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2. Narrative: Identify the aspects of the measure which cause fiscal impact and include any comments relevant to your analysis.

The bill seeks to create a seed-financing fund similar to that disbursed by the Agricultural Products Utilization Commission (APUC). The ED&F director would assign the responsibilities and tasks described in this bill to either the APUC or the Development Fund board, which are both divisions of the department.

This fiscal impact statement assumes that the BPUC responsibilites would be assigned to the APUC and that the program would generate similar application volume.

The APUC currently has a single FTE and recieves limited adminstrative and clerical assitance from the ED&F.

The fiscal effect is calculated based on three factors: 1) increased travel costs and per diem requirements for commmission members to participate in granting hearings; 2) additional costs of contract or hired staff for adminstration of the fund, the applications and the grant awarded; and 3) startup cost including the propagation of rules, program design, application design, marketing and accounting.

The start-up businesses that receive assistance from this fund might eventually contribute to the increased tax collections, but it is impossible to estimate the level.

B. Expenditures: Explain the expenditure amounts. Provide detail, when appropriate, for each agency, line item, and fund affected and the number of FTE positions affected.

Travel costs: using current APUC application volume as the guide, the program might expect 16 to 22 grant applications per quarter. Assuming two-day quarterly hearings, the travel costs are estimated at \$6800, including the \$50 per diem authorized in the bill.

Additional contract or hired clerical help was calculated at \$27,000 per year. However, the APUC and ED&F have no additional FTE's available.

Program initiation cost including: legal, accounting, advertising, travel, marketing and planning costs were estimated at \$31,000.

C. Appropriations: Explain the appropriation amounts. Provide detail, when appropriate, of the effect on the biennial appropriation for each agency and fund affected and any amounts included in the executive budget. Indicate the relationship between the amounts shown for expenditures and appropriations.

The fiscal impact of this analysis assumes the continuation of the APUC with its appropriation as recommended in the executive budget. The request calls for a \$5 million appropriation with \$207,000 allocated for administration. The salary of the director is included in that administrative portion. The fiscal impact statement assumes that the director, though compensated by APUC, would oversee both programs.

If the APUC were to receive less appropriation for administration or if the BPUC is not managed with APUC, the fiscal cost of this program would be similar to APUC's administrative costs of \$207,000 plus the \$31,000 initiation costs.

#### HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS HEARING ON HB1414.

Rep. Berg: The genesis of this is that this committee spends a lot of time looking at expenses and we as a legislature need to focus a little bit on our revenue. There is no question that the revenue projections are not as rosy as they were six months ago and what we need to do is do things that will increase tax collections, so Mr. Chairman, what I have handed out here is what I perceive, let me back up. In economic development there is a lot of programs that don't do any good and there are a few programs that work, two of the programs that have worked have been the pace funding program and the apuc program. These programs are ones that the appropriations committee in 1991 when I served on the appropriations that we revamped those and I think they have been very effect the last ten years. The bill before you would take an existing program that's proven to work (apuc) and expand that program or create a program branch of that which would be (bpuc), the difference would be that (bpuc) would focus on businesses that are start ups

and if you look at the sheet that I handed out, its going to cost about all the programs and what's happening, if you look under seed financing, really there's angel investors, there's apuc, the seed fund was defeated and this bill would basically that would fill that. If you look at the engrossed bill, the intent is not to create another board or another commission, but simply roll this authority into the current apuc administration and the Department of Economic Development and Finance. The reason this bill is before this committee is an amendment was placed on it to have an appropriation of \$250,000 of general fund dollars placed in there. This bill is also set up under section 4 that it may receive private sector money or money from other entities, and so the bill as introduced did not have the appropriation on there, but would be an entity that could receive some money and then use it to invest and start up businesses. What sets apuc apart and what sets bpue apart is rather than a loan or expansion of an existing process, if you look on section 4, and page 2, line 2 through 4, it really provides a grant, so it would be a grant to do some research and development testing and marketing, typically these grants are very small, probably \$5 to \$20. thousand dollars. It is a streamlined process, its a board that takes a look at the application and makes a decision. With that support and that grant, it may determine whether that business could take the next level and expand further. That is the essence of what this bill would do, and I would be happy to answer any questions.

**Rep. Delzer:** Do you see this as being a different commission, or do you see it being the same one?

Rep. Berg: If you look in Section 3, it says that the bpcu commission shall administer. Line 21, I really look at the Director of Economic Development to assign the duties to and existing board or commission within the department. Now I'm not sure if that board would be the apuc board, it could be the development fund board, but it would be an existing board.

Rep. Delzer: The reason for my question is to make sure that they are somehow separate entities so the money doesn't flow back and forth as such so that apuc has what its supposed to do and bpuc has what its supposed to do. I'm not sure that's covered, it almost looks to me like, if you made the same commission you could move the money back and forth.

