

Chairman Flakoll opened the hearing on HB 1192. All members were present.

Representative Metcalf introduced and testified in favor of the bill. (written testimony)

Senator Flakoll asked if a frozen embryo would qualify? (meter # 1967)

Representative Metcalf said he isn't sure. Is it a live animal? A judge would have to decide.

Senator Nichols asked regarding the \$1000 limit, does this take care of that?

Representative Metcalf said the \$1000 limit would still remain in place but the payment to a winner who doesn't want the animal prize would not exceed \$1000, even if the animal was worth more than that.

Senator Flakoll asked for an example.

Representative Metcalf said for example, an organization could raffle off a \$10,000 bull. A Chicago businessman was the winner. He did not have a need for a bull, so he would choose to take \$1000 instead. The bulls stays with the owner.

Senator Flakoll asked if part of the problem is the arbitrary value placed on livestock? Prices would vary from one sale to another?

Representative Metcalf said yes and also that the value of many types of livestock exceeds \$1000 and current code says you can't award more than \$1000.

Senator Klein said we have dealt with this issue for a few sessions. Will this take care if it? It started with 4H in '97 and last session we added buffalo. Are you confident we have it this time? Representative Metcalf said this is a good question. Its a good thing the Cowboy Hall of Fame added horses or we would be back. We have the major species, he thinks.

Darrell Dorgan, Cowboy Hall of Fame, testified in favor of the bill. He thanked the committee for the \$100,000 last session. The Cowboy Hall of Fame has parlayed that into \$2 million, as of yesterday. The donated horse raffle came about because a horse, with saddle and breaking, has been donated to the Cowboy Hall of Fame. They were making preparations to have a raffle when they found out current law wouldn't allow them to do it. If approved, they will have their raffle in Medora in August and think it could be a good money maker for them.

Senator Flakoll asked what they would do if the winner wanted the cash prize?

Mr. Dorgan said they would sell the horse.

Senator Urlacher asked why we list specific animals?

Mr. Dorgan said he has no idea.

Senator Flakoll said it was to avoid raffling bunny rabbits because they might not be cared for properly.

Keith Lauer, director of the gaming division for the Attorney General's office, said they are really neutral on this bill, he will provide some history. (meter # 3035)

In the '97 session, a 4H group wanted live beef and dairy animals for a raffle and it passed with an emergency clause.

In the '01 session, it was expanded to bison, sheep and pigs. The prize has always had to be donated and the value could not exceed the maximum cash award allowed by law. This bill will clean this up. The animal still has to be donated.

Senator Urlacher asked if there are other areas of the code that regulate items for raffle?

Mr. Lauer said the only other restriction is real estate cannot be raffled off. There is a cash limit of \$1000 to any individual or no more than \$3000 from any organization on any one day.

Wade Moser, North Dakota Stockmen's Association, testified in support of the bill. (meter # 3307) This bill will help several breed association in the state as well as the Saddle and Sirloin Club at NDSU. The question about frozen embryos is a good one. The Angus Association has looked at the possibility. They are holding an national conference in North Dakota this fall and they have lots of fund raising ideas.

Senator Urlacher asked if we could be less specific in the bill so we wouldn't have to come back?

Mr. Moser said in reviewing the section of the law, this is not covered under the gambling section but rather under the humane treatment of animals section. This is probably why animals are listed specifically.

Senator Flakoll asked another question of Representative Metcalf. Do all raffles in the state have to apply to a political subdivision?

Mr. Lauer answered the question. There are two ways to have raffles in the state. One is a local permit where the total prizes don't exceed \$6000 per year and the primary prize doesn't exceed \$1000. You get a local permit for this. If prizes exceed \$6000 per year, site authorization is

TESTIMONY SUPPORTING HB 1192 HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES JUDICIARY COMMITTEE JANUARY 28, 2003

Good afternoon Chairman DeKrey and members of the House Judiciary Committee. I am Representative Ralph Metcalf from the new and greater District 24 representing North Dakotans living in 22 townships in Western Barnes County and 10 townships in Northwestern Ransom County.

