1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact subdivision a of subsection 2 of section 15-40.1-06,

2 sections 15-40.1-07 and 15-40.1-08 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to educational

3 support per student and payment factors.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Subdivision a of subsection 2 of section 15-40.1-06 of the 6 1997 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

7 2. a. The educational support per student during the first year of the 1997-99 8 1999-2001 biennium must be one thousand nine hundred fifty four two 9 thousand one hundred twenty-nine dollars and for the second year of the 10 1997-99 1999-2001 biennium the educational support per student must be 11 two thousand thirty-two two thousand two hundred twenty-one dollars and is 12 the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on a per student basis as provided in 13 sections 15-40.1-07 and 15-40.1-08.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 15-40.1-07 of the 1997 Supplement to the North
 Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15-40.1-07. High school per student payments - Amount - Proportionate

17 payments. Payments must be made each year from state funds to each school district

18 operating a high school and to each school district contracting to educate high school students

19 in a federal school, subject to adjustment as provided in section 15-40.1-09, as follows:

- For each high school district having under seventy-five students in average daily
 membership in grades nine through twelve, the amount of money resulting from
 multiplying the factor 1.625 adjusted by sixty five eighty-five percent of the
 difference between 1.625 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of
- 24 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of

1public instruction, times the number of high school students in grades nine through2twelve registered in that school district, times the educational support per student3as provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 1998 2000, the factor is41.625 adjusted by seventy five percent of the difference between 1.625 and the5factor representing that which represents the five-year average cost of education6per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public7instruction.

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 2. For each high school district having seventy-five or more, but less than one
 9 hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve,
 10 the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.335 adjusted by
 11 sixty-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.335 and the factor
 12 representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category,
 13 as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high
 14 school students in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district,
- 15 times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06.
- Beginning July 1, 1998 <u>2000</u>, the factor is 1.335 adjusted by seventy-five percent
 of the difference between 1.335 and the factor representing that which represents
 the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined
 by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 20 3. For each high school district having one hundred fifty or more, but less than five 21 hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve, 22 the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.24 adjusted by 23 sixty five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.24 and the factor 24 representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category. 25 as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high 26 school students in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district, 27 times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. 28 Beginning July 1, 1998 2000, the factor is 1.24 adjusted by seventy five percent of 29 the difference between 1.24 and the factor representing that which represents the 30 five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by 31 the superintendent of public instruction.

13	5.	For high schools having an approved alternative education program, the amount of	
14		mon	ney resulting from multiplying the factor in:
15		a.	Subsection 1 times the number of students registered in the alternative
16			education program, times the educational support per student provided in
17			section 15-40.1-06, if the alternative education program has less than
18			seventy-five students in average daily membership.
19		b.	Subsection 2 times the number of students registered in the alternative
20			education program, times the educational support per student provided in
21			section 15-40.1-06, if the alternative education program has seventy-five or
22			more, but less than one hundred fifty students in average daily membership.
23		C.	Subsection 3 times the number of students registered in the alternative
24			education program, times the educational support per student provided in
25			section 15-40.1-06, if the alternative education program has one hundred fifty
26			or more, but less than five hundred fifty students in average daily
27			membership.
28		d.	Subsection 4 times the number of students registered in the alternative
29			education program times the educational support per student as provided in
30			section 15-40.1-06 if the alternative education program has five hundred fifty
31			or more students in average daily membership.

1 Every high school district must receive at least as much in total payments as it would have 2 received if it had the highest number of students in the next lower category. Payments may not 3 be made unless four or more units of standard high school work approved by the 4 superintendent of public instruction are offered during the current year, only certificated 5 teachers have been employed, and the other standards prescribed by this chapter have been 6 met. Payments must be made to the high school district in which the student is enrolled for 7 graduation and units of approved vocational education in accordance with the provisions of 8 chapter 15-20.1, and other courses approved by the superintendent of public instruction, 9 earned in another high school district must be included to meet the minimum four required 10 units. In the case of students enrolled in nonpublic schools for graduation or students enrolled 11 in less than four units of standard high school work who are in their fourth year of high school 12 coursework and who are enrolled in approved alternative high school curriculum programs, 13 proportionate payments must be made to the public school district in which the student is 14 enrolled for specific courses. School districts offering high school summer school programs are 15 eligible for proportionate payments provided each course offered satisfies requirements for 16 graduation, comprises at least as many clock hours as courses offered during the regular 17 school term, and complies with rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The 18 superintendent may adopt rules regarding eligibility for school districts to receive proportionate 19 payments for summer education programs. The proportionate payment made under this 20 section during the biennium for high school summer school programs may not exceed one and 21 one-half percent of the total amount appropriated by the legislative assembly for foundation aid 22 and transportation aid during the biennium.