**Rep. Berg:** That wasn't my intention in the amendments that you have in the engrossed bill before you, but I—think Rep. Delzer is correct, I really envision the fire wall between apuc and boue at least from those dollars

**Rep. Wald:** I think we could have an amendment that simply says that the two funds cannot be CO-mingled which would solve that problem.

Rep. Warner: I think that most of my concerns were addressed by Rep. Delzer, I commend Rep. Berg for bringing this forth, I think this is a very good plan, but I hope would hope that the two sides would be kept separate.

Rep. Timm: Would anyone mind, Rep. Berg, if we amended that bill?

Rep. Byerly: I would suspect that the would not make the apuc board be the overseer of the bpuc board, because they don't have anything in common. The board for apuc is made up of people related to agriculture, and it would make very little sense to put those people in charge of this fund.

Rep. Berg: The way I would see this interfacing, is from an administration standpoint apue here is our application, here's the process, and from the granting standpoint it maybe the development board in the regular meeting would have someone come and apply for a grant.

**Rep. Carlisle:** The ED&F budget, my understanding, how they have substantial increases in it. this would be an addition to that?

**Rep. Gulleson:** The apuc commission and the projects are self funded through the gas tax refund, and as I understand it they don't receive any general fund dollars. Did you look at a source of funding for the bpuc out of revenues derived from economic development projects that we have ongoing or anything like that?

Rep. Berg: We looked at that, and first of all I would like to make a comment. Apuc is funded in part by the gas tax refund, but there is also general fund dollars in there. Again there is no gas refund for businesses, so we weren't able to look at a gas tax refund. There certainly are things that the state does, commercial loans, etc., that could be used to tap into this, but in the general sense these are dollars that will hopefully come back as more general fund revenue.

**Rep. Glassheim:** You would have to pre grant money to be given out that would have to be raised from private sources, is that the thought, or is the \$250,000 involved with the grant program?

**Rep. Berg:** The \$250,000 of general fund would be in the grant program, there also able to go out raise and receive private dollars that would go to the grant program.

Rep. Koppleman: In the beginning of the bill it talks about entrepreneurial start up projects generically, but as you get into the bill and by the name, as a business products utilization commission, it implies to me that were taking strictly about products or are you talking about services as well?

Rep. Berg: I would really look at primary sector type of businesses and those are generally a product that someone is bringing to the marketplace, now it maybe software it may be actual property, but I think it would be rather than a real estate company or accounting firm or something like that.

Rep. Timm: Any other questions of Rep. Berg? Any other testimony in support of HB1414?

#### Minutes:

The committee was called to order, and opened committee work on HB 1414.

Rep. Skarphol: This amendment 0201 handed out does, puts up a fire wall between APUC (agriculture products utilization commission) and BPUC (business products utilization commission) if it were to be implemented. Moves to adopt the amendment. Rep. Carlisle seconded.

Rep. Skarphol: It creates a firewall between APUC and BPUC so that there would not be any intermingling or commingling of funds of jobs. This is to create an entirely separate program.

Rep. Wald: Can you tell what it means by "establish mutual fund capital pools"?

Rep. Berg: The existing language talks about a pool for APUC. The intention in the amendment is to follow the existing language, and make it clear that there would be two separate pools, and those pools would not flow out of one and into the other.

Rep. Wald: These mutual funds are not bought from a securities broker. Isn't that misleading?

Rep. Berg: If you look at the engrossed bill, in the current Century Code, it refers to the APUC may establish a mutual fund capital pool. This amendment uses the same terminology.

Rep. Glassheim: The pool has no money appropriated to it?

Rep. Skarphol: The bill in section 7 has a funding of 250,000 to get it off the ground, and may be amended lower.

Voice vote adopted amendment. Motion passes.

Rep. Carlisle: Moves to further amend on line 21, page 2, to change the amount to \$125,000. Rep. Delzer seconded.

Rep. Glassheim: Commends Rep. Berg for putting this bill forward, and reminds the committee that he has been trying to put money into development all session. This is a surviving vehicle for this. Support the bill and oppose the amendment, they need something to work with. Voice vote adopted the amendment. Motion passes.

Rep. Aarsyold: Has a concern on how the commission is established, and appointed. Are these persons compensated employees, or are they appointed citizens.

Rep. Berg: The intent is not to create a separate commission and board and all else. It really is to allow ED& F to look at one of their existing boards. The appropriate board may be the development fund board. The board is probably a citizens board, compensated per diem.

Chairman Timm: On page 1 of the engrossed bill, line 21 and 22, does that state that?

