



### **Major Related Legislation**

House Bill No. 1013 - Distribution of special education aid - Section 7 of Engrossed House Bill No. 1013 provides legislative intent that the special education appropriation be distributed as follows:

- 1. \$15,500,000 to reimburse school districts or special education units for excess costs incurred relating to contracts for students with disabilities (\$2,500,000 more than the amount appropriated for the 2003-05 biennium).
- 2. \$400,000 to reimburse school districts or special education units for gifted and talented programs (no change from the amount appropriated for the 2003-05 biennium).
- 3. \$36,600,000 to distribute on a per student basis pursuant to North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) Section 15.1-27-10 (\$101,305 more than the amount appropriated for the 2003-05 biennium).

House Bill No. 1013 - Payments for limited English proficient students - Section 8 of Engrossed House Bill No. 1013 provides that \$650,000 of the amount appropriated for state school aid is for payments to school districts educating limited English proficient students as provided in NDCC Section 15.1-27-12.

House Bill No. 1032 - Supplemental payments - This bill removes unrestricted federal revenue from the supplemental payment formula.

House Bill No. 1038 - Advisory commission on the No Child Left Behind Act - This bill creates a 13-member advisory commission on the No Child Left Behind Act and continues the interim No Child Left Behind Committee through the 2005-06 interim.

**House Bill No. 1154 - Per student payments** - This bill increases per student state school aid payments from \$2,623 in 2004-05 to \$2,813 in 2005-06 and \$2,912 in 2006-07.

House Bill No. 1154 - Weighting factors - This bill consolidates the school district size categories and increases the weighting factors so no factor is set below 1.0.

**House Bill No. 1154 - Teacher compensation** - This bill continues the current level of teacher compensation payments of \$1,000 for first-year teachers and \$3,000 for second-year teachers and provides that each school district shall use an amount equal to at least 70 percent of all new money received for per student payments and tuition apportionment for the purpose of increasing the compensation paid to teachers.

House Bill No. 1154 - Minimum teacher salary - This bill increases the minimum teacher salary from \$21,500 in 2004-05 to \$22,000 in 2005-06 and \$22,500 in 2006-07.

**House Bill No. 1154 - Transportation efficiency training** - Section 10 of Engrossed House Bill No. 1154 provides the department a \$30,000 general fund appropriation for contracting to provide transportation efficiency training to school district personnel.

House Bill No. 1154 - Contingent state school aid distributions - This bill provides that any state school aid funds remaining unspent at the end of the 2003-05 biennium will be distributed as follows:

- 1. The first \$600,000 for the purpose of providing reorganization bonuses pursuant to NDCC Section 15.1-12-11.1 and reorganization bonus advanced payments pursuant to NDCC Section 15.1-12-11.2.
- 2. The next \$300,000 to provide additional payments to school districts serving English language learners.
- 3. The next \$2,000,000 to provide joint powers agreement incentives as outlined in Senate Bill No. 2168.
- 4. Any remaining amount as additional per student payments.

**House Bill No. 1311 - State aid** - This bill provides a \$119,917 general fund appropriation to the department for reimbursing eligible school districts that received reduced amounts of state aid during the second year of the 2003-05 biennium because the district's general fund levy fell below 140 mills as the result of a reorganization or the dissolution of a contiguous district.

House Bill No. 1434 - No Child Left Behind accountability plan - This bill provides that the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall provide the Legislative Council a written notice of a proposed amendment to the state accountability plan required under the No Child Left Behind Act.

House Bill No. 1488 - Study of the state's elementary and secondary education system - This bill provides that the Legislative Council shall create an education congress to receive input from teachers, administrators, parents, students, local business and community leaders, representatives of higher education, representatives of the executive branch, and representatives of technology curricular to review the state's elementary and secondary education system, evaluate the effectiveness of existing programs, identify methods to increase student achievement, and prioritize the state's primary needs and goals for elementary and secondary education.

**House Bill No. 1512 - Education funding** - This bill increases sales, motor vehicle excise, financial institutions privilege, individual income, and corporate income taxes. The additional revenue is to be deposited in an education tax equity fund for distribution to school districts.

**Senate Bill No. 2168 - Joint powers agreements** - This bill provides a \$2 million general fund appropriation to the Superintendent of Public Instruction for providing funding to eligible educational associations.

Senate Bill No. 2404 - Study of education funding - This bill directs a Legislative Council study of enhanced funding for elementary and secondary education and methods by which the state's reliance on property taxes to fund elementary and secondary education could be reduced.
