RE: Support SB 2275 – Relating to removal of the \$400 million SIIF bucket right before the Prairie Dog Bucket.

Chairman Kannianen and Senate Finance and Taxation Committee members, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on SB 2275. I am John Saiki, the Morton County Engineer. I am here to support the bill as proposed.

I have worked for the Morton County Highway Department as the County Engineer for almost 5 years.

Morton County is the seventh largest county in the State of North Dakota encompassing 1,936 square miles and a population of 31,000. The Highway Department maintains approximately 1,200 miles of roadway, 108 miles of paved highways, with the remainder gravel. The gravel roads range from collectors, County Routes which are maintained, to section line roads, which are considered minimum maintenance roads. The Highway Department maintains 187 bridges, many of which are aging. The majority of our bridges are timber bridges and are approaching the end of their operational lives. Morton County is not an oil producing county, so our revenues are limited to motor fuel taxes and tax levies. We are managing our limited funds to maintain and repair what we have, both roadways and bridges.

Gravel is an important commodity, one that is found in the County. The cost involved is the crushing of the gravel. We have a plan for crushing, for the next five years. The issue is with limited funds, we crush a limited amount each year despite the fact that more potential gravel is located at the selected location. Gravel crushing is an item where we see an increase in cost per cubic yard, each year. It would be beneficial to crush more gravel at each setting at the current bid price rather than multiple settings over several years.

In regard to bridges, the only answer is to replace many of them. We currently have two bridges - one posted at 12 tons, the other 9 tons and one is eligible for Federal Funding. The issue is the construction cost is estimated at over \$5,000,000. Our 20% match is still \$1,000,000 for one bridge. In the past, this bridge was used to move ag products. Now legal loads, 80,000 pounds, cannot be carried on this bridge, which is a real hardship for many of the farmers and ranchers in the area. Many of the bridges were designed and built 50 or more years ago, when traffic was less, smaller and much lighter. Morton County currently has 71 posted bridges, with postings ranging from 3 tons to 20 tons.

Our County Commission is very understanding regarding the cost of maintenance and repair. They have been very good about maintaining our budget and providing modest increases. Unfortunately, with fuel, equipment repairs and purchases, the amount of money available for

road and bridge maintenance has remained the same or slightly decreased due to inflation. The Prairie Dog funding is an opportunity to crush more gravel, improve our roads and replace or repair additional bridges. We recently received our first Prairie Dog distribution, which is very helpful with our transportation plan and we are thankful for these funds, although our needs continue. The timing of the next distribution of funds is unclear, but by removing the \$400 million SIIF bucket, the likelihood of Prairie Dog funds being a more consistent funding stream would be greatly improved and appreciated.

Chairman Kannianen and committee members, I want to reiterate that I support the bill as written. Approving these changes will mean additional funding and enable County Highway Departments an opportunity to better schedule maintenance and improve our aging infrastructure.

I am contacting the committee in support of SB 2275 allocating funds to the municipal infrastructure fund prior to funding the Strategic Investment and Improvement Fund.

The City of Hazen, Mercer County ND, has an estimated population of 2,440 residents, with many fixed income households. We, unlike many cities our size and smaller, are very fortunate to have a strong agricultural and energy production industry in our area, which is most beneficial in selecting, and funding, projects for the benefit of our citizens.

Operation Prairie Dog has been a vital piece of our project funding as other revenues continue to decrease, and costs increase. We were able to use these funds to meet the majority of the city's cost-share requirements for our water storage tank replacement project, that addressed low pressure areas of our city to ensure proper fire flow, in case of emergency.

We are in the process of updating our comprehensive plan, in conjunction with developing a strategic economic development plan, and have created a Capital Improvement Project list with some high priority needs, such as sanitary sewer review, cleaning, and repairs. As well as completing our inventory of lead water service lines for replacement and also to achieve compliance with the Backflow Prevention Cross-Contamination Program. Federal funds and Prairie Dog funds are vital to these projects as we work to keep costs to our citizens at a minimum.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Todd Feland and I'm the City Administrator for the City of Grand Forks. I want to thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony and express my support to this legislation.

When "Operation Prairie Dog" was first introduced in the 2019 Legislative Session, we were very supportive and appreciative of the program in Grand Forks. We saw it as an added tool in our toolbox when it comes to funding for our local infrastructure projects. When the \$400 M Strategic Investment and Improvements Fund (SIIF) bucket was added before the Municipal/County and Township bucket it made the funds unreliable and unpredictable for us locally to include in our planning for projects.

During the 2021-23 biennium, the Municipal/County and Township bucket did not get filled due to lowered oil prices and the \$400 M SIIF bucket being placed in front of this key local infrastructure funding source.

