Minutes: **Chairman Kelsch** opened hearing bill.

Rep Hawken: A group has brought by a number of school districts bring their concerns. What we ask for from the state is helpful to everyone. These bills will address this.

Dan Huffman, Assistant Superintendent for the Fargo School District, See Attached Testimony

Rep. Sitte How many days?

Huffman: Our day exceeds the minimum by 45 minutes. By gaining back this flexibility will allow us to this at the end of every day or with the permission from Department of Public Instruction to have a half day for professional development each month.

Rep. Mueller In the bill we have 951 1/2 hours of instruction time for elementary and 1038 for high school. In your situation, what is that in terms of days?

Huffman: I don't have that calculation in front of me. What we are saying is that when we exceed those hours we would like to have the flexibility to request through the Department of Public Instruction the ability to use those additional hours for professional development. We

would never decrease the instructional time to kids to below the state minimum, but we have more hours in our calendar to do some 1/2 day early dismissals for teacher development.

Rep. Jon Nelson The time that you would be using for this instructional time would not come at the expense of the current class room activities, is that correct?

Huffman. That is correct. But we believe that allowing us to have that flexibility to do some professional development with our teachers to prepare for the new assessments and NCLB. We are going from a text book based science program at the elementary to a hands on kit based program. What we have seen so far with our kids is the knowledge level of the kid with respect to science has increased dramatically. That is a huge change for our teachers. In short of the state providing additional resources to us to extend our school year or to provide us with a means of actually add days to our contracts, this is one way we can take what we have at the present time, use a portion of that time for development activities and enhance what happens in the classroom for our kids when they come back.

Rep. Sitte You would take that 45 minutes times five days you are going to have at least a half day a week, you would have another day each month, 9 days of professional development during the school year in Fargo. That will be more than what is in other schools.

Huffman: Yes, that is the maximum. What I'm asking to do is independent of the Department of Public Instruction. Whatever we are asking for as part of 1294 still has to be submitted to the Department of Public Instruction through the wavier process for approval. Actually what we are talking about is the capability to do three or four early dismissals during the year so that we can do some improved professional development with our staff.

Gerald Christenson, retired school administrator, currently a consultant to school districts on school improvements. Directly related to the issues that will be in NCLB and the addressing the laws for the requirement for school improvement in the state. The issue that I run into, primarily in the small school districts, is time for the teachers to get together to do the tasks in their group, to meet the requirements of school improvement that ultimately impact NCLB. it is a real issue for schools that don't have contracts with teachers who are greater than 180 days. Teachers are wanting to be compensated. To do most activities takes about two hours of time. Some schools meet in the morning and late in the evening, when they are tired, and hen it is not as fruitful. There needs to be some kind of vehicle to accomplish this.

Wisconsin and South Dakota example.

In my experience we have the mentality that the only time teachers are doing anything good for kids is when they have kids in front of them. I can tell you that the time we enable teachers to get together and discuss how they are teaching and to work on improving teaching, reaches greater benefit per hour than the time they spend in front of kids. I would encourage your support.

Rep. Sitte BHS, all the elementary school, 1 day a month will have a sub so the teachers can get together for training. Are we talking about hiring subs to fill in or students released to go home and working mothers have a problem?

Christenson: There are times that schools do have subs and start at 7:30 and go to noon. or dismissing early at 1:30. It is my experience for teachers to concentrate after a long day.

I do agree that this bill will provide some flexibility. Ideally we would like to see additionally funded days for teachers professional development. It is true that the day is very full for people.

And many of them are asked to serve on many committees for the support of education. But there is time that is needed to do this. I reorganize that any early dismissal would be difficult for parents who are working. But given enough time I feel that arrangements can be made. I doubt that school districts would do this with out a great deal of thought and planning. Teachers do need time to reflect and talk to each other. At the middle school schedule, most of those schedule do allow some time. However there are many teachers who only have time to meet in the hall or the staff room. To fully plan for children, teachers are going to need the time to talk and spend more time in some kind of development.

Rep. Herbel What was the rational that this was lost during the last session, and why are we bringing it back?

