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and identify each and every claim and be pro active about them.. These are discovered through title claims.

This bill would change the N.D.C.C. to reflect the current policy being applied by the Department on the collection of Aid to Aged, Blind, and Disabled (AABD) obligations. Benefits have not been issued under AABD since 1975. While the Department continues to collect benefits previously issued under AABD due to homestead claims, collections are sporadic and are minimal in amount. The Department did not collect accrued interest on AABD claims paid from July 1997 - present. In August 1999, an official policy change was made by the Department to discontinue collecting accrued interest on AABD claims. Based upon these factors, there would not be a fiscal impact as a result of this bill.

**TESTIMONY BEFORE THE
SENATE HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE
REGARDING HOUSE BILL NO. 1110
February 20, 2001**

Chairman Lee, members of the Senate Human Services Committee, my name is Blaine Nordwall. I am Director of the Economic Assistance Policy Division of the Department of Human Services.

The Aid to the Aged, Blind, and Disabled program was administered under repealed N.D.C.C. ch. 50-24. The program served to provide cash grants to aged, blind, and disabled persons much as the AFDC program did for dependent families. In 1975, the federal government took over operations of the program when the Supplemental Security Income program was created.

Like the Medicaid program, the Aid to the Aged, Blind, and Disabled program required states to seek recovery of benefits from the estates of deceased recipients. The department's predecessor agency, the Social Service Board of North Dakota, was also required to establish liens on recipients' property to secure the eventual recovery of benefits. Consistent with these expectations, when the 1979 Legislature repealed chapter 50-24, it required that those recovery efforts continue, and left the liens in place.

The department continues to make claims, though, after 25 years, the number of cases in which claims are made is quite small. House Bill 1110 is intended to address a problem that arises when these claims are asserted after so many years. The problem is one of accrued interest.

In many cases, the lien instruments filed are mortgages that provide for the payment of interest at rates ranging from two percent to six percent. In cases where interest is not specifically provided, N.D.C.C. § 47-14-05 requires interest at the rate of six percent per annum. While these interest rates are

modest, interest will have accrued from 25 to 65 years on these claims. Total accrued interest is usually at least one and a half times the amount of the original claim.

The department has been concerned about accrued interest for some time, and, in fact, has not collected accrued interest on any AABD claim since before July of 1997.

As the fiscal note indicates, because we already discontinued collecting interest, we don't see any fiscal impact as a result of this bill. However, because of the outstanding instruments, and because of the statutory provision for the collection of interest, the department is reluctant to rely upon mere policy in foregoing accrued interest.

The department respectfully requests the Committee afford House Bill 1110 a do pass.
