Senator Nething opened the hearing for Office of Administrative Hearings, SB 2018.

Allen C. Hoberg, Director of the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH), (testimony attached) gave testimony for their upcoming budget for 2001-2003. Most state agencies (65) are required to use administrative law judges (ALJ) from the Office of Administrative Hearings. There are exceptions, Workers Compensation Bureau, Insurance Department and Public Service Commission. Additionally, some local government agencies have used the services of OAH for tobacco sales enforcement and public nuisance abatement. OAH has operated with a permanent full time staff of five (three ALJ FTEs and two support staff FTEs) for conducting hearings. In September 1, 1995, OAH began conducting administration hearings for the Workers Compensation Bureau (Bureau) pursuant to agency agreement. In order to be able to provide the Bureau with the necessary temporary ALJs, OAH contracts with attorneys in private practice of law. Billing rates for OAH temporary ALJ work and for all other OAH ALJ work, and to keep

the two component parts separate for expenditure and revenue purposes. We now have two separate components which were created for OAH's budget under it one cost center. For 2001-2003 biennium we are using only one cost center, Cost Center 1000. OAH is asking for \$47,890 more for salaries and wages, \$97,614 less in operating expenses, and \$5,000 less in equipment. The only new item for this biennium is the return to borrowing from the General Fund (\$100,000 in borrowing authority) and not the Bank of North Dakota as we are unable to recover the interest.

Senator Nething: To Legislative Council, if making the change in borrowing fund from Bank of North Dakota to General Fund, how would this show in projections?

OMB: It is a net zero type situation; zero affect.

Senator Nething: Explain billing consultant.

Allen Hoberg: We are a cost basis operation; our billing rate same as for federal agencies.

Senator Bowman: When doing hearings for WCB; you pay your help and you get paid?

Allen Hoberg: We charge a flat rate; number of hours on cases.

Senator Tallackson: What is a typical case, say from Human Services.

Allen Hoberg: We have a variety of cases through Human Services; ranging from neglect, welfare, child abuse, etc.

Senator Solberg: Looking at your handout; explain number of hearings.

Allen Hoberg: Our cases and hearing varies; 50-60% of hearing are either settled or withdrawn.

Senator Tomac: I can't understand the less appropriation you are asking for with a deficiency?

Allen Hoberg: Mainly it is the interest that we can't collect from borrowing and also the declining case load. We have to pay off the Bank of ND this biennium.

Allen Hoberg: That includes strictly the increases purposed by the Governor's

recommendation as well as performances increases that were carried over the second year of the biennium from last biennium. Our rates for services are strictly on a cost bases. We take all of our expenses from the previous biennium and divide that by the number of hours of services we provided during that biennium to get a billing rate. That is done by a billing consultant pursuant into a federal formula that meets federal guidelines.

Representative Aarsvold: (1090) Aren't you really asking the state to pick up interest on that borrowed sum?

Allen Hoberg: Essentially that is right. We tried in the last biennium to include that interest rate within our billings rate. Billing all the agencies for the amounts plus interest, and found out after the session was over last time we could not bill the federal agencies interest.

Representative Wald: Didn't you have money in efficiency appropriation bill? How did we miss the mark so bad last biennium in regard you needing 150,000?

Allen Hoberg: That is correct. It was 120.000 dollars. That was to pay back the Bank of ND loan interest and a couple other items. We missed the case load, it was decreasing the last four years, so it falls short. Plus the interest we owe the Bank of ND this biennium is going to be about 20.000 dollars.

Representative Wald: Have you adjusted your fee schedule?

Allen Hoberg: Yes, we have adjusted it. We adjusted it this last biennium and will again this biennium. All of the budget will be covered by the fees that we charge.

Representative Wentz: Does anyone else wish to appear in opposition of SB2018? Seeing none we will close the hearing on SB2018.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) work consists almost exclusively of conducting administrative hearings for a number of state agencies on a variety of administrative matters (e.g., complaint [enforcement] hearings, application hearings [for license or benefits], appeals hearings from various agency actions). OAH provides independent administrative law judges (ALJs) to conduct hearings that were formerly conducted by in-nouse agency hearing officers, assistant attorneys general, or agency contract hearing officers.

