

Chairman Kelsch We would like to see public dialog in the school districts and also to provide us with information every two years.

Rep. Sitte Do Bismarck and Fargo do this?

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Chairman Kelsch Large schools are doing this type of planning but not that far out.

Would your group accept 10 years?

Wahl: 10 years down the road administrative and instructional are hard to do. Buildings are easy as far a projecting when you will need a new roof.

Chairman Kelsch They should be able to project some of the staff's needs, retirement. With 95% will go to 60 years of age. I agree 20 years is a long time out. I truly believe that 10 years isn't to long to project out.

Wahl: Trying to plan to far leads to inaccuracy in enrollment beyond five years is difficult.

Chairman Kelsch the formula that we use has been perfected, they are within a small percentage

of actual. What my differ is the migration from rural to urban.

Ten years isn't unreasonable, able to plan for staff, housing in the community etc.

Rep. Hass This is a remnant of a broader bill for the future of ND. It is extremely important with regards to demographic shift, change in curriculum as we move into new technology. As a state and a school district this is critical to student of ND. I can See Attached Testimony the justification to eliminate the 20 years and move it to 10 years for planning and revisit it every two years, with subject to revisions, this can be a very valuable tool for us at the state and for the communities.

Rep. Mueller Is this a local control issue, if schools had planned for consolidations, etc. it may be easier to do now that the time has come. It is an organized approach to the future based on solid decisions. Smaller schools can't hide from what they see happening.

Concur with what has been said. Twenty years is to long, ten we can make work, with revision every two years. A larger concern: for the people in the communities, Department of Public Instruction, legislature, What authority will this report have. The plan will be revised and adjusted. And when the school board changes are they held accountable to the old administration. This could be an emotional upset to close a school. the public may not See Attached Testimony these as plans not promises.

Rep. Hass Credibility of the plan, the approach they take at the local level to have input from all levels, that will give it credit. Concern about obligating future boards through levy changes, teacher hiring, etc.

5-10 yr. plans are not cast in stone, they need to be used to guide the future.

Rep. Haas I don't think long range strategic planning is going on at the elementary and secondary level. Change comes very hard for a lot of districts. This is really necessary for student of ND.

Rep. Mueller: The greatest share at the district level are planning, where they are going and how they are going to get there and those kind of things. Some probably are not. It makes sense for all to sit down to make some determinations on where they are going and how they are going to get there. The old adage if you don't now where you are going how can you get there.

Rep. Williams I think districts are doing this and that this bill isn't really necessary.

Rep. Haas No requirement to report to Department of Public Instruction, this came from the Interim Committee. Revising this plan at least every two years.

Rep. Herbel Concerns about the time factor/reporting of it. Those have been eliminated by the amendment. I see nothing wrong with having a plan. I have schools in my district that don't have a plan, they plan to operate indefinitely.

Rep. Meier The think it is key what Rep. Herbel just said is having something upgraded every two years a lot more frequent then what was in the previous bill.

Chairman Kelsch we debated this at quit some length during interim committee. We also tried to add this on to a bill in the last session, because we thought it would be helpful to us as legislators. One of the things that disturbed me a little was the fact that during the interim we did find districts that really are not going through the process. We know they will not be in existence forever. But they will change. A tool for us to see that school dist. are giving this some thought.

Page 1, line 1, after "A BILL" replace the remainder of the bill with "for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 15.1-07 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to school district demographics and planning.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. A new section to chapter 15.1-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

School district demographics - Long-term planning process.

- Between January first and June thirtleth of every even-numbered year, the board of each school district shall invite the public to participate in a planning process addressing the effects that demographics might have on the district in the ensuing five-year and ten-year periods, and specifically addressing potential effects on:
 - Academic, athletic, and extracurricular programs;
 - Instructional and administrative staffing;
 - Facility needs and utilization; and
 - d. District tax levies.
- At the conclusion of the planning process, the board shall prepare a report, publish a notice in the official newspaper of the district indicating that the report is available, and make the report available upon request."

Minutes: VICE-CHAIRMAN LEE called the committee to order. Roll Call was taken with all (6) members present.

VICE-CHAIRMAN LEE opened the hearing on HB 1034 which relates to school district demographics and planning.

Testimony in support of HB 1034:

ANITA THOMAS. Legislative Council staff, explained the bill and the differences from the interim bill to the amended House bill. (see attached)

REPRESENTATIVE HAAS, Dist.36, explained some of the actions of the House. He said the interim bill had asked for a 20 year plan, and the committee thought that was too long a time frame. They dropped the reporting requirement because of the ever-changing demographics of our state. The committee wants to make sure there is a required planning process to take place at the local level

SENATOR COOK asked why the reporting process was dropped. He still feels there would be value in that if the reports were filed at a central place where legislators could possible access them and see what some of the long-term planning looks like. REPRESENTATIVE HAAS stated this was the most controversial element of the bill when they dropped the reporting element. The committee felt that if the local school districts took this seriously, and involved the patrons of the district in meaningful planning, then the report was possibly not necessary. He stated the House committee had received testimony stating the districts felt the reporting would be just one more thing they would have to file with DPI, and they didn't really want to do it.

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SENATOR CHIRSTENSON asked if this is an ongoing process. REP. HAAS stated it is ongoing and continual.

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if there would be any benefit in looking at a 2, 5 and 10 year plan.

REP. HAAS stated that would be excellent

TOM DECKER DPI, stated the department supports the bill. He feels a 2 year time frame would be good. He further stated it takes about 5 years for any significant change to take place.

SENATOR COOK asked if there is value in submitting a report. MR. DECKER stated he feels there is value in submitting a report which ensures the job will get done in a timely fashion and a product will be delivered.

