Mr. Chairman and Members of the Senate I.B.L. Committee my name is Wayne Mattern.

I am a dentist in private practice in Bismarck, a member of the State Board of Dental

Examiners and also serving as Executive Director for the Board. [I am here today to speak in favor of Senate Bill 2161] Our Dental Board voted unanimously in favor of this bill.

The changes provided for in the bill can be divided into three main areas.

They are:

- 1) License renewal periods for Hygienists and Dentists.
- 2) Allowing hygienists to work in satellite offices under general supervision.
- 3) Changes in the executive committee of the board and adjustment of the per diem for members.

In area #1 the renewal of the license, continuing education requirements (including CPR and Infection Control credits) would all come under a 24-month cycle. There would be no change in cost per year to either hygienists or dentists. Currently, renewals are on a one-year basis, Continuing Education is on a five-year basis and CPR and Infection control are on two years, creating unnecessary confusion for many.

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE

P.O. Box 7246 Bismarck, ND 58507-7246 701-258-8600 Fax 701-224-9824 Area #2 deals with section 43-20-03 of the North Dakota Century Code. This portion allows a hygienist to treat patients in a satellite office when the dentist is not on site. The requirements are listed in paragraphs 1-4 of 43-20-03. The change should increase the number of people a hygienist may treat over a 12-month period.

In area #3 (43-28-05) The Board wishes to establish an office of Immediate Past

President and list the duties for this office. The Board feels it would be extremely

valuable to keep the President on the board for one more year after completing the

office of president. The Board would like to list Executive Director instead of

Secretary/Treasurer in several areas in section 43-28.05 of the Practice Act, and replace
the office of Vice President with President Elect.

Finally, The Board is considering changing the compensation for board members while engaged in board duties from \$90.00 per day to \$110.00 per day. Again I would urge a do pass on 2161.

Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate Industry, Business, and Labor Committee. My name is Kathleen Mangskau. I am the Oral Health Program Director in the Division of Maternal and Child Health of the North Dakota Department of Health. I am here to provide information relating to the proposed amendment to subsection 2 of section 43-20-03 of the 1999 Supplement of the North Dakota Century Code. The proposed amendment relates to allowing dental hygienists to practice under general supervision if the patient is being treated at the primary or satellite practice location of the supervising dentist. This amendment could enhance the provision of preventive services to North Dakota residents, especially in rural areas of the state where dental access is becoming more difficult.

A 1998 survey of North Dakota dentists indicates this provision would impact a small number of dental offices and the majority of those are in rural areas or serve special populations. There are 36 dentists that report practicing at satellite clinics in the state. Fourteen are specialists and 22 are general dentists. Most specialists would not be impacted by this change, as they usually are present at the satellite site when services are being delivered. Of the 22 general dentists, six practice in federal settings that would not be impacted by state law. Approximately 16 dentists, all whom have satellite clinics in rural areas, could be impacted by this change. Since general supervision is already allowed at the primary practice when the dentist has authorized the procedure, this change would allow for similar practice at the satellite site and could increase access to preventive services in the rural areas of the state.
