

Corinno Bennett, Adm. of Early Childhood Services of Children and Family Services Division of the Dept. of Human Services appeared in support with written testimony.

Rep. Amerman had concerns with why someone would volunteer for a more extensive background check? Ans: Just to show to the parents that they have gone the extra mile to show that they have a clear background.

Rep. Weisz noted that he has no problem with the language per se, just doesn't sound right of probably cause for child abuse, now we're saying if the division has no record of a determination of services required for child abuse, the sentence is implying and what they are trying to determine or say is child abuse. Further discussion on changing probable cause to services required and a definition of same.

Rep. Weisz has an issue with, when do they actually have to go in and perform services required and what they can define as services required and can change as they see fit.

Also the committee had issues with how much leeway is there in denying or revoking applications based on something as simple as bed time interventions and legal definition of probably cause.

Krista Andrews appeared before the committee for further clarification and definition of "Services Required and Probable Cause".

Rep. Price had concerns with day care providers and allowing them to continue operating if there is any suspicion.

<u>Clarence Daniel</u>, Dir. of Social Services in Stutsman County, Jamestown explained what happens in his dept. and the process.

Rep. Porter feels that if the statute that already deals with child abuse has been changed than it only makes sense that this follows with it do that local county social service agencies at the state looks at these applications and these licenses, that the individuals and the organizations they are licensing have a requirement to report anytime that the county social service organization has put a services requirement against them. Also feels it is imperative to them and the licensing process that they have all the information that is out there.

Rep. Devlin made a motion for a DO PASS, second by Rep. Pollert, 12 - 1 - 0, Rep. Amerman will carry the bill.

Representative Deviln:

Under the direction of (at the time Senator) Wayne Stenehjem, the Legislative Council studied the practice of Child Protective Services (CPS) workers making "probable cause" determinations in CPS cases. The general sentiment was that social workers were making determinations similar to those of law enforcement officials, by making findings of "probable cause" (a term generally confined to criminal cases) of child abuse or neglect. CPS workers were also conducting "investigations" rather than the current practice of conducting "assessments."

in 1995, the law changed, so that CPS social workers conducted "assessments" to determine whether "services were required" (for the protection of an abused or neglected child). This determination focused on what services the CPS system could offer to a child and its parent to help protect the child from future abuse or neglect.

HB 1085, which addresses child care licensing issues, is proposed to reflect the current language and practice used in the CPS system, and is only a housekeeping bill.
