TESTIMONY

Chairman and committee members, my name is Illona Jeffcoat-Sacco. I am the director of the Public Service Commission's Public Utilities Division. The Public Utilities Division administers the Commission's jurisdiction over telephone, gas and electric public utilities in North Dakota. The commission asked me to appear here today to testify in favor of House Bill 1134, introduced at our request.

House Bill 1134 almost qualifies as housekeeping, but I need to provide a bit of background in order for you to see why.

In the North Dakota telephone business we operate under a regulatory scheme that protects the consumer in the purchase of "essential services." The term essential services is another name for plain old phone service or plain old dial tone. (You can find a specific definition of the term in the beginning of chapter 49-21.) In North Dakota, some of the protections that apply to essential services are price restrictions, price schedule filing requirements, and disconnect protections.

One additional essential services customer protection is the one at issue in this bill, section 49-21-01.4. Today this statute states that even if a

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company offers different "bundles" of services to its customers, with different types of pricing benefits, that company must also offer plain old phone service by itself (unbundled). If a customer wants to buy just essential services, under North Dakota law he or she must be allowed to do so. A phone company cannot require a customer to buy a bundle of services.

A problem developed with this statute because there are some companies that are local service phone companies and technically must comply with this statute, but they do not sell any regular, plain old essential services to anyone. Rather they are local companies that provide data services or access to Internet service providers, for example. These companies should not be under a statutory requirement (and should not be subject to penalty for violation) to provide unbundled essential services when they are not in the business of providing, and indeed, do not provide, any essential services at all. HB 1134 tweaks 49-21-01.4 to accomplish this purpose.
