SB 2289 – Creation of a North Dakota Scholarship Hearing scheduled: February 3, 2021 | 9:00 am Senate Education Committee, Sen. Schaible, Chair

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, for the record, I'm Erin Oban, senator for Bismarck's District 35. I'm here to introduce, discuss, and answer questions on SB 2289, a bill that would essentially rewrite our current North Dakota high school academic and CTE scholarship programs and align it with our state's Choice Ready Framework, a state plan to assist educators to ensure all students successfully depart high school possessing the essential skills necessary to be ready for post-secondary, the workforce, and/or the military. This tool was developed by educators in partnership with ND DPI following the passage of the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and is used to measure school growth in high schools. If you are interested in learning more about the Choice Ready Framework, you can visit ND DPI's website. For purposes of the discussion on this bill, I am including this Choice Ready Framework [ATTACHMENT A] so you can see its direct connection to both the language of and purpose for this bill.

To date, our state's academic and CTE scholarship programs have been effective incentives for students and their families to work hard, choose specific pathways or enroll in upper-level courses, and focus on high achievement in the areas of academics or CTE. For that reason, it makes great sense to align the financial incentives offered by our state to what we expect from our students in order to graduate.

But, Mr. Chairman, with the passage of ESSA at the federal level and the development of the Choice Ready Framework here at the state level, those expectations for high school graduates has changed. It makes great sense to align our state's high school scholarship program with our state's high school choice ready framework.

I will try to go over the changes this bill proposes in a way that's easier to understand than the sections and dates appear.

For starters, if this bill passes and is signed into law, it would not go into effect until Aug 1, 2021. That means this option – the North Dakota scholarship, aligned to the Choice Ready Framework – would not be available to any qualifying student until they graduate in May 2022 (2021-22 school year graduates). At that point, a student could qualify for the existing academic or CTE scholarship OR the new North Dakota scholarship should they meet those requirements.

On July 31, 2024 (graduating class of 2023-24), the academic and CTE scholarships would then sunset. The goal is, by the time the class of 2024-25 graduates, for the only remaining scholarship program to be this newly created North Dakota scholarship aligned to the Choice Ready Framework.

That is what Sections 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 of the bill address – the effective dates of this new scholarship program and the repeals of the academic and CTE scholarship programs. The reason for the various dates is to make sure we don't pull the rug out from any current students who have already begun to dedicate their efforts to receiving the academic or CTE scholarships in current law.

So, if you're like me and like to follow along and mark in your bill what is being proposed:

- Section 1 Makes this newly proposed "North Dakota scholarship" effective for the graduating class of 2022.
- Section 2, 5, 7, 9, 10, and 11 Sets and sunsets all the requirements and eligibility for the academic and CTE scholarships on July 31, 2024, effective starting with the class of 2025.
- Section 3 We'll review in a minute.
- Section 4, 6, 8 Adds in language for the newly proposed "North Dakota scholarship" to make it effective and students to be eligible.

The actual substance of the scholarship program, the creation of this North Dakota scholarship, is Section 3. If you go through the program, line by line, and compare it to that Choice Ready Framework, the language will look very familiar. That's exactly the point.

Let's do this, Mr. Chairman, to assure the committee of that overlap. If you'll go back to your bill:

- Lines 4-6 and 10-22: align to the "Essential Skills" in Choice Ready Framework
- Lines 7-9 and Lines 23-24: align to all 3 Post-Secondary Ready, Workforce Ready, and Military Ready in the Choice Ready Framework with the addition of the higher GPA to qualify for a scholarship
- Lines 25 through Line 6 on Page 3 (or (a) of subsection 6): align to a student who is considered "Post-Secondary Ready" in the Choice Ready Framework. That could be compared to what exists with our current academic scholarship requirements.
- Continuing on Page 3, Line 7 through Line 3 on Page 4 (or **(b)** of subsection 6): align to a student who is considered "Workforce Ready" in the Choice Ready Framework, similar to our existing CTE scholarship.
- And lastly, Page 4, Lines 4-12 (or (c) of subsection 6): creates a brand new opportunity for a student to qualify for a scholarship if that student excels at a higher level in the area of graduating "Military Ready."
- Add extra bullet to emphasize that students must meet 2 of the 3 to get the scholarship (postsecondary, workforce, military)

If graduates hit the marks outlined in 2 of 3 of the paths of the Choice Ready Framework at the level of the *existing* requirements to earn an academic or CTE scholarship (GPA, test scores, etc.), they will qualify for the North Dakota scholarship. So, this isn't about increasing the threshold from earning the scholarship but rather aligning the incentive for a scholarship with our state's efforts to graduate our students with the essential skills and choice ready for the college, career, or the military.

