HB 1522

This bill takes away the flexibility of school staff to help meet the needs of students who may need special accommodations to further their development and better meet physical needs that are important to provide an environment promoting education. This bill is discriminatory, unnecessary and should be rejected.

House Human Services Committee Members:

I am writing as a concerned life-long resident of North Dakota to express my opposition to HB1522 which makes it illegal to provide public accommodations to transgender students in schools. I am so dismayed that the legislators this session have decided it is necessary to attack a group of young people who are already vulnerable and at a greater risk of depression, anxiety and self-harm. The entire basis of this bill is hurtful and unnecessary and there are items listed on the bill which show a lack of research on the part of the sponsors prior to writing the bill.

I see a lack of understanding of the difference between sex and gender as well as an incorrectly perceived idea that sex and gender are simple and straightforward. Evidence-based research on this topic shows that even biological sex is determined by a myriad of factors that includes genes and their expression, chromosomes, neurobiology and endocrinology, not just DNA.

In section c, there is mention of students' perception of being any animal species. There have been rumors flying around the past couple of years that students are identifying as Furries and that there are litter boxes in schools here in North Dakota. This is ludicrous and has been shown to be untrue by the administrators of those schools. To even include this in a bill is an insult to our public-school administrators as well as the transgender students that this bill is attacking.

The suicide attempt rate among transgender individuals is 32 to 50%. Gender-based victimization, discrimination, bullying, violence and rejection by family, friends and/or community are just some of the factors that have caused this horribly high rate of depression and suicidal thinking. Studies have shown that youth who experience discrimination based on their gender identity were twice as likely to attempt suicide. Being misgendered, which this bill requires, leaves the person feeling disrespected, invalidated and dismissed, which negatively impacts their mental health. Using correct pronouns and names, however, has been shown to reduce depression and suicidal risk. This bill is an example of discrimination, victimization, bullying and rejection by community and is the opposite of what we should be doing to prevent suicides in our state. We should be supporting these people and should encourage culturally sensitive and transgender-inclusive programs to tackle this high rate of suicidality.

In section 3 of this bill, it does not allow a school to provide unisex bathroom accommodation for students unless they have had gender affirming surgery prior to the start of this law and have a written request from a parent or guardian. Since this bill appears to be targeting elementary through high school age students, there is obviously a lack of understanding of gender affirming care as gender affirming surgery is not done on minors. This means that there can never be restroom accommodations made for transgender students. We should instead be making a law that requires all schools to have gender neutral bathroom facilities. Studies have shown that allowing students to use gender-neutral bathrooms in schools can reduce bullying and victimization and can improve the mental and physical health of these students. This bill does the exact opposite.

The penalty aspect of this bill is not my area of expertise but I have a major concern when a parent can sue a school district if they feel that their child has suffered damages because of a violation to this bill. This could be costly to the school, even if the plaintiff does not prevail, and a waste of their time and taxpayers' dollars. I am not sure how a cis-gender student could be harmed by a transgender student being treated with respect and dignity. This bill is obviously not concerned with the damages done to transgender students when they are bullied, discriminated against or victimized.

Public Schools should be providing a safe and supportive environment for all children. Schools in our state have already tackled the issue of accommodation for transgender students and we should trust that the policies that have been developed and are being implemented in those schools are providing that safe and supportive environment for **ALL** students. There has been considerable evidence-based research on this topic and there are many resources available if any of the legislators would like to do more research. When we can create school environments that respect and affirm gender diversity, it actually empowers all the students in the school and teaches them empathy and acceptance of those who are different from themselves.

Please do what is right and give this bill a Do Not Pass out of committee.

My name is Brett Whitney and I am here to speak against House Bill 1522.

This bill, if passed, would have a devastating impact on transgender students in our state. By prohibiting accommodations for transgender students, this bill would effectively get rid of safe spaces for them in our schools.

Transgender students already face high levels of discrimination and bullying in school. They are more likely to experience harassment and violence, and are at a higher risk for depression and suicide. This bill would only make these problems worse.

By eliminating accommodations for transgender students, this bill sends a message to them that they are not welcome or valued in our schools. It tells them that their identities are not valid, and that their needs do not matter. This is unacceptable.

Furthermore, this bill creates a private right of action for parents or legal guardians of students who have suffered damages as a result of a violation of the law, which would only further harm the students.

I urge you to vote against this harmful bill and work towards creating inclusive and supportive schools for all students, including transgender students.

Chairman Weisz and members of the House Human Services Committee:

I am writing you to encourage you to oppose House Bill 1522.

This bill essentially says that certain students don't deserve to be treated with compassion. Do the sponsors of this bill have no idea the number of suicides the transgender community suffer from? I can only assume they don't, so will share just a small portion of the peer-reviewed research:

- A 2020 peer-reviewed study by The Trevor Project's researchers, published in the Journal of Adolescent Health, found that transgender and nonbinary youth were 2 to 2.5 times as likely to experience depressive symptoms, seriously consider suicide, and attempt suicide compared to their cisgender LGBQ peers.
- Research from Amsterdam which studied 45-years' worth of transgender suicide risk found that between 2013 and 2017, the suicide risk in Dutch referred transgender people (40 per 100 000 person years) showed to be three to four times higher than the general Dutch population (11 per 100 000 person years)
- Results from a study published in *Family Process* in 2020 supported the hypothesis that perceived relational support would reduce participants' suicide risk indirectly by first increasing their emotional stability. More specifically, our results showed that participants with higher levels of perceived relational support experienced increased emotional stability, which then led to lower levels of suicide risk for the participants.
- Data from a March 2022 issue of the *Journal of Interpersonal Violence* indicate that 82% of transgender individuals have considered killing themselves and 40% have attempted suicide, with suicidality highest among transgender youth.

HB 1522 will make these numbers increase in our state; it is disgusting, immoral, unethical, and cruel. This bill does not represent the North Dakota I know and love and I hope you will agree and issue a "do not pass" for HB 1522.

If you support this bill, I fear that you'll next be recommending the removal of accommodations for neurodiverse students and those with behavioral issues. If your ultimate goal is truly to support a child's life and access to learning, why would you support the removal of accommodations that allow this?

WRITTEN TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION TO HB 1522

House Human Services Committee on House Bill 1522 Date of Hearing: January 24, 2023 9:45 a.m. Debra L. Hoffarth, 1320 11th Street SW, Minot, ND 58701

This written testimony is presented in opposition to HB 1522, which outright discriminates against the transgender and non-binary communities, violates the rights of students to a free and appropriate education, and is a violation of every North Dakotans' right to free speech. It is an overreach of government authority into the private matters of its citizens.

This proposed legislation denies children their right to a free and appropriate education as it would make being mis-gendered a condition of their education, which is discriminatory, harmful, and intolerable. Article VII, Section 1 of the North Dakota Constitution declares that a free education is necessary for all children of the State of North Dakota and must be "free from sectarian control."

This bill violates several federal and state constitutional rights of is citizenry. The US and the State Constitutions take precedent over any legislative actions.

North Dakota Constitution Article I, Section 1 states: "All individuals are by nature equally free and independent and have certain inalienable rights, among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty; acquiring, possessing and protecting property and reputation; pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness; and to keep and bear arms for the defense of their person, family, property, and the state, and for lawful hunting, recreational, and other lawful purposes, which shall not be infringed.

North Dakota law and federal law prohibit discrimination based upon sex. The North Dakota Human Rights Act prohibits discrimination based upon sex. Title VII of the Civil Rights Act prohibits discrimination based upon sex, this includes gender identity. President Biden issued an executive order on Preventing and Combating Discrimination on the Basis of Gender Identity or Sexual Orientation which states "all persons should receive equal treatment under the law, no matter their gender identity or sexual orientation." This law requires individuals to violate federal law.

The right to free speech belongs to every citizen of the State of North Dakota. Our Constitution states: "Every man may freely write, speak and publish his opinions on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that privilege." The First Amendment prohibits the abrogation of free speech. Everyone has the right to speak freely, without repercussions, absent the language falling under hate speech, obscenity, child pornography, defamation, or incitement to violence and true threats of violence. Any restriction of free speech must be reasonable, content-neutral, viewpoint-neutral, and narrowly tailored to satisfy a significant institutional interest.

This proposal also violates the privileges and immunities clause. North Dakota Constitution. Article I, Section 21 states: No special privileges or immunities shall ever be granted which may not be altered, revoked or repealed by the legislative assembly; nor shall any citizen or class of citizens be granted privileges or immunities which upon the same terms shall not be granted to all citizens." This proposed legislation allows straight and binary individuals privileges, which transgender and non-binary individuals are not allowed – participation in North Dakota's education system.

There are already free speech laws on the books in North Dakota that would conflict with this proposed legislation. The State Board of Higher education has a policy that allows students and faculty free speech. Students cannot be sanctioned for speech unless "the speech or expression is unwelcome, targets the victim on a basis protected under federal, state, or local law, and is so severe, pervasive, and objectively offensive that a student effectively is denied equal access to educational opportunities or benefits provided by the

institution." Higher education institutions are to promote "a welcoming, inclusive environment." This legislation flies in this legislation allowing students and faculty to have free speech at institutions of higher education, which of course receive state funding. It will require these institutions and their faculties to potentially violate other state laws. It also makes the jobs of teachers everywhere more difficult. Teachers need support, not more legislation on what they can and cannot teach.

Furthermore, North Dakota Administrative Code 75.5-02-06.1 prevents social workers, many of whom are school counselors, or therapists from engaging in conversion therapy. This law could very well cause social workers to violate their ethical duties as outlined in the administrative code.

Use of preferred pronouns improves the mental health of transgender and non-binary individuals. A supportive and affirmative educational environment lowers suicide attempts.

This proposed legislation also includes a private right of action by other parents in the school who attends school with a transgender or non-binary student. There is no purpose in a private right of action by a parent against their child's classmate for the simple reason that they are transgender or non-binary. This engenders hatred and sows contempt in the school. It teaches intolerance, not love for your fellow mankind. There is no harm to other parties when you address someone with their preferred pronouns. The only harm involved in this proposed legislation is the prohibition of providing gender-affirming support to the transgender and non-binary community.

This proposed private right of action also includes exemplary damages up to \$500,000. This is excessive and an egregious use of power to target an at-risk community and does not comply with North Dakota law in regard to exemplary damages. It appears to be an attempt to silence a community. Under North Dakota law, exemplary damages are awarded in order to punish an individual (or entity).¹ It reserved for those extreme situations where there is a breach of an obligation, and it must be proved by "clear and convincing evidence of oppression, fraud, or actual malice."² Exemplary damages are not automatic and allowed only if there are compensatory damages.³ Exemplary damages are limited by North Dakota law to "two times the amount of compensatory damages or two hundred fifty thousand dollars, whichever is greater."⁴ Also, when determining exemplary damages, the following items must be considered:

- a. Whether there is a reasonable relationship between the exemplary damage award claimed and the harm likely to result from the defendant's conduct as well as the harm that actually has occurred;
- b. The degree of reprehensibility of the defendant's conduct and the duration of that conduct; and
- c. Any of the following factors as to which evidence is presented:
 - (1) The defendant's awareness of and any concealment of the conduct;
 - (2) The profitability to the defendant of the wrongful conduct and the desirability of removing that profit and of having the defendant also sustain a loss; and
 - (3) Criminal sanctions imposed on the defendant for the same conduct that is the basis for the exemplary damage claim, these to be taken into account if offered in mitigation of the exemplary damage award.⁵

This proposed legislation will put this section at odds with the longstanding exemplary damages standards already on the books in North Dakota. The legislation does not meet the standards for exemplary damages on its own so it cannot stand.

There is no clear purpose for this legislation, other than to harass and further terrorize the transgender and non-binary community in North Dakota, a community that already suffers from higher rates of suicide and harassment. Affirming individual's preferred pronouns lowers the risk of suicide and self-harming. This legislation will further marginalize transgender and non-binary individuals, putting their mental health at risk.

Transgender and non-binary individuals need compassion and inclusion, not hatred and exclusion. You cannot erase the existence of transgender and non-binary individuals via legislation. They have and will always exist. All people within the State of North Dakota deserve dignity and respect and to have their constitutional rights intact.

This bill is directly aimed at removing transgender youth from public education.

The bill states transgender youth will only get restroom accommodations and recognition as their gender if they have had gender affirming surgery and written consent from parents. It's incredibly rare for youth under 18 to receive gender affirming surgery. There's no way a trans student can meet these requirements to be affirmed at school.

LGBTQ Youth are more than 4 times as likely to attempt suicide than their peers (Johns et al., 2019; Johns et al., 2020). This isn't a result of the label, it's a direct outcome of being marginalized and discriminated against. This bill, and others that seek to further limit the LGBTQ+ community directly contribute to the increased risk of suicide.

I've seen this firsthand in my office from youth and young adults who share things like, "I don't belong here," "It's clear I'm not wanted," and "it's stuff like this that makes me want to die." As a mental health provider, I cannot support a bill that contributes to a community where members do not feel entitled to live the lives they are born into. More than half of transgender and nonbinary youth seriously considered suicide in the last year (Trevor Project 2022 National Survey on Youth Mental Health). North Dakota cannot afford to pass legislation that contributes to this.

This is not a bill that recognizes or appreciates a diverse population of North Dakotans and will result in loss of community members. It does not make North Dakota a desirable place to live and is not reflective of the values that most North Dakotan's hold toward their friends, neighbors and family members.

I strongly urge you to oppose HB 1522.

Dear Chair Weisz and members of the House Human Services Committee,

My testimony is in opposition to House Bill 1522. I ask that you give this bill a Do Not Pass.

This bill goes against everything we know about psychological support of teenagers. For transgender teens, studies show that one adult using the pronouns and name they prefer can reduce their suicide rate. The trans youth data survey showed that 74% of transgender youth in North Dakota contemplated suicide and 46% attempted. If this bill prevents that one adult from helping these kids, the numbers could rise. If the point of this bill is to assist these teens in killing themselves, it has the potential to be effective. My church hosts our community's Transgender Day of Remembrance service each year. Saying the names of North Dakota youth who die from suicide because they don't see a pathway to functional adulthood amidst a state they fear is trying to kill them is one of the most heartbreaking things I do.

The state of North Dakota has a responsibility to educate all of the children of North Dakota, declaring schools to be free to transgender individuals does not make it so, it just means that schools become a weapon against the transgender students who must hide their identity in order to go to school. It is obvious that this bill seeks to destroy children, even to result in their deaths. The audacity to include private institutions in this bill, meaning not just publicly provided and funded institutions, but all institutions shows how mean spirited this bill is. If I had children of school age, this bill would make me pack up and move away from North Dakota, regardless of my child's gender identity. I would not want them educated in an institution in which it was against the rules, against the law, to simply exist.

