Testimony SB 2097—Department of Water Resources Senate Energy and Natural Resources Senator Dale Patten, Chairman January 05, 2023

Chairman Patten, and members of the Senate and Energy Natural Resources Committee, I am Andrea Travnicek, the Director of the Department of Water Resources. I am here today to provide testimony in support of SB 2097.

The National Wild and Scenic Rivers System was created by Congress in 1968, to preserve certain rivers with outstanding natural, cultural, and recreational values in a free-flowing condition for the enjoyment of present and future generations. To qualify, a river or river segment must be in a free-flowing condition and must be deemed to have one or more "outstandingly remarkable" scenic, recreational, geologic, fish and wildlife, historic, cultural, or other similar values.

Since 2019, Congress has designated a total of 192 rivers into the National System, and the Secretary of the Interior has designated another 17 at the requests of governors, for a total of 209 rivers, which includes 12,700 miles of rivers throughout 40 states. Federal agencies, such as the U.S. Forest Service, the Bureau of Land Management, the National Park Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, identify rivers eligible for the National System while conducting their comprehensive land management planning processes, which has resulted in over 100 more rivers authorized for study.

Often, protections included in the designations can limit the development of new dams, limit federally funded bank and channel alterations, and also limit new oil, gas, and mineral development. Once these designations are in place, options for economic development, water supply, and flood protection may be impacted.

Currently the State of North Dakota has no federal wild and scenic river designations. In the 1970s, there was a movement for the Little Missouri River to be

designated as a federal wild and scenic river. Instead, the 44th Legislative Assembly (1975) developed the Little Missouri State Scenic River Act (Chapter 61-29) that left the management of the river in the state's control and developed a commission that could advise local or other units of government to afford the protection adequate to maintain the scenic, historic, and recreational qualities of the Little Missouri River and its tributary streams. This commission meets once a year to receive updates and reports from local entities and state agencies.

This bill proposes to create a new section to chapter 61-15 of the North Dakota Century Code codifying a process that provides opportunities for state agencies, local water boards, and county commissions that may be impacted by a potential designation to have a seat at the table to express support or concerns before a Governor or federal agency designates a federal wild and scenic river in the State. It additionally adds the requirement that the governor and the county commission of any county impacted must express written support before a river may be designated as a wild, scenic, or recreational river under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act.

Federal priorities may change over time, and federal designations have a real impact on state and local water management decisions. SB 2097 allows the state and local stakeholders to be an active participant in these discussions alongside the federal government. By having a process in place that includes local and state input, North Dakota will be in a better position to manage our water resources in the best interest of our citizens and economy.

TESTIMONY

Good morning, Chairman Porter and members of the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee. For the record, my name is Jonathan Emmer, and I am here to testify on behalf of the North Dakota Public Service Commission.

We stand in support of SB 2097, which adds a larger scope of entities notified when a wild and scenic river designation is being contemplated in the state. However, we offer an amendment adding the Public Service Commission to the agencies that a political subdivision must notify before engaging in meetings with the federal agencies.

The Public Service Commission's Reclamation Division administers the State's surface coal mining program and evaluates surface mining permit applications and revision applications that add land to a current permit. It is important that we are aware of areas under study for wild and scenic designation early in the permitting process and planning stages for our Abandoned Mine Lands (AML) projects. North Dakota Century Code 38-14.1-07(1) prohibits coal mining on any lands within the boundaries of units of the North Dakota state park system, the national park system, the national wildlife refuge systems, the national system of trails, the national wilderness preservation system, the national wild and scenic rivers system, including study rivers designated under section 5(a) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act [Pub. L. 90-542; 82 Stat. 906; 16

U.S.C. 1271 et seq.], and national recreation areas designated by Act of the Congress of the United States.

The Public Service Commission's Public Utilities Division also administers the State's siting rules and laws. While evaluating the impacts of sited facilities, the Commission evaluations a number of factors and directs developers to exclude or avoid certain locations from development. The areas include designated or registered national or state wild, scenic or recreational rivers.

Accordingly, the Public Service Commission requests that SB 2097 be amended to include the Public Service Commission to the list of entities to be notified before a political subdivision engages in meetings with federal agencies to have any waterbody in the state designated as a wild, scenic, or recreational river under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act.

TESTIMONY

Mr. Chair and committee members, I am Randy Christmann, Chair of the Public Service Commission, and I wanted to take this opportunity to share with you some additional information about this subject and about challenges fossil fuels industries and our Coal Reclamation Division are facing with federal agencies.

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is currently proposing to designate three river segments eligible for inclusion in the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System in North Dakota. These three river segments are identified in BLM's draft Resource Management Plan and draft Environmental Impact Statement. The three river segments involve 8.1 miles along the Little Missouri River in Dunn County, 3.4 miles along the upper reach of the Missouri River in McKenzie and Williams Counties and 0.1 miles along the Yellowstone River. It is not entirely clear how this designation might adversely affect future mineral development, pipeline corridors and agricultural interests such as irrigation. Scenic designation might create restrictions on oil and gas development, and the one in Dunn County might create further restrictions to power plants in Mercer County. These

are just some of the reasons why the Commission is requesting to be notified when these designations are being considered.

As an example of the problems federal meddling can cause, a challenge we are currently dealing with involves federal coal leases. Over the past decade, surface coal mining companies in North Dakota have had an extremely difficult time obtaining approval to mine federal coal. Leasing federal coal is a time consuming and expensive process that can take a decade or more, and even after a federal coal lease has been secured, the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Interior must also approve the mine plan before mineral removal can begin. The Interior Department is currently delaying mine plan approval on several tracts of federal coal in North Dakota and it is not clear if approval will ever be granted. Some of these mineral tracts are only partially owned by the federal government, so their obstinance will rob the private co-owners of their ability to monetize their assets while the land all around them is being mined. Adjacent mineral owners are also robbed as the mining operation cannot physically mine right up to the edge of the land containing federally owned minerals. The checkerboard nature of federal coal in North Dakota is resulting in increased costs to mine coal, increased utility costs for our citizens, and increased surface disturbance as mines expand operations to replace bypassed federal coal.

As you can see, the federal government's war against fossil fuel industries is being waged on multiple fronts and they have a history of using their powers capriciously. This makes it imperative that the Commission is aware of National Wild and Scenic Rivers designation proposals as soon as possible. Mr. Chair, this concludes my testimony.
