Line item transfers - Section 3 would provide authority for the Secretary of State to transfer funding between line items.

Secretary of State's salary - Section 4 would provide the statutory changes increasing the Secretary of State's salary. The Secretary of State's annual salary would increase from the current level of \$114,486 to \$121,355, effective July 1, 2023, and to \$126,209, effective July 1, 2024, to reflect the 6 percent and 4 percent recommended salary increases.

Continuing Appropriations

Athletic commission fund - North Dakota Century Code Section 53-01-09 - Appropriates any funding received by the Secretary of State for license fees for all boxers, kickboxers, mixed style fighters, promoters, managers, judges, timekeepers, cornerpersons, knockdown counters, matchmakers, and referees or other participants and fees based on the percentage of gross revenues from any boxing, kickboxing, mixed fighting style competition, or sparring exhibition held in this state to pay for the expenses of members of the Commission of Combative Sports.

Deficiency Appropriations

There are no deficiency appropriations for this agency.

Significant Audit Findings

The State Auditor reported the Secretary of State did not appropriately reconcile revenue. There was a difference of \$75,211 from revenue generated through various citizen fees through the Secretary of State's office IT systems when compared to ConnectND, the state's accounting system.

At this time, there is no major related legislation for this agency.

Chairman Bekkedahl and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee. I am Michael Howe, and I am honored to be serving as North Dakota's 15th Secretary of State. As this is officially my 13th day on the job, my budget testimony today will be a combination of plans we currently have and an ask for a little latitude as I work to better understand the needs of our office and team.

The Secretary of State's Office works to preserve and protect election integrity and promotes North Dakota as the easiest place to start and grow a business. We conduct a wide range of licensing, regulatory, registration and administrative functions, and provide guidance and oversite for statewide elections. We also serve as the office of record for certain legal documents generated by the executive and legislative branches of state government, as well as public records and notices involving various business entities.

STATUTORY AUTHORITY

Our statutory authority can be found in the following:

- NDCC Title 10 Corporations;
- NDCC Title 16.1 Elections;
- administration of varied liens in 35-01, 35-05, 35-17, 35-21, 35-29, 35-30, 35-31;
- oversight of Uniform Commercial code in 41-09;
- licensing of contractors in 43-07;
- registration of notaries in 44-06.1;
- registration of partnerships in 45-10.2, 45-11, 45-22, 45-23;
- registration of trademarks and trade names in 47-22, 47-25;
- registration of charitable organizations in 50-22;
- serve as commissioner of combative sports in 53-01;
- registration of lobbyists in 54-05.1; and
- documents recorded by the office in 54-09.

AUDIT FINDINGS

Operational Audit for the Two-Year Period Ended June 30, 2020 – Finding lack of revenue reconciliation. This recommendation is partially implemented. Reconciliation of fees recorded from our systems were not appropriately being reconciled against those same fees as they flowed through the Bank of North Dakota and were deposited and entered into the ConnectND (state) system. A discrepancy of \$74,211 was discovered in the reporting which involved no misplaced funds. A monthly reconciliation has been developed and is in the testing phase. Future plans include building an interface between Secretary of State and ConnectND system to further eliminate reconciliation errors.

Voting Security Assessment Audit 2022 – The Office of the State Auditor looked at six potential vulnerabilities with possible threat scenarios and determined a risk score for each. All scenarios were determined to be low risk. I am quoting our state auditor, he said "our election systems are incredibly secure across the state."

Operational Audit for Two-Year Period Ended June 30, 2022 – Audit not yet scheduled.

CURRENT BIENNIUM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In addition to executing the official duties with integrity and financial responsibility, Secretary Jaeger and the team accomplished many important objectives during the past two years which included modernization of business filings, reorganization of business services and several legislative changes.

CHALLENGES & NEXT BIENNIUM GOALS

Below are affecting the Office of Secretary of State and more information on these along with funding asks is included in the 2023-25 Biennium – Listing of Requests Compared to Executive Recommendation which is found on page 9.

Technology Support – The implementation of FirstStop and Central Indexing systems has modernized filings and licensing at the Secretary of State's office. Adequate funding to support maintenance and enhancements is a continued need to improve the user experience and make necessary upgrades to this and other systems, such as the campaign finance system, combative sports tracking software, and website restructuring. Systems that are user-friendly across all our customer platforms are critical to the agency's efforts to better serve our citizens.

Election Enhancements – North Dakota has always operated elections with integrity and the ND State Auditor recently found, after an extensive review, that our election systems are incredibly secure across our state. We do however believe this office can continue to improve processes and voter knowledge. Education, training, and materials to support our elections officials and growing voter knowledge and confidence will be a focus of this administration into the future. These efforts will help create transparency and further protect election security.

SoS Responsibility Level Increases – Repurpose/Reclass – With the modernization of processes in the agency, the skillsets and responsibilities of our employees have changed significantly. The appropriate classification of these positions, along with salary reflective of the position, and the ability to address compression issues are necessary to future recruitment and retention efforts. We also have salaries for 4 FTEs being supported by funding sources that are not stable or adequate for long-term sustainability. Greater information about this challenge can be found in the Staffing area of this testimony on page 8.