Sand: I can't speak for Senator Freborg. But I believe that he felt very strongly about student/teacher contact time.

Rep Nelson Was at least a perceived abuse by some schools, in using the flexibility for other extracurricular activities. Now we are going back. We've talked about a lot of things, but what about the student/teacher contact time? I would rather fund a couple of extra days for school, that to lessen the contact hours.

Sand: I agree with you. If you would like to amend this bill to say that the additional time can only be used for certain things. I concur with the student/teacher contact hours.

Rep. Sitte: 180 days paid, teachers need 172 contact days. Am I right. Are there not eight days built in now?

Sand: Most school calendars are 180 days. 3 holidays, 2 days for parent/teachers conference, and two professional development effort. So there is a minimum of 173 contact days. Some school districts exceed this.

Rep. Norland 5 1/2 hours for elementary instruction and high school 6 hours. Generally speaking, schools exceed that, it is almost impossible to get everything in that Department of Public Instruction requires. there ought to be time for in service for teachers, but still have the approval of Department of Public Instruction. I don't want to see an amendment.

Discussion: Rep. Sitte As I recall, they could stock up 45 minutes a day, at least 9 more days, reducing the student contact time. This is what it is all about, teachers and student being together learning. They don't need any more time away from the students at their expense.

Rep. Mueller How do we begin to address the issue of having more time for professional development. Some place some time we will have to deal with this issue.

Rep. Norland the Department of Public Instruction already requires schools to have 5 1/2 hours and 6 1/2 hours each day for elementary, secondary respectfully. I doubt if there is a school in ND that isn't going beyond that. Teachers need instruction time for professional development, Department of Public Instruction has to approve dates for all activity. I think this is a good idea, a way to get that in. At least a 1/2 day for that development.

Minutes: CHAIRMAN FREBORG called the committee to order. Roll Call was taken with all (6) members present.

CHAIRMAN FREBORG opened the hearing on HB 1294 relating to the reconfiguration of instructional days for schools.

Testimony in support of HB 1294:

REPRESENTATIVE KATHY HAWKIN, Dist 46, spoke in support of the bill. This bill deals with professional development. It allows districts that have additional classroom hours of instruction over what are required, to allow them to use the hours for staff development.

CHARLES DEREMER, Fargo Public Schools, presented testimony. (see attached)

SENATOR LEE asked if the \$3.9 million, listed on the DPI fact sheet (see Exhibit A) is used for professional development. MR. DEREMER replied that the money in his district is used for professional development, but much of that is for substitute teacher pay. He would prefer to use the money for summarizing, provide materials for the classroom improvement, whether it be

technology or whatever, and do additional training in the summertime. He feels \$3 million would not go far with the total teaching staff in the Fargo district of 10,000. Most administrators would say there is not enough money or time for professional development. In his district, about 40% is used for substitutes and 20% is used for expenses and 20% for mileage. Very little money goes to the districts for actual development.

SENATOR FALKOLL stated this bill applies to grade school (K - 6) as to hours of instructional time. He asked what about the high school instructional time. MR. DEREMER stated it would be the same concept only ½ hour more instructional time per day.

SENATOR FREBORG asked where the extra minutes go. MR. DEREMER stated the intent is they are to be used for class time. Some schools were grandfathered in when the last legislative session adopted the current statute. These schools were allowed to put in a little less time than the Fargo district, and because they had started doing "early releases" before current law, they are still allowed to do it. This is where the Fargo district feels there is an inequity, because they put in more time over the course of a year and cannot use that "extra" time for anything but class time.

SENATOR COOK asked to what degree is staff development attached to teacher evaluation.

MR. DEREMER stated their school has just started doing this. It is not part of the formal process or the evaluation yet but it will be incorporated in the future.

There was discussion on performance pay. MR. DEREMER stated it is in the talking stages and he feels it will move along and make a difference.

SENATOR CHRISTENSON asked how the staff development is being done. MR. DEREMER replied that it is 80% pedagogy and 20% content. He stated that with the implementation of NCLB, the percentages may change.