The fiscal note on the bill provides an estimate of 85 new students potentially qualifying with the addition of this North Dakota scholarship should the bill pass.

Mr. Chairman, that concludes the contents of the bill and the reasons for bringing it forward. I would be happy to answer questions, but it may be helpful to hear from Jim Upgren from the ND Department of Public Instruction beforehand.

Thank you for the time, and I would ask for your consideration of a "Do Pass" recommendation on SB 2289.

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NORTH DAKOTA CHOICE READY

The North Dakota CHOICE READY framework is a tool to assist educators to ensure all students successfully depart high school possessing the ESSENTIAL SKILLS necessary to be ready for life. The journey begins by ensuring students leave having the ESSENTIAL SKILLS to be successful for whichever path they choose. Students shall then strive to be POST-SECONDARY READY, WORFORCE READY, and/or MILITARY READY.



ESSENTIAL SKILLS

Earn a North Dakota high school diploma

Complete a 9-week Career Education Course/Individual Counseling (15.1-21-18), Financial Literacy (15.1-21-21), and pass ND Civics Test (15.1-21-27) and four or more additional indicators:

- 25 hours of Community Service
- 95% Attendance (not counting school related absences)
- Career Exploration Experience
- Two or more years in organized Co-Curricular Activities
- Two or more years in organized Extra-Curricular Activities
- Successfully complete a Capstone Project
- Successfully complete an on-line learning course
- Demonstrate competency in 21st Century Skills

Students shall then complete two or more of the CHOICE READY components below.

TESTIMONY ON SB 2289 SENATE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Chairman Schaible and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jim Upgren, Assistant Director in the Office of School Approval and Opportunity with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in support of SB 2289.

When the North Dakota Academic and CTE Scholarship program was established in 2009, the requirements of each scholarship were tied to the goal of students being college ready. While there have been minor revisions to the requirements over the years, the qualifications for the scholarship remain much as they were in 2009- a checklist of items related to preparation for college. Schools and students have planned class schedules and testing around meeting the scholarship requirements. A lot has changed in the past decade since 2009. We now understand that high schools must prepare students for a variety of paths and a variety of career choices they have in life. The proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of this bill are aligned to the requirements for a student to be considered "Choice Ready."

Before I continue regarding the proposed requirements of the bill, I will briefly describe Choice Ready and how it works. Part of the North Dakota K-12 Strategic

Vision is for each student to graduate Choice Ready. In short, a Choice Ready student is one that is qualified to pursue the choice of more than one path after high school. I have included in my electronic testimony a copy of the Choice Ready chart for your reference. Students must meet 4 of the 8 Essential Skills at the top of the chart (in blue). At the bottom of the chart are the 3 Choice Ready components: Post-Secondary Ready (on the left side of the chart in green), Workforce Ready (in the middle of the chart in pink), and Military Ready (on the right said of the chart in orange). Students that meet the requirements of 2 of those 3 components are considered to be Choice Ready, preparing students for multiple options after graduating from high school.

The proposed North Dakota Scholarship requirements listed in Section 3 of the bill are aligned to the Choice Ready requirements. Because this is a scholarship program intended to incentivize and reward students who work hard, the proposed requirements go above the basic requirements for a student to be considered Choice Ready. Students who earn the scholarship will also be Choice Ready, meeting the goal North Dakota has set forth as its K-12 vision. This bill will ensure that, when schools are planning class schedules, testing, and other activities to help students qualify for the scholarship, they will also be working towards helping students to graduate Choice Ready. If preparing students for multiple careers and choices is what

we say we value and want schools and students to strive for, we should align it with the state scholarship to incentivize students to work towards it.

The proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of the bill are aligned to the requirements for a student to be Choice Ready, with six adjustments to allow for the same level of rigor in the current scholarship requirements. First, students must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher. Second, to meet the post-secondary ready requirement, students must have an ACT score of 24 or higher, equivalent to what is currently required for the Academic Scholarship. Third, the proposed scholarship requirements remove the option of having CREAM/CLEM college remediation courses count in the post-secondary or workforce ready column. Fourth, to meet the workforce ready requirement, students must complete four credits of career and technical education courses with two of those credits in the same coordinated plan of study, equivalent to what is currently required for the CTE Scholarship. Fifth, to meet the workforce ready requirement, students must receive either a 24 on the ACT or scores of 5 or higher on each of the three WorkKeys assessments, equivalent to what is currently required for the CTE Scholarship. And finally, to meet the military ready requirement, a student must score 85 or higher on the ASVAB assessment, unless the student has completed basic training, in which case a score of 31 as required for Choice Ready would be sufficient. We believe that these modifications to the Choice Ready framework will ensure that there is still the same level of rigor required to earn

the scholarship, while at the same time ensuring that all scholarship recipients will also meet the goal of graduating Choice Ready.

If SB 2289 passes, the timeline for students earning the scholarship will be as follows: students graduating in 2021 will be evaluated for the scholarship using the current Academic/CTE Scholarship requirements; students graduating in 2022, 2023, or 2024 will have the option of using either the current requirements or the proposed new requirements in this bill, and starting with the graduating class of 2025, all students would be evaluated for the North Dakota Scholarship using the proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of this bill.

NDDPI fully supports SB 2289 as a way to align scholarship requirements that schools and students will plan for with the K-12 Strategic Vision of students graduating Choice Ready.

Chairman Schaible and Members of the Committee that concludes my prepared testimony and I will stand for any questions that you may have.

- 5 Good Morning Chairman Schaible, Vice-Chair Elkin and members of the committee. I am Jeff
- 6 Fastnacht, Asst. Superintendent at Mandan Public School. I am in support for SB 2289 today and ask that
- 7 the committee provide it a DO PASS recommendation.
- 8 For those of you that do not know me, I have the opportunity to be a member of the ESSA
- 9 Implementation Team for North Dakota. I have been an active member of this team of outstanding
- 10 educators and leaders since the spring of 2016. One of my passions, that I brought to the committee was
- 11 my desire to create a new accountability system that included elements of Redefining Ready. Redefining
- 12 Ready was, and is a national movement, supported by the American Association of School Administrators
- 13 to change how school accountability was measured. Redefining Ready was developed in response to the
- 14 one-test fits all philosophy so prevalent during NCLB. I had the privilege of working on a national level as
- a member of the Redefining Ready Implementation Cohort in 2015-2016. It was our goal to guide states
- 16 to develop ESSA plans that incorporated all or part of the Redefining Ready program. North Dakota did
- iust that when we developed our ESSA plan.
- 18 North Dakota's Choice Ready was initially focused on a means of measuring the success of high
- 19 schools in our state within the ESSA accountability system. It did not take long to realize that in addition
- 20 to being a more accurate representation of our schools, that Choice Ready was also a valuable tool to
- 21 guide students on their desired post-secondary path. Choice Ready provides a guide for students as to
- 22 what matters in high school as they prepare for post-secondary, the world of work, the military, or maybe
- 23 even all three. Students are deemed Choice Ready when they successfully complete the Essential Skills
- 24 and two of the other subcategories mentioned previously. The North Dakota Choice Ready Framework
- 25 has developed into a system that informs students, and their families, about the aptitudes and skills that
- help ensure their children will be successful in the future.
- 27 SB 2289 and the alignment of our state's scholarships to the Choice Ready framework reinforces the
- 28 benefits of Choice Ready and how academics and skills are what are desired for our children. Students
- around our state, just as they are in Mandan High School, are being guided by school counselors,
- 30 administrators, and educators to strive to graduate Choice Ready. Graduating high school is wonderful.

