15.1-01-03. State board of public school education - Powers and duties.

- 1. The state board of public school education shall:
 - a. Assist county committees in carrying out their duties.
 - b. Provide county committees with clerical assistance, plans of procedure, standards, data, maps, forms, and other materials, information, and services.





- c. Appoint members to the county committee, if the county superintendent does not fulfill this duty, as provided for in section 15.1-10-01.
- d. Provide oversight for regional education associations as required by chapter 15.1-09.1.
- e. Establish and certify a North Dakota learning continuum to allow a district-approved, mastery framework policy to award units required under sections 15.1-21-01 and 15.1-21-02 and to waive unit instructional time requirements under section 15.1-21-03, upon the recommendation of the kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council.
- <u>f.</u> Develop a policy and procedures for a school district formed by the reorganization process under chapter 15.1-12 to revert to individual school districts. For a reorganized school district to be eligible for the reversion process, the reorganized school district must have been formed by school districts located in two or more communities, including a rural community, and may not have been formed by school districts that were located in the same city. The board shall develop the policy and procedures on or before January 1, 2024.
- 2. The state board of public school education may adopt rules in accordance with chapter 28-32.

SECTION 2. A new section to chapter 15.1-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Purchase of gifts or gratuities - Gift fund.

- <u>1.</u> <u>A public school or school district may create a gift fund. The gift fund may not include state funds.</u>
- <u>A public school or school district may use funds from the gift fund to purchase an item as a gift or gratuity for an individual, including a school district employee, an individual who speaks or performs at a school function, or a guest on the school premises.</u>
- 3. For purposes of this section, "gift" includes:
 - a. A beverage, food item, or refreshment;
 - <u>b.</u> For parent-teacher conferences, beverages, food items, or refreshments, costing no more than twenty-five dollars per teacher;
 - c. A catered meal costing no more than fifty dollars per meal;
 - d. Pens, notepads, or other promotional materials;
 - e. <u>An item of cultural significance, including a quilt, basket, beadwork, sage, or quillwork;</u>
 - <u>f.</u> <u>An award or incentive, as approved by the superintendent of public</u> <u>instruction or the superintendent's designee; and</u>
 - g. Any other item of de minimis value.



SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-07-25.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-07-25.4. Virtual learning - School district policy - Report to legislative management and legislative assembly.

The board of a school district or governing board of a nonpublic school that operates a physical school plant may adopt a policy to allow students to engage in virtual instruction and in the case of a school district, qualify for average daily membership in the district. The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules governing policies under this section. A policy adopted by a school district under this section must comply with the rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall provide biennial reports an annual report to the legislative management regarding even-numbered years and the legislative assembly in odd-numbered years comparing the academic performance metrics of students participating in virtual instruction with students not participating in virtual instruction under this section using the statewide prekindergarten through grade twelve strategic vision framework goals. If the superintendent of public instruction does not have access to academic performance reports of a school district's virtual instruction subgroup because of low group size, the district shall provide the annual report required under this section for the district's comparison data.

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-07-26 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-07-26. School district demographicsenrollment - Long-term planning processReview - Report.

- Between January first and June thirtieth of every even-numbered year, the board of each school district shall invite the public to participate in a planning processreview addressing the effects that demographics mightdecreasing or increasing enrollment will have on the district in the ensuing three-year and five-year periods, and specifically addressing potential effects on:
 - a. Academic and extracurricular programs<u>achievement including</u> progress toward state academic goals adopted by the statewide prekindergarten through grade twelve education strategic vision steering committee;





 - f. An analysis of the role and practices of the county superintendent of schools.
- 2. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-ninth legislative assembly.

SECTION 17. TEACHER SHORTAGE AND MILITARY FAMILIES TASK FORCE - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT. During the 2023-24 interim, the superintendent of public instruction shall establish a teacher shortage and military families task force to examine employer recruitment needs, applicable state regulations, and benefit options for kindergarten through grade twelve educators within the state, including potential barriers to military personnel and spouses teaching in the classroom. The task force shall identify immediate and long-term public policy strategies to address teacher shortage and support for military families and spouses. The task force shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-ninth legislative assembly.

SECTION 18. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC

INSTRUCTION - GRANTS FOR FREE MEALS. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$6,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of public instruction for the purpose of providing grants to school districts to defray the expenses of providing meals, free of charge, for all students enrolled in public school at or below two hundred percent of the federal poverty guideline, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025. The superintendent of public instruction shall develop guidelines and reporting requirements for the grants.

"SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-01-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-01-03. State board of public school education - Powers and duties.

- 1. The state board of public school education shall:
 - a. Assist county committees in carrying out their duties.
 - Provide county committees with clerical assistance, plans of procedure, standards, data, maps, forms, and other materials, information, and services.

c. Appoint members to the county committee, if the county superintendent does not fulfill this duty, as provided for in section 15.1-10-01.



- d. Provide oversight for regional education associations as required by chapter 15.1-09.1.
- e. Establish and certify a North Dakota learning continuum to allow a district-approved, mastery framework policy to award units required under sections 15.1-21-01 and 15.1-21-02 and to waive unit instructional time requirements under section 15.1-21-03, upon the recommendation of the kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council.
- f. Develop a policy and procedures for a school district formed by the reorganization process under chapter 15.1-12 to revert to individual school districts. For a reorganized school district to be eligible for the reversion process, the reorganized school district must have been formed by school districts located in two or more communities, including a rural community, and may not have been formed by school districts that were located in the same city. The board shall develop the policy and procedures on or before January 1, 2024.
- 2. The state board of public school education may adopt rules in accordance with chapter 28-32.

SECTION 2. A new section to chapter 15.1-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Purchase of gifts or gratuities - Gift fund.

- <u>1.</u> A public school or school district may create a gift fund. The gift fund may not include state funds.
- 2. A public school or school district may use funds from the gift fund to purchase an item as a gift or gratuity for an individual, including a school district employee, an individual who speaks or performs at a school function, or a guest on the school premises.
- 3. For purposes of this section, "gift" includes:
 - a. A beverage, food item, or refreshment;
 - <u>b.</u> For parent-teacher conferences, beverages, food items, or refreshments, costing no more than twenty-five dollars per teacher;
 - c. <u>A catered meal costing no more than fifty dollars per meal;</u>
 - d. Pens, notepads, or other promotional materials;
 - e. An item of cultural significance, including a quilt, basket, beadwork, sage, or quillwork;
 - <u>f.</u> <u>An award or incentive, as approved by the superintendent of public instruction or the superintendent's designee; and</u>
 - g. Any other item of de minimis value.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-07-25.4 of the North Dakota Century

15.1-07-25.4. Virtual learning - School district policy - Report to legislative management <u>and legislative assembly</u>.

The board of a school district or governing board of a nonpublic school that operates a physical school plant may adopt a policy to allow students to engage in virtual instruction and in the case of a school district, qualify for average daily membership in the district. The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules governing policies under this section. A policy adopted by a school district under this section must comply with the rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall provide biennial reports an annual report to the legislative management regarding neven-numbered years and the legislative assembly in odd-numbered years comparing the academic performance metrics of students participating in virtual instruction with students not participating in virtual instruction under this section using state assessment data. If the superintendent of public instruction subgroup because of low group size, information must be reported in the aggregate.

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-07-26 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-07-26. School district demographics<u>enrollment</u> - Long-term planning process<u>Review - Report</u>.

Good morning, Chairman Elkin and members of the Senate
Education Committee.

It has been my pleasure over the past five years to have served as 5 the Assistant Superintendent for Mandan Public Schools. Over 6 this same period of time I have also served our profession as a 7 statewide leader as President of the North Dakota Association of 8 School Administrators (NDASA) and North Dakota Council of 9 Educational Leaders (NDCEL). I also had the privilege to serve 10 on the State Board of Public School Education and the North 11 Dakota Board of Career and Technical Education between 2018 12 and 2022. I am speaking to you today in support of Amendment 13 1 of 2284, dealing with the composition of the State Board of 14 Public Education. 15

The State Board of Public School Education plays a vital role in setting the course for education in our state. Over the past five years it has expanded from a board dealing almost exclusively

with reorganizations and annexations, to now having a 1 supervisory role of Regional Education Associations (REAs) and 2 adopting the Learning Continuum. Within this session additional 3 duties including oversight of the Center for Distance Education 4 (CDE) are being proposed. The State Board and the Career and 5 Technical Education (CTE) Board, which are joined in law, work 6 on many detailed issues that affect our school districts. While 7 there is value in varied perspectives in making these decisions, I 8 would offer that many of these decisions require an understanding 9 of education, taxation, and governance that is inherent to the 10 experiences of a school district superintendent. Between these 11 boards this includes, but is not limited to, annexations and the 12 impact of large property transfers between districts, new courses 13 offerings and course requirements within CTC as well as the 14 recent proposal of a new funding formula. Again, I suggest that 15 the expertise of a school district superintendent and the 16 understanding of the nuance of these decisions is not just nice to 17 have, it is a necessity. 18

North Dakota Century Code 15.1-01-01 appears to recognize the
 valuable role of the superintendent in the State Board. In fact,
 subsection 3 clearly states that

The governor shall appoint new board members from a list of names submitted by a committee consisting of the president of North Dakota united, the president of the North Dakota council of educational leaders, and the president of the North Dakota school boards association. Two of the state board members must be members of the North Dakota school boards association

What is less clear is why this process has recently been changed 11 and no longer aligns with NDCC 15.1-01-01. In 2022, Dr. Steve 12 Holen, Superintendent in McKenzie County School District, and 13 I were at the end of our terms and subject to reappointment. As 14 is required, the Governor's Office made the decision to appoint 15 new members and neither Dr. Holen or I were reappointed. For 16 the sake of clarity, it is within the Governor's responsibilities to 17 either reappoint or make a new appointee. The concern is not if 18 Dr. Holen or I were reappointed, but rather that the process 19 outlined in 15.1-01-01(3) was not followed with the fidelity that 20

should be expected with a process so clearly articulated in North
Dakota Century Code. In this case, no representatives were
offered by North Dakota United, North Dakota Council of
Educational Leaders or the North Dakota School Boards
Association. The selections were made from an application
process without input from the groups outlined in subsection 3.

