Minutes: CHAIRMAN FREBORG opened the hearing on HCR 3024 which urges Congress to raise the level of federal funding for the education of children with disabilities.

## Testimony in support of HCR 3024:

REPRESENTATIVE MYRON KOPPANG, District 25, presented written testimony. (see attached). There are other states involved in under-funding also.

BEV NIELSON, ND School Boards Assn., stated the National School Bd. Assn. had a resolution for the Federal government to fully fund their share of funding for educating children with disabilities.

MAX LAIRD, President NDEA, stated Senator Conrad has promised to propose 17 billion over the next 5 years for the federal government to make up their under-funding.

BOB RUTTEN, Director of Special Education for DPI, presented written testimony. (see attached).

JACK MCDONALD, Association of Nonpublic Schools, stated they support the bill. This has been a particular problem for nonpublic schools. They usually make arrangements through the public school system for students with disabilities. With the funding being so little, it has been very difficult.

There was no opposition to the resolution.

CHAIRMAN FREBORG closed the hearing on HCR 3024.

SENATOR COOK proposed an amendment to include the President of the United States on page 2, line 6, to those who will receive this resolution. Seconded by SENATOR WANZUK. Roll Call Vote: 6 YES. 0 NO. 1 Absent. Amendment adopted.

SENATOR KELSH moved an amendment to state: whereas Congress is considering income tax reductions and has never lived up to their promised funding level of 40%, they should apply it for property tax relief and use some of the excess funds to provide the promised 40% funding for children with disabilities. Seconded by SENATOR

O'CONNELL. SENATOR COOK asked if the intent of the amendment is to suggest that since there is a surplus they should pay, but if there weren't, they should not pay? SENATOR KELSH stated that he feels they have not been made to feel this is a high priority over the last few years, and he feels this resolution addresses that.

SENATOR KELSH WITHDREW HIS MOTION TO ADOPT THE AMENDMENT.

SECONDED BY SENATOR O'CONNELL. SENATOR WANZEK stated he could support the amendment if it did not speak to the surplus.

SENATOR KELSH will have an amendment properly drawn up by Legislative Council.

# HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 3024 EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPRESENTATIVE RAEANN KELSCH, CHAIRWOMAN

CHAIRPERSON KELSCH, MEMBERS OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE, MY NAME IS REPRESENTATIVE MYRON KOPPANG FROM DISTRICT 25 IN WAHPETON, NORTH DAKOTA. I AM HERE TO SUPORT HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 3024, URGING CONGRESS TO INCREASE FEDERAL FUNDING FOR THE EDUCATION OF CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS:

- 1. CONGRESS ENACTED THE EDUCATION FOR ALL HANDICAPPED CHILDREN ACT IN 1975, NOW KNOWN AS THE INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES EDUCATION ACT (IDEA). IN 1982, CONGRESS DETERMINED THAT STATE ENTITLEMENT SHOULD BE 40% OF THE AVERAGE "PER STUDENT" EXPENDITURE IN THE UNITED STATES, WHEN THE FEDERAL MANDATE BECAME LAW.
- 2. NORTH DAKOTA HAS BEEN RECEIVING ABOUT 10-14 PERCENT OF THE PROMISED AMOUNT.
- THIS UNDER-FUNDING HAS CAUSED THE STATE AND LOCAL PROPERTY TAX TO PAY A LARGE SHARE OF THIS COST TO EDUCATION. THE STATE HAS ASSUMED ABOUT 30% AND LOCAL ABOUT 60% OF THE COST FOR IDEA.
- 4. THIS UNDER-FUNDING WOULD TRANSLATE INTO \$15,000,000 TO \$18,000,000 SHORTFALL PER YEAR, FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.
- 5. IF THE STATES COULD RECEIVE 40% OF THE COST FROM CONGRESS, THERE COULD BE A REDUCTION IN LOCAL PROPERTY TAX AND THE STATE GENERAL FUND.
- 6. THE COST FOR FUNDING THIS PROGRAM HAS BEEN INCREASING RAPIDLY AND WILL CONTINUE TO DO SO, AS ADDITIONAL MANDATES ARE REQUIRED.
- 7. BUDGET SURPLUS IN RECENT YEARS COULD BE USED TO RAISE THE SUPPORT FOR EDUCATION OF CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES.

My name is Bob Rutten and I am the Director of Special Education for the Department of Public Instruction. I can be reached at 328-2277. On behalf of the DPI, I am here to express support for House Concurrent Resolution 3024, which urges Congress to raise the level of federal funding for the education of children and youth with disabilities.

Increased federal support for special education is a position the Department has advocated for many years. The Department believes the language of HCR 3024 would communicate to national leaders how seriously the Legislative Assembly of North Dakota regards this issue and how important it is to elevate financial support for the education of children and youth with disabilities.

There has been some confusion about the original intention of Congress regarding the funding of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The amount promised in the original 1975 legislation was not 40% of the costs of special education. It was 40% of the average per pupil expenditure in public elementary and secondary schools in the United States multiplied by the number

of children with disabilities ages 3-21 in the state receiving special education and related services. The level of federal funding received by North Dakota for the education of children with disabilities for the most current year is approximately one-third of the targeted funding amount of 40% set by Congress.

It is encouraging to report that there is movement in the right direction on this issue. As a result of the Congressional appropriation finalized in December, North Dakota can expect the largest increase in funding for the IDEA that we have ever received.

In August and October, 2000 the Department of Public Instruction contacted North Dakota's senators in Washington urging them to support a federal increase in funding for the IDEA. We received correspondence from both senators indicating their agreement with this principle and their willingness to work toward its realization.

When parents become aware that their child has a disability, typically a very wide range of emotions result. This often includes bewilderment, fear, anger, frustration and guilt. Whenever there's public talk about the financial burdens of special education, parents can and often do get another reminder of those deeply felt emotions. In addition to the relief of state and local education budgets, one of my strongest reasons for increasing federal support of special education funding is to bring an end to this perennial plea. If Congress would support the targeted

amount of 40% federal funding as previously described, I'm certain that at least some of the pain parents experience would be lessened. I urge your support for this Resolution and thank you for your consideration of children and youth with disabilities, their families and the schools of North Dakota that serve them.