I strongly oppose this bill. Banning schools from acknowledging or taking extremely basic steps to respect gender identity of students is extremely harmful to trans children. Suicide rates among children who are trans are exponentially higher than children who are not trans, and enacting this bill will contribute to trans children feeling discouraged, depressed, and rejected by their society. This bill directly goes against all of the research about supporting mental health for trans individuals. The fact that this bill is being considered is embarrassing for our state. It shows such ignorance of factual information and the extreme prejudice of our lawmakers.

Megan Degenstein, Ph.D. Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor My name is Samantha Kilcline, but I go by Willow. I am Nonbinary and bisexual. People are already afraid to be themselves and come out, and this well happen more often if this bill is put in place.

In 9th grade I came out to my mom as bisexual. she told me that I was not, and I was saying that because to be in a relationship with a male. She did not believe me until 12th grade when I started dating a female. I started doing research on a name that would feel more appropriate for me. I did not come out as nonbinary until after school, because I had a couple teachers that would not call queer students their preferred name and pronouns.

I also had my mother telling me that they/them pronouns were inappropriate and grammatically incorrect. She would ask me why people were using they/them pronouns and I will tell her they feel more comfortable, because they don't identify as male or female, or they identify as both/neither. I would get a long lecture about how they are incorrect from a grammatical standpoint. The sad thing is, I had to have my fiancé explain being nonbinary, and they/them pronouns more in depth to my mother for her to understand and actually use them, and call me by my chosen name.

Don't call the mom and tell her what you saw. The Resource Officer is mandated by law to tell a minor child's parent when a crime has been committed on school property. These are just a few examples of what my daughter had gone through and what steps or I should say extent the school did to protect my child. School is supposed to be a safe place for our kids, but I guess that means all kids except transgender kids.

Inclusion is a huge part of school and learning. It is in school we learn about each other and what makes us different. Schools should teach tolerance and acceptance. I knew that I was different from a very young age. Growing up in Texas with immigrant parents & in a poor immigrant community, my perspective of the world was limited. The first time I kissed a girl, we were hidden in her closet at midnight, scared of being found by her parents. It was a beautiful & deeply sad moment. A memory that should be cute and awkward and funny is tainted forever because of it was clouded by our terror of being found out to be "wrong". We weren't wrong.

I'm a fantastic actor. My greatest performance, to date, was convincing those around me that I was heterosexual & cisgender. I hid my feelings, my personhood, & my joy for over a decade. When I learned the word transgender, after I had spent my whole life convinced that I was completely alone, I was beside myself with grief over my life so far & utter joy at the life I now had the chance to start living. My family didn't accept that I wasn't their daughter. I attempted suicide multiple times. One attempt landed me in a medically induced coma. When I woke up, to the surprise of even my doctors, my family told me how happy they were that their "little girl" came back to them. I kept trying to kill myself, I ran away from home, my parents threw me out & my guardians in North Dakota took me in. They didn't accept me either, so I went back to acting.

Three years later, at 18, I was homeless, traumatized from years of abuse, & still transgender. No beating took it out of me, no vitriolic words could stem who I was, lack of support couldn't make me a different person. Now that I have transitioned socially, medically, & legally, I am three years free from a suicide attempt, two years sober, & finally at home within myself. I have friends. I have a place to live. I have pets. I am alive & happy to be so.

The attack on transgender rights all across the country will not stop people from being transgender. Centuries of history have shown, time and time again, from book burnings to murders to genocides, that transgender people cannot be subdued into nonexistence. Even if every single transgender person were to die tomorrow, more would be born the next day. The outcome of bills like these is that transgender people are made to suffer more for existing, suicide rates of transgender people increase dramatically, & the murders of transgender people are normalized.

The Lemkin Institute for Genocide Prevention has classified the actions of lawmakers within the GOP against the LGBTQ+ community as a movement driven by fascistic, genocidal ideology. With schools able to support children, they can assist if unaccepting families create an unsafe environment for them to live. 27% of transgender high schoolers don't sleep at home, 20% have run away or are homeless, 94.4% don't feel safe talking to their parents when feeling distressed. We need to provide support for these children. It has been proven over and over that acceptance of identity decreases the risk of suicide, homelessness, drug use, etc.

First: There is no transgender emergency that requires an Emergency Action by the state legislature. 2% of the population is trans. TWO PERCENT. Would you declare an emergency over the maybe 10% of the population that is born left-handed exploring the option publicly and socially of embracing their left-handedness, instead of forcing themselves to act right-handed? Of course not! So why are we engaging in panicked legislation about transkids socially exploring their own identity in school? Who does this hurt or threaten? No one. Because for kids who aren't trans, even if, by virtue of association with a trans classmate, they explore their own gender identity, NOTHING WILL CHANGE! THEY WILL STILL BE CIS!!! And GOOD FOR THEM for engaging in a little bit of self-reflection to determine who they are for themselves, rather than just unthinkingly moving through the world defining themselves by what someone told them they are based on whether they have internal or external genitalia!

This is the Satanic Panic all over again--and boy, wasn't that absolutely humiliating to have participated in, looking back?

SECOND: granting a person an accommodation for their perceived identity is done EVERY DAY, EVERYWHERE, IN EVERY FORUM. "Do you prefer to be addressed as Ms., Miss, or Mrs?" You think that question has nothing to do with gender identity? And would you tell me I'm unreasonable for asking to be called Ms. Dillin, rather than Mrs.? Why would you! "Is Robert here?" "Robert is my dad, I go by Bob." ROBERT isn't his identity. BOB is. WHO WOULD FIGHT WITH THIS? What about girls named Samantha who go by Sam? Is that an accommodation that conflicts with their "biological sex" and assumed gender identity? My first name is Amalia. Do you know how long it took me to even learn how to spell it, because I NEVER used it, EVER, until I went off to college? I had a family nickname, and that was what everyone called me, at my request--in school and otherwise. Amalia wasn't my identity. It didn't MATTER what my birth certificate said. I chose to make it my identity, later, for purely mercenary reasons, too--because there are so few Amalias, it made me feel unique, it set me apart. It could be a conversation starter! Does that make my identity now or then less valid? Of course not. I grew and changed and made the choice for myself of who I wanted to be and how I wanted to be addressed and no one thought anything of it at any point along the way.

Okay, so none of those examples are pronouns. But can you see, by extension, how absolutely outrageous it is that we're declaring the accommodation of preferred pronouns in schools an emergency situation? What kind of nonsensical grammar policing is this???

Historically speaking, the singular they (just like the singular you) is as old as the English language. It's only relatively recently that people have taken exception to its use. Forms of address come in and out of fashion, culturally and socially to totally normal for shifts to happen over the course of any period of time. Who cares if that's how a person prefers to be referred to? It's a word that more specifically encompasses their identity as an individual! Just like Ms. or Bob or Sam or people who go by Jack but are legally named John choose the form of address that most suits THEIR identity, too. THAT'S ALL ANY PRONOUN IS--a means by which to differentiate one person from another, indirectly, more precisely in regard to who they have indicated they are. And it is not my business to tell someone who they are or are not. It isn't yours, either. And it CERTAINLY is not the states right to decide for them.

So I can only assume the problem is that these kids might ask to be referred to by a pronoun or name in school that their parents don't know about--that maybe they're wrestling with their identity and afraid of how their family will respond. Isn't it safer for these kids to be able to engage in that exploration with the support of their peers, socially, openly, than to do it in total isolation, thinking themselves entirely alone, with no one they can trust, afraid that if they reveal themselves, they'll be made homeless by parents who don't understand? At best. When suicide rates for trans kids and LGBTQIA+ folks on the whole are so high, why would we want to drive them deeper into isolation with legislation like this? Make schools so inhospitable that they have nowhere they're allowed to exist as the people they know they are? If the state decides they aren't allowed to exist in school, and they aren't allowed to exist at home--where does that leave them? Is the state's preference, is our legislator's preference that these kids not live at all? Because if so, there's a word for that that none of us will like: it's called genocide. Thats what bills like this seem to be leading us toward.

This isn't a big leap. It's right there in the bill. NO ACCOMODATIONS ARE ALLOWED TO BE MADE FOR ANY CHILD OR ELSE THE SCHOOL DISTRICT CAN BE SUED. Making room for people to pursue legal actions and obtain "damages" for providing a child a pronoun or unisex bathroom accommodation HEAVILY IMPLIES that these kids are not safe at home. That their families will go to such lengths as taking LEGAL ACTION to MAKE SURE there is no place they are allowed to be themselves, safely.

Don't you find that a little concerning? If you're the kid in this scenario, what are your options? How do you navigate a world that took EMERGENCY ACTION to ensure that you were denied ALL RIGHTS to be you? Even such a small thing as being referred to as they or her or ze at school, to use a bathroom where you wouldn't be bullied or beat up or harassed and attacked. Would you do this to a kid whose nickname didn't match their perceived gender? And if you wouldn't, why would you do this?

THIRDLY: Unisex bathrooms exist so anyone can use them. Trying to dictate who gets to use a unisex bathroom entirely defeats the whole purpose. And there should be unisex bathroom options EVERYWHERE FOR EVERYONE AS A BASIC COURTESY TO BEGIN WITH, for people who need them be it for reasons of discomfort with being forced to use a bathroom that doesn't correspond with their gender or the need to retreat somewhere private for social support or help or just extra privacy AT ALL (because we all know that kids can be cruel for less reason than questioning ones gender identity and bullies are going to bully) or to allow a parent to help their child of a different gender or sex. Think of the dads with little girls and the moms with little boys. Don't they deserve unisex bathroom access too? Why isn't a unisex bathroom option in every public building already the default? I know I've used the word outrageous a lot but I'm utterly flabbergasted by this. If a kid needs a different bathroom because they have a shy bladder, would you deny them one? What if theyre being bullied by someone of their own gender and the bathroom just isnt safe for them because thats the place their bully always attacks? WHY then, would the state involve itself here? These asks, these accommodations--they're SO SMALL!!! And the response by our legislators is SO OVERBLOWN!! It would be LAUGHABLE if the consequences to these already marginalized kids were not so horrific. If this bill did not literally mean the difference between making it through childhood to adulthood ornot, for a large percentage of them.

Fourthly: Kids asking for accommodation for an animal identity isn't even something that is happening anywhere and its inclusion in this bill calls the whole rest of the legislation into question by any reasonable, thinking, rational person. In fact, its inclusion suggests to me that the authors are completely untethered from reality and they have no business writing legislation of any kind because their perception of the world and this state has been so warped beyond reason they are no longer fit for the office they hold.

Dear Chair Weisz and members of the Human Services committee,

My name is Kara Gloe. I am a mental health therapist licensed in both North Dakota and Minnesota. I work at Canopy Medical Clinic in Fargo, ND. Among the primary populations of people I serve are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, asexual, aromantic, and Two Spirit (LGBTQIA2S+) folks in North Dakota – including students in North Dakota's public schools. I am a former elected school board member and I have two children in public schools. It is from these intersecting experiences that I urge you to vote **Do Not Pass on HB 1522.** If passed, this bill would do irreparable harm to transgender students throughout North Dakota, infringe upon the rights of local school boards/school districts to make decisions that best reflect the needs of their students, and drive teachers out of the state. Additionally, it ignores the many nuanced needs of students, regardless of gender identity.

First, the data on the lethality of being a young trans person in the State of North Dakota is concrete. For trans high schoolers in North Dakota we know:

- More than half seriously considered suicide in the last year
- That rate is 3.3 times higher than their straight cisgender counterparts
- 30.4% attempted suicide in the past 12 months
- That is five times higher than their straight cisgender counterparts

This is data that focuses solely on youth in North Dakota is from the 2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey. These are the stats before the 2023 North Dakota legislature introduced multiple bills either directly targeting or severely disrupting the lives of our transgender friends, family, and neighbors. *Further, peer reviewed research from the Trevor Project shows transgender children who have one supportive adult in their lives are 39% less likely to attempt suicide.* This bill would rob so many children, who may not have one supportive adult at home, of the opportunity to have one at school. It is not hyperbolic to say, this bill will endanger the lives of North Dakota students.

Second, local control is something the North Dakota legislature often touts as something it values. However, this bill strips that away from school districts. During my tenure as a school board member, we had a plethora of data at our finger tips. Data we used to make decisions on how to improve educational outcomes and the reduce opportunity gap. Is it not best for the institutions that have the data on the students they serve and the expertise in education to make decisions they deem most appropriate to reach their own goals?

Third, this bill will force teachers out of the state. I have heard about teachers who have already left North Dakota, because they do not feel like North Dakota provides a safe teaching environment. We do not have to search hard to see how laws like this have panned out in other states. Florida's teacher shortage is so dire, they are putting people with no teaching education or experience in classrooms. The collapse of a state's education system is a fast train to the bottom. Is that where we want to be?

Lastly, there are number of reasons children may need to use single stall unisex bathroom that have nothing to do with gender identity. Some of these reasons may include trauma, phobias, anxiety, etc.

Under this law, providing these students with this simple accommodation would be punishable by up to \$500,000 in damages.

Federal law requires public schools to provide a safe learning environment for every student. This bill would make that impossible in North Dakota. For the health and well-being of every student in North Dakota I urge you to vote **Do Not Pass** on HB 1522.

I am a suicide prevention advocate and our state's expert in LGBTQ+ outcome data for North Dakota, especially as it relates to youth and schools. I am the author of the LGBTQ+ School Climate Report, a year-long look into school policies across North Dakota, student outcomes, and process improvement.

The Youth Risk Behavior Survey Data is the data our schools use for understanding their student population and needs. It is the data our health centers use for targeting approaches for community health. It is the data we advocate funding for state and federal grants. When looking at the base comparison of LGBTQ+ youth compared to straight cisgender youth, the discrepancies in outcomes are clear.

Before I continue, we must be honest with the intent of HB 1522. This bill would effectively remove trans individuals from any sort of acknowledgment or support within our school system. This will have tremendous consequences on trans and non-binary youth, according to the data.

Currently Trans Experience High School

- 94.4% Do not talk to parents when feeling sad, empty, hopeless, or angry (HS)
- 72.7% Didn't feel safe at school most of time or always (HS)
- 61.0% Bullied on School Property (MS)
- 27.0% Didn't Sleep in Parents Home + 20.0% Have Run away or homeless (HS)

It is worth noting that disallowing transgender students does not cause them to go away, but does cause any opportunity for help or support to disappear from our school systems. While youth aren't talking to their parents when feeling sad, empty, hopeless, or angry, they are nine times more likely to talk to adults within a school for support when they're experiencing a problem.