Since the Department of Public Instruction submitted its Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) state plan, the state's schools have been striving to provide students a choice ready education, as outlined by the Choice Ready Framework. Choice Ready is really a measurement of what a school is offering and not necessarily what student see as important, even though the Choice Ready Framework has been vetted. The Choice Ready Framework not only encourages students to complete a number of essential skills, it helps them determine their own paths by graduating college, workforce and/or military ready. Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, for the record, I'm Erin Oban, senator for Bismarck's District 35. I'm here to bring forward SB 2289 for the Committee's consideration after receiving unanimous approval from the Senate Education Committee.

Very briefly, if SB 2289 would become law, for the next few years, our state's high school graduates would have *three* different opportunities to qualify for a scholarship – the existing academic or CTE scholarships (through 2024), or the addition of a "North Dakota scholarship" program aligned to North Dakota's Choice Ready Framework, a state plan to assist educators to ensure all students successfully depart high school possessing the essential skills necessary to be ready for post-secondary, the workforce, and/or the military.

To date, our state's academic and CTE scholarship programs have been effective incentives for students to work hard, choose specific pathways or enroll in upper-level courses, and focus on high achievement in the areas of academics or CTE. For that reason, it makes great sense to align the financial incentives offered by our state to what we expect from our students when they graduate.

This isn't about increasing the threshold to earn a scholarship. With the North Dakota scholarship, if graduates hit the marks outlined in 2 of 3 of the paths of the Choice Ready Framework with the GPA and test scores of the *existing* requirements to earn an academic or CTE scholarship, they will qualify for the North Dakota scholarship.

On July 31, 2024, the bill sunsets our academic and CTE scholarships and leaves only this North Dakota scholarship. The reason the bill has a fiscal note is because of those effective dates and the few years of overlap when all three options are available, qualifying an estimated 85 additional students. This transition period is an effort to ensure we don't pull the rug out from any current students who have already started working toward earning the academic or CTE scholarships in current law.

For reference:

- Section 1 Makes the "North Dakota scholarship" effective in time for the graduating class of 2022.
- Section 2, 5, 7, 9, 10, and 11 Sets and sunsets all the requirements and eligibility for the academic and CTE scholarships on July 31, 2024, effective starting with the graduating class of 2025.
- Section 4, 6, 8 Makes effective and sets eligibility for the "North Dakota scholarship".

Mr. Chairman, I recognize the position you're all in in making strategic choices with the dollars we have available. And there may come a point when we need to review if the thresholds we've set for qualifying for scholarships are the right ones. However, at the very least, our financial incentives should align to our expectations, and that's what SB 2289 would do.

I respectfully request the Committee's positive recommendation and would stand for questions.

While there have been minor revisions to the requirements over the years, the qualifications for the scholarship remain much as they were in 2009- a checklist of items related to preparation for college. Schools and students have planned class schedules and testing around meeting the scholarship requirements. A lot has changed in the past decade since 2009. We now understand that high schools must prepare students for a variety of paths and a variety of career choices they have in life. The proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of this bill are aligned to the requirements for a student to be considered "Choice Ready."

Before I continue regarding the proposed requirements of the bill, I will briefly describe Choice Ready and how it works. Part of the North Dakota K-12 Strategic

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The proposed North Dakota Scholarship requirements listed in Section 3 of the bill are aligned to the Choice Ready requirements. Because this is a scholarship program intended to incentivize and reward students who work hard, the proposed requirements go above the basic requirements for a student to be considered Choice Ready. Students who earn the scholarship will also be Choice Ready, meeting the goal North Dakota has set forth as its K-12 vision. This bill will ensure that, when schools are planning class schedules, testing, and other activities to help students qualify for the scholarship, they will also be working towards helping students to graduate Choice Ready. If preparing students for multiple careers and choices is what

we say we value and want schools and students to strive for, we should align it with the state scholarship to incentivize students to work towards it.

The proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of the bill are aligned to the requirements for a student to be Choice Ready, with six adjustments to allow for the same level of rigor in the current scholarship requirements. First, students must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher. Second, to meet the post-secondary ready requirement, students must have an ACT score of 24 or higher, equivalent to what is currently required for the Academic Scholarship. Third, the proposed scholarship requirements remove the option of having CREAM/CLEM college remediation courses count in the post-secondary or workforce ready column. Fourth, to meet the workforce ready requirement, students must complete four credits of career and technical education courses with two of those credits in the same coordinated plan of study, equivalent to what is currently required for the CTE Scholarship. Fifth, to meet the workforce ready requirement, students must receive either a 24 on the ACT or scores of 5 or higher on each of the three WorkKeys assessments, equivalent to what is currently required for the CTE Scholarship. And finally, to meet the military ready requirement, a student must score 85 or higher on the ASVAB assessment, unless the student has completed basic training, in which case a score of 31 as required for Choice Ready would be sufficient. We believe that these modifications to the Choice Ready framework will ensure that there is still the same level of rigor required to earn

the scholarship, while at the same time ensuring that all scholarship recipients will also meet the goal of graduating Choice Ready.

If SB 2289 passes, the timeline for students earning the scholarship will be as follows: students graduating in 2021 will be evaluated for the scholarship using the current Academic/CTE Scholarship requirements; students graduating in 2022, 2023, or 2024 will have the option of using either the current requirements or the proposed new requirements in this bill, and starting with the graduating class of 2025, all students would be evaluated for the North Dakota Scholarship using the proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of this bill.

NDDPI fully supports SB 2289 as a way to align scholarship requirements that schools and students will plan for with the K-12 Strategic Vision of students graduating Choice Ready.

SB 2289 – Creation of a North Dakota Scholarship March 16, 2021 | 9:30 am House Education Committee, Rep. Owens, Chair

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, for the record, I'm Erin Oban, senator for Bismarck's District 35. I'm here to introduce, discuss, and answer questions on SB 2289, a bill that would essentially rewrite our current North Dakota high school academic and CTE scholarship programs and align it with our state's Choice Ready Framework, a state plan to assist educators to ensure all students successfully depart high school possessing the essential skills necessary to be ready for post-secondary, the workforce, and/or the military. This tool was developed by educators in partnership with ND DPI following the passage of the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and is used to measure school growth in high schools. If you are interested in learning more about the Choice Ready Framework, you can visit ND DPI's website. For purposes of the discussion on this bill, I am including this Choice Ready Framework [ATTACHMENT A] so you can see its direct connection to both the language of and purpose for this bill.

To date, our state's academic and CTE scholarship programs have been effective incentives for students and their families to work hard, choose specific pathways or enroll in upper-level courses, and focus on high achievement in the areas of academics or CTE. For that reason, it makes great sense to align the financial incentives offered by our state to what we expect from our students in order to graduate.

But, Mr. Chairman, with the passage of ESSA at the federal level and the development of the Choice Ready Framework here at the state level, those expectations for high school graduates has changed. It makes great sense to align our state's high school scholarship program with our state's high school choice ready framework.

I will try to go over the changes this bill proposes in a way that's easier to understand than the sections and dates appear.

For starters, if this bill passes and is signed into law, it would not go into effect until Aug 1, 2021. That means this option – the North Dakota scholarship, aligned to the Choice Ready Framework – would not be available to any qualifying student until they graduate in May 2022 (2021-22 school year graduates). At that point, a student could qualify for the existing academic or CTE scholarship OR the new North Dakota scholarship should they meet those requirements.

On July 31, 2024 (graduating class of 2023-24), the academic and CTE scholarships would then sunset. The goal is, by the time the class of 2024-25 graduates, for the only remaining scholarship program to be this newly created North Dakota scholarship aligned to the Choice Ready Framework.

That is what Sections 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 of the bill address – the effective dates of this new scholarship program and the repeals of the academic and CTE scholarship programs. The reason for the various dates is to make sure we don't pull the rug out from any current students who have already begun to dedicate their efforts to receiving the academic or CTE scholarships in current law.

So, if you're like me and like to follow along and mark in your bill what is being proposed:

- Section 1 Makes this newly proposed "North Dakota scholarship" effective for the graduating class of 2022.
- Section 2, 5, 7, 9, 10, and 11 Sets and sunsets all the requirements and eligibility for the academic and CTE scholarships on July 31, 2024, effective starting with the class of 2025.
- Section 3 We'll review in a minute.
- Section 4, 6, 8 Adds in language for the newly proposed "North Dakota scholarship" to make it effective and students to be eligible.