Reliable funding for infrastructure projects is critical in order for leaders to plan ahead, create shovel ready projects, and to maximize funding. It is also important to ensure that high priority projects can move forward as efficiently as possible throughout the planning, environmental, design, bidding, and construction stages.

With the removal of the SIIF bucket before the Municipal/County and Township bucket in the Operation Prairie Dog timeline, we can start to incorporate this funding source into our regular planning process for our local projects.

Receiving the Prairie Dog funds sooner and with more certainty is the reason we support SB 2275.

To the Honorable Chairman Kannianen and Committee,

The State of North Dakota has placed significant investment into infrastructure with the adoption of Operation Prairie Dog. However, the \$400 million SIIF bucket, which was not proposed as part of the original Prairie Dog Bill, creates a significant hurdle for non-oil producing cities and counties, as well as airports, to attain funding for critical infrastructure projects.

After the adoption of Operation Prairie Dog in the 2019 – 2021 biennium, the buckets for cities, counties, and airports did not fill which required these entities to delay or cancel infrastructure projects. If the SIIF bucket had not been in effect, these buckets would have filled, and projects would have moved forward. In the 2021 - 2023 biennium the buckets filled at the very end of 2022, leaving a great delay the ability to design, bid, and build projects. Additionally, higher construction costs will be present due to this delay in funding availability. Reliable state and local funding for transportation projects is critical for state and local leaders to plan ahead, create shovel ready projects, and to maximize federal grant funding.

I ask that you support the elimination of the \$400 million SIIF Fund allocation placed ahead of the infrastructure "buckets" and allow these buckets to fill first before the SIIF Fund as originally proposed in "Operation Prairie Dog".

Chairman Kannianen and members of the Senate Finance and Taxation Committee:

I am Jim Neubauer, City Administrator for Mandan, and am here to present testimony in support of Senate Bill 2275.

As introduced in the 2019 legislative session the Municipal Infrastructure Fund, also known as Prairie Dog Fund, was to provide significant funding assistance for non-oil producing counties. As we know oil prices during that initial biennium tanked. The City of Mandan was scheduled to receive approximately \$6.5 million dollars. The initial bucket filled and we received the first disbursement of \$2.5 million. These funds helped lower the special assessment costs for residents in three different assessment districts. There was no disbursement of the remaining \$4 million as the second bucket did not fill.

2021 legislation moved a \$400 illion strategic investment and improvements fund in front of the buckets for non-oil producing counties. While oil prices have remained high throughout this biennium, had the \$400-million-dollar bucket not been moved up, cities and counties would have received their disbursements much sooner, which allows for earlier funding and in turn allows us to pass those savings to citizens via lower costs for infrastructure projects.

The City of Mandan certainly is grateful for the Municipal Infrastructure funds it has received to date and encourage you to support SB 2275.

For the record, I am the City Auditor in Carrington.

I am respectfully requesting you to support a "DO PASS" on Senate bill #2275 to eliminate the \$400 million SIFF Fund allocation placed ahead of the infrastructure "buckets" and let it fill at the end of the "buckets" stream as originally contemplated in "Operation Prairie Dog".

Operation Prairie Dog has been a vital component in planning for our current and upcoming infrastructure needs. As with most cities our size, we have more project needs than revenue generated to meet those needs. Operation Prairie Dog has allowed us to begin the process of Capital Project planning to best utilize the funding received to prioritize our most critical projects. If the infrastructure buckets were to fill before the SIFF Fund allocation, this would help cities by not delaying necessary projects and reduce the exposure and risk to inflationary costs.

Because our first allocation of Prairie Dog funding was lower than anticipated (Census estimated our population just under 2,000) we have not expended the \$125,000 received. However, with the 2020 Census our population was at 2,080 and with the greater funding received we anticipate completing either water main replacement or a sewer rehabilitation project.

As you are aware, the State of North Dakota has emphasized significant investments into infrastructure by the adoption of Operation Prairie Dog. The \$400 million SIIF bucket has created a significant obstacle for airports, cities and counties that are not part of the oil producing area of North Dakota. It is difficult to obtain funding for our priority infrastructure projects.

The buckets for airports, cities and counties did not receive any funds after the adoption of Operation Prairie Dog in the 2019-2021 biennium. This caused a number of political subdivisions to delay or cancel important infrastructure projects. The SIIF bucket prevented this from happening.

The buckets did fill during the 2021-2023 biennium toward the end of 2022. This resulted in a significant delay for airports, cities and counties to design, bid and build projects. This also resulted in significantly higher construction costs due to the delay.

