

TESTIMONY ON HB 1045

My name is Bonnie Johnson and I serve as the Cass County Coordinator. In that capacity, I am here today to speak on behalf of the Cass County Board of Commissioners regarding indigent defense...public defender costs and guardian ad litem costs.

For many years, these costs were a part of the budget belonging to the Clerk of County Court and later to the Clerk of District Court. They began at a time when counties had their own court systems...known as County Court. Those court services were merged with the State District Court and ultimately the Clerk of Court became a part of State government, tied directly to the judiciary.

During this consolidation, the payment of indigent defense (public defenders) also became a part of the State's obligation for <u>criminal</u> cases. But, we forgot to change the corresponding sections of law for <u>civil</u> cases. Since the county government has no court system and no clerk of court, the public defender costs and guardian ad litem costs became "homeless". They didn't belong in any budget for any county office. In Cass County, the budget for the public defender costs for civil cases is set at \$35,000 and the Guardian Ad Litem fees for civil cases are set at \$10,000. They are contained in the County Commissioners budget....but they are certainly not expenses of the Board of Commissioners.

In my opinion, our budgeted amounts are, perhaps, the highest in the State. Therefore, we are not talking about a significant amount of money when addressing this issue. However, we detail a toverlook the fact that court costs belong with the court systems.

House Bill 1045 is a result of an interim study by the Judiciary A Committee at which Cass County testified concerning these matters. The bill, as drafted, corrects the deficiencies which were overlooked during court consolidation.

My remaining concern, although I have not personally seen the fiscal note, is that the estimate is much higher than realistic numbers would show. If there are financial concerns about the implementation of this proposed legislation, I would ask that you further review the fiscal note.

The interim committee did a superb job of understanding the complex issues with regard to this subject matter, and I would recommend that you vote "YES" on HB 1045.

Thank you for the opportunity to talk with you about this issue.

House Bill 1045 House Judiciary Committee by Ted Gladden, State Court Administrator

Chair Duane DeKrey and members of the House Judiciary Committee, my name is Ted Gladden and I am the State Court Administrator. I am appearing today regarding House Bill 1045. This bill results from a study conducted by the Interim Judiciary Committee and concerns the cost of indigent defense services for mental illness commitment proceedings and civil commitment of sexual predators, and costs for guardian ad litem services. These costs are currently paid by the county in which the case is venued. This bill represents the last piece of the puzzle in moving the costs of the administration of the courts from the counties to the state. If these costs are moved to the state, all indigent defense services will be provided by state appropriation. In preparation for my testimony, we did contact the counties to find out what the actual costs for these services were. From responses received from county auditors in December 2002, our best estimate is that the costs related to indigent defense services for mental illness commitment proceedings and civil commitment of sexual predators, and costs for guardian ad litem services are about \$390,000 per biennium. Thus, our request is that if these costs are moved from county responsibility to the state that an appropriation to the judiciary be included to cover the costs for the 2003-05 biennium.



Fiscal Note for 1045 - Indigent Defense costs paid by Counties

Attached is the detail by county regarding the indigent defense costs currently being paid by counties. This information was received by the auditor of each county for 2002 and 2001 and an average of these two years was used in the computation.

At the time the fiscal note was prepared we had received information from all but 15 of the smaller counties. An estimate based on the information we had was used for these counties. The eleven largest counties represents 85% of the cost.

Based on the information we now have which includes all but 3 counties, an estimate would be \$398,000. The auditor in Ward county also informed me that he had not included the contract payments of \$18,900 per year that they pay to the indigent defense attorney for providing mental health services. Based on this, the amount would increase by another \$37,800 for a total of \$435,800.

The estimate we used with the information we had at the time the fiscal note was due appears to be conservative, at an estimate of \$390,300 per biennium.

State-Funded Indigent Defense

North Dakota's indigent defense system is administered through the judiciary. As part of the court unification process, although the payment of indigent defense for criminal cases became a state obligation, each of the 53 counties is responsible for funding assigned counsel representation of indigents who are facing mental health commitment proceedings or proceedings for the commitment of sexually dangerous individuals. The county is also responsible for costs associated with the appointment of guardians ad litem for indigents. The committee received information that the counties spend an estimated \$200,000 to \$300,000 per biennium on indigent defense services. In 2001 Cass County spent \$16,000 on indigent defense and \$13,500 on guardian ad litem services; Burleigh County spent \$35,000 on indigent defense and \$10,000 on guardian ad litem services; Grand Forks County spent \$3,942 on indigent defense and \$12,273 on guardian ad litem services; and Stutsman County spent \$15,254 on indigent defense and \$5,000 on guardian ad litem services.

The committee considered a bill draft that provided that the state rather than the counties is responsible for paying the cost of indigent defense for mental illness commitment proceedings, sexual predator commitment proceedings, and for guardian ad litem costs. Testimony in support of the bill draft indicated that not making these indigent defense costs a state responsibility may have been an oversight at the time court unification was implemented. Other testimony indicated that currently these three types of indigent defense services are being provided by the attorneys with whom the state has contracted, but the costs of services are paid by the county. There was no testimony in opposition to the bill draft.

The committee recommended House Bill No. 1045 to provide that the state rather than the counties is responsible for paying for the costs of providing indigent defense for mental illness commitment proceedings, sexual predator commitment proceedings, and for guardian ad litem costs.