MARY WAHL, ND Council of Educational Leaders, presented a "planning session schedule". (see attached) She stated they support planning by school districts. There only concern is the time frame. They feel a five year time frame is good and a ten year time is too long especially if the report is done every other year. NCLB could not have been incorporated into any plan

because it was an unknown until just recently. Also, taxable values are an uncertainty. She feels

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10 years has too many variables and feels a 5 year schedule is better. You would at least have a four year reporting span.

SENATOR COOK asked if MS. WAHL thinks a five and 10 year plan would help the legislators in their deliberations. She doesn't think a 10 year plan is time-effective.

There was no opposition.

The hearing was closed.

Minutes: CHAIRMAN FREBORG called the committee to order. Roll Call was taken with all (6) members present.

Discussion on HB 1034:

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if there is interest within the committee with something other than a 5 and 10 year plan.

SENATOR FREBORG asked if we should have the districts predict their demise in 10 years, and if the committee really thinks the districts will be fair in their predictions.

SENATOR COOK feels this would give the districts a chance to look at what may happen in 10 years and give them the chance to make changes.

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if we should look at a 2 - 4 - 6 year plan.

SENATOR LEE feels it is important to look ahead 5 - 10 years. He feels a 2 year plan is an operational plan. A longer range plan would force the district to look ahead and base their operation on it. SENATOR FREBORG asked if he is talking about a written plan or on long

range goals. SENATOR LEE said the plan includes goals and would probably change as the years go by. SENATOR FREBORG stated that things move so fast now, that maybe we should look at shorter terms of planning.

SENATOR FALKOLL has a concern that the first report would be so far out and the board would probably change before the five years were done.

SENATOR COOK feels an important part of the legislation is it requires a planning process with public input.

Tape 1, Side B:

SENATOR COOK is comfortable with the bill as is. He feels the schools could go through this and then come back after 2 or 5 years with their thoughts on how it is working and how true it is. SENATOR FREBORG feels a long range plan (10 years) would be a "dream" of what they hope for, but in reality, not what will be.

SENATOR CHRISTENSON feels a 10 year plan needs to be done, even if it is only a projection. SENATOR FREBORG feels schools will refuse to look at their long range plan accurately. They now tend to not believe what DPI is saying about declining enrollment, even though DPI is using the latest census figures for their projections. His worry is that the smaller schools would plan for something that isn't there. SENATOR COOK feels with the public participating, it may be more accurate.

Senator Flakoll proposed an amendment to change the 5 and 10 years to 4 and 8 years.

Senator Cook seconded.

School District Demographics and Long Term Plans

While considering what education would look like and should look like in this state in the next 5, 10, and 20 years, the interim committee determined that school boards and districts should be engaging in the same line of questioning and ultimately planning.

The committee therefore proposed a bill that would require school boards to hold a public hearing during the first six months of each even numbered year, to consider the effects of demographics on their district, and most importantly, to consider appropriate responses to the population changes, regardless of whether those changes are positive or negative.

The board would then be required to prepare a report that sets forth the district's 5, 10, and 20 year plan. The plan must include potential changes in academic, athletic, and extracurricular programs; potential staff changes; potential building changes,

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including repairs, remodeling, new construction, and even closure; and potential taxation changes.

When the report is ready, the school district must publish notice of that fact in the newspaper and it must make the report available to anyone upon request.

During the committee hearings, some suggested that 20 years is a long time in terms of doing any practical planning.

Proponents however suggested that the bill draft will force school boards and school district patrons to have very public conversations about factors that will seriously impact their ability to deliver education to their students.

Madame Chairman, members of the committee, the interim committee recommended this bill by a vote of 16-0.

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TESTIMONY ON HB 1034 HOUSE EDUCATION COMMITTEE By Paul K. Johnson, Superintendent Bismarck Public Schools

Madam Chair and Members of the House Education Committee,

speaking on behalf of the Bismarck School Board. The Bismarck School Board opposes HB 1034 for at least four reasons. First, when conditions are changing so fast that business and industry typically do not dare to plan further than three years into the future, it is not realistic to expect school districts to plan ten and twenty years into the future. Second, the public may interpret the long-range plan to be a pledge or guarantee of future action or future protection. Third, crafting the plan may unnecessarily cause dissention as possible scenarios and actions far into the future are discussed. Fourth, the effect, if not the intent, of this bill is to require the present board to potentially obligate a future board to plans that may not seem feasible or desirable to the future board.

The Bismarck School Board suggests a DO NOT PASS recommendation from this committee.

2003 North Dakota Legislative Assembly House Education Committee Testimony HB 1034

House Bill 1034 establishes a requirement that school districts plan, anticipate the effects of changing demographics, and share that planning with the community. Most school districts are involved in this process at the present time.

The language in this bill, however, does present some concern for school districts and school boards. First, will the requirement to report this information to the superintendent of public instruction result in another massive reporting process that includes details impossible to predict five, ten and twenty year from now, and will this information create unnecessary concern in local communities by including predictions that will never happen. School districts do plan, and that p'an can be shared, in the format determined locally by the district. This bill should not create another defined report that will need to be completed by the district.

Second, the bill asked districts to identify program changes, staff changes, facility repairs, remodeling, closures, and new construction, and taxation changes five, ten, and twenty years from now. It is not possible to determine that kind of specificity twenty years out. The parents of some of the children we will serve have not even been born. The planning process needs to include generalities not specifics that far out.



The interim bill was to specifically address academic, athletic, and extracurricular program changes. The house bill was to consider academic, athletic, and extracurricular programs.

The interim bill was to specifically address instructional and administrative changes.