Since OAH began operations on July 1, 1991, it has conducted hearings for about 65 different state and local government agencies or entities. Most state agencies are required to use the services of OAH under N.D.C.C. chapter 54-57. N.D.C.C. § 54-57-03(1) lists those state agencies exempted. Some exempted state agencies, including the Workers Compensation Bureau (the "Bureau"), the insurance Commissioner, and the Public Service Commission have voluntarily used the services of OAH, contracting with OAH to do so. Additionally, some local government agencies have used the services of OAH for such hearings as tobacco sales enforcement and public nuisance abatement. These local entities also contract with OAH. Contract arrangements like those between OAH and other state or local agencies or entities is common in other states, too.

From July 1, 1991, until September 1, 1995, OAH operated with a permanent full-time staff of five (three ALJ FTEs and two support staff FTEs), conducting hearings, the vast majority of which were from agencies required to use OAH services. (Even from the outset, however, OAH occasionally contracted with temporary, contract ALJs to conduct a few hearings on an as-needed basis.) On September 1, 1995, OAH began conducting all of the administrative hearings for the Workers Compensation Bureau, pursuant to agency agreement. OAH uses both permanent ALJs and temporary, contract ALJs to provide services for the

Bureau. However, OAH uses temporary, contract ALJs to conduct the bulk of Bureau hearings.

Since the 1997-99 blennium, then, OAH's budget has had a second component under its one major program, for conducting Bureau hearings by means of temporary, contract ALJs. However, both components of OAH's one major program are engaged in the same program activity, *I.e.*, providing hearing officer services to conduct hearings for state agencies and local entities.

In order to be able to provide the Bureau with the necessary temporary ALJs, OAH contracts with attorneys in the private practice of law. It became necessary to establish different billing rates for OAH temporary ALJ work and for all other CIAH ALJ work, and to keep the two component parts separate for expenditure and revenue purposes. Therefore, the two separate components were created in OAH's budget under its one cost center. Although OAH has kept these separate components in preparing its 2001-2003 operating request proposal, it has submitted a combined budget proposal under its one major program, using only one cost center, Cost Center 1000.

It is Important to remember that the Workers Compensation Bureau and other voluntary users of OAH hearing officer services are not required to use OAH for any hearing officer services. However, the Bureau has used OAH exclusively since September 1995, by agreement, and it wishes to continue to do so for the 2001-2003 biennium. Thus, the two component parts of OAH's one major program will continue for the foreseeable future. Other voluntary user agencies, such as the Insurance Commissioner, the Public Service Commission, and the Bank of North Dakota (student loan hearings), apparently will continue using OAH, too. However, these agencies are included under OAH's main component; OAH permanent ALJs conduct their hearings.

For the 2001-2003 blennium, OAH has requested a small (2.7%) increase in salaries and wages (based on performance increases in the current blennium). The original and the revised executive recommendation is for a 7.9 % increase in salaries and wages. Otherwise, OAH's budget is decreasing. OAH is asking for a \$97,614 decrease in operating expenses, primarily due to a decrease in the need for temporary hearing officer services for Workers Compensation Bureau hearings, and a \$5,000 equipment expenses decrease. The only relatively large increase in OAH's operating expenses for the coming blennium is a \$8,740 increase in information technology and data processing expenses.

The executive recommendation for OAH is for an increase of \$31,316 over OAH's request for \$85,959 less in total expenditures. All of the additional increase in the executive recommendation is based on the executive recommendation for the increased compensation package of salaries and benefits.

In short, under the executive recommendation, OAH's mission and functions remain essentially the same, with a goal to continue the services to its traditional program, as well as to be able to continue to provide quality services through an ongoing temporary program to the Workers Compensation Bureau, and to continue to provide quality services to other voluntary user agencies and to local entities.

OAH proposes essentially the same staff configuration as for the 1999-2001 biennium.

- 1 full-time Director/ALJ
- 2 full-time ALJs

- 3 full-time support staff (three administrative assistants -one for the WCB caseload)
- 10 temporary, contract ALJs, to do mostly WCB hearings, as well as some other agency hearings, as needed (this is down from 15 at the beginning of the current blennium)
- Total of 6 full-time FTEs, 10 temporary, contract ALJs.