NANCY SAND, NDEA, stated their support for the bill. She stated "early closing" has been used for a variety of reasons. She feels professional development is important and time constraints exist in all districts.

There was no opposition to HB 1294.

ANITA DECKER, DPI, spoke to clarify some points. (see attached testimony).

SENATOR CHRISTENSON asked what the waivers for Fargo and Grand Forks are for. MS.

DECKER stated she would provide her with a copy.

There being no further testimony, the hearing was closed on HB 1294.

SENATOR COOK explained why he would vote for a Do Pass. He feels the key to this bill is the reconfiguration of the "number of instructional days" not of a particular day. He feels the passage of this bill would allow a school that has more hours than required for instructional purposes, to have school four days a week, not have school on Friday, and have continuing education instead on that day. What keeps a school from doing this now is the language that they want to remove which does not reduce the hours of instructional time that the school had the previous year.

SENATOR LEE said that a school could add 10 minutes a day or cut each class per day in order to get that day off. SENATOR COOK stated they could do that.

SENATOR CHRISTENSON reminded the committee that Anita Decker would bring to the committee the applications for waivers from Fargo and Grand Forks. SENATOR CHRISTENSON asked what happened with the time lost to the eastern school districts that lost time during the floods a few years ago.

More discussion by the committee on extending days etc. They also asked what can a school do now to provide an extra professional time day.

SENATOR COOK stated that in reading the testimony over again, it states that the intent of the legislation is not to bank time.

The committee did receive a copy of century code relating to the **reconfiguration of instructional days , State Agency summaries after action reports for the 1997 flood disaster, and a fall calendar summary report** of the schools in ND. (see attached).

SENATOR FREBORG stated he had talked to Dr. Charles DeRemer. The intent of this bill is to take two hours or so and alternate or rotate with morning and afternoon classes and they would perhaps start school later. These would be several options. He further stated the intent is not to take away from the teacher/pupil contact time.

SENATOR CHRISTENSON had received reports from Grand Forks which proposes early release on Fridays and alternating Fridays. She stated that usually the same classes take the shortage of time even if the administration works hard at a rotation.

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if the districts would still have to be approved by DPI to do this reconfiguring of classes. SENATOR FREBORG stated yes.

SENATOR FLAKOLL stated there is a stop/gap on some of their concerns because DPI has to approve any alterations.

SENATOR FLAKOLL said should there be a sunset clause on this requiring DPI to report to the next legislative session on this?

There was discussion from the committee, which said DPI must report to the interim committee what waivers are requested and what action is taken. The committee looked at century code, chapter 15, dealing with what statute says about waivers.

SENATOR LEE said the intent is to provide more time for the teachers so that time can be used for professional development.

SENATOR COOK stated he would be willing to make a motion to DO PASS. More Discussion.

SENATOR COOK moved a DO PASS. Seconded by SENATOR FLAKOLL.

Roll Call Vote: 3 YES. 3 NO. 0 ABSENT. MOTION FAILS.

The committee feels there is merit on both sides of this issue. SENATOR COOK feels with the reporting mechanism there is a check on the districts.

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if the legislature should put restrictions on time that is over the minimum required. SENATOR CHRISTENSON commented that so often it seems the administration is trying to manipulate.

SENATOR LEE moved a DO NOT PASS. Seconded by SENATOR CHRISTENSON.

Minutes: CHAIRMAN FREBORG called the committee to order with all members present.

ANITA DECKER, DPI, explained waivers. March 1 is the deadline to apply and April 15 is the deadline for the reply. This is the first year they have gone through the process since the Rules were adopted. There are criteria to follow in the approval process. Among the things they look for are anything that refers to innovation in the use of instructional time. Many schools think that is strictly professional development, but there may be other things they can do as well. The innovation should be based on some kind of plan, whether its been flaunted nationally or regionally. They try to look at student achievement. They also look at special development as a means to student achievement. They have received two proposals for next year.

SENATOR CHRISTENSON asked if block scheduling would be considered innovative.

SENATOR COOK asked if the rules would be changed with the passage of HB 1294. MS.

DECKER said if the law changes, DPI would be forced to change or amend the administrative rules.