Agency Operations Budget

2021-23 Base Budget Comparison to 2023-2025 Request/Executive Recommendation

The Secretary of State relies on people and technology to perform all of the work the legislature has directed. The agency's appropriation for the 2021-23 biennium was \$5.5 million with 88 percent of the general fund authority directed to salaries and wages. The agency was authorized for 33 full-time equivalent positions for the 2021-23 biennium, of which 29 FTEs were supported through general funds, and 4 FTEs through special (2 FTEs) or federal funds (2 FTEs). Operating expenses made up approximately 7 percent of our general fund spending authority, with special funds covering 78 percent.

LEGISLATIVE BASE 2023-2025 COMPARED TO FUNDING SOURCE

SPECIAL FUND – GENERAL SERVICES FUND - The agency has a special funds line – General Services Fund - which is the supported by fees received from select number of UCC licensing, filings, and for information subscriptions available from the agency. The general services fund (special fund) generated about \$14 million in the current biennium, of which \$1.5 million was retained by the agency with \$12.5 million from fees being deposited to the general fund.

Technology advancements in the agency have helped increase productivity, provide more efficient services for the public, and aid in maintaining the thousands of records associated with approximately 100 diverse categories of filings. Technology costs to maintain multiple systems will now outpace the revenue received in this fund, no longer making it a viable option as the only support funding for technology maintenance and user experience enhancements to systems. General fund support is needed to ensure the integrity of technology systems into the future, or greater fees from this line need to be retained by the agency to support systems.

Systems currently supported by these special funds include:

- Central Indexing System (CIS) maintains all filings related to various personal property liens to be completed electronically online approximately 350,000 files.
- FirstStop the engine for business with approximately a 100 types of business filings the continued implementation, enhancements, and maintenance.
- Website maintenance and any enhancements/customizations.

The Governor's recommendation has \$4.835 in salaries, operating, and election reform coming from the special – general services fund in the 2023-24 biennium; and an additional \$1.5 one-time funding from the SIIF fund to total \$6.89 in special funds. Estimated receipts to be retained by the agency from the special - general services fund in 2023-25 is approximately \$2 million. This gap isn't sustainable for the agency to meet critical technology infrastructure needs.

FEDERAL FUNDS – The Office of Secretary of State receives federal Help America Vote Act (HAVA) funds to continue to improve voter access and election administration. Information about federal funds is included in the Federal Funds section later in this testimony.

PUBLIC PRINTING - Under state law, the agency is responsible for the distribution of publications known as "public printing" and a major portion of the appropriation is directly related to the cost of printing the North Dakota Century Code, Session Laws, and the North Dakota Administrative Code. The remaining portion of the appropriation is used by the agency to cover costs related to programming database records, shipping, mailing, supplies, etc. Although the appropriation to cover the cost of publishing and distribution is included in the agency's budget, it is based on a recommendation from the Legislative Council, which has the legal responsibility for preparing, supervising, contracting, and communicating with the various publishers and vendors regarding these publications. Estimated costs for the printing of these items in the coming biennium is \$271,335.

STAFFING

The number of positions authorized has slightly increased over the past 10 years. As of January 2023, we have 4 unfilled positions that are in the hiring process. Appropriate staffing to create reasonable turnaround time for filings, as well as election administration and training is key to agency success. The chart at right shows a long-term history



of the staffing level for the Office of Secretary of State.

Proposed Shift in FTE Funding - The agency currently has authorization for 4 FTEs that receive no general fund support. Due to the critical nature of these positions, we are seeking more appropriate salary administration support. Salary dollars for these FTEs equal \$890,610, which are currently supplemented by special – general services fund (\$560,000 = 2 FTEs) and federal funds (\$330,610 = 2 FTEs).

Funds would be redirected as follows:

- Special general services fund would be directed towards supporting IT/technology expenses;
- Federal funding currently used to support staffing would be redirected to support voter education and materials across the state.

New FTE Request - The agency is also requesting support for 2 new FTEs. This includes 1 FTE in information management to assist in implementing new campaign finance technology; 1 FTE in elections to continue efforts to standardize voter experience in North Dakota. Total cost of these 2 FTEs is \$425,000.

Total FTE Fiscal Impact – Total salary/staffing support funding requested is \$1,315,610 (\$890,610 + \$425,000). The agency is requesting support for these positions either through general fund support or greater authority to retain funds in our special – general services fund line. We propose that \$200,000 of match dollars needed to secure 2023 Federal HAVA funding of \$1 M be a portion of this salary ask as noted later in this testimony.

Revenues – General Fund & General Service Fund (Special Fund) 2021-23 Biennium

Revenue forecasts for the 2023-2025 biennium were increased based on historical trends, General Fund was increased from \$12,500,000 to \$13,500,000. Below is 20-year look at revenue trends from the Office of Secretary of State.

2023-25 Biennium – Listing of Requests Compared to Executive Recommendation

There are several areas the Secretary of State's office needs to address to continue to provide high-value customer service through its staffing and citizen-facing digital systems.