This amendment is directing the representation on this critical 7 board. It replicates the requirement to have two NDSBA 8 NDASA representatives by now also requiring two 9 representatives. I feel this is a strong middle ground that still 10 allows the Governor's Office to exercise choice for two members 11 through an application process that wouldn't contradict the 12 process articulated in 15.1-01-01. 13

Chairman Elkin and members of the committee. Leadership
 matters and leaders that work daily in our schools have a unique
 perspective that should be represented on both of these boards.

As the 7 school superintendent at Valley City Public Schools, I accepted 8 this appointment with great pride and looked forward to the 9 opportunity to represent our students, educators, parents, and 10 school districts with important decisions related to public 11 education all across North Dakota. Over the past five years, the 12 boards for both Public Education and CTE have made several 13 critical decisions impacting education. A few of these decisions 14 include the reorganization of Williams County #8 and Williston 15 #1, the reorganization of the Hope-Page School District, the bi-16 annual oversight and auditing of our regional education 17 associations (REA's), the adoption of the new state learning 18 continuum, and the selection and management of federal dollars 19

related to the CTE Capital Projects Grant. Over the course of my
time serving on both of these boards, I've appreciated the hard

Introduction to SB 2284 Senator Don Schaible, District 31

Good afternoon, Chairman Elkin and Senate Education Committee. For the record, my name is Senator Don Schaible, here to introduce SB 2284 which will be the K-12 funding bill. Sometimes there is questions why this bill is not included in the K-12 budget bill, but I believe that Education Policy should also have their fingerprints on this bill also, for it's very hard to separate policy from appropriations and I believe policy should be involved with the processes. I will walk through each section, and if you would like, I can take questions after each section.

Sec. 1 suggest that members of the State Board of Public Education selected by legislative districts rather than counties would provide better representation with more even population and with counties, it has been difficult to find people that wanted to serve on the board. The clarification that is offer in subsection 3. Pg 2 is what has been in practice for years until lately so it may be good to clarify the intentions of how members are appointed. Line 17-19 also indicates that two members must be working administrators. These clarification came for issues that have recently took place because of issues for CTE centers and projects with CARES and ESSER moneys that were made available during the last session and special session.

Sec. 2 Adding language "in the school district" is clarify the probationary teacher in the same district. This question was put before the supreme court during the last interim and they ruled that legislative intent was that the 2 years were in the same school district, this just clarifies century code to match intent and court ruling.

Sec. 3 came at the request of the North Dakota School Board Association to make sure that the definition of Weapon is consistent though out Century Code. The NDSBA is here to further explain this request.

Sec.4 The original intent of this section was to allow school to evaluate teachers and only provide professional development to only ones that need it. With further discussion with DPI and Educational Leaders, we found out that is what is happening already. At the end of my presentation, I will be suggesting a few amendments for your consideration, one of the is to Section 4 of this draft.

Sec. 5 and Sec 6 page 7 allows for total on time funding by accelerating the on time weighting factor to 1.0 in 2023-24; this was scheduled to be phased in by 2025-26 by raising the factor by a .1 The cost of this is \$5.3 million.

Sec. 7 deletes language that is obsolete and no longer needed.

Sec.8 would seem like there is a lot of duplicated language, which there is, which address two different effective dates. As you will notice on page 8, line 17 and 18 through page 15 line 10 shows and effective date through June 30th ,2025. On page 15 line 11-12 and all the language through page 21 line 28 is for an effective date after June 30, 2025.

The effective change of this section is the amount for the per pupil payment and does suggest for a 3% X 3% increase to the amounts of \$10,544 for 2023-2024, and \$10,860 for 2024-2025. This is a cost of \$119.9 million.

The strikes out language Page 12-13 and page 18 line 27 through page 20 line 11 removes the requirement on transition maximum schools and moves them all on the formula at a cost of \$14.8 million.

Sec.9 suggests to our current school construction loan program. Under our current program, school can ask for a \$10m loan at 2% interest for school construction for 20 years. This program was started in 2015 with the intent of creating a revolving low interest loan fund that would become self-sustaining with out any additional cost to the state. This School construction loan fund has see a few changes, but has been very successful to our schools even during a period of low interest rates. The improvements in this bill intend to correct a couple of issue that still remain. One of the biggest complaints is that \$10 million was not much help to our larger school that projects are costing much higher levels than \$10 million. So the amendment on page 22 creates a two tiered system for smaller schools projects costing less than \$75 million could apply for a \$10 million loan and projects over \$75 million, schools could apply for a \$50 million low interest loan.

Sec. 10 provides an infusion of \$75 million to the construction loan program which provides a good start to creating a two tiered program that should provide property tax relief to school construction and moves us along to getting a self-sustaining revolving loan fund.

SB 2284 Senate Education | February 1, 2023 **Testimony of Alexis Baxley**

Good morning, Chairman Elkin, and members of the Senate Education Committee. My name is Alexis Baxley, and I serve as the executive director of the North Dakota School Boards Association. NDSBA represents the elected school boards of all 170 public school districts and several special education units in North Dakota.

The North Dakota School Boards Association stands in support of SB 2284. I will walk my testimony through the bill section by section in an attempt to be clear and succinct.

NDSBA is supportive of the changes to the state board of public school education composition in Section 1. We believe it is incredibly important to maintain a base level of school board and educator experience on the board due to the increased work load and educational focus of the board. While the board's work used to be largely annexations, we have added a significant number of duties and oversight authority to the board in recent sessions. The board benefits greatly from having experienced board members and administrators among its membership when completing these duties. Additionally, adding the option of the designee to the committee will provide our organizations with some appreciated flexibility. Limiting the list to three names will ensure the committee forwards only the most qualified candidates to the Governor for consideration and that only those names forwarded will be considered.

The clarifying language regarding probationary teachers in Section 2 is appreciated and ensures that legislative intent is clear. This language was challenged before the ND Supreme Court over the past biennium, so the addition of this language will help mirror that ruling as well.

Section 3 includes the definition of a dangerous weapon according the NDCC § 62.1-01-01. NDSBA asked that weapon be defined in chapter 15.1 in order to provide clarity to school districts who are tasked with disciplining students who bring weapons to school. Currently, that section of code requires that school districts adopt a policy governing the possession of weapons and firearms on school property or at school functions. I think we are all pretty clear as to what a firearm is, but what a weapon is has been less clear. The bill as written uses North Dakota's definition, but I would like to respectfully request that the committee consider amending the bill to use the federal definition provided in 18 USC § 930. I have included in my online testimony the proposed amendment. The federal definition reads as follows:

"...a weapon, device, instrument, material, or substance, animate or inanimate, that is used for, or is readily capable of, causing death or serious bodily injury, except that such term does not include a pocket knife with a blade of less than 2½ inches in length."

The biggest difference between the two definitions is two and a half inches of knife blade. Currently, students under IDEA who bring a weapon to school would be subject to the federal definition. Aligning the definition in this section of code to the federal definition provides clarity to districts no matter which students are involved.

If you are looking at the provided amendment, you have likely noticed one more piece. In subsection 2 of NDCC § 15.1-19-10 we are asking that current language be clarified to state that the policy of school district must include that suspension and expulsion MAY be a punishment for possession of a dangerous weapon or firearm. This change would codify what is currently happening in school districts. Current law is unclear as to whether the policy must include suspension and expulsion OR that the *punishment* must be suspension or expulsion. This becomes problematic when students, usually quite young, innocently bring the cool pocket knife gifted to them by grandpa, for example. Administrators and school boards know that expulsion in these scenarios is overkill and detrimental to the student. Most of they time they use good judgement and allow the student to stay, but without this amendment it isn't clear whether or not that is a legal decision. I ask that you consider this amendment and confirm what we believe the initial legislative intent to be.

Next, NDSBA is supportive of the increased per pupil payment and continued commitment to ontime funding in Sections 6, 7, and 8. The per pupil payment in this bill is a great starting point to ensure our districts are able to continue to serve their students over the next biennium despite record inflation.

Finally, we are supportive in the increased maximum school construction loan in Section 9 and the transfer in section 10. These dollars are a great investment in the future of North Dakota.

I respectfully ask that the committee give SB 2284 a do-pass recommendation, consider the amendments provided, and I would stand for any questions.

NDSBA proposed amendment to SB 2284

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Subsection 6 of section 15.1-19-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

- 2. The policy must prohibit the possession of a <u>dangerous</u> weapon or a firearm by a student on school property and at school functions and provide for the punishment of any student found to be in violation. Punishment The policy must provide that punishment for possession of a dangerous weapon or a firearm may must include immediate suspension from school and expulsion. A student who possesses a firearm in violation of this section must be expelled for at least one year. The school district firearms policy must authorize the school district superintendent or the school principal, if the school district does not have a superintendent, to modify an expulsion for firearms possession under this section on a case-by-case basis in accordance with criteria established by the board. Before expelling a student, a school board or its designated hearing officer, within ten days of the student's suspension, shall provide the student with a hearing at which time the school board or its designated hearing officer shall take testimony and consider evidence, including the existence of mitigating circumstances. If a designated hearing officer orders that a student be expelled, the student may seek a review of the decision by the school board, based on the record of the expulsion hearing.
- 6. For purposes of this section:
 - a. "Firearm" has the meaning provided in Public Law No. 90-351 [82 Stat. 197; 18 U.S.C. 921].
 - "School property" includes all land within the perimeter of the school site and all school buildings, structures, facilities, and school vehicles, whether owned or leased by a school district, and the site of any school-sponsored event or activity.
 - c. "Dangerous Wweapon" includes any switchblade or gravity knife, machete, scimitar, stiletto, sword, dagger, or knife with a blade of five inches [12.7 centimeters] or more; any throwing star, nunchaku, or other martial arts weapon; any billy, blackjack, sap, bludgeon, cudgel, metal knuckles, or sand club; any slungshot; any bow and arrow, crossbow, or spear; any weapon that will expel, or is readily capable of expelling, a projectile by the action of a spring, compressed air, or compressed gas, including any such weapon, loaded or unloaded, commonly referred to as a BB gun, air rifle, or CO2 gun; and any projector of a bomb or any object containing or capable of producing and emitting any noxious liquid, gas, or substance. The term does not include a spray or aerosol containing CS, also known as ortho-chlorobenzamalonitrile; CN, also known as alphachloroacetophenone; or other irritating agent intended for use in the defense of an individual, nor does the term include a device that uses voltage for the defense of an individual, unless the device uses a projectile and voltage or the device uses a projectile and may be used to apply multiple applications of voltage during a single incident, then the term includes the device for an individual who is prohibited from possessing a firearm under this title. has the meaning provided in 18 U.S.C 930.

