UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Under suspension of the rules, Mr. La Moure gave notice of a bill to incorporate the village of Grand Forks.

Mr. Wilson asked to be relieved from re further duty upon the standing committee on elections in the case of McHench against Back. He stated that certain malicious reports had been circulated, compromising his integrity, in connection with this case, and that in justice to himself and Mr. Back, he desired to withdraw from further work in this connection. He denounced the report as utterly without foundation.

The president stated that it was not nossible to silence the voice of slander-that the only course was to go abend regardless what was spoken by envious tongues. He hoped Mr. Wilson would not insist on his proposed withdrawal.

Mr. Wilson said he must insist upon it. Mr. Wallace asked if Mr. Wilson referred to any member of the council as the authors or abettors of the reports mentioned.

Mr. Wilson said be did not.

Mr. Wallace was of the opinion that the gentleman should not perm t such reports to have an effect upon him. If it was his decided wish be (Mr. Wallace) would, out of coustesy for the gentleman, vote for his relief from the duties specified.

M. Valentine said he boped Mr. Wilson would reconsider his determination. He (Mr. Velentine) had every confidence in the integrity of Mr. Wilson, and would e him remain in the work.

M. La Moure said he knew the source these malicious reports and his knowledge of that source induced him to remark that he placed no confidence in them. He hoped Mr. Wilson would not insist on withdrawing from the committee.