Staffing Repurpose/Reclass - As mentioned earlier, the agency needs to address compression issues and the resulting salary increases needed for higher-level skillsets required for digital processing. Continued risk of losing staff to positions of a similar nature with higher salary lessens our ability to recruit staff, and build and retain knowledge long-term, which is critical for agency success and future efficiencies. Currently, nearly 50% of the Secretary of State staff earn less than \$46,000 per year and as of January 1, 18% have less than 1 year of service with the agency.

We are requesting support for \$300,000 to adequately address these issues. The Governor's recommendation supports \$100,000, and the OMB budget includes \$75,000 for the Secretary of State in the proposed \$90 million equity package.

The agency is also seeking \$1,315,610 in general fund support for 4 FTEs receiving no general fund support, and two new FTEs to support technology enhancements and election reform. An explanation of this request is provided above in the Staffing portion of this testimony on page 8.

Technology Systems – Support & Customization - The Secretary of State is seeking support for technology enhancements to continue modernization work across the agency. A quick summary of technology related projects includes:

- **Campaign Finance System** Replacement of this system is needed as the current software was initially built with a minimal budget and has limited functionality. The vendor who originally programmed the system no longer offers campaign finance software and North Dakota is the company's only customer.
- Ongoing Software Support/Maintenance FirstStop, Central Indexing, and other software systems have on-going costs for licensing, upgrades and general system maintenance. These costs do not cover enhancements or customizations to create greater efficiencies, ease of user experience, or implementation of any prescribed legislative changes. Additionally, past legislative efforts have required us to support these systems with limited fees allowed to be retained by the agency. These fees in the last biennium were \$1.5 M, which is insufficient to support multiple digital systems, websites, and enhancements. The agency currently has a listing of over 50 enhancements to create greater userfriendliness that require funding for contracted services outside of our maintenance contract for FirstStop. These enhancements benefit the state's businesses and lending authorities and create ease of doing business in North Dakota.
- Increased NDIT Application Hosting Costs Support for increased hosting fees for systems residing on NDIT servers.
- User Experience Enhancements The Office of Secretary of State will be moving its existing website to the State platform in the coming biennium. Our office currently maintains multiple sites and systems, none of which feel cohesive to one brand. The redesign of sites will include bringing the main website, as well as our elections' website, into one unified platform for users to find valuable information regarding the services provided by the agency. In addition, as a benefit to the citizens of North Dakota, businesses, licensees, candidates, elected officials, and others utilizing our services, the agency seeks to implement a text message notification system. Users would be able to opt-in to the service and receive notifications, such as filing deadlines, voter information, candidate information, and more via text message. This would allow the public the ability to direct how they wish to receive information and alert them to important deadlines or news items, thus enhancing transparency in and access to government.

We are requesting support for \$3 M (general fund), including a 1 new FTE including in our staffing ask to grow critical agency system knowledge to help continue digital system modernization efforts. The Governor's recommendation supports \$1.83 M but did not extend dollars or support for an FTE.

Election Compliance & Modernization - Expectations upon county election administrators (county auditors) and the Office of Secretary of State have increased significantly since the Help America Vote Act passed in 2002. North Dakota has made critical investments for meaningful reform in providing support for the Central Voter File and Election Management System, and new voting equipment and electronic pollbooks approved and funded by the legislature in 2019. Resources are needed to continue to improve the election process, including training, standardization of processes and expectations, as well as supporting voter education materials.

The administration of elections is a year-round job for the state and 53 county auditors, who also oversee many responsibilities in addition to elections. Smaller population counties also are unable to employ enough staff to properly handle the required workload of elections. We are seeking the ability to provide additional support to counties to ensure the administration of elections continues with the integrity that North Dakotans expect and to reduce the chance of burnout of county election officials. We had originally requested 3 additional FTEs supported by federal Help America Vote Act dollars. This administration believes HAVA dollars should support the creation of materials, training, and voter education, and is instead requesting general fund support for 2 existing FTEs currently paid for with federal dollars; and for the additional 1 FTE included in the Governor's recommendation supported by federal funds. These are included in our earlier staffing request on page 8.

The Governor's recommendation supports \$213,608 which supports 1 FTE through federal funding.

Other Funding

- **Public Printing** Estimated costs for the public printing items in the coming biennium is \$271,335 based on the estimate provided by Legislative Council and supported by the Governor's recommendation. This increase of \$13,404 covers the increase in operating costs for printing and distribution.
- **OMB Rent Model** OMB Rent Model is \$201,331 for the square footage occupied for the Office of Secretary of State in the Capitol and Judicial Wing.

Federal Funding Changes

The Secretary of State will have approximately \$4,000,000 of Help America Vote Act federal funds available for the 2023-2025 biennium, and the opportunity to access an additional \$1,000,000 with a \$200,000 general fund match in March 2023. The purpose of the funds is to improve the administration of elections for Federal office, including to enhance election technology and make election security improvements" to the systems, equipment and processes used in federal elections.

Use of general fund dollars to support these FTEs would meet match requirements for 2023 HAVA funds as proposed in the staffing portion of this testimony on page 8.