Testimony in Support of SB 2284 – Senate Education Committee

Chairman Elkin and members of the Senate Education Committee, for the record my name is Bob Marthaller, representing North Dakota United.

Chairman Elkin, North Dakota United is pleased to provide testimony in general support of SB 2284, and we wish to thank you and Senator Schaible as well as Representative Heinert and Representative Nathe for your leadership and efforts to provide quality educational opportunity for North Dakota students. The members and leadership of North Dakota United, also want to thank you for your support and efforts to provide adequate and equitable financial resources to public schools and school districts. Your efforts have made it possible for school boards, administrators, teachers, and many other school staff to continue working to provide the best possible education system for North Dakota students. And, I must say that you have done all this while providing significant property tax relief for the citizens of North Dakota.

Chairman Elkin and members of the committee, North Dakota United believes that North Dakota teachers are among the best in the nation. Along with parental and community support and involvement, we believe our education system and quality instruction provided by North Dakota teachers, will have our students choice ready and will graduate ready to pursue additional formal education or training, enter the military, or become a part of the state workforce. We also recognize the work is not complete and there is much left to be done. Education is a continuous process and for our students to be "choice ready" additional resources must be made available. Services such as career counseling, mental health and other counseling support, resources for critical infrastructure such as technology and safe and functional facilities must be supported and expanded.

Teachers and support staff are critical to the mission, and we must endeavor to do the best that we can to support them, including providing a competitive compensation and benefit package. To this end, the State of North Dakota must provide the financial resources in order to serve North Dakota students.

That's why North Dakota United wishes to propose a significant increase in funding to public school districts, increases that local school boards can manage at the local level in support of education in their communities.

SB 2284, Section 8, page 11 sets the state rate at \$10,544 per weighted student units for the 2023-24 school year and \$10,860 for the 2024-25 school year.

Chairman Elkin and members of the committee, North Dakota United respectfully suggests that the rate for the 2023-24 school year be set at \$11,056 per weighted student unit and for the 2024-25 school year, the rate be set at \$11,940. With the help of the professional staff at the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction, we estimate the additional cost for the biennium to be approximately \$346 million, or about an 8% increase for each year of the biennium.

At North Dakota United we recognize this is a huge number for the Senate Education Committee to ponder. However, North Dakota United believes this number is attainable and we hope for serious consideration as this bill moves forward for further debate and deliberation.

Chairman Elkin and Members of the Committee:

My name is Adam Tescher, and I am the School Finance Officer with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here to provide information regarding SB 2284.

In 2013, the state implemented a K-12 funding formula tied to the cost of providing adequate and equitable education and funded it with a combination of state and local taxes. Local property tax levy authority was decreased significantly, with statewide taxes making up the difference. Statewide taxes are now funding approximately 73% of the funding formula.

The local share is 60 mills on taxable valuation and 75% of other local in-lieu of property tax revenue. The state funds the remainder up to the adequate amount. The formula is student-driven and uses various weights to account for the increased costs associated with school size and serving students with special needs. A base perstudent funding rate is set by the legislature designed to generate the resources necessary to educate students to state standards. In addition, there are transitional adjustments included to minimize budget impacts that inevitably occur when making major changes.

The Legislature, through the interim Education Funding Committee, contracted with Picus-Odden and Associates to conduct a recalibration study to confirm the adequacy of that base level of support.

The consultants used an evidenced-based model to determine the resources necessary to educate students to college and career-ready proficiency. Included in the model are all components necessary to meet the standards. This includes core staffing, administration, operations, professional development, technology, and instruction materials.

Attached is a blank worksheet for the Minnewaukan School District that we will walk through and complete to help gain an understanding of the Integrated Funding Formula.

2 Testimony in support

Senator Elkin and members of the Senate education committee, we are here supporting
NDCEL and we are here to explain our support for specific areas of this bill. We do so
with the understanding that this bill is typically a bill we work on through conference
committee and to the end of session. That being said, it is important to understand our
rationale for support in a number of areas.

Let's start with the State Board of Public Education. Since 1999 when the Governor 8 began appointing to this board, the law has stood regarding the 3 associations sending 9 to the governor a list of candidates from which he was to appoint from by law. Over the 10 11 years, there have always been at least 2 members of NDSBA on the board (by law) and have always otherwise been occupied by at least three active school superintendents and 12 sometimes by 4. The reason for this is that the issues this board deals with begs for a 13 board that is steeped in educational knowledge. The three associations have always 14 15 agreed on this and that has never changed. Under the current Governor administration, 16 he's instituted his own board application procedure and that procedure has determined his appointments, not law. In the most recent appointment (you will hear more about 17 this) the recommendations of the 3 associations were ignored and the appointees were 18 not taken from the groups (as prescribed by law) and instead were purely chosen at the 19 20 whim of the governor. This amendment maintains the required two board members 21 who should be the voice of the people, at least two superintendents and allows the governor two others at his leisure which we feel is a more than generous offer. Every 22

governor since 1999 has wholeheartedly respected and appreciated this process until
 recently.

As we look at other areas of this bill there are many good things worth mentioning andworth keeping. They all benefit the field.

- Better of spring or fall ADM protects our smaller schools who experience ADM
 declines at times. They are valuable schools, and we need to keep them
 sustainable. One year of budget preparedness is not too much to ask for to protect
 those communities and those students who receive their education there.
- On time funding is important for growing districts so they can manage the
 challenges of increasing classroom sizes, new buildings, and new services.
- Per pupil increases are important to not only manage inflation but also so we can
 offer our very deserving staff adequate pay to remain competitive in the field
- Enhancement in the school construction loan funds help local communities and
 provide intrinsic property tax relief.
- Some of the studies being offered in this bill can provide either pilots or studies
 of efficiencies that can help our schools

We ask this committee to look at this bill in a favorable light, and frankly to hold to the ideals that we are asking for understanding of what is better for students is more important than is application of more power given to any position in government. If we are protective of big government, we must remain carefully protective of balance of power just as your legislatures that have come before you.

Senate Education Committee Members,

Greetings. My name is Duane Poitra. I am the Business Manager for the Belcourt School District. I am an enrolled member the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa. I wish to provide testimony today in relation to <u>SUPPORT</u> of SB2284 as it relates to the North Dakota Education funding formula, specifically on the "Transition Maximum" language elimination in the bill's draft language. Transition Maximum pertains to School Districts still transitioning on to actual formula since 2013; these Districts hence receive less funding than formula calculation.

Transition Maximum was established in the North Dakota Education funding formula back in the 2013 biennium as a funding formula mechanism to allow school districts that were "<u>under formula</u>", based on actual formula calculation, to "get on formula" at a reasonable pace; which was anticipated then to be no more than 6 - 8 years.

A baseline per pupil amount was determined in the 2013 biennium for each District affected by Transition Maximum that would be multiplied by a per pupil waiting factor of 110% to which the resulting weighted baseline per pupil amount would be multiplied by the weighted average daily membership (ADM) of the District to determine a maximum District payment amount. The baseline per pupil amount changed in 2019-20.

If a district had a baseline per pupil payment rate less than the established per pupil payment rate for 2013-14, the district received a transition maximum adjustment to their formula calculation to prevent significant swings in district budgets due to a funding formula change.

The education funding formula would also determine a "normal" formula payment for Districts. The difference between the "normal" formula payment calculation and the maximum payment calculation is called the Transition Maximum Adjustment, which in the calculation is a deduction from the "normal" formula payment.

In the 2013 biennium, there were 41 Districts that were affected by Transition Maximum. The goal of a Transition Maximum Districts is to get on "normal" formula. As of the 2022-23 school year, there are 11 Transition Maximum Districts, of which 10 of the School Districts primarily serve a Native American population.

Please consider all other North Dakota school districts are either on formula or exceed the formula (transition minimum Districts). The total annual North Dakota education funding is approximately \$1 billion dollars per year. The funding needed to get these 11 school districts on formula is about \$10.7 million dollars per year.

I previously provided testimony during the 2021 ND Legislative Session suggesting transition maximum schools be placed on actual formula as soon as possible. I again offer testimony that the transition maximum schools get on the funding formula in the manner specified in HB2184, considering intent of the 2013 ND Legislative Session.

The 2013 Legislative Session provided a new education funding formula which essentially lowered property tax contributions used towards education in North Dakota by increasing North Dakota's contribution towards education.

However, property poor school districts with average per student imputed taxable valuations more than 80% below the State average required funding formula modification in the 2013 draft bill to realize benefit. SB2184 provides an expeditious solution for the property poor districts, currently affected by transition maximum, to finally move to normal formula payment as originally intended in 2013.

Therefore, I support SB2184 as this bill provides a means to get ALL the school districts affected by transition maximum on normal North Dakota Education funding formula as intended back in 2013.







Proposed Change in HB1186

As drafted, the maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify for a loan from SCARLF would increase from \$10 million to \$20 million.

- Increasing the maximum loan amount from \$10 million to \$20 million, the SCARLF will
 reduce the number of loans that can be funded at the current level of funding.
- Assuming loans are for the maximum amount:
 - SCARLF can currently fund 4.5 new loans at \$10 million, per loan.
 - An increase to a \$20 million maximum at current funding level is 2.25 new loans.

Policy Question:

If current funding level is maintained...is the Legislature willing to decrease the number of loans that can be funded each biennium?



Proposed Change in HB1186

As drafted, the current 2% interest rate charged to school districts will decrease to 1%.

 Today, the fund receives repayments on existing loans; Biennial repayments total approximately \$45 million. These repayments are available to make new loans.

Example

- \$45 million of new loans generates <u>\$10 million in interest when accrued at 2%</u>, over a 20-year term.
- \$45 million of new loans generates <u>\$4.8 million in interest when accrued at 1%</u> over a 20-year term.

Policy Question

Is the Legislature willing to lower the interest rate on loans to school districts to 1% which revolves funds at a slower rate?



Summary Slide

- HB1186 suggests two policy proposals the SCARLF
 - 1. Increase the maximum loan amount from \$10m per applicant to \$20m per applicant.
 - Without additional funding, the maximum number of projects that could be funded is reduced from 4.5 to 2.25
 - 2. Decrease the current 2% interest rate on school construction loans to 1%.
 - Decreasing the interest rate will reduce the amount of funding revolving back into the fund via repayments. \$45,000,000 in new loans will generate \$5,200,000 less, at 20-year loan terms, at 1% than at 2%.
- Proposed Amendment to HB 1186
 - 1. Allow refinancing of loans secured on the open market into SCARLF
 - Refinancing of market rate bonds would consume capacity of the fund to make new loans.
- · SB 2284 proposes to make policy changes to SCARLF
 - 1. For project under \$75m...retain the \$10m cap.
 - 2. For projects over \$75m, increase the cap to \$50m.
 - 3. Appropriate \$75m from Foundation Aid to the SCARLF in the 2023-2025 biennium.

