

Rep. Weisz has concerns with Ms. Hoesel's rationale and utilization regarding the 12 beds. Response was that the bill would go back to 1999 and what was in place at that time and that was 96 beds.

## TESTIMONY HB 1228-DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES HOUSE HUMAN SERVICES CLARA SUE PRICE, CHAIRMAN

Chairman Price, and members of the Human Service committee, my name is JoAnne Hoesel and I serve as the administrator for children's mental health programs for the Department of Human Services. I am here today to present testimony regarding House Bill 1228. The Department supports the passage of this bill with one recommended amendment to change the moratorium reference date for the number of licensed beds from June 30, 1999 to June 30, 2003.

This bill was introduced to request a continuation of the moratorium placed on the expansion on bed capacity and was set at the number of beds licensed as of June 30, 1999. Since the start of the biennium twelve (12) residential treatment center beds were vacated and thus, the Department of Human Services did not budget for them in the 03-05 budget. The fiscal note sets forth the needed funds to provide services for these twelve (12) RTC beds. No additional funding is needed if the bed capacity in the moratorium were set at the number of licensed beds as of June 30, 2003 rather than June 30, 1993. This would reflect the current number of licensed RTC beds which is 84. Attachment A lists the current residential treatment centers and their current licensed bed capacity. Attachment B is a document which provides rationale for the suggested amendment.

The number of group and residential child care facility (RCCF) beds was 289 as of June 30, 1999. As of the most recent licensing (July 1, 2002) the licensed bed count is 288. Attachment C lists the current licensed group home and residential child care facilities.

### DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT CENTER SUPPORT FOR 84-BED CAPACITY

Occupancy rate. According to the Medicaid program statistics, it appears that residential treatment facilities will continue to have open beds in the future. Projections indicate that overall occupancy rates will be less than 90% in the coming biennium even taking into consideration other payer sources.

Eight Rivers Utilization. Eight Rivers did not admit additional youth starting in September 2001 and had 1 - 3 youth in that facility through July 2002 at which time this facility was closed and the children were served on the children and adolescent psychiatric unit at the ND State Hospital. This indicates that the absence of these beds did not have a major negative impact on the system. Alex Schweltzer states that the average daily census of the child & adolescent unit at the ND State Hospital is twelve (12).

<u>Foster Care utilization rates.</u> Numbers of children in foster care in federal fiscal year 2000 were 1,978 and in FFY 2001 were 1,929. A decrease of 49 children.

Out of state Placements. Placements of children into out of state facilities in July were at 38 children. This is compared to 47 children at that time in 2001. In December of 2002 there were 33 children in out of state facility care.

<u>Community options</u>. Additional PATH beds were added to the system to accommodate an increase for those who through the CON process were not approved for RTC level of care.

Collectively, the items above lead to the support of a decrease of RTC beds from 96 to 84.
