

Earl Strinden, former Representative, Majority Leader: I look back with fond memories in my 22 years of service. Why name this facility, Ralph Engelstad? He was determined to have the facility built as soon as possible, we are now in the process of making this a non-profit charitable organization all of the revenues will go as a benefit as the donor had wished.

The reason for putting it in a statute is when the family, came up after Ralph's death, the question came up is how do we know that maybe someone will decide to change the name. Yes, it could be changed sometime but the process it would have to come before the legislature to do it. One of the largest gifts made, ranking among the top 10 in the entire nation for a gift, total gift asking for nothing, it was a gift for the people of N.D. for the benefit of our state as pointed out in his letter to the Governor. It will be very meaningful for the family, and hopefully along the way there will other Ralph Engelstads, that will favor our state.

Chuck Stroup, President, Board of Higher Education: The board hasn't taken up this bill, and we don't have a position per say, I think the general idea of the legislature getting in the business of naming buildings is a bad one, because you can see all the concerns. I can see why you want to support this bill by the amount of the gift. I don't want to step on anyones toes, and I hope you will appreciate that.