Testimony on North Dakota Education Funding Formula – SB2284

Presented by Scott Davis, representing Belcourt School District #7, Ft. Yates Public School District, New Town Public School District

Greetings Sen. Elkin and members of the Committee,

My name is Scott Davis. I am the former Executive Director of the ND Indian Affairs Commission, a post I held for 12 years. I know represent Belcourt School District #7, Ft. Yates Public School District, New Town Public School District.

I am here today in support of SB 2284 in that this Bill will provide adequate funding for North Dakota school districts which include North Dakota public schools on Tribal Reservations.

This Bill reminds me an extension of what was done during the 2013 Legislative Session. Then, Governor Dalrymple in unison with the Legislative Body, passed a substantial property tax bill that aided local political subdivisions and school districts that included schools on Tribal Reservations.

What was added to that Bill at the time was to carve out a school funding formula for schools that have no or very limited tax base. The schools that we are addressing today exist on our Air Bases in Minot and Grand Forks, they also include schools in Belcourt, Ft. Totten, Ft. Yates and within the MHA Nation.

The intent of that Bill formula at that time was to get those schools on Formula. Since then, we've had a few budget shortfalls due to falling Oil prices, commodity prices and pandemic. So today, many of the schools are not there yet.

We believe with your support that SB 2284 will get our schools back on track to full Formula and maintain current baseline funding rates and to continue to increase the (transition) maximum percentage in the coming years.

Over the last 10 plus years we recognize that Tribal Nations and you as State leaders have shown great progress in partnership and understandings within your Committees, DPI and the Governor's. We value those meetings, face to face talks, questions and answers as we work together in helping all North Dakotans and Tribal Citizens in obtaining an adequate education.

Our team would be happy to sit down with Committee members as we move this Bill forward.

Mr. Chairman this concluded my testimony at this time, and I'd be happy to answer any questions.

After watching Wednesday's hearing of SB 2284 regarding the selection process for the State Board of Public School Education, I feel it is imperative that I share some facts with you.

Testimony you heard that day was riddled with misinformation at best and is more accurately described as steeped in untruths and mischaracterization. I could not stand by and let them go uncorrected.

The State Superintendent is the Executive Director & Secretary for the State Board of Public School Education and is directed by the ND Legislature to carry out NDCC 15.1-01-01 (3), which states,

"The governor shall appoint new board members from a list of names submitted by a committee consisting of the president of North Dakota united, the president of the North Dakota council of educational leaders, and the president of the North Dakota school boards association."

I know that my **predecessor** did not follow the law as outlined in NDCC 15.1-01-01 (3), but upon discovery and working with this Governor, NDCC has been followed to the letter of the law.

This packet is being provided as evidence that the testimony given to your committee on Wednesday - stating that the law has not been followed in the past few years - was false and untruthful.

As mentioned, The State Board of Public School Education's most significant work is working with <u>county</u> superintendents and the recommendations coming from <u>county</u> committees appointed by county commissioners and county superintendents, mostly related to property annexations, school re-organizations, and school consolidations.

At first blush, it may seem harmless to change the boundary designations from **county jurisdictions** to **legislative districts**, but there is a clear through-line that exists from **county** jurisdictions to the State Board of Public School Education.

Visiting with the Association of Counties, they believe it is important they be involved in this work before any changes are made to this section of NDCC to ensure their members' interests are represented.

It may also appear to be a good idea to have local superintendents on the State Board of Public School Education, ... but it may not be.

County Commissioners do not appoint local school superintendents to sit on their County Annexation Committees, and they may have a good reason, or they may not – but no one has asked them.

Requiring that a certain number of members of the State Board of Public School Education be members of the North Dakota Council of Education Leaders Association of School Administrators drastically reduces the number of eligible applicants to this board, reducing the selection pool of applicants from a minimum of 17,000 qualified electors from each jurisdiction to approximately 28.

As the Executive Director & Secretary of the State Board of Public School Education, who is tasked by the legislature to "call meetings [of the State Board of Public School Education] as necessary, carry out the policies of the board, and employ personnel necessary to perform the board's duties." I, too, need to be involved with the critical discussion and work of making any changes to the jurisdictional boundaries and the composition requirements of the board members.

Prior to the filing of SB 2284, I was not aware NDCEL was bringing this forth to the 68th Assembly to consider.

Given the urgency of getting this bill out of Committee on Monday, February 6, but clearly seeing the need to involve more stakeholders in this important and significant work, I respectfully request SB 2284 be amended before it moves out of the Senate in a defective state, to

Remove existing language in Section 1 and Replace it With:

4 SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY- STATE BOARD OF PUBLIC EDUCATION.

2 During the 2023-2024 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the historical and current composition and geographical distribution of North Dakota's county and state boards of education. The study shall review the composition and geographical distribution of boards from other states and involve state, county, and local stakeholders in the review. The legislative management shall report its findings to the sixty-ninth legislative assembly.

After working with this bill's sponsor, Chairman Elkin, other key Senators, and the NDCEL Executive Director,

Summary of Board of Public School Education Selection Process

It supervises the development of a state learning continuum, which identifies skills that are crucial for the well-rounded education of a high school graduate. It has charge of the state K-12 Education Coordination Council, which reviews the effectiveness of North Dakota's education programs.

Most recently, the board reviewed and approved a historic combination of the Williston city school district and a neighboring Williams County district into a single entity, called <u>Williston Basin School</u> <u>District No. 7</u>. The reorganization took effect July 1, 2021.

Jason Rohr, Jamestown, a senior crop insurance specialist for AgCountry Farm Credit Services.

Introduction to SB 2284 Senator Don Schaible, District 31

Good afternoon, Chairman Bekkedahl and Senate Appropriations Committee. For the record, my name is Senator Don Schaible, here to introduce SB 2284 which will be the K-12 funding bill. Sometimes there is questions why this bill is not included in the K-12 budget bill, but I believe that Education Policy should also have their fingerprints on this bill also, for it's very hard to separate policy from appropriations and I believe policy should be involved with the processes. I will walk through each section, and if you would like, I can take questions

Sec. 1 suggest that members of the State Board of Public Education selected by legislative districts rather than counties would provide better representation with more even population and with counties, it has been difficult to find people that wanted to serve on the board. The clarification that is offer in subsection 3. Pg 2 is what has been in practice for years until lately so it may be good to clarify the intentions of how members are appointed. Line 17-19 also indicates that two members must be working administrators. These clarification came for issues that have recently took place because of issues for CTE centers and projects with CARES and ESSER moneys that were made available during the last session and special session.

Sec. 2 Adding language "in the school district" is clarify the probationary teacher in the same district. This question was put before the supreme court during the last interim and they ruled that legislative intent was that the 2 years were in the same school district, this just clarifies century code to match intent and court ruling.

Sec. 3 came at the request of the North Dakota School Board Association to make sure that the definition of Weapon is consistent though out Century Code.

Sec. 4 0. On page 5 line 26 allows for total on time funding by accelerating the on time weighting factor to 1.0 in 2023-24; this was scheduled to be phased in by 2025-26 by raising the factor by a .1 The cost of this is \$5.3 million.

Section 6 deals with a bill we heard earlier for school that are closer than 19 miles. This language is no longer needed.

Section 7 page 9 is where we suggest a 3 x 3 increase for the next biennium with the per pupil payment to be \$10544 for 2023-24 and \$10860 for 2024-25

The strikes out language Page10 Starting line 23 through page 12 line 7 removes the requirement on transition maximum schools and moves them all on the formula at a cost of \$14.8 million.

On page 13 starting on line 6 deals with in-lieu of revenue. This change request that the in-lieu revenue would be averaged over a 5 year period to take large swings in how this money is allocated.

Starting on page 14 is a large amount of duplicated language which is necessary because of a effective date of after June 30, 2025. This duplicated language continues to page 20 line 24

Sec.8 suggests to our current school construction loan program. Under our current program, school can ask for a \$10m loan at 2% interest for school construction for 20 years. This program was started in 2015 with the intent of creating a revolving low interest loan fund that would become self-sustaining with out any additional cost to the state. This School construction loan fund has see a few changes, but has been very successful to our schools even during a period of low interest rates. The improvements in this bill intend to correct a couple of issue that still remain. One of the biggest complaints is that \$10 million was not much help to our larger school that projects are costing much higher levels than \$10 million. So the amendment on page 21 creates a two tiered system for smaller schools projects costing less than \$75 million could apply for a \$10 million loan and projects over \$75 million, schools could apply for a \$50 million low interest loan.

Sec 9 suggests a study of school transportation services funding

Sec 10 requests \$1,000,000,000 of general funding and in sec 11 \$1,000,000,000 of turn back uulars implementing The Science of Reading we implemented from last session.

Sec. 12 provides an infusion of \$75 million to the construction loan program which provides a good start to creating a two tiered program that should provide property tax relief to school construction and moves us along to getting a self-sustaining revolving loan fund.

SB 2284 House Education | March 13, 2023 **Testimony of Alexis Baxley**

Good morning, Chairman Heinert, and members of the House Education Committee. My name is Alexis Baxley, and I serve as the executive director of the North Dakota School Boards Association. NDSBA represents the elected school boards of all 170 public school districts and several special education units in North Dakota.

The North Dakota School Boards Association stands in support of SB 2284. I will walk my testimony through the bill section by section in an attempt to be clear and succinct.

NDSBA is supportive of the changes to the state board of public school education composition in Section 1. We believe it is incredibly important to maintain a base level of school board and educator experience on the board due to the increased work load and educational focus of the board. While the board's work used to be largely annexations, we have added a significant number of duties and oversight authority to the board in recent sessions. The board benefits greatly from having experienced board members and administrators among its membership when completing these duties. Additionally, adding the option of the designee to the committee will provide our organizations with some appreciated flexibility. Limiting the list to three names will ensure the committee forwards only the most qualified candidates to the Governor for consideration and that only those names forwarded will be considered.