SENATOR COOK asked what happens if a school is not given a waiver, what is the recourse.

MS. DECKER replied first the superintendent reviews their request for reconsideration, then DPI has 3 weeks to reply, then the district has 3 weeks to reply. Ultimately, the final word is with DPI, or the superintendent.

SENATOR COOK asked if DPI is required to report the requests for waivers to a special committee, such as the interim committee. MS. DECKER replied yes. She stated that up to now, the department has never issued a waiver on instructional time. They have never received a request for one. They have had requests for waivers of accreditation.

SENATOR FREBORG asked why did schools extend class time in the first place. MS.

DECKER replied to improve students. SENATOR FREBORG asked why do the schools now believe they are being penalized for extending instructional time.

SENATOR FLAKOLL stated a school can reduce their hours of instruction. They will lose a year and then they can build again. A school has to report to DPI they are going to reduce their instructional days, but do not need their approval as long as they meet the minimum required.

SENATOR FREBORG asked if there is anything in statute that would allow for less than the minimum number of instructional days.

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked how the lost time was dealt with when Grand Forks and Fargo had the flood in 1997. Documents were provided later. (see attached).

The report would be "after the fact" to the interim committee. There was further discussion on the amount of instructional time and why the time was increased in the first place. SENATOR FLAKOLL feels professional development gives teachers ways to enhance their teaching and be better at their profession. This would give a district the chance to give two days to the teachers for professional development.

SENATOR COOK asked if this removes the requirement that it gets approved by the Supt. of public instruction. Does this allow the district to make an adjustment to their school calendar on their own, without going through the process. SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if this would be more palatable if there were a percent of total number of days instead of the two days.

SENATOR COOK asked why create a new section to Ch. 15.1-06. He believes this would be free standing and would not require the reporting process.

House Bill 1294 gives back to school districts some flexibility in use of our school calendar that was lost during the last session. It will allow school districts that have hours above and beyond the state requirement to use those hours for professional development activities. Senator Freborg and Members of the Committee,

My name is Charles DeRemer. I am Assistant Superintendent of Instructional Services for the Fargo Public Schools. I am speaking in support of HB 1294. The current law is restrictive, inequitable, and a roadblock to improved student learning. I feel that the elimination of paragraph 2, lines 17-20 would benefit staff, increase student learning and save districts money.

Background:

The current statute requires all elementary schools to provide a minimum of 951.5 hours of instruction annually. The Fargo School District currently provides 1038 hours of instruction annually. Even though we exceed the minimum requirement by nearly 2.5 weeks, we are not allowed to use any of the time for professional development for staff. We do not suggest that any school be allowed to provide less than the minimum under any circumstance. However, those schools that do exceed the minimum requirement should be given the latitude to design a calendar that meets the approval of their board and community.

The suggested Bill would also save districts money. In a time where money must be closely scrutinized, any efforts that would improve student learning while saving districts money is a win-win situation for everyone. To release all of our teachers for one day each year would cost the district \$68,000. By merely minor changes in our calendar, we could release all of our teachers at one time, thereby saving the costs of substitutes.

Research is clear in telling us that well-trained teachers make a difference in improving student achievement. It seems to only make sense that we should support ideas that help students while saving districts money.

Chairperson Freborg and members of the committee:

My name is Anita Decker. I am the director of School Approval and Accreditation for the Department of Public Instruction. The Department wants to clarify what this statute means in terms of school calendar. *Some misconception exists*

NDCC 15.1-06-04 specifies that each school must provide 173 full days of instruction. A full day is defined as at least 5½ hours for elementary students and at least 6 hours for high school students.

The statute under consideration in this legislation, NDCC 15.1-06-05 does not change the requirement for 173 full days of instruction. We do not believe that the intent of this legislation is to "bank time" resulting in less pupil/teacher contact time than that required by statute. Rather it states that any school that meets the minimum school time may reconfigure that time by applying for a waiver if the waiver encourages innovation, provides improved education opportunities, or enhanced academic opportunities, provides for greater flexibility in the use of a school by current students, provides for greater flexibility in the use of a school by individuals or groups other than current students, or results in significant cost-savings to the district.