Rep. Berg: Yes. And section 6 talks about reimbursement. The administration is probably APUC for now.

Rep. Carlisle: Moves DO PASS AS AMENDED. Seconded by Rep. Thoreson.

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#### Minutes:

The meeting was called to order. All committee members present. Hearing was opened on HB 1414 relating to the powers of the business products utilization commission.

Representative Dave Weller, District 30, cosponsor. Distributed "stage definitions" sheet and "Funding programs available to businesses according to their development stage" chart. The early stage financing is where we are now. What we are trying to do is to get BPUC going. I ask you to give this bill your favorable consideration.

Representative Rick Berg, District 45, cosponsor. There are two programs that have been effective: APUC and BPUC. The way APUC works is as a granting process: someone has an idea and needs a little seed money for marketing, to set up business from a legal standpoint, to get a prototype manufactured, etc... There is really a broad range of things that someone could come to APUC for. I am using APUC as an example because it parallels BPUC with a couple of exceptions. This is for the initial seed capital. APUC: request for initial seed capital, Board

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decides if they are worthy of money. This is a quick easy way to help, this is where we need to go in economic development. The difference between APUC and BPUC will be that this bill will not create a separate board. The Board on page 2, lines 3 and 4: appropriate place would be within the development fund, whose board would be the granting organization. Page 2, lines 8 and 9 say what the grants would be for. The other important thing is that we have set up a fire wall between this and APUC, page 1 lines 22 and 23 sums it up, no intent to remove funds from APUC but to take something that works in agriculture and apply it to business and commerce. Appropriation is small, the intent is, if commerce bill changes our structure, BPUC would receive grants from the foundation to help more start up businesses. There is nothing in our state economic development, finance or commerce that gives this initial small startup seed capital. Intent is not to create additional bureaucyacy.

Senator Mutch: Where is the money coming from?

R Berg: It would be general fund appropriation. If the commerce bill passes, the foundation would raise private sector dollars. The process APUC is using can be modified and adapted to BPUC.

Dean Reese, CEO, ND Development Corp. In favor. There is a need for this type of program, it will be workable within the development fund.

Senator Espegard: How much money is there in APUC and how successful has it been?

Lance Gaebe, Executive Director APUC. In grants less than a million dollars per year. This year we have 70 different grants. Last time we did an economic analysis a million dollar investment returned 260 million through jobs and so forth, that was in 95°.

No opposing testimony. Hearing closed.

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### Stage Definitions

#### EARLY STAGE FINANCING

#### Seed Financing:

This stage is a relatively small amount of capital provided to an inventor or entrepreneur to prove a concept and to qualify for start-up capital. This may involve product development and market research as well as building a management team and developing a business plan, if the initial steps are successful.

#### Start-Up Financing:

This stage provides financing to companies completing development and initial marketing. Companies may be in the process of organizing or they may already be in business for one year or less, but have not sold their products commercially. Usually such firms will have made market studies, assembled the key management, developed a business plan, and are ready to do business.

#### First-Stage Financing

This stage provides financing to companies that have expended their initial capital, often in developing and market testing a prototype, and require funds to initiate full-scale manufacturing and sales.

#### **EXPANSION FINANCING**

#### Second-Stage Financing

This stage is working capital for the initial expansion of a company that is producing and shipping, and has growing accounts receivables and inventories. Although the company has made progress, it may not yet be showing a profit.

#### Third-Stage Financing

This stage provides major expansion of a company whose sales volume is increasing and that is breaking even or profitable. These funds are used for further plant expansion, marketing, working capital, or development of an improved product.

#### LATER STAGE FINANCING

#### Bridge Financing

This stage is needed at times when a company plans to go public within six months to a year. Often bridge financing is structured so that it can be repaid from the proceeds of a public underwriting. It can also involve restructuring of major stockholder positions through secondary transactions. Restructuring is undertaken if there are early investors who want to reduce or liquidate their positions, or if management has changed and the stockholdings of the former management, their relatives and associates are being bought out to relieve a potential oversupply when public.

#### Open Market

This stage involves acquiring securities of companies whose common shares trade publicly.

#### ACQUISITION/BUYOUT

#### Acquisition Financing

This stage provides funds to finance the acquiring of another company. Venture Economics tracks these deals when calculating venture capital disbursements in situations where the funding is by a venture capital firm, but not when it is by a buyout firm.

#### Management/Leveraged Buyout

These funds enable an operating management group to acquire a product line or business, at any stage of development, from either a public or private company. Often these companies are closely held or family owned. Management leveraged buyouts usually involve revitalizing an operation, with entrepreneurial management acquiring a significant equity interest. Venture Economics tracks these deals when calculating venture capital disbursements in situations where the funding is by a venture capital firm, but not when it is by a buyout firm.