The clarifying language regarding probationary teachers in Section 2 is appreciated and ensures that legislative intent is clear. The intent of this chapter was challenged before the ND Supreme Court over the past biennium, so the addition of this language will help mirror the ruling of the court as well.

Section 3 includes the definition of a dangerous weapon according the NDCC § 62.1-01-01. NDSBA asked that dangerous weapon be defined in chapter 15.1 in order to provide clarity to school districts who are tasked with disciplining students who bring weapons to school. Currently, that section of code requires that school districts adopt a policy governing the possession of dangerous weapons and firearms on school property or at school functions. I think we are all pretty clear as to what a firearm is, but what a weapon is according to this section has been less clear. The bill as written uses North Dakota's definition, but I would like to respectfully request that the committee consider amending the bill to use the federal definition provided in 18 USC § 930. I have included in my online testimony the proposed amendment. The federal definition reads as follows:

"...a weapon, device, instrument, material, or substance, animate or inanimate, that is used for, or is readily capable of, causing death or serious bodily injury, except that such term does not include a pocket knife with a blade of less than 2½ inches in length."

The biggest difference between the two definitions is two and a half inches of knife blade. Currently, students under IDEA who bring a weapon to school would be subject to the federal definition. Aligning the definition in this section of code to the federal definition provides clarity to districts no matter which students are involved.

If you are looking at the provided amendment, you have likely more changes than the definition. In subsection 2 of NDCC § 15.1-19-10 we are asking that current language be clarified to state that the policy of school district must include that suspension and expulsion MAY be a punishment for possession of a dangerous weapon. Federal law requires that an expulsion of one year occur as a result of a student possessing a firearm. It does not have the same requirement for a dangerous weapon. This change would codify what is currently happening in school districts. Current law is unclear as to whether the policy must include suspension and expulsion OR that the *punishment* must be suspension or expulsion. This becomes problematic when students, usually quite young, innocently bring the cool pocket knife gifted to them by grandpa to school for example. Administrators and school boards know that expulsion in these scenarios is overkill and detrimental to the student. Most of they time they use good judgement and allow the student to stay, but without this amendment it isn't clear whether or not that is a legal decision. I ask that you consider this amendment and confirm what we believe the initial legislative intent to be. I have worked with Robin Lang at NDDPI to ensure that the amendment and resulting language is in compliance with the federal Gun Free Schools Act as well.

Next, NDSBA is supportive of the increased per pupil payment and continued commitment to ontime funding in Sections 4, 5, 6, and 7. The per pupil payment in this bill is a great starting point to ensure our districts are able to continue to serve their students over the next biennium despite record inflation.

We are also supportive in the increased maximum school construction loan in Section 8 and the transfer in section 12. These dollars are a great investment in the future of North Dakota.

Finally, the transportation study included in Section 9 will provide valuable insight regarding school transportation funding as we look to continue to serve students across North Dakota.

I respectfully ask that the committee give SB 2284 a do-pass recommendation and consider the amendment provided. I would be happy to stand for any questions.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Subsection 6 of section 15.1-19-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

- 2. The policy must:
 - a. prohibit the possession of a <u>dangerous</u> weapon or a firearm by a student on school property and at school functions and provide for the punishment of any student found to be in violation. Punishment must include immediate suspension from school and expulsion.
 - b. require aA student who possesses a firearm in violation of this section must be expelled for at least one year.
 - <u>c.</u> The school district firearms policy must authorize the school district superintendent or the school principal, if the school district does not have a superintendent, to modify an expulsion for firearms possession under this section on a case-by-case basis in accordance with criteria established by the board. Before expelling a student, a school board or its designated hearing officer, within ten days of the student's suspension, shall provide the student with a hearing at which time the school board or its designated hearing officer shall take testimony and consider evidence, including the existence of mitigating circumstances. If a designated hearing officer orders that a student be expelled, the student may seek a review of the decision by the school board, based on the record of the expulsion hearing.
 - d. Include referral to criminal justice or juvenile delinquency system for students who posess a firearm in violation of this section.
- 3. If a school district expels a student under this section, the district may authorize the provision of educational services to the student in an alternative setting.
- 4. Actions under this section may not conflict with state special education laws or with the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act [Pub. L. 91-230; 84 Stat. 121; 20 U.S.C. 1400 et seq.].
- 5. This section does not apply to any student participating in a school-sponsored shooting sport, provided the student informs the school principal of the student's participation and the student complies with all requirements set by the principal regarding the safe handling and storage of the firearm.
- 6. For purposes of this section:
 - a. "Firearm" has the meaning provided in Public Law No. 90-351 [82 Stat. 197; 18 U.S.C. 921].
 - "School property" includes all land within the perimeter of the school site and all school buildings, structures, facilities, and school vehicles, whether owned or leased by a school district, and the site of any school-sponsored event or activity.
 - c. "Dangerous Wweapon" includes any switchblade or gravity knife, machete, scimitar, stiletto, sword, dagger, or knife with a blade of five inches [12.7 centimeters] or more; any throwing star, nunchaku, or other martial arts weapon; any billy, blackjack, sap, bludgeon, cudgel, metal knuckles, or sand club; any slungshot; any bow and arrow, crossbow, or spear; any weapon that will expel, or is readily capable of expelling, a projectile by the action of a spring, compressed air, or compressed gas, including any such weapon, loaded or unloaded, commonly referred to as a BB gun, air rifle, or CO2 gun; and any projector of a bomb or any object containing or capable of producing and emitting any noxious liquid, gas, or substance. The term does not include a spray or aerosol containing CS, also known as ortho-chlorobenzamalonitrile; CN, also known as alphachloroacetophenone; or other irritating agent intended for use in the defense of an individual, nor does the term include a device that uses voltage for the defense of an individual, unless the device uses a projectile and voltage or the device uses a projectile and may be used to

apply multiple applications of voltage during a single incident, then the term includes the device for an individual who is prohibited from possessing a firearm under this title. <u>has the meaning</u> provided in 18 U.S.C 930.

Chairman Heinert and members of the House Education Committee, for the record my name is Bob Marthaller, representing North Dakota United.

Chairman Heinert, North Dakota United is pleased to provide testimony in general support of SB 2284, and we wish to thank you and Senator Schaible as well as Senator Elkin and Representative Nathe for your leadership and efforts to provide quality educational opportunity for North Dakota students. The members and leadership of North Dakota United, also want to thank you for your support and efforts to provide adequate and equitable financial resources to public schools and school districts. Your efforts have made it possible for school boards, administrators, teachers, and many other school staff to continue working to provide the best possible education system for North Dakota students.

Chairman Heinert and members of the committee, North Dakota United believes that North Dakota teachers are among the best in the nation. Along with parental and community support and involvement, we believe our education system and quality instruction provided by North Dakota teachers, will have our students choice ready and graduate ready to pursue additional formal education or training, enter the military, or become a part of the state workforce.

We also recognize the work is not complete and there is much left to be done. Education is a continuous process and for our students to be prepared to pursue multiple opportunities, adequate and equitable resources must be made available. Services such as career counseling, special education related resources and supports for students with learning challenges, mental health and other student supports, resources for critical infrastructure such as technology and safe and functional facilities must be supported and expanded.

Teachers and school support staff are critical to the mission, and we must do the best that we can to support them, including providing a competitive compensation and benefit package. To this end, North Dakota United requests that the State of North Dakota provide financial resources to local school districts at the highest extent possible.

That's why North Dakota United wishes to propose a significant increase in funding for public school districts, increases in funding that local school boards can manage at the local level in support of education in their communities.

SB 2284, (version .03000) sets the state rate at \$10,544 per weighted student units for the 2023-24 school year and \$10,860 for the 2024-25 school year.

Chairman Heinert and members of the committee, North Dakota United respectfully asks that the rate for the 2023-24 school year be set at \$11,056 per weighted student unit and for the 2024-25 school year, the rate be set at \$11,940. These rates represent about an 8% increase for each year of the biennium and, with the help of the professional staff at the Department of Public Instruction, North Dakota United estimates the additional cost for the biennium to be approximately \$346 million.

At North Dakota United we recognize this is a huge number for the House Education Committee to consider. However, North Dakota United believes this number is attainable and we hope for your serious consideration as SB 2284 moves forward for further debate and deliberation.

I will walk through each section, and if you would like, I can take questions after each section and/or after my presentation.

Sec. 1 suggest that members of the State Board of Public Education selected by legislative districts rather than counties would provide better representation with more even population than with counties for it has been difficult to find people that wanted to serve on the board. The clarification that is offer in subsection 3. Pg 2 is what has been in practice for years until lately so it may be good to clarify the intentions of how members are appointed. Line 17-19 also indicates that two members must be working administrators. This clarification came for issues that have recently took place because of issues for CTE centers and projects with CARES and ESSER moneys that were made available during the last session and special session.

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COMMITTEES:

Appropriations

Sec. 4 and 5 Deals with on-time funding.

On page 5 line 26 allows for total on time funding by accelerating the on time weighting factor to 1.0 in 2023-24; this was scheduled to be phased in by 2025-26 by raising the factor by a .1 The cost of this is \$5.3 million. Section 5 explains how a school will pay back for student that were paid for but not in the school district at the end of the school year.

Section 6 deals two or more schools that consolidated and if they are so many miles apart, they could use the size weighted factor of their original numbers that would produce more money for the district. The strike out language set that distance of 19 miles or more. This has been addressed in other bills and is no longer needed.

The first thing I would like to mention about Section 7 that there is 6 pages of duplicate language that start on page7 line 3 through page 13 line 26, and page 13 line 27 through page 20 line 13. This duplicate language is necessary because of details that are required with the different dates. The first language is for code effective through June 30, 2025, and the second set of language effective after June 30,2025.

Section 7 starting on page 9 is where we suggest a 3% x 3% increase for the next biennium per pupil payment to be \$10544 for 2023-24 and \$10860 for 2024-25.

The strikes out language Page10 Starting line 23 through page 12 line 7 removes the requirement on transition maximum schools and moves them all on the formula at a cost of \$14.8 million.

Sec 10 requests \$1,000,000 of general funding and in sec 11 \$1,000,000 of turn back dollars implementing The Science of Reading we implemented from last session.

Sec. 12 provides an infusion of \$75 million to the construction loan program which provides a good start to creating a two tiered program that should provide property tax relief to school construction and moves us along to getting a self-sustaining revolving loan fund.