The Department has received two requests for the 2003-2004 school year for waivers under this statute—one from Fargo, the other from Grand Forks.

State Agency Summaries of After Action Reports for the 1997 Flood Disaster

1294

North Dakota Aeronautics Commission

During the winter and spring disasters of 1997, the Aeronautics Commission provided air transportation for state agency personnel. The Aeronautics Commission was most often required to respond on short notice, therefore, it was necessary for the commission to stay updated on the weather reports and airport conditions. In the future, the Aeronautics Commission would like to see airports/air transportation utilized more in the overall disaster emergency plan because many times travel by air is the only transportation available.

North Dakota Association of Counties

As a stable grass roots form of government, volunteer counties provide numerous services, which establish the framework that help society to function. The disaster conditions of 1997 caused counties to stretch their budgets even further to meet the demands of these extreme conditions. The disasters had the largest impact on three integral county service areas: rural transportation, social services, and public safety. It is in these areas that counties experience the greatest costs and management difficulties in times of disasters. Although federal and state assistance helps cover a certain percentage of the initial cost impacts, counties are responsible to cover remaining costs using their own resources with property taxing authority virtually frozen at current levels.

The North Dakota Association of Counties developed two programs to directly help those counties affected by flooding. The Counties Helping Counties program was a way for counties in need of goods or services to get in contact with other counties who could provide services. The other program, the County Employee Relief Fund, was designed to allow county employees to make tax-deductible monetary donations directly to flood-affected county employees.

Based on survey data from 30 counties, it has been projected that total response costs were approximately \$11 million and recovery costs will be in excess of \$18.7 million. These figures, however, do not include any major facility reconstruction or demolition costs.

North Dakota Department of Agriculture

Agriculture, North Dakota's number one industry, has suffered the largest blow of any sector of the state's economy at the hands of Mother Nature during the winter and spring of 1996-97. More than 123,000 head of cattle perished, over five million pounds of milk were destroyed, and close to one million acres of prime farmland were left unplanted as a result of the winter storms and spring flooding that ravaged the State.

Farmers and ranchers not only experienced livestock and crop production losses, but suffered damage to farm buildings, machinery, and stored crops. Direct losses to farmers and ranchers totaled more than \$250 million, with estimated additional indirect losses

Central Supply, Purchasing, and Surplus property. During the flood, Central Duplicating provided on demand services for necessary printed materials and forms. Surplus Property focused on obtaining sandbags, food supplies, and generators to help cope with the emergency flood needs. The Surplus Property operation organized and purchased 482,000 sandbags from Japan. State Purchasing prioritized and handled emergency purchases for state agencies.

Central Personnel's primary role in the flood was to help coordinate benefits information and to recommend the use of special benefits for employees within affected agencies. Central Personnel responded to the Governor's Office request for assistance with an overall policy direction on employee needs by preparing information and recommendations for a statewide policy.

The State Radio Communications is covered in a separate section.

North Dakota State Plumbing Board

Immediately after the Red River inundated the City of Grand Forks, the North Dakota State Plumbing Board, in cooperation with the State Health Department and local city governments, provided assistance with bringing on-line the potable water and waste water systems. After residents were able to return to their homes and begin rebuilding, the State Plumbing Board provided technical assistance to local plumbers.

Department of Public Instruction

After Grand Forks was evacuated, the Department of Public Instruction immediately requested that all North Dakota school districts accept flood displaced children as resident students for the balance of the 96-97 school term and assured school districts that they would receive foundation aid for flood displaced students enrolled at their schools. The Department also made an agreement with education officials in Minnesota and South Dakota to admit flood displaced students to their schools regardless of their state of residence.

The Department's food distribution office worked to arrange delivery and allocation of commodity foods that were donated by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). This food was distributed to the Red Cross and Salvation Army, which together provided more than 1.3 million meals during the duration of the flooding disaster.

