**TESTIMONY** 

HB 1411

My husband has been an amputee since May of 2010 due to a motorcycle accident, he was struck by a 94 year old driver. We have certainly gone through our battles, from the accident, to the long hospital stay, the decision to amputate and the long road to recovery and learning how to walk again. My husband works hard and long hours at times for the NDDOT, this amputation has never slowed him down, even on his bad days and being confined to a wheelchair he keeps pushing. Being an amputee and wearing a prosthetic comes with its shares of ups and downs, we never had issues getting approval for prosthetic devices for his leg the first 10 years, it wasn't until Sanford took over from BCBS that we discovered that according to the policy it's 1 limb a lifetime. If your not familiar with what it's like to live in the life of an amputee, do all amputees a favor and start researching the struggles they go through and you will understand how 1 limb a lifetime is unethical. Saying that once you're 18 you don't get anymore limbs is asinine, does one's body not change after they are 18? My husband has needed a new fitting for a prosthetic for at least 6 months. He has a sore on his limb from the poor fitting he has now due to change in shape and size of limb that he has to wear a special medical pad over it in order to prevent more damage, these pads are \$50 per box at our local medical store and we go through 3 per month just to get him buy and able to continue walking. Without prosthetic device I'm not sure my husband would be able to keep the job he has, his job doesn't allow wheelchairs in the middle of highways building roads. He is a government worker and worries daily how long he can keep going, due to not knowing how much longer he can continue wearing this prosthetic device because it no longer fits properly. We have 3 children 12, 8 and 5, they have watched him struggle and become depressed when wheelchair bound. They see him no differently with or without a leg, but Jason sees him self as less without his prosthetic, this gives him the freedom to

walk, and play in the backyard with his kids and be the dad he wants to be. I am begging you to please look at your loved ones, or picture yourself losing a limb and being told you don't get anymore coverage, your stuck in a wheelchair unless you have a benefit asking people for financial help to purchase a limb. Please take the time to put yourself in all amputees shoes. Especially those covered under Sanford NDPERS. Jason is not the only patient who is an amputee under this coverage struggling with the same issues. There are a lot more, a lot that don't even know I've been fighting for this change since 2021. I pray to see change for everyone. They deserve the same comfort that we are blessed to have everyday having our limbs.

# HB 1411 January 25, 2023 Human Services Committee

Over twenty years ago, Jason Hunter had a motorcycle accident and lost his leg from just above the knee down. He was —and still is — employed by the NDDOT. Because of that, he had the luxury of NDPERS medical insurance, which covered medical expenses as well as ongoing expenses related to Jason's need for adjustments and new attachment fittings occasionally over the past twenty plus years.

Things went smoothly from an insurance standpoint for most of those years — especially when coverage was handled by the Blues (BC/BS of ND).

A short while back, a new carrier "got the bid" and they helped the Hunter's out initially, but after Jason had to have more than one attachment point replaced (because they do wear out), they decided to read the small print of the policy with a new interpretation: "If you are over the age of 19, you get only one new prosthetic per lifetime." That basic wording is in there, but the previous carrier — BC/BS did not consider the attachment point as the prosthetic device—only the leg itself fell into that category, attachment points have wear and tear, depending on the individual, and need replacing or adjusting occasionally — anyone can understand that.

Sanford, our new and current carrier said "no, it is all one thing and all inclusive."

Sanford did make one exception in the spring of 2021 because a legislator was informing the PERS board of what was happening and they said, ok, but only one more time.

In ND, we may not have the highest wages for state employees, but we always brag about our benefit package.....how great our retirement plans are and how wonderful our PERS Medical insurance is. We say that we hold our people in high esteem and rave about how we treat our people that work for us in ND.

But, some folks are forced to hold public fund raisers to pay for a new attachment point for their prosthetic limb because the current attachment point is wearing out.

The current insurance carrier says it will be too expensive because there are so many prosthetic devices out there. Well, here's a flash, we are not talking about every prosthetic device out there — this bill applies only to prosthetic limbs. Not teeth, eyes, hearing aids, or other devices. Limbs only.

NDPERS has been aware of this proposed legislation for over a year now, as it was initially prepared by Legislative Council many months ago and presented to NDPERS executive director with notice of the intended legislation coming to you this session if the PERS board did not address changes sooner. They may say they need to study this issue, but believe me, they have had their chance to do all the studying they need from an actuarial standpoint.

In the end, all we need to do is stand behind our word and treat our North Dakota employees who work for all of us as good as we say we do.

# TESTIMONY OF SCOTT MILLER House Bill 1411 – Prosthetic Device Coverage

Good Afternoon, my name is Scott Miller. I am the Executive Director of the North Dakota Public Employees Retirement System, or NDPERS. I am here to testify in a neutral position regarding House Bill 1411.