These students turn to adults at school, because they don't feel safe at home. When these youth have one adult who can accept them, <u>their suicidality reduces by 39%</u>. Suicidality in this population is shown to be significantly higher when they have <u>unsupportive parents</u>. When they don't feel safe at home they're likely to use illicit substances and run away. When schools don't

offer some kind of safety net for them, they flee the state and open themselves up to homelessness and trafficking.

Social Contagion

One suspects this bill is intended in some part to stop social contagion. The broad concept of social contagion influencing transgender identity was popularized by <u>Littman 2018</u>. This research is extremely important for understanding how fear of transgender youth identity has emerged over the last five years.

The research appears to accurately convey the worry and fear parents have about kids and gender identity. What actually occurs is that a youth typically knows they're LGBTQ+ at <u>much</u> <u>younger age than they tell their parents</u> or get treatment. It could be confusion, shame, fear or just not having the right words. But parents assume their kids are straight and cisgender. Some assume that being transgender is wrong or awful. What they see is their kids going to interact with other trans kids and then gain confidence and courage to come out. They tell their parents and their parents only see the superficial. They think their kid was perfectly 'normal' before hanging out with the trans kids and was 'influenced' into the identity. They don't understand why their kid would gravitate towards that in the first place; why would they seek safety and support in people who share their experience.

We understand trans to have a biological underpinning. We did a <u>forty year literature</u> review on the subject by the Endocrine Society of America. There are brain scans featuring affirmation of trans identity when looking at the bed nucleus of the stria terminalis, there are identical twin studies supporting a genetic basis, and even developmental psychology literature on gender identity during development showing strong and persistent identity regardless of natal biological features. We have decades of research and a wealth of knowledge indicating that trans identity is not a choice, not being influenced, and the harm in forcing these kids to ascribe to their sex assigned at birth or conversation therapy as it's more commonly known. That is what the literature suggests. It may not be a law of science, more research may need to be done, but there is nothing in literature suggesting denying trans identity to kids will help them and a lot to suggest it will be very harmful.

It is worth noting that this very research shows that you can't force someone to be trans or cisgender. They would be harmed by pursuing a gender identity not congruent to who they are. And if a youth was influenced into being trans, they wouldn't get happier identifying that way. Their outcomes wouldn't improve if it was a mistake. And if they do improve, if they have more energy, if they have more hope - that is maybe the right direction to go. Nobody locks down trans or cisgender identity in a single visit or conversation. These things are often what youth explore throughout their childhood to see what is right for them. And we pay attention to what makes them happy and what makes them thrive. If a kid transitioned socially and became miserable, probably should stop that.

The worst part is that when we heavily restrict the ability for kids to just experiment, we sometimes force kids into rebelling against us. A child may tell their parent they're trans and if

the parent denies that, the kids may just see that as rejection. The kid may just pretend to be trans out of spite. The kid may just not trust their parents anymore. Even if that kid wasn't trans, knowing that there is a specific condition in which they won't be loved or supported is a scary situation for them to be in.

The point of this suggestion is to suggest that schools are not making kids transgender. That supporting trans youth is not the same as creating trans youth. State CDC data is pretty consistent in the trans demographic regardless of states that support or are hostile to trans identity. You don't stop trans kids by not supporting them, you just...have kids who get no support. The data in North Dakota is clear on that.

Support in Schools

All of the data I've looked over in the last few years around trans individuals in schools indicate accepting and affirming them is the best course of action. This includes looking at recommendations for school boards, school policy, teacher's code of ethics, guidelines for principals and so on. The experts who actually do research on policy and inclusion tend to come to the same conclusion on these matters.

I don't even see these as debates within education, so much as within political organizations and entities. At the moment transgender students have federal protections to ensure accessibility to spaces. It may be needless to say this piece of legislation violates federal law, but when trans youth do not feel safe at school or accepted, that's not an accessible learning environment. If they can't use a bathroom that makes sense for them, they won't drink water. When they can't be themselves in school, they won't go to school. And if they're forced to comply with regulations that are devastating to their mental health, they simply won't continue.

It is worth understanding how we got to the level of inclusion we see today. It was educators realizing there was a problem impacting queer youth. Doing research on best practices and incorporating those practices to get the best outcome. This proposed legislation would take away all of that.

If we want to assert the absolute rights of cisgender populations over transgender people within North Dakota, there is probably little I can do to stop that. As a suicide prevention advocate and researcher, I can just tell you the data. If you want to learn how to reduce suicidality in LGBTQ+ populations, I can tell you how to do that. If you want to make these kids feel isolated, hopeless, and prone to every tragedy you can imagine for a youth, then this is a pretty good step in that direction.

One final thing to keep in mind is that even if this legislation fails, even if all of the bills targeting our trans population don't pass or are declared unconstitutional - we still find ourselves at a crisis. If you'd like to work with me to reduce suicides in this population, please reach out. Until then, I recommend voting Do No Pass.

Good morning, Chairman Weisz and members of the committee. My name is Olivia Data, I am the Youth Action Council Coordinator for the North Dakota Women's Network, and I urge you to vote "Do Not Pass" on HB 1522.

The Youth Action Council is an organization that believes in empowering younger generations to participate in their communities and contribute to a brighter future. But for youth to be empowered, we first need to be safe, healthy, and comfortable in our own skin, and HB 1522 would put this all at risk.

No matter one's personal beliefs on gender identity, the facts do not lie. According to the National Library of Medicine, 82% of transgender people have contemplated killing themselves, and 40% of transgender people have actually attempted suicide¹. By prohibiting schools and teachers from respecting transgender and nonbinary students, HB 1522 poses a serious threat to the wellbeing of many children. Opposition to House Bill 1522

Dear House Members, My testimony is in opposition to HB 1522. I urge you to give this bill a DO NOT PASS.

Gender dysphoria (previously gender identity disorder), according to Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental disorders are defined as a "marked incongruence between their experienced or expressed gender and the one they were assigned at birth." People who experience this turmoil cannot correlate to their gender expression when identifying themselves within the traditional, rigid societal binary male or female roles, which may cause cultural stigmatization. This can further result in relationship difficulties with family, peers, friends and lead to interpersonal conflicts, rejection from society, symptoms of depression and anxiety, substance use disorders, a negative sense of well-being and poor self-esteem, and an increased risk of selfharm and suicidality. Patients with this condition should be provided with psychiatric support. Hormonal therapy and surgical therapy are also available depending on the individual case and patient needs. Transgender people (including non-binary and third gender individuals) have existed in cultures worldwide since ancient times. The modern terms and meanings of "transgender", "gender", "gender identity", and "gender role" only emerged in the 1950s and 1960s. Many people in western societies, particularly the United States, have been unaware or ignorant of the existence of people we call transgender today. **Western societies have had an unfortunate history of dismissing or persecuting groups of people who were outside what the majority of the population considered "normal".**

I cannot understand how so many people in this state fail to take the time to understand transgender people or the LGBT community as a whole. The disturbing rhetoric, largely rooted both in bigotry and ignorance, that I hear on an almost daily basis make me sick to my stomach. Homosexuality was considered a mental disorder for decades by the western medical community. Homosexuals are still are executed in many parts of the world today. Homosexuality is no longer considered a mental disorder because it is not a mental disorder. It is a natural variation of human sexuality. The fight for the rights of transgender people today is no different than the gay liberation movement of the late 1960s through the mid 1980s. Transgender people are not going away and deserve to be fully embraced by our society. The confused, hurtful, vile and dehumanizing language that a concerning amount of people use, particularly when discussing transgender members of our community, is absolutely disgusting and needs to stop. Trans people should not be referred to with language such as: anomalies, exceptions, deformities, mentally ill, etc. Similar language has been used throughout history to ostracize groups of people who are different from the majority of the population in an attempt to dismiss them as freaks and perverts for simply trying to exist in the world. **Trans people are not a threat to society.**

People need to understand that being transgender, albeit rare, is also a natural variation among humans. Transgender people deserve respect and access to healthcare just like everyone else. I frequently hear unkind language used by my fellow North Dakotan's regarding trans people, gay people, lesbians, etc. The recent rise in, what I call, anti-trans-panic is largely driven by political right-wing media outlets such as FOX News; farright outlets such as Newsmax and One America News Network; and other outright hateful organizations such as The Daily Wire (founded in 2015 by religious fundamentalists Ben Shapiro and Jeremy Boreing). The latter organization recently produced a disgusting, misinformed, hateful, and dishonest film titled "What is a Woman". Anyone who has had any exposure to this film should have been able to easily recognize the intentionally dishonest jump-cut editing tactics and the film's overtly cartoonish condescending tone. It was one of the worst pieces of "journalism" ever produced in the modern era. Anyone with a basic level of critical thinking and media literacy would have been able to identify this film for what it was. Unfortunately, too many people are unwilling to think critically and question any of their preconceived notions of what people are, how people interact in society or how the world actually works. **The existence of transgender people is not a political issue. It is a medical and human rights issue**.

I have heard many people express concerns about irreversible side effects about medical treatments for transgender youth. What people are ignoring is the extensive diagnostic testing and specialized counseling that occurs when determining whether or not a child is transgender in the first place. Children who are suspected of being transgender begin by transitioning socially. This can include letting the child wear clothes typical of the opposite gender, referring to the child by their preferred pronouns, referring to them a different name, etc. Children during this stage of "social transition" are monitored closely by their family, community and their health care specialist. These children are not coerced in any way to maintain their behavior. Evaluation continues until the child reaches a particular stage of puberty and at that time medical intervention can become necessary. The effect of puberty blockers, within the first few years of taking the medication, is indeed reversible and would be stopped if there was evidence that is in the best interest of the child to continue through the puberty that aligned with their assigned gender (sex) at birth. If this is not the case then the child could proceed with further medical intervention which would allow their body to develop in a manner consistent with their gender identity. By contrast, allowing a transgender child to physically develop in a manner consistent with their assigned gender (sex) would indeed cause many irreversible physical characteristics. In adulthood, a transgender person, whose body was developed by their natural puberty, could have a very difficult time transitioning into a body consistent their preferred gender identity. Certain characteristics such as their voice, bone structure, etc., can make it difficult, if not impossible, for them to blend into society and live as the gender they identify as. The diagnostic and treatment processes need to be left to medical professionals.

Suicide is the second leading cause of death among people from the ages of ten to twenty-four. Lots of young people think about it. LGBT people, in that age group, are almost five times as likely to have attempted suicide than their heterosexual peers. What is worse is that LGBT youth who report coming from non-accepting and non-supporting families are eight times more likely than the other LGBT youth to have attempted suicide. So, we're talking about people who are eight times more likely than the people who are already five times more likely than the rest of the population in that age range who may attempt to kill themselves. This is exacerbated even further by people on TV who attribute the suicidal ideation of LGBT people to a mental disorder that these children, and young adults, don't even have. Everyone in this country deserves access to healthcare. Transgender youth and adults are no exception. HB 1301 seeks to further reduce the limited Healthcare that American's have access to in the first place. Decisions concerning the health of all American's need to be kept between the patients, their loved ones and their doctors. **The government has no business intervening in the medical care that people receive from their doctors and any attempt to do so is a massive authoritarian overreach of the government. Medical care needs to be handled by medical experts who are trained to follow the scientific evidence wherever it leads.**

Please be kind, open minded and understand that the children being targeted by this bill do not need your help. They are already loved and in good hands. There is no need to intervene in their medical care. This bill will cause far more pain and suffering in the lives of people who don't deserve it.

I strongly urge you to oppose HB 1522.

Dear Senators, I am writing in opposition to HB 1522. I ask that you give this bill a Do Not Pass.

HB 1522 also makes mention of students who perceive themselves as being any animal species other than human. I believe this section of the proposed bill is in reference to the "Litter boxes in schools hoax," which even has its own <u>Wikipedia article</u> due to the numerous instances where claims have repeatedly been made and disproven. InForum, a North Dakota newspaper, even covered claims of litter boxes in Fargo-Moorhead public schools where Fargo Public Schools Superintendent Rupak Gandhi stated the claims were not true (<u>InForum Article</u>).

You should all know by now that transgender individuals are at high risk for death by suicide. You seem to disregard this as being fact that has been studied by psychologists in recent years with scientific papers reporting on it. My name is Gabriela Balf, I am a psychiatrist in Bismarck and a Clinical Associate Professor at UND, and I speak on my behalf.

As presented in testimonies for the previous bills this morning,

- 1. Transgender condition is a real medical condition medical term is Gender Incongruence*. I have presented earlier the science, including imaging studies that clearly reflect the reality of this condition.
- 2. The mental distress that some transgender people experience as a result of Gender Incongruence condition + non-affirming conditions = Gender Dysphoria in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders DSM5 (available on APA website at https://dsm.psychiatryonline.org/)
- 3. School environment is crucial for the mental and physical wellbeing of children. This bill proposes to transform it into a hostile environment and increase minority stress, which will have the already proven effects of increasing the rates of depression, suicide attempts and substance use disorder among the transgender population AND their cis peers.
- 4. This school environment may contravene with the rights that parents supportive of their transgender child have to control the child's education as spelled in SB 2260.

Therefore: Why persist in increasing minority stress for a small number of our children? When we face so many urgent issues related to the mental health of children in our state, why don't we spend your valuable time thinking about productive ways to address those, instead of wasting your days of selfless volunteering on **bills that are proven to kill some of our children**, bills that will stain your legacy?

I urge you to be thoughtful when you vote for all the transgender bills that are coming your way, and listen to science. On behalf of our patients, we thank the House Human Services Committee for listening to our presentation of scientific evidence.

Neutral Testimony on House Bill 1522

Chairman Weisz and honorable members of the House Human Services Committee. My name is Jacob Thomsen and I am a Policy Analyst for North Dakota Family Alliance Legislative Action. I am testifying on behalf of our organization regarding HB 1522 and wish to provide neutral testimony on this bill.

We understand that it can be difficult for some to identify themselves on the spectrum of gender, apart from their biological sex. That being said, our organization and its constituents believe that the issue should be kept separate from the responsibility of a school and its teachers and students. Gender is a social edifice that is created; it is not science. As such, if taken to its conclusion, we will have eventually find teachers and administrative school officials having to refer to students as Spot the dog or Herbie the turtle. In an effort to avoid this kind of foolishness, we support the intent behind the bill.

