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SENATOR JUDY LEE opened the public hearing for HB 1306 relating to misrepresentation as to status as an emergency medical services personnel.

REPRESENTATIVE TODD PORTER, from District 34, introduced HB 1306. This bill puts into code a penalty for misrepresentation of one's self as an emergency medical technician. ...

Instances where people have not kept up their certification to help a person as an EMT, getting in front of an actual certified EMT ... actual cases documented ... Questions and discussion with committee ... (Tape 1, Side A, Meter # 5812 - end and Side B, Meter 0 - 140)

REPRESENTATIVE SEVERSON testified in support of the bill. This is a public safety issue.

The North Dakota EMS Association supports HB 1306 for an amendment to prohibit misrepresentation as an EMS person, and to provide a penalty.

Even though this has not been a great problem in North Dakota to date, we have had individuals in the past who have held themselves out as an EMS provider. In one case, an individual photocopied an EMT card from another certified EMT, typed his name on the card and began applying for EMS jobs around the state. This individual was never certified or licensed as an EMS provider.

In another case, a person who formerly served as an EMT more than 10 years ago held herself out to members of a racing organization and provided medical care during their racing events. Their insurance rider required a certified or licensed EMT. She was no longer credentialed to perform such duties.

And in yet another case, a person who came to North Dakota from Wyoming provided a certificate which showed completion of an EMT course. However, the individual never tested at the state or national level to become an EMT, but continued to show the certificate of completion from an EMT course to convince employers he was an EMT.

Just as we would not allow physicians and nurses to hold themselves out if they were not licensed to practice, those misrepresenting themselves as an EMS provider should also fall under a penalty. This bill would allow for prosecution under a Class B misdemeanor.

This law would include any person misrepresenting themselves as any of the following; EMT-Basic, EMT-Intermediate, EMT-Paramedic, and certified First Responder.

We ask for your support on HB 1306, and to give it a favorable "do pass" recommendation.
