2. Narrative: Identify the aspects of the measure which cause fiscal impact and include any comments relevant to your analysis.

HB1126 would permit the State Board of Higher Education (SBHE) to increase the amount of the student financial assistance grant from \$600 to up to \$1,000 per recipient, if determined necessary by the SBHE. The SBHE would consult the statutory advisory board, which is compromised of public, private and tribal college representatives, a high school counselor and a post secondary student, concerning any changes to the grant award amount.

The student financial assistance grant program (more commonly referred to as the state grant program) currently provides a \$600 grant to students based on financial need. The current 2001-03 funding available for the program is \$2.9 million from general fund, other fund and federal fund sources. At \$600 per recipient, this will support an average of 2,500 students per year in the current 01-03 biennium. During the 2002-03 school year, a total of 32,412 students applied for the grant.

The 2003-05 executive budget recommendation provides a block grant or pooled appropriation for all student grant programs, including the state grant program, to the SBHE for allocation. The block grant funding for all programs for 03-05 represents a hold-even budget (same as 01-03 levels). If one assumes that the SBHE does not reallocate funds between grant programs within the block grant, the state grant program would be able to fund approximately 2,545 grants per year at \$600 per student. If the SBHE chose to increase the grant award to the maximum of \$1,000, as proposed in the legislation, the program would be able to fund approximately 1,525 grants per year in 03-05. The amount of the award will be based, in part, on the level of funding appropriated by the legislature. It is unlikely that the amount of the grant award would be increased if no additional funding is provided.

Minutes: CHAIRMAN FREBORG called the committee to order. Roll Call was taken with all (6) members present.

CHAIRMAN FREBORG opened the hearing on HB 1126 which relates to the maximum amount for student financial assistance program grants.

Testimony in support of HB 1126:

MIKE HILLMAN, Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs for ND University System, presented testimony. (see attached) His testimony also included a graph showing Students Receiving State Grant Dollar Awarded by Institution Type. (see attached). This program is managed by Peggy Wipf.

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if they would go from \$600 to \$1000 to each student or would it be incremental. MR. HILLMAN stated the \$1000 would be the statutory limit that can be awarded. SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if it wouldn't be better to give less dollars to more students. MR. HILLMAN stated they balance the need with the dollars available and he feels this is the best

way to serve students. If the maximum limit is increased, fewer students would receive the dollars, but the <u>most</u> needy would.

SENATOR COOK asked how they determine parental contribution. MR. HILLMAN stated there is a formula based on the federal form and worksheet which helps them obtain the percentage that the parents are responsible for.

SENATOR LEE asked if a student is eligible, do they get the whole \$600. MR. HILLMAN said yes.

SENATOR FREBORG asked about the history of the appropriation for this program. MR. HILLMAN said the funding for the program has been stable for a number of years.

SENATOR COOK asked about the unmet need of a student. He wonders why some have such a greater amount of unmet need. Is it because they are going into a program or field that will take an extensive college education, or is it because they are going to a higher priced private college.

MR. HILLMAN stated that because the priority is the highest unmet need, the students attending private institutions or those needing extensive education would probably have a greater unmet need.

SENATOR LEE asked if there is an average cost per year per student. MR. HILLMAN said usually colleges have a base cost per year listed in their literature.

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if this is only for a four year degree. MR. HILLMAN stated it is only for an undergraduate degree. SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if the applicants have to meet criteria to be eligible. MR. HILLMAN stated they must meet the federal financial aid requirements and he things the state requires the same.

SENATOR TAYLOR asked if this program will give grants to more students attending private institutions. MR. HILMAN stated it probably would because the cost is usually greater.

SENATOR CHRISTENSON asked how the dollars are distributed. MR. HILLMAN stated it is a one time grand and is distributed by semester. SENATOR CHRISTENSON asked if the money goes directly to the student.

PEGGY WIPF, DPI, explained the money goes to the institution and is credited to the student's account. She further explained about the grants.

SENATOR CHRISTENSON swinmed it up as such: If \$1000 is approved, the number of students being helped will decrease from 2500 to 1500.

There was no opposition to HB 1126.

The hearing was closed on HB 1126.

Madam Chairperson and members of the House Education Committee, my name is Peggy Wipf and I am director of financial aid within the North Dakota University

System Office.

House Bill No. 1126 relates to the student financial assistance grant program.

The North Dakota Student Financial Assistance Program (State Grant Program) presently provides a \$600 grant per year to North Dakota residents pursuing their undergraduate degree and who attend North Dakota's public, private, and tribal colleges based upon demonstrated financial unmet need. The purpose of this needs-based grant is to assist students with their cost of attending a North Dakota postsecondary institution. A State Grant also reduces the amount of money a student needs to borrow to pay for their education.


During the 2001-02 academic year, over 33,000 North Dakota students applied for a state grant. The State Grant Program was able to fund 2,482 needy students or roughly 8 percent of the eligible students during 2001-2002 due to the amount of program funding available. For 2001-2002, the greatest unmet need of a State Grant Program recipient was \$10,192 while the average unmet need was \$4,843. Program funding and awards ran out at an unmet need of \$5,934 in 2001-02. In other words, those students demonstrating an unmet need of \$5,934 or less did not receive State Grant support.

Unmet need for this program is calculated as follows: Cost of education minus parent/student expected contribution, minus Federal Pell Grant, minus other resources, e.g., veterans' benefits, equals unmet need.

The suggested change in Section 1 of House Bill 1126 would permit the State
Board of Higher Education (SBHE) to increase the amount of a State Grant from \$600 to

school counselor, and a student, concerning any changes to the grant award amount.