Airports, cities and counties desire to have reliable state and local funding to accomplish important transportation projects. A reliable funding stream allows for better planning and helps to maximize access to limited federal grant funding sources.

I respectfully request that you support the elimination of the \$400 million SIIF Fund allocation placed ahead of the infrastructure "buckets" and allow these buckets to fill first before the SIIF Fund as originally proposed in "Operation Prairie Dog".

Chairman Patten and members of the committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 2275. My name is Matt Perdue, and I am testifying on behalf of North Dakota Farmers Union's (NDFU) members.

NDFU supports SB 2275, which adjusts the formula for Operation Prairie Dog (OPD). Specifically, the bill eliminates the \$400 million Strategic Investment and Improvements Fund (SIIF) bucket that is situated before the Municipal Infrastructure Fund and County and Township Infrastructure Fund. This bill does not affect the SIIF bucket at the end of the formula.

According to the Upper Great Plains Transportation Institute (UGPTI), our rural roads and bridges require \$10.5 billion of investment over the next 20 years. We appreciate the wisdom of the 66<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly in establishing OPD to address those needs. We believe this bill would improve upon that foundation, better addressing local infrastructure needs.

Under the current OPD formula, \$400 million is allocated to the SIIF before any funds are available to counties, townships and municipalities. Removing that SIIF bucket will ensure the more funds are more consistently available to help political subdivisions address their needs. More consistent availability of funds, in turn, allows political subdivisions to better plan for infrastructure projects.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify. We respectfully request a "Do Pass" recommendation on SB 2275. I will stand for any questions.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee,

The City of Fargo recognizes and greatly appreciates the North Dakota Legislature's vision in approving House Bill 1066, commonly referred to as "Operation Prairie Dog", during the 66<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly. HB 1066 made significant changes to the gross production tax distribution formula and created a much needed source of new infrastructure funding for cities, counties, and townships in non-oil producing counties.

On December 12, 2022, the City of Fargo Commission voted unanimously to prioritize the use of Operation Prairie Dog funds received from the 2021-2023 biennium towards a number of additional projects to be constructed in 2023 and 2024. These additional projects fall into one of three project categories: pavement preservation, replacement of infrastructure to support redevelopment, and replacement of streets and utilities in core neighborhoods. The additional funds provided by Operation Prairie Dog are being used to improve and preserve arterial roadway pavements, to replace original infrastructure in the downtown in order to provide reliable water, sewer, and roadway access to new buildings, and to replace failed infrastructure in core neighborhoods in an effort to preserve and improve those neighborhoods.

Although the City of Fargo has been diligent in the preservation, replacement, and improvement of existing infrastructure, there is an ever growing need to invest additional funds in our critical infrastructure. Operation Prairie Dog funds allow the City of Fargo to make additional investments in our infrastructure without the need of raising special assessments. The changes proposed in SB 2275 would ensure the likelihood of future distributions to cities, counties, and townships, provide greater certainty that Operation Prairie Dog funds can be relied upon for additional investments to critical infrastructure in future years, and, just as importantly, receive the money earlier in the biennium so that projects can begin at an earlier date.

We seek your support of SB 2275 as it would greatly increase the confidence in receiving Operation Prairie Dog funds and promote additional long term planning and investment in the preservation of existing infrastructure and the replacement of failed infrastructure.

Chairman Kannianen and members of the committee,

I am Ryan Riesinger, President of the Airport Association of North Dakota (AAND) and Executive Director of the Grand Forks Regional Airport Authority (GFK). I want to thank you for the opportunity to testify today. AAND is the professional organization for North Dakota Airports and it serves to promote airports and aviation across the state. GFK consistently ranks as one of the busiest airports in the country and is the proud home of the University of North Dakota (UND) John D. Odegard School of Aerospace Sciences. I am here today on behalf of AAND and GFK to express support of SB 2275.

During the 2019 Legislative Session, the North Dakota legislature passed "Operation Prairie Dog" to support infrastructure development throughout the state. This 2019 appropriations bill included allocations to "Municipal/County & Township Infrastructure Funds" for the non-oil producing areas of the state, and \$20 million for a new "Airport Infrastructure Fund". These infrastructure funds were placed at the bottom of a series of "buckets" that are filled by streams from both the Oil & Gas Production Tax and the Oil Extraction tax. However, a \$400 million bucket for the "Strategic Investments and Improvements Fund" (SIIF Fund), was

placed in front of the infrastructure fund buckets. This \$400 million bucket was never proposed as part of the original Prairie Dog program. Due to a substantial downturn in oil prices and production the infrastructure fund buckets failed to fill during the 2019-2021 biennium.