### **BUDGET ANALYSIS**

OAH's present 1999-2001 budget shows a total funding of \$1,576,016 when a \$150,000 loan from the Bank of North Dakota is included, but OAH must pay back that loan (with interest) before the end of the current biennium. OAH does not ask for authority to borrow from the Bank again this biennium. Therefore, OAH's current budget is really \$1,426,016. It is asking for a budget (executive recommendation) of \$1,371,292. An overall decrease of \$54,724.

More specifically, under the executive recommendation OAH is asking for \$47,890 more under the salaries and wages line item (including benefits), \$97,614 less in operating expenses, and \$5,000 less in equipment. Under operating expenses, OAH is asking for \$8,740 more in iT-data processing,

\$1,225 more in IT-telephone, \$615 more in postage, and \$50 more in printing. The remainder of OAH's operating expense line items are reduced or remain the same. There are substantial reductions in professional services (\$80,900), operating fees and services (\$17,200), dues and professional development (\$4,638), travel (\$2,000), and repairs (\$2,000).

This proposed budget contains nothing that is really new. The only new item for this blennium is the return to borrowing from the general fund (\$100,000 in borrowing authority) rather than borrowing from the Bank of North Dakota. This will mean that OAH will no longer have to repay interest which it cannot recover in its billing process. Otherwise, OAH will maintain its operations essentially as it has since September 1995, with reduced caseloads, especially in Workers Compensation cases. Of course, this assumes that no new legislation is passed expanding or reducing OAH's jurisdiction. None is anticipated by OAH. However, OAH is currently engaged in talks with state agencies almed at possibly expanding voluntary use of OAH. OAH will continue to bill all agencies that use its services on an hourly rate, determined by our billing consultants, to fund all of its budget.

In summary, with the budget proposed today, OAH should be able to fulfill its mission, i.e., providing quality, independent hearing officer services to all state agencies required to use its services and to all state or local entities wishing, for whatever reason, to engage an independent administrative law judge to conduct its hearings. OAH respectfully requests that the Senate approve OAH's 2001-2003 operating budget request as proposed today.

Attached to this memorandum, for the Committee's information, are various statistical documents of OAH, including a breakdown of requests received by agency and hearings and prehearing conferences held. Other statistics can be provided if the Committee desires.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) work consists almost exclusively of providing independent administrative law judges to conduct administrative hearings for a number of state agencies on a variety of administrative matters, e.g., complaint (enforcement) hearings, application hearings for license or benefits, appeals hearings from various agency actions. Since OAH began operations on July 1, 1991, it has conducted hearings for about 65 different state and local government agencies or entities. Most state agencies are required to use the services of OAH under N.D.C.C. chapter 54-57. N.D.C.C. § 54-57-03(1) lists those state agencies exempted. Some exempted state agencies, including the Workers Compensation Bureau, the Insurance Commissioner, the Bank of

North Dakota, and the Public Service Commission have voluntarily used the services of OAH, contracting with OAH to do so. Additionally, some local government agencies have used the services of OAH for such hearings as tobacco sales enforcement and public nuisance abatement. These local entities also contract with OAH. Contract arrangements like those between OAH and other state or local agencies or entities is common in other states, too.

From July 1, 1991, until September 1, 1995, OAH operated with a permanent full-time staff of five (three ALJ FTEs and two support staff FTEs), conducting hearings, the vast majority of which were from agencies required to use OAH services. From the outset, however, OAH occasionally contracted with temporary, contract ALJs to conduct a few hearings on an as-needed basis. On September 1, 1995, OAH began conducting all of the administrative hearings for the Workers Compensation Bureau, pursuant to agency agreement. OAH uses both permanent ALJs and temporary, contract ALJs to provide services for the Bureau. However, OAH uses temporary, contract ALJs to conduct the bulk of Bureau hearings.

