This law places on the Attorney General Responsibility for prescribing training for private and security personnel and seeing that the training requirements are met.

"In-house" security personnel are brought under this act but are not covered by the current law. The number of such new persons covered is not known since there is no available data.

The Attorney General is given responsibility to determine if a security person should be armed, or if the person possesses any disability which would indicate that he should not be armed. This necessarily implies a psychological evaluation as well as a detailed background investigation as to propensity for violence.

The Attorney General is required to evaluate each offense the individual person has committed, the function the individual is to perform, and interrelationship of the two. The Attorney General is also to determine if the individual is sufficiently rehabilitated - however, most criminologists believe that rehabilitation is impossible to determine.

The Attorney General is also put into the I.D. business with responsibility to issue, reissue, and transfer registration cards.

Before the Attorney General can refuse to issue such a card a hearing must first be held.



This is assuming that the industry itself pays for individual training costs within the prescribed training requirements. If training is to be paid by the state, the cost of 200 hours of basic training would be approximately \$1,000 per person or an estimated cost for the biennium of \$300,000.

The estimated revenue from fees and services would be \$12,000.
