a business with the primary place of business outside the rural growth incentive city. The business under this subsection is not limited to primary sector businesses. The funding source of the state grant is the North Dakota development fund. Total grants awarded by the department under this subsection may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars per biennium.

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4. The city may not use city or state funds raised or provided under this section for costs associated with administering the rural growth incentive city. The department shall provide the rural growth incentive city with training to assist the city in expanding primary sector businesses, locating new businesses, and working with state economic development programs."

SECTION 19. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - NORTHERN PLAINS UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM TEST SITE. It is the intent of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly that the northern plains unmanned aircraft system test site maximize earned revenue to the extent possible while operating and conducting business of the test site.

SECTION 20. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DATA STORAGE.

During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying data storage by state entities. The study must include input from the information technology department, North Dakota university system, and kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council. The study must consider data security, geographical locations of storage, geographical locations of corporate contractors, state and federal laws that may affect North Dakota data, ownership and control of data storage, and current and estimated data storage costs related to cloud-based, out-of-state data storage of North Dakota state and local government data. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

SECTION 21. EMERGENCY. The \$12,000,000 appropriated from the federal coronavirus relief fund, of which \$6,565,432 is in the operating expenses line item and \$5,434,568 is in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in sections 2 and 8, and the \$100,000 appropriated from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant in the grants line item in section 1 and identified in section 2 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure."

The Conference Committee version:

- Includes the transfer of 1 FTE information technology position and related funding to the Information Technology Department (ITD) for the information technology unification initiative, the same as the Senate. The House amendments did not transfer the FTE position to ITD.
- Does not include funding for an economic development, growth, and diversification
 grant program for providing grants for the operating costs of an event and
 entertainment venue used to promote the expansion of tourism and economic
 development and growth in the state. The House added a \$5 million general fund
 appropriation for this program.

This amendment also:

- Amends a section that provides an exemption for the \$28 million 2017-19 biennium supplemental appropriation for the beyond visual line of sight unmanned aircraft system (UAS) program that was continued into the 2019-21 biennium to continue into the 2021-23 biennium. The Department of Commerce may provide grants of up to \$5 million from this funding to the Department of Transportation for infrastructure construction of the beyond visual line of sight UAS program during the 2021-23 biennium. This section was included by the House. The Senate authorized the Department of Commerce to provide a grant of up to \$28 million to the Department of Transportation.
- Amends a section identifying \$29 million provided from the strategic investment and improvements fund in Section 1, the same as provided by the House. The Senate provided a total of \$26 million.
- Adds a section to amend North Dakota Century Code Section 54-34.3-13 to remove the requirement that businesses be "primary sector" businesses to qualify for the rural growth incentive program, which is administered by the North Dakota Development Fund in the rural growth incentive fund. The House included this section.
- Removes a section added by the Senate that provided an exemption to the
 Department of Commerce to continue 2019-21 biennium funding for the early
 childhood education program into the 2021-23 biennium. The House also removed
 this section. The Department of Commerce anticipates \$565,432 related to the early
 childhood education grant program will not be used and will be canceled at the end
 of the 2019-21 biennium. This amount is included in the 2021-23 biennium general
 fund beginning balance.

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- Amends a section to require of the 2019-21 biennium funding in the discretionary funds line item the Department of Commerce is authorized to continue into the 2021-23 biennium, \$200,000 must be used retrain up to 10 displaced energy industry workers to enhance programmer development and engineering skills. The Senate and House authorized the exemption for the discretionary funds line time but did not previously provide a designation for the \$200,000.
- Adds a section of legislative intent that the Northern Plains UAS Test Site maximize earned revenue when possible. The House included this section.
- Adds a section providing for a Legislative Management study of data storage by state entities. The House included this section.
- Declares \$12 million appropriated from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund for various programs and \$100,000 from the general fund for a motion picture production and recruitment grant to be an emergency measure.

This funding is considered a one-time funding item.

Section 9 identifies \$1 million from the general fund in Section 1 is for providing grants to an organization dedicated to expanding workforce opportunities, training, and education related to the beyond visual line of sight UAS industry, which the Department of Commerce may provide only to the extent the organization provides \$1 of matching funds from private or other public sources for each \$1 provided by the department during the 2021-23 biennium.