The actual substance of the scholarship program, the creation of this North Dakota scholarship, is Section 3. If you go through the program, line by line, and compare it to that Choice Ready Framework, the language will look very familiar. That's exactly the point.

Let's do this, Mr. Chairman, to assure the committee of that overlap. If you'll go back to your bill:

- Lines 4-6 and 10-22: align to the "Essential Skills" in Choice Ready Framework
- Lines 7-9 and Lines 23-24: align to all 3 Post-Secondary Ready, Workforce Ready, and Military Ready in the Choice Ready Framework with the addition of the higher GPA to qualify for a scholarship
- Lines 25 through Line 6 on Page 3 (or (a) of subsection 6): align to a student who is considered "Post-Secondary Ready" in the Choice Ready Framework. That could be compared to what exists with our current academic scholarship requirements.
- Continuing on Page 3, Line 7 through Line 3 on Page 4 (or **(b)** of subsection 6): align to a student who is considered "Workforce Ready" in the Choice Ready Framework, similar to our existing CTE scholarship.
- And lastly, Page 4, Lines 4-12 (or (c) of subsection 6): creates a brand new opportunity for a student to qualify for a scholarship if that student excels at a higher level in the area of graduating "Military Ready."
- Add extra bullet to emphasize that students must meet 2 of the 3 to get the scholarship (postsecondary, workforce, military)

If graduates hit the marks outlined in 2 of 3 of the paths of the Choice Ready Framework at the level of the *existing* requirements to earn an academic or CTE scholarship (GPA, test scores, etc.), they will qualify for the North Dakota scholarship. So, this isn't about increasing the threshold from earning the scholarship but rather aligning the incentive for a scholarship with our state's efforts to graduate our students with the essential skills and choice ready for the college, career, or the military.

The fiscal note on the bill provides an estimate of 85 new students potentially qualifying with the addition of this North Dakota scholarship should the bill pass.

Mr. Chairman, that concludes the contents of the bill and the reasons for bringing it forward. I would be happy to answer questions, but it may be helpful to hear from Jim Upgren from the ND Department of Public Instruction beforehand.

Thank you for the time, and I would ask for your consideration of a "Do Pass" recommendation on SB 2289.

SB 2289 – Creation of a North Dakota Scholarship March 29, 2021 | 10:00 am House Appropriations Committee

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, for the record, I'm Erin Oban, senator for Bismarck's District 35, here to bring forward SB 2289 for the Committee's consideration.

To be as brief but informational as I'm able, if SB 2289 would become law, for the next few years, our state's high school graduates would have *three* different opportunities to qualify for a scholarship – the existing academic scholarship, the CTE scholarship, or the addition of a "North Dakota scholarship" program as proposed in this bill. The new language is specifically aligned to North Dakota's Choice Ready Framework [see Attachment A], a state plan developed by our state's educators after federal ESSA passage to assist educators in ensuring all students successfully depart high school possessing the knowledge and skills necessary to be ready for post-secondary, the workforce, and/or the military.

To date, our state's academic and CTE scholarship programs have been effective incentives for students to work hard, choose specific pathways or enroll in upper-level courses, and focus on high achievement in the areas of academics or CTE. But since the creation of those scholarship programs, Mr. Chairman, our expectations for our high schoolers have changed in order to graduate choice-ready. For that reason, it makes great sense for us to re-align the financial incentives we offer in the form of scholarships to what we expect from our students when they graduate.

With the new language proposing this North Dakota scholarship, if graduates meet the requirements in 2 of 3 of the paths of the Choice Ready Framework at the *existing* GPA and test scores required to earn an academic or CTE scholarship, they will qualify for the North Dakota scholarship. This isn't about increasing the threshold to earn a scholarship. This is about aligning incentives with expectations.

On July 31, 2024, the bill will sunset our current academic and CTE scholarships and leave only this new North Dakota scholarship. This transition period is an effort to ensure we don't pull the rug out from any current students who have already started working toward earning the academic or CTE scholarships in current law.

Mr. Chairman, I recognize the position we're all in in making strategic choices with the dollars we have available. I also know we've seen a number and variety of scholarship-related bills this session. There may come a point when we need to review if the thresholds we've set for qualifying for scholarships are the right ones, but, at the very least, our scholarships should align to our expectations, and that's what SB 2289 would do. I respectfully request the Committee's positive recommendation and would stand for questions.

