DAKOTA'S LEGISLATURE.

A Complete Report of the Proceedings of the Council and the House.

Fifteenth Session-Fortieth Day.

Council convened at 10 o'clock a. m., Mr. President in the chair.

Prayer by the chaplain. Roll call showed all members in their

Journal read and approved. RESOLUTION

The following resolution was offered: Resolved, That the territorial treasurer be instructed to furnish the council with a statement of delinquent taxes of the various counties due the territorial treasury during the past five years; also an approximate statement of the revenue of the territory for the next two years.

Mr. Burdick moved the resolution be adopted. Carried.

SECOND BRADING OF COUNCIL BILLS.

No. 54-providing for the taxation of the product of mines and for the appointment of a commission to control the sales and charters of mines-came up for its passage under an adverse report from the committee on mines and mining.

Mr. Rinehart made a vigorous and effective speech against the bill.

Mr. Rice moved as an amendment to the bill that the proposed commissioners be granted the right to confiscate any mine and appropriate it to their own uses whenever their financial condition was such as to require pecuniary re inforcements.

The bill then came up on its final passage and was defeated, Mr. Ellis and Mr. Speaker being excused, Mr. Van Woert voting, and all the rest present (twenty) voting in the negative.

ADJOURNMENT.

The house, at 12:15 p. m., adjourned to ten o'clock Monday morning.

Session Notes

House file 54, providing for the taxa-tion of mines on their products and for the appointment of a mining commission with unusual powers, which has been slumbering in committee for so time past, was resurrected this morning and given its quietus. Mr. Rinehart, of the Black Hills, led the opposition to the measure. Mr. Benson, who introduced the bill, was absent and it had no champion during the last moments of its ex-

The bill which Mr Phillips proposes to introduce in the house next Monday, relative to railroad taxation, will provide for a tax of four per cent on the gross earnings of a railroad line during the first five years of its operation and a tax of five per cent thereafter. The present law requires a tax of two per cent the first five years and three per cent there-Mr. Phillips will endeavor to in Mr. Washabangh has introduced tional convention for southern Dakota.
