Olsrud Yes. I get a letter each year that is sent to the director of OMB asking for the dues, but I don't remember what that is.

Rep. Wald I would ask Jim Smith or Joe from OMB to give us a list of all of the agencies that belong to CSG and how much we pay by agency.

Jim Smith In the OMB appropriation bill, SB 2015, they include the amounts for the various dues and memberships for the Council State Governments for next biennium. It's \$138,500.

Chairman Martinson Does that include all of the agencies?

Smith Right.

Rep. Wald SB 2015?

Smith Right.

Chairman Martinson Why are you having a difficult time filling positions? Is it the amount that you are willing to pay? How long have they been open?

Olsrud They have probably been vacant for more than 2 years. We decided at the end of the 2001 session not to make an offer to the temporary people who had worked at that time. It is a combination of things including looking for people with experience. Saying it is strictly compensation and adding dollars to our appropriation is sensitive because we don't want to upset current employees. The Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly is a small branch. If someone gets sick for a day, operations are shut down in that area, and that is not a good position to be in. It is more finding the skills than the pay.

Rep. Gulleson On related legislation, it talks about SB 2294 which requires to reconvene each even numbered year for budget adjustment purposes. Is this a bill about annual sessions?

Oisrud I think that used to be called the Senator Redlin bill, which has been revived.

Rep. Wald I am amazed at the quality of people you hire. It never ceases to amaze me the amount of work they crank out when we are in session, particularly in appropriations. Can you meet the salary requirements to keep these people? Is that an issue that needs to be looked at?

Olsrud Turnover is always difficult with a small operation such as we have because we are relying on so few people to do multi tasks. We had a lot of applicants for our fiscal positions this time, which has a lot to do with the economy. I can't say we have difficulty finding people, because there are a lot of people looking for jobs today. We will always have trouble, particularly in the fiscal area, with salaries because the executive branch looks at our people. We have had some amazing success stories. We have to accept the fact that we probably are going to lose people when there are major openings.

Senator Holmberg, Chairman called the meeting to order, attendance was called.

HB 1001 Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly.

Wesley Belter, Representative from District 22, Chairman of the Legislative Council. No written testimony. He introduced the Legislative budget, HB 1001.

John D. Olsrud (#147) Director, North Dakota Legislative Council. His written testimony is Exhibit #1 which is attached to these minutes. The appropriation for the Legislative Assembly is about \$8.6 million from the general fund, about 5% or \$435,000 less than the current biennium. This is the amount considered necessary for a 77 legislative day or a 108 calendar day regular session next time in 2005. The average in the past few years has been 72 days. Since 1993, the longest the legislative has met has been 77 days and the shortest has been 66 days. The constitution allows for 80 legislative day session and if that happens, the Council will advise you as to just where they are in the current blennium. The salary and wage items is \$5.5 million

which includes legislative pay for about 70 employees. The legislators compensation is \$125 per day, with chairman and legislative leaders receiving slightly more. Legislators' monthly compensation of \$250 per month and additional \$250 per month for the majority and minority leaders. Health insurance for 133 legislators, which that number changes - right now the number is 126. Wages have been reduced by \$189,000 because there are 6 fewer legislators this session, because of redistricting. Operating expenses are about \$3 million which includes Legislator's travel; Lodging costs; Data processing costs; Information technology equipment, consulting services (there is a \$200,000 for hiring a consultant to analyze the Legislative Assembly's bill drafting system, which needs to be replaced. Mr Olsrud went on to explain the problems with the present bill drafting system (these figures can be found in exhibit #1). He continued with what needs to be done on the computer system. He explained about the main frame bill status system that has been in place since 1969, and how they have to go to a more modern system. They are relying on a hand full of people who know this system to keep it going. As they people retire, etc, there will no longer be anyone who knows about this system. The people coming out of the colleges today with computer degrees are not learning about main frame systems. These systems have to be replaced and it is going to cost money. He continued with the telephone, telecommunications and networking charges and the professional services for secretarial services, etc. Capital Assets is for miscellaneous equipment replacement needs. National Conference of State Legislatures is up slightly, these services are used by the smaller states to help in the legislative process. The Legislative Council is requesting approximately \$7.2 million from the general fund which is \$201,994 or 3% less than the 2001-03. The FTE positions is the same as last biennium, 33. There are 2 openings now for support staff in the computer section.