Since the 1997-99 biennium, then, OAH's budget has had a second component under its one major program, for conducting Bureau hearings by means of

temporary, contract ALJs. However, both components of OAH's one major program are engaged in the same program activity, *i.e.*, providing hearing officer services to conduct hearings for state agencies and local entities. Although OAH has kept these separate components in preparing its 2001-2003 operating request proposal, it has submitted a combined budget proposal under its one major program, using only one cost center.

It is important to remember that the Workers Compensation Bureau and other voluntary users of OAH hearing officer services are not required to use OAH for any hearing officer services. However, the Bureau has used OAH exclusively since September 1995, by agreement, and it wishes to continue to do so for the 2001-2003 biennium. Thus, the two component parts of OAH's one major program will continue for the foreseeable future. Other voluntary user agencies, such as the Insurance Commissioner, the Public Service Commission, and the Bank of North Dakota, apparently will continue using OAH, too. However, these agencies are included under CAFi's main component; OAH permanent ALJs conduct their hearings.

For the 2001-2003 blennium, the original and the revised executive recommendation is for a 7.9 % increase in salaries and wages. Otherwise,

OAH's budget is decreasing. OAH is asking for a \$97,614 decrease in operating expenses, primarily due to a decrease in the need for temporary hearing officer services for Workers Compensation Bureau hearings, and a \$5,000 equipment expenses decrease. The only relatively large increase in OAH's operating expenses for the coming biennium is a \$8,740 increase in information technology and data processing expenses.

Under the executive recommendation, OAH's mission and functions remain essentially the same, with a goal to continue the services to its traditional program, as well as to be able to continue to provide quality services through an ongoing temporary program to the Workers Compensation Bureau, and to continue to provide quality services to other voluntary user agencies and to local entities.

OAH proposes essentially the same staff configuration as for the 1999-2001 biennium.

- 1 full-time Director/ALJ
- 2 full-time ALJs

- 3 full-time support staff (three administrative assistants -one for the WCB caseload)
- 10 temporary, contract ALJs, to do mostly WCB hearings, as well as some other agency hearings, as needed (this is down from 15 at the beginning of the current biennium)
- Total of 6 full-time FTEs, 10 temporary, contract ALJs.

### **BUDGET ANALYSIS**

OAH's present 1999-2001 budget shows a total funding of \$1,576,016 when a \$150,000 loan from the Bank of North Dakota is included, but OAH must pay back that loan, with interest, before the end of the current biennium. OAH does not ask for authority to borrow from the Bank again this biennium. Therefore, OAH's current budget is really \$1,426,016. It is asking for a budget of \$1,371,292. An overall decrease of \$54,724.

More specifically, under the executive recommendation, OAH is asking for \$47,890 more under the salaries and wages line item, including benefits; \$97,614 less in operating expenses; and \$5,000 less in equipment. Under operating expenses, OAH is asking for \$8,740 more in IT-data processing, \$1,225 more in IT-telephone, \$615 more in postage, and \$50 more in printing. The remainder of

OAH's operating expense line items are reduced or remain the same. There are substantial reductions in professional services (\$80,900), operating fees and services (\$17,200), dues and professional development (\$4,638), travel (\$2,000), and repairs (\$2,000).

This proposed budget contains nothing that is really new. The only new item for this biennium is the return to borrowing from the general fund rather than borrowing from the Bank of North Dakota. OAH is asking for \$100,000 in borrowing authority from the general fund. This will mean that OAH will no longer have to repay interest which it cannot recover in its billing process. Otherwise, OAH will maintain its operations essentially as it has since September 1995, with reduced caseloads, especially in Workers Compensation cases. Of course, this assumes that no new legislation is passed expanding or reducing OAH's jurisdiction. OAH will continue to bill all agencies that use its services on an hourly rate to fund all of its budget.

In summary, with the budget proposed today, OAH should be able to fulfill its mission, to provide quality independent hearing officer services to all state agencies required to use its services and to all state or local entities wishing, for whatever reason, to engage an independent administrative law judge to conduct

its hearings. OAH respectfully requests that the House approve OAH's 2001-2003 operating budget request as proposed today.

Attached to this memorandum are various OAH statistical documents, including a breakdown of requests received by agency, and hearings and prehearing conferences held pursuant to those requests. Other statistics can be provided if the Committee desires.
