1. Please estimate the fiscal impact (in dollar amounts) of the above measure for state general or special funds, counties, and cities.

Narrative: The bill legalizes the conduct of games of chance through electronic video gaming devices. The bill places the video system under the management and control of the State Gaming Commission. The bill establishes a special video gaming operating fund; requires manufacturing standards and testing and approval of video gaming devices; and requires a computer telecommunications and management information system. The bill requires licensing of manufacturers, distributors, operators or devices, and gaming sites; requires background investigations of applicants; and assigns the actual ownership, placement, and operation of video gaming devices at gaming devices to operators, rather than licensed gaming organizations. The bill allocates adjusted gross proceeds between the gaming tax, gaming sites, operators, and gaming organizations; distributes the gaming tax to fund several state programs and the general fund; and funds a reimbursable appropriation of \$500,000 for start-up costs.

As requested, this memo conveys the fiscal effect to Senate Bill No. 2512 of the amendments adopted by the Senate Judiciary Committee on Monday, February 15, 1993. The amendments replaced the original text of Senate Bill No. 2512 with the text of House Bill No. 1213, and, the amendments made substantive changes to House Bill No. 1213 as proposed by the Sinner Administration. These changes were:

- The game of paper charitable gaming tickets 1. conducted through jar bars, rather than pull tab dispensing devices, is <u>not</u> phased out effective June 30, 1994.
- 2. The gaming tax rates on presently legalized games of chance are not doubled.
- 3. Other than at a gaming site where bingo is the primary game of chance conducted, if a licensed organization operates video gaming devices, the organization is required to first discontinue conducting all other games of chance at that This amendment would replace a gaming site's present games of chance with video gaming devices, at the organization's discretion.

These three particular amendments materially affect the fiscal effect of the original House Bill No. 1213 in relation to the proposed amendments to Senate Bill No. 2512.

If Senate Bill No. 2512 is amended as proposed, the bill legalizes the conduct of games of chance through electronic video gaming devices. The bill sets a limit on site

rental; allows gaming organizations to operate up to seven video gaming devices at licensed alcoholic beverage establishments and gaming sites where bingo is the primary game of chance; requires manufacturing standards and testing and approval of video gaming devices; and requires a computer telecommunications and management information system. Except at a site where bingo is the primary game of chance conducted, if a gaming organization operates video gaming devices at a site, the organization is prohibited from conducting other games of chance at that The bill allocates adjusted gross proceeds (gross proceeds less prizes) between gaming tax, expenses, and charitable uses; requires licensing of manufacturers, distributors, and video gaming devices; and requires background investigations of applicants. The bill provides an appropriation of \$2,000,000 and five full-time equivalent positions to the Attorney General's office.

The state and county and city fiscal effects are represented on the attached document.

The calculated fiscal effect is conservative. The positive general fund revenue is based on a projected diversion of consumer disposable income from presently legalized games of chance to video gaming devices. Only the dollars presently forecast for the North Dakota charitable gaming industry for the 1993-95 and 1995-97 bienniums were used in the compilation of the fiscal effect.