However, this bill applies the requirements private schools as well as public. Aside from our belief that these requirements should not apply to private schools, the vast majority of private schools are faith-based and highly unlikely to, "adopt a policy establishing a place, facility, school program, or accommodation that caters to a student's perceived or expressed gender" or other actions prohibited in the bill.

We firmly believe that it is in the best interest of all students that schools not capitulate to contrived accommodations for students. However, given the inclusion of private schools in the bill, we cannot support this bill either. For these reasons, North Dakota Family Alliance Legislative Action is testifying neutral with regard to House Bill 1522.

Dear Chair Weisz and Members of the House Human Services Committee:

My name is Rev. Karen Van Fossan. I am an ordained minister and licensed professional counselor, serving as a pastoral counselor in the state of North Dakota. I ask that you give HB 1522 a Do Not Pass recommendation.

A few years ago, I was adopted by a young mother and her beautiful transgender child. Having been rejected by their family of origin, they asked me to become their mom and grandma. Due to a fundamental misunderstanding about what it means to be transgender, their family had become unable to love them. As painful as this breach has been for my chosen daughter and grandchild, I believe the real losers in this scenario are the family members who don't get to experience the Halloween costumes, the spontaneous dances, and the joyful utterances (like "I love you, Grandma!") that I now enjoy as a matter of course. I do indeed love my transgender grandchild from the deepest place in my soul.

Still, my grandbaby is just one of the reasons I strongly oppose HB 1522. As a pastor and as a counselor, I am honored to have accompanied a number of trans youth, as they have made lifegiving transitions from a prescribed gender identity to an authentic gender identity. It has been my distinct privilege to witness their unfolding, their blossoming, as they see their own sacredness in the eyes of God – and, at last, in the eyes of themselves.

In fact, according to a recent position statement, the American Counseling Association says this about gender identity and ethical counselor conduct:

"Gender is the product of a complicated interaction of chromosomes, anatomy, hormones, and culture that begins before birth. Most people's gender identity is consistent with the gender they were labeled at birth. Individuals who identify as transgender have a persistent and consistent experience of their gender being different from their sex assigned at birth. The stress brought on by stigma and the pressure to be gender-conforming with an individual's assigned sex is known to cause minority stress and significantly affect health and wellbeing, even in the face of the resiliency and the strengths of transgender individuals. Counselors know and understand the critical importance of living consistently with one's gender identity, which may or may not include physical or social gender transition."

I would like to repeat a portion of that last statement: "Counselors know and understand the critical importance of living consistently with one's gender identity."

In other words, **the expectations of this bill are in direct conflict with best practices for counselors who serve trans children** – and, I would say, for any adults who serve any children. The more whole any child, any person, can be, the more whole the community becomes.

For all of these reasons, I urge you to vote Do Not Pass on HB 1522. Thank you for your time and consideration. I would be glad to respond to any questions.

My name is Scott Dyk, representative from district 23. I am here today to represent **Hospital** 1522 and to testify on its

content. $\mu \mathcal{B}_{-}$

I am speaking today, on behalf of all the children and students in K-12 schools across this legendary state. I will be echoing sentiments of mothers and fathers, grandparents, and a host of constituents from my district. Including the citizens, all over this state, evidenced by the many emails, received in response to this bill.

As a father of 3 married children and grandfather of 12, my primary responsibility is to protect them!

As a legislator, my primary responsibility is to protect the children of this state. All children. Ronald Reagan said "governments, first duty is to protect the people not to run their lives"

Who are we protecting? All children in K-12 public and private schools.

And here are the reasons why we are protecting.

Example #1

A report filed on October 26, 2022 tells of a transgender

student who entered a girls restroom in Oklahoma. And the student victim labeled as V on the redacted report told Police she was speaking with friends in the girls bathroom when student A approached.

The student victim labeled as V on the redacted report told Police she was speaking with friends in the girls bathroom when student A approached her with a question. After telling student A, she didn't want to speak with her, and why, student A became angry, and asked her if she wanted to fight before hitting her in the face. The alleged assailant continued to hit kick and pull student V's hair. Student the told the police, the strength of student A's punch left her unable to fight back. One friend reported they tried to help, but they were also struck in the face twice. A witness said they were worried about their friend, because the assailant was a man. Police observed, one victim, had injuries to her eye, face and head with a possible concussion. The student was charged with single counts of disorderly conduct and assault and battery.

Example #2

2) The Loudon county public school board has fired their superintendent. After a Virginia grand jury released a report, criticizing the district for how it handled two sexual assaults committed by the same student. The Northern Virginia school district came to the national spotlight after a father accused the school board of covering up his daughters sexual assault. Scott Smith testified before the board that a biological boy, wearing a skirt, raped his daughter in the girls bathroom.

After that incident, the boy was able to transfer to another school in the district where he then assaulted another girl. He was convicted in juvenile court of both assaults.

At the time Smith claimed the district tried to cover up his daughters assault to push a policy that supported transgender students using bathrooms of their choice. In a 91 page report released, the grand jury found that the school district was looking out for their own interests, instead of the best interests of the students.

The fall out of this tragedy involved a parent commenting that "this is not over, it is not over for those two girls and their families, and it's not over for all of us. We have to send our children into those buildings every day with a lack of trust. And so that really really concerns me. And I think there should be repercussions"!

Example # 3) Closer to home in Williston , North Dakota, a trans individual went into the girls bathroom on more than one occasion, and when the football team found out, they beat the him up! We cannot allow this kind of behavior toward any student.

This is why there is provision for protection, for a student who

has had gender, affirming surgery prior to when This bill goes into effect!

Everyone needs to be treated with dignity, civility, and respect. For those who have been bullied and scorned, I'm sorry. For those parents and relatives who have lost a loved one to suicide, I'm sorry. I can't begin to imagine the pain, loss, and devastation you feel.

When are we going to do something about this? It has to be now.

We need to act now, to protect our kids!!

Are you all aware that we have political leaders who sanction half nude perverts dancing for kindergartners while rubbing their crotch?

Are you all aware that our government is telling parents they have no right to know what the state is teaching their children, but that day is here. This ideology has created an environment where educators are grooming, our impressionable children to consider sterilization and mutilation.

Ronald Reagan said this," we must reject the idea that every time a law is broken, society is guilty rather than the lawbreaker. It is time to restore the American precept that each individual is accountable for his actions."

Now, just in case, there are those here who are experiencing a bendable backbone like a recent senator from South Dakota. He reasoned this issue should be a school board issue.

This is not a school board issue as you could tell by the way the Virginia school board handled their situation. This is our issue. This is our legislative issue for today.

Now, for the strengthening of our back bones, we do have precedent on our side.

Title IX. Title IX of the education amendments was acted by Congress in 1972 to illuminate discrimination in education based upon sex against girls and women in particular. It states, no person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal, financial assistance. When this was past girls and women faced high barriers to pursue educational opportunities, particularly in higher education, title IX was designed to remove those barriers, and now represents 50 years of progress in education made by girls and women title IX regulates every public K-12 school, college and university of the nation, as well as every private school that takes federal funding. As a result it has wide, reaching implication for tens of millions of children and parents across the country. the regulations implemented in title IX were binary based on two sexes, male and female. Recognizing biological distinctions where they matter and prohibiting discrimination based on sex as Congress intended.

This was recently challenged by President Biden, and was struck down in a federal appellate court.

This ruling came out January 5, 2023. A federal court of appeals has held at title IX's prohibition on discrimination on the basis of sex refers to biological sex and not gender identity. The year and ruling by the United States Court of Appeals for the 11th circuit calls into question the legality of Biden administration's proposed title nine rules, which equate gender identity with sex and would require schools to open up women's sports and other spaces to males who identify as women.

The 11th circuit ruled 7 to 4 on December 30, that the bathroom policy violates neither title IX of the education amendments of 1972 nor the US Constitution the court rejected the claim that the school boards actions discriminated against trans identifying students.

This is great basis for this bill. Also keep in mind smokers are required to smoke outside the building. Sometimes it can be 20 below zero. We are trying to protect all people from secondhand smoke. You can see the theme.

Now I get it if you're still a little bit nervous about doing the right thing here. Someone very close to me said to count the cost before you venture into your next career. The chairs you and I sit in the house chamber come with a great amount of responsibility and accountability.

You will find encouragement in this statement by Patrick Henry

"should I keep back my opinions at such a time, through fear of giving offense?" I echo that exact thought.

And finally, we have president, Teddy Roosevelt, who has his roots here in North Dakota. Who gave his most famous speech in April 23, 1910. He said "it is not the critic who counts. Not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. the credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena. Whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood. Whose strives valiantly, who errs, who come short again and again. Because there is no effort without error and short coming, but who does actually strive to do the deeds , who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions, who spends himself in a worthy cause, who at the best knows, in the end, the triumph of high achievement, and who, at the worst, if he fails, at least, fails well, daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls, who neither no victory nor defeat .

Protecting all our children is a worthy cause. We all must dare greatly in this worthy cause!

Puritan leader John Winthrope said that we are a city on a hill.

In order for North Dakota to be a city set on a hill, and to continue to be legendary, we must protect all of our children. If we don't, we will become infamous.

I'll end with this. For me personally there is truth that is transcendent. It exists far above the universe and material existence. I implore us as a whole to discover the solutions and healing found therein.

Honorable members of this committee, as strongly as I can, I urge a Do Pass vote on HB 1522. I am open to amend the penalty capped at 500,000 to be less or more.

Madame chair and members of the senate human services committee,

Freedom is no freedom at all without boundaries and restrictions. Alarmingly, we find ourselves in a culture today where ancient boundaries and restrictions are being challenged. Our great nation has proven that great courage is required to protect our boundaries. I am confident, great courage is in this room today. Protecting the private space of our K-12 school bathrooms are the boundaries in focus with house bill 1522. This bill protects all students, our daughters and granddaughters, our sons and grandsons, and the individual who identifies as transgender. When the private space of a K-12 bathroom is violated by an individual of the opposite biological sex, then there is an immediate, abusive, and threatening intrusion. This bill is necessary because of parents and students personally telling me of boys entering girls bathrooms in K-12 schools in the state of North Dakota.

The next two examples to my knowledge, have not yet happened in our North Dakota K through12 school system. When you hear them, you will understand with clarity why this bill is necessary.

On October 26, 2022, a report was filed, telling of a transgender student who entered a girls restroom in Oklahoma. A witness said the transgender student was a man who hit the girl in her face. Two of the girls friends stepped in to help their friend, and were also struck in their faces. Police observed one victim had injuries to her eye, face, and head. The student was charged with single accounts of disorderly, conduct and assault and battery.

Then, in the Loudon county school district in northern Virginia, a biological boy, wearing a skirt, raped Scott Smith's daughter in the girls bathroom. After that incident, the boy was able to transfer to another school in the same district where he then assaulted another girl. He was convicted in juvenile court of both assaults. During this time, Mr. Smith claimed the district tried to cover up his daughters assault, to push a policy that supported individuals who identify as transgender students for the purpose of using bathrooms of their choice.

In a 91 page report released, the grand jury found that the school district was looking out for their own interests, instead of the best interest of the students.

There is little appetite for school boards to deal with this issue in our state, and in other states as well.

That is why it is before legislatures today around this nation and that is why HB1522 is before you today.

In summary, freedom is no freedom at all without boundaries and restrictions.

There is no question about whether a boy and a girl's bathroom is an immediate, abusive, and threatening intrusion. How do we know this? Because he's in the room. He's there.

Just like if somebody walks into your house in the middle of the night. You're not going to wonder if they are a threat. They're in your house. And they could make matters worse, depending on how they behave once they get there. The point is we need to protect the private spaces of our K through12 school bathrooms. We need to protect all of our students.

Madame Chairman and members of this committee, please give this bill a do pass vote. Thank you and I'll stand for questions.

House Bill 1522

Relating to gender identity and accommodations in schools

Dear Members of the Senate Human Services Committee,

My name is Shawna Grubb and I reside in District 35. I am writing to urge a DO PASS recommendation for HB 1522.

Why is this bill needed?

- Federal agencies have tried to force schools to grant access to sex-specific intimate facilities based on self-declared gender identity instead of biological sex.
- Students, particularly women and girls, have valid concerns about privacy and safety in intimate spaces, as well as about the equality of women under law.
 Allowing males to have access to female-only spaces completely disregards the safety and privacy of women and girls.
- Gender identity polices are unlawful under current Title 9 regulations. The term "sex" is not ambiguous and cannot be unilaterally redefined by schools to mean "gender identity."
- North Dakota law should specify that "sex" does not mean "gender identity," and local schools should devise solutions that respect the privacy and safety of all students, not just those who claim to have a victim status
- In a time when there is an extreme shortage of school staff, requiring staff to work in environments that require them to adhere to dangerous genderidentity affirming policies could risk more staff to quit teaching and subsequently, leave schools even more understaffed.

These proposed bills are in direct conflict with NDASP's adopted position statement from the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) which states that:

Positive educational and social outcomes for all children and youth are possible only in a society—and schools within it—that guarantees **equitable treatment to all people**, regardless of race, class, culture, language, gender, gender identity, religion, sexual orientation, nationality, citizenship, ability, and other dimensions of difference (NASP, 2019).

Additionally, school psychologists are guided by an ethical code that calls for beneficence, through which they respect the rights and dignity of all persons, and nonmaleficence, which requires that they do no harm. NASP's ethical standards require school psychologists to validate and affirm a young person's authentic lived experience, value their integrity, ensure their safety, and promote their well-being (NASP, 2020b). The proposed laws would prohibit school psychologists from practicing ethically.

Our LGBTQ+ youth need our support now more than ever. Some alarming statistics from The Trevor Project 2022 Survey include:

- 45% of LGBTQ youth seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year.
- 60% of LGBTQ youth who wanted mental health care in the past year were not able to get it.
- 73% of LGBTQ youth reported experiencing symptoms of anxiety
- 58% of LGBTQ youth reported experiencing symptoms of depression

NDASP also vehemently supports the use of evidence-based practice through an ethical lens. Conversion 'therapy' is not evidence based and has been determined to be fraudulent by several states. In fact, "The present-day scientific consensus is that such practices are not only ineffective, but highly harmful and fundamentally unethical." (Conine, Campau, Petronelli, 2022). Examples of historical unethical practices used in conversion therapy include corporal punishments such as spanking and electroshock therapy, among other questionable practices. The United Nations Human Rights Council (2020) goes as far to say that these practices are not only a public health problem, but also "violate the prohibition of torture and ill-treatment." 17% of LGBTQ youth reported being threatened with or subjected to conversion therapy (The Trevor Project, 2022), which can have life-threatening effects.