The Department received a waiver from the USDA on the application process for children applying for free meal benefits. As a result, all flood-displaced children were allowed to receive free breakfasts and lunches at host schools for the duration of the 1996-97 school year without the need to submit an application. This resulted in about 2,600 children receiving 2,621 free breakfasts and 40,567 free lunches in April and May of 1997.

North Dakota Secretary of State

The living history project is supported by a donation of software and equipment from Apple Computer and a challenge grant from the Department of Education.

Schafer says he'll stick to make-up day formula

BISMARCK — Gov. Ed Schafer said Wednesday he will not change his policy on forgiving missed school days.

Many schools have canceled classes due to weather this year, prompting several superintendents to ask Schafer to forgive those days so they don't have to be made up, said Schafer's spokeswoman, Julie Liffbrig.

The governor uses a formula to decide which days will be forgiven. Schools must make up the first two days of school that are called off. Those days already are built into school calendars.

The formula allows schools to be forgiven their third missed day. But they must make up their fourth missed day. The fifth and sixth can be forgiven, and after that, the governor will forgive every other day that is missed.

So far, 108 schools have asked the governor to forgive missed school days.

"A fair number are asking for forgiveness of days above and beyond the formula," Liffbrig said. "There's been a lot of different requests to alter the formula this way or that way.... But he thinks it's important to just stick by the formula. It works."

Mark Sanford, the Grand Forks superintendent, said administrators should all be clear about the governor's policy. "We each got a mailing a couple of months ago," he said.

Schafer is encouraging superintendents to do whatever is needed to help communities deal with blizzards and flooding. He said schools and their students should help conserve power, sandbag and do other things, even if it means calling off school.

Schafer said schools will be forgiven the days allowed in the formula, and should try to make up the others. If they need more days forgiven, he will consider that later in the school year.

UND plans recovery

■ University System
official promise business
as usual this fall

The University of North Dakota will be open as usual next fall, North Dakota University System officials promise.

And its summer session will begin May 12, even if fewer students than normal enroll.

"We will do everything possible to have that university operating in the fall," University System Chancellor Larry Isaak said Thursday.

UND President Kendall Baker and Isaak told the state Board of Higher Education, meeting at Bismarck State College, about damage at UND after flood water moved onto campus last weekend.

"I have been stunned beyond belief," Isaak said.

The top University System priority, he added, is to make sure employees receive their paychecks. To do that, the system's mainframe computer had to be moved from Grand Forks to North Dakota State University in Fargo. It began working Thursday afternoon and officials said they hoped paychecks for the 12,000 higher education employees would start to be printed Thursday night.

Isaak told board members Gov. Ed Schafer

expects federal funds to pay disaster-related costs. The board gave UND authority to bypass state law and sign emergency repair contracts without going through the competitive bidding process.

Baker said he expects a "virtual university" to be set up by Monday. School officials will be available to answer questions from students, faculty, staff and others by calling 1-800-225-3863 or 1-800-342-8230. Information also is available on the World Wide Web at www.ndak.edu.

"Our obligation and responsibility are to move forward," Baker said.

Part of that obligation is to help the rest of Grand Forks recover from the state's worst-ever flood. State emergency officials have asked the University System to be a leader in recovery efforts.

The university already hosts the Grand Forks emergency operation center and other flood-related offices. Officials expect UND to house up to 5,000 flood evacuees, possibly for months.

UND officials are just now beginning to assess damage, as water begins to fall. At the flood's height, nearly half of the campus was under water, several feet deep in places.

Baker said he has no damage estimate — although he expects it to be in the "tens of millions of dollars" — and does not know how many buildings are extensively damaged. Even buildings which were not flooded need to be cleaned because of sewage backups.

The most severely damaged building appears

to be the medical school, Baker said. Chemicals in the building mean it needs more clean-up than others on campus, he added.

Baker said he expects next school year to be normal, although he admitted fall enrollment may be down. Enrollment for summer school also is expected to be less than expected.

Classes have been dismissed for the semester due to the flood, but Baker said potential students still toured the campus last Saturday at the height of the flood.

Some fall classes and other activities may have to be moved to new locations, Baker said. But, he said, it is too early to know any details. Baker also said:

■ UND is "coming along reasonably well identifying where everybody is." School workers — like all state employees displaced due to flooding — are to let supervisors know where they can be reached.

