

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Minutes:

Chairman Kelsch opened hearing on HB 1033

Anita Thomas, Attorney for the Legislative Council and legal council for the interim Education Committee.

The interim committee was charged with studying K-12 Education during the insuring 5-10-20-years. Within those parameters the committee received a great deal of testimony and discussion on the concept of local control vs. constitutional obligations, that required the legislative assemble to provide for a uniform system of free public school. The committee felt that it would be appropriate to impose on the school district, certain minimum requirements regarding there educational offerings.

Now once this issue came up there has been a long standing assumption that the state has in statute a requirement regarding the minimum number of credits need for high school graduation. That assumption is not accurate. A few sessions ago the legislative assemble adopted language that required home school student to have at least 17 units in order to obtain a high school

district. The interim committee determined that there should be a statute which sets the requirement for the min. amount of units needed in order to graduate from a high school in this state and the number that was selected was 21. The committee was told that most school districts were already at or above this requirement. And nothing in this bill would preclude a school district from requiring more units in order for the students to graduate. Section 1 of the bill you have in front of you sets the 21 unit requirement for public and nonpublic, and division for independent students, and section 2 of the bill imposes the same requirement on home schooled students. The interim committee recommended this bill by a vote of 21-0.

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Minutes: CHAIRMAN FREBORG called the committee to order. Roll Call was taken with all (6) members present.

CHAIRMAN FREBORG opened the hearing on HB 1033 which relates to high school graduation requirements and the requirements for students receiving home education and to provide an effective date.

#### Testimony in support of HB 1033:

ANITA THOMAS, Attorney, Legislative Council, explained the bill to the committee. This bill came from the interim education committee. It puts into statute the minimum number of units needed for high school graduation. It has been assumed that there was a required seventeen units needed, but this is not in statute. This would put the number of twenty-one units into statute and would include public, non-public and home-schooled students. This bill does not preclude a school from requiring more units for graduation.

SENATOR FREBORG asked how the number twenty-one was reached. MS. THOMAS stated the committee had looked at twenty-four, but that would have affected a significant number of districts.

ANITA DECKER, Director School Approval and Accreditation, DPI, testified in support of the bill. (see attached) She also presented a fact sheet that showed the required units in all school districts in the state. (see attached)

SENATOR COOK asked to what degree do school districts in ND offer different diplomas. Are school districts issuing a "participation" diploma for students who have put in the time, but have not successfully completed the course work. MS. DECKER replied that the school districts determine what the standards are for meeting their requirements. There could be some of what Senator Cook is talking about, but she feels this has fallen pretty much by the wayside. SENATOR LEE asked what is the typical number of units a student graduates with. MS.

DECKER stated this is not reported to DPI.

SENATOR FREBORG asked what the value of a "complementary" diploma would be. MS. DECKER replied that it is valued by employers most of the time, although it is debatable. SENATOR COOK stated that a high school diploma is needed to enlist in the armed services. MS. DECKER stated they prefer a high school diploma, but under some circumstances will accept other criteria, such as home education or an adult education program.

BEV NIELSON, ND School Board Association, stated their support for this bill. They agree the state should set a minimum number of units required for graduation. This meets some standards for uniformity.

### TESTIMONY ON HB 1033 HOUSE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

January 15, 2003 by Anita K. Decker, Director School Approval and Accreditation 328-1718

**Department of Public Instruction** 

Madame Chair and members of the committee:

My name is Anita Decker and I am the director of School Approval and Accreditation for the Department of Public Instruction. I am here to speak in favor of I-IB1033 regarding high school graduation requirements for North Dakota's high schools.

High school graduation requirements vary from state to state. Nearly all states, however, have statutory minimum course requirements that must be met before a high school diploma is granted. According to a report from the Education Commission of the States requirements vary from 13 to 24 units.

Currently, North Dakota has no statutory requirement on units required for high school graduation although there is a common perception that a minimum of 17 is set by law. The North Dakota University System admissions requires 13 units and recommends an additional 3 units.

The handout lists North Dakota school districts by enrollment and shows the number of credits required for graduation as reported to the Department this fall. This information is also available on each school's profile which is on the Department's website. Eleven schools reported raising their graduation requirements this school year.

Fifty-four percent of schools already meet the requirements in this bill. Only two schools in the top three enrollment categories would have to raise their graduation requirements more than one unit. Nine schools in the lowest enrollment category would have to raise their requirements more than a single unit. Only one nonpublic school and one state school would need more than one additional unit.

Based on this report, Madame Chair and members of the committee, we would urge a do-pass on HB1033 with the recommendation that the provisions of this bill apply to the graduating class of 2005.

Madame Chair, this concludes my testimony. I would be happy to answer any questions.

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