Support for LGBTQ+ youth leads to better outcomes for them and society as a whole. LGBTQ+ youth report that when adults talk to them respectfully about their LGBTQ+ identity and use their names and pronouns correctly, they feel supported. Research indicates that LGBTQ+ youth are more resilient when they have supportive people in their lives. Further, LGBTQ+ youth with higher resilience are 59% less likely to attempt suicide and 69% less likely to consider suicide (The Trevor Project, 2022). NDASP supports legislative actions to increase access to mental health for all individuals, including LGBTQ+ youth.

Please join NDASP in supporting our LGBTQ+ youth by voting "nay" on the house and senate bills listed above.

I am writing in opposition to HB #1522. The authors who drafted this bill lack any knowledge or understanding of what being transgender is and what the person who is transgender faces living amongst a CIS dominated society. I was born and raised in North Dakota and I am also a parent of a transgender person. My child went to public schools and I have watched her being discriminated against, have had to report a criminal act that was done to her on school property. I had to deal with the ugliness of her peers, staff and faculty as well. The school administration being one in not one but two schools districts. I'm here to tell you there is no such thing as a "safe haven" at school for anyone who is bullied. Bullying is alive and well in North Dakota schools and it looks like the legislative branch is following in step with discrimination and ostracizing kids in our schools.

How many of you know a transgender person or have talked to a parent of a transgender person regarding their experiences in public schools? I dare say none of you have taken the time or even thought of what the transgender person goes through at school each and every day. By law our kids are mandated to go to school. The kids there are forced to endure ill-mannered children who are raised by people who think if you don't look and act like me, then you are not worthy of respect and so it is ok to bully these people. I know this because my child was bullied. My child wasn't one to act up, cause attention to herself in the contrary, she is sky, quiet and respects authority figures.

My daughter would come home and tell me how the day went and more times than I wanted to recall, there was someone's kid being a bully. Whatever happened to the no bullying zone at school? Oh, that is for the CIS kids and not meant for transgender people? My daughter had teachers who outed her in class, and when I took that up with the principal, nothing happened but a verbal hey, don't do that. I asked why this teacher put her lunch account up on the white board in front of the class. This was a history class. The principal couldn't answer that nor would she allow me to address the teacher. Now who is being the bully and allowing the bullies to continue their behavior? The school administration, that's who.

When my daughter was filmed in a bathroom stall, which is illegal. I took that once again to the school and this time I demanded that the Resource Officer be notified because I wanted to file charges. What this CIS peer did was illegal. The Resource Officer came, took statements from my daughter and her friend who witnessed the video which was put on Snapchat and Facebook. The CIS peers' mother was called. The mother released the phone to the Resource Officer and he viewed the video. The CIS peer even admitted to doing this and do you know what the school administration told the Resource Officer? Don't call the mom and tell her what you saw. The Resource Officer is mandated by law to tell a minor child's parent when a crime has been committed on school property. Does that sound like the school

has my daughter's best interest at heart? Does that smack of No Bullying Zone to you? Nope, sure doesn't.

These are just a few examples of what my daughter had gone through and what steps or I should say extent the school did to protect my child. School is supposed to be a safe place for our kids, but I guess that means all kids except transgender kids.

Inclusion is a huge part of school and learning. It is in school we learn about each other and what makes us different. Schools should teach tolerance and acceptance. What this bill does is support the ideology that if someone is different then it is bad and should be treated as lesser than by removing rights and privileges that the others enjoy. Do you really want to teach the youth of North Dakota that if someone is different from you then it is ok to discriminate against them? I thought that we lived in the USA where everyone has the right to be themselves. Apparently, History hasn't come to mind to any of you when you think of excluding transgender kids from their peers or better yet, maybe your ideology comes from those from the deep south who fought to keep people of color at the back of the bus, to use separate bathrooms, even to the extent of separate churches, schools and businesses.

This bill violates the civil rights of transgender students in schools. These kids just want to go to school, learn, use the bathroom and some, very few, want to participate in sports. The number of transgender kids in North Dakota isn't large but this bill still does damage to the self esteem of the transgender person and gives the misconception to CIS people that transgender people are ok to mistreat.

My daughter was born transgender. From her early days to present she has always had mannerisms and behaved like that of her older sister. This isn't a fad or a phase and not a way to erase CIS females in sports. My daughter doesn't like sports. My daughter is kind, thoughtful and sweet. Nothing in her persona resembles a male. I should know I have lived with her all her life.

What are you scared of? Transgender people use the bathroom just like the CIS population. We go in and get out, end of story. There isn't any malcontent on behalf of transgender person using the same bathroom as a CIS person.

In fact, CIS people are the aggressors and their behavior needs to be regulated. The lack of empathy, understanding and acceptance of transgender people will flow over and spread onto other marginalized people such as Native Americans, people of color and of different religion. When will society learn from the mistakes of our past? The KKK fostered segregation. Was it necessary to segregation people of color from whites? Did something horrible happen when integration happened? No, but people love to make up stories and the worse the better. That isn't human nature, that is bigotry and discrimination to the core.

Madame Chairman Lee and Members of the Committee:

My name is Andrew Alexis Varvel. I live in Bismarck, District 47.

I disagree with House Bill 1522 as presently written.

On line 10, instead of "in consultation with", the legislation ought to say "while fully informing." The reason for this change is that the school district should not become party to family quarrels. Although it is important for parents to be informed, parents should not have veto power over reasonable accommodation for children who identify as a gender other than the sex they were born with.

If a child perceives his or her born sex to be a straitjacket, the worst thing we can do is to force the child to go against his or her inclination. I am saddened that this is what the Legislature is trying to govern: kids in bathrooms and preferred pronouns. I know preferred pronouns might seem mysterious to those who have not encountered them before, but they can be a big deal to people.

My child's first-grade friend just told everyone, she wants to be called by a different nickname for her first name. It has been a struggle to remember to call her by her preferred nickname, but every time we make the effort, she lights up because it's what she wants. We make the effort because it makes her feel good and seen. We hope students across the state are allowed to feel this way too. It's about kindness and respect, not about trying to make adults uncomfortable.

I ask you to please give House Bill 1522 a Do Not Pass recommendation to show our transgender and nonbinary students they are welcome here in our state. Thank you for the opportunity to share my testimony.

This testimony is submitted in opposition to bill #1522

School districts should be encouraged to support all of the youth in the school district. It would be a benefit to every student if the school environment was more inclusive. Perhaps schools could have some restrooms that have no gender identification attached - open to every student to use.

School boards should be allowed to make policies that are less discriminatory toward youth; policies that promote the best outcomes for all of the students in the schools. There should be no fear of possible civil action for a decision by a board that was made with the best interests of the students in mind.

DO NOT PASS HB 1522

Chair Lee and members of the Senate Human Services Committee, I am writing to you today to urge a DO NOT PASS on HB 1522. I am the founder of an organization called Project RAI, we work with gender queer children ages 3-14. We work to provide them resources, advocacy, and community so kids are able to when feeling lonely and reduce the risk of suicide.

I am trying to understand the purpose of this bill and how it will ensure the creation of a healthy and positive school climate. Are teachers only able to affirm pronouns of cis kids? I am unsure how teachers will teach if they are not allowed to use any child's preferred pronouns.

Research on affirming school policies and practices shows that affirming and welcoming all students for who they are leads to a more positive school environment as a whole. School climate for both LGBTQ children and cisgender children are impacted heavily by the practices that are in place. Amy Gower et al., defined school climate as "the quality and character of school life", and it has been associated with a variety of student behaviors, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity (2018, p. 814). The research found that schools with supportive climates are able to follow best practices to create that supportive climate throughout; these best practices had positive impacts on all students in the school, not just LGBTQ children.

Kris T. De Pedro et al., examined safety, victimization, and school climate in rural LGBTQ youth. The study aimed to compare feelings of safety among rural vs urban LGBTQ children and what supports are available to them. School victimization has an adverse impact on the academic achievement and well-being of LGBTQ youth. Researchers found that safety is enhanced for LGBTQ youth when enumerated anti-bullying policies are in place (De Pedro, et, al., 2018, pgs 265-266). As shown in other studies, LGBTQ students feel safer and more supported when school climate and policies are inclusive; this study found similar results, however, LGBTQ youth in rural communities may have difficulty accessing basic resources and support typically found in urban areas (p. 277). Lack of basic resources can lead to higher depression rates, greater feelings of insecurity in school, and greater rates of isolation.

According to the report, 61.6% of queer youth in North Dakota have seriously considered attempting suicide. 84% do not have any adult to turn to when feeling sad, hopeless, angry, or anxious, 61% reported bad mental health for one week or more each month (Seidler, 2021, p. 4). Our queer youth in North Dakota deserve to confidently exist in spaces as their cisgender classmates; schools will play a big role in helping our youth feel affirmed and accepted.

LGBTQ positive school climates exist in very small percentages across the state. Not supporting LGBTQ professional development training and having comprehensive LGBTQ anti-bullying/harassment polices creates a negative cascade across all outcomes related to school belonging, opportunity, and support (Seidler, 2022, p.6). Noted in the research, positive school climate practices and policies were major contributors to the success of LGBTQ students:

A positive LGBTQ-specific school climate, as opposed to a general positive school climate, is one that has supportive staff, teachers, and nurses who provide a sense of safety and support for LGBTQ students, promotes student empowerment and visibility through gay-straight alliances and inclusive curricula, has policies that explicitly enumerate protections on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity, has staff

that are required to learn about LGBTQ topics as part of their professional development, and has staff that intervene when sexual orientation and gender identity-based harassment take place (Kosciw et al., 2016, p. 144).

The research showing positive impacts of gender affirming policies and procedures in public schools for not only queer students, but all students. Our state is at risk of creating school environments that queer students will not be able to exist in; OR our kids will go against these radical and dangerous policies and continue to affirm and welcome their friends. It is not fair to shove queer students back to the dark reaches of their personal closet, if they do not have a safe person to turn to at home, not able to talk to their supportive adult at school, what options do they have left? Nothing good, that's for sure. What a lonely existence the legislative body is setting up for our kids. I absolutely understand why families are making plans to leave.

Again, I urge a DO NOT PASS on HB 1522. Just because the authors of this bill hate queer kids, does not mean queer kids do not exist. These bills will kill kids, do not do this to them.

To the North Dakota Legislative Council,

My name is Alayna Kraft. I am 18 years old, I am a queer student, and I am testifying in opposition of HB 1522.

School is ultimately where students spend most of their time, arguably even more than their homes. The transgender and non binary student accommodations that HB 1522 plans to criminalize will have a detrimental impact on students.

According to the National Institutes of Health, 82% of transgender people have considered suicide in their lifetimes, and 40% have acted on their thoughts. If schools ban the usage of a student's preferred name and pronouns, some of these students will lose the only acceptance they have in their lives. Taking away the love and acceptance from transgender and non binary people is not going to make people stop being transgender or non binary. It will only make them hide it from everyone, and they'll be forced to let the dysphoria pile up.

If you could give your child a medicine that would make them 33.3% less likely to consider or act on suicidal impulses, wouldn't you? Studies show that when transgender students had even just one accepting adult in their lives, one third of those asked said that they reported less suicide attempts and thoughts. Acceptance and healthcare is critical for transgender people. Schools that have teachers who use the correct name and pronouns for students are quite literally saving lives.

During this time I would like to remind you that according to the Connecticut Health Investigative Team, 21% of Generation Z identifies as being a part of the LGBTQIA+ community. It's not always obvious. Transgender and non binary people could be people you know and love, and this bill would be hurting them tremendously. There is nothing unnatural about being transgender or non binary, science has stated for years that two biological birth sexes is overly simplified. Intersex people exist, and so do people with disorders of sex development. If these people have always existed, then it is not a stretch to assume that transgender and non binary people have also always existed.

Thank you for taking time out of your day to listen to me.

Chairperson, Senator Judy Lee, members of the Senate Human Services committee, I am Barry Nelson, here on behalf of the Fargo Human Rights Commission to testify regarding HB 1522, and I urge you to vote do not pass on this bill.

The Fargo Human Rights Commission consists of eleven volunteer members who are nominated by the Mayor and appointed by the City Commission. Each serves a three-year term. The Human Rights Commissioners represent a broad range of racial, religious, ethnic, social, economic, political and professional groups.

Our mission is: The Fargo Human Rights Commission provides leadership and education in areas of civil rights, to eliminate discrimination against persons because of color, creed, religion, national origin, age, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, or marital status. It encourages adherence to civil rights through education, conciliation, and mediation. It identifies human and civil rights-related concerns of the public and recommends policies to the board of city commissioners that protect and preserve individual rights.

At its February, 2023 commission meeting, the assembled commission members voted unanimously on a resolution standing in opposition to the numerous bills targeting our Transgender community.

Our opposition to these bills is based on two principles: 1) it is harming our kids, and 2) it is restricting our freedoms.

In support of principle number one, I cite the following: National research tells us that 75% of transgender youth feel unsafe at school and are more likely to miss school out of concern for their safety. The North Dakota Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance (YRBS) data from 2021 indicates that suicide ideation and attempts are disproportionately higher for LGBTQ. Evidence is as follows: middle school students who ever seriously considered suicide: straight – 22%; LGB – 65%; Transgender – 74.7%. Middle school students who have ever attempted suicide: straight – 7.5%; LGB – 29.3%; Transgender – 46.3%.

Passing bills that directly or indirectly target LGB and specifically Transgender students only enhance this environment by further targeting them within schools and community.

It is within the overall context of the numbers and breadth of bills being presented in this legislative body, that we stand in opposition to HB 1522.

The first question that comes to mind is: why? Why is this bill necessary? Does this not represent government overreach? Does not each individual school district within its own jurisdiction not have the means and best interests of their students and community at heart in developing these policies? Does not a school district not already have the resources and best practices to develop these policies as it pertains to use of a student's preferred pronoun?

Let's point out this bill's major flaws. Point number 2 states: A board of a school district shall establish, in consultation with the parent or legal guardian, a policy for the use of a separate restroom accommodation for a transgender student. And, Point number 3 states: A board of a school district or a school shall prohibit a student from using a restroom that does not coincide with the student's biological sex. This bill is a blatant form of discrimination and directly violates the executive order referred to as "Executive Order on Preventing and Combating Discrimination on the Basis of Gender Identity or Sexual Orientation" signed by Joseph R. Biden on

January 20th, 2021. The first two lines of this bill state: "Every person should be treated with respect and dignity and should be able to live without fear, no matter who they are or whom they love. Children should be able to learn without worrying about whether they will be denied access to the restroom, the locker room, or school sports." This includes transgender individuals.