Don't you just hate it when you have been diligently studying a bill in preparation for a hearing and then someone brings in an amendment. Well, that is what I am doing but I believe that you will like this amendment as all it does is make the bill easier to understand. It puts it into a language that even I can understand so if you will bear with me I will explain HB 1192 using the proposed amendment.

This bill has been filed on behalf of the North Dakota Winter Show to allow them to conduct a raffle with a live animal as the main prize. You can raffle most any kind of merchandise with very few limitations, but current law requires that when a live animal is raffled, the winner must be able to refuse acceptance of the animal and receive a cash payment instead. Now this may not be a problem except that the animals some organizations may desire to raffle may have a value well in excess of \$1,000 which is the maximum cash payment that can be made under another provision of our state raffle laws.

I have given you two pieces of paper that contains the amendment that I talked about earlier. One is the actual proposed amendment and the other is the effect of the proposed amendments to house bill No. 1192. I want to thank Chuck Keller who is a lawyer for the Attorney General in the Gaming Division for making this bill understandable in laymen's language. Chuck read the original bill and offered to rewrite it and I gladly accepted.

As you can see as you read this paragraph, the cash prize will be the LESSER of the market value of the animal or the maximum single cash prize amount allowed by NDCC. This simple correction will allow the Winter Show and other similar livestock industry groups to raffle the quality of animal that is of interest to their customers and breeders and still meet the requirements of the law. I ask that you give this bill favorable consideration and I will try to answer any question you may have.



There will also be extensive exhibits explaining the evolution of the sport of rodeo in North Dakota. We'll tell the story of how the contest of man and animal evolved from the Sunday afternoon match at the ranch corral to today's arenas.

The Hall of Fame will also include galleries of western art and sculpture, a gift shop, and an archival library that will be connected to other libraries nationwide. That connection will allow for extensive historical as well as personal family genealogical research. There will also be ongoing video and hands-on presentations to provide visitors with a true feeling of our great western heritage.

Between interactive videos and live presentations, the story of what made the west unique will be brought to life for the nearly half million people who visit Medora each year...



The Hall of Fame has been the dream of many for years. In 1995, Bismarck educator and former rodeo rider Phil Baird joined forces with western shop owner Evelyn Neuens and the nonprofit North Dakota Cowboy Hall of Fame was born. The cost is estimated at \$3,000,000 and hundreds of people from across the country have pooled their dimes and dollars to begin saving their heritage and history.



TESTIMONY SUPPORTING HB 1192 SENATE AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE MARCH 13, 2003

Good morning Chairman Flakoll and members of the Senate Agriculture Committee. I am Representative Ralph Metcalf from the new and greater District 24 representing North Dakotans living in 22 townships in Western Barnes County and 10 townships in Northwestern Ransom County.

This bill has been filed on behalf of the North Dakota Winter Show to allow them to conduct a raffle with a live animal as the main prize. You can raffle most any kind of merchandise with very few limitations, but current law requires that when a live animal is raffled, the winner must be able to refuse acceptance of the animal and receive a cash payment instead. Now this may not be a problem except that the animals some organizations may desire to raffle may have a value well in excess of \$1,000 which is the maximum cash payment that can be made under another provision of our state raffle laws.

As you can see as you read this bill, the cash prize will be the LESSER of the market value of the animal or the maximum single cash prize amount allowed by NDCC. This simple correction will allow the Winter Show and other similar livestock industry groups to raffle the quality of animal that is of interest to their customers and breeders and still meet the requirements of the law.

This bill was amended in the House of Representatives at the request of another organization to include the raffle of horses in addition to the other species of live animals currently listed in existing code. The North Dakota Winter Show and I have no specific desire in this matter of adding horses to this measure.

I ask that you give this bill favorable consideration and I will try to answer any question you may have.