23 SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 15-40.1-08 of the 1997 Supplement to the North
 24 Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15-40.1-08. Elementary per student payments - Amount. Payments must be made
from state funds to each school district operating an elementary school and to each school
district contracting to educate elementary students in a federal school, employing teachers
holding valid certificates or permits in accordance with section 15-47-46 and chapter 15-36,
adjusted as provided in section 15-40.1-09, as follows:

For each one-room rural school, the amount of money resulting from multiplying
 the factor 1.28 adjusted by sixty-five eighty-five percent of the difference between

1 1.28 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per 2 student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, 3 times the number of students in that school in grades one through eight in average 4 daily membership, up to a maximum of sixteen students, times the educational 5 support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. There must be paid .9 times 6 each additional student in its school in grades one through eight in average daily 7 membership times the educational support per student provided in section 8 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than twenty students in 9 average daily membership. If the one-room rural school is located in a school 10 district with another elementary school, the weighting factor for the students in 11 grades one through six must be based on the average daily membership in the 12 district in grades one through six as provided in subsections 2 through 4. If the 13 one-room rural school is located in a school district with another school that has 14 students in grade seven or eight, the weighting factor for the students in grade 15 seven or eight must be the same as that provided for in subsection 5. Beginning 16 July 1, 1998 2000, the factor is 1.28 adjusted by seventy-five percent of the 17 difference between 1.28 and that which represents the five-year average cost of 18 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of 19 public instruction.

20 2. For each elementary school in school districts having under one hundred students 21 in average daily membership in grades one through six, the amount of money 22 resulting from multiplying the factor 1.09 adjusted by sixty-five eighty-five percent 23 of the difference between 1.09 and the factor representing the five-year average 24 cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 25 superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in 26 grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom or for each 27 teacher, times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, 28 except that no payment may be made for more than twenty-five students in 29 average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning 30 July 1, 1998 2000, the factor is 1.09 adjusted by seventy-five percent of the 31 difference between 1.09 and that which represents the five-year average cost of

1 2 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

- 3 For each elementary school in school districts having one hundred or more 3. 4 students in average daily membership in grades one through six, and provided the 5 districts in which such schools are located have an average daily membership of 6 less than one thousand elementary students in grades one through six, the amount 7 of money resulting from multiplying the factor .905 adjusted by sixty-five eighty-five 8 percent of the difference between .905 and the factor representing the five-year 9 average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 10 superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in 11 grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom or for each 12 teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, 13 except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in average daily 14 membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 1998 2000, 15 the factor is .905 adjusted by seventy five percent of the difference between .905 16 and that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for 17 this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 18 4. For each elementary school in school districts having an average daily 19 membership of one thousand or more elementary students in grades one through 20 six, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor .95 adjusted by 21 sixty-five eighty-five percent of the difference between .95 and the factor 22 representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, 23 as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of 24 students in that school in grades one through six in average daily membership in 25 each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student 26 provided in section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more 27 than thirty students in average daily membership in each classroom or for each 28 teacher. Beginning July 1, 1998 2000, the factor is .95 adjusted by seventy five 29 percent of the difference between .95 and that which represents the five-year 30 average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 31 superintendent of public instruction.

1 5. For each of the above classes of elementary schools, except for one-room rural 2 schools that are not located in a district with another school having students in 3 grade seven or eight, there must be paid to each school the amount of money 4 resulting from multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted by sixty-five eighty-five percent 5 of the difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average 6 cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 7 superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in 8 grades seven and eight in average daily membership in each classroom or for 9 each teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 10 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in 11 average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning 12 July 1, 1998 <u>2000</u>, the factor is 1.01 adjusted by seventy five percent of the 13 difference between 1.01 and that which represents the five-year average cost of 14 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of 15 public instruction.

16 For each elementary school having students under the compulsory age for school 6. 17 attendance, but not less than three years of age, in a special education program 18 approved by the director of special education, the amount of money resulting from 19 multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted by sixty-five eighty-five percent of the 20 difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of 21 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of 22 public instruction, times the number of special education students in that school 23 under the compulsory age for school attendance in average daily membership in 24 each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student 25 provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 1998 2000, the factor is 1.01 26 adjusted by seventy-five percent of the difference between 1.01 and that which 27 represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as 28 determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

7. For each elementary school providing a kindergarten that is established according
to provisions of section 15-45-01, the amount of money resulting from multiplying
the factor .50 adjusted by sixty-five eighty-five percent of the difference between

1 .50 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student 2 for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times 3 the number of students in that school in average daily membership in each 4 classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student, as 5 provided under section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more 6 than twenty-five students in average daily membership in each classroom or for 7 each teacher. The full per student payment may be made only to those 8 kindergarten programs providing the equivalent of ninety full days of classroom 9 instruction during any twelve-month period. Programs providing shorter periods of 10 instruction during the same time period must receive a proportionately smaller per 11 student payment. Beginning July 1, 1998 2000, the factor is .50 adjusted by 12 seventy-five percent of the difference between .50 and that which represents the 13 five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by 14 the superintendent of public instruction. 15 The superintendent of public instruction shall make proportionate payments to each 16 public school district educating students who are also enrolled in nonpublic schools. 17 Every school district must receive at least as much in total payments for elementary 18 students as it would have received if it had the highest number of students in the next lower 19 category.