This bill is inhumane in all aspects. There is ample literature and anecdotal stories of the consequences of current bathroom/locker room gender segregation:

- Kids don't drink fluids all day long resulting in dehydration.
- I visited with a number of young adults who shared their strategies so that they would avoid having to use the restroom for the entire day, including no fluid intake or "holding it in" until they got home at the close of day.

These obviously had immense impact on the quality of their school day and ultimately on their health.

To purposely and intentionally target this small, vulnerable population is misdirected at best, is cruel if not evil in its intent to inflict harm and pain on our children at its worst.

We take pride in our local schools in Fargo that seek to accommodate and educate all students, to create a safe and affirming learning environment for all its students and strongly urge you to vote no on this solution in search of a problem and the worst kind of government overreach.

TESTIMONY on HB 1522 from the NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF SOCIAL WORKERS—NORTH DAKOTA CHAPTER to the ND Senate Human Services Committee March 15, 2023

Chairperson Lee and members of the Senate Human Services Committee:

The Advocacy Committee of the NASW-ND submits this testimony in opposition to House Bill 1522. We appreciate the opportunity to share our perspective.

NASW-ND urges the members of the Senate Human Services Committee to vote DO NOT PASS on HB 1522 for the following reasons:

1. HB 1522 will harm and discriminate against transgender students throughout North Dakota.

In North Dakota, suicide attempt rates are 58 times above the national average for Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual (LGB) youth. Bullying is common for almost half of North Dakota's LGB youth and stigma remains rampant as eight percent of all youth testify that they were bullied because others thought they may be gay. The Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System compiled this data which is used to survey of middle and high school students statewide. From the data, it was high rates of considering suicide (47%) and attempting suicide (29%) prevailed among LGB students. Nowhere in the survey did they ask about transgender students, only LGB.

The Trevor Project has information on transgender youth and states that over half of transgender and nonbinary youth seriously considered suicide in the past year and nearly 1 in 5 have attempted suicide in the past year. 78% percent of transgender and nonbinary youth reported experiencing symptoms of anxiety and 65% symptoms of depression. 37% of transgender youth reported that they have been physically threatened or harmed due to their gender identity.

This bill would harm students by discriminating against them further with restroom restrictions and inconsistent use of preferred pronouns in the school.

2. HB 1522 prohibits public schools, teachers, and leadership from providing accommodations to transgender students.

This bill, causes inconsistencies in preferred-pronoun use, will create confusion among students, teachers, and staff, will promote bullying of transgender students, and will cause further trauma for transgender students.

By prohibiting schools and teachers from respecting transgender and nonbinary students, HB 1522 poses a serious threat to the wellbeing of many students. This bill would deny students who do not conform to a gender binary the opportunity to learn and live in a community that recognizes and respects them. All students deserve to be educated in a safe environment with schools and teachers who respect them for who they are.

The NASW-ND respectfully requests that members of the Senate Human Services Committee vote Do Not Pass on this bill.

My name is Kimberly Hurst and I reside in District 1. I am asking that you please render a do pass on House Bill 1522. I am a mom of four boys. As a parent, I expect the state of North Dakota and the local schools to protect my children's privacy rights when they are in school. Disregarding these rights should be unlawful. A student's perceived sexual orientation or gender identity does not change a school's obligation to protect *all* of their students. Safeguarding student's privacy rights should be the center point for local schools and the state of North Dakota. Local schools should devise solutions that align with respect, privacy and safety of *all* students, not just those who have a perceived or expressed gender that is inconsistent with the student's biological sex.

The language of this bill secures accommodation for transgender students by allowing local schools to adopt policies for using a separate restroom. So it is also reasonable to provide privacy to all other students to use a restroom that coincides with their biological sex. Not only is this language reasonable, it is fair and equitable because it is considering not just one group of students but *all* of the students and their safety and privacy.

I urge you to support the passing of House Bill 1522. Thank you for your consideration of this important matter and for your service to the state of North Dakota.

Chair Lee, Vice Chair Cleary, and Committee members:

On behalf of the ACLU of North Dakota, I submit joint testimony in opposition to HB1473 and HB1522.

The ACLU was counsel in *Carcaño et al. v. Cooper et al.*, the legal challenge to North Carolina's "bathroom ban" bills, HB 2 and HB 142. Additionally, The ACLU is currently counsel for Plaintiffs in litigation challenging anti-trans bills that have passed across the country over the past two years. As such, the ACLU is familiar with the prevailing doctrine governing litigation in this area of law and have direct knowledge of the costs and fees associated with litigation of this kind.

By singling out transgender students for discrimination and excluding them from restrooms and locker rooms that match their gender identity, 1473 discriminates based on transgender status and sex in violation of the United States Constitution and Title IX of the Civil Rights Act. If passed, this bill would send a message to vulnerable transgender youth that they are not welcome or accepted in their communities. It would expose school districts and the state to costly litigation and the potential loss of federal funding for education.

The Supreme Court has already declined to review a federal appeals court decision holding that policies like the one proposed here violate the constitutional and statutory rights of transgender students.¹ That is because the law is clear on this issue.

Where a law singles out people based on the fact that they have a gender identity that does not match the sex assigned to them at birth, it necessarily discriminates on the basis of sex and trans status, thus triggering heightened equal protection scrutiny under the Constitution. "[I]t is impossible to discriminate against a person for being ... transgender without discriminating against that individual based on sex."² As the U.S. Supreme Court has explained, "[a]ll gender-based classifications today warrant heightened scrutiny."³ There is no exception to heightened scrutiny for gender discrimination based on physiological or biological sex-based characteristics.⁴ This bill, if passed, would separately trigger heightened scrutiny for discriminating against individuals based on transgender status.⁵

Parties who seek to defend gender-based and trans-status based discrimination must demonstrate an "exceedingly persuasive justification' for that action." Under this standard, "the burden of justification is demanding and it rests entirely on the State."⁶ The North Dakota legislature has so far has offered no justification for HB1473 and HB 1522 except for hypothetical future problems that have not arisen. But under heightened scrutiny, justifications "must be genuine, not hypothesized or invented post hoc in response to litigation."⁷ This demanding standard leaves no

room for a state to hypothesize harms that have not come to pass in the many years that transgender students have used appropriate restrooms and locker rooms.

Likewise, if passed, HB1473 and HB 1522 would violate Title IX of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Title IX protects all students—including students who are transgender—from discrimination based on sex. Title IX states that "[n]o person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."⁸ The overwhelming majority of courts to consider the issue have held that discrimination against transgender students in schools is prohibited sex discrimination under Title IX.⁹ Since the Supreme Court's decision in *Bostock*, at least one federal appeals court has affirmed that Title IX's prohibition on sex discrimination likewise prohibits discrimination against transgender students when accessing single-sex spaces and activities.¹⁰

The federal government has made clear that it intends to enforce federal civil rights statutes, including Title IX, consistent with the Supreme Court's holding in *Bostock*.¹¹ This means that should North Dakota pass HB1473 and HB 1522 or bills like it that target transgender students for discrimination, it will not only likely face litigation by private parties but also by the federal government. And such a violation of Title IX will not only cost the state substantially in litigation costs but will also put the state's federal education funding at risk.

Even just considering lawsuits by private individuals, these cases are extremely costly. A Virginia school district paid \$1.3 million in attorneys' fees after spending years unsuccessfully defending its policy of banning transgender students from restrooms that align with their gender identity.¹² If passed, this bill will put school districts in the untenable position of facing huge liability if forced to comply with state law.

Because this bill violates the United States Constitution and federal civil rights law, it puts North Dakota at risk of losing hundreds of millions of dollars in federal funding, and harms transgender youth, all to solve a problem that plainly does not exist. Transgender students already live and go to school in North Dakota, they go to the restroom just like everyone else and their presence harms no one. But if passed, this bill would cause severe harms to transgender students who are just trying to live their lives and go to school alongside their peers.

We urge a "do not pass" recommendation on HB1473 and HB 1522.

Hello. My name is Shelley Farrell. I reside in Minot ND and I oppose HB 1522.

You are crushing me, spirit and soul with this bill. I am the mother of a transgender daughter and if you stood in my shoes you'd never allow this to happen.

If you haven't raised a transgender child, you can't know the horrific pain that it entails. If you don't know the stories of transgender persons than you can't understand the struggle.

It began at a young age. She loved people and wanted to be social but she was often left out because she was "different ".

She was 12 years old when I found a suicide note. The bulling she endured was brutal. Her life was threatened, she was abused and called awful things repeatedly. The kids were disgusting bullies. I always offered to homeschool her but she didn't want to be in isolation.

But the middle of 8th grade she was a dishrag of a person and we had to pull her out.

I suppose boys can't handle a gentle, compassionate and talented soul. Those boys don't need protection. My child does.

In high school she went to a school where people are accepted as they actually are. Pronouns were used according to a persons gender. Transgender girls are girls. Transgender boys are boys.

What harm can come from using the appropriate pronouns for our children. That other children might learn of others who are different from them and learn compassion and acceptance.

Misgendering transgender children is the same as misgendering cisgender children. No different!

While this bill in its current form does not compel teachers to misgender students like SB 2133, it would be unfortunate to limit districts from aligning their policies around best outcomes for students and with the consideration for student safety. It is for these reasons I urge a "Do Not Pass."

My name is Mia Halvorson, and I am currently a North Dakota resident and undergraduate student taking classes at both North Dakota State University and Minot State University. I am double majoring in Human Development Family Science, and Social Work, with an emphasis on women and gender studies, our youth, and marginalized communities.

The first issue I take note of is there is no fiscal note on this bill. That, in turn, indicates the sponsor of this legislation has not recognized the costly impact this bill will have. I graduated from the small school of Fairmount, North Dakota. My graduating class was just six students, with K - 12 serving roughly 100 students. The school had two men's restrooms and two women's restrooms. There are no gender-neutral locations for a transgender person to use if this bill forces transgender people out of the bathroom they are most comfortable with.

Considering there is no gender-neutral restroom, this innately forces transgender people to use the only space provided, which is a bathroom they are not comfortable with. Not all schools have the ability to provide individuals with a space they can use. This will lead to a lawsuit in a different manner than the bill intends, in which the student who doesn't have a restroom will sue for damages.

We don't have the ability to build these spaces prior to the next academic year, which starts just five months from now. School's not only don't have the funding, but it just isn't possible in the short time span.

I ask that you vote NO on HB 1522 for the reasons listed above, the reasons other individuals testifying provide, and the hundreds of additional reasons I could provide.

I am a board certified pediatrician who worked in North Dakota for forty years, from 1980 to 2020. I worked at the NDDOH from 1985 to 2000 and served at times as the State Epidemiologist, AIDS/Project Director, Director of Maternal and Child Health and Chief Medical Officer. As a pediatrician, I provided primary care to LGBTQ adolescents and treated them with dignity and respect.

In 1989, the North Dakota Legislature passed AIDS/HIV legislation which balanced good public health and compassion and led our state to have the LOWEST HIV cumulative case rate in the United States for the next 30 years. We reached out to the LGBTQ community to reduce HIV transmission.

Chairman Lee and Members of the Committee:

My name is Christina Sambor, I am submitting testimony on behalf of the North Dakota Human Rights Coalition, the Human Rights Campaign and Youthworks to oppose the various bills set for hearing this morning that seek to exclude transgender students from facilities and limit their medical care.

HB 1473 and HB 1522 both deny a transgender person or student's ability to use the bathroom that corresponds to their gender. First of all, these types of policies are rooted in the idea that allowing a trans person, in particular a trans woman, access to the women's bathroom poses some sort of threat to the safety of women generally. There is no evidentiary support for this inflammatory and discriminatory position. Second, there is no reason that these issues can't and shouldn't be left up to individual school boards to handle. Conservative principles purport to value local control. School Boards and administrators are in a much better position to assess how a particular school district can handle these matters in a way that diffuses harmful speculation and considers the rights of the trans student as well as any concerns of the other students. There is no evidence that this is a statewide problem that requires a broad, discriminatory response.

Additionally, these policies go against the recommendations of many national education organizations such as National School Boards Association, the National Association of Secondary School Principals, the American School Counselor Association, the National Education Association, and the National Federation of High School Associations.

Most importantly, we know that affirming transgender students and respecting their rights shows them they are equal members of society, that they are welcome here, and that their worth is not diminished by their school. This is the position that the Legislature should be taking, that we can and will hear from, and uphold the rights of, a group of our citizens who are being unfairly attacked on a coordinated national level.

As to HB 1522, a group of doctors have testified to the scientific validity of safe and well managed care for transgender individuals. Our state policy should be guided by their expertise and compassion, not by fear. Societal changes certainly can be difficult, especially when they involve children, and the desire to make sure we are condoning practices that are helpful, not harmful, is a valid and understandable concern. Those with expertise in this area have provided their clinical knowledge to this committee, and we encourage our policy makers to give their expertise the respect and acceptance it deserves.

For all of these reasons, please vote do not pass on HB 1473, HB 1254, and HB 1522.


Testimony Supporting House Bill 1522

Good morning Madam Chair Lee and honorable members of the Senate Human Services Committee. My name is Mark Jorritsma and I am the Executive Director of North Dakota Family Alliance Legislative Action. I am testifying on behalf of our organization in favor of HB 1522 and respectfully request that you render a "DO PASS" on this bill.

We understand that it can be difficult for some individuals to identify themselves on the spectrum of gender, as distinct from their biological sex. That being said, our organization and its constituents believe that the issue should be kept separate from the responsibility of a school and its teachers and students. Gender is a social edifice that is created; it is not science. As such, if taken to its conclusion, we will eventually find teachers and administrative school officials having to refer to a student as anything they choose, including animals, as has already happened in some places. This bill makes an effort to avoid this kind of foolishness.

The bill does not prohibit the use of preferred pronouns by individuals with various gender identities. However, what it does is protect against being forced to use preferred pronouns, in accordance with Americans' First Amendment Right to free speech.