The Secretary of State shall notify the legislative council of any transfers made pursuant to this section.

Chairman Wanzek and members of the Senate Appropriations - Goverment Operations Division. I am Michael Howe, Secretary of State, and I am here to provide greater information about our budget request and answer any questions you may have. To begin I'd like to give you a some brief background on our funding sources which will be helpful as we get into how our request differs from the Executive Budget Recommendation

FUNDING SOURCES - ISSUE WITH GENERAL SERVICE FUND (SPECIAL)

The Office of the Secretary of State has three main funding sources:

- General Funds state general fund dollars
- Federal Funds Help America Vote Act funding election related (Election Reform line)
- Special Funds General Services Fund agency fees and saleable information (portion retained by agency, remaining deposited into general fund)

The General Services Fund (special) is the supported by fees received from a select number of UCC licensing, filings, and for information subscriptions available from the agency. The general services fund (special) will generate an estimated \$14 million in the current biennium, of which \$1.5 million will be retained by the agency based on fees allowed in statute (10%), with \$12.5 million being deposited to the general fund (90%). The original intent was that a portion of these fees with the agency in support of technology needed to administer these filings.

Technology costs to maintain multiple systems far outpace the revenue the agency is allowed to retain from this fund. General fund support is needed to ensure the integrity of technology systems into the future, or the ability to retain a greater portion of these dollars is needed to support systems.



Systems currently supported by these special funds include:

- Central Indexing System (CIS) maintains all filings related to various personal property liens to be completed electronically online approximately 350,000 files.
- FirstStop the engine for business with approximately 100 types of business filings the continued implementation, enhancements, and maintenance.
- Website maintenance and any enhancements/customizations.

The Executive Budget Recommendation has \$4.835 in salaries, operating, and election reform coming from the special – general services fund in the 2023-24 biennium; and an additional \$1.5 one-time funding from the SIIF fund to total \$6.89 in special funds. Estimated receipts to be retained by the agency from the special - general services fund in 2023-25 is approximately \$2 million. This gap \$4.83 million is dollars we do not have the ability to retain and creates a situation where it isn't sustainable for the agency to meet critical technology infrastructure needs.

Our budget request reflects an increase in technology support to address this gap to adequately support systems.

REVISED BUDGET REQUEST - 2023-2025

The Office of Secretary of State is seeking support in three areas.

- 1. STAFFING \$1,615,610 general fund
- 2. TECHNOLOGICAL SYSTEMS & SUPPORT \$3,000,000 (\$1.5M general fund + \$1.5 SIIF)
- 3. ELECTION COMPLIANCE & MODERINZATION Supported by Staffing Request

1. STAFFING

Repurpose/Reclass - \$300,000 General Fund

With the modernization of processes in the agency, the skillsets and responsibilities of our employees have changed significantly. The appropriate classification of these positions, along with salary reflective of the position, and the ability to address compression and administration issues are necessary to future recruitment and retention efforts.

Executive Recommendation supports \$100,000.

Proposed Shift in FTE Funding - \$890,610 General Fund

The agency currently has authorization for 4 FTEs that receive no general fund support. Due to the critical nature of these positions, we are seeking more appropriate salary administration support. Salary dollars for these FTEs equal \$890,610, which are currently supplemented by special – general services fund (\$560,000 = 2 FTEs) and federal funds (\$330,610 = 2 FTEs).

Funds would be redirected to support programs as follows:

- Special general services fund would be directed towards supporting IT/technology expenses;
- Federal funding currently used to support staffing would be redirected to support voter education and materials across the state.

Executive Recommendation - salary is included in special/federal lfund lines.

New FTE Request - \$425,000 General Fund

The agency is requesting support for 2 new FTEs. This includes 1 FTE in information management to assist in implementing new campaign finance technology; 1 FTE in elections to continue efforts to standardize voter experience in North Dakota. Total cost of these 2 FTEs is \$425,000.

Executive Recommendation supports \$213,608 in federal funds for 1 FTE elections, no support for 1 FTE information management.

Total Fiscal Impact

Total salary/staffing support funding requested is \$1,615,610). The agency is requesting support for these positions either through general funds or greater authority to retain funds in our special – general services fund line. We propose that \$200,000 of match dollars needed to secure 2023 Federal HAVA funding of \$1 M be a portion of this salary ask as noted later in this testimony.

2. TECHNOLOGICAL SYSTEMS & SUPPORT

The Office of Secretary of State is seeking support for technology enhancements to continue modernization work across the agency. A quick summary of technology related projects includes:

- **Campaign Finance System** Replacement of this system is needed as the current software was initially built with a minimal budget and has limited functionality. The vendor who originally programmed the system no longer offers campaign finance software and North Dakota is the company's only customer.
- Ongoing Software Support/Maintenance FirstStop, Central Indexing, and other software systems have on-going costs for licensing, upgrades and general system maintenance. These costs do not cover enhancements or customizations to create greater efficiencies, ease of user experience, or implementation of any prescribed legislative changes. The agency currently has a listing of over 50 enhancements that require funding for contracted services outside of our maintenance contract for FirstStop. These enhancements benefit the state's businesses and lending authorities and create ease of doing business in North Dakota.
- Increased NDIT Application Hosting Costs Support for increased hosting fees for systems residing on NDIT servers.
- User Experience Enhancements The Office of Secretary of State will be moving its existing website to the State platform in the coming biennium. Our office currently maintains multiple sites and systems, none of which feel cohesive to one brand. The redesign of sites will include bringing the main website, as well as our elections' website, into one unified platform for users to find valuable information regarding the services provided by the agency. In addition, as a benefit to the citizens of North Dakota, businesses, licensees, candidates, elected officials, and others utilizing our services, the agency seeks to implement a text message notification system. Users would be able to opt-in to the service and receive notifications, such as filing deadlines, voter information, candidate information, and more via text message. This would allow the public the ability to direct how they wish to receive information and alert them to important deadlines or news items, thus enhancing transparency in and access to government.

Total Fiscal Impact

We are requesting technology support of 3M - 1.5 M in ongoing funding, and 1.5 M coming from SIIF as one-time funding.





3. ELECTION COMPLIANCE & MODERNIZATION

North Dakota has made critical investments for meaningful reform in providing support for the Central Voter File and Election Management System, and new voting equipment and electronic pollbooks approved and funded by the legislature in 2019. Resources are needed to continue to improve the election process, including training, standardization of processes and expectations, as well as supporting voter education materials. The purpose of the funds is to improve the administration

of elections for Federal office, including to enhance election technology and make election security improvements to the systems, equipment and processes used in federal elections.

This administration believes HAVA dollars should support the creation of materials, training, and voter education, and is requesting general fund support for 2 existing FTEs currently paid for with federal dollars; and for the additional 1 FTE included in the Governor's recommendation supported by federal funds.

Notwithstanding section 54-16-04, the office of management and budget may transfer up to \$100,000 of appropriation authority between line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, as requested by the secretary of state, during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025."

MICHAEL HOWE, SECRETARY OF STATE

Chairman Nathe and members of the committee, I'm Michael Howe, Secretary of State. Over my first few weeks in office, I have been working to better understand the needs of our team. I am here to provide you greater insights into our budget and the anticipated changes we see on the horizon.

We will be asking for your support of the recommendations brought forth by the Senate and have additional asks to ensure two areas of agency need are addressed:

- 1) Funding all positions from general fund sources to maintain critical agency roles, and
- 2) Support for one-time and on-going technology needs in the agency which support critical business and licensing functions, and systems dedicated to statewide election administration functions.

AGENCY OVERVIEW

The Office of the Secretary of State conducts a wide range of licensing, regulatory, registration and administrative functions. We also serve as the office of record for certain legal documents generated by the executive and legislative branches of state government, as well as public records and notices involving various business entities.

The Office of the Secretary of State also works with North Dakota's 53 counties to administer and protect the integrity of our election process. Statewide election results are made available through the Secretary of State's elections website – Vote.ND.Gov.

STATUTORY AUTHORITY

Our statutory authority can be found in the following:

- NDCC Title 10 Corporations;
- NDCC Title 16.1 Elections;

- registration of charitable organizations in 50-22;

- documents recorded by the office in 54-09.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

The Office of Secretary of State is currently authorized for 33 full-time equivalent (FTE) employees – 29 FTEs – general fund supported, 4 FTEs – special/federal fund supported. A breakout of positions is provided in the below organizational chart.



AUDIT FINDINGS

<u>Operational Audit for the Two-Year Period Ended June 30, 2020</u> – Finding lack of revenue reconciliation. This recommendation is partially implemented. Reconciliation of fees recorded from our systems were not appropriately being reconciled against those same fees as they flowed through the Bank of North Dakota and were deposited and entered into the PeopleSoft (state) system. A discrepancy of \$74,211 was discovered in the reporting which involved no misplaced funds. A monthly reconciliation has been developed and is in the testing phase. Plans include building an interface between Secretary of State and PeopleSoft system to further eliminate reconciliation errors.

<u>Voting Security Assessment Audit 2022</u> – The Office of the State Auditor looked at six potential vulnerabilities with possible threat scenarios and determined a risk score for each. All scenarios were determined to be low risk. I am quoting our state auditor, he said "our election systems are incredibly secure across the state."

Operational Audit for Two-Year Period Ended June 30, 2022 – Scheduled to begin March 2023.

NEXT BIENNIUM CHALLENGES & GOALS

Future challenges affecting the Office of the Secretary of State include:

TECHNOLOGY SUPPORT – The implementation of FirstStop and Central Indexing systems has modernized filings and licensing at the Secretary of State's (SoS) office. These and other systems need continued funding support to ensure adequate maintenance, necessary upgrades, and enhancements to improve user-experience. Our budgetary ask includes both one-time (implementation) and ongoing (maintenance/enhancement) general fund support for technology to begin addressing these concerns.

