Minutes: Chairman Krebsbach opened the hearing on HB 1271 which relates to the adjutant

Brigadier General Michael J. Haugen. A copy of his written testimony is attached. Senator C. Nelson indicated that she was aware that the General had attended war college, she inquired if he knew how many of your other people currently in the guard have attended war college.

Brigadier General Haugen indicated he believed on the army side there are 5 or 6 officers who have attended war college and could be eligible for general officers. There are different requirements on the air side than on the army side. One thing that has happened, North Dakota took the lead in developing the lead on a joint headquarters. Here at Fraine Barracks we have army and air under one commander. This is a test program that has proven so successful that nationally they are looking at doing this in all of the states. Some of the larger states have a second army general office. We do not. What this bill would then do would allow us to do this because state statute would allow us to do it. Senator T. Mathern inquired in terms of

personnel management and military protocol, does it really work that the governor appoint the basically assistant to you? Wouldn't it be better if the general chose the assistant? Brigadier General Haugen indicated that he would like to go through the processes that are used for the selection. They have a selection board. The eligible candidates are notified. The board then interviews and makes a recommendation. The recommendation is forwarded to the governor and he can think of no recent time that any of those recommendations have been overturned. The final authority rests with the governor as designated by the constitution. Senator Dever inquired about how a generalship is awarded. Brigadier General Haugen explained how this title is conferred and at what levels, and the recognition levels of those appointments. Senator C. **Nelson** inquired that what this bill does basically to allow someone to work himself up the chain so that they are in a position to take the place of the Adjutant General should it become necessary. The general elaborated on this. Senator C. Nelson inquired about the necessity of attending war college and who takes the place of those who would be gone. Brigadier General Haugen elaborated further. Representative Duane DeKrey, district 14, appeared before the committee. He indicated this is an important bill and he supports the bill as well and would ask the committee to give it a Do Pass recommendation. There was nothing further Chairman Krebsbach closed the hearing on HB 1271. Senator C. Nelson made a motion fer a Do Pass on HB 1271, seconded by Senator Wardner. Roll Call Vote indicated 6 Yeas, 0 Ways, and 0 Absent or Not Voting. Senator Krebsbach will carry the bill.

### HOUSE BILL 1271

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee, good morning.

This Bill addresses the minimum qualifications to be appointed as an Assistant Adjutant General, and increases the number of Assistant Adjutants General that can be appointed by the Governor.


First, this Bill updates the appointment qualifications for Assistant Adjutants General. We consider this a housekeeping measure designed to make our state law consistent with federal general officer appointment criteria. Under our current state law, the Governor could appoint anyone who has been a member of the National Guard for five years and reached the rank of Captain. However, if the Governor were to appoint a "Captain", it would take up to nine years for this individual to achieve the rank of Brigadier General. In addition to the minimum time in grade requirements, this "Captain" would have to be promoted to Major, Lieutenant Colonel and Colonel, and complete all required military education requirements, including the two-year War College course. This scenario does not make sense to us and is inconsistent with federal general officer appointment requirements. Based on this inconsistency, we believe it is time to change our law so that it accurately reflects the federal requirements. To this end, this Bill increases the minimum rank from Captain to Lieutenant Colonel. While this will not insure immediate federal recognition as a Brigadier General, it will significantly shorten the time.

Second, this Bill allows the Governor to fill any general officer position authorized by the Federal government. Currently, all positions authorized by federal law are filled. These positions are the Assistant Adjutant General-Air, Assistant Adjutant General-Army, and the Air Headquarters Chief of Staff. In the future we anticipate an increased authorization for general officers. When this day comes, we will need the authorization under our state law to fill these positions. This Bill provides that authorization by tying the Governor's authority to appoint to a valid federal authorization.

In closing, it needs to be noted, and stressed, that this Bill does not increase the number of full-time state employees, and does not require any state funds, since all new general officer positions will be 100% federally funded.
