The hearing resumed after a fresh tape was placed in the recorder. Rep. Thorpe asked that for the record, he be allowed to reiterate his question and comments regarding lines 1-11, and mainly on line 6 of page 3. "If organized labor would that change in the language on that line be taken out of the loop and I understand his reply to be that no that is not the case, that it would be in the loop. That would be our legislative intent, I hope".

Chair Keiser: Sure. There will be no change in the general process in which members were selected and appointed to the board.

Chuck Peterson, Former Chairman of the Workers Compensation Board and chairman of Jobbers Moving & Storage, spoke in favor of all four bills presented by WCB for this legislative session. .(See attached)

Dick Johnson, past board member of WCB, spoke in favor of HB 1150 as presented. His oral testimony addressed the importance of an eleventh member at large. Regarding the state auditor's office and the independent performance audit, during Johnson's term on the board, an internal audit department was established. He believes that particular areas identified by risk assessment should be written in the bid spec for the independent performance audit by the state auditors office. The amended language will cover that and it will assure the legislature that the Bureau is audited successfully.

As no one was present who wished to testify in opposition to HB 1150, the hearing was closed.

SUMMARY OF ACTUARIAL INFORMATION: North Dakota Workers Compensation, together with its actuary, Glenn Evans of Pacific Actuarial Consultants, has reviewed the legislation proposed in this bill in conformance with Section 54-03-25 of the North Dakota Century Code.

The proposed legislation adds an additional at-large member to the Board; makes the Board's medical representative a voting member; shortens Board member terms from 6 years to 4 years; limits terms of office to 3 consecutive 4 year terms; and allows the state auditor, in consultation with the Board, to determine upon which departments an independent performance evaluation is to be conducted.

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee:

My name is Dave Ystebo, and I am Chairman of the North Dakota Workers Compensation Board of Directors. I have had the opportunity to serve as a board member since 1998. As you may well remember, legislation passed in 1997 created a workers compensation board of directors whose members represent employers, employees, and the medical community.

The current board structure has worked well to provide appropriate oversight to ensure NDWC operates efficiently and effectively. We take our obligation to maintain cost-effective operations and a high level of service very seriously.

The board is actively involved in all aspects of Workers Compensation functions, including the planning, preparation and ultimate approval of proposed legislation. The proposed legislation before you received the unanimous approval of the board. On behalf of the board, I request your favorable consideration of House Bill No. 1060, 1065, 1149, and 1150. Brent Edison will follow with a more detailed explanation of each bill.

2003 House Bill No. 1150 Testimony before the House Industry, Business, and Labor Committee Presented by: Brent J. Edison **Executive Director & CEO** North Dakota Workers Compensation January 21, 2003

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee:

My name is Brent Edison and I am Executive Director and CEO of North Dakota Workers Compensation. I am here today to testify in support of 2003 House Bill No.1150. This bill proposes to make the medical representative of the workers compensation board of directors a voting member of the board; to add an at large member to the board; to shorten board members' terms of office from six years to four years; and to change the term limits for board members from two consecutive six-year terms to three consecutive four-year terms. In addition, it allows the state auditor, in consultation with the board, to determine upon which departments an independent performance evaluation is to be conducted. The Workers Compensation Board of Directors unanimously supports this bill. I will briefly address the changes proposed in each section of this bill.

SECTION 1

Background

In 1997, the Legislative Assembly passed 1997 House Bill No. 1440 which created a workers compensation board of directors (65-02.1-03). Pursuant to this legislation, the governor appointed ten members to the board whose terms of office commenced in January 1998. Six members represent employers of various sizes, three members represent employees, and one nonvoting member represents the medical association.

Although the current board structure has worked very well, this bill proposes several enhancements to the existing structure. In May 2002, all board members participated in

a strategic planning retreat to chart a course for the future of the organization. One of the ten goals prioritized was to enhance the board structure. Although several options and configurations were considered, the board unanimously determined the following enhancements were necessary.

Medical representative a voting member

Currently, section 65-02-03.1 designates the medical representative as a nonvoting member, even though the medical representative is requested to attend all board meetings and has much the same responsibilities as the other nine voting members of the board. The medical community is an integral component of any workers compensation system, and the medical representative contributes valuable insight from the medical sector. As a result, the Board of Directors is committed to making the medical representative a voting member of the board.