Chairman Heinert and members of the house education committee. My name is Mike McHugh and I reside in rural Morton County. I have been active in education for 20 years including 12 years in the classroom as a Career and Technical Education Teacher. I have also had the pleasure of serving on a variety of groups impacting education including Superintendent Baesler's family engagement cabinet, the ESSA committee and as of last year a member of the State Board of Public School Education and the State Board of Career and Technical Education. I am here today in opposition to section 1 of Senate Bill 2284.

This section of the bill appears to be a solution looking for a problem.

The structure of this board has been in place for a number of years without issue. When the appointment process was created in century code, it is clear that the framers found it valuable to include geographic representation, ensuring that the appointee is familiar with issues in the given set of counties close to where they live. This is different than many other state boards, which look first at other criteria. The largest issue with adding a requirement of having two members being employed by a ND School district and active members of the ND association of school administrators, in addition to two members being school board members on this six person board is that four of the six members would have a geographic criteria and an additional criteria. Since two seats are appointed by the governor every two years, it would make it impossible for an at large member to serve on this board if they happen to reside in at least two geographic areas. As those seats are reappointed this could continue perpetually in those areas. I also suggest that individuals such as retired superintendents may be at a minimum, equally qualified to fulfill these duties but would not be eligible if a seat is needing someone who is currently employed. While it is true that historically school administrators have had ample representation on the board, and I would anticipate this to be true in the future, codifying this along with the requirements of geography present a great challenge for the governor in making appointments and individuals seeking a position on the board. I appreciate input from a variety of stakeholders and find our current process nimble and this section creates a burden on the process.

Additionally, I don't believe that changing the appointment of individuals from counties to legislative districts solves any problems but does change the natural flow that we have for many issues in education which originate at the county level.

Finally, as you have heard, the State Board of Public School Education and the State Board of Career and Technical Education have been tasked with a number of additional duties in recent years. While it is important to have the perspective of administrators when making decisions, it is also important to have the perspective of individuals that are in industry. This is especially important on the State Board for Career and Technical Education.

This section has several issues. I will again mention that I have no objection to this bill if section 1 is to be removed. Thank you for your time and I stand for any questions.

Chairman Heinert and members of the House Education Committee.

My name is Kirsten Baesler. I am the North Dakota Superintendent of Public Instruction, and I am here to speak in support of SB 2284 with one amendment related to Section 1.

The State Superintendent is the Executive Director & Secretary for the State Board of Public School Education and is directed by the ND Legislature to carry out NDCC Chapter 15.1-01 – State Board of Public School Education.

The State Board of Public School Education's most significant work is working with <u>county</u> superintendents and the recommendations coming from <u>county</u> committees appointed by county commissioners and county superintendents, mostly related to property annexations, school reorganizations, and school consolidations.

At first blush, it may seem harmless to change the boundary designations from **county jurisdictions** to **legislative districts**, but as you can see, there is a clear through-line that exists from **county** jurisdictions to the State Board of Public School Education.

After visiting with the Association of Counties, it is important they be involved in this work before any changes are made to this section of NDCC to ensure their members' interests are represented.

It may also appear to be a good idea to have local superintendents on the State Board of Public School Education, ...but it may not be.

County Commissioners do not appoint local school superintendents to sit on their County Annexation Committees, and they may have a good reason. Or they may not. But no one has asked them. Requiring that a certain number of members of the State Board of Public School Education be members of the North Dakota Council of Education Leaders Association of School Administrators drastically reduces the number of eligible applicants to this board, reducing the selection pool of applicants from a minimum of 17,000 qualified electors from each jurisdiction to approximately 28.

As the Executive Director & Secretary of the State Board of Public School Education, who is tasked by the legislature to "*call meetings* [of the State Board of Public School Education] as necessary, carry out the policies of the board, and employ personnel necessary to perform the board's duties." I, too, need to be involved with the critical discussion and work of making any changes to the jurisdictional boundaries and the composition requirements of the board members.

Prior to the filing of SB 2284, I was not aware this change was being proposed to the 68th Assembly to consider.

The need to involve more stakeholders in this important and significant work is evident. I respectfully request that SB 2284 be amended.

Mr. Chairman, an official amendment has been drafted, and I will look to you to determine the appropriate time to address removing the existing language in Section 1 and replace it with the following:

SECTION 9. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - STATE BOARD OF PUBLIC SCHOOL EDUCATION. During the 2023-24 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the historical and current composition and geographical distribution of the state board of public school education and county education committees. The study must include the composition and geographical distribution of education boards in other states. The study must include input from state, county, and local stakeholders. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations to the sixty-ninth legislative assembly."

Testimony - SB2284

Presented by Scott Davis, representing Belcourt School District #7, Ft. Yates Public School District, New Town Public School District

Greetings Rep. Heinert and members of the Committee,

My name is Scott Davis. I am the former Executive Director of the ND Indian Affairs Commission, a post I held for 12 years. I know represent Belcourt School District #7, Ft. Yates Public School District, New Town Public School District.

I am here today in support of SB 2284 in that this Bill will provide adequate funding for North Dakota school districts which include North Dakota public schools on Tribal Reservations.

This Bill reminds me an extension of what was done during the 2013 Legislative Session. Then, Governor Dalrymple in unison with the Legislative Body, passed a substantial property tax bill that aided local political subdivisions and school districts that included schools on Tribal Reservations.

What was added to that Bill at the time was to carve out a school funding formula for schools that have no or very limited tax base. The schools that we are addressing today exist on our Air Bases in Minot and Grand Forks, they also include schools in Belcourt, Ft. Totten, Ft. Yates and within the MHA Nation.

The intent of that Bill formula at that time was to get those schools on Formula. Since then, we've had a few budget shortfalls due to falling Oil prices, commodity prices and pandemic. So today, many of the schools are not there yet.

We believe with your support that SB 2284 will get our schools back on track to full Formula and maintain current baseline funding rates and to continue to increase the (transition) maximum percentage in the coming years.

Over the last 10 plus years we recognize that Tribal Nations and you as State leaders have shown great progress in partnership and understandings within your Committees, DPI and the Governor's. We value those meetings, face to face talks, questions and answers as we work together in helping all North Dakotans and Tribal Citizens in obtaining an adequate education.

Our team would be happy to sit down with Committee members as we move this Bill forward.

SB 2284 increases the school district Integrated Formula Payment and provides a \$75 million appropriation for the school construction revolving loan fund.

Sections 5 and 6 accelerate the on-time weighting factor to 1.0 in 2023-24; this was scheduled to be phased in by 2025-26. The fiscal impact of this section is \$5.3 million.

Section 8 moves all transition maximum school districts onto the funding formula. The cost for this change is \$14.8 million. Section 8 gives a 3% increase yearly of the biennium to the per pupil payment rate. The new rates would be \$10,544 and \$10,860 for 2023-24 and 2024-25. The cost of this change is \$119.9 million.

Section 9 increases the maximum loan amount under the school construction revolving loan fund from \$10 million to \$50 million for projects over \$75 million.

There is an increase to the fiscal impact on SB 2328 of \$380,000. SB 2328 generates additional student units for districts that operate 2 plants at least 14 miles apart. These additional students would also receive the 3% and 3% increase in SB 2284.



BND administers 23 programs and \$904 million in assets for the Legislature



- BND currently administers programs that serve a wide range of purposes, including school construction, water projects, general and medical infrastructure, and disaster recovery.
- *Infrastructure Revolving Fund includes \$52 million to be transferred from BND's capital.
- ** HB 1187 created The Rebuilders Permanent Loan Fund (RPLF) during the 67th Legislative Session. This permanent revolving loan fund was established by transferring \$50 million in loans and cash from the Small Employer Loan Fund (SELF) created by BND during the Covid 19 pandemic to the RPLF.
- ***The Water Infrastructure Revolving Loan Fund was created by HB 1431. The Fund combined previously reported Community Water and State Water – Revolving Loan Fund.

2015 Legislative Session

- Legislature made a decision to offer a low interest revolving loan fund for schools

 - f. Develop a policy and procedures for a school district formed by the reorganization process under chapter 15.1-12 to revert to the individual school districts. For a reorganized school district to be eligible for the reversion process, the reorganized school district must have been formed by school districts located in two or more communities, including a rural community, and may not have been formed by school districts that were located in the same city or town. The board shall develop the policy and procedures on or before January 1, 2024.
- 2. The state board of public school education may adopt rules in accordance with chapter 28-32."

The governor appoints board members to six-year terms. State law requires the presidents of North Dakota United, the North Dakota School Boards Association and the North Dakota Council of Educational Leaders to submit lists of names for openings.

On Wednesday, the presidents agreed to forward the names of eight candidates to the governor to represent Burleigh, Eddy, Foster, Kidder, McLean, Sheridan, Stutsman and Wells counties. The governor will choose a person from among those candidates to represent that group of counties. The candidates are:

Kenneth Aune, Jamestown, band director at Jamestown Middle School; Rick Diegel, Steele, the superintendent of Kidder County public schools; Donald Emch, Bismarck, a retired schoolteacher and administrator; Burdell Johnson, Tuttle, a farmer/rancher and business owner; Andrew Jordan, Bismarck, the superintendent of Wilton public schools; Nick Klemisch, Garrison, the superintendent of Garrison public schools; Marsha Lembke, Bismarck, a retired former administrator for the North Dakota Department of Transportation; and Jason Pohr, Jamestown, a senior crop insurance specialist for AcCountry Form Condit Semicore

Jason Rohr, Jamestown, a senior crop insurance specialist for AgCountry Farm Credit Services.

One candidate, incumbent board member **Sonia Meehl**, of Oakes, applied for a second term. Her name was forwarded to the governor to represent Dickey, Emmons, LaMoure, Logan, McIntosh, Ransom, Richland, and Sargent counties.

Baesler is a member of the Board of Public School Education and serves as its executive secretary. Its remaining six members represent groups of counties, which are listed in state law (NDCC 15.1-01-01(1)).

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Baesler Announces Opportunity for Public Service in Education

BISMARCK, N.D., June 3, 2020 – State School Superintendent Kirsten Baesler on Wednesday invited applications for two openings on the <u>Board of Public School Education</u>. The board facilitates cooperation among the state's various K-12 education organizations, and oversees North Dakota career and technical education programs.

Baesler is executive secretary of the board and is responsible for its administration. The board has seven members, including Baesler and six members that represent groups of counties. The groups are listed in state law (NDCC 15.1-01-01(1)).

