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## Minutes:

Rep. Weisz, Chairman opened the hearing on HB 1368, a bill for an Act to amend and reenact subsection 1 of section 39-04-12 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the distinctive number on vehicle number plates.

Rep. Froelich: Representing District 31. Representative Kempenich asked me to fill in for him as he could not be here. This law is already in effect in other states. The counties in South Dakota and in Montana have the county designation on their plates already. We have heard there ulterior motive in this bill to find out where people are from. Representative Kempenich assures me there is no such thing. Rep. Kempenich had prepared written testimony. A copy of his testimony is attached.

Keith Magnuson: Representing the North Dakota DOT. They are concerned about this bill because of the impact it would have on the Department. In talking with Rep. Kempenich I find that the problems he has is much smaller than the solution in this bill. With this bill we would

have the general issuance of plates --- which our fiscal note reflects--- that cost so much because all vehicles would have to have letters signifying the county of the residence of the registered owner. Other states have this in their laws -- in South Dakota and in Montana --- but in most states that have this provision -- the counties collect the fees and pay over to the state a portion of the fees. Ours is just the opposite as we collect the fees at the state level and distribute to the cities and to the counties. It makes sense for the counties to have county designations on the plates because they are trying to collect their money. In talking to Rep. Kempenich, it appears that they are trying to get at those farm trucks -- which are licensed at a much lower cost as farm vehicles doing commercial hauling. Keith Kyser can talk to this issue better than I but there are exemptions in the law for trading work, etc. If it is an enforcement problem, law enforcement can haul these trucks over to check their loads. But, to place this requirement on all vehicle for the farm truck problems seems excessive. Farm trucks are supposed to be limited to one hundred fifty miles to carry their own produce. We will computer programming changes but the bigger problem is that we would have to have a much bigger inventory of plates out in those branch offices for those counties they serve--- there is a substantial cost to administer this program. Rep. Weisz, Chairman: Rep. Kempenich, gave us some testimony---- do you read into this bill that this would take effect only when there is a general issuance of plates? <u>Keith Magnuson:</u> That is correct -- it doesn't say that we have to have a new general issuance but if it did we would need a lot of money to do that but it would only be at a general issuance that we could do this -- with the letters, etc.

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Rep. Ruby: (5.7) Is it possible that they (farm trucks hauling commercial loads) could haul for neighbors and still stay within the one hundred fifty mile radius? So this wouldn't correct the problem, right?

Keith Magnuson: That is correct because basically it is an enforcement problem. They could easily be hauling for hire within that radius and you wouldn't know it. It is probably not an easy problem to fix.

Keith Kyser: Director of Motor Vehicle Division of the DOT. It isn't very often that I stand up after my boss and correct something he said-- but there is no one hundred fifty mile restriction on the hauling of farm products. There is a restriction on the driver's license. There is a provision in the law for helping out another farmer by hauling for him -- an example I though of this morning would that of a valley farmer hauling sugar beets and then going to the far western part of the state to help out with sugar beets hauls in the Trenton area -- exchanging labor. I helped put the fiscal note together and I did read the bill to mean that we would have to have a general issuance under this bill. I would ask that if the committee is for this bill that would clarify if they mean for a general issuance because of the costs.

There being no further testimony on HB 1368, Rep. Weisz, Chairman closed the hearing on HB 1368. (7.9)

This bill requires that most license plates display a two letter county designator. The only way to comply with the provisions of this bill is to issue new license plates for most vehicles.

All MV expenses are funded directly from the HW distribution fund proceeds before distribution. Thus, the \$4 million of additional expenses resulting from this bill would come directly off the top of the HW distribution fund before the balance of the fund is distributed between DOT, and the cities and counties. As a result, the amount available for distribution would decrease by \$4 million dollars. The resulting revenue loss to the DOT for transportation purposes would be \$2.52 million. The loss to the cities and counties would by \$.56 million and \$.92 million respectively.

In order to prevent this revenue loss if this bill were passed, additional revenue of \$4 million would have to be generated. As written, this bill does not provide for this additional revenue.

B. Expenditures: Explain the expenditure amounts. Provide detail, when appropriate, for each agency, line item, and fund affected and the number of FTE positions affected.

The estimated cost for a general issuance of license plates is \$3.5 million. In addition, the Department of Transportation will have to purchase and use more license plates under the provisions of this bill as a result of customers who move from one county to another. Also, each of the 17 offices that issue license plates will need to maintain a larger of license plates for all 53 counties as county residents are not restricted to purchasing their license plates in their county of residence. Finally, some changes will need to be made to our computer system to ensure the correct county plates are issued for each vehicle. The overall estimated cost is \$4 million.