In the past, the agency has relied on special funds to support technology needs, however the agency's special fund is based on a select number of fees SoS can retain under statute which generates approximately \$1.5 to \$2.0 million each biennium. We recognize this is no longer sufficient to sustain the technology needs of the agency long-term across multiple platforms needed to conduct our work in business and elections. Technology systems needed to manage both business and election functions require robust functionality with workflows, comprehensive reporting, enhanced security, and user-friendly public facing platforms to support the agency's efforts to better serve our citizens.

The SoS is facing the end-of-life of for critical systems over the next few years. Newer software platforms maintained by the agency need system upgrades, and other systems are at risk of no longer being supported. Systems identified that need to be replaced/upgraded include:

- Election Related Technology: campaign finance system, election management systems (includes ND Voices, election night reporting, etc.), various election equipment
- Business Related Technology: upgrades/enhancements to FirstStop and Central Indexing Systems, combative sports tracking software, main website rebuild, online notary management solution

ELECTION ENHANCEMENTS – North Dakota has always operated elections with integrity and the ND State Auditor recently found, after an extensive review, that our election systems are incredibly secure across our state. We do however believe this office can continue to improve processes and voter knowledge. Education, training, and materials to support our election officials and growing voter knowledge and confidence will be a focus of this administration into the future. These efforts will help create transparency and further protect election security.

REPLACEMENT OF FEDERAL HELP AMERICA VOTE ACT (HAVA) DOLLARS - FUNDING WITH GENERAL FUND

SUPPORT – Over the last several biennia, North Dakota has relied on Federal HAVA – Help America Vote Act – funding to support the purchase of critical election equipment and funding of 2 FTEs in election staffing. The Federal government has signaled that there is no guarantee that HAVA dollars will be continuing after 2023. The duties of these federally supported employees will not go away and are critical to administering North Dakota elections. If the state of North Dakota provides no additional support, HAVA dollars will be expended by 2027. Critical election staffing and the continued maintenance of election systems and equipment – poll pads, ballot scanners, cradle points, etc. – currently costs about \$1.1 million each biennium.

GENERAL FUND SUPPORT FOR CRITICAL STAFFING – SoS has salaries for 4 FTEs being supported by funding sources that are not stable or adequate for long-term sustainability. The 2 FTEs who provide critical election

support mentioned in the above Federal HAVA section are funded with federal funds, and 2 FTEs who work in our Licensing and Central Indexing unit are fully funded with special funds. The agency is asking for general fund support for all 4 FTEs to be able to sustain critical positions long-term regardless of funding source and redirect special funds to their intended purpose of supporting technology and elections in the agency.

SOS RESPONSIBILITY LEVEL INCREASES – With the modernization of processes in the agency, the skillsets and responsibilities of our employees have changed significantly. The appropriate classification of these positions, along with salary reflective of the position, and the ability to address compression issues are necessary to future recruitment and retention efforts. The agency made a repurpose and reclassify ask based on this need.

AGENCY OPERATIONS BUDGET

2021-23 Base Budget Comparison to 2023-2025 Senate Recommendation

The Secretary of State relies on people and technology to perform the work the legislature has directed. The agency's appropriation for the 2021-23 biennium was \$5.5 million with 88 percent of the general fund authority directed to salaries and wages. Operating expenses made up approximately 7 percent of our general fund spending authority, with special funds covering 78 percent of operating costs.

STAFFING - FTE - SENATE RECOMMENDATION

The agency is authorized for 33 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions for the 2021-23 biennium, of which 29 FTEs were supported through general funds, 2 FTEs through special funds, and 2 FTEs through federal funds.

The Senate recommendation provided \$479,143 in general fund salary support for 2 FTEs currently funded by special funds. The special funds made available through this shift will help support a portion of technology needs as requested by the agency. Special funds retained by the agency were intended to support technology.

The Senate also created authority for \$200,950 in federal funds to support 1 new FTE to aid in elections.

The Senate recommendation also supported \$100,000 in increases for the repurposing of positions which have changed responsibilities due to the move to more technology-based skillsets, funding for salary, health, and benefit increases, as well as an equity increase of \$26,748 for the Secretary of State.

SENATE – FTE/SALARY SHIFT CHANGES

The Senate Recommendation provided:

- Shifted \$479,143 from special to general fund salary support for 2 FTEs currently funded through special funds
- 1 FTE supported by authority of \$200,950 in federal funding for salary and related operating expenses for election support
- Supported \$100,000 in salary for repurposing and reclassification of positions for increased skillsets

The Office of the Secretary of State operations base budget provides general office support across the agency – travel, NDIT costs, printing/postage, etc. The base budget operating expenses of \$3,308,424, includes \$391,570 in general funds, with \$2,916,854 coming from special funds, which includes some carry-over funding for IT projects with existing contract obligations.

The Senate recommendation includes the following additions to operations:

- \$1.5 million one-time funding from the SIIF Fund for technology systems – campaign finance software solution, IT contract support, website rebuild
- \$330,000 (\$165,000 general fund + \$165,000 special funds) – purchase of a text-messaging platform and ongoing support for maintenance
- \$200,000 State match dollars to secure \$1 million in Federal HAVA funding in 2023
- \$201,331 OMB rent model for space maintained in the Capitol and Judicial Wing

FEDERAL FUNDS – The Office of Secretary of State receives Federal Help America Vote Act (HAVA) funds to continue to improve voter access and election administration.