Senator Robinson: There has been several changes in the past few years, is part of the problem your inability to track, recruit and retain? Mr. Olsrud replied that it was difficult to answer, it is the fiscal staff that is hard to keep. The executive branch is the competition for the fiscal staff, the rest of the staff is pretty stable. State agencies want to hire the people from Legislative Council because they know the process, etc. and so it becomes extremely difficult to keep fiscal staff. It will always be a problem, because agencies will always want our top fiscal staff people. Senator Mathern: He wanted to know if funding for the main frame was in this budget? Mr. Olsrud stated that they all of the main frame programs were funded, they were not asking for money to totally new system. They would have to ask for millions. Senator Mathern continued about what would happened when these handful of people are no longer here. He was just wondering why the switch was done. Mr. Olsrud replied that the problem is that they have this integrated system, if they wanted to replace the entire system and have a integrated system so that everything is tied together, he wasn't even sure if they could find a consulting firm or someone to come in and do that, because it is so complicated and it has been patched together. What they are purposing is to take this step by step. They know that if they take this bill drafting system, we will be back in 2005 for a substantial amount for that one program. Maybe if we get the money for the consultant, he could take a look at this and tell us what we should do, but he wasn't sure

Senator Bowman: Do you consult with ITD? Can they supply the answers, etc. that is needed. Mr. Olsrud replied that they did work with ITD, they rely very much on them but there are problems there also with keeping good people, again the salary issue. They can't help us very much because the people they hire are not familiar with main frame systems. Senator Bowman continued that if the updates are done then wouldn't the ITD be able to help? Mr. Olsrud couldn't answer the question fully, since most of the technology was way over his head. They will certainly use them but they won't be able to do everything for them. Senator Grindberg: When the legislative chamber was given new chairs, carpet, etc, what budget did that come out of? Mr. Olsrud replied that he couldn't remember if it was carry over money or what. If there has been 65 day sessions, the legislature has said that money can be carried over to the next biennium. That money is then used, usually, for carpet, chairs, etc. It would be in the Legislative council budget. Senator Mathern: He was concerned that there was not the request for the bigger change. He felt that they needed to have the best technology in order to provide the best service. He was concerned about the idea that the system is handing together by "bailing wire" and only a few people know how this system works and they could be leaving at any time. Mr. Olsrud stated that he would look at what the figures where 4 years ago, vendors where brought in, a lot of them specialize in business, not state government. To find the right person who will understand what they need is difficult, but he could certainly get the historical information for the committee. Senator Krauter: Would like a short memo following up on Senator Grindberg's question regarding where the funding came from for the several things they did a few years ago. Mr.

Olsrud said they could get that for them. Senator Robinson: He was wondering if they shouldn't budget so many dollars each biennium for upkeep, etc. If these rooms are the responsibility of the legislative council then shouldn't we be doing something on a plan. Not waiting until the need is in the thousands of dollars just to catch up. These rooms are no in bad shape but it is the showcase for North Dakota and these rooms are used a lot and if there was a schedule and it was rotated so that every year there was something being done to keep them updated. Senator Andrist: He wanted to congratulate the council on how advanced the computer system have been over the years, he wanted to know if they should look at getting rid of some of the things that can be done on the computers, like the secretarial services, is there a need to give journals to everyone anymore, printing of notices of hearing, plus putting them on e-mail also, which is doubling up on things. Mr. Olsrud stated that on the legislative branch has really taken advantage of technology, the number of employees has been reduced to 70-75. The reduction in printing is also great. There used to be up to 12 people in the bill room, now there is only 5, of course this service is now contracted out. They have been very good at reducing the number of employees needed to do these services. Senator Grindberg I don't have the answer to that. I think one can gather from walking in that it doesn't sell very well or look very good to the public when you have a room that is drastically outdated with furniture.

Allen. Legislative Council I am not sure, I would have to do some checking.

Senator Krauter We previously redid the carpeting in the chambers, the chairs, the sound system, and voting boards, which was done similar to this type of a situation. Dollars not used in some legislative sessions were used for that. There is not a scientific method of years and times of doing these types of things. Senator Krauter We need to keep this stuff looking good because pretty soon it is going to be so tattered that it is going to cost more.

Chairman Martinson You didn't mention the \$150,000 for equity adjustments that you took out. The reason we put that in is Office of Management and Budget treat themselves pretty well up there. Their fiscal people are substantially higher than ours are in legislative council. It appears that as soon as they realized that there weren't going to be salary increases for the next biennium they gave themselves raises. The salaries were given in January about the same time we were talking about salary freezes. Apparently there is a bit of a feud, at least coming from one direction, that they don't want to have anybody paid more than they get or even equal to what they get. We are pretty adamant about narrowing the gap somewhat. That is not just for fiscal people, but it is also for attorney people. We are going to stay pretty firm on that.

Senator Krauter From Senate discussions, this was not in the recommendation that the legislative council put forward. If it was important for the person who put the budget together, they should have put it in there. Equity is an issue for all state employees. I agree with you, it looks suspicious at those times when raises were given. The Senate's decision was based on the fact that it wasn't presented by legislative council as a request in the budget.

Chairman Martinson These are the people that work for us. They work just as hard as the people in OMB. I went up and talked to John Olsrud, and I like John Olsrud, but he would never be the one that would come down here and say I want more money. He is not like that and that is to his credit. If you wait for John Olsrud to come down and ask for a salary increase, we will be here for a long time. That is where we are coming from and we are not going to move off that position.




