Initially there will be major computer and printing costs. This will be less after the first year. Each year there will be administrative costs to process the coupon payments. The estimated first year setup and administrative costs are \$100,000.

If appropriations are provided, there will be a maximum of about \$550,000 in payments made for coupons for each year. As written, gratis license holders will also qualify for \$5 coupon payments even though they do not pay for their license. A certian percentage of the coupons will not be returned, but this number is not know.



- 10. For a nonresident nongame hunting license, fifteen dollars.
- 11. For a wild turkey permit, eight dollars.
- 12. For an annual general game license, three dollars.
- For a permit to propagate, domesticate, or possess protected wildlife, five dollars.
- For a license to a nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs, or that person's agent, the amount that the nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs would pay for a nonresident buyer or shipper of green furs license or

Each motorboat twenty feet [6.1 meters] in length or over excluding canoes, thirty-three dollars.
- 21. To operate watercraft used for hire, the following license fees apply for three years:
 - Class 1. Each craft capable of carrying two adults of average weight, six dollars.
 - Class 2. Each craft capable of carrying three adults of average weight, six dollars.
 - Class 3. Each craft capable of carrying four adults of average weight, six dollars.
 - Class 4. Each craft capable of carrying five adults of average weight, six dollars.
 - Class 5. Each craft capable of carrying up to eight adults of average weight, nine dollars.
 - Class 6. Each craft capable of carrying up to ten adults of average weight, twelve dollars.
 - Class 7. Each craft capable of carrying up to fifteen adults of average weight, twenty-four dollars.
 - Class 8. Each craft capable of carrying sixteen or more adults of average weight, thirty dollars.
- 22. For the taking of undesirable fish from the waters of this state pursuant to section 20.1-06-05, fifteen dollars for each hoop-net or trap, and fifteen dollars for each seine of fifty feet [15.24 meters] or any fraction thereof.
- 23. For a license to erect, have, and maintain on the ice in this state a fishhouse used or to be used to protect one while ice fishing or a dark house used or to be used for spearfishing, ten dollars for each unit.
- 24. For a resident paddlefish tag annual license, three dollars per tag.
- 25. For a nonresident paddlefish tag annual license, seven dollars and fifty cents per tag.



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
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- 27. For an annual license to sell minnows or other live balt at retail, fifteen dollars, except the fee is seventy-five dollars if white suckers are sold.
- 28. For an annual license to operate a private fish hatchery, seventy-five dollars.
- 29. For a resident commercial frog license, fifty dollars.
- 30. For a nonresident commercial frog license, two hundred dollars.
- 31. For a resident frog license, three dollars.
- 32. For a resident husband and wife frog license, five dollars.
- 33. For a shooting preserve operating permit:
 - a. One hundred dollars, if the shooting preserve consists of an area of six hundred forty acres [259 hectares] or less; or
 - b. One hundred dollars, if the shooting preserve consists of an area of more than six hundred forty acres [259 hectares], plus fifty cents per acre [.40 hectare] for each acre [.40 hectare] over six hundred forty acres [259 hectares].
- 34. For an annual license to guide for both hunting and fishing, one hundred fifty dollars.
- 35. For an annual license to guide only for hunting, one hundred dollars.
- 36. For an annual license to guide only for fishing, one hundred dollars.
- 37. For a nonresident waterfowl hunting license, ten dollars.
- 38. For a nonresident husband and wife fishing license, thirty-five dollars.
- 39. For a nonresident short-term three-day fishing license, ten dollars.
- 40. For a nonresident fur-bearer and nongame hunting license, twenty-five dollars.
- 41. For a combination license, twenty-seven dollars.
- 42. For a white-tailed deer license sold to certified guides or outfitters and provided by them to nonresidents, two hundred fifty dollars.
- 43. For a resident swan license, five dollars.
- 44. For a nonresident swan license, twenty-five dollars.
- 45. For a resident and nonresident sandhill crane license, five dollars.
- 46. For a resident commercial clam license, one hundred dollars.
- 47. For a nonresident commercial clam license, one thousand dollars.