Further, not using someone's preferred pronoun can simply be a matter of confusion or unawareness. Dear Chair Lee and members of the Senate Human Services Committee,

My name is Kara Gloe. I am a mental health therapist licensed in both North Dakota and Minnesota. I work at Canopy Medical Clinic in Fargo, ND. Among the primary populations of people I serve are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, asexual, aromantic, and Two Spirit (LGBTQIA2S+) folks in North Dakota – including students in North Dakota's public schools. I am a former elected school board member and I have two children in public schools. It is from these intersecting experiences that I urge you to vote **Do Not Pass on HB 1522.** If passed, this bill would do irreparable harm to transgender students throughout North Dakota, infringe upon the rights of local school boards/school districts to make decisions that best reflect the needs of their students, and drive teachers out of the state. Additionally, it ignores the many nuanced needs of students, regardless of gender identity.

First, the data on the lethality of being a young trans person in the State of North Dakota is concrete. For trans high schoolers in North Dakota we know:

- More than half seriously considered suicide in the last year
- That rate is 3.3 times higher than their straight cisgender counterparts
- 30.4% attempted suicide in the past 12 months
- That is five times higher than their straight cisgender counterparts

This is data that focuses solely on youth in North Dakota, is from the 2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey. These are the stats before the 2023 North Dakota legislature introduced multiple bills either directly targeting or severely disrupting the lives of our transgender friends, family, and neighbors. *Further, peer reviewed research from the Trevor Project shows transgender children who have one supportive adult in their lives are 39% less likely to attempt suicide.* This bill would rob so many children, who may not have one supportive adult at home, of the opportunity to have one at school. It is not hyperbolic to say, this bill will endanger the lives of North Dakota students.

Second, local control is something the North Dakota legislature often touts as something it values. However, this bill strips that away from school districts. During my tenure as a school board member, we had a plethora of data at our fingertips. Data we used to make decisions on how to improve educational outcomes and the reduce opportunity gap. Is it not best for the institutions that have the data on the students they serve and the expertise in education to make decisions they deem most appropriate to reach their own goals?

Third, this bill will force teachers out of the state. I have heard about teachers who have already left North Dakota, because they do not feel like North Dakota provides a safe teaching environment. We do not have to search hard to see how laws like this have panned out in other states. Florida's teacher shortage is so dire, they are putting people with no teaching education or experience in classrooms. The collapse of a state's education system is a fast train to the bottom. Is that where we want to be?

Lastly, there are number of reasons children may need to use single stall unisex bathroom that have nothing to do with gender identity. Some of these reasons may include trauma, phobias, anxiety, etc. Under this law, providing these students with this simple accommodation would be punishable by up to \$25,000 in damages.

Federal law requires public schools to provide a safe learning environment for every student. This bill would make that impossible in North Dakota. For the health and well-being of every student in North Dakota I urge you to vote **Do Not Pass on HB 1522.**

I request two amendments to the most recent version of HB 1522 for your consideration.

Please amend current lines 10-12 of bullet point 2 in Section 1 where it states the following:

"A board of a school district shall establish, in consultation with the parent or legal guardian, a policy for the use of a separate restroom accommodation for a transgender student."

The original intent of the bill was never to provide a transgender accommodation which it now currently does. This creates a fiscal note because some schools would need to remodel. The original bill never had a fiscal note because it had no transgender accommodation, only ones for males and females. We do not need public schools remodeling for transgender bathrooms and locker rooms. Article 8, Section 1 of the ND Constitution states:

"A high degree of intelligence, patriotism, integrity, and morality on the part of every voter in a government by the people being necessary to ensure the continuance of that government and the prosperity and happiness of the people...."

Providing transgender accommodations does not teach our great children intelligence, patriotism, integrity, and morality.

Please amend current lines 8-9 of bullet point 1 in Section 1 where it states the following:

Committee Chair and members of the Committee, my name is Audin Rhodes (legally Allison Joyce Rhodes) and I am writing in opposition to HB 1522.

I am a concerned civilian who was born and raised in North Dakota. I am a family services case manager at a statewide organization partnered with North Dakota Health and Human Services that helps lower income people receive services to better their lives and families. I am here of my own volition due to the extremely personal stake I have in this legislature. I grew up in the small town of Velva, ND and am now living in Minot, ND. For nearly 30 years I've been here and for well over half my life I've known I was queer.

I am trans non-binary and growing up in rural North Dakota did not allow me the vocabulary to define and express myself. I knew I was kind of a boy and kind of a girl but had no representation to look up to, no role models, no GSA. No safe havens. So I remained closeted for a very long time and am only recently out to most of my family and my workplace.

Because of my personal gender fluid identity, I was able to use the girls bathroom without much thought. It personally didn't feel fully right, but it didn't feel fully wrong either. Some of my friends did not have that luxury. They felt fully wrong and coerced, every time they had to use a bathroom that didn't align with their gender identity. They felt cut every time they were called a name or pronoun that did not reflect who they understood themselves to be. One of my best friends nearly killed himself when he was an adolescent youth because his family did not accept his queerness and because he thought he would never be able to live and be loved as a man. I'm so thankful he lived beyond that day. Many queer kids aren't so lucky however. Half of all transgender and nonbinary youths have seriously considered attempting suicide in the past year. And at least one attempts suicide every 45 seconds. These are our children.

I want those of you in this room with children, to imagine them being in a school that did not or does not see them and in fact deliberately harms them. If your child is an adult I want you to go back to when they were a teen. Picture their face. Their style choices. Their likes and dislikes. I want you to imagine your masculine son being called "she" or "her" by peers and adults and being forced to use the girls bathroom and being excluded from sports like football. I want you to imagine your daughter being called a boy and being made fun of for liking feminine things or wearing a sparkly dress to prom even though they are in fact a girl. Picture her being forced to use the boys bathroom when all she wants is to be treated like the other girls in her class. Can you imagine how distressing this would be for your child? How much mental anguish this disrespect and invisibility would cause? As if being a youth finding your way in a complicated world isn't painful enough?

And if that's too hard to visualize, can you imagine if someone called <u>you</u> the wrong pronouns and the wrong name every day, all day? What if I called councilman ______, Tiffany, and called her a

woman? That would be upsetting to you, wouldn't it? You would correct me and say, "My name is actually ______. And I'm a man." If I and the rest of the world kept ignoring you and told you "No actually, you're a woman, your name is Tiffany, and you need to use the women's restroom...Don't you think it would take it's toll after a while? After a few months? And then years? You'd be forced to live a life that is not true to who you are. You'd have to cut parts of yourself off, and that is an act that leads to death. And I don't think anyone in this room wants to lead children to death or harm. We can at the very least agree on that.

Kids deserve to be accepted for who they are and for who they are becoming. They deserve to explore their gender and sexuality. They deserve to explore their values. They deserve a future.

There is no harm in allowing kids to live life as their most authentic selves. It is a beautiful thing to watch a child grow into their confidence and identity. It costs you nothing to be kind to them as they navigate who they are. It costs you nothing to love the uniqueness of our gender-queer children. That is why I am in strong opposition of HB 1522.

Our advocates and attorneys assist not only individuals with developmental and intellectual disabilities, but also those with mental health disabilities. This is where we see an intersectionality between gender identity and mental health. LGBTQ+ individuals are more likely to have a mental health disability than the general population. Studies routinely show that more than a third of LGBTQ+ individuals, and nearly 40% of trans individuals, report having at least one more or disability. Forty percent of trans individuals also reported having attempted suicide at some point in their lives. As shown by these statistics, disability issues disproportionately impact LGBTQ+ individuals.

Young people experience an even greater impact. Fifty-three percent of individuals aged eighteen to twenty-five years report serious psychological distress, and at least one quarter of LGBTQ+ youth report experiencing bullying at school because of an actual or perceived disability.

The prevalence of mental health disabilities in the LGBTQ+ community makes the community particularly vulnerable to proposals such as HB 1522, even if the proposal is well intentioned and purports to advance the rights of another class of individuals.

For these reasons, P&A urges a DO NOT PASS on HB 1522.

Dear Senate Human Sevices Committee,

Your dedication to protecting our youth is admirable, but I'm speaking to you today to share some concerns about how bills such as HB1522 may actually do the opposite and be harmful to youth of North Dakota.

Supporters of bills such as HB1522 have repeatedly said that they intend to "protect" youth. However, none of these supporters have yet answered concerns about the unintended consequences of bills like this.

Additionally, no one has discussed the harmful effects lack of information and a feeling of being unwelcome has on youth. A 2011 study noted that adolescents who identify as a sexual minority (i.e., gay/lesbian, bisexual, or other sexual orientation) were twice as likely to perform acts of self-harm. A study ten years later further noted the association between the experience of being identified as a sexual minority and the increased risk of self-harm.

Aside from self-harm, lack of representation in one's community leads to dehumanization of a person according to 2020 research by Mancini T. Ferrari. This dehumanization further contributes to the mental health decline in youth. An article published in 2022 surmised that making sure people from diverse backgrounds are represented in mental health education resources "is an important component to inclusive accessible care."

In the landmark 2018 case Doe ex rel. Doe v. Boyertown Area School District, testimony relied on the American Academy of Pediatrics' amicus brief reporting that "policies that exclude transgender individuals exacerbate the individual's risk of anxiety and depression, low selfesteem, engaging in self-injurious behaviors, suicide, and other adverse outcomes."

A consultant with Fargo's Harbor Health Initiative explained that bills like HB1522 are not operating in the best interest of people, but rather creating anxiety and fear. They said: "since these actions aren't well grounded, they're not going to result in better outcomes. Which means more destabilizations and more anxiety and fear from it.."

A primary goal of Harbor Health is to promote better mental health, and HB1522 and other anti-trans bills do not support this goal. "You don't ever want a person thinking there is no option or place for themselves." This person went on to say: "When we're looking at minority communities, a big thing for them is finding representation, because it can be extremely socially isolating to not see yourself represented in materials or stories. There are a lot of other factors to consider too when we think about shame and the narratives youth may have about themselves, their bodies, and even their desires when they're living in a society that actively stigmatizes them."

Please, for the sake of ND youth, vote Do Not Pass on HB1522.

Senate Human Services Committee HB 1522 Testimony in Opposition

Dear Chair Lee and Members of the Committee:

I write on behalf of the Government Affairs Committee for the Fargo Board of Education and respectfully urge you to vote NO on HB 1522.

The Fargo Public School's mission statement is "Educating and Empowering All Students to Succeed." Inherent in this statement is a commitment that no student attending the Fargo Public Schools will be subject to discrimination, bullying, harassment, and that every student will be accepted, and have the same rights and opportunities to learn and participate in school life regardless of gender, gender identity or expression, race, nationality, or disability. HB 1522 stands in the way of this mission and harms students, schools, and school culture.

Allowing students to use facilities aligned with their gender identity has a powerful impact towards ensuring a more accepting, respectful, and inclusive learning and working environment. The simple act of properly addressing a student by their identified pronouns similarly fosters an inclusive, respectful, and accepting environment. National research suggests that an overwhelming 75% of transgender youth have felt unsafe at school and are more likely to miss school out of concern for their own safety. Transgender students suffer from suicide ideation and attempts at far higher rates than their non-LGBTQ peers. All students–particularly our most vulnerable–deserve to learn in an environment free of sex-based harassment, all students should have the freedom to express and have the school honor gender identity, and all students should be able to use facilities in accordance with their gender identity. Research also supports that when schools implement LGBTQ-inclusive policies, such policies benefit ALL students, not just those who identify as LGBTQ. HB 1522 is in direct conflict of our school district's commitment to educational justice.

Additionally, HB 1522 Section 1, Part 2's provision that contemplates use of a specific transgender bathroom upon parental or guardian consultation and approval ignores the reality that these students could face neglect or abuse from their parents and guardians, in addition to creating a discriminatory and segregated policy based upon sex. Equally important, establishing such restrooms in many districts would be cost-prohibitive and unworkable.

We strongly urge you to vote NO on HB 1522.

I am here to present NEUTRAL testimony. Look at Line 10.

This legislation would be greatly strengthened if the words "in consultation with" were replaced with "while fully informing".

This is because the Century Code, and the school district, should not become a party to family quarrels.

We should not be overly concerned whenever adolescents act like smart alecks. An eye roll often works better than getting mad. I'll put it this way - if banana says rock pronouns are banana and rock, then rock pronouns are banana and rock. That's a reference to an incident in a middle school last August - and it suggests that the next generation will do just fine.

And case you're interested, given my stance here and my opposition to child sterilization, I do plan to testify against Senate Bill 2260.

Testimony Before the Senate Human Services Committee HB 1522 March 21, 2023

Chairwoman Lee and members of the Senate Human Services Committee, for the record, my name is Nick Archuleta, and I am president of North Dakota United. On behalf of our 11,500 members, I rise today to oppose HB 1522 and to urge a *do not pass* recommendation.

Madam Chair, we have two primary objections to HB 1522, The first is that should HB 1522 become law, it will represent an unnecessary legislative overreach into an area best left to locally elected school boards. I know that many school districts already have policies related to accommodations for transgender students and those which do not are fully empowered to create a policy should the need arise. I would contend, Madam Chair, that schools are best administered by those closest to the community in which they exist.

Not content with telling school boards what to do, HB 1522 extends its overreach to the courts by telling them what remedies they must award in the event that someone successfully sues the school board or the school district.

Second, Chair Lee and members of the Committee, in introducing the bill on January 24 to the House Human Services Committee, the primary sponsor of HB 1522 cited two incidents from other states before, at the 11:00:27 mark of the video, he claimed without proof that the Williston football team beat up a transgender student who had gone into the girls' rest room. He then continued his presentation of the bill by saying, "Everyone needs to be treated with dignity, civility, and respect." This bill does not do that. It does the opposite. It treats a particularly vulnerable population like pariahs and further marginalizes transgender students.

Finally, Madam Chair and Committee members, it is not a coincidence that there have been over 425 bills submitted in legislatures across the country addressing our fellow citizens who are transgender. There has been a growing and relentless effort over the past several years to ostracize transgender students in our nation's schools. The results have been

My High School Punished Me for Saying a Male Shouldn't Be Allowed to Watch Me Undress | Alliance Defending Freedom



My High School Punished Me for Saying a Male Shouldn't Be Allowed to Watch Me Undress

I was taught girls should speak up when something makes them feel uncomfortable, but the school didn't care.

My High School Punished Me for Saying a Male Shouldn't Be Allowed to Watch Me Undress | Alliance Defending Freedom



As a girl, I was taught to respect the privacy of my body, and to speak up if I felt unsafe or if something made me feel uncomfortable. Now I'm 14 and shocked to learn not all adults take you seriously when you say you don't feel safe or comfortable. In fact, they may even punish you for speaking out.