■ It is too early to tell if some research projects were lost due to lack of electricity. Two professors are baby-sitting an electric generator around the clock to provide power for their project, as an example of what UND faculty members are doing to save their work.

■ A full-page advertisement is due to appear in major North Dakota newspapers Sunday giving UND employees and students flood information.

■ Commencement is planned for August for both May and August graduates. "We will view it as a major celebration."

Apple engineers and network specialists are installing 20-person computer labs at the two Grand Forks schools, Twiney Elementary, and the C.B. Eilson School, that escaped damage in the flood. Both are located outside the city on Grand Forks Air Force Base, which has served as a community hub for emergency activities since the disaster struck.

67-15-02-01. Definitions. For purposes of this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:

1. "Applicant" means a school seeking approval for reconfiguration of instructional days.
2. "Curricular instruction", as used in subsection 2 of North Dakota Century Code section 15.1-06-04, means the actual class period, including study hall, but does not include time to pass between classes, lunch periods, or other time that is not devoted directly to student instruction.
3. "Department" means the North Dakota department of public instruction.
4. "School" means a public school located in North Dakota and subject to the regulatory authority of the state of North Dakota.
5. "Superintendent" means the North Dakota superintendent of public instruction.

67-15-02-02. Eligibility for reconfigured school calendar. Upon approval by the superintendent, any school may reconfigure the number of school days required by North Dakota Century Code section 15.1-06-04 if the reconfiguration complies with this chapter and North Dakota Century Code sections 15.1-21-03, 15.1-21-04, and 15.1-06-03.

of the administrator and board chairman, and the information that is responsive to the considerations to be made by the superintendent, including how the proposed reconfigured calendar relates to the criteria listed in section 67-15-02-05. At a minimum, each applicant shall include the following in the application:

1. The goals and objectives of the reconfiguration program;
2. Documentation of community input into the proposed program, including written correspondence on the subject, summaries of oral contacts, and a summary of any discussions at public meetings or hearings;
3. A cost-benefit study, including potential for savings in transportation and energy costs;
4. The number of hours of instructional time for the most recent school year completed prior to the application;
5. A proposed school calendar that will assure high school students will receive one thousand thirty-eight hours of instructional time and elementary students will receive nine hundred fifty-one and one-half hours of instructional time;
6. A class schedule for each grade level;
7. A contingency plan for makeup days and allowances for storms and other school closings;
8. A professional development plan; and
9. An evaluation plan, including specific plans to evaluate:
 - a. Student performance;
 - b. Student use of facilities;
 - c. Community use of facilities;
 - d. The success rate of any innovations;
 - e. The change in educational opportunities for students;
 - f. The change in academic opportunities for students; and

9. Any costs savings attributable to the reconfiguration, including savings in staffing, energy, transportation, and maintenance costs.

3. The superintendent will review each application and approve, approve with modifications as provided under section 67-15-02-06, or deny the application.
4. Notice of the superintendent's decision will be mailed by first-class mail to the applicant on or before April fifteenth of the year prior to the year for which a reconfigured school calendar is sought.

67-15-02-05. Evaluation of applications. Each application for a reconfigured school calendar must be evaluated by the superintendent using the following criteria:

1. The impact of the reconfiguration plan on the period of instructional time. Under this criterion the superintendent will consider:
 - a. Whether the period of instructional time for elementary students under the proposed plan is equal to or greater than the period of instructional time for elementary students during the previous school year;
 - b. Whether the period of instructional time for high school students under the proposed plan is equal to or greater than the period

of instructional time for high school students during the previous school year;