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- 48. For a commercial clam dealer's permit, two thousand dollars. In addition, the applicant shall submit to the director a surety bond in the sum of two thousand dollars.
- 49. For an annual nonresident license to sell minnows or other live bait at wholesale, two hundred dollars.
- 50. For a bighorn sheep license issued to a nonresident, five hundred dollars.
- 51. For a nonresident reciprocal trapping license, two hundred fifty dollars.
- 52. For a nonresident spring white goose license, fifty dollars.
- 53. For a resident certificate fee, one dollar, and for a nonresident certificate fee, two dollars. An agent may not charge a service fee for issuing a resident or nonresident certificate fee.

<u>Senator Thomas Fischer</u>, Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee opened the hearing on HB 1391 relating to big game hunting license fees.

All members of the committee were present.

Representative Duane DeKrey of District 14 cosponsor of HB 1391 presented the bill to help relations between land owners and hunters. This bill adds a \$5.00 fee on a license which go to helping provide places for people to hunt. The bill will need to be amended because some issues have risen since the bill was in the house. There is some disagreement whether it is proportional and fair between residents and non residents. As the bill reads, the money will now go to the PLOTS program and it should go to the Private Land Initiative (PLI).

<u>Dennis Daniel</u> testified on HB 1391 stating that with amendments he could support it. This started as a coupon bill where the hunter would have a \$5.00 coupon and would give it to the land owner and in turn he sent it into the Game & Fish and then receive \$5.00. Now the bill

comes in this way and thinks it is unfair. Raise the fee evenly across the board, youth, resident and non resident alike.

David Munsch testified on HB 1391 stating that fees for non residents should be proportional because now it is unfair.

Roger Rustvet, Deputy Director of the North Dakota Game and Fish Department testified on HB 1391 in a neutral opposition stating they have concerns now as the bill is written. The basic concepts of the bill is that it raises all the license fees for deer hunting by \$5.00 and the money then goes into the PLOTS (Private Land Open To Sportsman) program. This will probably raise about \$1 million for the access program, but what it really does is take money from the deer program who do not have access problems and subsidizes the upland game and waterfowl access programs. To be fair the money generated should go to deer access programs. This bill raises the fee by \$5.00 and if passed HB 1358 will also raise the fee \$5.00 for the habitat stamp.

Senator Stanley Lyson stated his area farmers do want license fees increased as this could reduce the number of license sold and they want the deer numbers down.

Written testimony was passed out to the committee from Mike Donahue of the United sportsmen of North Dakota and the N.D. Wildlife Federation and Haroid Neameyer of the Cass Caounyt Wildlife Club. (See attached).

Senator Fischer closed the hearing on HB 1391.

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





North Dakota Game and Fish Department Testimony for HB 1391 Dealing with Landowner Coupons

- 1. North Dakota has not had significant fee hunting problems with deer hunting like we have had for pheasants and waterfowl. Landowners generally understand that they need to let hunters in so they do not have too many deer. This coupon system starts fee hunting for deer and it will probably grow with time. If landowners want to charge for hunting, they can do it by collecting directly from the hunters. This is not a bill that the ND Game and Fish Department can support.
- 2. Administration of this system will be a major challenge. There will be 100,000 coupons or more each year. Tens of thousands will be returned for payment. Data entry and IRS record keeping will be major jobs. The state will have to prepare and deliver tens of thousands of checks and many of the checks would be for \$5. Note that landowners would not be the only ones who could turn in coupons for payment. Individual hunters who did not take a deer or who hunted on public land could also request five dollar payments for their coupons.
- 3. As written, this bill requires that coupons be put on gratis/no cost licenses. These license holders would not pay anything of their license, but would be eligible for a \$5 payment if they turned in their coupon. I suspect this is not the intent of the sponsors.
- 4. No appropriation is provided so Game and Fish can make payments for the coupons.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

I am Harold Neameyer speaking on behalf of the Cass County Wildlife Club. The Cass County Wildlife Club is opposed to HB 1391. The intent to provide some financial support to landowners is admirable; however providing only \$5.00 is not an amount that will make a difference one way or another.

There may be misuse of the funds because there is no verification of where an animal was harvested. Are gratis licenses included? The administrative paper work would necessitate adding staff. For example, a hunter could recoup their own coupon cost if they harvested an animal on public land. Postage would be excessive.

There are enforcement issues that take warden's time and effort. The benefits of this bill do not offset the problems it may cause; therefore, we oppose HB 1391.
