SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if anything can be done if a student receives his "offer of a lifetime" after accepting this scholarship. MS. WIPF answered this is possible but it is understood that the student is tabling all offers until they receive one they want. However, parents are saying that if the offer were made earlier, their student would have accepted it over an out of state school.

SENATOR COOK asked if she thought seniors might not be as motivated once they have been accepted by a college and have the necessary funding. MS. WIPF doesn't see this from the "high achievers", those who will be getting these scholarships.

There was no opposition to HB 1125.

The hearing was closed on HB 1125.

SENATOR LEE moved a DO PASS. Seconded by SENATOR TAYLOR.

SENATOR CHRISTENSON says she feels test scores (standardized testing) alone cannot give a true feel of the student and whether they would be deserving of a scholarship.
