TWELFTH SESSION.

Fifteenth and Sixteenth Days.

Council.

YANKTON, D. T. Jan. 25.

The resolution was adopted and the sergeant atterms was instructed by the to president to bring the disturber of order be fore the bar of the council.

The sergeant-at arms shortly returned bringing with him H. W. White, proprietor of a music store located in a room underneath the council chamber. He was reprimanded by the president and warned to desist in future from musical indugences within hearing of the council.

On motion of Mr. La Moure a committee of three was appointed to ascertain why the council had not been provided with five hundred copies of the governors' message, in compilance with its resolution.

SAXTEENTH DAY.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Mr. Bailey, from the committee on finance reported back council bill No. 14, a bill for an act to fund the indebtedness of Minnehaha counties. The committee had considered the bill and recommended that it be passed. The bill went to its third reading and was ordered recommittee and printed.

Mr. Bailey, from the committee on finance reported council biil No. 15, a biil to extend the time for paying taxes in Minnehaha county for the year 1876, without penalty or interest, with a recommendation that it pass. The bill as amended was passed by the following vote: Ayes—Messrs, Back, Buley, Duncan, Gunderson, La Moure, Miner, Mills, Pettigrew, Potter, Valentine, Wallace: noes—Mr. President; absent and not yoting—Mr. Wilson.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

Mr. Mills, from the select committee to whom was referred council bill Nos. 4 and 5, relating respectively to the repeal of the act establishing a bureau of immigration reported a substitute for the two bills. The proposed new bill provides for the establishment of a board of immigration to con sist of a superintendent and two co amissioners, shall receive no compensation and that the superintendent shall be ex officie manager of the board. There is provided for an appropriation of \$2,000 per year to pay the expenses of an egent appointed to go to Europe to influence immigration and an appropriation of \$400 per year to pay the traveling expenses of the superinten dent his and postage, stationary and printing bills. Fred J. Cross is named in the bill as superintendent and Newton Edmunds and Jacob Max as commissioners

Mr. Miner, from the same committee, made a minority report asking that the bill reported by the inspority do not pass. On motion of Mr. Mills the bill as re-

ported by the mejority was ordered printed.

Mr. Back offered a resolution calling for a special committee to investigate the financial standing of the territory, but upon hearing that the finance committee had that matter in charge, withdrew his resolution.

Mr. Mills stated that there was a clause in the penal code in king it a misdementor to dispose of property covered by castell mortgage and that the council—had by amendment charged the offence to larceny. He thought a conference committee to act with a house committee in considering this subject should be appointed.

On motion, Messrs. Bailey and Wallace were appointed as such committee.

HOUSE BILLS, ETC.

On motion house file No. 18, an-act_attaching the county of Ransom to the county of Richland for record purp see, was read a second time and referred to the judiciary committee.

UNFINSHED BUSINESS.

Mr. Back submitted a resolution calling upon the finance committee to act in conjunction with the house committee on ways and means for the purpose of ascertaining the present financial condition of the territory, the object being to ascertain whether, or not there is any money to appropriate. The resolution was adopted.

House file No. 7, a memorial asking for the vacation of certain Indian reservat ions was taken up and passed.

Mr. Wallace gave notice of a bill to fix the time for burning prairies.

On motion of Mr. Bailey, the council went into committee of the whole on house file No. 1, sn act to provide a civil code for Dakota, Mr. Mills in the chair.

On motion the rules were suspended, and house lile No. 2, a bill for an act to establish a pend code, to which amendments had been made by the council, was brought up and the house went into committee of the whole, Mr. Coddington in the chair, for the consideration of the amendments,

After some time spent therein, the committee rose, reported, and recommended the concurrence of the house in all but one of the council smeadments, and that the speaker appoint a committee or the part of the council on the matter of disagreement of the two houses.

The recommendations were adopted, and Measrs. Beadle, Coddington and Dunham appointed a conference committee on the the part of the house.

The house then went into committee of the whole, Mr. Coddington in the chair for the consideration of the political code.

After some time spent therein, the committee srose, reported progress and asked leave to sit again.

. The house then adjourned.
