Roll call was taken at the beginning of orientation with each member telling a bit about themselves; all were present - Senator Lee, Senator Kilzer, Senator Fischer, Senator Eberle, Senator Mathern, Senator Polovitz The orientation was concluded by a brief explanation of protocol and procedure.

The hearing on SB2094 was opened.

Brenda Weisz Dept of Human Services introduced the bill. See written testimony.

Schator Mathern asked what we have been doing? Are we not following the law?

Ms. Weisz explained that the State Auditor's office goes through Century Code to see if there are items that need to look at that agencies should be doing and in this section it states that we will track these payments in this particular fund and the Auditor's Office will certify the expenditure and they are asking to take that part out because they don't do that and the fund is not even operational. Basically this is housekeeping. There is a fund established that allows us to track

<u>Senator Mathern</u> There were no people here representing these organizations that provide this residential care. Were they made aware of this change?

Brenda Weisz was called to check on this.

<u>Jack McDonald</u>: In response to this, I am representing the ARC of the Upper Valley which is the Association for People of Developmental Disabilities. Our understanding is that payments will still be made but not from segregated funds. I will call and double check on this bill.

Senator Mathern: I move a Do Pass, but not report to the floor until Friday.

Senator Polovitz seconded the motion.

Senator Kilzer supports the motion as is.

Roll call vote carried 6-0. Senator Mathern will carry the bill.

The committee was recessed.



Madame chairman Lee and members of the committee, I am Brenda Weisz, Director of Fiscal Administration for the Department of Human Services. I appear before you today to provide information relating to SB2094, a bill to repeal section 25-16-11 of the NDCC.

The Department is proposing to repeal the section of code that relates to payments made to purchase residential care, custody, treatment, training, and education for persons with developmental disabilities. This particular section of NDCC refers to accounting/tracking for these expenditures in a separate fund. These expenditures are currently and have been for many blennia included in the budget request of the Department of Human Services in the funds established and operated under the current statewide accounting system, which is not a separate fund.

The Department is not suggesting to eliminate payments for these services but rather, proposing to repeal the section as a matter of housekeeping based on the current method used to track these expenditures.

This section of NDCG was initially passed during the 1967 Legislative Session (SB 249) when community based care was just beginning to be introduced for persons with developmental disabilities. It was also a time period long before the current accounting system used by state agencies was established which now allows for proper and thorough tracking of these types of expenditures within a Department's budget structure. Repealing this section will not change the manner in which these expenditures are paid, reported and monitored.

This concludes my testimony. I would be happy to address your questions.

Below are the comments of Mike Williams, a board member of The Arc, Upper Valley, in response to SB 2094 and the testimony you heard on that bill Wednesday. I believe they are indicative of the feelings of the whole board.

"I am not aware that this change would have any negative effect upon the provision of services for people with disabilities. The repeal of an outdated accounting statute (which statute has been largely ignored for so long as I am aware) should not affect our programs or the funding for our programs in any way. The fact that these funds are accounted for in the Departmental budget, instead of separately, should be no big deal."
