## DAKOTA'S LEGISLATURE.

A Complete Report of the Proceedings of the Council and the House.

Fifteenth Session-Ninth Day.

Called to order at ten o'clock by Pres dent Scobey.

Prayer by the chaplain. Roll call. Absent Messrs. Dewey, Ziebach and Washabaugh.

Reading of the journal. While the reading was in progress the

Mr. Jackson gave notice of an act to amend an act to establish the independent school district of Valley Sprin

Mr. Walsh gave notice of a bill to es to abolish the office of district attorney

Council bill No. 8 was read. This pro-vides for the repeal of section 427 of the penal code. Referred to judiciary com-mittee.

The clerk then started to read council bill No. 9, which is a bill to amend the charter of the village of Brookings.

Mr. Roberts moved that as it was reading be dispensed with and the bill be referred. Bill referred to committee

on incorporations.

Mr. Nickeus introduced a resolution that the committee on printing be instructed to ascertain the cost of printing daily, with an additional 500 copies at the end of the session. Adopted.

Mr. Jackson suggested that a fitting recognition be made of the reception tendered them by the people of Sioux Falle

Mr. Roberts thought such a recogni tion was due to the people of Sioux Falls and Vermillion, and also the rail-road company. The matter was referred to committee on arrangemen

Mr. Dewey introduced a petition of C. J. B. Harris, asking for compensation for work performed in 1873 and '74 in compiling the laws of the territory. The reason of compensation never having been made is that it is asserted that the bill, under which the work was done never became a law. The fact that it never became a law is evidenced by the fact that it does not appear upon the journal of the council. On the contrary, however, it appears on the journal of the house and was signed by the governor, on which ground it is claimed that it did become a law. The compensation asked is \$2,000 for work performed and \$1,000 for interest at the rate of ten per cent. per annum since payment has been due.

The bill of which Mr. Washabaugh gave notice in the council this morning in regard to the changing of the bounds ries of the judicial districts provides that the counties of Pratt, Stanley and Rusk, now included in the 2d district, and all all that portion of Boreman which lies south of the 46th parallel and is now par-tially in the 3d and partially in the 2d districts, shall be added to the 1st district. This would make the Missour river the eastern boundary of the 1st district, north of Pierre.

On motion of Mr. Pyatt, the house, at 11 o'clock, a. m., adjourned to 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

Session Note

C.A. Webster who was to-day appointed by Speaker Williams assistant sergeant-at arms of the house, is the city editor of the Grand Forks Herald. The press of Dakota has very properly been well cared for in the organization of the legislature. Chief Clerk Henderson, of the council is from the Grand Forks Plaindealer, Assistant Clerk Quinn of the council is from the Fargo Republican, Engrossing Clerk Malla-han is from the Elk Point Courier, As sistant Clerk Cressey of the house is from the Huron Leader and Mr. Webster makes the fifth editor on the list.

The bill of which Mr. Thomps Minnehaha, gave notice to-day will attempt to amend the license law in these particulars: An increase of the minimum sum required for a liquor licens from two hundred to five hundred dollars; an increase of the maximum sum required for a liquor license from five hundred to one thousand dollars. Mr. Thompson also proposes to make some change in the bond requirements in connection with the sale of liquor. The bill if it becomes a law is not to go into effect until January 1, 1884.

Sterling gave notice to-day of a bill to locate the Dakota blind asylum at Huron. The people of Huron are de sirous of securing this institution and are willing to do what is right in the way of grounds, &c. They argue further that Huron is on a dead level and there is no chance for the blind who come to their town to fall off from anything.

By next week the legislature will get down to business. The first ten days must necessarily be devoted to prepara-tion and to the arrangement of the work of the session. Next Friday the members will inspect the insane asylum and that will close their rambles among publie buildings.