At the end of the 2021 legislative session, it was forecasted that the infrastructure fund buckets would not fill during the 2021-2023 biennium. This meant that cities, counties, townships, and airports were unable to rely on this funding source as they planned and prepared for projects within the current biennium. Reliable State and local funding for transportation projects is critical in order for leaders to plan ahead, create shovel ready projects, and maximize federal grant funding. It is also important to ensure that high priority projects can move forward as efficiently as possible throughout the planning, environmental, design, bidding, and construction stages.

The \$400 million SIIF Fund started to fill in May 2022. Without that fund, the other infrastructure funds would have started to fill in May 2022 and would have all been filled before the end of summer 2022. The \$400 million SIIF Fund is simply cash accumulated by the State. It is not programmed for any use until the next legislative session determines how to allocate it. In the meantime, the infrastructure planning for cities, counties, townships, and airports waits for another season to begin projects – exposing them to inflation risks and delaying important infrastructure planning and projects throughout the state.

As our airports plan for future development and growth the funding needs are projected to be significant. Over \$1 billion in projects have been identified over the next 10 years at airports in North Dakota, and the amount for 2023-2027 alone is \$684 million (please see attachment). Our airports work cooperatively with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to maximize federal grant participation, but additional investment from the State and local airport

sponsors will be required to meet these forecasts. Removing the \$400 million SIIF bucket will make the infrastructure buckets for the cities, counties, townships, and airports more reliable for future planning and development.

In closing, AAND and GFK are strongly supportive of SB 2275. We respectfully request that the committee provide a do pass on the bill. I thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony today and will take any questions the committee may have for me.



I'm Scott Meske, representing the North Dakota Transportation Coalition and offer our support for Senate Bill 2275, which prioritizes the political subdivision bucket in the Legacy Fund earnings stream.

The North Dakota Transportation Coalition consists of the largest twenty statewide and regional trade associations, agriculture groups, political subdivisions and business entities in the State – all of whom have a vested interest in moving goods, services and people as efficiently and safely as possible. Our purpose is to advance and enhance North Dakota's transportation infrastructure through advocacy and education efforts resulting in sustainable funding and sound public policy solutions.

The NDDOT and the Upper Great Plains Transportation Institute have made it clear that over the next 20 years, approximately \$10 billion will be needed to maintain, repair and replace North Dakota's infrastructure network. While they receive some continual funding through various formulas and taxes, it isn't nearly enough to meet the demand. The need only increases the longer we continue to take a band-aid approach. Prioritizing the political subdivision stream makes economic sense to address our infrastructure needs.

Please support SB 2275 to remove the dollars for the Strategic Investment and Improvements Fund. Removing this subsection will generate more dollars to be deposited to the non-oil producing counties, cities and townships. This will help alleviate the struggle we have in trying to maintain our Road and Bridge infrastructure.

Foster is one of the smallest land area counties in the state, however, we have 91 miles of roads that were paved in the 1970's. We cannot meet the maintenance required at \$1 million dollars a mile to replace asphalt. In the future, we will need to look at reclaiming some of the roads back to gravel but that cost is now \$90,000 to \$140,000 per mile. With a small tax base and a mill levy valued at a little over \$30,000, we will be hard pressed to maintain these roads without the infusion of Prairie Dog funding.

#### To Whom it may concern:

The City of Cavalier is writing this letter in support of SB 2275. The city of Cavalier has received two distributions of Prairie Dog Funds. We will be utilizing these funds to repair and update one of our lift stations in our city. We are still in the planning phase. Currently, the infrastructure needs of the City of Cavalier are as follows: We have 4 lift stations that were replaced or installed in the 1970's and early 1980's that will need updating. Lift station #1 services everything on the north side of the river, lift station number 6 services all of Bjornson Drive and Wedge Wood Manor our local nursing home that currently has 40 residents. These lift stations service about 1/3 of the homes and businesses in the City of Cavalier.

Additionally, there are 4in water mains that need to be replaced on Madison St, River St, Park St, Mountain St W, 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave, along with sewer and street repairs. We also need to replace the 6in Water main on West 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave N of Park St. These water mains were installed in the 1930's and are undersized for adequate fire flow and water circulation. They have also experienced numerus water breaks. This would include approximately 7,500 ft. of water main replacement and 4,000 ft. of sewer main. The total estimated price from 2013 was around \$3.1 million. Construction costs have increased significantly if not even doubled.

The benefit to the City of Cavalier to have access to the funds from the Prairie Dog Project is unmeasurable. These funds allow our city, with a population of 1238 residents, to implement much needed repairs and upgrades to our water and sewer systems that would take many more years without this funding source. For this reason, the City of Cavalier supports SB 2275.