HB 1411 would expand the PERS health plan coverage regarding prosthetic appliances and limbs, to include repair or replacement if medically appropriate. This change would align the PERS health plan with other fully-insured and self-insured plans. Since it expands coverage, we anticipate it will result in an increase in total claims. Our consultant estimates it will increase total claims costs by between 0.3% and 0.4%, which will be reflected in increased premiums.

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HB 1411 would expand the PERS health plan coverage regarding prosthetic appliances and limbs, to include repair or replacement if medically appropriate. This change would align the PERS health plan with other fully-insured and self-insured plans. Since it expands coverage, we anticipate it will result in an increase in total claims. Our consultant estimates it will increase total claims costs by between 0.3% and 0.4%, which will be reflected in increased premiums. The House amended the bill to require that any increase in premium be paid out of our health insurance reserve fund, which currently has a balance of approximately \$52.3 million.

## Changes requested:

- 1. Add language relating to community health representatives:
  - a. Definition,
  - b. Certification;
- 2. Amend list of members of the community health worker task force;
- 3. Incorporate sections of 1029 which would allow implementation;
- 4. Amend appropriation.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

**Section 1.** A new chapter to title 43 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

#### **Definitions.**

As used in this chapter:

- "Community health representative" means an individual certified through the Indian Health Service to provide community-based and medically guided health care, which may include traditional Native concepts.
- "Community health worker" means an individual certified under this chapter to provide preventative health services to a community.
- 3. "Department" means the department of health and human services.

#### Title.

An individual may not use the title of either "community health representative" or "community health worker" unless that person is certified as such in accordance with this chapter.

#### Scope of Practice - Community Health Worker.

A community health worker provides preventative health services to prevent disease, disability, or other health condition or their progression for an individual with a chronic condition or at risk for a chronic condition who is unable to selfmanage the chronic condition or for an individual with a documented barrier that affects the individual's health. This section does not authorize a community health representative or community health worker to practice within the scope of practice of another regulated profession, such as nursing, medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, or psychology.

#### Certification.

- The department shall establish a method of reviewing Indian Health Service certification for an applicant seeking certification as a community health representative.
- 2. The department shall establish certification standards for an applicant seeking certification as a community health worker.
- 3. In implementing this section, the department may:
  - a. Adopt rules;
  - b. Charge a fee for certification or recertification;
  - c. Contract with a third party; and
  - d. Require an applicant to meet education and experience requirements.

# SECTION 2. COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER TASK FORCE – REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.

- During the 2023-24 interim, the department of health and human services shall establish and provide staffing and administrative services to a community health worker task force.
- 2. The community health worker task force shall consist of:

a.	One member representing the Medical Services division of the
	department, appointed by;
b.	One member representing the Public Health Division of the
	department, appointed by;
c.	One member representing local public health units, appointed by
	;
d.	One member representing community health workers, appointed
	by ·

e. One member representing community health representatives, appointed by \_\_\_\_\_\_;

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- f. One member representing hospitals in this state, appointed by a statewide association representing hospitals;
- g. One member representing federally qualified health care centers, appointed by a statewide association representing federally qualified health care centers:
- h. One member representing emergency medical services, appointed by a statewide association representing emergency medical services.
- 3. During the 2023-24 interim, the community health worker task force, in collaboration with the department of health and human services, shall:
  - a. Develop a data-driven poan for community health worker scope of work, education and training, certification and regulation, medical assistance, reimbursement, and a North Dakota community health worker collaborative;
  - b. Develop a plan for a North Dakota community health worker collaborative;
  - c. Provide to the department of health and human services a proposal for a Medicaid state plan amendment or waiver to include community health workers and community health representatives;
  - d. Provide the department of health and human services proposed administrative rules for the community health worker scope of work, education and training, certification and regulation, medical assistance reimbursement, and a North Dakota community health worker collaborative; and
  - e. Collaborate with existing clinical, public health, home, and community-based service systems.

# SECTION 3. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES – COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS – MEDICAID STATE PLAN

**AMENDMENT.** During the 2023-25 biennium, the department of health and human services shall seek a Medicaid state plan amendment to authorize the reimbursement of

certified community health workers and community health representatives. Upon amendment of the Medicaid state plan, the executive director of the department of health and human services shall certify this fact to the legislative council.

SECTION #. APPROPRIATION – DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES – COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER TASK FORCE. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$100,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of health and human services for the purpose of contracting with a third party to assist the community health worker task force with data collection, meeting facilitation, and report development for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.