- c. Whether the elementary students will receive at least nine hundred fifty-one and one-half hours each year under the plan; and
 - d. Whether the high school students will receive at least one thousand thirty-eight hours of instructional time.
2. The superintendent must also find one of the following to be a likely result of the reconfiguration:
- a. That the proposed plan encourages innovation. Under this criterion the superintendent will consider:
 - (1) Educational trends relevant to the proposed reconfiguration;
 - (2) Research relevant to the proposed reconfiguration; and
 - (3) The likelihood that instructional staff will develop and use innovative means of instruction.
 - b. That the proposed plan will improve educational opportunities for students. Under this criterion the superintendent will consider:
 - (1) Educational opportunities available to students under the existing configuration; and
 - (2) Educational opportunities available to students if the reconfiguration plan is adopted.
 - c. That the proposed plan will enhance the academic opportunities of the students attending the school. Under this criterion the superintendent will consider:
 - (1) Academic opportunities available to students under the existing configuration; and
 - (2) Academic opportunities available to students if the reconfiguration plan is adopted.
 - d. That the proposed plan will allow current students greater flexibility in the use of the school facilities. Under this criterion the superintendent will consider:
 - (1) Existing facility use by current students;
 - (2) The flexibility in use of school facilities available to current students under the existing configuration; and

- (3) The flexibility in use of school facilities available to current students if the reconfiguration plan is adopted.
- e. That individuals or groups other than current students will have greater flexibility in the use of the school facilities. Under this criterion the superintendent will consider:
- (1) Existing facility use by individuals and groups other than current students;
 - (2) The flexibility in use of school facilities available to individuals or groups other than current students under the existing configuration; and
 - (3) The flexibility in use of school facilities available to individuals or groups other than current students if the reconfiguration plan is adopted.
- f. That the reconfiguration plan will result in significant cost-savings to the district applying. Under this criterion the superintendent will consider:
- (1) Present costs of the district;
 - (2) Proposed reductions in the district's costs; and
 - (3) The difference between the present costs to the district and the proposed costs under the reconfigured plan will be considered significant if the present costs are anticipated to exceed the proposed costs by forty dollars per student.

67-15-02-06. Modifications to applications. At any time prior to March first of the year prior to the school year the proposed reconfiguration plan is to take effect, an applicant may submit additional information to the superintendent for consideration as part of the application.

67-15-02-07. Term of reconfiguration - Application for extension. If approved, a school's reconfiguration plan is valid for one year. A school may request the superintendent to extend the reconfiguration plan for one additional year. A request for extension will be granted only if:

1. The application for extension is received by the superintendent prior to July first of the year after the year in which the reconfiguration was implemented;
2. The school followed the reconfiguration plan as approved by the superintendent; and
3. The school can demonstrate:
 - a. The requisite number of instructional hours for elementary and high school students has been delivered;
 - b. The instructional hours during the reconfigured school year were at least equal to the instructional hours in the prior year; and
 - c. During the reconfigured year either:
 - (1) Innovation occurred in the school;
 - (2) Enhanced educational or academic opportunities were provided to the students;
 - (3) There was greater flexibility in the use of the school by students, nonstudents, or organizations; or
 - (4) The school had substantial financial savings as a result of the reconfiguration.

A reconfiguration may also be granted if a school demonstrates that the program has not resulted in a negative outcome in any of the four evaluation criteria set out in subsection 3 and more time is needed to assure a sufficient evaluation period.

67-15-02-08. Reconsideration. If the applicant's request for reconfiguration of the school calendar program is denied, the denial must be in writing. The denial must state the reason for the denial. The notice of denial must be mailed to the applicant at the address provided for in the application and must include a notice of the opportunity to request a reconsideration. A request for reconsideration must be in writing and must be received by the superintendent within three weeks of the date of mailing by the department. Late requests for reconsideration will not be considered. The reconsideration request must state the following:

1. The facts, law, or rule the applicant believes was erroneously interpreted or applied; and

2. The applicant's arguments on how the facts, law, or rule should have been applied, giving specific reasons and thorough analysis.

The superintendent of public instruction shall issue a final written response on the reconsideration request within three weeks after receiving a complete reconsideration request.

2. The enhanced educational and academic opportunities for students;
3. Any innovations resulting from the reconfiguration of the school calendar;
4. The use of school facilities by students;
5. The use of school facilities by nonstudents and organizations;
6. Any cost-savings attributable to the reconfiguration; and
7. Any modifications to the approved reconfiguration program.