Applicants are being sought to represent two groups of counties. The person must be an eligible voter and live in one of the counties in the group. The groups are:

- 1. Burleigh, Eddy, Foster, Kidder, McLean, Sheridan, Stutsman or Wells counties (NDCC 15.1-01-01(1)(d); and
- Dickey, Emmons, LaMoure, Logan, McIntosh, Ransom, Richland, or Sargent counties (NDCC 15.1-01-01(1)(c).

The application deadline for the two openings is 5 p.m. Tuesday, June 30. <u>The one-page application form</u> is posted on the Department of Public Instruction's website here: https://www.nd.gov/dpi/sites/www/files/documents/SFN%20Forms/SFN%2061841.pdf

Applications should be sent to <u>dpi@nd.gov</u> at the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction. Applications may also be mailed to the Department of Public Instruction, 600 E. Boulevard Ave., Dept. 201, Bismarck, N.D., 58505.

"This is an opportunity for a North Dakotan who is interested in K-12 education to do important public service work that will benefit education," Baesler said.

Members of the Board of Public School Education are appointed by the governor and serve six-year terms. They meet on the third Monday of each month, except when the board has no pending business. Members are paid \$62.50 per day, plus expenses, for meetings and for performing duties as directed by the board.

The board oversees North Dakota's <u>seven regional education associations</u>, which provide professional development and learning opportunities for teachers, and the operations of the <u>K-12 Education</u> <u>Coordination Council</u>, which reviews North Dakota education services and programs and identifies opportunities for efficiency and collaboration.

Board members automatically become part of the <u>Board of Career and Technical Education</u>, which oversees North Dakota's state CTE department and CTE programs.

The Board of Public School Education also acts on requests from school districts to dissolve, reorganize, or transfer property between each other. In addition, its members participate in an education goals and objectives meeting each year with the <u>Board of Higher Education</u>, the <u>Education Standards and Practices</u> <u>Board</u>, and the state <u>Board for Career and Technical Education</u>.







Subject: Testimony on North Dakota Education Funding Formula – SB2284 on Transition Maximum

Greetings House Education Committee Members,

My name is Duane Poitra. I am the Business Manager for the Belcourt School District. I am an enrolled member the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa. I wish to provide testimony today in relation to <u>SUPPORT</u> of SB2284 as it relates to the North Dakota Education funding formula, specifically on the "Transition Maximum" language elimination in the bill's draft language. Transition Maximum pertains to School Districts still transitioning on to actual formula since 2013; these Districts hence receive less funding than formula calculation.

Transition Maximum was established in the North Dakota Education funding formula back in the 2013 biennium as a funding formula mechanism to allow school districts that were "<u>under formula"</u>, based on actual formula calculation, to "get on formula" at a reasonable pace; which was anticipated then to be no more than 6 - 8 years.

A baseline per pupil amount was determined in the 2013 biennium for each District affected by Transition Maximum that would be multiplied by a per pupil waiting factor of 110% to which the resulting weighted baseline per pupil amount would be multiplied by the weighted average daily membership (ADM) of the District to determine a maximum District payment amount. The baseline per pupil amount changed in 2019-20.

If a district had a baseline per pupil payment rate less than the established per pupil payment rate for 2013-14, the district received a transition maximum adjustment to their formula calculation to prevent significant swings in district budgets due to a funding formula change.

The education funding formula would also determine a "normal" formula payment for Districts. The difference between the "normal" formula payment calculation and the maximum payment calculation is called the Transition Maximum Adjustment, which in the calculation is a deduction from the "normal" formula payment.

In the 2013 biennium, there were 41 Districts that were affected by Transition Maximum. The goal of a Transition Maximum Districts is to get on "normal" formula. As of the 2022-23 school year, there are 11 Transition Maximum Districts, of which 10 of the School Districts primarily serve a Native American population.

Please consider all other North Dakota school districts are either on formula or exceed the formula (transition minimum Districts). The total annual North Dakota education funding is approximately \$1 billion dollars per year. The funding needed to get these 11 school districts on formula is about \$14.8 million dollars over biennium.

I previously provided testimony during the 2021 ND Legislative Session suggesting transition maximum schools be placed on actual formula as soon as possible. I again offer testimony that the transition maximum schools get on the funding formula in the manner specified in HB2184, considering intent of the 2013 ND Legislative Session.

The 2013 Legislative Session provided a new education funding formula which essentially lowered property tax contributions used towards education in North Dakota by increasing North Dakota's contribution towards education.

However, property poor school districts with average per student imputed taxable valuations more than 80% below the State average required funding formula modification in the 2013 draft bill to realize benefit. SB2184 provides an expeditious solution for the property poor districts, currently affected by transition maximum, to finally move to normal formula payment as originally intended in 2013.

Therefore, I support SB2184 as this bill provides a means to get ALL the school districts affected by transition maximum on normal North Dakota Education funding formula as intended back in 2013.

History of ND State Board of Public School Education Membership

Summary:

The ND school administrators' association has suggested members for the Board of Public School Education since it was founded in 1955 (suggestions that, for most of that time, the governor was free to ignore). The law has NEVER required school administrator membership on the board. It HAS required that two ND school board members be members of the Board of Public School Education.

When the board was founded, its governor appointees were drawn from judicial districts. Since 1979, they have been drawn from six groups of counties. These groups have not been changed since then.

Board of Public School Education Established 1955 (S.L. 1955, Chp.132)

Members: Governor (Chairman), attorney general, superintendent of public instruction. Additional two members chosen by the North Dakota Education Association and the North Dakota School Officers' Association, currently known as the School Business Managers' Association (one each) at their annual conventions. The teacher and administrator positions are chosen for two-year terms.

Appointed board members paid \$10 for each day they worked as a board member.

1963 (S.L. 1963, Chp. 43)

Members: Superintendent of public instruction and "one qualified elector from each judicial district within the state," who are appointed by the governor and confirmed by the North Dakota Senate.

Governor to nominate members from lists of three candidates *for each position*, with each list proposed by the president of the North Dakota state's attorneys association, the president of the North Dakota school administrators association, and the president of the North Dakota school boards association.

All governor appointees are chosen for six-year terms in such a fashion so that two members' terms expire on June 30 of every even-numbered year.

Two board members required "at all times" to be members of the school boards' association.

Superintendent of public instruction required to serve as executive director and secretary of the board.

Board elects its own chairman annually.

Appointed board members' pay increased to \$15 a day.

1971 (S.L. 1971, Chp. 172)

Appointed board members' pay increased to \$30 a day.

1979 (S.L. 1979, Chp. 225)

Board members appointed from groups of counties, rather than from judicial districts. North Dakota has 53 counties. The groups of counties are the same today (NDCC 15.1-01-01). The law says the district representatives must be "from" the district.

District 1 (7): Barnes, Cass, Grand Forks, Griggs, Nelson, Steele, Traill.

District 2 (11): Benson, Bottineau, Cavalier, McHenry, Pembina, Pierce, Ramsey, Renville, Rolette, Towner, Walsh.

District 3 (8): Dickey, Emmons, LaMoure, Logan, McIntosh, Ransom, Richland, Sargent.

District 4 (8): Burleigh, Eddy, Foster, Kidder, McLean, Sheridan, Stutsman, Wells.

District 5 (6): Burke, Divide, McKenzie, Mountrail, Ward, Williams.

District 6 (13): Adams, Billings, Bowman, Dunn, Golden Valley, Grant, Hettinger, Mercer, Morton, Oliver, Sioux, Slope, Stark.

1981 (S.L. 1981, Chp. 182)

Appointed board members' pay increased to \$50 a day.

1991 (S.L. 1991, Chp. 168)

The president of the North Dakota Education Association replaces the president of the North Dakota State's Attorneys Association as a person who suggests three candidates for the governor to choose from for every open spot on the Board of Public School Education. The North Dakota School Boards Association and the North Dakota School Administrators Association remain as the other two organizations that suggest appointees. The requirement that Board of Public School Education members be confirmed by the ND state Senate is dropped.

1999 (S.L. 1999, Chp. 196)

Specifies that the appointed board members must be eligible to vote in North Dakota, and that they "must reside in one of the counties they represent." Previously, the residency requirement was implied but not explicit.

Law now says the governor must appoint new board members "from a list of three names submitted by a committee consisting of the president of the North Dakota Education Association, the president of the North Dakota Council of Educational Leaders, and the president of the North Dakota School Boards Association."


The new law incorporates the NDCEL name. It previously said the committee had to submit "three names for each position to be filled." So, if there were two vacancies, six names needed to be submitted. Now, two vacancies can be filled from a list of three names.

Appointed board members' pay increased to \$62.50 a day.

2013 (S.L. 2013, Chp. 151)

Removes the requirement that the nominating committee submit "three names" for the governor to choose from for vacancies on the board. It now says, "the governor shall appoint new board members from a list of names." The nominating committee is the same, as is the requirement that at least two board members be members of the North Dakota School Boards Association.



- The <u>Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)</u> was signed into law on December 10, 2015.
- ESSA reauthorized the 1965 Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), which was previously reauthorized as No Child Left Behind (NCLB).
- The law builds on key areas of progress and ongoing efforts to improve educational opportunities for all students in North Dakota.
- On September 1, 2017, NDDPI received official approval of the <u>North Dakota State ESSA Plan</u>.
- NDDPI staff continues to review the law and engage in deliberate stakeholder involvement through the ESSA Planning Committee which approves any accountability process revisions that don't require a full state plan amendment.

ESSA and Accountability

Purpose of Accountability

- The purpose of the ND accountability system is to provide statewide responsibility to all stakeholders to pursue the ND PK-12 Strategic vision and to do the following:
 - Provide transparency and public reporting of key performance and improvement indicators for all schools, districts, and the state;
 - Ensure all schools and districts are engaged in a process of continuous improvement;
 - Identify when and where desired results are not being achieved, prioritize which schools are most in need of support; and
 - Allocate resources and support services, increase oversight and engagement and elevate accountability for those schools most in need of support.