The Secretary of State will have approximately \$4,000,000 of Help America Vote Act federal funds available for the 2023-2025 biennium,

SENATE – OPERATION CHANGES

The Senate Recommendation provided:

- \$1.5 million SIIF one-time funding for technology projects
- \$330,000 support for on-going IT maintenance and procurement of text messaging system
- \$1 million federal authority to receive 2023 HAVA election related funding
- \$200,000 state match for Federal funding
- \$389,342 restoration of authority for federal funds already received (error in Gov. Rec.)
- \$13,404 increase in public printing
- \$201,331 OMB rent model for capitol space

and the opportunity to access an additional \$1,000,000 with a \$200,000 general fund match in March 2023. The purpose of the funds is to improve the administration of elections for Federal office, including to enhance election technology and make election security improvements to the systems, equipment and processes used in federal elections.

Spending projections for the currently available \$4,000,000 in HAVA funds are broken down below. If general fund support for staffing is provided, staff dollars will be redirected to education/training efforts.

The Senate recommendation supports:

- \$1 million authority for Federal HAVA funds received in 2023 (20% state match noted above)
- \$389,342 restoration of authority for federal dollars already received; these funds were mistakenly removed in the Governor's Budget Recommendation as part of an FTE request

PUBLIC PRINTING - SoS is responsible for the distribution of publications known as "public printing". The appropriation is directly related to the cost of printing the North Dakota Century Code, Session Laws, and the North Dakota Administrative Code. A small portion of funding is used to cover costs related to mailing, supplies, etc. The appropriation to cover the cost of publishing and distribution is based on a recommendation from the Legislative Council, which has the legal responsibility for preparing, supervising, contracting, and communicating with the various publishers and vendors regarding these publications. The Senate recommendation supports:

• \$271,335 – estimated public printing, increase of \$13,404

GRANTS – The agency has \$25,000 in its grant line available for requests from North Dakota's tribes to support tribal access to voting.

Agency Collections - General Fund & General Service Fund (Agency Special Fund)

Revenue forecasts for the 2023-2025 biennium were increased based on historical trends, General Fund was increased from \$12,500,000 to \$13,500,000. Below is 20-year look at revenue trends from the Office of Secretary of State. REVENUE TRENDS FROM FEES COLLECTED BY SECRETARY OF STATE

The work of the Office of Secretary of State generates approximately \$14 million in revenue from our business and licensing services. Approximately \$12 million stays in the general fund, and \$1.5 - \$2 million is transferred to the agency's special

fund for use based



on specific fees allowed to be retained by the agency in statute to aid in supporting technology. (Fees retained include a portion of central indexing fees, and revenue gained from the sales of lists or records.)

A comparative look at the common types of filings this office processes is included below. These numbers include total actions, which are the results of both new and renewals of certain licensing, registrations, etc.

2023-25 Biennium – Agency Requests Compared to Senate Recommendation

There are several areas the Secretary of State's office needs to address to continue to provide high-value customer service through its staffing and citizen-facing digital systems.

The SoS requests support of Senate recommendations as well as additional support as noted.

SALARY & EQUITY REQUEST

Staffing Repurpose/Reclass - The SoS needs to address compression issues and the resulting salary increases needed for higher-level skillsets required for digital processing. Continued risk of losing staff to positions of a similar nature with higher salary lessens our ability to recruit staff, and build and retain knowledge long-term, which is critical for agency success and future efficiencies. The OMB Budget also includes \$75,000 in the \$90 million equity package for Secretary of State. Currently, nearly 50% of the Secretary of State staff earn less than \$46,000 per year and as of January 1, 18% have less than 1 year of service with the agency.

STAFFING REQUEST

Proposed Shift in FTE Funding (SPECIAL) – The Senate recommendation supported shifting funding for 2 employees paid from special funds to general fund support in the amount of \$479,143. This funding shift provides agency flexibility for better salary administration and allows

special funds to be directed toward their original intended purpose of supporting technology needs in the agency.

Proposed Shift in FTE Funding (FEDERAL) - Under the Senate

recommendations, the agency received 1 new FTE for elections supported by federal funds, however, federal funds are not a long-term solution. The agency already has two positions that receive no general fund support. These positions (current and new FTE) all support election administration in North Dakota. Due to the critical nature of these positions, we are seeking more appropriate salary administration support as federal funding is in jeopardy. The agency intends to apply the state match of 200,000* to the salary of the new FTE – 200,950 – and requests that the remaining two federal positions – current 2 FTEs - 362,111 – be shifted to be paid from general funds. This shift in funding will allow redirection of federal funds to support enhanced education and training efforts in elections.

New FTE Request – The agency's technology needs continue to grow as does the need for in-house expertise. The agency is requesting support for 1 new FTE in information management to assist in implementing new campaign finance technology and to secure agency system expertise for long-term maintenance of technology systems - \$180,000.