Additional Member at Large

The addition of a member at large would allow for the recruitment of individuals who possess certain talents and expertise, but who otherwise do not meet the criteria to serve as a board member under existing law. As with the medical representative and the employer representatives, this bill proposes the governor choose the member at large from a list of three candidates submitted by the board.

Decrease in Term of Office

The reason for this proposed change is a six-year commitment is simply too long to ask of board members. In addition, the proposed increase from two consecutive terms to three consecutive terms merely keeps the term limit to twelve years (three four-year terms instead of two six-year terms).

Under the current structure, three or four board members' terms expire on December 31st of each even-numbered year. In order to integrate a new board member (member at large) into the current rotation schedule, but also maintain a reasonable rotation schedule, this legislation will result in five or six board members' terms expiring December 31st of every even-numbered year.

To further make this transition as easy as possible, the medical representative who took office January 1, 2003, and the member-at-large who will take office on August 1, 2003 will only serve three-year terms. Thereafter, the terms of these board members will be four years. Each biennium, various departments are selected for evaluation. However, current law requires the fraud unit and safety programs be evaluated each biennium. The proposed changes in sections two through four of this bill would eliminate the mandatory evaluation of the fraud and safety programs each biennium, and allow the state auditor, in consultation with the board, to determine upon which functions and operations a performance evaluation is most warranted.

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee:

My name is Brent Edison and I am Executive Director and CEO of North Dakota Workers Compensation (NDWC). I am here today to testify in support of Engrossed House Bill No. 1150. This bill proposes to make the medical representative of the workers compensation board of directors a voting member of the board; to add an at large member to the board; to shorten board members' terms of office from six years to four years; to change the term limits for board members from two consecutive six-year terms to three consecutive four-year terms; and will require all NDWC departments. except the special investigations unit, to be evaluated at least once every other biennium. The Workers Compensation Board of Directors unanimously supports this bill as did the House of Representatives (90-0). I will briefly address the changes proposed in each section of this bill.

SECTION 1

Background

In 1997, the Legislative Assembly passed 1997 House Bill No. 1440 which created a workers compensation board of directors (65-02.1-03). Pursuant to this legislation, the governor appointed ten members to the board whose terms of office commenced in January 1998. Six members represent employers of various sizes, three members represent employees, and one nonvoting member represents the medical association.

Although the current board structure has worked very well, this bill proposes several enhancements to the existing structure. In May 2002, all board members participated in

a strategic planning retreat to chart a course for the future of the organization. One of the ten goals prioritized was to enhance the board structure. Although several options and configurations were considered, the board unanimously determined the following enhancements were necessary.

Medical representative a voting member

Currently, section 65-02-03.1 designates the medical representative as a nonvoting member, even though the medical representative is requested to attend all board meetings and has much the same responsibilities as the other nine voting members of the board. The medical community is an integral component of any workers compensation system, and the medical representative contributes valuable insight from the medical sector. As a result, the Board of Directors is committed to making the medical representative a voting member of the board.

Additional Member at Large

The addition of a member at large would allow for the recruitment of individuals who possess certain talents and expertise, but who otherwise do not meet the criteria to serve as a board member under existing law. As with the medical representative and the employer representatives, this bill proposes the governor choose the member at large from a list of three candidates submitted by the board.

Decrease in Term of Office

The reason for this proposed change is a six-year commitment is simply too long to ask of board members. In addition, the proposed increase from two consecutive terms to three consecutive terms merely keeps the term limit to twelve years (three four-year terms instead of two six-year terms).

Under the current structure, three or four board members' terms expire on December 31st of each even-numbered year. In order to integrate a new board member (member at large) into the current rotation schedule, but also maintain a reasonable rotation schedule, this legislation will result in five or six board members' terms expiring December 3!st of every even-numbered year.

To further make this transition as easy as possible, the medical representative who took office January 1, 2003, and the member-at-large who will take office on August 1, 2003 will only serve three-year terms. Thereafter, the terms of these board members will be four years. Other than the term of office of the medical representative who took office January 1, 2003, the proposed four-year term will not impact the terms of office of board members appointed prior to the effective date of this Act.