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


- Under ESSA, NDDPI initially identified schools as Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) for the first time in March of 2018 and the first round of Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) schools in August of 2018 based on accountability data from either the 2016-2017 school year or the 2018-2019 school year.
- In the spring of 2019, with COVID-19, ND was unable to administer the ND State Assessment (NDSA) and, therefore, run accountability.
 - At that time, any school that was identified as TSI, was "frozen", which meant that they were still considered TSI in 2020-2021.
 - Schools identified as CSI, were supposed to be in their "final" year of identification in 2020-2021.
- In the winter of 2020, the USED released a waiver to allow states to again pause accountability, due to potential
 data inconsistencies caused by the pandemic.
 - During the spring ND ESSA Implementation meeting, the committee voted to again "freeze" any TSI/CSI school for the 2021-2022 school year.
- Preliminary 2022-2023 TSI/CSI notifications occurred on August 17, 2022. The accountability review period ends on September 9, 2023.
 - NDDPI intends for this information to be finalized and available to the public next week.

- 3. Add high schools who have a less than 67% 6-year cohort grade rate.4. DPI reviews the pool and identifies

- Any school from the pool that has one or more subgroups (i.e. economically disadvantaged, children with disabilities, English Learners, and/or White, American Indian, Alaska Native, African American, Asian or Native Hawaiian, Other Pacific Islander, Hispanic or Latino) with achievement levels below the highest performing comprehensive school based on all accountability factors within the state's accountability system

TSI Exit Criteria

School is no longer underperforming based on TSI-selection criteria.

School is successful in meeting established interim goals in identified subgroups for two consecutive years and the school is exiting by making progress on its own.

Schools receiving TSI support that do not meet exit criteria after 3 consecutive years will be selected for Comprehensive Support.

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

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
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
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2022-2023 ND School Renewal Process

Every bill must be read on two separate natural days, and the readings may be by title only unless a reading at length is demanded by one-fifth of the members present.

No bill may be amended, extended, or incorporated in any other bill by reference to its title only, except in the case of definitions and procedural provisions.

The presiding officer of each house shall sign all bills passed and resolutions adopted by the legislative assembly, and the fact of signing shall be entered at once in the journal.

Every law, except as otherwise provided in this section, enacted by the legislative assembly during its eighty natural meeting days takes effect on August first after its filing with the secretary of state, or if filed on or after August first and before January first of the following year ninety days after its filing, or on a subsequent date if specified in the law unless, by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each house, the legislative assembly declares it an emergency measure and includes the declaration in the Act. Every appropriation measure for support and maintenance of state departments and institutions and every tax measure that changes tax rates enacted by the legislative assembly take effect on July first after its filing with the secretary of state or on a subsequent date if specified in the law unless, by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each house, the legislative assembly declares it an emergency measure and includes the declaration in the Act. An emergency measure takes effect upon its filing with the secretary of state or on a date specified in the measure. Every law enacted by a special session of the legislative assembly takes effect on a date specified in the Act.

The legislative assembly shall enact all laws necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this constitution. Except as otherwise provided in this constitution, no local or special laws may be enacted, nor may the legislative assembly indirectly enact special or local laws by the partial repeal of a general law but laws repealing local or special laws may be enacted.

Section 14. All sessions of the legislative assembly, including the committee of the whole and meetings of legislative committees, must be open and public.

Section 15. Members of the legislative assembly are immune from arrest during their attendance at the sessions, and in going to or returning from the sessions, except in cases of felony. Members of the legislative assembly may not be questioned in any other place for any words used in any speech or debate in legislative proceedings.

Section 16. Any amendment to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the legislative assembly, and if agreed to upon a roll call by a majority of the members elected to each house, must be submitted to the electors and if a majority of the votes cast thereon are in the affirmative, the amendment is a part of this constitution.



CHAPTER 15.1-36 SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

- 3 The superintendent of public instruction shall review loan applications based on a prioritization system that includes a review of all applications filed during the twelve-month period preceding April first and gives consideration to:
 - a. <u>New construction or remodeling projects, then refinancing callable bonds, then</u> <u>leans for inflation;</u>
 - b. Student occupancy and academic needs in the district;
 - c. The age of existing structures to be replaced or remodeled;
 - d. Building design proposals that are based on safety and vulnerability assessments;
 - e. Community support;
 - f. Cost; and
 - g. Any other criteria established by the superintendent of public instruction, after consultation with an interim committee appointed by the legislative management.
 - 5 If the superintendent of public instruction approves the loan, the Bank of North Dakota shall issue a loan from the school construction assistance revolving loan fund. For a loan made under this section:
 - a. The maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify is ten fifteen million dollars. However, if a school district's unobligated general fund balance on the preceding June thirtieth exceeds the limitation under section 15.1-27-35.3, the loan amount under this section may not exceed eighty percent of the project's cost up to a maximum loan amount of eight million dollars;
 - b. If the school construction project totals seventy-five million dollars or more, the school district may qualify for an additional ten million after all new loan applications have been considered. However, if a school district's unobligated general fund balance on the preceding June thirtieth exceeds the limitation under section 15.1-27-35.3, the loan amount under this section may not exceed eighty percent of the project's cost.
 - c. The term of the loan is twenty years, unless the board of the school district requests a shorter term in the written loan application; and
 - d. The interest rate of the loan may not exceed two percent per year.
 - e. <u>A district with a school construction loan secured on the open bond market may apply to refinance the loan when callable with the school construction assistance revolving loan fund under this subsection.</u>

New Session Law effect for the 2023-25 biennium.

School Construction Assistance Revolving Loan Fund - Bank of North Dakota School Construction Projects.

- a. <u>A district that qualifies for a loan under subdivision a, in15.1-36-08(5), which was approved for a loan of up to ten million dollars for a construction project bid after January 1, 2021, and before June 30, 2024, may apply for a loan in an amount equal to the difference between fifteen million dollars and the amount of the approved loan.</u>
- b. A district that qualifies for a loan under subdivision b, in15.1-36-08(5), which was approved for a loan of up to ten million dollars for a construction project bid after January 1, 2021, and before June 30, 2024, may apply for a loan in an amount equal to the difference between twenty-five million dollars and the amount of the approved loan.
- c. <u>A district may qualify for an additional loan, if any money remains available, under this section if the project incurred additional expenses due to unanticipated construction inflation:</u>
 - 1. The unanticipated construction inflation must have occurred for a

construction project bid after January 1, 2021, and before June 30, 2024

- 2. The maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify is five million dollars;
- 3. The minimum loan amount or which a school district may qualify is one million dollars.
- 4. The interest rate on the loan may not exceed two percent per year;
- 5. The term of the loan is twenty years, unless the board of the school district requests a shorter term in the written loan application; and
- 6. The school district may pledge revenues derived from its general fund levy authority or other sources of revenue authorized by law.
- f. <u>The Superintendent of Public Instruction must use an additional application</u> <u>deadline of August 1, 2023. Subsequent years will use the deadline established by</u> <u>the Department of Public Instruction.</u>

SECTION ____. **AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-06-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-06-04. School calendar - Length.

1. A school district shall provide for a school calendar that includes:

a. At least nine hundred sixty-two and one-half hours of instruction for elementary school students and one thousand fifty hours of instruction for middle and high school students;

b. Three holidays, as selected by the board in consultation with district teachers from the list provided for in subdivisions b through j of subsection 1 of section 15.1-06-02;

c. No more than two days for:

- (1) Parent-teacher conferences; or(2) Compensatory time for parent-teacher conferences held outside of regular school hours; and
- d. At least three days of professional development not including meals or breaks.

2. For the first three days of professional development required under subdivision d of subsection 1, a day of professional development must consist of:

a. Six hours of professional development, exclusive of meals and other breaks, conducted within a single day;

b. Six hours of cumulative professional development conducted under the auspices of a professional learning community; or

c. Two four-hour periods of professional development, exclusive of meals and other breaks, conducted over two days.

3. If because of weather or other conditions a school must cancel hours of instruction or dismiss before completing all hours of instruction for the day, the school is responsible for making up only those hours and portions of an hour between the time of cancellation or early dismissal and the conclusion of all hours of classroom instruction for the day if the dismissal will result in the school failing to meet the requirements of subdivision a of subsection 1.

<u>4.</u> A school district may satisfy the requirements of this section by providing <u>no more than</u> <u>eighteen hours for elementary and no more than twenty-one hours for high school of</u> virtual instruction pursuant to section 15.1-07-25.4 <u>if:</u>

a. All available designated storm days in the district's calendar have been used; and

b. A plan has been approved by the local school board.

4. 5. For purposes of this section, a full day of instruction at a physical school plant consists of:

a. At least five and one-half hours for kindergarten and elementary students, during which time the students are required to be in attendance for the purpose of receiving curricular instruction; and

b. At least six hours for high school students, during which time the students are required to be in attendance for the purpose of receiving curricular instruction.

5. <u>6.</u> If a school district intends to operate under a school calendar that consists of four days of instruction per week, the school district shall apply and be approved for a waiver by the superintendent of public instruction.

6. <u>7.</u> If a school district intends to provide virtual instruction, the instruction must comply with the requirements under subsection <u>4.5</u>. The attendance of students participating in virtual instruction must be verified by monitoring the student's progress on academic pacing guides developed by the school district to ensure students are in attendance and receiving sufficient curricular instruction, as defined in rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction.

SECTION ____. **AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-27-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-27-23. Weather or other conditions - Closure of schools - State aid payments to school districts.

1. The board of each school district shall establish the length of a period, day, and week in accordance with the requirements of section 15.1-06-04. If a public school or school district is closed or provides less than a full day of instruction, the public school or school district shall reschedule those hours to ensure students receive at least the minimum number of instructional hours required by subdivision a of subsection 1 of section 15.1-06-04. A school or school district may satisfy the requirements of this section by providing no more than eighteen hours for elementary and no more than twenty-one hours for high school of virtual instruction under section 15.1-06-04.

2. Any public school or school district for which the rescheduling of classes would create undue hardship may request that, for purposes of calculating state aid payments to the school district, the governor waive the rescheduling in whole or in part.

SECTION _____. **AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-07-25.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-07-25.4. Virtual learning - School district policy - Report to legislative

management and legislative assembly.

- 1. The board of a school district or governing board of a nonpublic school that operates a physical school plant may adopt a policy to allow students to engage in virtual instruction and in the case of a school district, qualify for average daily membership in the district.
- 2. <u>Virtual instruction that occurs as a result of weather or other conditions under section</u> <u>15.1-06-04:</u>
 - a. <u>May only be used if the district has no remaining designated storm days</u> available;
 - b. Is limited to eighteen hours for elementary and twenty-one hours for high school; and
 - c. Requires a plan to be approved by the local school board.
- 3. The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules governing policies under this section. A policy adopted by a school district under this section must comply with the rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction.
