REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE

SB 2119: Judiciary Committee (Sen. Traynor, Chairman) recommends DO NOT PASS (5 YEAS, 2 NAYS, 0 ABSENT AND NOT VOTING). SB 2119 was placed on the Eleventh order on the calendar.

2001 TESTIMONY

SB 2119

SB 2119 – The bill creates a new crime for the transportation of anhydrous ammonia in a container not designed and constructed for the storage and transportation for the substance. Any individual who violates the provisions of the section will be guilty of a Class C felony.

Anhydrous ammonia is one of the key chemicals used to make methamphetamine. While the intent of the bill was to provide a criminal penalty for the stealing anhydrous ammonia, it has an unintended consequence of creating a criminal sanction for farmers who fail to use a proper container as designated by federal code.

Additionally, present law provides that an individual is guilty of a class c felony if a container were used to transport anhydrous ammonia for the purpose of manufacturing methamphetamine under the drug paraphernalia statute (Chapter 12.1-31.1). Thus it would seem that the bill's intent is addressed in existing law.

Finally, the real issue in the war against methamphetamine will not be fought in farm fields against farmers who may inadvertently violate this law, but rather by enacting a comprehensive drug enforcement and treatment plan. Shortly, I plan to have legislation introduced that will serve as a key component in my comprehensive program. Other parts of this program will be implemented administratively. Our goal is to focus not only on enforcement issues, but also to coordinate our efforts with health officials to

provide more effective treatment alternatives. With this in mind, I believe that SB 2119 is unnecessary.

SB 2133 – The theft of anhydrous ammonia is added to 12.1-23-05, and makes it a class C felony in this bill. The discussion regarding my comprehensive drug program is applicable here (See, SB 2119). The law enforcement community has also informed me that in instances where anhydrous ammonia is being illegal taken for the purpose of drug manufacturing its value usually exceeds \$500. Consequently the crime would be covered under subsection 2 (a) of the section. As such the addition anhydrous ammonia to the section is unnecessary.
