The joint committee of both houses on onment of representatives in the legislature had a long session yesterday and finally came to an agreement which is a compromise between the house bill intro-duced by Mr. Grmble and the council bill introduced by Mr. Kuykendail. The com-ing together of this committee has been long ing together of this committee has been long delayed, there being a disposition to hold off until the details of the important matter were thoroughly digested. The apportionment as finally agreed ages in the joint committee assigns to the various counties the following representation:

1st district—Union county:-one member of the council and two members of the house,

2d district-Clay, Turner and McCool counties—one member of the council and two members of the house.

3d district-Yankton county ber of the council and three members of the

4th district—Bon Homme, Charles Mix, Brule, Buffalo, Hutchinson, Armstrone, Hanson and Davison counties—one member of the council and two members of the

5th district—Lawrence county—two mem-bers of the council and four members of the

6th district—Lincoln county—one mem-ber of the council and one member of the

7th district -Minnehaha county member of the council and two members of the house,

8th district—Lake, Moody, Brookings, Deuel, Hamlin, Codington, Wood and Grant counties—one member of the council and two members of the hous

9th district-Cass, Richland, Barnes, Ransom and Foster counties—one member of the council and two members of the house. 10th district—Traill, Grand Forks, Ram-

sey and Pembina counties—one member of the council and two members of the house. 11th district—Burleigh, Kidder, Morton, Emmons, Stutsman and Stevens counties one member of the council and one membe

12th district-Pennington and Custer counties-one member of the house.

This is the agreement reached by the joint committee. It is, of course, subject to some modifications in the two bodies which the committee represents, but it is as it stands the result of many days and nights
