Good afternoon, Chair Heinert, and members of the House Education Committee. My name is Brenda Zastoupil, and I serve as the Financial Aid Director for the North Dakota University System (NDUS). I am here today to provide information in support of HB1451 which increases the ND Academic, Career and Technical Education and ND Scholarship amounts.

The ND University System (NDUS) administers the Academic, Career and Technical Education (CTE) and ND Scholarships for students enrolled at qualifying institutions of higher education within the state. Current statute provides a \$6,000 award that may be used toward post-secondary enrollment at the state's accredited public, private or tribal institutions, including accredited career schools. Students earn the scholarship in high school by taking challenging coursework and attaining minimum grades, including an overall GPA of 3.0 out of 4.0. Awards are issued at a rate of \$750 per semester or \$500 per quarter or clock hour term. Approximately 23% of high school seniors qualify for the scholarship, and 89% of those awarded receive at least one disbursement of the scholarship. HB1451 increases the award beginning in 2023 to \$10,000, paid at a rate of \$1,250 per semester or \$833 per quarter or clock hour term. The estimated 2023-25 cost of this change is \$5.554 million, for which an appropriation is included in section 2.

The ND Academic, CTE and ND Scholarships have proven to be successful at retaining individuals in the state. Up to 10 years following high school graduation, scholarship recipients are retained in North Dakota for either work or post-secondary education at a higher rate than those not receiving a scholarship. The increased award amount will help students to continue accessing an affordable education within North Dakota. I request a do pass on HB1451 and will stand for questions.

Chairman Heinert and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jim Upgren, Assistant Director in the Office of School Approval and Opportunity with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in support of HB 1451.

The Academic and CTE Scholarships were created in 2009, at an amount of \$6000. The first students to receive the scholarship graduated from high school in 2010, being able to use the scholarship in college starting with the 2010-2011 school year. At that time, the annual cost of attendance at UND and NDSU was \$17,338, Minot State University was \$14,802, the regional four-year universities was \$14,005, and the two-year colleges was \$12,799. The scholarship is paid at a rate of \$750 per semester (\$1500 per school year), meaning that for the 2010-2011 school year, the scholarship covered between eight and twelve percent of a student's cost of attendance.

The \$6000 scholarship amount has not been increased since the program's inception in 2009. Today, the annual cost of attendance for UND and NDSU is \$24,900, Minot State University is \$20,550, the regional four-year universities is

\$21,568, and the two-year colleges is \$18,187. That means that today, the scholarship only covers between six and eight percent of a student's cost of attendance. The cost of college has continued to rise over the last twelve years, but the amount of the scholarship has remained constant at \$6000.

NDDPI supports HB 1451 to increase the scholarship amount and provide students the same level of overall scholarship benefit available when the program was first created.

Chair Heinert and Members of the Committee: My name is Connor Ferguson, and I am the Director of Policy, Advocacy, and Research for the North Dakota Student Association (NDSA). I am testifying today on behalf of the NDSA in support of HB 1451.

The North Dakota Student Association is a student organization established in 1969 dedicated to ensuring that students have a voice at the table in policy that affects Higher Education. We consist of delegates from each of the 11 public institutions meeting monthly to engage students in ND Higher Education policy. Our mission is to empower students, create collaboration between the student bodies of the North Dakota public universities, and to give a student perspective on higher education policy.

On November 5th, 2022 the NDSA passed the resolution NDSA-09-2223: A Resolution in Support of the NDSA's Legislative Priorities for the 23-25 Biennium. One of the priorities enumerated by the resolution is the increase of access to financial aid for NDUS students. The North Dakota Student Association also passed NDSA-08-2223: A Resolution in Support of NDUS Scholarships, which emphasizes the importance of scholarships for NDUS students. We believe that scholarships are essential for many students to access a quality education concern of severe financial burden. Finally, the NDSA passed NDSA-12-2223: A Resolution in Support of HB 1003: Higher Education Budget Allocation for the 23-25 Biennium on Saturday, January 21st, 2023. In this resolution, the NDSA discussed the importance of affordable education for retention of skilled workers and the economic development of emerging technologies. The passage of HB 1451 will significantly increase the financial well-being of NDUS students from the state of North Dakota. If passed, this bill will continue to promote ND institutions of higher education as a competitive, appealing option for those considering moving out of state for college by lowering the cost of enrollment for high achieving students. These students will likely work in flourishing and productive industries which have high demand for intelligent, new workers. It is important that the state of North Dakota leverages this population and keeps students in the state for sustainable economic development. The scholarship funded by HB 1451 is an investment in the next generation of North Dakotans that will pay off for years to come.

The NDSA also believes that affordable access to education is essential. Affordable education will continuously fuel and develop North Dakota's economy by offering more opportunities for success to those concerned by the severe economic burden. As students, we value access to quality education and we believe that providing scholarship opportunities to students from North Dakota will be essential for bringing students into high demand jobs and retaining a youthful workforce in the state. On behalf of the North Dakota Student Association and students across the NDUS, I urge the committee to provide a Do Pass recommendation on HB 1451.

Chairman Heinert and Members of the House Education Committee:

My name is Eric Ripley, Executive Director of Career & Technical Education (CTE) for the Grand Forks Public Schools and Director of the virtual Grand Forks Area Career & Technology Center. I am communicating my support of HB1451, relating to increasing the amount of the North Dakota Scholarship for qualifying students.

The development of the North Dakota Academic and North Dakota Career and Technical Education Scholarship originated into law with the first eligible graduating class being the 2009 – 2010 school year. In 2011, the eligibility requirements were changed to include specific coursework, in addition to a minimum requirement on the ACT or WorkKeys exams. Over the course the next several years, modifications and small adjustments to the requirements of the North Dakota Academic and North Dakota Career and Technical Education Scholarship were made, and others proposed during session that were rejected. During the 67th Legislative Assembly in 2021, the new North Dakota Scholarship was created through the passage of SB2289. However, since the very first graduating class in 2010, the maximum amount granted per student under this state scholarship has always remained at \$6,000.

According to educationdata.org, college tuition inflation averaged 4.63% annually from 2010 to 2020 (*http://educationdata.org/college-tuition-inflation-rate#*). Certainly, the cost of higher education has increased since 2010, providing a strong case for this committee to examine the North Dakota state scholarship program. The proposed \$4,000 increase would represent a 66.7% increase in the overall amount, which would actually slightly exceed the average cost of tuition inflation since the inception of the state scholarship.

In visiting with families and students, I can attest that the presence of the North Dakota Scholarship is one of the key factors when examining post-secondary options. Within our state, strategies for addressing our workforce needs includes keeping our current youth within the state. Support of HB1451 with an increase to the overall maximum amount awarded to eligible students would be helpful in this regard.