That's what happened to me when I said I didn't think a teenage male should be allowed in the girls' locker room where my teammates and I undress and change. I'm a private person when it comes to my body, even in the safety and comfort of home. But at school, apparently there's no problem with a male student freely watching us girls change our clothes.

It was a conversation I had with some peers in French class that landed me in trouble with the officials at Randolph Union High School in Vermont. Someone overheard me telling my friends that a dude doesn't belong in the girls' locker room, and they reported me to the co-principals, even though the male student didn't hear me and wasn't in the class.

The controversy didn't start in French class, though; it started when the school allowed a male who identifies as a girl to compete on our girls' volleyball team. When the male student entered our locker room, we were changing. Some of us didn't have a shirt on; others of us were only in our underwear. Naturally, some of us were uncomfortable and asked the student to leave, but we were ignored.

I was upset after the incident and called my mom to tell her about it. She and several other parents called the school administrators to express concerns about the male student being in the girls' locker room. Not only did school officials make no attempt to provide us with any support or a workable solution, they made *me* the bad guy for saying that a teenage male shouldn't be allowed to watch us girls undress.

Shouldn't every girl be taught to speak out to protect herself from situations where she hasn't given consent — and be listened to by those in a position to help? If something feels off, trust your gut? Not at my high school. If you don't comply with the school's preferred gender identity policy, *you're* the bad guy. For expressing true, commonsense, biological facts — boys and girls are different and must respect each other's bodily privacy — I was punished.

The school began an investigation into the comments I made in class and banned our entire girls' volleyball team from using the girls' locker room. The co-principals notified me that I was found guilty of harassment and bullying of "a student on the basis of the targeted student's gender identity." As punishment, school officials told me I must take part in a "restorative justice circle" with the equity coordinator, submit a "reflective essay," and serve out-of-school suspension.

So, with the legal assistance of Alliance Defending Freedom, I sued the co-principals and Orange Southwest School District officials. On the same day that we filed suit, the superintendent rescinded the disciplinary actions against me.

But I wasn't the only one to experience retaliation for stating a simple truth and wanting to be safe. My dad, Travis, was suspended from his coaching job for standing up for me. Thank you, Madam Chair and Honorable Members of the Committee. My name is Karen Hanson and I live in District 35. I am in support of House Bill 1522. I agree wholeheartedly that the focus of this bill is to protect the private space boundaries of our K-12 school bathrooms. This gives us the opportunity to provide for everyone's physical needs of providing a safe school bathroom, along with remedies of a civil cause of action if a student has suffered damages because of a violation. This part of the bill is also very important.

Before I continue with my own personal thoughts, I will read this article of a situation that is becoming far too common. Testimonies like this are not isolated incidents, unfortunately. (See attached article from Alliance Defending Freedom: "My High School Punished Me for Saying a Male Shouldn't Be Allowed to Watch Me Undress")

The issue at hand in this bill is really all about protective boundaries. It provides protection in boundaries for everyone in that "...a school shall prohibit a student from using a restroom that does not coincide with the student's biological sex." It also offers a remedy for the school and parents of transgender students to work something out so that student can have a safe bathroom of their own, if need be.

What it comes down to is protecting our children in the bathrooms and locker rooms, which are the most vulnerable places in schools, because they are the most private spaces. The rights of our children to have safe bathrooms MUST NOT be overridden in favor of someone of a chromosomally different sex who says they have a right to be in the opposite sex's bathroom just to feel affirmed, accepted or not have their feelings hurt.

When children are little, we teach them all about safety. It should not change as they are growing into their teen years through high school under our care as parents. And that includes the care we pay for and entrust to the school, teachers, and administrators. Safety is the real issue. It's not about feelings or being affirmed. It's truly about providing the safest place to use the bathroom without having the daily fear that someone from the opposite gender has the freedom to walk right in because there's no fear of penalty, because no clear boundaries exist or are enforced with penalties.

I was recently reading research on brain development. It said that all behaviors and experiences you endure until age 25 have potential to impact your developing brain, which tends to finish developing right around the age of 25. Adults over the age of 25 tend to feel less sensitive to peer pressure. The reason I mention this is that children are not equipped to set proper boundaries of safety for themselves, much less in a bathroom with the opposite gender. WE are the adults and are dealing with this right now on their behalf so they can be kids, go to school, and be protected in the most private spaces of those schools. Last week a friend of mine

encountered a mom and her two daughters selling Girls Scout Cookies. In conversation, this HB 1522 came up. The mom, in reference to this bill, said that her daughters are afraid to go to the bathroom in their elementary school here in Bismarck. She indicated that they will try to not go to the bathroom all day long in order to avoid that room. She didn't expound on that point.

So, boundaries are what make everyone safe, even if they don't like those boundaries. Case in point, when our children were young, they had to learn our safety boundaries. They didn't always like those boundaries, so they pushed back. When we as parents did not enforce those boundaries that we had set in place, they would keep pushing to see what the limit was. But when we followed THROUGH with enforcing those safe and secure boundary lines, guess what happened. They knew they were safe then. And that did not mean they "liked" the boundaries, but why is it that we feel the need to coddle our kids and think they have to "like" everything? It's not about coddling and affirmations, it's truly about safety.

The pushing against the boundaries of everything descent and good and wholesome has been accelerating all over this nation. Where does it end and how far does it go? We have an opportunity to come together and put these real protective measures in place, and this bill will literally protect thousands upon thousands of North Dakota children for decades to come by keeping them safe in their own bathrooms. And who knows, one of those children could be yours or someone you love!

My High School Punished Me for Saying a Male Shouldn't Be Allowed to Watch Me Undress

I was taught girls should speak up when something makes them feel uncomfortable, but the school didn't care.

My High School Punished Me for Saying a Male Shouldn't Be Allowed to Watch Me Undress | Alliance Defending Freedom



As a girl, I was taught to respect the privacy of my body, and to speak up if I felt unsafe or if something made me feel uncomfortable. Now I'm 14 and shocked to learn not all adults take you seriously when you say you don't feel safe or comfortable. In fact, they may even punish you for speaking out.

That's what happened to me when I said I didn't think a teenage male should be allowed in the girls' locker room where my teammates and I undress and change. I'm a private person when it comes to my body, even in the safety and comfort of home. But at school, apparently there's no problem with a male student freely watching us girls change our clothes.

It was a conversation I had with some peers in French class that landed me in trouble with the officials at Randolph Union High School in Vermont. Someone overheard me telling my friends that a dude doesn't belong in the girls' locker room, and they reported me to the co-principals, even though the male student didn't hear me and wasn't in the class.

The controversy didn't start in French class, though; it started when the school allowed a male who identifies as a girl to compete on our girls' volleyball team. When the male student entered our locker room, we were changing. Some of us didn't have a shirt on; others of us were only in our underwear. Naturally, some of us were uncomfortable and asked the student to leave, but we were ignored.

I was upset after the incident and called my mom to tell her about it. She and several other parents called the school administrators to express concerns about the male student being in the girls' locker room. Not only did school officials make no attempt to provide us with any support or a workable solution, they made *me* the bad guy for saying that a teenage male shouldn't be allowed to watch us girls undress.

Shouldn't every girl be taught to speak out to protect herself from situations where she hasn't given consent — and be listened to by those in a position to help? If something feels off, trust your gut? Not at my high school. If you don't comply with the school's preferred gender identity policy, *you're* the bad guy. For expressing true, commonsense, biological facts — boys and girls are different and must respect each other's bodily privacy — I was punished.

The school began an investigation into the comments I made in class and banned our entire girls' volleyball team from using the girls' locker room. The co-principals notified me that I was found guilty of harassment and bullying of "a student on the basis of the targeted student's gender identity." As punishment, school officials told me I must take part in a "restorative justice circle" with the equity coordinator, submit a "reflective essay," and serve out-of-school suspension.

So, with the legal assistance of Alliance Defending Freedom, I sued the co-principals and Orange Southwest School District officials. On the same day that we filed suit, the superintendent rescinded the disciplinary actions against me.

But I wasn't the only one to experience retaliation for stating a simple truth and wanting to be safe. My dad, Travis, was suspended from his coaching job for standing up for me. He expressed his views on a Facebook post, calling out the injustice of the male student being allowed to use our locker room and watch my teammates and I undress: "He got a free show, they got violated," my dad wrote. My name is Aubrianna Brown. I am a homeschooled high school junior from Bismarck, North Dakota. I stand in support of house bill 1522.

I know what you might be thinking: why would a homeschooler care about the public-school restroom policy? Regardless of where I go to school, I am an impassioned young adult who realizes that this policy will affect my friends, siblings, peers, and the future of our great state. I am speaking today on behalf of the children in the public school system. They are subjected to this destructive thought-process and ideology unceasingly. There is no relief. As a drama student at one of the local high schools, I have seen firsthand the confusion and depression of the students who are questioning their gender. They are drowning in a sea of confusion and doubt in a society that ties weights to their ankles through its affirmation. These wonderful students do not need their confusion confirmed. They have mistakenly attached their identity to their gender, but people are so much more than gender. We have the ability to affirm the person, while not conforming our views to their delusion. A more help ful response would be to guide them to the truth about gender and sexuality. "Transgenderism refers to a psychological state, how he allegedly views himself which is irrelevant to everyone except him. Locker rooms are not meant to house people based on psychological states."1

Providing the opportunity for transgender people to use the bathroom corresponding to the gender they identify with will destroy the comfort of the masses. "For most well-adjusted people, their comfort level in the bathroom depends on who else is allowed to use it. Most girls feel comfortable using the girl's bathroom because there will only be girls inside it."² We not only need to consider the small minority of transgendered people, but also the little girls who did not asked to be subjected to seeing men in inappropriate ways and have their innocence taken away. We need to consider the young boys and men who easily can be accused of taking advantage of situations that they should never be subjected to in the first place, from inadvertently looking through cracks in doors up to easier access for violence and rape. Once you see something, you can never unsee it. These images can haunt people for years to come. The experiences can harm the innocence of all children concerned and have detrimental effects later in life, on their mental wellbeing, marriages, and overall relationships. "So much of the reasoning behind the LGBT movement is based on people's feelings and experiences. Their legitimate pain calls out for compassion and support, touching

our hearts, as it should. But when we elevate people's stories, feelings, preferences, and experiences above Scriptural truth, we have built a house of cards instead of a foundation for life."³ Feelings need to take its proper place, so here is my story wrapped in the blanket of God-given truth.

As I had mentioned before, I participate in the theater program at a local high school. During shows, there is normally not a lot of time to change in between scenes. The director has set aside separate changing rooms for guys and girls so we can make our quick changes with some privacy. The only problem is that one of the guys is allowed to be in the girls changing area while the other guys are not. This is extremely uncomfortable for me. I do not want a guy talking to me while I am changing. I do not want him to see me in my undergarments. I can try to go in nooks and carneys and try to wait to use the bathroom when it is available, but that is not always practical or doable. This should not be allowed. This boy is one of my good friends in this program. I do not believe that he would violate my safety in any way, but for me to still be subjected to this infringement of my modesty and the modesty of the other girls around me is unthinkable. I know that I am homeschooled, but this makes my case stronger. If it happens to me, it happens to them. If I am uncomfortable, they are uncomfortable. They just cannot be here to tell you about it themselves.

Madam chairman and members of the committee. My name is Rep. SuAnn Olson, representing District 8.

As I mentioned in my testimony last week, separating people based on sex has been addressed by the courts a number of times over the years. A recent 11th Circuit court case 18-13592 was issued in December 2022 and explained the application of the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment to sex-based classifications by stating that "a policy will pass constitutional muster only if it satisfies intermediate scrutiny." Intermediate scrutiny means "the government must show that the classification serves important governmental objectives and that discriminatory means employed are substantially related to the achievement of those objectives." In that particular case, protecting personal privacy was found to be an important government objective.

Here is quote from Ruth Bade Ginsburg: "[s]eparate places to disrobe, sleep, [and] perform personal bodily functions are permitted, in some situations required, by regard for individual privacy." Ruth Bader Ginsburg, *The Fear of the Equal Rights Amendment, Wash. Post, Apr. 7, 1975*

We need to acknowledge that females as a sex are inherently more vulnerable than males and government policies must recognize and protect their privacy and safety.

Women have a right to Privacy and Safety. This is not too much to expect. I have 9 granddaughters. The oldest is nearly 10 and will be moving on to middle school soon. I want her to be safe in a restroom. She has a right to not undress in a girls' locker room in front of males with penises. She has a right to not view penises when she uses the restroom or a locker room. She has a right to be safe. She has a right to her own privacy.

Hello Senator Lee,

I wanted to thank you once again for listening to my testimony last week on HB 1473 and HB 1254.

I'm unfortunately not able to testify today on the bill, but I still wanted to send a message of concern I have for HB 1522.

One of my bigger concerns is a lack of funding within schools. I spoke with well over a dozen small schools, many of which only had male and female restrooms. Many of these schools stated they would have funding issues, including Lidgerwood Public School, indicating they have nowhere they can build a restroom (especially prior to the next school year). It would incur heavy financial impacts and it is just an unreachable task in the next five months.

Other schools stated they would turn a current handicapped restroom into a gender-neutral restroom, which I recognize as a possible solution. However, I want to discuss the possibility of bullying. It is enforcing that trans students use a restroom deemed as handicapped, which I believe could construe "trans people are handicapped." This subjects these children to bullying, a group that is already more likely to struggle with bullying and suicide.

I asked other questions about the schools, including if students could use these restrooms without concerns about running late to class. Many high schools have roughly four minutes to get out of class, head to their lockers to grab their belongings and get back to class. In some of these schools, including Bowbells Public School, their restroom is in the corner of the school. Yes, a smaller school, but it causes a higher likelihood of students to be late.

I have many other concerns, especially with trans students who appear cisgender passing. I know I discussed this last week about myself, being a trans person who has updated all legal documents and does not have their gender questioned.

I can go as far as to say I used the womens restroom multiple times when I testified last week. I would also like to state that other senators were inside the restroom common spaces, none of which batted an eye at my gender.

I will say, once again, I talked to many small schools. But this issue also pertains to larger schools. If we have gender neutral restrooms, that means other students have access to these spaces. Who is to say another student, say cisgender, is using a gender neutral restroom before the trans student arrives? They no longer have a place they can go in that moment.

You also cant label these spaces as 'trans' bathrooms, as this could out a student who is just starting an internal transition and doesn't feel comfortable using a restroom that aligns with their gender identity.

I would love to continue discussing my thoughts on topics relating to trans students, so I leave my email open to response. But, as stated earlier, there is a heavy financial impact on this legislation that is not thought about.
