Committee Chair and Members of the Committee,

My name is Kriste Ross, Coroner for Cass County. I am here in support of House Bill 1481. I started with the Cass County Coroner's Office in 2001 under the supervision of Dr. John Baird. With his guidance and support, I began doing death investigations in 2007. In 2011, I became a certified medicolegal death investigator and began signing death certificates. While I was able to discuss cases with Dr. Baird when needed, much of my education and ability to determine cause and manner of death came from my extensive training through the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators, International Association of Coroners and Medical Examiners, the CDC and NIJ. I've been training on how to complete a death certificate thoroughly and accurately, and often am contacted by the Department of Vital Records to amend death certificates that have been completed by a medical provider in error. For better understanding on accurate completion of death certificates, I have met with physicians at local hospitals, explaining how to properly sign death certificates and offer literature for reference.

The Cass County Coroner's Office receives calls, both reportable (defined under NDCC 11-19) and nonreportable deaths. Our office records all reported deaths which are also documented in annual statistics and shared with local and state agencies. While deaths are reported to us most often by nursing staff, he/she may not know what the attending physician will enter on certificate as the cause of death.

I am in support of this bill, as deaths that occur in my county may be in question or have a death certificate that is completed inaccurately. Not all deaths are reported to the county coroner. Any questions about deaths ultimately need to be investigated, which could have easily been resolved by knowing the cause of death.

House Bill 1481 House Human Services Committee Testimony of Rep. Gretchen Dobervich, Bill Sponsor January 25, 2023

Good morning Chairman Weiss and fellow members of the House Human Services Committee. I am before you this morning to introduce HB 1481. This bill is a technical corrections bill to sections of North Dakota Century Code that apply to the work of our county coroners. Please note that there was a glitch in Requests and some amendments are still to come.

The proposed change to Subsection 2 of section 23-02.1-27 adds county coroners, medical examiners and the state forensic officer to the list of persons who can provide a certified copy of a complete death record to a relative, an authorized representative, the child fatality review board, a licensed physician, or a genetic sibling for the purposes of researching family medical history. This proposed change allows county coroners, medical examiners, and the state forensic officer to view the complete death record, which they are legally required to sign, prior to signing it.

An amendment is on the way for HB 1481 to amend North Dakota Century Code 44-04-18.18 to include an item (6) Teaching and training of county coroner personnel or other medical professional education. This section addresses the legal uses of autopsy images. While there is a subsection (1) which states autopsy photos can be used for "medical or scientific teaching or training purposes" the coroner who requested this amendment stated that they felt it was necessary as they have had issues in the past obtaining photographs for training purposes.

An amendment is also coming to amend North Dakota Century Code 44-04-18.7 to add a number 10 which reads an image taken by county coroner personnel or a medical examiner using a digital camera or similar device. In North Dakota Century Code 44-04-18.7 (2) add law enforcement after coroner. This allows law enforcement to use deidentified autopsy images for teaching and training purposes. In North Dakota Century Code 44-04-18.7(3) add law enforcement after coroner. This allows a decedent's spouse, child, parent, or sibling, upon proof of the relationship to view an autopsy photograph, image, or recording in the business offices of law enforcement. Current law allows for viewing in the offices of medical examiner, coroner, or physician, if there is not an active criminal investigation or prosecution. It is believed this is needed as in some counties a law enforcement official is also the county coroner and there may not be a designated coroner's office.

Good morning Madame Chair and fellow members of the Senate Human Services Committee. For the record my name is Representative Gretchen Dobervich, I work for the people of District 11 in south central Fargo.

I am before you this morning to introduce HB 1481. This bill is a technical corrections bill to sections of North Dakota Century Code that apply to the work of our county coroners.

The proposed change to Subsection 2 of section 23-02.1-27 adds county coroners, medical examiners, and the state forensic officer to the list of persons who can provide a certified copy of a complete death record to a relative, an authorized representative, the child fatality review board, a licensed physician, or a genetic sibling for the purposes of researching family medical history. This proposed change allows county coroners, medical examiners, and the state forensic officer to view the complete death record, which they are legally required to sign, prior to signing it.

HB 1481 amends North Dakota Century Code 44-04-18.18 to include an item (6) Teaching and training of county coroner personnel or other medical professional education. This section addresses the legal uses of autopsy images. While there is a subsection (1) which states autopsy photos can be used for "medical or scientific teaching or training purposes" the coroner who requested this amendment stated that they felt it was necessary as they have had issues in the past obtaining photographs for training purposes.

Also amended in North Dakota Century Code 44-04-18.7 is adding a number 10 which reads an image taken by county coroner personnel or a medical examiner using a digital camera or similar device.