## Testimony on SB 2275 Presented to the Senate Finance and Taxation Committee Prepared by Tina Fisk, West Fargo City Administrator Jan. 24, 2023

1 Chairman Kannianen and members of the Senate Finance and Taxation 2 Committee,

Please accept this testimony from the City of West Fargo urging a Strong **DO PASS** on SB 2275.

The bill's proposed change to oil and gas extraction tax distribution will give cities across the state access to needed infrastructure funding much faster and more efficiently than is currently available. The sooner cities are able to attain this funding, the sooner we can complete projects that directly impact safety, development, and quality of life for our residents.

In our capital improvement plan, West Fargo has planned for \$208 million in necessary infrastructure projects from 2023-2027. Reliable funding for projects is critical in order for leaders to plan and maximize grant funding. Of particular concern in West Fargo is \$75 million of work that will take place in West Fargo's core area, which encompasses our oldest neighborhoods and West Fargo's primary affordable housing stock. A 2019 infrastructure study identified that these neighborhoods contain streets and sewer systems in need of major rehabilitation. In many cases, this infrastructure has not been rehabbed since its installation in the 1950s, '60s, or '70s. Its revitalization is important to ensure

residents have safe roads, safe water and that these neighborhoods remain livable for years to come.

This type of revitalization is costly. Based on our current funding policy, about \$40 million of those core area projects would be funded through special assessments. The passage of this bill and more efficient distribution of oil and gas tax would allow us to remove some of the financial responsibility that would be placed directly on property owners in the core area.

For example, the reconstruction work needed in West Fargo's Westwood neighborhood to bring streets, water, sanitary and storm sewer systems to current standards could place \$50,000 in special assessments on a single property. On average, this equates to an additional \$3,905 due annually or \$325 per month. Some of these existing homeowners simply do not have the means to add large increases to their expenses in the form of special assessments. We are currently heavily weighing the decision to move forward without additional funding secured. However, this risks catastrophic failures that can affect health and sanitation as well as rising construction costs due to inflation.

This is why it is so vital that we have access to additional funding sources, such as Prairie Dog funds for these projects. Westwood is just one of five areas currently in critical need, a list that will only grow as infrastructure ages across our city.

Again, we ask for a DO PASS on SB 2275 to provide more timely distribution of oil and gas extraction tax to cities for critical infrastructure funding.

Good morning, Chairman Kannianen and Committee members.

I am Larry Syverson from Mayville, I grow soybeans on my farm in Traill County, I am the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors for Roseville Township, and I am also the Executive Secretary of the North Dakota Township Officers Association. NDTOA represents nearly 6,000 Township Officers that serve in more than 1,100 dues paying member townships.

If and when the operation prairie dog, county and township infrastructure fund bucket fills, each township in non-oil counties receives some nine thousand dollars. In Roseville Township, for even a very light maintenance layer of gravel with pit run gravel, which costs us 12 dollars a yard spread, \$9,000 will only do about 4 miles. We have 48 miles, not all roads see heavy use but there are some that will need maintenance graveling every 2 to 3 years to keep them useable. We have to budget \$38,000 a year for blading and graveling. That \$38,000 doesn't allow for any graveling at the recommended rates it is all barely a maintenance level.

During the 20-21 biennium we were very hopeful that prairie dog would pay out for counties and townships. Of course we were sorely disappointed, the biennium ended with the fund empty and our chance to get a few miles improved to a more durable surface was lost.

Once the surface is lost it takes a lot more to bring it back than it would have been to maintain it

NDTOA is currently holding its annual meeting and convention, yesterday we were discussing the pending legislation of this session. When SB 2275 came up the membership was very enthusiastic and hopeful that getting the SIIF bucket out of the way would allow prairie dog to be a more dependable source of funding for our transportation systems.

Last evening a spokesman for the Western Dakota Energy Association also talked about legislation mentioning that prairie dog pays non-oil counties and townships. But he went on to say that eleven counties in their association get less than five million dollars of oil and gas tax

distributions so their townships do not get any oil and gas payments. Those townships do not totally escape energy impacts but must face the expenses without the funding.

One time funding has been very helpful and is much appreciated, but the term "one-time" does not instill much of a sense of dependability. We are mostly farmers, and we certainly understand the volatility of commodity markets and realize that results can be disappointing. But we are hoping that moving the four hundred-million-dollar SIIF bucket out of the steam ahead of the county and township fund will help bring some stability to our funding.

Chairman Kannianen and Committee Members, that concludes my prepared testimony. On behalf of the membership of NDTOA, I ask that you give SB 2275 your favorable recommendation and I will try to answer any questions.