TECHNOLOGY NEEDS REQUEST

A summary of technology related projects includes:

- Campaign Finance System Replacement of this system is needed as the current software was initially built with a minimal budget and has limited functionality. The vendor who originally programmed the system no longer offers campaign finance software and North Dakota is the company's only customer.
- Ongoing Software Support/Maintenance FirstStop, Central Indexing, and other software systems have on-going costs for licensing, upgrades, and general system maintenance. These costs do not cover enhancements or customizations to create greater efficiencies, ease of user experience, or implementation of any prescribed legislative changes. Additionally, past legislative efforts have required us to support these systems with limited fees allowed to be retained by the agency. These fees average approximately \$1.5 M per

biennium, which is insufficient to support multiple digital systems, websites, and enhancements. The agency currently has a listing of over 50 enhancements to create greater user-friendliness that require funding for contracted services outside of our maintenance contract for FirstStop. These enhancements benefit the state's businesses and lending authorities and create ease of doing business in North Dakota.

- Increased NDIT Application Hosting Costs Support for increased hosting fees for systems residing on NDIT servers.
- User Experience Enhancements The Office of Secretary of State will be moving its existing website to
 the State platform in the coming biennium. Our office currently maintains multiple sites and systems,
 none of which feel cohesive to one brand. The redesign of sites will include bringing the main website, as
 well as our election website, into one unified platform for users to find valuable information regarding the
 services provided by the agency. In addition, as a benefit to the citizens of North Dakota, businesses,
 licensees, candidates, elected officials, and others utilizing our services, the agency seeks to implement a
 text message notification system. Users would be able to opt-in to the service and receive notifications,
 such as filing deadlines, voter information, candidate information, and more via text message. This would
 allow the public the ability to direct how they wish to receive information and alert them to important
 deadlines or news items, thus enhancing transparency in and access to government.
- Election Compliance & Modernization Expectations upon county election administrators (county
 auditors) and the Office of Secretary of State have increased significantly since the Help America Vote Act
 passed in 2002. North Dakota has made critical investments for meaningful reform in providing support
 for the Central Voter File and Election Management System, and new voting equipment and electronic
 pollbooks approved and funded by the legislature in 2019. Resources are needed to continue to improve
 the election process, including training, standardization of processes and expectations, as well as
 supporting voter education materials. The Office of Secretary of State anticipates that ND Voices critical
 election administration systems may be at an end-of-life situation as their current vendor was bought out
by another supplier who may or may not continue to support the platform. This includes the ND Voices systems which interacts with all 53 counties and supports the following:

 - Central Voter File Database
 - Petition Management
 - E-Pollbook Interface
 - Precinct/Polling Location Management
 - Voter/Election Worker Assignment
 - Equipment Assignment to Polling Locations
 - Ballot Creation
 - Candidate Management
 - Absentee/Vote by Mail
 - Military Voting
 - Canvassing Report Generation
 - Election Night Reporting

ONE-TIME FUNDING REQUESTS

2021-23 One-Time Funding Requests - No one-time funding requests were included in the current biennium.

2023-25 One-Time Funding Requests

- \$1.5 million of one-time funds are being requested in the Senate Recommendation from Strategic Investment Fund (SIIF) for the replacing campaign finance system and contracted services for IT enhancements (website restructure).
- \$6 million of one-time funds are being requested to address replacement of ND Voices comprehensive election management system and needed upgrades to FirstStop business/licensing services solution.

AGENCY FLEXIBILTY REQUEST - LINE-ITEM TRANSFER

The Senate recommendation includes language in Section 5 which grants authority for line-item transfers in our appropriation bill in a total amount not to exceed \$100,000 to enhance the flexibility and our ability to leverage the entirety of our budget to meet our needs

BILLS THAT MAY HAVE FISCAL IMPACT

The following bills may have fiscal implications for the Office of Secretary of State:

FEDERAL FISCAL RECOVER FUND STATUS

The Secretary of State received no fiscal recover funding during the November 2021 special session.

First Chamber Changes

A summary of the first chamber's changes to the agency's base level appropriations and the executive budget is attached as an appendix.

Selected Bill Sections Included in the First Chamber Version

Strategic investment and improvements fund - Section 3 provides \$1.5 million is from the strategic investment and improvements fund (SIIF) for a new campaign finance system, contracted website redesign, and information technology (IT) system enhancements.

Secretary of State's salary - Section 4 provides statutory changes to increase the Secretary of State's salary. The Secretary of State's annual salary would increase from the current level of \$114,486 to \$130,000 (13.6 percent), effective July 1, 2023, and to \$135,200 (4 percent), effective July 1, 2024.

Line item transfers - Section 5 provides authority for the Secretary of State to transfer up to \$100,000 between line items.

Continuing Appropriations

Athletic commission fund - North Dakota Century Code Section 53-01-09 - Appropriates any funding received by the Secretary of State for license fees for all boxers, kickboxers, mixed style fighters, promoters, managers, judges, timekeepers, cornerpersons, knockdown counters, matchmakers, and referees or other participants and fees based on the percentage of gross revenues from any boxing, kickboxing, mixed fighting style competition, or sparring exhibition held in this state to pay for the expenses of members of the Commission of Combative Sports.