TESTIMONY ON SB 2289 HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE EDUCATION AND ENVIRONMENTAL DIVISION March 29, 2021

Chairman Monson and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jim Upgren, Assistant Director in the Office of School Approval and Opportunity with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in support of SB 2289.

When the North Dakota Academic and CTE Scholarship program was established in 2009, the requirements of each scholarship were tied to the goal of students being college ready. While there have been minor revisions to the requirements over the years, the qualifications for the scholarship remain much as they were in 2009- a checklist of items related to preparation for college. Schools and students have planned class schedules and testing around meeting the scholarship requirements. A lot has changed in the past decade since 2009. We now understand that high schools must prepare students for a variety of paths and a variety of career choices they have in life. The proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of this bill are aligned to the requirements for a student to be considered "Choice Ready."

Before I continue regarding the proposed requirements of the bill, I will briefly describe Choice Ready and how it works. Part of the North Dakota K-12 Strategic Vision is for each student to graduate Choice Ready. In short, a Choice Ready student is one that is qualified to pursue the choice of more than one path after high school. I have included in my electronic testimony a copy of the Choice Ready chart for your reference. Students must meet 4 of the 8 Essential Skills at the top of the chart (in blue). At the bottom of the chart are the 3 Choice Ready components: Post-Secondary Ready (on the left side of the chart in green), Workforce Ready (in the middle of the chart in pink), and Military Ready (on the right side of the chart in orange). Students that meet the requirements of 2 of those 3 components are considered to be Choice Ready, preparing students for multiple options after graduating from high school.

The proposed North Dakota Scholarship requirements listed in Section 3 of the bill are aligned to the Choice Ready requirements. Because this is a scholarship program intended to incentivize and reward students who work hard, the proposed requirements go above the basic requirements for a student to be considered Choice Ready. Students who earn the scholarship will also be Choice Ready, meeting the goal North Dakota has set forth as its K-12 vision. This bill will ensure that, when schools are planning class schedules, testing, and other activities to help students qualify for the scholarship, they will also be working towards helping students to

graduate Choice Ready. If preparing students for multiple careers and choices is what we say we value and want schools and students to strive for, we should align it with the state scholarship to incentivize students to work towards it.

The proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of the bill are aligned to the requirements for a student to be Choice Ready, with six adjustments to allow for the same level of rigor in the current scholarship requirements. First, students must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher. Second, to meet the post-secondary ready requirement, students must have an ACT score of 24 or higher, equivalent to what is currently required for the Academic Scholarship. Third, the proposed scholarship requirements remove the option of having CREAM/CLEM college remediation courses count in the post-secondary or workforce ready column. Fourth, to meet the workforce ready requirement, students must complete four credits of career and technical education courses with two of those credits in the same coordinated plan of study, equivalent to what is currently required for the CTE Scholarship. Fifth, to meet the workforce ready requirement, students must receive either a 24 on the ACT or scores of 5 or higher on each of the three WorkKeys assessments, equivalent to what is currently required for the CTE Scholarship. And finally, to meet the military ready requirement, a student must score 85 or higher on the ASVAB assessment, unless the student has completed basic training, in which case a score of 31 as required for Choice Ready would be sufficient. We believe that these modifications to the Choice

Ready framework will ensure that there is still the same level of rigor required to earn the scholarship, while at the same time ensuring that all scholarship recipients will also meet the goal of graduating Choice Ready.

If SB 2289 passes, the timeline for students earning the scholarship will be as follows: students graduating in 2021 will be evaluated for the scholarship using the current Academic/CTE Scholarship requirements; students graduating in 2022, 2023, or 2024 will have the option of using either the current requirements or the proposed new requirements in this bill, and starting with the graduating class of 2025, all students would be evaluated for the North Dakota Scholarship using the proposed scholarship requirements in Section 3 of this bill.

NDDPI fully supports SB 2289 as a way to align scholarship requirements that schools and students will plan for with the K-12 Strategic Vision of students graduating Choice Ready. We support SB 2289, and we also stand willing to assist committee members in drafting any amendments that may further strengthen the bill.
